TITLE OF RESOLUTION: AN ACTION RELATING TO AN EMERGENCY AND THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; AMENDING RESOLUTION CD-80-14, ENTITLED "AN ACTION RELATING TO AN EMERGENCY; TO ADDRESS A MATTER OF NAVAJO VOTER DISENFRANCHISMENT; AND PROVIDING FOR A SPECIAL RUN-OFF ELECTION AND A SPECIAL GENERAL ELECTION FOR THE OFFICE OF PRESIDENT"

PURPOSE: This emergency resolution will amend resolution CD-80-14, entitled "An Action Relating to an Emergency; To Address a Matter of Navajo Voter Disenfranchisment; and providing for a Special Run-Off Election and a Special General Election for the Office of President"

This written summary does not address recommended amendments as may be provided by the standing committees. The Office of Legislative Counsel requests each Council Delegate to review each proposed resolution in detail.

BE IT ENACTED:

Section One. Findings

- A. On January 10, 2015, President Ben Shelly signed Res. CD-80-14.
- B. Res. CD-80-14 was considered as an emergency matter to address disenfranchisement of the votes of many Navajo voters by allowing them to vote again. Based on recommendation from the Navajo Election Administration, a special run-off election was to be scheduled for June 2, 2015; and a special general election was to be scheduled for August 4, 2015. By Res. CD-80-14, Navajo Election Administration was requested to contact 2014 primary election candidates to determine if they wish to file an application for candidacy for the Office of the President.

- C. The Navajo Election Administration has reported that it has not contacted the 2014 primary election candidates due to the filing of new court pleadings with the Navajo Supreme Court.
- D. Navajo leaders are receiving many communications about the need to resolve the election of the President and many Navajo voters are expressing their desire to have an election sooner than June 2015 and August 2015.
- E. The continuing delay of the election is preventing or otherwise hindering the installation of the next President of the Navajo Nation, causing the image of the Navajo Nation to suffer, resulting in too many uncertainties; the delay also does not allow for immediate planning by the Navajo Nation to continue basic essential governmental services for the Navajo People.
- F. Navajo Nation leadership have been "talking things out" to provide for the continued leadership in the Office of the President and to resolve the election of a new President while recognizing that many Navajo votes were disenfranchised. Several pieces of legislation have been introduced to address the issue of disenfranchisement of Navajo voters.
- G. Res. CD-80-14 funded the special primary and general elections in the amount of \$317,891.00 and required said funding should be re-appropriated and be expended and used for election(s) scheduled pursuant to this legislation in conformance with budget documents inserted hereto as Exhibit "A".
- H. The late filing of grievances, the different interpretations of the law and the late decisions by the Office of Hearings and Appeals and the Navajo Nation Supreme Court have contributed to the instability and confusion in the 2014 Navajo Nation Election.
- I. Joe Shirley, Jr., received the highest amount of votes in the 2014 Navajo Nation primary election.
- J. Although Russell Begaye finished third in the 2014 Navajo Nation primary election, he was ordered by the Navajo Office of Hearings & Appeals and the Navajo Nation Supreme Court to be a candidate in the for the Office of the President.

- K. The inconsistencies in the Election Code may potentially violate due process rights of candidates, deny the right to the equal protection of the law and infringe upon the fundamental right of voters to select their own leaders. The right of Navajo People to elect a leader of their choice should be respected.
- L. It is in the best interest of the Navajo Nation to resolve the issues, questions and concerns about the Navajo Nation presidential election and to provide for the installation of a new President sooner than what was called for in Res. CD-80-14.
- M. This matter is a continuing emergency pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(16); an emergency is limited to matters which directly threaten the sovereignty of the Navajo Nation and that such emergency matters must arise due to the pressing public need for such resolution and must be a matter requiring a final action by the Council.
- N. The lack of an election for the Office of the President and the Vice President constitutes an emergency which needs to be addressed immediately. Accordingly, for purposes of stability and the continuing of services, it is crucial, and in the best interests of the Navajo Nation, that an election for the offices of the President and Vice President take place at an earlier date.
- O. Navajo Nation Council, as the representative body of the elected representatives of the Navajo People, pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 102(A), has the prerogative and the authority to amend resolutions to provide for certain remedies and to enact resolutions pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A).

Section Two. Amending and Modifying Res. CD-80-14.

Navajo Nation Council resolution CD-80-14 is hereby amended and modified as follows:

- A. There shall only be one special election scheduled for March 24, 2015, to elect the President and Vice-President of the Navajo Nation.
- B. Joe Shirley, Jr., along with his choice for the Vice President, shall be a pictured candidate on the ballot for the special election; and his previous

- payment of a filing fee shall be sufficient and no further fee shall be required of him.
- C. Russell Begaye, along with his choice for the Vice President, shall be a pictured candidate on the ballot for the special election; and his previous payment of a filing fee shall be sufficient and no further fee shall be required of him.
- D. If the law existing at the time of the printing of the ballot allows for a write-in candidate, a space shall be provided on the ballot for a write-in candidate. If the write-in candidate paid his filing fee for the 2014 primary election, then any filing fee as a write-in candidate for the special election shall be waived. Otherwise, a fee of \$1,500.00 shall be required for any new write-in candidate. The election shall be determined by plurality vote. The candidate receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared the winner; no run-off election shall be held.
- E. Prior to the printing of the ballot for the March 24, 2015 special election, any write-in candidate, cleared by the Navajo Election Administration to participate, shall declare his choice for the Vice-President.
- F. The amount of \$317,891.00 appropriated by Res. CD-80-14 shall be appropriated and be used for the March 24, 2015 special election scheduled pursuant to this legislation in conformance with budget documents inserted hereto as Exhibit "A".
- G. All other sections of Res. CD-80-14 are rescinded and shall have no legal effect.

Section Three. Authorizing Navajo Board of Election Supervisors and the Navajo Election Administration To Implement the Special Election.

The Navajo Board of Election Supervisors and the Navajo Election Administration are hereby authorized to conduct the special Presidential general election of March 24, 2015, for the purpose of electing and certifying a new President and Vice-President of the Navajo Nation.

- A. Poll officials used in the 2014 regular general election may be used as poll officials for the special general election.
- B. All precautions and necessary steps shall be taken to -promptly send absentee ballots to persons who have voted by absentee ballots in the 2014 election cycle.
- C. Special provisions contained herein shall be consistently implemented, as much as possible, with current Election Code provisions and the intent of this resolution.
- D. Navajo Election Administration shall make arrangements for the public announcement for the special election in Navajo and English languages.

Section Four. Effective Date

These amendments are effective upon its approval pursuant to 2 N.N.C. §221(B).

Section Five. Saving Clause

Should any provision of this action be determined invalid by the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, or the District Courts of the Navajo Nation, without appeal to the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, portions not determined invalid shall remain the law of the Navajo Nation.
