Section Two. Findings

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- Resolution CMA-16-16 AN ACTION RELATING TO RESOURCES AND 5 Α. DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE, NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE AND THE 6 NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; APPROVING SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING FROM 7 THE UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE IN THE AMOUNT OF 8 \$1,000,000.00 FOR THE TOLANI LAKE SENIOR CITIZEN CENTER PROJECT 9 was passed by the Navajo Nation Council. The President purports to "line-item veto" 10 this legislation "in its entirety." In essence, the resolution was "vetoed" under Navajo 11 Nation law. President's memorandum on the veto and CMA-16-16 are attached 12 hereto as Exhibit "A." 13
- B. A "line-item veto" is a veto of a portion of an appropriations bill. A "line-item veto"
 does not affect the entirety of an act of the legislative body. A "line-item veto" is
 defined as follows:
 - "The power which governors possess in most states to veto items in appropriation bills without affecting any other provision of such bills." Blacks Law Dictionary, 6th Ed. 1565.
- 20 C. A general "veto" affects an entire bill, not only a portion of it. A general veto is 21 defined as follows:

"The refusal by the executive officer whose assent is necessary to perfect a law which has been passed by the legislative body, and the message which is usually sent to such body by the executive, stating such refusal and the reasons therefor." Blacks Law Dictionary, 6th Ed. 1564.

D. In refusing to enact any portion of resolution CMA-16-16, the President has exercised his veto powers under 2 N.N.C. § 1005(C)(11).

Section Three. Overriding veto

Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. 1005 (C)(10), action for Legislation CMA-16-16 is being submitted to the Navajo Nation Council, through the Office of the Speaker within the ten (10) day requirement. The Navajo Nation President is empowered with the authority to line-item veto legislations passed by the Navajo Nation Council and such authority is not subject to override by the Navajo Nation Council, pursuant to 2 N.N.C. 164 (A)(17).

After review of Resolution No. CMA-16-16, Relating to Resource and Development Committee, Budget and Finance Committee and Naabik'íyáti' Committee and the Navajo Nation Council; Approving Supplemental Funding from the Unreserved, Undesignated fund balance in the amount of one million (\$1,000,000) for Tolani Lake Senior Citizen Center Project, I hereby exercise my line-veto authority to:

1. SECTION 2. APPROVING SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING FROM THE UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE IN THE AMOUNT OF ONE MILLION DOLLARS (\$1,000,000) FOR TOLANI LAKE SENIOR CITIZEN CENTER PROJECT, in its entirety.

The justification for use of the President's line-item veto authority is set forth below.

In review of the Resolution No. CMA-16-16, there was an amendment of increasing the amount from \$500,000 to \$1 million. However, the budget attached as Exhibit "C" is only for \$500,000. In reviewing the amendment, there are clear amendments to the legislation, but it doesn't appear to include amendments or justification for this increase in the budget forms. In fact, Exhibit "C" the Budget Form, Summary, Justification and Schedule continue to provide only for \$500,000, not for a budget of \$1 million. As such, the legislation and the Budget contradict itself.

Furthermore, the Project dates are not consistent, the Budget Form set the project for 2 years, while the Budget Summary is only for 1 year, plus the dates are wrong. Lastly, the Budget Summary is missing approval by the Branch Chief and there are no object codes in the Justification form. Without object codes, the budget cannot be inputted into the FMIS system. These discrepancies were brought to the attention of the Navajo Nation Council and outlined in a memorandum provided by the Office of Management and Budget. It is important these changes are made so these technicalities will not negatively impact the Legislation.

Aside from these, Exhibit "E" is not visible. All photos provided are essentially sheets of paper that are blackened. It offers no assistance to this Office in our review of this legislation.

Lastly, the Navajo Nation is facing the largest budget shortfall, due to the decline in oil and gas. We must be very careful in the use of our funds to cover the impending shortfall. There were several options discussed at the recent 3 branch chiefs meeting, including capping the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance (UUFB).

With limitations in funds, the President and Vice President stated at the 3 branch chiefs meeting that it would only consider infrastructure and economic development for the UUFB. Therefore, the OPVP would ask the community to consider seeking these funds for infrastructure uses, such as electricity, power and water lines to the community. This is a necessity needed by many of our Navajo people. With infrastructure as a pillar of the Begaye-Nez administration, we would be willing to consider such an appropriation.

For all the above reasons, I have no other option but to exercise my line-item veto authority.

SECTION 1. FINDINGS

- A. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820 (L), "[t]he Navajo Nation Council may adopt and approve supplemental appropriations to the Annual Comprehensive Budget during the fiscal year. Supplemental appropriations of General Funds within the current fiscal year are permitted, if and when additional sources of revenues above and beyond the initial or current revenue projections are projected and which are also in excess of the reserve amount set forth at § 820(J)."
- B. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(9), a proposed resolution that requires final action by the Navajo Nation Council shall be assigned to the Naabik'íyáti' Committee before it is heard by the Navajo Nation Council.
- C. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 300 (C)(1)(3) and (4) the Budget and Finance Committee is authorized to recommend adoption of resolutions related to the expenditure of the Nation's financial resources.
- D. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 501 (C)(1), the Resources and Development Committee is the oversight committee for the Chapters and the Division of Community Development, Capital Improvement Office.
- E. The Title 12 Finance Act Supplemental Appropriation requirements include:

- Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(M), all requests for annual operating funds and supplemental funds shall be submitted to the Office of Management and Budget ("OMB") for budget impact analysis. On December 21, 2015, the Office of Management and Budget presented its memorandum with regard to this supplemental request for appropriation. The memorandum is attached as Exhibit A.
- 2. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(L), when the Controller identifies additional sources of revenues above and beyond the initial or current revenue projections, supplemental appropriations may be allocated by the Navajo Nation Council. The attached memorandum, Exhibit B, dated December 28, 2015 from the Office of the Controller has identified the additional revenues.
- F. The purpose of this request is to fund planning and design of a Tolani Lake Chapter Senior Citizen Center. The Navajo Nation Budget Forms are attached as Exhibit C. Two Tolani Lake Chapter Resolutions passed in 2011 and 2013 acknowledge the need to renovate the Tolani Lake Senior Center; the resolutions are attached as Exhibit D. Photographs of areas within the Tolani Lake Senior Center demonstrating need of repair are attached as Exhibit E. The Architectural Scope of Services for the Tolani Lake Senior Center Building is attached as Exhibit F.
- G. The Navajo Nation finds it in the best interest to approve Supplemental Appropriation for the Tolani Lake Senior Citizen Center Project.

The Office of Management and Budget has reviewed the above referenced document. Upon review of the proposed supplemental funding proposal, OMB notes the following:

- The attached copy of the Navajo Nation Capital Improvement Plan 2013-2017, which
 was approved by resolution CAP-18-14, does list Tolani Lake Chapter as an approved
 project for renovation in the amount of \$1,000,000.00. The Appropriations Act, Section
 820 (I), addresses the Capital Budget requirements in the following language: "All
 budget requests for capital improvements shall be in compliance with an adopted
 Capital Improvement Plan and shall not be approved unless in compliance with the
 Plan."
- 2. The Tolani Lake Chapter is requesting \$500,000.00 from the UUFB for a Senior Center design and engineering Project.
- 3. The Office of the Controller says the UUFB has an amount of \$14,400,000 available. OMB recently compiled the Fiscal Year 2015 unmet needs list which was submitted by the oversight committees but Tolani Lake Chapter is not on the list. There are over a \$100,000,000 in unmet needs requests which need to be considered for funding from the UUFB or other sources. These unmet needs should be considered before other requests.
- 4. The Capital Project Budget Summary in Part II. Appropriation End Date shows 10/1/2015-9/30/15 which appears to be incorrect. And the Appropriate End Date in Part II does not agree with the end date in Part IV. Project Information. In addition to the same form, Part IV. Budget at LOD 4 and the Amount(s) as well as the Total are all blank. These spaces should be completed with the appropriate information.
- 5. On The Navajo Nation Detailed Line Item Budget and Justification page, the top left Fiscal Year needs to be filled in with FY16 as well as all the forms with blank Fiscal Year(s) spaces.
- 6. The appropriate budget forms for capital projects need to be used. This includes the Project Budget Summary, Capital Project Budget Schedule, and the Detailed Line Item Budget and Justification. The other budget forms are for operating budget requests, not capital projects budget requests.

- 4. The Senior Citizen Center has been in use for 21 years and is in need of major repairs such to the kitchen facilities, bathrooms, ceiling, floor tiles, and needs handicapped accessibility to the building; and
- 5. An extension is needed to create more space to avoid overcrowding and to provide additional storage space for kitchen utensils, maintenance tools and other necessities; and
- 6. The Tolani Lake Chapter Senior Citizen Center is "Construction Ready" as all the required clearances such as Environmental Assessments, Archaeological Clearances and Right-Of-Way clearances are completed.

ARCHITECTURAL SCOPE OF SERVICES

FOR

TOLANI LAKE SENIOR CENTER BUILDING – MAJOR RENOVATION TOLANI LAKE, NAVAJO COUNTY, ARIONZA THE NAVAJO NATION

Architectural Services: Standard Scope of Work

Project Description & Scope:

The Navajo Nation and Tolani Lake chapter officials are considering the renovation of the existing senior center building, located on the Tolani Lake chapter tract. The existing senior center is a single story 2,352 square feet modular structure surrounded by the existing chapter house, an existing head start building, and existing playground equipment. The scope will include additional spaces for approximately ten (10) to fifteen (15) elders, two (2) office assistant, one (1) cook and a bus driver, one (1) additional senior employee that provide services and support for the Navajo Nation area on aging agency program in order to serve the Navajo Nation elders. The new additional proposed area will be about 1,792 square feet. The existing facility has a dining area, kitchen, restrooms, small custodial/mechanical room area, and small office area. In the upcoming feasibility study/ Risk Management's report (building assessment), depending on their report, an appropriate utility and code upgrades to designated connection source points will need to be assessed and proposed in order to provide utility services such as electrical upgrades, Ethernet/wireless, upgrades of telecommunicates, upgrades of water meters, etc. administrative parking, traffic flow and servicing operation (deliveries, maintenance/repair, storage, etc.) will need to be evaluated.

Renovation: Existing 2,352 S.F. Additional 1,792 S.F.

The renovation shall include all upgrades necessary to meet current applicable codes; 2009 IBC codes, NFPA codes, and Navajo Nation Area Aging Agency standards/ requirements. In addition, it should include an in-depth evaluation of the best solution for maintaining current public spaces/lounge space and administrative space, while adding a secure environment for the additional enrolled elders/ community and the public. The following items should be included as part of the Scope of work:

- Renovate both the west and east exterior facades.
- Expand the Electrical room/mechanical room and consolidate all IT requirements/ telecommunication areas.
- Upgrade of both Men and Women public restroom and shower room- ADA compliant
- Renovate offices into more department office areas.
- Develop new drop of points/ bus turn around/ fire department trucks.
- Provide additional storage spaces where possible
- Upgrade fire suppression system and fire alarm systems.
- Upgrade HVAC systems, replace evaporative cooler.
- Minor site preparation of ADA parking areas.
- Upgrade of grease trap
- Upgrade of Electrical meters.
- Upgrade of water meters.
- Install new office cubical area/ storage (Optional).
- Navajo Nation to select furniture outlet & partition manufacturer contract to coordinate for floor plan layout electrical outlets, at various locations.
- Renovate to/address all of OEH Comments, recommendations, and violations

Selective Demolition:

Removal of exterior metal panels, building purlins, roofing system, windows, and insulation.

The selective demolition shall include the areas of upgrade necessary to meet infrastructure requirements from NTUA, OEH, HIS and Navajo Nation Area on Aging Agency Department/ Federal Aging standards.

Logistics and Financial:

There will be a number of challenges and issues involved in undertaking a construction project on a major building...... As part of the Scope of Work (SOW), certain logistics and financial aspects of the project must be evaluated. These considerations include:

- Anticipated disruptions (utility outages, etc.)
- Contractor access and lay down area
- · Phasing of construction
- Construction Timeline
- Project Cost estimate
- Risk Management Plan and Plan of Action
- Cost of new Construction versus Major Renovation

The Nation/ClO/Chapter has limited financial resources. The SOW/Cost must include a thorough analysis of how to best achieve the maximum benefit for improving services to the Navajo Nation Head start department, while meeting the constraints of financial resources available in the fiscal year. Careful planning should be given to phasing the project in a way that meets budget targets.

Services provided would include complete architectural, structural, mechanical, electrical, plumbing, fire protection, and civil design services for new construction for a major renovation, existing assessments still need to be coordinated with various Navajo Nation departments for proper demolition and abatement if needed. In addition the following services will be included.

I. Programming Phase

- Create a comprehensive Site Plan in accordance with the 2009 International Building Codes (IBC), site utilities, facilities, and partial drainage planning.
- Create a Program of Spaces for Aging start building interior of various employee offices, Isolation rooms, and kitchen area: basic information such as sizes, space requirements, Department workflow, activities and special uses. Coordinate with CIO/ NAAA department, and various Navajo agencies' representative.
- Facilitate meetings with Navajo Nation Area on Aging Agency Department and department staff as needed to develop basic components and programs planning of Navajo Aging program, including Navajo Nation's standard building systems, equipment and materials.

- Attend coordination meetings with Navajo Nation's department/Chapter staff and any pertinent external agencies (Agencies, State and Federal) as required to determine and gain approvals from all pertinent entities.
- 5. Provide a schematic cost estimate and conceptual project schedule.
- 6. Prepare and submit five (5) sets of interior plan program of spaces and adjacencies layout for review and approval.

II. Schematic Design Phase

- Facilitate meetings with the Navajo Nation's aging department/agency staff to review interior tenant square footage, required utilities and/or telecommunication data requirements, partial drainage, and traffic needs to develop Schematic Design Documents.
- 2. Obtain and review applicable Navajo Nation standards and guidelines for design (Design Criteria Manual, International Building Code) and provide design that meets State or federal codes.
- 3. Attend Pre-Development meeting and address points of clarification regarding the project.
- Prepare and submit three (3) sets of Schematic Design Documents, Preliminary Specifications, Schematic cost estimate and schedule to the Navajo Nation Lead Agency Department staff for review and approval. (30% plan review). Components to include:
 - a. Partial site plans, ADA paving layouts, drop-off locations, and traffic circulation
 - b. floor plans, building circulation
 - c. exterior elevations, rendering and color palette
 - d. critical building sections and details
 - e. Relevant right of way information such as easements, building setbacks etc.
 - f. Location of utilities and sizes
- After receiving schematic design comments, meet with:
 - a. Planning Department, CIO/Building Officials and Fire Marshall to review project requirements.
 - b. Navajo Nation Lead Agency department, Navajo Water Resource department and Navajo Nation Environmental Protection Agency (NNEPA) to review project drainage.
 - c. Navajo Tribal Utility Authority (NTUA) Public Works to review utilities.
- Respond in writing to all Navajo Nation Departments, Indian Health Services, Office of Environmental Health, Building Permit Inspector, Navajo Nation Head Start Department, and Navajo Nation Fire marshal City comments on plans.
- 7. Coordinate with the Navajo Nations utilities and service providers.

III. Design Development Phase

- 1. Facilitate meetings with Navajo Nation staff to develop Design Development Documents.
- Prepare and submit three (3) sets of Design Development Documents including Detailed Specifications, Cost Estimate and schedule to the Navajo Nation Lead Agency staff for review and approval. (60% plan review). Components to include:
 - a. site plans, paving layouts, traffic circulation, lighting, signage and utilities
 - b. floor plans, Structural, Civil, Architectural, Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP), Mechanical Electrical Plumbing (MEP), Fire Protection and landscaping if applicable
 - c. exterior elevations, rendering and color palette
 - d. building sections and details
 - e. Interior elevations, casework and millwork elevations

f. drainage Study and calculations

- g. report addressing all Navajo Nation's Design Criteria and Code requirements
- 3. Respond in writing to all Lead Agency's Building plans reviewers comments on plans.
- 4. Coordinate final utility plans.

IV. Construction Documents Phase

- Prepare complete Construction Documents and Specifications and submit three (3) sets to the Navajo Nation Lead Agency and Building Plan review staff for Code and general review and approval (90% plan review).
- Attend follow up meetings with Navajo Nation Fire Marshall, Navajo Nation Head Start Department and agencies, Indian Health Services, Office of Environmental Health, and the 3rd party Building Inspector Official (BIO).
 - a. Obtain 3rd party building inspector's approval and NNEPA signature of plans.

3. Complete Platting and record Plat.

- 4. Complete final coordination with Nation's utilities and tele-communication service providers.
- Prepare and submit four (4) complete sets of Construction Documents, including 90% written responses, Specifications and Architect's Cost Estimate and schedule to:
 - a. Projects Department for review and approval (100% plan review)
 - b. Community Development for formal Plan Review for Permit
- Submit plans to 3rd party building inspector or Indian Health Services (IHS) for accessibility review.
- 7. Correct plans to reflect issues noted by Review for Permit.
- Acquire signature of 3rd party Building Inspector, IHS, OEH, ClO, State of New Mexico, and Navajo Nation Area Aging Agency Department.

V. Bid Phase

- a. Provide Notice to Bidders (NTB) to the Project Manager. The Lead Agency Department is responsible for advertising.
- Reproduce and disseminate bid sets to Dodge, and (2) two sets to the Navajo Nation Lead Agency [PM (1), HIS (1) and interested bidders]
- c. Distribute (including the sale of) plans to interested bidders

 Keep record of plan holder's list
- d. Assigned Chair pre-bid meeting and attend the Bid Opening
- e. Respond in writing to questions from bidders and prepare addenda as necessary.
- f. Assist with design of Bid Proposal*
- g. Prepare Lead Agency's Recommendation of Award Letter to include the following required content:
 - I. Check for math errors and reconcile any mathematical discrepancies
 - ii. Review for unbalance bid items
 - ill. Certified Bid Tabulation including Engineer's estimate
 - iv. Review of contractor's financial standing and references provided
 - v. Explanation of discrepancies between the Engineer's estimate and bids
 - vi. Recommendation to award
- 2. Attend Navajo nation Council meeting and recommendation for award of Contract for New Construction.
- Produce and transmit to selected contractor five (5) sets of project manuals ready for execution with Lead Agency's Notice of Intent to Award (NOI)

*This is the use of bid strategies to attain lowest possible prices for work, use of alternatives, etc.

- VI. Construction Administration Phase
 - 1. Facilitate Pre-Construction meeting and conduct regular construction progress meetings.
 - 2. Provide Construction Administration.
 - a. Review, log and approve submittals, shop drawings, Request for Information etc.
 - b. Review Construction Materials Testing reports.
 - c. Review and approve applications for payment.
 - d. Coordinate with Construction Manager or Project Manager on all Requests for Change Proposals, Change Orders, etc. including maintaining a log of all such documents.
 - e. Provide direction for questions and concerns from the contractor and Construction/Project Manager in resolution of problems.
 - 3. Provide Field Services for entire construction period
 - a. INTRODUCTION


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The Tolani Lake community is geographically situated in the southwestern part of Arizona, approximately 65 miles east of Flagstaff, Arizonal. The Tolani Lake Senior Center is located along Indian Route 2, between Leupp and the Hopi Reservation. This highway is the main access road between Leupp and Kykotsmovi, AZ.

According to the 2000 census records, the Tolani Lake community's population is approximately two thousand (2000) residents. Approximately 20% of the population consists of elders. Due to lack of employment, many residents raise livestock and depend on the local townships, like Winslow and Flagstaff, to obtain temporary employment to purchase basic needs. There are limited employment opportunities available within the community. Employment programs include a federally funded pre-school, the Tolani Lake Sr. Center, the Tolani Lake Enterprises, and the Public Employment Programs with the chapter house. Due to lack of employment the people of Tolani Lake often seek employment in the neighboring towns, leaving the elders alone and vulnerable. This is where the Senior Center assists by accommodating the elders by serving a healthy breakfast and lunch. They encourage the elders to participate in arts and crafts projects to keep them occupied. They also encourage social interaction among the clients. However, often times they don't have the room to socialize.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENT - IMPACTED BY PAST / PRESENT MINING

The impact reporting of past mining activities within the community as identified by AML is the open gravel pit located 1 ½ mile east of Tolani Lake chapter near the mesa – GPS location is Latitude: 35.25"10.40, Longitude: - 11048'51.39"- (See Exhibit A). There has been no impact of significant nature by this open gravel pit other than the disturbance of the surface area and the loss of grazing area by the surface disturbance. The open gravel pit is not registered as a certified gravel pit because it did not meet the requirements for such certification. The local community has been using the gravel pit for gravel surfacing for local bus routes and for roads by private home owners. BIA and NDOT revert to the gravel pit in emergency situations when inclement weather sets in and roads are destroyed.



According to the Senator George J. Mitchell Center, University of Maine, "the effect of sand and gravel mining is the loss of the protection provided by soil as it filters out pollutants. Removing the highly concentrated organic layer of soil found on the surface of sand and gravel deposits decreases the soil's ability to bind up substances and thus clean water as it passes through its pores. This loss develops new avenues for contamination to enter groundwater."

GOVERNMENT OFFICES

The Tolani Lake community has various governmental offices serving the local residents - Navajo Nation Chapter House, Tolani Lake Senior Citizen Center, Tolani Lake Enterprises, and the Navajo Nation Pre-school. These facilities provide employment to local residents. Home Care Solutions, who cater to the elders and handicap, also provide employment to the community. The local chapter is operated by the chapter administration with the three officials serving as an oversight. The Senior Center is located on the chapter tract and within the boundaries of the Tolani Lake Chapter.

PROJECT PLAN

The Tolani Lake Chapter is collaborating with the Tolani Senior Center and the CLUPC members, to plan on extending the senior center 20 feet north to accommodate more elders and 5 feet west to provide a storage area for pots and pans, furniture, and maintenance tools. The center is in dire need of renovation. The kitchen will need new cup boards. The current ones are worn and torn from use over the years. The bathroom doors are too narrow and will need to be widened to accommodate wheel chair bound elders. The ceiling tiles will need to be replaced as they are "sagging" from wear and tear and from inclement weather over the years.

The overall assessment of the Senior Center is poor to fair. This is not good enough for the welfare of our senior citizens who enter the building. The current occupancy limit is to accommodate 60 elders but according to the elders and the employees, the center holds about half that amount. The current dimension of the facility is $52' \times 32' \times 28'$.

According to the project plan, the 20 feet extension to the north will create additional dining and storage space and more room for the holiday celebrations and provide more space for tables for their arts and crafts. The extension to the west of the building will be for storage, as the center needs more space for their big pots and pans used for cooking, their gardening tools and supplies, their maintenance tools, and furniture. They will be out of compliance with the department of health should they try to store these in the current building – (See Exhibit B).




Exhibit B - Rendering of 20 ' addition to the north

SCOPE OF WORK

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The scope of work will entail a 20 feet extension of to the north of the Senior citizen center and a 44 feet extension to northeast corner of the current building. It will also entail and upgrade of the current plumbing, the HVAC system, windows, and will have handicap access doors to the front and bathroom entrances.

According to the drawings and specifications prepared by Navajo Design and Engineering Services, described in general as: Renovate both the west and east exterior facades, Expand the electrical room / mechanical room and consolidate all IT requirements/ telecommunication area, upgrade both Men and Women public restroom and shower room – ADA compliant, renovate offices into more department office areas, develop new drop points / bus turn around / fire department trucks, provide additional storage spaces where possible, upgrade fire suppression system and fire alarm systems, upgrade HVAC systems, replace evaporative cooler, minor site preparation of ADA parking areas, upgrade grease trap, upgrade electrical meters, upgrade water meters, install new office cubical area / storage, Navajo Nation to select furniture outlet & partition manufacturer contract to coordinate for floor plan layout electrical outlets, at various locations, renovate to address all of OEH comments and violations.

GOALS / OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of the proposed extension and renovation of the Senior Center, many elders will enjoy a higher standard of care and health improvement, and the space to socialize with other people.

PROJECT SCHEDULE / PLAN OF ACTION

The projected schedule to begin the extension of the Senior Center is August 2014 and completed by February 2015. While construction is underway, we can accommodate the seniors at the old school located behind the Center. The Tolani Lake Chapter Officials and Administration will oversee the project, making periodic reports to the AML Office. The work force development program, partnered with the public employment program (PEP) offered through the local chapter, will provide laborers to assist in completing the project. The Senior Center maintenance technician can assist in the clean-up.

PROBLEM STATEMENT

The Tolani Lake Chapter is respectfully requesting the funding in the amount of 400,000.00 from the Abandoned Mine Lands to extend the Senior Center north and west of the current building, and renovate the kitchen, the bathroom, and repair and replace the roof and ceiling tiles. Current clients depend on the Senior Center for their breakfast, lunch, and for social interaction. The extension and renovation of the center will not just provide more space but greatly increase the safety, the welfare, and instill higher morale of the elders.

Maintenance

The maintenance of the building will be the sole responsibility of the Tolani Lake Senior.

The current Sr. Center states it is to occupy 60 people, but we get more than the bccupancy limit when we sponsor various events.

The council decided it would be best to renovate and extend the current Sr. Center instead of erecting a new building. We feel building a new center will take too long.

2. The resolution dated 19 November 1973 by Tolani Lake Chapter requested that the use of the withdrawn land be changed and that said land be used as a development of homesites for chapter members of Tolani Lake, and

3. Field clearances have been conducted by the Office of Navajo Land Administration with favorable results and consents of the surface users have been obtained.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. The Advisory Committee resolution enacted on 19 November 1973 which provided for the withdrawal of the land on Exhibit "A" attached hereto, to be used for development of a Navajo Senior Citizens Community is hereby amended as follows:

2. The land description in Exhibit "A", attached hereto, is hereby withdrawn for the development of homesites for chapter members of Tolani Lake.

3. The Office of Navajo Land Administration is authorized to continue a land survey of described land, attached hereto.

4. The Office of Program Development of the Navajo Tribe is hereby instructed to work with the Tolani Lake Chapter to design a proposed development.
