TITLE OF RESOLUTION: AN ACT RELATING TO AN EMERGENCY; AMENDING 11 N.N.C. §§ 8 ET SEQ. AND 824 REGARDING QUALIFICATIONS FOR CANDIDATES FOR ELECTIVE OFFICES WHILE ALLOWING NAVAJO VOTERS TO ALTERNATIVELY ELECT A CANDIDATE OF THEIR CHOICE BY MEANS OF WRITE-IN VOTING

PURPOSE: This resolution will amend 11 N.N.C. §§ 8 *et seq.* and 824 regarding qualifications for candidates for elective offices. Among other matters, the bill, if approved, will allow Navajo voters to alternatively elect a candidate of their choice by means of writein voting.

This written summary does not address recommended amendments as may be provided by the standing committees. The Office of Legislative Counsel requests each Council Delegate to review each proposed resolution in detail.

BE IT ENACTED:

Section One. Findings

A. Navajo Nation government consists of three branches of government, each separately exercising distinct assigned powers. The Legislative Branch of the Navajo Nation government consists of the Navajo Nation Council and other programs and offices. 2 N.N.C. §102 *et seq*. The Council is a representative body, consisting of members elected by voters of the Navajo Nation. Under the structure of Navajo Nation government, the Council exercises legislative powers of government. As a law-making body, the Navajo Nation Council enacts law through legislation and sets and establishes policy for the Navajo Nation (including its entities and programs). The President executes laws passed by the Council and the Courts, when necessary, interpret such laws.

- B. The 2014 Navajo Nation election was disrupted when a Navajo Nation presidential candidate was challenged about his fluency in Navajo language and was eventually removed from the ballot by the Navajo Nation Supreme Court. This resulted in the formation of at least two groups of Navajo people. One group is concerned about the need to keep fluency requirement for a Navajo presidential candidate. Another group, composed largely of a younger generation of Navajo people, is insisting upon the recognition of their right to vote and elect a leader of their choice. Despite the bifurcation of ideals, Navajo Nation needs to remain whole and address the concerns of both groups. This division in ideals is unnecessary.
- C. Navajo parents and their leaders have consistently sent Navajo youth to seek and obtain Western education and to return to help the Navajo Nation. Many have obtained this education but at institutions far from Navajoland. Further, young Navajo persons are getting their Western education at state-controlled school systems which do not prioritize the teaching of Navajo language and culture. As a result, many of our Navajo youth have become less fluent or proficient in the Navajo language. In 1980, it was reported that 80% of Navajo people spoke Navajo. However, today, this percentage is down to 68%. Navajo Times, January 15, 2015.
- D. All Navajo people, particularly our youth, should be encouraged to participate in government, including the electoral process. If young Navajo persons are not allowed to participate in the election of offices as candidates, there could be a long-lasting division incongruent with the Navajo concept of harmony or hozho.
- E. Aside the Navajo Nation Presidential position, there are "fluency" provisions in Navajo law for other offices within the Navajo Nation government.
- F. Write-in voting procedure is necessary to allow Navajo voters to vote for an alternative candidate in recognition of the principle that Navajo voters are allowed to vote for candidates of their choice.
- G. Navajo Nation Council has received many requests from the voting public that the law or the electoral process be immediately reviewed or otherwise amended to permit a broader more inclusive system which encourages fair participation in government. The need to address this issue facing the Navajo Nation constitutes an

emergency under the laws of the Navajo Nation. Statutory provisions under the Navajo Nation legislative process provide - "Matters constituting an emergency shall be limited to the cessation of law enforcement services, and disaster relief services, fire protection services or other direct services required as an entitlement under Navajo Nation or Federal law, or which directly threaten the sovereignty of the Navajo Nation. Such an emergency matter must arise due to the pressing public need for such resolution(s) and must be a matter requiring final action by the Council." 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(16). The Navajo Nation is a sovereign nation. As a sovereign entity, it must immediately address the issue of voting rights facing many Navajo voters.

H. Accordingly, it is in the best interest of the Navajo Nation to accommodate the concerns of the Navajo voting population by immediately designing a law which promotes confidence in the electoral process, particularly the ability and interest to vote in elections again.

Section Two. Amending Title 11, Navajo Election Code

§ 2. Definitions

II. "Special elections" - Elections called by the <u>Navajo Nation Council or</u> Board in the event of a sufficient recall or referendum petition or to fill a vacancy in accord with this Title.

§ 4. Voting; number of votes

- A. Except as provided by Navajo Nation law, \forall voting shall be by secret pictorial ballot. If a candidate fails to comply with the provisions of 11 N.N.C. § 27, Ballot Picture, his or her picture will be deleted from the ballot.
- B. Each registered voter shall be entitled to cast one vote for each position that his or her precinct is entitled to elect in the primary, general, and chapter elections; provided, however, that no voter may cast more than one vote for any one candidate.

1	C. In an election involving a write-in candidate, a name stamp or other form of a

B. All candidates determined eligible by the Navajo Election Administration following review of candidate applications shall be placed on the special election ballot.

C. Notwithstanding authorization in other elections, <u>W</u>write-in candidacies shall not be allowed in special elections <u>unless otherwise provided for by resolution of</u> the Navajo Nation Council.

§ 145. Conduct of special elections

In the absence of a Navajo Nation Council resolution setting out a procedure for conducting a special election, or unless otherwise provided by Navajo Nation law, sepecial elections shall be conducted in the same manner as other elections except as follows:

- A. There shall be a 14-day filing period upon a declaration of vacancy.
- B. Candidate applications for the Offices of the Navajo Nation President and Vice President shall be filed at the same time.
- C. Upon the expiration of a filing period, the Navajo Election Administration shall, within five days, review applications filed and determine whether applicants should be certified as eligible for candidacy. An applicant disqualified or otherwise deemed ineligible for office may file a grievance pursuant to 11 N.N.C. § 341.

E. Must be able to understand and speak Navajo and English and write the English language, except as otherwise provided by Navajo Nation law, including 11 N.N.C. § 8.

Section Three. Effective Date

These amendments shall become effective in accord with 2 N.N.C. § 221(B).

Section Four. Codification

The provisions of this Amendment shall be codified by the Office of Legislative Counsel. The Office of Legislative Counsel shall incorporate this amendment into the next codification or supplement of the Navajo Nation Code.

Section Five. Saving Clause

Should any provision of this Act be determined invalid by the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, or the District Courts of the Navajo Nation without appeal to the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, those provisions of the Act which are not determined invalid shall remain the law of the Navajo Nation.
