17	responsibilities, reviews and recommends resolutions regarding certain matters, including	
18	health, education and social services. 2 N.N.C. § 401.	
19	B. The Naabik'íyáti' Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation	
20	Council. 2 N.N.C. § 700(A). The committee, among other responsibilities, coordinates	
21	all state programs, including education in public schools. 2 N.N.C. § 701 (A)(4).	
22	C. There are a significant number of Navajo children attending public schools in the	
23	state of New Mexico, including schools located within the Navajo Nation.	
24	D. On November 26, 2018, tribes in New Mexico updated its Tribal Educational	
25	Priorities. The priorities include tribal consultation, school safety and language and	
26	culture. See attached Exhibit "A." It is in the best interest that the Navajo Nation	
27	supports these priorities.

The Navajo Nation supports the Tribal Educational Priorities as updated November 26, 2018 and attached as Exhibit "A." The written priorities shall be provided the New Mexico Governor's Office.

<u>Tribal Educational Priorities for the Current Martinez Administration</u> <u>And</u>

Tribal Educational Priorities for the Incoming Lujan-Grisham Administration

1. Tribal Consultation:

- a. State leadership in attendance at government to government meetings, mutual respect for the consultation process, and scheduling meetings with the tribal cultural calendar in mind.
- b. Enhanced communication and follow up. Example: Tribal Consultation Survey.
- c. Rule making for educational retention.
- d. During leadership change ensure continuity of projects and commitments.
- e. Implement "formal" tribal consultation with LEAs
- f. Timely tribal consultation must take place as mandated by federal and state law

2. School Safety and Mental/Behavioral Health:

- a. School safety plan development and review, sharing plan among community and parents.
- b. Law enforcement and emergency responder coordination.
- c. Counselor and behavioral/mental health coordination.

3. Language:

- a. Classification of Native language teachers and salary scales.
- b. Identifying and highlighting Native language programs for other schools and tribes to learn from and develop for their own schools and communities.
- c. IGA funding award to occur in timely manner with ongoing communication on funding process and decision making.

4. Culturally Responsive Learning:

- a. Development and implementation of culturally responsive training for twenty-three (23) school districts in serving tribal communities and with large tribal student populations.
- b. Issue directive for cultural competency training to occur at Cibola High School.
 - c. Cultural competency training to be mandated for all schools and school districts. No exemptions.
 - d. Require cultural competency training as part of teacher certification.

5. Budget and Finances:

- a. Transparency in education budgets and finances. Example: Impact Aide.
- b. Training for school boards regarding the responsible and ethical use of educational funds.
- c. Offer competitive teacher salaries
- d. Consultation on funding cuts, i.e. supplies

6. College and Career Readiness:

a. Support college and career readiness.

7. PED Strategic Plan:

a. Understanding the strategic plan and the methodology for tribal input into the plan.

8. Educational Infrastructure Support:

- a. Teacher housing
 - i. Recruitment and retention of teachers
- b. School bus routes
- c. Broad Band Access
