17	A. The Navajo Nation established the Naabik'íyáti' Committee as a Navajo Nation	
18	Council standing committee and as such empowered the Naabik'íyáti' Committee to	
19	coordinate all requests for information, appearances and testimony relating to	
20	proposed county, state and federal legislation impacting the Navajo Nation. See 2	
21	N.N.C. §§ 700 (A), 701 (A)(6). See also CO-45-12.	
22	B. The Navajo Nation established the Law and Order Committee ("LOC") as a Navajo	
23	Nation Council standing committee and as such empowered LOC to review and	
24	recommend resolutions relating to public safety within the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. §§	
25	164 (A)(9), 600 et seq. See also CO-45-12.	
26	C. The Navajo Nation has a government-to-government relationship with the State of	
27	Arizona.	
28	D. During the First Regular Session of 2019, Arizona House Bill 2570 was introduced to	
29	the 54 th Legislature. See Arizona HB 2570 attached hereto as Exhibit A.

- E. House Bill 2570 seeks to establish a study committee on missing and murdered indigenous women and girls comprised of the House of Representatives and Senate's respective indigenous peoples caucuses, the attorney general, director of the department of public safety, and other appointed members. *Id.*
- F. The study committee is established to conduct a comprehensive study to determine how the State of Arizona can reduce and end violence against indigenous women and girls, and other enumerated purposes. *Id.*

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

- A. The Navajo Nation hereby supports Arizona House Bill 2570 titled "AN ACT ESTABLISHING A STUDY COMMITTEE ON MISSING AND MURDERED INDIGENOUS WOMEN AND GIRLS" attached hereto as Exhibit A.
- B. The Navajo Nation hereby authorizes the Speaker of the Navajo Nation Council, President of the Navajo Nation, and their designees, to advocate the Navajo Nation's support of Arizona House Bill 2570.

AN ACT

ESTABLISHING A STUDY COMMITTEE ON MISSING AND MURDERED INDIGENOUS WOMEN AND GIRLS.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Arizona: 1 Section 1. Study committee on missing and murdered indigenous 2 women and girls; membership; duties; report; 3 delayed repeal 4 A. The study committee on missing and murdered indigenous women and 5 6 girls is established consisting of the following members: 1. The chairpersons of the house of representatives' and the 7 senate's respective indigenous peoples caucuses or their designees. The 8 chairperson of the senate indigenous peoples caucus shall serve as 9 chairperson and the chairperson of the house of representatives indigenous 10 peoples caucus shall serve as vice chairperson of the study committee. 11 2. The attorney general or the attorney general's designee. 12 13 3. The director of the department of public safety or the director's designee. 14 4. The following members who are appointed by the governor: 15 16 (a) One county attorney and one sheriff from a county with a population of eight hundred fifty thousand persons or more and one county 17 attorney and one sheriff from a county with a population of less than 18 19 eight hundred fifty thousand persons. (b) One representative of a tribal government. 20 (c) One victim advocate. 21 (d) One chief of police who is from a tribal police department. 22 (e) One peace officer who works and resides on a federally 23 recognized American Indian reservation in this state. 24 (f) One social worker who is from a tribal, statewide or local 25 organization that provides services to indigenous women and girls. 26 (q) One representative who is from a tribal, statewide or local 27 organization that provides advocacy for or counseling to indigenous women 28 and girls who have been victims of violence. 29 (h) One representative who is from a tribal, statewide or local 30 organization that provides legal services to indigenous women and girls. 31 (i) All members of the indigenous peoples caucus. 32 (j) One member who works with the Phoenix or Tucson Indian center. 33 (k) One member who works in the Phoenix area Indian health 34 35 services. B. The study committee shall meet quarterly or more frequently as 36 the chairperson deems necessary. 37 C. Committee members are not eligible to receive compensation, but 38 members who are appointed by the governor are eligible for reimbursement 39 40 of expenses under title 38, chapter 4, article 2, Arizona Revised 41 Statutes. D. The study committee shall: 42 1. Conduct a comprehensive study to determine how this state can 43 reduce and end violence against indigenous women and girls in this state. 44 - 1 -

2. Establish methods for tracking and collecting data on violence against indigenous women and girls, including data on missing and murdered indigenous women and girls.

4 3. Review policies and practices that impact violence against 5 indigenous women and girls, such as child welfare policies and practices.

6 4. Review prosecutorial trends and practices relating to crimes of 7 gender violence against indigenous people.

8 5. Gather data on violence against indigenous women and girls in 9 this state.

10 6. Determine the number of missing and murdered indigenous women 11 and girls in this state.

12 7. Identify barriers to providing more state resources in tracking
13 violence against indigenous women and girls and reducing the incidences of
14 violence.

15 8. Propose measures to ensure access to culturally appropriate 16 victim services for indigenous women and girls who have been victims of 17 violence.

18 9. Propose legislation to address issues identified by the study 19 committee.

10. Submit a report regarding the study committee's activities and recommendations for administrative or legislative action on or before November 1, 2019 to the governor, the president of the senate and the speaker of the house of representatives and provide a copy of this report to the secretary of state.

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E. This section is repealed from and after September 30, 2020.
