PURPOSE: This legislation, if approved, will appropriate \$4,842,845.00 from the Síhasin Fund for the construction of a new Cameron Chapter House building.

BE IT ENACTED:

SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

- A. The Resources and Development Committee is established as a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council with oversight authority over all Navajo Nation Chapters and their Chapter activities. 2 N.N.C. §500(C).
- B. The Budget and Finance Committee is established as a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council that is authorized to review and recommend to the Navajo Nation Council the budgeting, appropriation, investment and management of all funds. 2 N.N.C. §301(B)(2).

- 1 C. The Naabik'íyáti' Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council
2 that considers all proposed final actions by the Navajo Nation Council. 2 N.N.C.
3 §164(A)(9).
- 4 D. The Navajo Nation Council is the governing body of the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C.
5 §102(A). As such, the Council may approve appropriations from the Navajo Nation's
6 Síhasin Fund.
- 7 E. 12 N.N.C. §2502, as amended by CJA-03-18, states the purpose of the Navajo Nation
8 Síhasin Fund ("Síhasin Fund") as follows:
9 §2502 Purpose
- 10 A. The purposes of this Fund are to provide financial support and/or financing for:
- 11 1. The planning and development of economic development and regional
12 infrastructure supporting economic development and community development,
13 including such infrastructure as, but not limited to, housing, commercial and
14 government buildings, waterline, solid waste management development,
15 powerline Projects, and transportation and communication systems, within the
16 Navajo Nation; and . . .
- 17 B. For the Purpose in §2502(A)(1), Fund expenditures for infrastructure shall not be
18 limited by 12 N.N.C. §1310(F) or TCDCJY-77-99.
- 19 C. Leveraging the Fund by way of guaranteeing loans, match funding, direct funding
20 in part, and other weighted uses of the Fund, including loan financing from the
21 Fund, for the purposes in §2502(A)(1), shall be favored over direct funding in
22 whole.
- 23 F. The Síhasin Fund provides that "Fund Principal" shall consist of all deposits made to
24 the Síhasin Fund and that "Fund Income" shall consist of all earnings (interest,
25 dividends, etc.) generated and realized by the Fund Principal, and that Síhasin Fund
26 Income shall be deposited in, and added to, the Fund Principal until such time as a
27 Fund Expenditure Plan is duly approved. 12 N.N.C. §2504 and §2505(C).
- 28 G. The Síhasin Fund also provides that "Fund Principal and Income shall not be expended
29 except pursuant to a Fund Expenditure Plan consistent with the purposes set forth in
30

1 §2502 of this Chapter and adopted by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of all members of the
2 Navajo Nation Council.” 12 N.N.C. §2505(A).

4 **SECTION TWO. FINDINGS**

5 A. The Navajo Nation Council Resolution Nos. CAP-35-18, as amended by CJA-03-21
6 and CMY-45-23, each included and incorporated herein by reference, equally
7 appropriated \$4,166,666.67 to each Council Delegate District, which provided for a
8 three-year Síhasin fund plan for Chapter projects across the Navajo Nation.

9 B. The Budget and Finance Committee Resolution No. BFAP-09-22, included and
10 incorporated herein by reference, approved a project change to CAP-35-18, Project
11 Nos. D-117 and D-118, for the benefit of the Cameron Chapter and re-appropriated
12 Síhasin funds in the amount of \$733,334.66 to the project titled, “ *Plan, Design,*
13 *Demolition & Construct New Chapter Building*” for Cameron Chapter.

14 C. The Navajo Nation Division of Community Development’s Capital Projects
15 Management Department (“CPMD”), on behalf of the Cameron Chapter, expended
16 \$240,000.00 of the Síhasin funds, appropriated through BFAP-09-22, on the *Cameron*
17 *Chapter Demolition Project*, which demolished the *old* Cameron Chapter House
18 building to remediate the site for the construction of a *new* Cameron Chapter House
19 building. This demolition and site remediation project completed on August 10, 2023.

21 D. The completion of the *Cameron Chapter Demolition Project* adjusted the available
22 Síhasin funds, appropriated under BFAP-09-22, to \$493,334.66, which is available to
23 expend on the construction of a *new* Cameron Chapter House building. **Exhibit B.**

24 E. The Cameron Chapter has provided a proposal for the construction of a new Cameron
25 Chapter House building. The Chapter, in its proposal, requests additional Síhasin
26 funds in the amount of \$4,842,844.34 for the construction of a *new* Cameron Chapter
27 House building. **Exhibit C.**

28 F. The CPMD, on behalf of the Cameron Chapter, prepared a Scope of Work (dated
29 December 8, 2023) that summarizes in detail the project work, project plan, project
30 budget, a conceptual floor plan, photos of the remediated site and proposed Navajo

1 Nation budget forms for the construction of a *new* Cameron Chapter House building.
2 This Scope of Work also identifies a shortfall (under *Const. Request Need*) of
3 \$4,842,845.00 for the construction of a *new* Cameron Chapter House building.

5 G. The Cameron Chapter, on behalf of itself and its community, provided Cameron
6 Chapter Resolution No. CA-012-354#2 (certified on January 12, 2024) that requests
7 Síhasin funds in the amount of \$4,842,844.34 for the construction of a *new* Cameron
8 Chapter House building. **Exhibit E.**

9 H. Allocation of the Síhasin funds as requested by the Cameron Chapter meets the criteria
10 for Síhasin expenditures because the proposed expenditure involves community
11 development and government buildings as described in 12 N.N.C. §2502(A)(1).
12

13 **SECTION THREE. APPROVING \$4,842,845.00 FROM THE SÍHASIN FUND FOR**
14 **THE CONSTRUCTION OF A NEW CAMERON CHAPTER HOUSE BUILDING;**
15 **AND APPROVING THE RELATED EXPENDITURE PLAN**

16 A. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. §2505(A), the Navajo Nation hereby approves \$4,842,845.00
17 from the Síhasin Fund for the construction of a new Cameron Chapter House building
18 and also approves the Expenditure Plan for the project as set forth in the attached
19 **Exhibit D.**

20 B. The total amount of Síhasin funds approved in this Act may be further leveraged by
21 bond or loan financing pursuant to the Navajo Nation Bond Financing Act (12 N.N.C.
22 §1300 *et seq.*, as amended), using Síhasin Fund earnings for repayment and financing
23 costs, upon approval of the Budget and Finance Committee and upon a 2/3 approval
24 vote of the full membership of the Navajo Nation Council.

25 C. The Controller shall determine whether the source of the Síhasin funds approved in this
26 Act will be Síhasin Fund Principal or Síhasin Fund Income, or a combination of both.

27 D. The approved Síhasin funds shall be disbursed to the Navajo Nation Division of
28 Community Development (“DCD”) within thirty (30) calendar days after the effective
29 date of this Act.

30 E. At the option of the Cameron Chapter, the DCD shall either: (1) arrange for the

Chapter's use of the funds for the construction of a new Cameron Chapter House building, in accordance with DCD's usual procedures for the release of Síhasin funds to Chapters that are governance-certified under the Local Governance Act, at 26 N.N.C. §102; or (2) implement and administer the construction of a new Cameron Chapter House building through CPMD.

F. Any Síhasin funds not spent or encumbered within thirty-six (36) months of the effective date of this Act shall revert to the Síhasin Fund Principal, unless otherwise approved prior to such reversion by both the Resources and Development Committee and the Naabik'íyáti' Committee.

G. The Síhasin funds approved herein shall not comingle with funds from any other sources for the construction of a new Cameron Chapter House building or otherwise. Any and all savings or unused amounts of the approved Síhasin funds shall be returned to the Síhasin Fund Principal once the construction of a new Cameron Chapter House building for the Cameron Chapter is completed, or upon the reversion deadline in SECTION THREE (F) above.

H. The Síhasin Fund may be reimbursed in the amount of the allocation approved herein, using funds available to the Navajo Nation from any and all state and federal sources, including Congressional appropriations under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 or other COVID-19-related relief, if the expenditure for the Cameron Chapter described herein is deemed eligible under the legal scheme governing such funding.

SECTION FOUR. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Act shall become effective pursuant to 12 N.N.C. §2505(A) and 2 N.N.C. §221(B).

SECTION FIVE. SAVING CLAUSE

If any provision of this legislation is determined invalid by the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, or by a Navajo Nation District Court without appeal to the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, those provisions of this legislation not determined invalid shall remain the law of the Navajo Nation.

I. SUMMARY

Of the 110 Chapter buildings within the Navajo Nation, eight were condemned by the Navajo Nation Division of Health. Office of Environmental Health Code Enforcement federal government, which included the Cameron Chapter facility. Tuba City Regional Health Care Corporation: Office of Environmental Health recommended closure of the Cameron Chapter due to numerous contributing factors of unsafe conditions. As a result, a licensed structural engineer inspected the Cameron Chapter for structural soundness and integrity. The primary concern was for the safety and welfare of the Cameron Chapter Staff, Officials and the general public upon their use of the facility and general services daily.

The Navajo Nation Division of Health: Office of Environmental Health/Code Enforcement, issued on Administrative Order of Condemning and Order of Permanent Closure, copy enclosed as **Exhibit A. 1.**, of the Cameron Chapter building. Results from the structural inspection of the defects found in the Fall of 2012 by the Federal Division of Environmental Health Services.

II. BACKGROUND

The Cameron Chapter is a non certified chapter and is one of the 110 Chapter Governments on the Navajo Nation. The chapter is a local governmental entity and is delegated certain authorities and responsibilities with respect to local matters consistent with the Navajo Nation Laws. Pursuant to Title 2, Section 402 (a), the Cameron Chapter has the authority to review all matters affecting the local communities and make appropriate recommendations to the Navajo Nation, County, State and Federal government agencies that are in the best interest and welfare of the local communities.

The Western Navajo Agency is the largest land base of the five agencies on the Navajo Nation that extends into the rural areas of the State of Arizona and Utah, with an estimated land size of 2,359,122 acres. The Cameron Chapter is one of the eighteen Chapters in the Western Navajo Agency with an estimated land base of 153,000 +/- acres. It is located along U.S Highway 89 at Milepost 466, 1/2 mile north of Highway 64 Junction; Cameron, Arizona. Cameron is in a very rural area with limited resources in terms of law enforcement, education, telecommunication/utilities, transportation, commercial, and healthcare access to serve the community and general public.

The chapter population according to the 2010 U.S Census is recorded of 1122. According to 1990 U.S Census records, the population was 1206.

There are limited employment opportunities available in the community, thus, the rate of unemployment is increasing. The Cameron Day School, and Cameron General Store, Cameron Chapter, Cameron Senior Citizen Center, and the two (2) Navajo Head Start Programs all employ a limited number of people. Over 70% of the community members rely on general welfare with Navajo Nation General Assistance, Navajo Nation Program for Self-Reliance and food stamps through the Department of Economic Security. Elders and disabled rely on Social Security and/or Disability benefits.

The Cameron Chapter is focused on improving the safety, social, economic, health and

educational conditions of the families residing in the community. To promote these plans, the community recognizes that infrastructure development is the most important. The community has also been affected by the Bennett Freeze, land dispute with the Hopi Tribe that prohibited any construction, development and building repairs without written expressed approval from both tribes. Approximately 49,925 acres were affected by the Bennett Freeze. For over 40 years the Former Bennett Freeze Area, has resulted in severe social and economic problems for the community of Cameron. Due to these conditions many members of the community have relocated to nearby towns for better health services, education, and the convenience of modern-day necessities. The construction prohibition was lifted in 2009, future projects will improve the living conditions of the people by continuous community education and functions by the local community government.

III. Problem Statement and Need Assessment

On October 9, 2015, the Federal Division of Environmental Health Services conducted a physical inspection of the Cameron Chapter Building. Due to severe shift in the foundation and load bearing walls, it resulted a possible danger of the building roof collapsing. There was possible presence of asbestos and lead paint in the walls, roof, plumbing and ceiling areas. In 1959, the building was built of cinderblocks and lumber by local unskilled labors. The building had most of the original plumbing and electrical work laid over half a century before.

On October 15, 2012, the Federal Division of Environmental Health Services (DEHS) generated an inspection report that outlined a recommendation to the Cameron Chapter, to close due to several contributing factors. It was also recommended that a certified structural engineer inspect the Cameron Chapter for structural integrity. The interested parties' primary concern is for the safety and welfare of the Cameron chapter staff, officials and the community upon their use of the facility and daily general services to the public.

On the summer of 2023, Cameron Chapter Staff and the Executive Director of Division of Community Development, in cooperation with Navajo Nation Capital Project Management Department (CPMD), a visual inspection was conducted of the Chapter building's demolition project was completed and ready for a new development.

Due to community needs for ongoing local services and functions within the Cameron Chapter community, the Administration office is currently utilizing a building built in the 80s located within the Chapters premise as the main office to continue assisting community members.

Space limitation in Cameron remains the same along with providing necessary services to the community, which continues to be a challenge. Other challenging factors are improvements on increasing productivity for the chapter administrative staff to meet the demands of the community and the general public, and most public meetings continue to be held at the Cameron Senior Citizens' Center with very limited space. At times, the public meetings in the Senior Citizens' Center becomes overcrowded exceeding the maximum occupancy of 54. It causes a safety and health concern and deters community members away. Despite these challenges' factors with no local community facility, the Cameron Chapter continues to encourage the community and general public to attend public meetings and/or other social functions that are

important for community awareness.

Space limitations have also caused limited spending on the chapter's Summer Youth Employment and Public Employment Program funds to employ in the community is essential and necessary for the Chapter to complete local projects. These programs also allow the community to be self-sufficient and gives the youth the opportunity to pay for books, clothes, supplies, registration fees, etc., for the upcoming school year.

Cameron Chapter employs an average of 15 Public Employment Program Participants throughout the Fiscal Year, an average of 20 age approved Summer Youth Employment Program Participant as well as numerous Participants from programs such as Office of Dine Youth and the Navajo Nation Workforce Development.

IV. OBJECTIVES AND GOAL

This project is to provide a healthy and safe environment, and to enhance the overall quality of life for the general public of the Cameron Community, Administrative Staff, and the Chapter Officials. Cameron community members have had many challenges including disruption of basic human services over the last forty years caused by federally imposed construction prohibition, known as the Bennett Freeze. Through the successful and timely completion of this project, the Chapter will exemplify its ability to continue working with various agencies and organizations in fulfilling the community prioritized needs of the Cameron Chapter. The completion of this project will also contribute to further capital development. Examples are additional power line extensions, waterline extensions, road improvements for safer accessibility of schools, law enforcement, emergency medical services, community health representatives to attend to high risk patients, etc. In order to meet the Cameron community needs and goals, the Navajo Nation Capital Project Management Department (CPMD), formerly known as Navajo Nation DES, supports and encourages the approval of the funding that is being requested along with numerous other entities.

V. SCOPE OF WORK

The construction of a new Cameron Chapter building was proposed in two (2) phases:

Phase One (1) of the project design is complete with a cost estimate of \$280,000.00. Chapter design of the new building was increased from 4,000 square feet to 4,500 square feet. Increase of the building was the chapter's desire to provide adequate space for the community's needs.

Phase two (2) of the project is estimated at \$4,842,844.34.00 for the construction of the new Cameron Chapter building. The goal is to complete the construction of the new Cameron Chapter building on its scheduled timeline and within the proposed budget.

Project milestone: See **Exhibit A** that references the updated Cameron Chapter Project Schedule.

The new Cameron Chapter building will be 4,500 square feet with unique designs that will entail energy efficient features and a voltage converter system that meets renewable portfolio standards for the State of Arizona. It will have large windows for cross ventilation and cooling purposes. The electrical wiring will be specific to include an area for future computer lab terminals and the

chapter house will provide WIFI/Broadband services to the community. The bathrooms will have Americans with Disability Act (ADA) handicapped accessibility and low water usage toilets.

The Cameron Chapter Administration and CMPD will oversee construction projects and management of the new building. For the past fifty years, the organization has been responsible for the majority of all community procurement and local budgets. Through our vast experience, the administration will use their expertise and knowledge to ensure the new chapter building project will meet milestones and deadlines by working with CMPD.

The Cameron Chapter administration maintains and establishes all local utility infrastructures along with managing and operating a watering point for the entire community. Cameron Chapter staff oversee maintenance of two Head Start buildings and the Senior Center within the community while meeting both federal and tribal standings.

The Cameron Chapter in collaboration with CMPD have conducted feasibility studies and determined that all utilities are on-site to support the new structure. The site is located within the withdrawn land of the chapter tract that belongs to the Cameron Chapter and right-of-way access are currently available to the site.

The community watering point is located within the chapter premise. The community watering point remains a primary source for local domestic and livestock use, vital to approximately 60 percent of the community who still lack running water in their homes. Future infrastructure in these areas of the community will improve over time as the construction of the new chapter building is complete. More community interaction with critical involvement of the stakeholders to guide and contribute in completion of infrastructure projects will decrease the amount of people lacking running water.

The old Cameron Chapter House was the main artery providing liveliness to the community for over 50 years. Traditional meetings, celebrations, games, educational workshops, and other social events have since ceased since the closure of the Chapter House in October 2012. Public meetings continue to be held in the temporary modular building with limited space. Nursing and public health consultations have also discontinued due to limited space. The nearest medical facility is in nearby Tuba City, 25 miles away. Cameron was a long-time participant in the mobile medical unit, courtesy of Tuba City Regional Health Care Center, this offered community members the convenience of receiving non emergent medical care, this service has since decreased as we are short on space-age. The food distribution program that provided much needed food assistance to community members, mainly elderly community members with limited income has since closed and no longer provides assistance as we have no space for them.

VI. Location of the New Cameron Chapter Building

Below: The location of the future Cameron Chapter Building will be located on the same site as the previously demolished Chapter Building as shown below in the red box. The site is located adjacent to the Cameron Head Start Building. The Cameron school is located about 50 yards north of the yard depicted in white and 100 yards from the Senior Citizen Building. The community watering point is located south the warehouse.

To limit construction costs and meet budget goals, the new Cameron Chapter building will be reconstructed on the same site as the old chapter building. With the increasing enrollment population and discontinuation of local services, the demand for a new chapter building has increased. No community chapter facility limits meeting the growing needs of the community, this includes veterans, youth, and elders. A new chapter building will extensively help expedite a return of a local community culture, tradition, and education, employment, re-opening of scheduled events to encourage community developments and improvements, traditional celebrations, and other social activities for the betterment of Cameron that includes health promotions and maintaining an active lifestyle. The Chapter anticipates a return of the much-needed commodity food program and other welfare services. The Nurse Consultation office will also reopen, and a community room will be available for voting, town meetings, weddings, funeral practices, etc. A future computer lab with Wi-Fi internet access will be available for virtual learning and the Chapter hopes to open a small gym facility for the community seeking a more active lifestyle.

1. The Cameron Chapter is a duly recognized chapter of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 26 N.N.C § 3; and is delegated the authority and responsibility to promote projects that benefit the local community; and
2. Cameron chapter is vested with the authority to review all matters affecting the community and make appropriate recommendations to the Navajo Nation, Federal, State, and local government agencies for appropriate actions; and

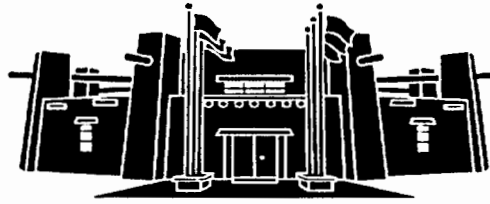

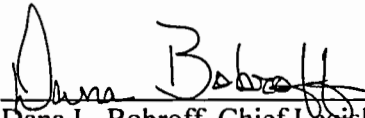
