AN ACTION RELATING TO NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE; ACCEPTING THE RECOMMENDATION OF THE HEALTH, EDUCATION AND HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE AND GRANTING THE DESIGNATION OF "TRIBAL ORGANIZATION" TO THE NAVAJOLAND NURSING HOME, INC. FOR A PERIOD OF FOUR (4) YEARS, FOR THE PURPOSES OF CONTRACTING WITH THE UNITED STATES INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE AND AUTHORIZING THE NAVAJOLAND NURSING HOME, INC. TO NEGOTIATE AND ENTER INTO TITLE I, INDIAN SELF-DETERMINATION ACT (P.L. 93-638, AS AMENDED) CONTRACTS AND TITLE V SELF GOVERNANCE COMPACTS PURSUANT TO THE INDIAN SELF-DETERMINATION ACT (P.L. 93-638, AS AMENDED), SUCH DESIGNATION OF "TRIBAL ORGANIZATION" BEING REVOCABLE AND CONTINGENT ON CONTINUING COMPLIANCE WITH ALL TERMS AND CONDITIONS AS APPROVED BY THE HEALTH, EDUCATION AND HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE OF THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL

BE IT ENACTED:

SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

A. Pursuant to Navajo Nation Council Resolution CJY-33-10 and the Navajo Nation Code at 2 N.N.C. Section Five (5) "References to previous Standing Committees" which states in part "References in the Navajo Nation Code...to Government Services and Intergovernmental Relations Committees shall mean the Naabik'íyáti' Committee..." the Naabik'íyáti' Committee of the Navajo Nation Council exercises the authority to authorize and approve additional tribal organizations that have received the recommendation and approval of the Health, Education and Human Services Committee of the Navajo Nation Council.

SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

- A. The Navajoland Nursing Home, Inc. has requested to be designated a "tribal organization" for a period of four (4) years, beginning October 1, 2021 and ending September 30, 2025, for the purposes of contracting with the United States Indian Health Service and to negotiate and enter into Title V Self Governance Compacts pursuant to the Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended). See Exhibit A of Exhibit 1.
- B. The Health, Education and Human Services Committee of the Navajo Nation Council through Resolution HEHSCJN-07-21, attached as **Exhibit** 1, has found it to be in the best interest of the Navajo Nation to approve and recommend to the

Naabik'íyáti' Committee of the Navajo Nation Council that the Navajoland Nursing Home, Inc. be given the revocable designation of "tribal organization" for a period of four (4) years, beginning October 1, 2021 and ending September 30, 2025, for the purposes of contracting with the United States Indian Health Service and to negotiate and enter into Title V Self Governance Compacts pursuant to the Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended), subject to the Terms and Conditions as found in **Exhibit D of Exhibit 1**.

- C. The Navajoland Nursing Home, Inc. serves seven (7) Navajo Nation Chapters and has been endorsed by separate resolutions adopted by all the respective Chapters, as found within Exhibit B of Exhibit 1.
- D. The Naabik'íyáti' Committee of the Navajo Nation Council finds it to be in the best interest of the Navajo Nation, upon approval and recommendation of the Health, Education and Human Services Committee, to approve authorization of the Navajoland Nursing Home, Inc. the revocable designation of "tribal organization" for a period of four (4) years, beginning October 1, 2021 and ending September 30, 2025, for the purposes of contracting with the United States Indian Health Service and to negotiate and enter into Title V Self Governance Compacts pursuant to the Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended) and subject to the continuing compliance with the Terms and Conditions as approved and adopted by the Health, Education and Human Services Committee as attached in Exhibit D of Exhibit 1.

SECTION THREE. APPROVAL

The Naabik'íyáti' Committee of the Navajo Nation Council, upon approval and recommendation of the Health, Education and Human Services Committee (Committee), hereby approves giving the Navajoland Nursing Home, Inc. the revocable designation of "tribal organization" for a period of four (4) years for the purposes of contracting with the United States Indian Health Service and to negotiate and enter into Title I, Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended) contracts and Title V Self Governance Compacts pursuant to the Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended) and subject to the continuing compliance with the Terms and Conditions as approved and adopted by the Health, Education and Human Services Committee and herein attached as Exhibit D of Exhibit 1.



RELATING TO HEALTH, EDUCATION AND HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE; RECOMMENDING FOR APPROVAL OF THE NAABIK'ÍYÁTI COMMITTEE DESIGNATION OF THE NAVAJOLAND NURSING HOME, INC. AS A NAVAJO NATION "TRIBAL ORGANIZATION" FOR THE PURPOSES OF CONTRACTING WITH THE UNITED STATES INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE AND AUTHORIZING IT TO NEGOTIATE AND ENTER INTO TITLE I, INDIAN SELF-DETERMINATION ACT (P.L. 93-638, AS AMENDED) CONTRACTS AND TITLE V SELF GOVERNANCE COMPACTS PURSUANT TO THE INDIAN SELF-DETERMINATION ACT (P.L. 93-638, AS AMENDED), SUCH DESIGNATION OF "TRIBAL ORGANIZATION" BEING REVOCABLE AND CONTINGENT ON COMPLIANCE WITH ALL TERMS CONDITIONS AS REQUIRED

BE IT ENACTED:

SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

- A. The Health, Education and Human Services Committee exercises oversight responsibility over all matters related to health on the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. §400 (C)(1)
- B. The Health, Education and Human Services Committee exercises authority to review and recommend the authorization and designation of a for-profit or non-profit health or social services organization as a tribal organization for the purposes of contracting or compacting under the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act. 2 N.N.C. § 401 (6)(e)
- C. Navajo Nation Council Resolution CJY-33-10 authorized the previously existing Intergovernmental Relations Committee of the Navajo Nation Council to act as final approval authority, only upon a recommendation for approval by the Health, Education and Social Services Committee and each of the Navajo Nation Chapters to be served, for all additional designations of "tribal organizations."

- D. Upon reorganization of the Navajo Nation Council and Committees the Naabik'iyati Committee assumed, unless otherwise specified, all the responsibilities of the previous Navajo Nation Council's Intergovernmental Relations Committee and the Health, Education and Social Services Committee was renamed the Health, Education and Human Services Committee. CAP-10-11
- E. The Naabik'iyati' Committee of the Navajo Nation Council, only upon the recommendation for approval by the Health, Education and Human Services Committee and the approval of each of the Navajo Nation Chapters to be served, is to act as the final authority for approving the revocable designation of "tribal organization" for purposes of contracting under the Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended), and Title V Self Governance Compacts pursuant to the Indian Self-Determination Act. (P.L. 93-638, as amended).

SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

- A. Resolution CJY-33-10 authorized contractors to be authorized as Navajo Nation "tribal organizations" for the purpose of entering into Title V, Self-Governance Compacts/Contracts pursuant to the Indian Self-Determination Act, (P.L. 93-638, as amended).
- B. The Navajoland Nursing Home, Inc. has requested to be designated a "tribal organization" for a period of four (4) years, for the purposes of contracting with the United States Indian Health Service and to negotiate and enter into Title I, Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended) Contracts. See Exhibit A
- C. The Navajoland Nursing Home, Inc. was incorporated in the State of Arizona on February 18, 1982. ACC File No. 01450670 Navajoland Nursing Home, Inc. is also incorporated under the laws of the Navajo Nation. BRD File No. 100092.
- D. The Navajoland Nursing Home, Inc. serves the Navajo Nation Chapters of Chinle, Ganado, Blue Gap/Tachee, Low Mountain, Many Farms, Nazlini, and Tselani-Cottonwood.
- E. The Navajoland Nursing Home, Inc. proposal for designation of "tribal organization" has been endorsed by separate resolutions adopted by all the named respective chapters. The chapter resolutions are attached and can be found in Exhibit B.

- F. The Naabik'iyati' Committee, by Resolution NABIN-73-18 attached as Exhibit C, previously authorized the Navajoland Nursing Home, Inc., as a "tribal organization" to negotiate and enter into Title I, Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended), Contracts and Title V, Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended) Compacts being revocable and contingent on continuing compliance with all terms and conditions as approved by the Health, Education and Human Services Committee of the Navajo Nation Council.
- G. The Health, Education and Human Services Committee of the Navajo Nation Council finds it to be in the best interest of the Navajo Nation to approve and recommend to the Naabik'íyáti Committee that the Navajoland Nursing Home, Inc. be given the revocable designation of "tribal organization" for a period of four (4) years for the purposes of contracting with the United States Indian Health Service and to negotiate and enter into Title I, Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended) Contracts and Title V, Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended) Compacts contingent on compliance with all terms and conditions as required in Exhibit D.
- H. The Health, Education and Human Services Committee of the Navajo Nation Council finds it to be in the best interest of the Navajo Nation to rescind Resolution NABIN-73-18 previously adopted on November 29, 2018 attached as Exhibit C.

SECTION THREE. APPROVAL

- A. The Health, Education and Human Services Committee of the Navajo Nation Council hereby rescinds Resolution NABIN-73-18.
- The Health, Education and Human Services Committee of the В. Navajo Nation Council hereby approves and recommends to the Naabik'íyáti Committee that the Navajoland Nursing Home, Inc. be given the revocable designation of "tribal organization" for a period of four (4) years, beginning October 1, 2021 and ending September 30, 2025, for the purposes of contracting with the United States Indian Health Service and to negotiate and enter into Title I, Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended) Contracts, and Title V, Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended) contingent on compliance with Terms and Conditions required in Exhibit D.

- 5. The NNHI, Pursuant to NN PL93-638 Contract, NNHI requests Title I, FY funds from USA-DHHS, NAIHS to assist Elder Health Care on the Navajo Nation; And
- 6. The NNHI attached the FY's budget request for 4years under Title 1, PL93-638 with USA-DHHS, NAIHS.

INTRODUCTION

The Navajoland Nursing Home, Inc. (NNHI) dba-Dr. Guy Gorman Sr. Care Home (DGGSCH) is defined as the only Center for Medicare/Medicaid Services (CMS) Level I, II & III Skilled Licensed Nursing Home on the Navajo Nation in Chinle, Arizona. NNHI was established in 1968 funded by the Navajo Nation Division of Social Services (Family Services Department), Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) PL-93-638 for 20 Navajo Elders. In 1971 NNHI was Incorporated under the State of Arizona as a 501 🖸 3 Non-profit organization receiving funds from AHCCCS through reimbursements for 60 Navajo Elders. In February 2019, NNHI completed and moved into the new 28 million dollars 80 bed facility funded by Navajo Housing Authority (NHA) and the Navajo Nation (NN). On November 28, 2019 the Navajo Nation Naa'bik'iyati' Committee approved NNHI for PL93-638 funding under the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act (ISDEAA). NNHI provides health care and serves the Navajo Elders within the territorial jurisdiction of the NN. NNHI has five Board of Directors who carries out the purpose, power and duties of the organization. Based on the Census 2000, there are approximately 36,600 Navajo living on the NN over the age of 65+. The NN Division of Social Services

and Family Services estimated approximately 2,800 Navajo Elders are in need of extended health care. Others who may need extended health care includes disabled veterans, accident victims who no longer require acute care and the handicapped. Further or updated research is necessary to determine the exact number of Navajo Elders in need of extended care services.

The need for nursing home care services for the Navajo people has become increasingly important during the last 20 to 30 years, as a consequence of modernization and the breakdown of the Navajo family. Formerly, elders had a secure place within the extended family, many younger members of the family are now moving away to urban areas to seek employment and other urban amenities. The increased use of motor vehicles and consequent injuries and deaths from accidents has also created a need for extended care facilities to care for elder family survivors and those disabled.

The following also contributes to the placement of persons institutionalized in a nursing home: Housing problems, lack of water, fuel, poor sanitation, inadequate finances and lack of transportation. The purpose is to provide the services that is required. Navajos being the predominantly major client representation to a degree that reflects the highest optimal level of efficient and effective nursing home services within an adequate funding source. Also, to extend the services on the NN for Navajos to remain within the home boundaries and to preserved and promoted traditional concept and cultural heritage on daily basis. To the end, that the Navajo elders and disabled receive adequate and quality health nursing care and services.

II. SCOPE OF WORK

- a. That GGSCH will provide community based Skilled Nursing Home Level I, II & III health care and hospice care services to Navajos Elders who require nursing home care due to infirmity, age and physically challenged conditions on a long-term basis.
- Provide nursing care services to Navajos consumers in activities of daily living, personal hygiene/grooming, range of motion exercise, medication administration, counseling, recreational and nutritional services.
- Skilled nursing care shall be provided in the DGGSCH by qualified/licensed personnel to deliver skilled/hospice nursing care services, as well as cultural/traditional support as needed. Services will include 24 hours a day, 7 days a week care, with safe supervision.
- The skilled nursing home shall provide a maximum of 2 residents to a room, unless room accommodates only I resident. Female residents will room separate from male residents
- Nursing Care Plans shall be developed by the Licensed Nursing Team and Medicare Care Providers. All Nursing Care Plan shall be individualized and integrated into the daily living routine as part of the nursing environment.
- Elders progress evaluations shall be measured on a quarterly basis
 with progress reports to the NN Standing Committees, MDT, semiannual staff, and evaluations shall determine if the Nursing Care Plan
 is effective with update of care plans as needed upon changes in
 condition.
- All care and services to the elders shall be provided using Care Plans goals and objectives that are appropriate and culturally sensitive.

- The DGGSCH shall further accommodate those in need of Hospice Care and Respite Care.
- III. Dr. Guy Gorman Sr. Care Home (DGGSCH) has a Vision, Mission, and Guiding Principles to change the landscape/painting of Nursing Home Care for Elders forever on the NN. DGGSCH is more than just a corporation or company...It's a revolution!

IV. REGULATION AND POLICY

A. Legislative Authority

In 1965, the Navajo Nation Council approved funds to build Chinle Nursing Home (CNH), which opened in July 1968 to provide nursing home care for Navajo elders under the Department of Social Services. Later, in 1969, Toyei Nursing Home opened, because CNH occupancy was at near capacity, but closed due to water contamination later. In 1971, when the NN was unable to provide Maintenance and Operation (OM) funds for CNH, CNH filed & became a 501© 3 Non-profit corporation under the State of Arizona, to request AHCCCS funds from Center for Medicare/Medicaid Services (CMS) thru reimbursement. NNHI became a Level I nursing home facility under CMS, and started operating under the HIPPA Regulations and Privacy Act. Software Point Click Care (PCC) and Minimal Data Set (MDS) was also established for Patients Record keeping pursuant to CMS regulations. A Memorandum of Agreement (MDA) was also established with Chinle Indian Health Service (IHS) for professional & specialized services (Doctors, PT, OT, ST, ect.) for NNHI's elder services

November OI, 2018, CNH became Dr. Guy Gorman Sr. Care Home (DGGSCH) as doing business (DBA). On November 28, 2018, the Navajo Nation Naa'bik'iyati' Committee approved/authorized legislation for NNHI to plan on a Funding Agreement with Navajo Area Indian Health Services (NAIHS) thru the PL93-638 Self Determination Act for 4 years (Title I). Once approved by NAIHS, NAIHS will provides oversight over NNHI. NNHI will receive funding from NAIHS under ISDEAA, Title I, to provide Nursing Home Care services on the NN for elders.

B. Lead Agencies

- 1. NNHL Employer for the entire NNHL personnel.
- 2. NN Naa'bik'iyati' Committee (NNNC). NNNC approved NNHI to prepare a MDA with NAIHS for funds to operate nursing home care under PL 93-638.
- 3. NAIHS. Contractor for NNHI under ISDEAA, PL 93-638. NAIHS provides oversight over NNHI for 4 years.
- 4. NNHI will continue 3rd Party billing thru Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System (AHCCCS) for reimbursement.
- 5. Center for Medicare/Medicaid Services (CMS). NNHI will continue using HIPPA and Privacy Act until one is adopted by the NN.
- 6. NHHI Board of Directors will continue to be responsible and duties of NNHI.
- 7. Navajo Nation Council and NN President will have the final MOA approval between NHHI & NAIHS.

- 8. NN Department of Long-Term Care, under the Social Services
 Division (BIA 93-638). Provides elders placement through Doctor
 referrals
- 9. NN Health Education, Human Services Committee (NNHEHSC). Oversight over NNHI under Title 5.

C. Operational Policies and Procedures

- NNHI has in place operational policies and procedures to ensure that its organizational structures have direction at the administrative level.
- 2. NNHI currently operates under the guidelines of a Scope of Work (SOW) that outlines the responsibilities and authority of the organization, staff, and legislative oversight. The SOW details the primary responsibilities of the organization' system.
- 3. NNHI will continue to use the CMS approved HIPAA and Privacy Act Regulations to keep in compliance with Licensed providers. NNHI will also stay in compliance with AHCCCS for Policies/Standards/Practices for third party reimbursement billing.
- 4. All NNHI Personnel are subject to NNHI Personnel & Procedures Policies and NN Office of Labor Relations Policies.

D. Funding Sources

1. NNHI is presently supported primarily through AHCCCS reimbursement billing through the NN Department of Long-Term Care, Family Services and the Indian Health Services referrals.

The funds are primarily utilized to purchase services, postage, vehicle maintenance, utilities bills, insurances, supplies, equipment, personnel, overtimes, hospital care for elders and daily operation of NNHI facilities.

- 2. NNHI is presently applying through contract (Title I) with NAIHS for PL93-638 for annual funding.
- 3. NNHI personnel rarely attend paid training, due to lack of funds. NNHI Board of Directors don't allocate funds for personnel to attend conferences. But CMS provides free training for staff.
- 4. Transportation and Transfer Services. NNHI uses its own transport services for its elders to appointments, activities, etc., uses current Arizona tariff rate established by CMS and AHCCCS.

E. Training and Licenses

1. NNHI utilizes CMS Level I, II & III, AHCCCS & Arizona Health Care Association (AHCA) Free training and certification seminars. All certified staff and administration personnel attended the general training. Plus, free videos are provided by AHCCCS Long Term Care Consortium (LTCC) for privacy training. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Office for Civil Rights (OCR) has the authority to enforce the privacy rule. And is enforced base on compliance.

V. Organization Structures/Job descriptions

I. NNHI Nursing Home has been operating for over 50 years, first at Level I & II and in 2016 at Level III care certified by CMS.

All effort is clearly coordinated, to assure that elder health care is met. NNHI personnel have clearly defined and mutually accepted the roles and responsibilities to effectively provide nursing health care for all elders at NNHI facility. At NNHI, personnel understand that successful and honest implementation requires mutual respect and understanding among staff.

2. NNHI facility will have Level I, II & III health care consisting of Quality Assurance QA/QI Committee. The QA/QI will serve as a formal mechanism to address and solve health care problems with Elders within NNHI facility. NNHI will provide medical and nursing staff to coordinate and evaluate activities and the quality of elder care delivered by staff. A formal chain of command system has been developed, maintained, and utilized to address NNHI departments and organization.



SUMMARY OF START UP EXPENSES

Two of the largest items in our start up budget is the Electronic/Computerized medical records system call Point Click Care (PCC) software and hiring additional Professional Staff. The primary designs of this system have already been used by NNHI for 5 years and presently, in the construction phase of the new facility by Sound and System. In addition to the obvious benefit of allowing multiple care-team members (IT, RN's, CNA, MA, MDS, Dr., PT, HRC & Finance) to easily exchange confidential information as they change shifts, this PCC system will allow staff to keep track of elders chronic conditions, monitoring gradual but serious changes in condition which might be overlooked in day to day interactions, and corroborate quantifiable medical data for our elders in our skilled nursing facility. Pursuant to HIPPA and Privacy Act Regulations, NNHI will have to meet the Staff to Resident Ratio, which NNHI lacks due to shortage of funding.

(d) The Indian tribe or tribal organization shall conduct all major procurement transactions by providing full and open competition...

(2) As provided in section 7 (b) and (c) of the Act, Indian preference and tribal preferences shall be applied n any procurement award (e) The Indian tribe or tribal organization shall make procurement awards only to responsible entities who have the ability to perform successfully under the terms and conditions of the proposed procurement. (f) The Indian tribe or tribal organization shall maintain records on the significant history of all major procurement transactions.



AN ACTION

RELATING TO NAABIK'ÍYÁTI'COMMITTEE; ACCEPTING THE RECOMMENDATION OF THE HEALTH, EDUCATION AND HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE AND GRANTING THE DESIGNATION OF "TRIBAL ORGANIZATION" TO THE NAVAJOLAND NURSING HOME, INC., FOR A PERIOD OF FOUR (4) YEARS, FOR THE PURPOSES OF CONTRACTING WITH THE UNITED STATES INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE AND AUTHORIZING THE NAVAJOLAND NURSING HOME, INC., TO NEGOTIATE AND ENTER INTO TITLE I, INDIAN SELF-DETERMINATION ACT (P.L. 93-638, AS AMENDED) CONTRACTS AND TITLE V SELF-GOVERNANCE COMPACTS PURSUANT TO THE INDIAN SELF-DETERMINATION ACT (P.L. 93-638, AS AMENDED), SUCH DESIGNATION OF "TRIBAL ORGANIZATION" BEING REVOCABLE AND CONTINGENT ON CONTINUING COMPLIANCE WITH ALL TERMS AND CONDITIONS AS APPROVED BY THE HEALTH, EDUCATION AND HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE OF THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL

BE IT ENACTED:

SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

- A. Pursuant to Navajo Nation Council Resolution CJY-33-10 and the Navajo Nation Code at 2 N.N.C. Section Five (5) "References to previous Standing Committees" which states in part "References in the Navajo Nation Code...to Government Services and Intergovernmental Relations Committees shall mean the Naabik'iyáti' Committee..." the Naabik'iyáti' Committee of the Navajo Nation Council exercises the authority to authorize and approve additional tribal organizations that have received the recommendation and approval of the Health, Education and Human Services Committee of the Navajo Nation Council. See Exhibit A.
- B. The Naabik'iyáti' Committee, upon recommendation of the Health, Education and Human Services Committee and the approval of the Navajo Nation Chapters to be served, is to act as the final authority for approving the revocable designation of "Tribal Organization" for purposes of contracting under the Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended)

SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

- A. The Navajoland Nursing Home, Inc., has requested to be designated a "tribal organization" for a period of four (4) years, for the purposes of contracting with the United States Indian Health Service and to negotiate and enter into Title I, Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended) contracts and Title V Self-Governance Compacts pursuant to the Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended). As found within **Exhibit B**.
- B. The Navajoland Nursing Home, Inc., was incorporated in the State of Arizona on February 18, 1982. ACC File No. 01450670. As found within **Exhibit B**.
- C. The Navajoland Nursing Home, Inc., serves Navajo members representing 67 of the 110 Navajo Nation Chapters and supporting Chapter resolutions are attached within **Exhibit B**.
- D. The Health, Education and Human Services Committee of the Navajo Nation Council through Resolution HEHSCO-23-18, has found it to be in the best interest of the Navajo Nation to approve and recommend to the Naabik'iyáti' Committee of the Navajo Nation Council that the Navajoland Nursing Home, Inc., be given the revocable designation of "tribal organization" for a period of four (4) years for the purposes of contracting with the United States Indian Health Service and to negotiate and enter into Title I, Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended) contracts and Title V Self-Governance Compacts pursuant to the Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended), subject to the Terms and Conditions within the legislation herein attached at Exhibit B.
- E. The Naabik'íyáti' Committee of the Navajo Nation Council finds it to be in the best interest of the Navajo Nation, upon approval and recommendation of the Health, Education and Human Services Committee (Committee), to approve giving the Navajoland Nursing Home, Inc., the revocable designation of "tribal organization" for a period of four (4) years for the purposes of contracting with the United States Indian Health Service and to negotiate and enter into Title I, Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended) contracts and Title V Self-Governance Compacts pursuant to the Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended) and subject to the continuing compliance with the Terms and Conditions as approved and adopted by the Committee and herein attached and found within Exhibit B.

SECTION THREE. APPROVAL

The Naabik'íyáti' Committee of the Navajo Nation Council, upon approval and recommendation of the Health, Education and Human Services Committee (Committee), hereby approves giving the Navajoland Nursing Home, Inc., the revocable designation of "tribal organization" for a period of four (4) years for the purposes of contracting with the United States Indian Health Service and to negotiate and enter into Title I, Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended) contracts and Title V Self-Governance Compacts pursuant to the Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended) and subject to the continuing compliance with the Terms and Conditions as approved and adopted by the Health, Education and Human Services Committee and herein attached as **Exhibit C** and found within at **Exhibit B**.

TRIBAL ORGANIZATION FOR HEALTH CARE PURSUANT TO

INDIAN SELF-DETERMINATION ACT (P.L. 93-638 AS AMENDED)

Navajo Nation Conditions for

Designation as Tribal Organization for Health Care Pursuant to the Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended)

The Navajo Nation and the designated "Tribal Organizations" shall cooperate under the principles of Ké to ensure that the health care needs of all Navajo citizens are fully met.

The designation of "Tribal Organization" for participation in the Indian Self-Determination Act (P.L. 93-638 as amended) is a revocable designation and is conditioned on the continued, ongoing and full compliance with the terms and conditions as set forth below:

- The designated "Tribal Organization"
 Must qualify as a participant under the Indian Self Determination Act (P.L. 93-638, as amended) as follows:
 - (A) Completing, to the satisfaction of the Health, Education and Human Services

 Committee and the Naabik'iyati' Committee of the Navajo Nation Council, a

 planning phase as described under the Act and which includes:
 - (1) Legal and budgetary research; and
 - (2) Internal tribal government planning and organizational preparation relating to the administration of health care programs.
 - (B) Requesting participation Title V, Self-Governance, by resolution of the Health, Education and Human Services Committee and the Naabik'iyati' Committee of the Navajo Nation Council; and
 - (C) Demonstrating financial stability and financial management capability for the three (3) fiscal years immediately preceding the application for Title V, Self-Governance.
- The designated Tribal Organization shall maintain its eligibility for third party payments under the Centers for Medicare and Medicard Services (CMS).

- The designated 1 ribal Organization shall maintain continued accreditation by a nationally recognized accreditation program.
- The designated Tribal Organization shall operate and administer their Self-Governance Compact programs under the oversight of the Health, Education and Human Services Committee
- 5. The designated Tribal Organization shall appear before and report to the Health Education and Human Services Committee and the Nasbik'iyati Committee of the Navajo Nation Council whenever requested to do so
- 6. The designated Tribal Organization shall maintain compliance with all monitoring and reporting requirements duly established by the Health, Education and Human Services Committee, including:
 - (A) Submission to the Health, Education and Human Services Committee of copies upon receipt, of all final Federal Single Audit Act audit reports, including Audited Financial Statements, and final survey reports issued by its nationally recognized accreditation organizations(s) and all associated corrective action plans, with copies to the Navajo Nation Department of Health.
 - (B) Submission of copies of the Self-Governance Compact and all Annual Funding Agreements to the Navajo Nation Department of Health.
 - (C) Submission of copies of the designated "Tribal Organization's" Annual Report, upon acceptance of same by the "Tribal Organization", to the Health, Education and Human-Services Committee and to the Navajo Nation Department of Health. The format, criteria and due date of the Annual report shall be determined by the Health, Education and Human Services Committee.
 - (D) Submission of a listing of the Board of Directors-identified by Chapter, description of method of selection of Board, length of term and by-laws.
- 7. The designated "Tribal Organization" shall maintain continued compliance with all applicable Navajo Nation laws and regulations, including, but not limited to, the Navajo Preference in Employment Act and shall provide a report on employment compliance to the Health, Education and Human Services Committee annually and upon request.

- 8. The designated "Tribal Organization" shall maintain compliance with all applicable Navajo Nation Health care policies and priorities duly adopted by the Health and Social Services Committee and shall demonstrate the establishment and operation of a traditional medicine program as an integral component of the provision of health care.
- 9. The designated "Tribal Organization" will consult and cooperate with the Navajo Nation Department of Health concerning the public health needs and programs of the Navajo Nation.
- 10. The designated "Tribal Organizations" and Navajo Nation Department of Health shall timely develop and on-going written policy for consultation on matters of public health and have such policy approved by the Health, Education and Human Services Committee.
- 11. The designated "Tribal Organizations" and Navajo Nation Department of Health and Navajo Nation Department of Emergency Medical Service shall enter Memorandum of Understandings for the Navajo Nation's use and occupancy of the designated Tribal Organization's facilities as long as such use and occupancy does not interfere with direct care services.
- 12. The designated "Tribal Organization", in its dealings with the federal and state government, be it lobbying, advocacy, litigation, or negotiating efforts, shall only take positions or make arguments, consistent with official published Navajo Nation positions. The designated "Tribal Organization" shall report and consult with the Health, Education and Human Services Committee prior to such undertakings.
- 13. The designated "Tribal Organization" shall not directly charge any tribal member for health care services nor charge the Navajo Nation Employee Benefit Plan or Workers Compensation Plan for health care services provided to a covered tribal member unless the Indian Health Service would be able to charge the tribal member for the same service under the same circumstances unless otherwise authorized by the Naabik'iyati' Committee of the Navajo Nation Council.
- 14. The designated "Tribal Organization" shall provide direct patient care to all Native American eligible users unless otherwise authorized by the Naabik'iyati' Committee of the Navajo Nation Council.
