RESOLUTION No. CMY-31-16: RELATING TO RESOURCES AND DEVELOPMENT, HEALTH, EDUCATION AND HUMAN SERVICES; BUDGET AND FINANCE, NAABIK'ÍYÁTI', AND NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; APPROVING SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING FROM THE UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE IN THE AMOUNT OF TWO MILLION DOLLARS (\$2,000,000) FOR 110 CHAPTER'S SUMMER YOUTH

**EMPLOYMENT** 

Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. 1005 (C)(10), action for Legislation CMY-31-16 is being submitted to the Navajo Nation Council, through the Office of the Speaker within the ten (10) day requirement.

After careful review of **Resolution No. CMY-31-16**, I have decided to sign this Legislation into law. I believe the Summer Youth employment can be an invaluable opportunity as it is an investment in our future, our youth and will create employment. It also brings home our college students and provides training for our youth. However, it must also be well-organized and operated in a manner to give the tools needed for our youth to grow and learn in a variety of ways. This could be in providing assistance to our elders and children or attending trainings, conferences, meetings learning about our government and how our youth can return after graduation and truly help our great Navajo Nation.

Be advised, I will issue a directive to the Office of Youth Development to begin development of the Summer Youth Employment Program that will be able to coordinate on a large scale with all Chapters to ensure polices and procedures are in place. Also, development of plans to ensure the youth are receiving appropriate training and proper supervision is provided. This plan will also allow for Youth to be more involved not only in the community but also within the government.

In this distribution of funds, I ask each Chapter to utilize these funds to ensure that the employment opportunities are open to all our youth, to be fair and not fall victim to nepotism. Most importantly, take this opportunity to develop a Chapter Youth Employment program that will teach our youth about our culture, traditions, language, and our great Nation.

Lastly, I ask each Chapter to budget accordingly for youth employment this next fiscal year. This is the more appropriate process as some Chapters are more in need for funds for youth employment than others. We should be better prepared financially rather than expending funds without fully understanding all the needs and whether we are meeting those needs. As such, this will be the only time supplemental funding will be provided.

Youth and Elders is the second pillar for this Administration, and as part of the one voice, one nation, I sign this legislation into law.

### RESOLUTION OF THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL

#### 23rd NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL - Second Year, 2016

#### AN ACT

RELATING TO RESOURCES AND DEVELOPMENT, HEALTH, EDUCATION AND HUMAN SERVICES; BUDGET AND FINANCE, NAABIK'ÍYÁTI', AND NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; APPROVING SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING FROM THE UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE IN THE AMOUNT OF TWO MILLION DOLLARS (\$2,000,000) FOR THE 110 NAVAJO NATION CHAPTER'S SUMMER YOUTH EMPLOYMENT

#### BE IT ENACTED:

#### SECTION 1. AUTHORITY

- A. The Navajo Nation established the Resources and Development Committee (RDC) as a Navajo Nation Council standing committee and as such gave RDC oversight over Navajo Nation Chapters. 2 N.N.C. §§ 164 (A)(9), 500 (A), 501 (C)(1).
- B. The Navajo Nation established the Health, Education and Human Services Committee (HEHSC) as a Navajo Nation Council standing committee and as such empowered HEHSC to review and recommend resolutions regarding employment. 2 N.N.C. §§ 164 (A)(9), 400 (A), 401 (B)(6)(a).
- C. The Navajo Nation established the Budget and Finance Committee (BFC) as a Navajo Nation Council standing committee and as such empowered BFC to review and recommend to the Navajo Nation Council the management of all funds. 2 N.N.C. §§ 164 (A)(9), 300 (A), 301 (B)(2).
- D. The Navajo Nation Council established the Naabik'íyáti' Committee as a Navajo Nation standing committee and as such proposed legislation that requires final action by the Navajo Nation Council shall be assigned to the Naabik'íyáti' Committee. 2 N.N.C. §§ 164 (A)(9), 700 (A).

#### SECTION 2. FINDINGS

- A. The Title 12 Finance Act Supplemental Appropriation requirements include:
  - 1. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(M), all requests for annual operating funds and supplemental funds shall be submitted to the Office of Management and Budget ("OMB") for budget impact analysis. A preview of the appropriation legislation is available to the OMB for their budget impact analysis response.
  - 2. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(L), when the Controller identifies additional sources of revenues above and beyond the initial or current revenue projections, supplemental appropriations may be allocated by the Navajo Nation Council. The Office of the Controller has provided a memorandum that as of April 1, 2016 the update balance in the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance is \$9,604,215.00. This memorandum is attached as Exhibit B.
- B. "Diné Customary Law declares and teaches that: [i]t is the right and freedom of the people that our children are provided with education to absorb wisdom, self-knowledge, and knowledge to empower them to make a living and participate in the growth of the Navajo Nation." 1 N.N.C. § 204 (F).
- C. One way for the Navajo Nation to honor Diné Customary Law is to assist high school and college students with temporary employment.
- D. The Summer Youth Employment program offers high school and college students the opportunity to gain work experience and youth enrichment activities during their summer breaks.
- E. The Summer Youth Employment program offers high school and college students the opportunity to earn funds to pay for some of their school expenses.
- F. The Summer Youth Employment program aligns with Diné Customary Law by providing Navajo Nation children with "education to absorb wisdom, self-knowledge, and knowledge

to empower them to make a living and participate in the growth of the Navajo Nation." 1 N.N.C. § 204 (F).

- G. The supplemental funding to the 110 Navajo Nation Chapters shall be allocated as follows: "fifty percent (50%) of the appropriation shall be divided equally among all chapters and the remaining fifty percent (50%) shall be divided proportionately among the chapters using a percentage equal to that figure which the number of registered voters in each chapter bears to the whole of registered Navajo Nation votes as determined by the most current voter registration figures available as of the date of the appropriation." 12 N.N.C. § 820(0).
- H. The supplemental funding will be deposited with each of the 110 Navajo Nation Chapters per the Budget Forms. These forms are attached as Exhibit A.
- I. The Navajo Nation hereby finds it is in the best interest of the Navajo People to approve this supplemental funding request.
- SECTION 3. APPROVING SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING FROM THE UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE IN THE AMOUNT OF \$2,000,000 FOR 110 NAVAJO NATION CHAPTERS, BUSINESS UNIT NUMBERS 108014-108123
- A. This supplemental appropriation of \$2,000,000 shall be from that amount of funds that exceeds the minimum fund balance of the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance as determined by the Office of the Controller and to the 110 Navajo Nation Chapters, Business Unit Numbers 108014-108123.
- B. The Navajo Nation hereby approves supplemental funding from the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance in the amount of \$2,000,000 for the 110 Navajo Nation Chapters, Business Unit Numbers 108014-108123, to fund the Summer Youth Employment/Youth Enrichment program.
- C. The supplemental funding shall be deposited within appropriate accounts with each of the 110 Navajo Nation Chapters using the 50/50 formula pursuant to 12 N.N.C. section 820(0), per Exhibit A. This appropriation shall

not be used to replenish Chapter accounts in deficit on or before May 31, 2016.

- D. This appropriation may be used for employment of college students provided that no more than 50% of the appropriation to the Chapter is used for college students.
- E. This appropriation may be used to provide for salary payments to students when they attend Navajo cultural or language teaching activity or forum or in the performance of other non-dangerous activity notwithstanding federal or state laws.
- F. This appropriation shall not be used by Navajo Chapters for any other purpose other than summer student employment/student enrichment as indicated in this legislation.
- G. The use of the amounts appropriated to the Navajo Chapters for any other purpose other than summer student employment/student enrichment as indicated in this legislation is prohibited.
- H. The Speaker is directed to ensure that the legislation is engrossed and delivered to the President's Office by the end of the day that the legislation is passed by the Navajo Nation Council.
- I. The Office of the Controller, the Office of Management and Budget and the Division of Community Development shall allocate the funds within 5 days to the chapters once the President signs the resolution.
- J. The Navajo Nation Council hereby directs all 110 chapters to establish or implement an Enrichment guidelines/policy by chapter resolution prior to expenditure of fund for Student Enrichment Activity and to have Division of Community Development ensure such policies by chapter resolutions are established. Nothing in this requirement will limit or hinder payments of student salary, the directive only applies to use of student enrichment.

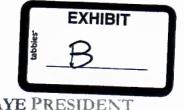

Financial Update-(General Fund Revenue, Expenditures, UUFB)

The gross General Fund Revenues, see Exhibit "A", as of March 31, 2016 is \$140,123,088 which includes a \$13,000,000 transfer from the Sales Tax Trust Fund. The total set asides is \$40,422,156. The Net Revenue for the General Fund is \$99,700,093 which is 61.02% of the projection. The total expenditures by branch are shown on Exhibit "B". The Legislative Branch has expenditures of \$7,412,315, encumbrances of \$833,272, with a remaining budget of \$10,767,285. The Executive Branch expenditures are \$92,808,655; encumbrances are \$14,628,087 with a remaining budget of \$81,779,634. The Judicial Branch expenditures are \$6,050,450, with encumbrances of \$1,505 and remaining budget of \$8,077,497. Total General Fund expenditures are \$106,271,419; total encumbrances are \$15,462,863 with an overall remaining budget of \$100,624,415. The updated UUFB as of April 1, 2016 is \$9,604,215, attached Exhibit "C." Please note that there are pending resolutions from the Navajo Nation Council Special Session on March 23, 2016 that if vetoed could affect the balance of the UUFB.
