AN ACTION RELATING TO HEALTH, EDUCATION AND HUMAN SERVICES, RESOURCES AND DEVELOPMENT, BUDGET AND FINANCE, NAA'BIK'ÍYÁTI', AND NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; APPROVING SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING FROM THE UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE IN THE AMOUNT OF ONE MILLION NINE HUNDRED AND EIGHTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$1,980,000) FOR CONSTRUCTION OF A NEW SENIOR CENTER FOR THE NAZLINI CHAPTER; WAIVING 12 N.N.C. § 820(I) AND 860(C) RELATING TO THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROCESS

PURPOSE: The purpose of this legislation is to approve a supplemental appropriation for \$1,980,000 for construction of a Senior Center within Nazlini Chapter.

This written summary does not address recommended amendments as may be provided by the standing committees. The Office of Legislative Counsel requests each Council Delegate review the proposed resolution in detail.

- C. The Navajo Nation established the Budget and Finance Committee (BFC) as a Navajo Nation Council standing committee and as such empowered BFC to review and recommend to the Navajo Nation Council the management of all funds. 2 N.N.C. §§ 164 (A)(9), 300 (A), 301 (B)(2).
- D. The Navajo Nation Council established the Naabik'íyáti' Committee as a Navajo Nation standing committee and as such proposed legislation that requires final action by the Navajo Nation Council shall be assigned to the Naabik'íyáti' Committee. 2 N.N.C. §§ 164 (A)(9), 700 (A).
- E. The Title 12 Appropriations Act Supplemental Appropriation requirements include:
 - When the Controller identifies additional sources of revenues above and beyond the initial or current revenue projections, supplemental appropriations may be allocated by the Navajo Nation Council. 12 N.N.C. § 820(L).
 - 2. Supplemental appropriations made from non-recurring revenues shall only be made for non-recurring operations or purposes, as set forth at § 820(F). The Controller of the Navajo Nation shall be responsible for designating recurring and non-recurring revenues. 12 N.N.C. § 820(L).
 - 3. All requests for annual operating funds and supplemental funds shall be submitted to the Office of Management and Budget ("OMB") for budget impact analysis. 12 N.N.C. § 820(M).
- F. The Title 12 Capital Improvement Process includes:
 - Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 810(F), "Capital Improvement" means a major project undertaken by the Navajo Nation that is generally not recurring on an annual basis and which fits within one or more of the following categories:
 - i. All projects requiring debt obligation or borrowing;
 - ii. Any acquisition or lease of land;

- iii. Purchase of major equipment or vehicles, with a life expectancy of five years or more, valued in excess of an amount to be established by the Controller;
- iv. Major building improvements that are not routine maintenance expenses and that substantially enhance the value or extend the useful life of a structure;
- v. Construction of new buildings or facilities including engineering, design, and other pre-construction costs with an estimated cost in excess of an amount to be determined by the Controller; and/or
- vi. Major equipment or furnishing required to furnish new buildings or other projects, the cost of which is above a certain amount to be established by the Controller.
- 2. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820 (I), the "[d]evelopment of the Capital Budget shall be coordinated with development of the Operating Budget. All budget requests for capital improvements shall be in compliance with an adopted Capital Improvement Plan and shall not be approved unless in compliance with the Plan."
- 3. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 860 (C)(2) "[t]he appropriation portion of the Capital Improvement Plan is subject to approval of the Navajo Nation Council upon recommendation of the Budget and Finance Committee. Any modification or amendment affecting the approved Capital Improvement Plan is subject to review and concurrence by the Resources and Development Committee prior to consideration by the Navajo Nation Council."

Section Two. Findings

- A. This is a funding request for the construction of a new Senior Center within the Nazlini Chapter. See Exhibit D.
- B. The supplemental funding request forms are attached as Exhibit A.

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- A. This supplemental appropriation of \$1,980,000 shall be from that amount of funds that exceeds the minimum fund balance of the Unreserved,
 Undesignated Fund Balance as determined by the Office of the Controller and to the Nazlini Chapter Business Unit Number, 108020.
- B. The Navajo Nation hereby approves the supplemental appropriation from the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance to the Nazlini Chapter for the Nazlini Chapter Senior Center Construction Project, Business Unit Number, 108020 for \$1,980,000.

Section Five. Effective Date

The provisions of this Act shall become effective in accord with 2 N.N.C. § 221(B).

Financial Update-(General Fund Revenue, Expenditures, UUFB)

The gross General Fund Revenues, (see Exhibit "A"), as of August 31, 2017 is \$203,053,235, (see Footnote 1). The total General Fund set asides is \$\$51,749,599 (Footnote 2). The Net Revenue for the General Fund is \$151,303,727 (see Footnote 3). The permanent fund income transfer is \$24,411,000 (Footnote 4). The reserve taken for the permanent fund income transfer is \$2,885,000 (Footnote 5). The grand total revenue for the General Fund is \$172,829,727 (see Footnote 6) which is 98.78% of the projection.

Next, are the total expenditures by Branch, (see Exhibit "B"), as of August 31, 2017, the Legislative Branch has expenditures of \$14,836,331 (see Footnote 1a); encumbrances of \$822,493 (see Footnote 1b) with a remaining budget of \$3,307,669 (see Footnote 1c). The Executive Branch expenditures are \$162,500,722 (see Footnote 2a); encumbrances are \$7,206,122 (see Footnote 2b) with a remaining budget of \$37,797,219 (see Footnote 2c). The Judicial Branch expenditures are \$11,718,156 (see Footnote 3a); with encumbrances of \$73,692 (see Footnote 3b) and remaining budget of \$2,356,349 (see Footnote 3c). Total General Fund expenditures are \$189,055,209 (see Footnote 4a); total encumbrances are \$8,102,307 (see Footnote 4b) with an overall remaining budget of \$43,461,236 (see Footnote 4c).

The updated Undesignated Unreserved Fund Balance (UUFB), (see Exhibit "C") as of September 8, 2017 is \$31,258,217. The Fiscal Year 2016 audited numbers were approved via CJY-51-17 and an amount of \$11, 728,198 that was previously reserved for debt service for capital projects was returned back to the UUFB with the approval of CJY-50-17. These two amounts have been incorporated into this new schedule.

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Project Summary

Razlini Chapter is submitting a funding application to the Navajo Nation Capital Improvement Office (NNCIO) seeking \$1,950,000 in appropriations. Nazlini Chapter is proposing the construction of a new 3,915 square feet senior center building at a total projected cost of \$1,950,000. The facility will consist of a cafeteria style eating area, a kitchen and offices for staff and a paved parking lot with all safety features to accommodate ADA individuals. The current building was constructed by Nazlini Chapter in 1986 and renovated in 1993 and it is time to replace the building with a new modern building for better service.

The proposed project will address the needs of a new Nazlini Chapter Senior Citizen facility to accommodate safety and capacity recommendations. The current existing building was built in 1385 and renovated in early 1990's. The building is still functional but deficiencies were cited by Office of Environmental Service of Indian Health Service and the structure of the old building is dilapidating fast.

The proposed project received prominent public support and categorized as a priority in the Chapter's Infrastructure and Capital Improvement Plan (ICIP) and Community Land Use Plan (CLUP).

Nazilni Chapter planned a location construction site within the chapter property near existing Navajo Tribal Utility service (See existing utility infrastructure on Exhibit A). The Chapter property was established in 1962 for community services in a 10 acre fenced property. (See the legal land survey on Exhibit B). A project management team will be selected to coordinate with the architect and contractor to undertake the project in a timely manner and within approved budget.

The total project cost estimated at \$2,0250,000. Nazlini Chapter will allocate \$75,000.00 in match-fund from the chapter's general budget. Nazlini Chapter resolutely deliberates the support from the community for a new Nazlini Senior Center facility; the demand is justified for the safety and capacity sufficiency; the demand is also justified for remoteness of the community.

II. Qualitative Narrative

A. Need for Public Facility

Nazlini Chapter was established by the Navajo tribal government in the early 1950's and currently according to US census serves a population of 1,260.

Nazlini Chapter essential and vital need of a new senior citizen facility is warranted due to the old dilapidating building which also does not meet the congregate safety and capacity accommodation.

As an isolated community, Nazlini Chapter senior citizen is disadvantaged to numerous public services and amenities which are available to urban communities. The chapter's initiative is to develop local services for the senior citizens and the community. The current senior citizen center is located 28 miles from the nearest Navajo Nation police station, grocery store, social services and hospital in Chinle, Arizona and 20 miles to similar services to Ganado, Arizona.

B. Direct & Indirect Benefits

Nazlini Chapter's proposed new Senior Citizen Facility Project will bring direct and noticeable benefits to the community. The new facility will enhance the congregate safety and health, and public capacity accommodation. The parking lot will be paved and all parking safety functions for senior citizen. The building will provide safe accessibility entrance to accommodate disadvantage individuals. Indirectly, the community will enrich and heighten its community values and for a better insight on a comprehensive community development and also, traveling senior citizens will know that there is a senior citizen in Nazlini where they can get their congregate meals. Ultimately, senior citizens will be able to congregate with their peers

C. Public involvement

Nazlini Chapter and community senior citizens dignified involvement is commended to cause the new senior citizen facility into a reality. Nazlini Chapter resolution is attached as documentation proclaiming public support for the construction of a new senior citizen facility. (See Exhibit C). Office of Environmental Service of Indian Health Service conducted institutional survey of the center on October 26, 2015 and stated Nazlini Senior Center continues to be one of most well maintained public structures in the Chinle Service Unit with overall exceptional management of the Senior Program and the facility maintenance (See Exhibit D for IHS institutional survey report). IHS also mentioned that the Nazlini Senior Staff and to the community of Nazlini is on its second year of Commendations.

III. Project Description

A. Project Summary

Nazini Chapter has developed plans and preliminary specifications to construct a 3,815 square feet senior citizen building to provide a safe and capacity accommodation. The new facility will include a cafeteria style eating area, kitchen area, conference room, office space for staff, and exercise room with a sauna room. The concept design is attached as Exhibit E.

The proposed facility will be located within the Nazlini Chapter fenced property. See attached Exhibit F for the legal land survey and the concept facility location. Navajo Tribal Utility Authority infrastructure is within the property area near the proposed project location.

B. Project Goals & Objectives

The primary goal of this project is to construct a new senior citizen facility to address the needs of the Nazlini Chapter senior citizen safety and health environment and to replace the old existing building.

The objectives are many including the mentioned direct and indirect benefits that are in the qualitative narrative statement above.

Identified community development plan expressed by Chapter Members are community services and public facilities as addressed in the Chapter's Community Land Use Plan.

C. Scope of Work

Nazlini Chapter: The chapter will provide a supporting resolution for the development of a new senior citizen building. The chapter will submit the grant proposal to Navajo Nation Capital Improvement Office before March 1, 2016 for funding the proposed new senior citizen building.

Grant Writer: The consultant will develop the grant proposal for the proposed new senior citizen facility. The write-up will include the needs assessment survey, identify project priorities utilizing

the chapter Land Use Plan, conducted pre-planning sessions with all the appropriate parties, identified project site, obtained preliminary consent from land users, and available all preliminary fieldwork, including archaeological surveys, environmental assessments, preliminary designs, cost estimates, and survey of land withdrawals. Finalized necessary land withdrawals. Prepare and complete project proposal application containing all necessary criteria including scope of work, plan of operation, cost estimate, status of clearances, planning clearance, matching funds, chapter resolution, support letters from programs, conceptual design, and other necessary documents.

Navajo Nation: The Design Engineering Program will assist in developing the facility, provide planning, architectural, engineering, surveying, technical service and construction administration for Nazlini Chapter. The Capital Improvement program will provide the funding for the construction of a new senior citizen facility in Nazlini, Arizona.

Pursuant to applicable Navajo Nation laws, a Request for Qualifications/Request for Proposals (RFQ/RFP) will be used to procure the services of an architectural & engineering firm as well as the procurement of services of a firm to conduct the legal survey and environmental assessment for the project. A planning group consisting of the Nazlini Chapter, Navajo Nation Government Department representatives and other involve agencies will conduct the RFQ/RFP and other project management matters. Nazlini Chapter has prepared a concept floor plan of the proposed building to indicate the basic modules and proposed schematics of the building. The scope of work will provide management of the engage agency. The concerned agency involve in the project will have opportunity to modify the building layout, size and construction materials to meet the need and building safe code.

During the construction phase a construction inspector will make periodic monitoring inspections and report to the architect and the funding parties. Any discrepancies with the plans and specification, errors, or quality of construction issues will be corrected by the contractor. When the project is complete, the building will be transferred to Nazlini Chapter and a specified time warranty will be in effect. During the warranty period, any warranty items found to be defective or incomplete will be corrected by the contractor.

Below is a bullet point showing the relationship of key personnel and stakeholders that will be involved with the project.

- Chapter Officials work and meet with consultant to make sure all necessary documents are inclusive in the grant proposal.
- Chapter Administration staff assist and provide chapter officials and consultant with necessary chapter documents for the grant proposal
- Consultant work and meet with all stakeholders for the development of grant proposal
- Navajo Design & Engineering work with chapter officials and consultant on concept senior citizen building design, engineering and cost estimate.
- Navajo Capital Improvement Office assist the chapter on securing funding for the project.

- Navajo Tribal Utility Authority provide the water, electricity and gas line infrastructure for the concept design and cost estimate
- Bureau of Indian Affairs provide the access right of way from Navajo Route 27 to the chapter property. Develop better access road to the chapter property.
- Indian Health Service provide the waste water disposal recommendation and other necessary requirements regard to health and safety environment.

D. Project Timeframe

An exact construction timeframe has not been determined at this time due to ambiguous variables including: grant award, execution of contract, advertising for architect, contractor, construction season, and other uncertain and undefined expectancies. However, once the architectural work is complete, the architect will bid the construction work to be done; there will be a 30-day advertisement period. Once a contractor is selected and a contract is awarded, the contractor will submit a construction schedule that will identify the precise dates of construction. The following is general estimation of time requirements for each phase of this construction project.

E. Project & Construction Management

Nazlini Chapter will appoint a project management team consisting of representatives from the Nazlini Chapter, Navajo Nation Capital Improvement Office, Navajo Nation Design Engineering Program and other vital stakeholders. Their primary task will be to ensure the project is carried out in a well-organized, cost-efficient, and timely manner.

IV. Budget

The total projected budget for the Nazlini Senior Citizen Facility Project is \$2,025,000. Nazlini Chapter is requesting Navajo Nation to provide proportionate project funds at \$1,950,000 and matching allocations from Nazlini Chapter in the amount of \$75,000. The following chart illustrates the amounts proposed for each component of the project as well as the matching responsibilities.


V. Land Use, Historic Preservation, and Environmental Compliance


Nazlini Chapter property is 9.97 acres in size and has been surveyed and legally withdrawn by the Navajo Land Administration. A Cultural Resources Inventory (DCD1 98-074) and survey plat are attached as Exhibit G. Nazlini Chapter Tract is located within the Chinle Navajo Agency in Apache County, Arizona. The specific location of the tract is depicted on the Nazlini, Arizona 1983 USGS 7,5' quad map. The land status of the project area is Tribal Trust Land. The project area is located on a level flood plain area just east of Navajo Route 27, in the community valley of Nazlini, Arizona at an elevation of 6,260 feet. The general area of the Nazlini Chapter is characterized by a rural Navajo settlement system comprised of single/multiple home clusters, a community school and a Baptist church. No known traditional cultural properties were identified within the chapter tract. The field work was completed on July 22, 1998.

Vi. Maintenance and Operation Plan

Medini Chapter receives Navajo Nation general funds annually and allocates an amount for operations and maintenance for chapter programs and facilities. Chapter property and investments are important responsibilities for the Nazlini Chapter. Therefore, Nazlini Chapter will provide necessary and sufficient funds for the operations and maintenance of the proposed new senior citizen facility. Nazlini Chapter will coordinate with the Navajo Agency on Aging and other resource agencies to establish appropriate agreements necessary for operations relative to the senior citizen services.

Navajo Tribal Utility Authority Infrastructure







Thence N 60° 23' E, a distance of 583.75 feet to a point;

Thence N 84° 38' E, a distance of 83.84 feet to a point being the most northerly corner of the herein described tract of land;

Thence \$ 29° 37' E, a distance of 625.93 feet to a point being the most easterly corner of the herein described tract of land, and from whence the center line of a driveshaft of a windmill bears \$ 77° 09' E, a distance of 316.15 feet;

Thence S 60° 23' W, a distance of 660.00 feet to a point being the most southerly corner of the herein described tract of land;

Thence N 29° 37° W, a distance of 660.00 feet parallel to and 50 feet from the center line of a dirt road, said dirt road being approximately 24 feet in width, to the point of beginning.

Exhibit E Se**nior** Citizen Building Concept Design




On behalf of Lupton Chapter and the Capital Improvement Projects Department, Navajo Nation Division of Community Development, a cultural resource inventory has been completed for the Nazlini Chapter Tract. The area was inventoried for the future improvements to the chapter tract: the construction and improvement of community buildings, parking lots, and all utilities. The rest of the area was inventoried for general planning of the Nazlini Chapter. As individual undertakings are identified, compliance with Section 106 of the NHPA will be conducted.

The fieldwork was conducted by Maxine L. Yazzie of the Capital Improvement Projects Department, on July 22, 1998. The project area is located within the Nazlini Chapter, in an unplatted portion of T 19 N, R 27 E GSRBM; Nazlini, Apache County, Arizona. Approximately 9.97 ac (3.03 ha) of land was inspected.

Ten in-use areas (A-J) and one isolated occurrence (DCD1 98-074-01) were identified during the cultural resource inventory. None of the in-use areas meet the 50-year guideline for inclusion into the National Register of Historic Places. The isolated occurrence tacks integrity of location and is not eligible for inclusion into the National Register of Historic Places. Approval for the undertaking is recommended.

INTRODUCTION

On behalf of Nazlini Chapter, and the Capital Improvement Department of the Navajo Nation Division of Community Development, a cultural resource inventory has been completed for the future improvements to the chapter tract: the construction and improvement of community buildings, parking lots, and all utilities. The rest of the area was inventoried for general planning of the Nazlini Chapter. For purposes of this project, Bureau of Indian Affairs, Navajo Area Office is the lead agency for meeting the requirements of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act.

The fieldwork was conducted by Maxine L. Yazzie of the Capital Improvement Department on July 22, 1998.

DESCRIPTION OF UNDERTAKING

The area was inventoried for the future improvements to the chapter tract: the construction and improvement of community buildings, parking lots, and all utilities. The rest of the area was inventoried for general planning of the Nazlini Chapter.

PROJECT LOCATION




Figure 1: General location of the project area location within the Chinle Agency. Map is after Chapter Images: 1996 Edition.




Figure 2: Specific Locations of the Nazlini Chapter Tract. Map is U.S.G.S qued map Nazlini, Arizona 1983. Numbers are UTM coordinate locations. DCD1 98-074.

The Nazlini Chapter Tract is located within the Chinle Navajo Agency of the Navajo Indian Reservation (Figure 1) in Apache County, Arizona. The specific location of the tract is depicted on the Nazlini, Arizona 1983 USGS 7.5' quad map (Figure 2). The legal location is in the unplatted portion of T 19 N, R 27 E; GSRBM; Nazlini, Apache County, Arizona. The land status of the project area is Tribal Trust Land. UTM's coordinates are listed in Table 1.

AREA ENVIRONMENTAL AND CULTURAL SETTING

The project area is located on a level flood plain area just east of Navajo Route 27, in the community valley of Nazlini, Arizona. It is southwest of the Nazlini Creek, west of

The project area is located on a level flood plain area just east of Navajo Route 27, in the community valley of Nazlini, Arizona. It is southwest of the Nazlini Creek, west of the Nazlini Canyon and east of the Tah-aith-cheed Wash. The elevation of the area is 6260 ft/1908 m. The vegetation in the general vicinity include Chinese elm, various grasses, rabbitbrush and snakeweed.

The general area of the Nazlini Chapter is characterized by a rural Navajo settlement system comprised of single/multiple home clusters, a boarding school and a trading post.

EXISTING DATA REVIEW

As part of this project, the archival data of the Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Department (NNHPD) in Window Rock were consulted. Within 1 km (.6 mi) of this project, seven previous completed projects and two previous recorded sites are marked on the NNHPD base maps. These projects and sites are listed in Table 2.

The following sources were reveiwed for information on Traditional Cultural Properties in the general areal Navajo Indians III (Van Valkenburgh 1974) and Dine Bikeyah (Van Valkenburgh 1941). No known Traditional Cultural Properties were identified within the chapter tract by these sources.

FIELD METHODS

The fieldwork was completed by Maxine L. Yazzie of the Capital Improvement Department on July 22, 1998. The project area was investigated using a Class III (100%) level, pedestrian survey strategy utilizing parallel transects spaced about 15 meters apart. The Nazini Chapter Tract consists of 9.97 ac (3.03 ha). The chapter tract is enclosed by a fence and is disturbed by grading. Mr. Lee Bigwater showed the author the project area.

Data about Traditional Cultural Properties and the dates of the existing buildings in the Tract was collected from Mr. Lee Bigwater, Chapter Vice-President, and Mr. Woodie Bennett, Chapter Community Service Coordinator, on July 22, 1998. No traditional cultural properties were identified in or around the tract.

Resource Definitions

The following describe the NNAD working definitions for cultural resources.

Isolated Occurrence: Any non-structural remains of a single event; alternatively, any non-structural assemblage of approximately 10 or fewer artifacts or other material within an area of approximately 10 square meters or tess, especially if it is of questionable human origin, if it appears to be the result of fortuitous causes, or if it lacks integrity (1991b). Rock art, burials, sacred places, and formal features are not recorded as isolated occurrences.

Traditional Cultural Properties: This include both places with material remains and places that lack the evidence of human use that would qualify them as archaeological sites, historic properties, or graves (NNHPD 1991a). Traditional Cultural Properties with material remains may include, but are not limited to, sites that may have been blessed and where ceremonies may have occurred, such as those with hogans, houses, sweathouses, game corrats (needzii'), eagle traps and so forth; other sites where ceremonies and rituals occurred (if evidence of such use, such as, the remains of ceremonial structures, are visible); trail shrines; rock art; and both marked and unmarked graves (NNHPD 1991a). Such places that lack clear evidence of human use include, but are not limited to, the following types: places for gathering plants for use in ceremonies and other traditional purposes; places for gathering minerals for other traditional purposes; places for gathering contents of sacred bundles; places for gathering other materials for ceremonial and other traditional purposes; prayer-offering places; places associated with the general Navajo origin story; places associated with origin stories of particular ceremonies; places associated with the origin of a clan; places associated with the origin of a Navajo custom; places identified as the home of a Holy Being such Wind, Lightening, Big Snake; location of echoes (Talking Rocks, which convey human words to the Holy People): natural discoloration of rock that has some kind of supernatural event power; and places that have a part in the life-cycle rituals of individuals (such as the spot where a newborn baby's umbilical cord is placed). Many of these sorts of places are features of the natural landscape, such as mountains, hills, rock outcrops, springs, and individual trees (NNHPD 1991a).

Site: The location of an event, belief, or activity, a prehistoric or historic occupation or activity, or a building or structure, whether standing, ruined, or vanished, where the location itself maintains historic, archaeological, or traditional cultural value regardless of the value of any existing structure. Note: does not include isolated historic trash dumps less then ten to twenty years old.

CULTURAL RESOURCE FINDINGS

Ten in-use areas (A-J) and one isolated occurrence (DCD1 98-074-01) were identified during the cultural resource inventory. The isolated occurrence consists of two pieces of pink/white chert interior flakes. The cultural resource locations are shown in Figure 3. The in-use areas are listed in Table 3.

EVALUATION OF SIGNIFICANCE

The in-use areas (A-J) do not meet the 50-year guideline for inclusion to the National Register. The isolated occurrence (DCD1 98-074-01) lacks integrity of location and does not meet the guidelines for inclusion to the National Register. No historic properties were located within the project area.

MANAGEMENT RECOMMENDATIONS

Approval of this undertaking is recommended with the following general recommendations. If any previously undetected cultural resources are discovered during the undertaking (e.g., pottery, bone, stone tools), all activity should cease in that area and the Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Officer ([520] 871-7132) should be immediately notified. Upon inspection of the remains, direction on how to proceed will be given pursuant to 36 CFR 800.11. Any future development within the chapter tract will require compliance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act.

Pursuant to 12 NNC 820 (M) requiring OMB budget assessment, OMB reviewed the subject document and provides the following information.

- 1. The budget has FY 2017 entered on each budget form page which is the incorrect fiscal year funding. The funding will be from the FY 2018 UUFB, from October 1, 2017 to September 30, 2018.
- 2. The proper Project budget forms displayed in the FY 2018 Budget Instructions Manual at Appendix J (starting on page 76) should be used because it will be set up as capital project. Instructions on how to complete the forms are also included with the forms. Blank project budget forms are available for use on the OMB website.
- 3. The Appropriation Act, at 12 NNC 820 (I), requires that capital projects comply with an adopted Capital Plan. Currently, there is no approved Capital Plan.
- 4. Object code 9050 should be used on the appropriate budget form for budgeting construction of a new senior center since this project is a capital cost item and not a non-capital cost item.
- 5. The Budget Instructions Manual states that Supplemental Funding requests for Capital Projects shall be submitted to DCD Capital Projects Management Department for review, guidance, and advice. There is no indication that this was done.
