CONSTRUCTION OF A CHAPTER BUILDING REPLACEMENT FOR THE TONALEA
CHAPTER; WAIVING 12 N.N.C. § 820(I) AND 860(C) RELATING TO THE CAPITAL
IMPROVEMENT PROCESS

BE IT ENACTED:

Section One. Authority

- A. The Navajo Nation established the Resources and Development Committee as a Navajo Nation Council standing committee and as such gave the Committee oversight over Navajo Nation Chapters. 2 N.N.C. §§ 164 (A)(9), 500 (A), 501 (C)(1).
- B. The Navajo Nation established the Budget and Finance Committee (BFC) as a Navajo Nation Council standing committee and as such empowered BFC

1 to review and recommend to the Navajo Nation Council the management of
2 all funds. 2 N.N.C. §§ 164 (A)(9), 300 (A), 301 (B)(2).

3 C. The Navajo Nation Council established the Naabik'iyáti' Committee as a
4 Navajo Nation standing committee and as such proposed legislation that
5 requires final action by the Navajo Nation Council shall be assigned to the
6 Naabik'iyáti' Committee. 2 N.N.C. §§ 164 (A)(9), 700 (A).

7 D. The Title 12 Appropriations Act Supplemental Appropriation requirements
8 include:

- 9 1. When the Controller identifies additional sources of revenues above
10 and beyond the initial or current revenue projections, supplemental
11 appropriations may be allocated by the Navajo Nation Council. 12
12 N.N.C. § 820(L).
- 13 2. Supplemental appropriations made from non-recurring revenues shall
14 only be made for non-recurring operations or purposes, as set forth at
15 § 820(F). The Controller of the Navajo Nation shall be responsible for
16 designating recurring and non-recurring revenues. 12 N.N.C. § 820(L).
- 17 3. All requests for annual operating funds and supplemental funds shall be
18 submitted to the Office of Management and Budget ("OMB") for budget
19 impact analysis. 12 N.N.C. § 820(M).

20 E. The Title 12 Capital Improvement Process includes:

- 21 1. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 810(F), "Capital Improvement" means a major
22 project undertaken by the Navajo Nation that is generally not recurring on
23 an annual basis and which fits within one or more of the following
24 categories:
 - 25 i. All projects requiring debt obligation or borrowing;
 - 26 ii. Any acquisition or lease of land;
 - 27 iii. Purchase of major equipment or vehicles, with a life expectancy of
28 five years or more, valued in excess of an amount to be established
29 by the Controller;

- iv. Major building improvements that are not routine maintenance expenses and that substantially enhance the value or extend the useful life of a structure;
 - v. Construction of new buildings or facilities including engineering, design, and other pre-construction costs with an estimated cost in excess of an amount to be determined by the Controller; and/or
 - vi. Major equipment or furnishing required to furnish new buildings or other projects, the cost of which is above a certain amount to be established by the Controller.
2. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820 (I), the “[d]evelopment of the Capital Budget shall be coordinated with development of the Operating Budget. All budget requests for capital improvements shall be in compliance with an adopted Capital Improvement Plan and shall not be approved unless in compliance with the Plan.”
 3. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 860 (C)(2) “[t]he appropriation portion of the Capital Improvement Plan is subject to approval of the Navajo Nation Council upon recommendation of the Budget and Finance Committee. Any modification or amendment affecting the approved Capital Improvement Plan is subject to review and concurrence by the Resources and Development Committee prior to consideration by the Navajo Nation Council.”

Section Two. Findings

- A. The existing Tonalea Chapter Building is the subject of an Administrative Order of Condemning and Order of Permanent Closure. See Exhibit D.
- B. This is a funding request for the construction of the new chapter building replacement for the Tonalea Chapter. See Exhibit D.
- C. The supplemental funding request forms are attached as Exhibit A.
- D. The Office of Management and Budget has provided a memorandum satisfying the requirements of 12 N.N.C. § 820(M) and is attached as Exhibit B.

- 1 E. The Office of the Controller has provided a memorandum dated September 8,
2 2017 indicating the balance in the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance as
3 of September 8, 2017 is \$31,258,307. This memorandum is provided to meet
4 the requirements of 12 N.N.C, 820 (L), however the Controller of the Navajo
5 Nation has not designated the funds as recurring or non-recurring. This
6 memorandum is attached as Exhibit C.
- 7 F. The request for funds for construction of the Tonelea Chapter Building
8 Replacement Project within the Tonalea Chapter is not included in the Title
9 12 Capital Improvement Plan because the Plan was rescinded by Navajo
10 Nation Council. CAP-23-17
- 11 G. Any modification or amendment affecting the approved Capital Improvement
12 Plan is subject to review and concurrence by the Resources and Development
13 Committee prior to consideration by the Navajo Nation Council. 12 N.N.C.
14 § 860.
- 15 H. The Navajo Nation finds it in the best interest to waive 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I)
16 and 860 (C) regarding the Capital Improvement for the Tonalea Chapter
17 Building Replacement Project.
- 18 I. The Navajo Nation finds it in the best interest of the Navajo people to approve
19 this supplemental appropriation request.
20

21 **Section Three. Waiving 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I) 1 And 860 (C) Regarding Funding for**
22 **the Tonalea Chapter Building Replacement Project.**

23 The Navajo Nation Council hereby waives 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I) and 860(C)
24 with regard to the Tonalea Chapter Building Replacement Project.
25

26 **Section Four. Approving the Supplemental Appropriation from the Unreserved,**
27 **Undesignated Fund Balance in the Amount of \$2,196,362.00 for the**
28 **construction of the Tonalea Chapter Building Replacement Project.**

- 29 A. This supplemental appropriation of \$2,196,362.00 shall be from that amount
30 of funds that exceeds the minimum fund balance of the Unreserved,

Undesignated Fund Balance as determined by the Office of the Controller
and to Business Unit Number *—new number*.

- B. The Navajo Nation hereby approves the supplemental appropriation from the
Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance to the Tonalea Chapter Building
Replacement Project, Business Unit *New Number* for \$2,196,362.00.

Section Five. Effective Date

The provisions of this Act shall become effective in accord with 2 N.N.C. § 221(B).

Subject: Financial Update-(General Fund Revenue, Expenditures, UUFB)

The gross General Fund Revenues, (see Exhibit "A"), as of August 31, 2017 is \$203,053,235, (see Footnote 1). The total General Fund set asides is \$ \$51,749,599 (Footnote 2). The Net Revenue for the General Fund is \$151,303,727 (see Footnote 3). The permanent fund income transfer is \$24,411,000 (Footnote 4). The reserve taken for the permanent fund income transfer is \$2,885,000 (Footnote 5). The grand total revenue for the General Fund is \$172,829,727 (see Footnote 6) which is 98.78% of the projection.

Next, are the total expenditures by Branch, (see Exhibit "B"), as of August 31, 2017, the Legislative Branch has expenditures of \$14,836,331 (see Footnote 1a); encumbrances of \$822,493 (see Footnote 1b) with a remaining budget of \$3,307,669 (see Footnote 1c). The Executive Branch expenditures are \$162,500,722 (see Footnote 2a); encumbrances are \$7,206,122 (see Footnote 2b) with a remaining budget of \$37,797,219 (see Footnote 2c). The Judicial Branch expenditures are \$11,718,156 (see Footnote 3a); with encumbrances of \$73,692 (see Footnote 3b) and remaining budget of \$2,356,349 (see Footnote 3c). Total General Fund expenditures are \$189,055,209 (see Footnote 4a); total encumbrances are \$8,102,307 (see Footnote 4b) with an overall remaining budget of \$43,461,236 (see Footnote 4c).

The updated Undesignated Unreserved Fund Balance (UUFB), (see Exhibit "C") as of September 8, 2017 is \$31,258,217. The Fiscal Year 2016 audited numbers were approved via CJY-51-17 and an amount of \$11, 728,198 that was previously reserved for debt service for capital projects was returned back to the UUFB with the approval of CJY-50-17. These two amounts have been incorporated into this new schedule.

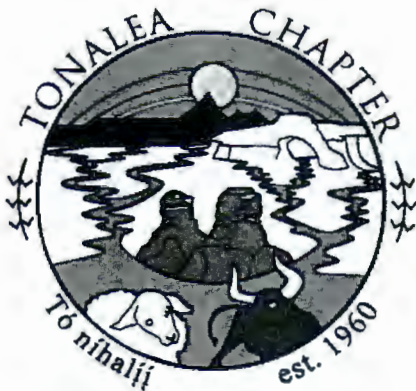

I. SUMMARY

Of the 110 Chapter buildings within the Navajo Nation, eight were condemned by the Navajo Nation Division of Health, Office of Environmental Health Code Enforcement federal government, which included the Tonalea Chapter facility. Tuba City Regional Health Care Corporation: Office of Environmental Health recommended closure of the Tonalea Chapter due to numerous contributing factors of unsafe conditions. As a result, a licensed structural engineer inspected the Tonalea Chapter for structural soundness and integrity. The primary concern was for the safety and welfare of the Tonalea Chapter Staff, Officials and the general public upon their use of the facility and general services on a daily basis.

The Navajo Nation Division of Health: Office of Environmental Health/Code Enforcement, issued an Administrative Order of Condemning and Order of Permanent Closure, copy enclosed as **Exhibit A.1**, of the Tonalea Chapter building. Results from the structural inspection of the defects found in the Fall of 2012 by the Federal Division of Environmental Health Services.

II. BACKGROUND

The Tonalea Chapter is a certified chapter and is one of the 110 Chapter Governments on the Navajo Nation. The chapter was granted LGA Certification on December 2, 2014 by the Navajo Nation Resource and Development Committee. The chapter is a local governmental entity and is delegated certain authorities and responsibilities with respect to local matters consistent with the Navajo Nation Laws. Pursuant to Title 2, Section 402 (a), the Tonalea Chapter has the authority to review all matters affecting the local communities and make appropriate recommendations to the Navajo Nation, County, State and Federal government agencies that are in the best interest and welfare of the local communities.

The Western Navajo Agency is the largest land base of the five agencies on the Navajo Nation that extends into the rural areas of the State of Arizona and Utah, with an estimated land size of 2,359,122 acres. The Tonalea Chapter is one of the eighteen Chapters in the Western Navajo Agency with an estimated land base of 153,000 +/- acres. It is located along U.S. Highway 160 at Milepost 344, ½ mile north on Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) highway N-21, 36°19'4"N 110°58'13"W, Tonalea, Arizona. Tonalea is in a very rural area with limited resources in terms of law enforcement, education, telecommunication/utilities, transportation, commercial, and healthcare access to serve the community and general public.

The Chapter population according to the 2010 U.S. Census is recorded at 2,595. According to 1990 U.S. Census records, the population was 2,072.

There is limited employment opportunities available in the community, thus, the rate of unemployment is increasing. The Tonalea Day School, two grocery stores – Old Red Lake Trading Post and Tonalea General Store, Tonalea Chapter, Tonalea Senior Citizen Center, Navajo Nation Community Health Office and the two (2) Navajo Head Start

Program all employ a limited number of people. Over 70% of the community members rely on general welfare with Navajo Nation General Assistance, Navajo Nation Program for Self-Reliance and food stamps through the Department of Economic Security. Elders and disabled rely on Social Security and/or Disability benefits.

The Tonalea Chapter is focused on improving the safety, social, economic, health and educational conditions of the families residing in the community. To promote these plans, the community recognizes that infrastructure development is the most important. The community has also been affected by the land disputes between the Navajo and Hopi Tribes that prohibited any construction or developments. The construction prohibition was lifted in 2009; future projects will improve the living conditions of the people by continuous community education and functions by the local community government.

III. PROBLEM STATEMENT AND NEED ASSESSMENT

On October 9, 2012, the Federal Division of Environmental Health Services conducted a physical inspection of the Tonalea Chapter building. Due to a severe shift in the foundation and load bearing walls, it resulted a possible danger of the building roof collapsing. There was possible presence of asbestos and lead paint in the walls, roof, plumbing, and ceiling areas. In 1959, the building was built of cinderblocks and lumber by local unskilled laborers. The building had most of the original plumbing and electrical work laid over half a century before.

On October 15, 2012, the Federal Division of Environmental Health Services (DEHS) generated an inspection report that outlined a recommendation to the Tonalea Chapter to be closed due to numerous contributing factors. It was also recommended that a certified structural engineer inspect the Tonalea Chapter for any structural integrity. The interested parties' primary concern is for the safety and welfare of the Tonalea Chapter Staff, Officials and the general public upon their use of the facility, and daily general services to the public.

On October 19, 2012, Tonalea Chapter Staff and the Executive Director of Division of Community Development, in cooperation with the Navajo Nation Capital Improvement Office (CIO) and Navajo Nation Design and Engineer Services (DES), A visual inspection was conducted of the Chapter building's compromised load bearing walls and stress cracks in the concrete floor of the assembly room.

In November 2012, the Tonalea Chapter administration moved into the chapter's Tin Blue Warehouse meant for storage. Despite it possessing serious health, safety, and hazardous concerns, chapter administration staff continued to operate out of the Tin Blue Warehouse.

On May 20, 2013, the Navajo Nation Division of Health: Office of Environmental Health/Code Enforcement issued an Administrative Order of Condemning and Order of Permanent Closure, (see **Exhibit A.1.**), of the Tonalea Chapter building after a visual

inspection of the compromised structure and integrity was found in the Fall of 2012 by the Federal Division of Environmental Health Services.

The Chapter Administration staff was housed in the chapter's Tin Blue Warehouse for over three (3) years. The Chapter Administration staff had to endure the extreme cold weather in the winter months and extreme heat in the summer months due to poor insulation. The administrative staff dealt with vermin, lizards and snakes entering the warehouse due to dilapidated exterior panels. The Warehouse was never meant to be utilized as an office space, but for storage only.

On December 8, 2015, the Navajo Department of Health issued the Order of Closure to the Tonalea Chapter Administration - see **Exhibit A.2**. The Administration was granted limited re-entry to collect only necessary administrative items. The Order of Closure explicitly stated, "There shall be no administrative function during this duration." The Administration was given until December 11, 2015 by 5:00 p.m. to vacate the premise.

After December 11, 2015, Tonalea Chapter Administration staff moved out of the Tin Blue Warehouse with no alternative office space. There was no other building available in Tonalea Community for the Administration staff to utilize as an alternate office space.

Thereafter, Tonalea Chapter entered into a Memorandum of Agreement with the Navajo Nation Division of Community Development to temporarily relocate the Tonalea Chapter Administration Staff to the Administrative Services Center in Tuba City, AZ. This was the only viable alternative. This resulted in serving the community from Tuba City that required Tonalea community members to commute 25 miles southwest of Tonalea. Educational services and other social functions for the community were discontinued, and in despair.

Due to community demands of continuing local services and functions in Tonalea, this required collaboration with the Tonalea Senior Citizen Center in identifying an office space for the chapter administration staff. The Tonalea Chapter Administration is currently utilizing a space in the Tonalea Senior Citizen Center. Within the 10'x10' space being occupied, the laundry room inside the Tonalea Senior Citizen Center has become the new chapter administration office.

Space limitation in Tonalea remains the same along with providing necessary services to the community, which continues to be a challenge. A couple of other challenging factors are improvements on increasing productivity for the chapter administration staff to meet the demands of the community and the general public, and most public meetings continue to be held at the Tonalea Senior Citizen Center with very limited space. At times, public meetings in the senior center becomes overcrowded exceeding the maximum occupancy of 54. It causes a safety and health concern, and deters community members away. Despite these challenging factors with no local community facility, the Tonalea Chapter continues to encourage the community and general public to attend public meetings and/or other social functions that are important for community awareness.

Space limitation has also caused limited spending on the chapter's Summer Youth Employment and Public Employment Program funds. The need to spend the Summer Youth and Public Employment Program funds to employ in the community is essential to help the chapter complete local projects. This also allows youth pay for books, clothes, school supplies, registration fees, etc., for the upcoming school year.

IV. OBJECTIVES AND GOALS

The objective of this project is to provide a healthy and safe environment, and to enhance the overall quality of life for the general public of the Tonalea community, Administrative Staff, and the Chapter Officials. Tonalea community members have had many challenges including disruption of basic human services over the last forty years caused by federally imposed construction prohibition. Through the successful and timely completion of this project, the Chapter will exemplify its ability to continue working with various agencies and organization in fulfilling community prioritized needs of the Tonalea Chapter. The completion of this project will also contribute to further capital development. Examples are additional power line extensions, waterline extensions, road improvements for safer accessibility of schools, law enforcement, emergency medical services, community health representatives to attend to high risk patients, etc. In order to meet the Tonalea community needs and goals, the Navajo Nation Capital Project Management Department (CPMD), formerly known as Navajo Nation DES, supports and encourages the approval of the grant that is being requested.

Overall, this will allow Tonalea Chapter to ensure commitment of the four pillars identified by the Navajo Nation Office of President and Vice-President that were mandated by the Navajo people – veterans, elders, youth, employment and infrastructure.

V. SCOPE OF WORK

The construction of a new Tonalea Chapter building were proposed in three (3) phases: 1) demolition of the old chapter building with abatement of asbestos, lead paint and removal [Completed, 2015]; 3) design of a new chapter building 2) construction of a new chapter building.

Phase one of the project is complete that entailed testing for asbestos, lead paint, mercury, chlorofluorocarbon (CFCs) and polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs) in the building. These harmful materials were tested by a specialized licensed Inspector, Iina Ba, Inc. Materials that tested positive were removed by a specialized contractor and transported to an authorized location where the contaminated materials were disposed of. This phase of the demolition project's cost estimate was approximately \$150,000.00 for planning, developing and implementing

Phase two of the project design is almost complete with a cost estimate of \$364,000.00. Chapter design of the new building was reduced from 8,400 square feet to 6,795 square feet. Reduction of the building was the chapter's desire to manage a smaller building

due to fiscal reasons.

Phase three of the project is estimated at \$2,196,000.00 for the construction of the new Tonalea Chapter building. The ultimate goal is to complete the construction of the new Tonalea Chapter building on its scheduled time line and within the proposed budget. Our first scheduled milestone is to communicate the construction site plan to the community with the design planning team. The team will utilize visual aids such as graphics and 3-D models to emphasize the changes from the old building to the new building designs by incorporating the local culture, philosophy, and tradition. This will be followed by the ground breaking to begin construction.

Project milestones: See **Exhibit B** that references the updated Tonalea Chapter Project Schedule.

The new Tonalea Chapter building will be 6,795 square feet with unique designs that will entail energy efficient features and a voltage converter system that meets renewable portfolio standards for the State of Arizona. It will have large windows for cross ventilation and cooling purposes. The electrical wiring will be specific to include an area for future computer lab terminals and the chapter house will provide Wi-Fi/Broadband services to the community. The bathrooms will have Americans with Disability Act (ADA) handicapped accessibility and low water usage toilets. See **Exhibit C.1-C.3** attachments referencing the chapter building – site plan (**C.1.**), floor plan (**C.2.**) and exterior elevations (**C.3.**).

The old building (demolished) was approximately 2,600 square feet and was used as both a government building and community building adjacent to important community resources. There were fourteen rooms total, including three office spaces, a reception area office, a janitor's closet and nursing consultations, four storage closets, two restrooms, computer lab, and about 120 capacity assembly hall used for voting, wedding ceremonies, funeral planning, traditional tribal games and cultural teachings and celebrations.

The Tonalea Chapter administration and CMPD will oversee construction projects and management of the new building. For the past fifty years, the organization has been responsible for the majority of all community procurement and local budgets. Through our vast experience, the administration will use their expertise and knowledge to ensure the new Chapter building project will meet milestones and deadlines by working with CMPD.

The Tonalea Chapter administration maintains and establishes all local utility infrastructures along with managing and operating a watering point for the entire community. Tonalea Chapter staff oversee maintenance of two Head Start buildings and the Senior Center within the community while meeting both federal and tribal standings. In 2010, FEMA entrusted Tonalea with over \$30,000 in monies and equipment to operate Project Snowdrift, plow and salt roads and assist with vehicle accidents and emergencies. They also have had previous experience in construction management, having supervised the complete \$100,000 renovation and remodel of the Chapter's Senior Center in 2011.

Financially, the Tonalea Chapter House oversees an annual budget of \$325,000. They manage a \$90,000 trust that awards bachelor, masters and PhD candidates' annual scholarships. In preparation for the upcoming construction of the new Chapter House, the Tonalea local government has saved more than \$100,000 to put towards the project.

The Tonalea Chapter in collaboration with CMPD have conducted feasibility studies and determined that all utilities are on-site to support the new structure. The site is located within the withdrawn land of the chapter tract that belongs to the Tonalea Chapter and right-of-way access are currently available to the site.

The community watering point is located within the chapter premise. The community watering point remains a primary source for local domestic and livestock use, vital to approximately 60 percent of the community who still lack running water in their homes. Future infrastructure in these areas of the community will improve overtime as the construction of the new chapter building is complete. More community interaction with critical involvement of the stakeholders to guide and contribute in completion of infrastructure projects will decrease the amount of people lacking running water.

The old Tonalea Chapter building was the main artery providing liveliness to the community for over 50 years. Traditional meetings, celebrations, games, educational workshops, and other social events have ceased since October of 2012. Public meetings continue to be held at the Tonalea Senior Citizen Center and nearby churches. Nursing and health consultations have also discontinued. The nearest medical facility is in Tuba City, Arizona – 25 miles away and the mobile clinic has since ceased. A food distribution program to assist families and elderlies in need with limited income to support the local community has closed down.

VI. LOCATION OF THE NEW TONALEA CHAPTER BUILDING

Below: The location of the future Tonalea Chapter Building will be located on the same site as the condemned Chapter Building as shown below in red box. The site is located adjacent to the Tonalea Head Start building. The Tonalea School is located about 200 yards east of the yard depicted in white and 50 yards from the Senior Citizen building. The community watering point was relocated near the warehouse north of the existing Senior Center.



In an effort to limit construction costs and meet budget goals, the new Tonalea Chapter building will be reconstructed on the same site as the old chapter building. With the increasing enrollment population and discontinuation of local services, the demand for a new chapter building has increased. No community chapter facility limits meeting the growing needs of the community, this includes veterans, youth, and elders. A new chapter building will extensively help expedite a return of local community culture, tradition, and education, employment, re-opening of scheduled events to encourage community developments and improvements, traditional celebrations, and other social activities for the betterment of Tonalea that includes health promotions and maintaining an active lifestyle. The Chapter anticipates a return of the much needed commodity food program and other welfare services. The Nurse Consultation office will also reopen and a community room will be available for voting, town meetings, weddings, funeral practices, etc. A future computer lab with Wi-Fi Internet access will be available for virtual learning and the Chapter hopes to open a small gym facility for the community seeking a more active lifestyle.

Information having been presented to and conditions observed by the Navajo Division of Health, Office of Environmental Health Code Enforcement, duly designated as and herein the (Regulatory Authority), of the unsafe dilapidated condition of the Tonalea Chapter House Building, herein the (Chapter House), posing a substantial public environmental health and safety risk as well as posing a substantial liability exposure risk to potential claims of loss by the Chapter House governance, herein the (Chapter Officials), and the Navajo Nation due to existing potential hazards therein. The information presented, in whole or in part, were from the Tuba City Regional Health Care Corporation, Division of Environmental Health Services, duly designated as and herein the (Health Advisor), specifically, survey report of October 15, 2012 and supporting past surveys of November 2001, December 2001, and February 2007.

A site visit was made by the Regulatory Authority on May 6, 2013, accompanied by Chapter Officials, wherein observations were made of the true unsafe dilapidated condition of the Chapter House. In conclusion, the Chapter House building is beyond any feasible rehabilitative initiative to current building standards as well as environmental health and safety standards and/or requirements. Several architectural, engineering, environmental health and safety mitigating factors limit any likelihood of feasible rehabilitation and/or renovation for continued use, specifically: the question of structural integrity is being the main concern. The Chapter House built in 1959 is outgrown by the community's population as evident by two

additions having been made to accommodate the community's growth. It must be noted that the building additions and renovations made were without any confirmation to any known standards or code oversight. In much discussion and deliberation with Chapter Officials and thorough consideration of the matter and information presented by the Health Advisor it was agreed to that the Chapter Officials request condemning the existing Chapter House and an order of permanent closure in support of the Chapter Official's efforts in the demolition of the Chapter House and move forward in obtaining a new chapter complex.

In addition to the Chapter House, Chapter Officials requested an assessment and evaluation of (3) three abandoned building within the complex, they are: a) A dilapidated wooden hogan structure, property number R002-003; b) A dilapidated wood & stucco structure, property number R002-005; and c) A dilapidated single wide trailer, property number R002-008.

The conclusion from said assessment and evaluation of the above is that they, too, pose a substantial public environmental health and safety risk as well as posing a substantial liability exposure risks to potential claims of loss by the Chapter House governance and the Navajo Nation due to existing potential hazards therein, each in of themselves. Further, it confirms the observations and recommendations of the Health Advisor in their survey of October 15, 2012.

It must also be further stated that in the process of conducting said assessment and evaluation it was noted that there are numerous inoperable farm equipment and vehicles within the Chapter compound, each beyond feasible repair. Too, there are numerous discarded excess materials stacked, piled, or strewn about the compound as well. These conditions and ease of access pose an additional environmental health and safety risk as well.

Therefore, in consideration of the Tonalea Chapter governance's request and accepting and applying the Health Advisor's recommendations the Regulatory Authority hereby issues the following:

1 NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the existing Tonalea Chapter House building is hereby Condemned and an Order of Permanent Closure is granted and shall be effective May 20, 2013. Therefore, any or all efforts towards the demolishment of said Chapter House shall be initiated.

2 NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN that the (3) three additional dilapidated buildings: a) The hogan structure property number R002-003; b) The wood & stucco structure property number R002-005; and c) A single wide trailer, property number R002-008 are beyond any

feasible rehabilitative initiative to current building standards as well as environmental health and safety standards and/or requirements.


3. **NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN** that the above (3) three dilapidated buildings are hereby Condemned. Therefore, any or all efforts towards the removal and/or demolition of the said buildings shall be initiated.

4. **NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN** that the inoperable farm equipment and vehicles and discarded materials be removed to reduce or eliminate the substantial public environmental health and safety risks and to mitigate any hazards and ill effects from potential loss of claims and is in the best interest of the Tonalea Chapter governance and the Navajo Nation.

5. **NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN** that Condemning and the Order of Permanent Closure of said property is to reduce or eliminate the substantial public environmental health and safety risks and to mitigate any hazards and ill effects from potential loss of claims and is in the best interest of the Tonalea Chapter governance and the Navajo Nation.

6. **NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN** that the Health Advisor shall be included in the Chapter's, but not limited to, proposed site building planning, plan development, plan review, and construction, etc.

Tonalea Chapter Officials:

On October 15, 2012, Mr. Lyndon Endischnee, Environmental Health Officer II, Ms. Angelita Chee, Environmental Health Technician, and I surveyed the Tonalea Chapter House. The purpose of the survey was to evaluate the structural integrity of the facility environment. In addition, to make recommendations for the improvement of existing services such as sanitation, safety practices, and management practices related to public health and safety at this facility.

The Tonalea Chapter meeting hall was constructed in 1959, and the remaining portion of the building was added-on during the 1970s. It appeared that the chapter house had undergone some recent renovations, but our office did not conduct plan reviews and approval. Copies of the Chapter House surveys on November 2001, December 2001 and February 2007 are attached. Pictures of the chapter house are also enclosed. The recommendation that a structural engineer evaluate the structural soundness of the chapter building was not done prior to the chapter renovations. The structural concerns that were addressed in the previous environmental health surveys in 2001 and 2007 have come to a point of being unsafe for the chapter employees, and the community at large.

The chapter compound to the south, west, and northwest is unsafe because of several abandoned buildings. A trailer on the south, storage building(s) on the west, and a Hogan structure to the northwest of the chapter house present safety hazards such that the structures are dilapidated, not repairable, and provide harborages (shelter) for animals and rodents. There were also numerous inoperable farm equipment and vehicles on the chapter compound that are beyond repair. Photos of the dilapidated structures are attached.

SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATION:

THE TUBA CITY REGIONAL HEALTH CARE CORPORATION, DIVISION OF ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH SERVICES, ACTING AS THE APPOINTED HEALTH ADVISORS FOR THE NAVAJO NATION RECOMMENDS:

- 1. THAT THE TONALEA CHAPTER BE CLOSED DUE TO NUMEROUS INTER-RELATED CONTRIBUTING FACTORS THAT CAN ADVERSELY AFFECT THE CHAPTER STAFF AND THE GENERAL PUBLIC;**
- 2. SEEK FUNDS TO REPLACE THE CHAPTER HOUSE FACILITY;**
- 3. SUBMIT AS-BUILT PLANS FOR ANY NEW BUILDINGS TO OUR OFFICE;**
- 4. THAT CONSTRUCTION NOT COMMENCE UNTIL A PLAN REVIEW OF THE BUILDING AS-BUILTS ARE REVIEWED AND APPROVED.**
- 5. THAT CONSTRUCTION BE DONE BY PROFESSIONALS WITH WARRANTY COVERAGE AND RECOURSE FOR CORRECTIONS IF NECESSARY.**
- 6. REMOVE ALL UNSAFE, DILAPIATED STRUCTURES, INOPERABLE HEAVY EQUIPMENT AND VEHICLES FROM THE CHAPTER COMPOUND TO ELIMINATE HEALTH AND SAFETY HAZARDS.**

Information having been presented to the Office of Environmental Health/Code Enforcement, Navajo Department of Health, duly designated as and herein the (Regulatory Authority) in the form of a written complaint, dated November 12, 2015, concerning the questionable conditions within the To’Nihali’ Chapter, duly designated as a Certified Chapter and herein the (Chapter), and confirmed during a site visit on November 13, 2015 concluding that the complaint had merit.

Conditions observed were, but not limited to: Administrative business and functions were being conducted from in a warehouse structure. Conditions did not meet acceptable levels of comfort for administrative staff, clientele, and visitors in that 1. No functioning restroom(s), 2. No hand washing availability, 3. Inadequate heating, and 4. Inadequate sustaining heating, to name but a few. The Regulatory Authority was informed by the Chapter that the lack of approved budget hindered the corrective actions and that until a budget is approved no corrective action with respect to the plumbing issues would be corrected. The Chapter was advised to seek alternative means to identify resources to correct and/or seek relocation. The Regulatory Authority agreed not to administer no action at that time due the Chapter agreeing to continue seeking alternative resources.

On November 23, 2015 the Regulatory Authority learned that the Chapter was scheduled conduct a Thanksgiving Dinner on November 24, 2015 for Chapter members, visitors, etc.

On November 24, 2015 the Regulatory Authority called the Chapter and received confirmation of the scheduled event with no corrective actions or improvements addressing the concerns of existing conditions. In the course of the discussion, the Chapter agreed to cancel the event and any future public gatherings and limit administrative functions and continue to seek corrective actions. That being agreed to, the Regulatory Authority agreed not to take any actions in that the Chapter agreed to voluntarily close.

On November 30, 2015 and December 1, 2015 and December 7, 2015 the Regulatory Authority received complaints from the Health Advisor and Chapter member(s) that the Chapter continued operations from within the Chapter.

Therefore, in consideration of the above information and observed conditions and little to no corrective actions, the Regulatory Authority issues the following.

NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN that the conditions within the To'Nihalii' Chapter continue to pose a substantial health and safety risk to administrative staff, clientele, visitors.

NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN that the To'Nihalii' Chapter is hereby Ordered Closed.

NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN that the closure shall commence upon service, namely, 2:00 p.m., December 8, 2015.

NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN that an Authorization to Resume Operation shall be only after all identified health and safety risks are corrected.

NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN that the Chapter may be Granted reentry to collect necessary administrative items to a relocated location and shall be out by the end of business day, Friday December 11, 2015. Note: That there shall be no administrative functions or activity therein during this duration.

Tonalea Chapter Officials:

On October 07, 2015, Mr. Lyndon Endishee, Environmental Health Officer II, and I surveyed the Tonalea Chapter House. The survey was at the request of the chapter officials, after the chapter was issued a closure notice by the Navajo Division of Environmental Health / Code Enforcement. Our office also received numerous complaints regarding the condition of the chapter house.

The original chapter house was closed in 2012 and has been demolished since then. The unsafe buildings to the south, west and northwest of the demolished building have also been removed. The chapter moved into an old blue metal corrugated storage building without a sanitary clearance or a plan review by Tuba City Regional Health Care Corporation, Environmental Health Services Branch. Pictures of the old blue metal corrugated storage unit (chapter house) are enclosed. A structural engineer did not evaluate the structural soundness of the old blue metal corrugated storage unit (chapter house) prior to the chapter moving into the building. The conditions in the blue building are unsafe for the chapter employees, and the community at large. As of December 08, 2015, the old blue metal corrugated storage unit (chapter house) received an "Order of Closure", which is enclosed, from the Navajo Division of Office of Environmental Health / Code Enforcement for the following:

1. Conditions did not meet acceptable levels of comfort for administrative staff, clientele, and visitors;
2. No functioning restrooms;
3. No hand washing availability; and,

4. Inadequate sustainable heating.

The old blue metal corrugated storage unit (Tonalea Chapter House) does not meet NFPA 101 Chapter 12 and 13 for assembly occupancies, UBC - Uniform Building Code, NEC - National Electrical Code, UPC - Uniform Plumbing Code, NFPA 54 - National Fuel Gas Code, NFPA 58 - Storage and Handling of L.P. Gases, OSHA Standards - 29 CRR 1910, Federal Rehabilitation Act - handicap accessibility standards. (See the listing for Institutional Plan Reviews references for other applicable standards and guidelines).

In addition, photos of exterior hazards outside of the blue building are attached.

SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATION:

THE TUBA CITY REGIONAL HEALTH CARE CORPORATION, DIVISION OF ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH SERVICES, ACTING AS THE APPOINTED HEALTH ADVISOR TO THE NAVAJO NATION RECOMMENDS:

- 1. CONCURRENCE WITH THE NAVAJO DIVISION OF ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH / CODE ENFORCEMENT "ORDER OF CLOSURE" DUE TO NUMEROUS INTER-RELATED CONTRIBUTING FACTORS THAT CAN ADVERSELY AFFECT THE CHAPTER STAFF AND THE GENERAL PUBLIC;**
- 2. SEEK FUNDS TO REPLACE THE CHAPTER HOUSE FACILITY;**
- 3. SUBMIT AS-BUILT PLANS FOR ANY NEW BUILDINGS TO OUR OFFICE;**
- 4. THAT CONSTRUCTION NOT COMMENCE UNTIL A PLAN REVIEW OF THE BUILDING AS-BUILTS ARE REVIEWED AND APPROVED;**
- 5. THAT CONSTRUCTION BE DONE BY PROFESSIONALS WITH WARRANTY COVERAGE AND RECOURSE FOR CORRECTIONS IF NECESSARY; and.**
- 6. REMOVE ALL UNSAFE, DILAPIATED STRUCTURES, INOPERABLE HEAVY EQUIPMENT AND VEHICLES FROM THE CHAPTER COMPOUND TO ELIMINATE HEALTH AND SAFETY HAZARDS.**

1. The Tonalea Chapter is a duly-recognized Chapter of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 26 N.N.C § 3; and is delegated the authority and responsibility to promote projects that benefit the local community; and
2. Tonalea Chapter is vested with the authority to review all matters affecting the community and make appropriate recommendations to the Navajo Nation, Federal, State and local government agencies for appropriate actions; and
3. Tonalea Chapter is currently without a safe, adequate and publicly accessible facility to perform its basic government functions. The Chapter House was built around 1959, and exceeded its useful life, and has been demolished. The demolished Chapter House was seriously dilapidated and was beyond repair with visible structural and foundation shifting that caused large stress cracks in the walls of the structure; and
4. Tonalea Chapter Project Update on May 2, 2017 with the architect, design and engineering construction facilitated amendments to the first (8,398 SF - \$2,361,339.08 Cost), the recommended copy of the schematic drawing of the replacement chapter building attached as Exhibit A (6,795 SF) and the construction cost \$2,196,362.20.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. Tonalea Chapter supports and approves amendments to supersede resolution No. TN17-02-UB03 and re-affirming support of requesting the Navajo Nation Council allocate new construction funds from the existing Sihasin Funds or Undesignated Unreserved Funds Balance for a new chapter house in the revised amount of \$2,196,362.20 (6,795 SF) or an adjusted construction cost.



Subject: Capital Outlay Match Fund Update

Attached you will find the unaudited Income Statement and Balance sheet (Exhibit A) for the Capital Outlay Match Fund as of June 30, 2017.

The un-appropriated balance of the Capital Outlay Match Fund as of June 30, 2017, is currently \$16,527,651 (see Exhibit A, footnote 1).

The income statement shows the total amount of interest and dividends collected have totaled \$66,593 as of June 30, 2017. The \$2,000,000 set aside from the General Fund is shown in Other Revenue category. Total collected for the fund is \$2,066,593. There have been expenditures in the amount of \$591,305.

Exhibit B shows all the projects which the Capital Outlay Match has ongoing at this point in time. The total revised budget is \$22,558,465. There has been an amount of \$21,717,073 expended and encumbrances of \$399,275. The remaining balance of the projects within the Capital Outlay Match is \$442,117.
