AN ACTION

RELATING TO NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE; CONFIRMING THE RE-APPOINTMENT OF ANDREW BENALLIE AS A REPRESENTATIVE OF THE BLACK MESA CHAPTER TO THE BLACK MESA REVIEW BOARD

SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

- A. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. 701 (A)(1) the Naabik'íyáti' Committee has the authority to grant final confirmation of appointments to boards, commissions and colleges unless otherwise provided in law.
- B. The appointments to the Black Mesa Review Board as made by the respective Chapters require confirmation by the Naabik'íyáti' Committee. 2 N.N.C. 903(B)

SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

- A. The purpose of the Black Mesa Review Board shall be to advocate for fair and just compensation for Navajo families within the five Navajo Nation Chapters whose socio-economic and environmental interests are adversely affected or impacted by coal mining and related operations of Peabody Western Coal Company. 2 N.N.C. § 902
- B. The Board shall include one member who shall be appointed by the Black Mesa Chapter. 2 N.N.C. § 903(A)
- C. The Black Mesa Chapter appointed Andrew Benallie as the Chapter member of the Black Mesa Review Board in 2015. See Exhibit A.
- D. The Black Mesa Chapter has reappointed Andrew Benallie as the Chapter member for the Black Mesa Review Board. See Exhibit B.
- E. Within 30 days of appointment, each Board appointee shall be presented to the Naabik'iyáti' Committee for confirmation. Such confirmation to be for four years commencing upon administration of oath of office. 2 N.N.C. § 903(B)
- F. Any Board member may be appointed for consecutive terms, but shall be limited to two consecutive terms. 2 N.N.C. §903(H)

G. The Naabik'iyáti' Committee of the Navajo Nation Council finds it to be in the best interest of the Diné to confirm the reappointment of Andrew Benallie as the Black Mesa Chapter representative to the Black Mesa Review Board.

SECTION THREE. CONFIRMING APPOINTMENT

The Naabik'íyáti' Committee of the Navajo Nation Council hereby confirms the reappointment of Andrew Benallie as the Black Mesa Chapter representative to the Black Mesa Review Board for a term of four(4) years.

RESOLUTION OF THE NAABIK' ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE Of the 23RD Navajo Nation Council---First Year 2015

AN ACTION

RELATING TO THE NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE; CONFIRMING THE APPOINTMENT OF ANDREW BENALLIE AS A REPRESENTATIVE OF THE BLACK MESA CHAPTER TO THE BLACK MESA REVIEW BOARD

SECTION ONE. FINDINGS

- A. The purpose of the Black Mesa Review Board shall be to advocate for fair and just compensation for Navajo families within the five Navajo Nation chapters whose socio-economic and environmental interests are adversely affected or impacted by coal mining and related operations of Peabody Western Coal Company. 2 N.N.C. § 902.
- B. The Board shall consist of seven members, one of whom shall be appointed by the Black Mesa Chapter. 2 N.N.C. § 903(A); see also Black Mesa Chapter Resolution attached as Exhibit A.
- C. Within 30 days of their appointment, each Board appointee shall be presented to the Government Services Committee of the Navajo Nation Council for confirmation. 2 N.N.C. § 903(B). References in the Navajo Nation Code to the Government Services Committee shall mean the Naabik'íyáti' Committee, unless the amendments enacted herein or the context of previous law indicates otherwise. See CO-45-12, Section 5(A).
- D. If so confirmed, a Board member's term shall not commence until he or she is administered an oath of office by a judge or justice of the Navajo Nation courts. 2 N.N.C. § 903(B).
- E. The term of appointment for appointment of all Board members shall be four years. 2 N.N.C. § 903(H).
- F. The terms of the Board members shall be staggered. 2 N.N.C. \S 903(A).
- G. Any Board member may be appointed for consecutive terms, but shall be limited to two consecutive terms. 2 N.N.C. § 903(H).

H. Mr. Andrew Benallie has been appointed by the Black Mesa Chapter based on his qualifications, and is replacing Mr. Jones Begay as the representative of the Chapter. See Mr. Benallie's Resume attached as Exhibit B.

SECTION TWO. APPROVAL OF APPOINTMENT

The Naabik'íyáti' Committee of the Navajo Nation Council hereby confirms the appointment of Mr. Andrew Benallie to serve on the Black Mesa Review Board as a representative of the Black Mesa Chapter for a term of four (4) years.

REQUESTING THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL TO REAPPOINT ANDREW BENALLIE TO SERVE ON THE BLACK MESA REVIEW BOARD AS REPRESENTATIVE OF BLACK MESA CHAPTER FOR ANOTHER FOUR YEAR TERM.

WHEREAS:

- 1. The Navajo Nation Council Resolution CS-34-98 enacted the Navajo Nation Local Governance Act and codified it under Title 26 of the Navajo Nation Code; and
- 2. The Black Mesa Chapter is aware of multiple adverse impacts created by Peabody Western Coal Company's mining activities. Andrew Benallie has served on the Black Mesa Review Board for the previous four (4) years. He is actively involved member of Black Mesa Review Board in addressing issues and concerns related to environmental impact affecting the people such as land reclamation, employment, and the potential economic impact as result of imminent Peabody mine closure; and
- 3. For decades, the Peabody's mining operations had incurred multiple adverse impacts on the people with immediate mining area and beyond. Thus, based on studies and factual findings the primary impact area included Black Mesa community along with other communities. As part of verification, Andrew Benallie submitted written testimony to Bureau of Reclamation concerning the disappearance of natural springs that were once critical for wildlife and livestock water.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. Black Mesa Chapter hereby requests the Navajo Nation Council to reappoint Andrew Benallie to Black Mesa Review Board for another (4) term based on the foregoing reasons in the above Whereas sections.



Major Accomplishment: Organized and coordinated major tax-free bond which was finalized and authorized by bond issuer for \$200 million rated at AAA. The \$200 million was slated as capital moneys for new tribal office buildings, infrastructure constructions such as waterlines, power line extensions, house wirings, etc. The bond was authorized and approved and ready for transaction at NY Wall Street when the 1988 chaos of political disaster completely destroyed Navajo Nation credibility. As political appointee, I was outlawed out of my position.

1982 to 1986: Navajo Nation Tribal Council Delegate: <u>Duties</u>: (1). Chairman, Resource Committee, (2). Chairman, Negotiation Team for Minerals Re-negotiations, (3). Coordinated the original Navajo Water Code for NNC acoption, (4). Chairman, Black Mesa Review Board for Peabody Mine operations, (5). Member, Navajo Hopi Relocation Committee.

1979 to 1982: Minerals Department, Navajo Nation, Window Rock, Az.

<u>Position</u>: Assistant Director; <u>Duties</u>: developed Navajo Geological Information System to automate gas, coal, uranium activities. Devised formula for coal quality index for comparative analysis of Navajo coal against other western coals for reference as negotiation tool.

1972 to 1979: Office of the Chairman and Vice Chairman of Navajo Tribal Council:

Position: Administrative Assistant: Duties: Mostly provided technical assistance and summarized reports for Chairman and other leaders reviewed mineral leases, right-of-ways, water study reports, EIS, translated coal burning generating stations, high voltage power lines, underground pipelines, etc. Worked with tribal departments and Navajo Tribal Council, help draft Navajo position papers for presentations to congressional leaders. Personally, interacted and communicated with U.S. Senators and other Congressional leaders.

1972 to 1976: University of Arizona, Tucson, Az. <u>Position</u>: Consulting Electrical Engineer; <u>Duties</u>: Provided engineering assistance in designing TeleMedical Communication System in consultation with Boston General Hospital. It was originally planned for Arizona tribes. Since all tribal hospitals and communities in Arizona (except one in Grand Canyon) are land road accessible the technology was transferred to where it is most needed, it is presently in full use in Alaska. Commuted between Tucson and Boston. In 1999, the Alaskan natives awarded me numerous gifts of appreciation at their Health Conference in Anchorage, Alaska.

1968 to 1972: Ariresearch Garratt Corporation; Phoenix, Az. <u>Position</u>: Senior Electrical Engineer; <u>Duties</u>: Conducted engineering designs for instruments to test and monitor environmental controls in high altitude supersonic aircrafts. Too many other engineering related tasks to mentions.

1969 to 1972: General Semi-conductors; Tempe, Az. <u>Position</u>: Consulting Electrical Engineer; <u>Duties:</u> Supervised engineering designs of production line test instruments for newly invented semiconductors.
