BONAVENTURE INDIAN MISSION SCHOOL TO PURCHASE THREE

SCHOOL BUSES

Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. 1005 (C)(10), action for Legislation CMA-17-16 is being submitted to the Navajo Nation Council, through the Office of the Speaker within the ten (10) days requirement. Furthermore, the Navajo Nation President has line item veto authority for budget items within the annual Navajo Nation Comprehensive Budget or Supplemental Appropriations, which are not subject to override by the Navajo Nation Council. 2 N.N.C. 164 (A)(17).

After review of Resolution No. CMA-17-16, Relating to Budget and Finance Committee, Naabik'íyáti' Committee and the Navajo Nation Council; Approving Supplemental Funding from the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance in the amount of \$300,000 in the form of a grant, for the St. Bonaventure Indian Mission School to purchase three school buses, I hereby exercise my lineveto to:

SECTION 2. Approving Supplemental Funding from the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance the amount of \$300,000, in the form of a grant, for the St. Bonaventure Indian Mission School, in its entirety.

The justification for use of the President's line-tem veto is set forth below.

Primarily, the amount requested and the amount needed is unclear. This legislation attempts to appropriate \$300,000 to acquire three (3) 55 passenger-seat buses. Based on the proposal from the school, the cost for one (1) 55 passenger-seat bus is \$65,000. This means for three (3) school buses at \$65,000 is \$195,000. This leaves a remaining \$105,000. It is not clear what this remaining amount is to be used for, as the budget clearly states only for the acquisition of three (3) buses, but that amount is \$195,000.

This is a huge discrepancy in the amount requested and the amount needed, without clarity we cannot support this appropriation. At present, the Navajo Nation is facing the largest budget shortfall, due to the decline in oil and gas. We must be very careful in the use of our funds to cover the impending shortfall. The submitted budget is not accurate and we are not in a position to appropriate funds not needed, as our future governmental operations will need every penny.

From a technical standpoint, pursuant to the Fiscal Year 2016 Budget Instructions Manual (BIM), Part V: Program Manager and Branch Chief or Division Director provides signatures and dates to indicate that the budget has been reviewed and approved by those officials. As such, Budget Forms 1 and 2 should have been signed by the School Official for Program Manager and Department of Dine Education for the Division Director. It is DODE that would administer this grant not the legislative branch. Therefore, the signatures on these forms violate the BIM.

In any case, as President of the Navajo Nation, I must protect to the best of my ability future governmental operations and continued services to our People. Therefore, I must exercise my line-item veto authority.

Section 1. Findings

- A. St. Bonaventure Indian Mission School is located in Thoreau, New Mexico. Ninety-Seven percent (97%) of the total student population is Navajo. The school needs buses to transport Navajo children to and from school. The school is urgently seeking assistance from the Navajo Nation. See budget documents attached as Exhibit "A."
- B. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 400 et seq., the Health, Education and Human Services Committee generally oversees matters relative to health, education and social services affecting the Navajo Nation, among other duties and responsibilities.
- C. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 300 (C)(1), (3) and (4), the Budget and Finance Committee is authorized to recommend adoption of resolutions related to the expenditure of the Navajo Nation's financial resources.
- D. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(9), a proposed resolution that requires final action by the Navajo Nation Council must be assigned to the Naabik'íyáti' Committee before it is considered by the Navajo Nation Council. The Navajo Nation Council is the governing body of the Navajo Nation, pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 102 (A).
- E. A preview of the appropriation legislation is available to the Office of Management and Budget for its budget impact analysis response.
- F. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(L), the Navajo Nation Council may adopt and approve supplemental appropriations to the Annual Comprehensive Budget during the fiscal year.

Supplemental appropriations of General Funds within the current fiscal year are permitted, (1) if and when additional sources of revenues above and beyond the initial or current revenue projections are projected and which are also in excess of the reserve amount set for in § 820(J) or (2) when the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund balance is in excess of the reserve amount set forth at § 820(J). The Office of the Controller has determined available funds in the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance. See Exhibit "B."

G. The Navajo Nation finds it in the best interest to approve the supplemental funding request for the St. Bonaventure Indian Mission School.

Section 2. Approving Supplemental Funding from the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance the amount of \$300,000, in the form of a grant, for the St. Bonaventure Indian Mission School

Approving supplemental funding from the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance the amount of \$300,000, in the form of a grant, for the St. Bonaventure Indian Mission School for the purchase of three (3) school buses as provided in budget documents attached as Exhibit "A." The funding shall be from that amount of funds that exceeds the minimum fund balance of the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance as determined by the Office of the Controller pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(L).

More importantly Native Americans students can attend St. Bonaventure School free of charge and does not have to be catholic.

Teaching our students to live in both worlds, the Navajo Reservation world and the dominant American culture, is the recipe for success.

MISSION STATEMENT

St. Bonaventure Indian Mission and School is an

agency providing the people of the Navajo Reservation the opportunity to develop self-sufficiency through education, employment, housing and outreach services that make available food, water and clothing, and other social services. We are motivated by the desire to mutually share the goodness of God.

INTRODUCTION

St. Bonaventure Indian Mission and School are located in Thoreau, New Mexico, on the southeastern edge of the Eastern Navajo Reservation. Thoreau is between Grants and Gallup, New Mexico, just off Interstate I-40 about 110 miles west of Albuquerque. This is a rural town of about 6,000 people, with the majority (89%) being Navajo.

The Eastern Navajo Reservation is located in a high desert region of the Southwest. The climate is semi-arid, and water is scarce and very precious. Trees used for fuel to cook are in limited supply. The altitude, ranging from 7,200 to 8,500 feet above sea level, makes for windy summers and cold harsh winters.

The Navajo Nation covers an area of 27,000 square miles in three southwestern states (New Mexico, Arizona, and Utah) and is larger than the state of West Virginia. Over 300,000 people make up the Navajo Nation, and poverty is pervasive. Unemployment is approximately 45 percent and employment opportunities are limited. The part of the Eastern Navajo Reservation which St. Bonaventure Indian Mission and School serve is at the very bottom of the economic ladder of the Navajo Nation.

TRANSPORTATION

The Mission still provides door to door transportation to its students and many of the roads the buses travel on are unimproved and treacherous roads.

The Navajo children come from the surrounding communities, from the edge and remote areas of the Navajo Reservation. Some children travel as many as 35 miles a day to attend St. Bonaventure Indian Mission and School. The Public school buses do not go off paved roads; however St. Bonaventure Indian Mission School buses (some 4 wheel drive), driven by Navajo men and women make the round-trip routes daily, because we strongly believe that no child should be left behind and we honestly and sincerely believe that every child deserves an education for a better future. The Mission is faced with constant repairs and purchasing buses periodically to ensure students receive the education they deserve.

EDUCATION

In any battle against poverty the first line of defense must be education. St. Bonaventure Indian Mission and School recognize this strategy and remains an advocate to ensure that children age 3, all the way to the 8th grade in our elementary school, are given this opportunity. Currently there are 201 Navajo students attending our school.

The purpose of St. Bonaventure Indian Mission and School is to provide Navajo children with the best education required to survive and succeed in the non-native world, or any part of that world they choose to join, as responsible citizens leading productive lives.

More importantly Native Americans students can attend St. Bonaventure School free of charge and does not have to be Catholic.

Whenever and wherever possible the Navajo traditions, culture and language are introduced into the curricula. It is an on-going process and is done in concert with the Navajo themselves. Teaching our students to live in both worlds, the Navajo Reservation world and the dominant American culture, is the recipe for success.

SCHOOL STAFF AND FUTURE DEVELOPMENT

Today, the need for teachers is as strong as ever and the Mission depends on individuals willing to give of themselves for the good of the Navajo children.

Currently we have 18 teacher/assistance who are Navajo and the remaining teachers are of Anglo origin and must be recruited throughout the United States, primarily through the AmeriCorps program. St. Bonaventure School promotes the opportunity for our Navajo teacher assistants to further their education and ensure that they become certified teachers. By promoting this opportunity we now have three certified elementary teachers.

NUTRITION

St. Bonaventure Indian Mission and School provides breakfast and lunch, 5 days a week, 9 months of the year to 201 children. For many of the children the school breakfast and lunch may be their only meals of the day.

Both juvenile and adult obesity, diabetes (type 1 and type 2) and hypertension are major health risk that the Navajo are struggling with. According to one recent study, one in four Native Americans is diabetic, which is three times the national average. St. Bonaventure Indian Mission and School is taking steps to address this issue by following a State approved menu.

Financial Update-(General Fund Revenue, Expenditures, UUFB)

The gross General Fund Revenues, see Exhibit "A", as of December 29, 2015 is \$107,488,198 and the total set asides is \$34,547,876. The Net Revenue for the General Fund is \$72,940,323 which is 44.64% of the projection. The total expenditures by branch are shown on Exhibit "B". The Legislative Branch has expenditures of \$3,096,256, encumbrances of \$988,684, with a remaining budget of \$13,479,526. The Executive Branch expenditures are \$46,734,925; encumbrances are \$7,730,151 with a remaining budget of \$124,785,988. The Judicial Branch expenditures are \$2,501,179, with encumbrances of \$6,884 and remaining budget of \$11,607,862. Total General Fund expenditures are \$52,332,360; total encumbrances are \$8,725,719 with an overall remaining budget of \$149,873,376. The updated UUFB as of December 29, 2015 is \$14,407,443, attached Exhibit "C."
