PURPOSE: This resolution if approved will amend Title 17 of the Navajo Nation Code and enact the Navajo Nation Firearms Act.

This written summary does not address recommended amendments as may be provided by the standing committee. The Office of Legislative Counsel requests each committee member to review the proposed legislation in detail.

- B. Automatic Gun means any weapon which shoots, is designed to shoot, or can be readily restored to shoot, automatically more than one shot, without manual reloading, by a single function of the trigger. The term shall also include the frame or receive of any such weapon, any part designed and intended solely and exclusively, or combination of parts designed and intended, for use in converting a weapon into a machine gun, and any combination of parts from which a machinegun can be assembled if such parts are in the possession or under the control of a person.
- C. Rifle means a weapon designed or redesigned, made or remade, and intended to be fired from the shoulder and designed or redesigned and made or remade to use the energy of the explosive in a fixed cartridge to fire only a single projectile (ball shot) through a rifled fore for each single pull of the trigger, and shall include any such weapon which may be readily restored to fire a fixed cartridge.
- D. Shotgun means a weapon designed or redesigned, made or remade, and intended to be fired from the shoulder and designed or redesigned and made or remade to use the energy of the explosive in a fixed shotgun shell to fire through a smooth bore either a number of projectiles (ball shot) or a single projectile for each pull of the trigger and shall include any such weapon which may be readily restored to fire a fixed shotgun shell.
- E. Silencer means any device for silencing, muffling, or diminishing the report of a portable firearm, including any combination of parts, designed or redesigned, and intended for use in assembling or fabricating a firearm silencer or firearm muffler, and any part intended only for use in such assembly or fabrication.
- F. Any other weapon means any weapon or device capable of being concealed on the person from which a shot can be discharged through the energy of an explosive (i.e.

pistol or revolver) having a barrel with a smooth bore designed or redesigned to fire a
fixed shotgun shell, weapons with combination shotgun and rifle barrels twelve (12)
inches or more, less than eighteen (18) inches in length, from which only a single
discharge can be made from either barrel without manual reloading, and shall include
any such weapon which may be readily restore to fire. Such term shall not include a
pistol or a revolver having rifle bore, or rifled bores, or weapons designed, made, or
intended to be fixed from the shoulder and not capable of firing fixed ammunition.

- G. Antique firearm means any firearm not designed or redesigned for using rim fire or conventional center fire ignition with fixed ammunition and manufactured in or before 1898 (including any matchlock, flintlock, percussion cap, or similar type of ignition system or replica thereof, whether actually manufactured before or after the year 1898) and also any firearm using fixed ammunition manufactured in or before 1898, for which ammunition is no longer manufactured in the United States and is not readily available in the ordinary channels of commercial trade.
- H. Unserviceable firearm means a firearm which is incapable of discharging a shot by means of an explosive and incapable of being readily restored to a firing condition.
- I. Make means putting together, altering, any combination of these, or otherwise producing a firearm.
- J. Transfer means selling, assigning, pleading, leasing, loaning, giving away or otherwise disposing of.

§ 2501. Registration of firearms

- A. Central registry. The Navajo Nation Police Department shall maintain a central registry of all firearms in the Navajo Nation, except firearms in possession or under the control of the Navajo Nation. The registry shall be known as the Firearms Registration and Transfer Record. The registry shall contain:
 - 1. Identification of the firearm;
 - 2. Date of registration; and
 - 3. Identification and address of person entitled to possession of the firearm.

- B. By whom registered. Each individual who owns a firearm residing on the Navajo Nation, as defined in 7 N.N.C. § 254 (A), must register each firearm he or she owns, within one hundred and eighty days (180) of the Act's enactment or from the date of purchase. Firearms transferred must be registered to the transferee by the transferor. Prior to transferring a firearm the transferor of a firearm shall obtain authorization, as required by this Act, to transfer the firearm and such authorization shall permit the registration of the firearm required under Section (C).
- C. How to register. Each firearm owner shall notify the Navajo Nation Police Department in accordance with the prescribed regulations and register the firearm required by this Section.
- D. Proof of registration. A person possessing a registered firearm, as required by this Section, must retain proof of registration which shall be made available to the Navajo Nation Police Department.

§ 2502. Identification of firearms

A. Identification of firearm

Each firearm shall be identified by a serial number which may not be readily removed, obliterated, or altered, the name of the manufacturer, importer or maker, and other identification made by the Navajo Nation Police Department.

B. Firearms with no serial number

Any persons who possess a firearm which does not bear a serial number and other information required by Subsection (A) of this Section shall identify the firearm with a serial number assigned by the Navajo Nation Police Department.

§ 2503. Restrictive use of information

A. General Rule

No information or evidence obtained from an application, registration, or records required to be submitted or retained by a natural person in order to comply with any provision of this Act or regulations issued thereunder, shall be used directly or indirectly, as evidenced against the person in a criminal proceeding with respect to this violation of

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law occurring prior to or concurrently with the filing of the application or registration, or compiling of the records containing the information or evidence. Except as provided in Subsection (B) of this Section.

B. Furnishing false information

Subsection (A) of this Section shall not preclude the use of any such information or evidence in a prosecution or other action under any applicable provision of law with respect to the furnishing of false information.

SECTION FOUR. CODIFICATION

The provisions of the Act which amend or adopt new sections of the Navajo Nation Code shall be codified by the Office of Legislative Counsel. The Office of Legislative Counsel shall incorporate such amended provisions in the next codification of the Navajo Nation Code.

SECTION FIVE. SAVINGS CLAUSE

Should any provision of this Act be determined invalid by the Navajo Nation Supreme Court or the District Courts of the Navajo Nation, without appeal to the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, the remainder of the Act shall remain the law of the Navajo Nation.

SECTION SIX. EFFECTIVE DATE

The provisions of this Act shall become effective in accord with 2 N.N.C. § 221(B).

RESOLUTION OF THE KAYENTA TOWNSHIP COMMISSION

Opposing Proposed Navajo Nation Council Legislation No. 0114-17 Amending Title 17 of the Navajo Nation Code and Enacting the Navajo Nation Firearms Act.

- 1. The Kayenta Township Commission ("Commission") is a home-rule municipality of the Navajo Nation with the general authority and responsibility to govern for the welfare of the Kayenta Township ("Township") and its residents, including the enactment of such ordinances, rules and regulations as it deems in the best interest of the Township, see 2 N.N.C. §§ 4081-4086 (2005); and
- 2. The Navajo Nation Council has granted the Township "home-rule" status under the governance of the Commission pursuant to Resolution CJY-42-03 (July 29, 2003) (codified at 2 N.N.C. §§ 4081-4086 (2005)), and the Navajo Nation Supreme Court has recognized the comprehensive authority of the Commission in Kayenta Township Commission v. Ward, No. SC-CV-29-07 (Sup. Ct. Feb. 25, 2011); and
- 3. On March 24, 2017, the Honorable Council Delegate Davis Filfred introduced Legislation No. 0114-17 to amend Title 17 of the Navajo Nation Code and to enact the Navajo Nation Firearms Act; and
- 4. The Town Manager and the Commission have reviewed this Legislation and have the following concerns:
 - a. Currently there is a lack of enforcement and cooperation between the Navajo Nation Judicial Branch and the Navajo Nation Police Department;
 - b. The Navajo Nation currently lacks the manpower to enforce such legislation;
 - c. Funds are not available for a national gun registry that would have to be maintained at the local, state and federal level to be accurate;
 - d. There are a myriad of privacy concerns and access to information would have to be strictly controlled to prohibit tampering or abuse of the information;
 - e. Many gun owners may ignore the registry or provide misleading information, or information may be entered into the registry in a misleading or inaccurate manner;
 - f. A registry would document weapons that legal firearms owners possess, but would do little, if anything, to control the flow of stolen weapons, illegal weapons or weapons manufactured without serial numbers so as to make them untraceable; and
- 5. For such reasons enumerated at Recital Paragraphs 4(a) (f), above, the Town Manager recommends that the Commission oppose such proposed legislation; and
- 6. The Commission has heard the report and recommendation of the Town Manager and, with all due respect for the Honorable Delegate Filfred, agrees that the Commission should oppose proposed Legislation No. 0114-17, for the reasons stated above, and the Town Manager should be authorized to take any further reasonable actions consistent with this resolution, including posting comments with the Navajo Nation Council Office of Legislative Services.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- 1. With all due respect to the Honorable Council Delegate Davis Filfred, the Commission hereby expresses its opposition to proposed Navajo Nation Council Legislation No. 0114-17 amending title 17 of the Navajo Nation Code and enacting the Navajo Nation Firearms Act for the reasons stated herein.
- 2. The Town Manager is hereby authorized to take any further reasonable actions consistent with this resolution, including posting comments with the Navajo Nation Council Office of Legislative Services.
