RESOLUTION OF THE RESOURCES AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE 24th Navajo Nation Council --- Second Year, 2020

AN ACTION

RELATING TO THE RESOURCES AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE; CONFIRMING
THE CHIEF JUSTICE'S APPOINTMENT OF JOELYNN M. ASHLEY TO THE
NAVAJO NATION WATER RIGHTS COMMISSION

BE IT ENACTED:

SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

- A. The Resources and Development Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council. 2 N.N.C. § 500.
- B. The Resources and Development Committee has final authority to confirm appointments of members to the Navajo Nation Water Rights Commission ("NNWRC"). 2 N.N.C. § 501(B)(9).
- C. According to the Plan of Operation for the Navajo Nation Water Right Commission, the Chief Justice of the Navajo Nation has authority to appoint one member to the NNWRC. GSCAP-07-04, Subexhibit A, Article 5(A), attached as **Exhibit 1**.

SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

- A. Each NNWRC member shall serve for a four-year term pursuant to the NNWRC Plan of Operation, approved by GSCAP-07-04, Subexhibit A, Article 4(C). **Exhibit 1**.
- B. The Chief Justice of the Navajo Nation is authorized to appoint one Commission member from the Western Agency of the Navajo Nation. GSCAP-07-04, Subexhibit A, Article 5(C). Exhibit 1.
- C. Joelynn M. Ashley fulfills the requirements for appointment as the Western Agency Commissioner. See **Exhibit 2**.
- D. The Chief Justice of the Navajo Nation Council has appointed Joelynn M. Ashley as the Western Agency Commissioner of the NNWRC. See **Exhibit 3**.
- E. Pursuant to GSCAP-07-04, Subexhibit A, Article 4(C), Joelynn Ashley's appointment would begin on November 20, 2020.

F. It is in the best interest of the Navajo Nation that Joelynn M. Ashley be appointed and confirmed as the Western Agency Commissioner for the NNWRC.

SECTION THREE. APPOINTMENT

The Resources and Development Committee of the Navajo Nation Council hereby confirms the Chief Justice's appointment of Joelynn M. Ashley to the Navajo Nation Water Rights Commission for a two-year term beginning on November 20, 2020, to complete the unexpired term of the last Commissioner representing the Western Agency as provided for in the NNWRC Plan of Operation.



BE IT ENACTED:

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS

Navajo Nation Water Rights Commission Plan of Operation

Article 1. Establishment

The Navajo Nation Council by Resolution CAP-39-02 established the Navajo Nation Water Rights Commission (herein referred to as "Commission") in the Executive Branch of the Navajo Nation government.

Article 2. Purpose

The purpose of the Commission is to ensure that the water rights of the Navajo Nation are vigorously pursued, effectively coordinated, and to enhance the communication between all entities engaged in water rights efforts on behalf of the Navajo Nation.

Article 3. Definitions

As used herein the following terms shall be defined as:

- A. "Appointed Members" means the five (5) members of the Commission who represent the Navajo public and are appointed pursuant to Article 5 of this Plan of Operation.
- A.B. "Supervise" means to oversee, direct and coordinate.
- B.C. "Water Rights" mean the development, filing and adjudication or settlement of claims in any jurisdiction and shall include the acquisition and development of wet water.

Article 4. Membership, Qualifications and Term of Office

A. The Commission shall consist of seven (7) members. No less than five (5) of the members shall be enrolled members of the Navajo Tribe. Two of the commissioners shall serve on the Commission by virtue of the

position they occupy in the Navajo government; one (1) of the positions shall be occupied by the Attorney General or successor of the Navajo Nation and one (1) of the positions shall be occupied by the Director or the successor of the Department of Water Resources of the Division of Natural Resources of the Navajo government. Such positions shall have full membership and authority as a member of the Commission.

- B. The remaining five (5) positions shall be filled in accordance with the appointment process provided in Article 5 in this Plan of Operation, and they shall be members of the Navajo public representing each of the five (5) BIA geographic agencies on the Navajo Nation.
- C. Commission members representing the Navajo public shall serve a term of four (4) years and may be reappointed. The first appointments having been confirmed on November 19, 2002; terms thereafter will expire on November 19 of the appropriate year.
- D. Appointed Commission members shall retain their positions until such time as his/her successor is appointed and confirmed.
- D.E. In order to ensure continuity, at the first meeting of the Commission the five (5) commissioners appointed pursuant to Article 4 shall draw lots for their initial terms, two terms shall be for a one (1) year period, two terms shall be for a two (2) year term period, and one term shall be for a three (3) year period. At the conclusion of these initial terms all terms shall be a four year period.
- E.F. No elected official from any government (state, county, federal, city or tribal) shall be eligible for appointment.

Article 5. Appointments and Confirmations

- A. The Speaker of the Navajo Nation Council shall appoint two (2) members; the President of the Navajo Nation shall appoint two (2) members; and the Chief Justice of the Navajo Nation shall appoint one (1) member.
- B. The Government Services Resources Committee of the Navajo Nation Council shall confirm the five (5) appointed Commission members representing the Navajo public following a recommendation by the Resources Committee of the Navajo Nation Council.

- C. As soon as practicable after the passage of this Plan of Operation, the three Branch Chiefs of the Navajo Nation shall meet and draw lots in order to assign the five (5) BIA geographic agencies among themselves for purposes of making appointments, as provided in Sub-Section A above. Such lot drawing by the Branch Chiefs shall be conducted once every four years thereafter. The Speaker of the Navajo Nation Council is assigned to appoint one (1) member from the Fort Defiance Agency, the President of the Navajo Nation is assigned to appoint one (1) member from the Shiprock Agency and one (1) member from the Chinle Agency, and the Chief Justice of the Navajo Nation is assigned to appoint one (1) member from the Western Agency. Such recommendations may be of individuals with experiences in, but not limited to the fields of engineering, economics, hydrology, natural resources law or serving in the capacity as a public official.
- D. A public announcement of the expiration of the term of an Appointed Commissioner shall be made sixty (60) days prior to November 19.

Article 6. Resignation, Removal, and Filling Vacancies

- A. The Resources Committee of the Navajo Nation Council may remove a Commission member appointed pursuant to Article 45, only after 1) providing that Commissioner with a written notice of the ground for removal, 2) providing an opportunity for a response, and 3) approval of two-thirds of the full membership. The removal of a Commission member shall be for good cause such as, but not limited to, neglect of duty, misconduct or inability to discharge the duties of the Commission. Removal of the Attorney General or successor and Director or successor of the Department of Water Resources from the Commission shall occur only when these individuals are removed from their respective positions in a manner consistent with 2 N.N.C. § 1962 (B) pertaining to the Attorney General and the Navajo Preference in Employment Act, 15 N.N.C. § 601 et seq. pertaining to the Director of the Department of Water Resources.
- B. When a Commission member resigns or does not complete the term of office for any reason, the vacant position shall be filled in the same manner provided in Article 4.5 for those positions representing the Navajo public, provided that the appointment by the relevant Branch Chief is made within 60 days of notice of the vacancy. If there is no appointment within said 60 days the Resources Committee of the Navajo Nation Council shall make the appointment for the balance at the term of the vacated position. The positions reserved for the Attorney

- General and the Director of the Department of Water Resources of the Division of Natural Resources shall be filled on an interim basis by acting personnel until permanently filled.
- C. Resignations shall be in writing to the Chairperson of the Commission and the Chairperson of the Resources

 Committee of the Navajo Nation Council.
- D. The appointment shall be for the balance of the term of the position vacated.
- E. If there is no appointment within said 60 days of the vacancy, the Resources Committee of the Navajo Nation

 Council shall make the appointment.

Article 7. Officers, Quorum and Decision-making

- A. The Commission shall select from among the five (5) Commissioners, by majority vote, a Chairperson, and Vice-Chairperson. Neither the Attorney General nor the Director of the Department of Water Resources shall serve in these capacities.
- B. Four (4) Commission members, including the Chairperson and/or Vice Chairperson shall constitute a quorum.
- C.B. Consensus shall be required to carry all official actions of the Commission, with the exception of the election of officers pursuant to Sub-section A above.

Article 8. Authorities

- A. The Commission shall have the following enumerated authorities:
 - To assess, approve and implement the Navajo Nation's water rights claims to determine the feasibility and prioritization of such claims and devise an overall strategy for the Nation's pursuit of such claims.

- To advise and report to the President of the Navajo Nation, and Resources Committee of the Navajo Nation Council, on the status and progress of water rights claims, consistent with Sub-Section A 1 above.
- 3. To serve as the principal point of contact for the Navajo Nation on all media, public relations and public education efforts regarding water rights and shall coordinate all public statements on these issues.
- To establish the policies and priorities for the expenditure of the Navajo Nation Water Rights Claim
 Fund.
- 5. To approve the budget and expenditure of the Navajo Nation Water Rights Claim Fund.
- 6. To develop and recommend to the Resources <u>Committee</u> and Budget and Finance Committees of the Navajo Nation Council, the expenditure plan for the Navajo Nation Water Rights Claim Fund specifying the procedures for requesting the use of money from the Fund.
- To establish and supervise negotiating teams for any and all Navajo Nation water rights negotiation
 efforts to ensure consistency of positions and to maximize success consistent with the Navajo Nation
 water strategy.
- 8. To enhance communication between the appropriate Navajo Nation divisions, departments, programs, chapters and appropriate agencies, the Navajo public on water rights issues by producing periodic newsletters, fostering the immediate use of wet water and other action to preserve or enhance Navajo Nation Water Rights Claims.
- To conduct public <u>meetings</u> hearings to seek and receive input from the Navajo public on water rights issues.
- To recommend resolutions or legislation to the Resources Committee or other Standing Committees of the Navajo Nation Council to enhance the Navajo Nation position on water rights claims.

- 11. To adopt such rules and regulations including, meeting procedures as it deems necessary and proper for the orderly and efficient conduct of meetings and business.
- 12. To approve pertinent contracts, employment, and personnel, including the hiring of specialists/experts and other personnel provided for in the Water Rights Claims Funds.
- B. The Commission shall have all necessary and proper authorities to implement and carry out the purposes set forth in Article 2 above.

Article 9. Meeting, Notice, and Quorum Reimbursement of Expenses

A. Official Meetings

- Regular meetings. The Commission shall meet at least once a month. Regular meetings shall be held
 the second Thursday of every month. Commission members need not be physically present at the
 regular meetings for purposes of establishing a quorum but may shall attend and participate regular
 meetings electronically telephonically for good cause if not physically present.
- Special meetings. Special meetings may be called by the Chairperson of the Commission.
 Commission members need not be physically present at the special meetings for <u>purposes of establishing a quorum</u> but <u>may shall attend and participate special meetings electronically telephonically if not physically present.
 </u>
- 3. Quarterly Public Meetings. The Commission shall conduct at least once in a quarter a meeting where the Navajo general public may provide recommendations on the Navajo water rights issues. Such public meetings shall rotate among the five agencies on a quarterly basis.
- Emergency Meetings. The Commission may conduct emergency meetings on or off the Navajo
 Nation without prior twenty-four (24) hour notice.

B. Notice of Meetings

- Unless a meeting date and time is established at the prior Commission meeting. Photice of meetings
 stating the date and time, place and agenda shall be properly addressed to each Commission member.
- Notice is deemed waived by the Commission members attending the meeting in which the next meeting date and time is established.
- 2.3. To call an emergency meeting, the Chairperson must determine whether an emergency exists. Further, the members of the Commission members attending the meeting will document the existence of such emergency in its meeting minutes and resolutions.
- Notices of quarterly public meetings shall be provided through public media (e.g. radio and/or newspaper) at least two weeks prior to the quarterly public meeting.
- C. Quorum. Four (4) Commission members including the Chairperson and/or Vice Chairperson shall constitute a quorum.
- Commission Actions. All substantive actions of the Commission shall be taken by written resolution duly certified by the presiding officer. Such resolutions shall be based upon consensus of the Commission members, as provided in Article 7 CB above.
- E. The Commission members shall be reimbursed expenses at the rate approved for members of the Navajo

 Nation Council and only Commissioners appointed pursuant to Article F shall be compensated \$200.00 for each
 day of official commission meetings, when physically present at such meeting.
- D.E. Minutes and Resolutions. Access to minutes of meetings and resolutions of the Commission, and all other records of the Commission shall be governed by the Navajo Nation Privacy Act, 2 N.N.C. Section §§ 81, et seq.
- Article 10. Reimbursement and Stipends

- A. The Commission members shall be reimbursed actual and reasonable expenses at the rate approved for members of the Navajo Nation Council when physically or telephonically present at all meetings, as defined in Article 9 and occasions as defined in Article 10(C).
- B. Appointed Commission members shall be compensated up to \$250.00 for each day of official Commission meetings as specified in Article 9 when physically or telephonically present at such meetings.
- C. Appointed commission members may be compensated up to \$250.00 when physically present at negotiations, court hearings, public meetings, and other such occasions approved by the Commission or necessary for the execution of the Commission's purpose as specified in Article 2.

Article 10. 11. Administrative Support

The Navajo Department of Water Resources shall provide administrative support to the Commission <u>until such time as</u> the Commission hires a Commission staff.

Article 11. 12. Organizational Chart

Attached to this Plan of Operation as "Exhibit 1" is an organizational chart that depicts how the Commission is integrated into the Navajo Nation governmental structure.

Article 12. 13. Amendments to the Plan of Operation

This Plan of Operation (including the Organizational Chart) may be amended from time to time by the Government Services Committee of the Navajo Nation Council upon the recommendation of the Resources Committee of the Navajo Nation and the Navajo Nation Water Rights Commission.

Dear Honorable Chief Justice,

I am writing to request consideration as a representative to the Navajo Nation Water Rights Commission - Western Agency Representative position. I am a member of Coppermine Chapter Western Agency Chapter, Coppermine Arizona. My education in the history, philosophies, traditional knowledge culture and policymaking of American Indian nations has occurred very much of my lifetime. In my childhood on the Navajo Reservation I was surrounded by the oral histories of Native American culture, religion, history, and politics. My parents were both elementary and secondary education teachers who awakened and nurtured in me the value of education as a way toward individual fulfillment through knowledge and service to the broader community. My grandfather was my key inspiration and my main advocate for becoming an educated person. He was the first in his family to earn a college degree. My grandfather grew up on the Coppermine area of the Navajo reservation during the culturally destructive Indian boarding school era. He experienced first-hand the national policy that aimed to assimilate Indian people into mainstream America by destroying the individual's cultural identity and undercutting their connection to the rich heritage that informed their view of their place in the world. Punished for speaking his native Navajo language and being sent far off to another state for his high school education, hundreds of miles from the love and guidance of family and the strength of his culture, my grandfather learned the lessons of courage and perseverance that he I believe his unwavering belief in the value of passed on to his children and their children. higher education continues today with me today and my desire to strive for more knowledge and a greater ability to continue utilizing my education to benefit my native community and the broader interests of tribal sovereignty in general.

While the failed assimilationist policies that confronted my grandfather have largely been abandoned and times have changed, in many ways today's native nations are still feeling the lingering effects of the mentality that gave birth to the boarding school years, a mindset that taught the Nations to look to the U.S. government to define the path that native people should follow. One of the areas where this failure is most evident is the lack of economic development in reservation communities, including the development of the infrastructure necessary to make economic development possible and sustainable. The key area that I would like to focus on in my graduate studies is the lack of water infrastructure in Indian Country. I am still amazed, by the simple fact that today in the 21st Century; many of my family members still do not have running water. Today, my paternal grandparents, who are 95 years of age today, still do not have running water in their home. A basic necessity that almost all Americans now take for granted

has yet to become commonplace for many native people, many of whom are still considered impoverished people.

I graduated from Northern Arizona University in 2001 with a B.S. in Political Science and a minor in Women Studies. While completing my undergraduate degree I began to understand the importance of an interdisciplinary approach to learning and teaching. For example, while taking political science courses I learned about challenging policies and practices that I could then apply to learning about tribal governments and politics. During these undergraduate years my interest and love of policy and politics was also strengthened, with the emphasis for learning how it could apply to tribal nations.

In 2003, I earned a Master's degree in Public Administration from Northern Arizona University. While earning this degree I completed a Graduate Assistantship with the Colorado Plateau Cooperative Ecosystem Studies Unit at Northern Arizona University. My interest in policy started when I began to understand the variables that continue to either threaten or affect tribal sovereignty, the complexities of Nations to assert various aspects of tribal sovereignty for basic needs such as: environmental policy/federal Indian water rights. Upon completing my graduate assistantship I wanted to do more, however at that time I began working for a tribal government on resolving issues addressing existing environmental policy and federal Indian water rights. My basic question for graduate study will be how can tribal Nations achieve the basic human right arising out a secure supply of quality water available to every home?

I would like to use the skills I have acquired from having over 18 years working directly with tribal, state, and federal agencies to be applied to the Navajo Nation Water Rights Commission. My research interests include the western perception of public administration and translating that to tribal administration through existing indigenous political structure surrounding natural resources, environmental policy and federal Indian water rights policy. I want to develop the research approach and history of federal Indian water rights policy and use that knowledge to create a template for helping tribal administrators understand how to structure a water resources plan that will use their federal Indian water right (specifically to settlement and/or litigation process) to build a sustainable, economically viable permanent homeland. My research interests fit directly into that of the doctorate (Phd) program of Politics and International affairs with an emphasis in Public Policy and Public Administration, having Federal Indian Water Rights Policy as the area of specialty. My goals include producing well-informed accounts of this underrepresented population utilizing an Indigenous-focused methodology. Additionally, I believe in the importance of teaching future American Indian political leaders to learn how current political relationships for strengthening a future positive governmental/administrative change in Indian Country. Equally, I have a strong interest in using what I learn from the Politics and International Affairs faculty to educate future Native American political leaders with effective policy strategies for Native nation-building.

I am excited about using a comprehensive approach to writing and discussing American Indian policy and politics, specifically linked to federal Indian water rights. I am currently working directly with Dr. Zachary Smith, Regents' Professor from the Northern Arizona University Political Science department due to his specialty in the area of natural/environmental resources policy emphasis relating to federal Indian water rights policy. It is with great integrity that I

submit my application for interest to the Navajo Nation Navajo Water Rights Commission – Western Agency Representative position.
