

PURPOSE: This bill will confirm the appointment of District Court Judge Letitia Stover for a two year probationary period. The President of the Navajo Nation shall appoint the District Court Judges with confirmation by the Navajo Nation Council from among those applicants recommended by the Law and Order [Judiciary] Committee of the Navajo Nation Council. The Law and Order Committee delegated its responsibility and authority to the Judicial Conduct Commission to screen applicants and to recommend the probationary appointment of judges and justices. LOCS-19-18. The Navajo Nation Council shall confirm judicial appointments. 7 N.N.C. § 355 (A).

This written summary does not address recommended amendments as may be provided by the standing committees. The Office of Legislative Counsel requests each Council Delegate to review each proposed resolution in detail.

BE IT ENACTED:

Section One. Authority

- A. The Navajo Nation established the Law and Order Committee as a Navajo Nation standing committee and as such gave the Law and Order Committee authority to recommend to the Navajo Nation President the permanent appointment of probationary judges. 2 N.N.C. §§ 164 (A)(9), 600 (A), 601 (B)(10).
- B. The Law and Order Committee delegated its responsibility and authority to the Judicial Conduct Commission to screen applicants and to recommend the probationary appointment of judges and justices. LOCS-19-18.
- C. The Judicial Conduct Commission made its recommendation to the Navajo Nation President for Letitia Stover to be appointed as a probationary judge of the Navajo Nation. JCC-03-19.
- D. The President of the Navajo Nation shall appoint the Chief Justice, Associate Justices, and District Court Judges with confirmation by the Navajo Nation Council from among those applicants recommended by the Law and Order [Judiciary] Committee of the

1 Navajo Nation Council. The Navajo Nation Council shall confirm judicial appointments.

- 3 E. References in the Navajo Nation Code and other official documents to the Government
4 Services and Intergovernmental Relations Committee shall mean Naabik'íyáti

8 **Section Two. Findings**

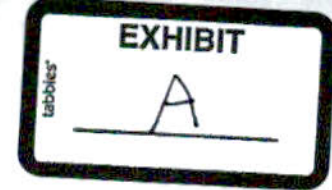
- 9 A. Letitia Stover is an enrolled member of the Navajo Nation and is an applicant for
10 appointment as District Court judge. Ms. Stover's application and qualifications have
11 been reviewed by Judicial Conduct Commission, and she has been interviewed by
12 Judicial Conduct Commission. *See* JCC-03-19, attached hereto as **Exhibit A**.
13 B. The Judicial Conduct Commission has determined that Letitia Stover meets the
14 qualifications for appointment as Navajo Nation Judge and has recommended her for
15 probationary appointment to the Navajo Nation President. *Id.*
16 C. The Navajo Nation President has appointed Letitia Stover as Navajo Nation judge,
17 subject to confirmation by the Navajo Nation Council. *See* Appointment Letter and
18 Qualification Documents attached hereto as **Exhibits B** and **C**, respectively.

20 **Section Three. Confirming Probationary Appointment**

21 The Navajo Nation confirms Ms. Letitia Stover as a probationary Navajo Nation

**RESOLUTION OF THE
JUDICIAL CONDUCT COMMISSION**

**RECOMMENDING TO THE NAVAJO NATION PRESIDENT THE PROBATIONARY
APPOINTMENT OF LETITIA STOVER AS NAVAJO NATION DISTRICT COURT
JUDGE**

BE IT ENACTED:

SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY.

- A. Navajo Nation District Court Judges are selected by appointment and confirmation. See generally, 7 N.N.C. §355. The Law and Order Committee of the Navajo Nation Council initially determines the qualifications of all applicants for judgeships. 2 N.N.C. §601(B)(7) and 7 N.N.C. §355(A). The names of those deemed qualified are forwarded to the President of the Navajo Nation for appointment. The appointments of the President are subject to Navajo Nation Council confirmation.
- B. The Law and Order Committee has delegated the responsibility and authority to the Judicial Conduct Commission regarding the screening of applicants for and recommendation of probationary appointment of judges and justices of the Navajo Nation by Resolution LOCS-19-18.

SECTION TWO. FINDINGS.

- A. To improve the quality and effectiveness of the justice system, the Navajo Nation Judicial Branch needs to have a fully seated judiciary; however, there are nine vacancies for Navajo Nation District Court Judge position.
- B. While the Navajo Nation Code, Title 2, states that Navajo Nation President shall appoint District Court Judges "only from among those named in the panel submitted" by the Law and Order Committee, in order to address the Navajo Nation's immediate need for judges, the Judicial Conduct Commission contends that submitting one applicant to the Navajo Nation President is sufficient because of the dire need for judges.
- C. The applicant took the writing test as required by Title 7.
- D. The Judicial Conduct Commission conducted the interview of the applicant on September 21, 2019.
- E. The Judicial Conduct Commission reviewed the applicant's qualifications for judicial appointment.
- F. The Judicial Conduct Commission determines that Letitia Stover meets the qualifications for appointment as a probationary Navajo Nation District Court Judge and is qualified for the position of Navajo Nation Judge.

SECTION THREE. RECOMMENDATION FOR PROBATIONARY APPOINTMENT

- A. The Judicial Conduct Commission recommends to the Navajo Nation President that Letitia Stover be appointed as District Court Judge, subject to the Navajo Nation Council's confirmation. 2 N.N.C. §601(B)(7)(2012)

SECTION FOUR. DIRECTIVE.

The Office of Human Resources shall immediately submit to the Navajo Nation President all documents provided by the applicant recommended for appointment. Confidential information within application documents shall remain protected except upon authorized disclosure by the applicant. 2 N.N.C. § 81 et seq. (2009)

I am interested in the District Court Judge Position advertised on your website. My resume is attached, and given my experience and capabilities I would appreciate your consideration for this position. I hope to provide you with my personal and professional insight.

I would like to highlight some of my educational experiences to demonstrate my interest in the law. I graduated with an LL.M in the Indigenous Policy and Law Program from the University of Arizona. Previous to receiving my LL.M., I received my J.D. degree at the University of South Dakota School of Law. I also pursued a M.A. in Political Science.

My interest in the judge position stems predominantly from my present position as a staff attorney. I was able to gain insight into the position and learn that it provides a distinctive intellectual challenge and an invaluable inside perspective into how law is interpreted, shaped, and applied on the Navajo Nation. My diverse experience would make me a unique addition. For example, I am a former teacher with a rural upbringing, which helps me bring a different perspective to legal problems than many of my peers. These experiences have been instrumental in my desire to work in the legal field, and more specifically in Indian Country.

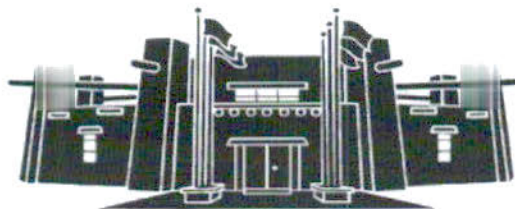
I believe I have the skills and experience necessary to succeed as a judge. As a staff attorney I advised the district court judge, provided legal research, advised the court on orders, drafted rules and policies, completed community outreach, and organized court events such as criminal justice summits, legal clinics, Amnesty day. In law school, I participated in several moot court competitions and in the summers I had an opportunity to work for Navajo Hopi Legal Services and Office of Senator McCain where I researched various legal topics. While pursuing my LL.M., I have had the opportunity to write legal memos for the Navajo Nation Supreme Court and assist with summarizing cases to be published in a tribal reporter.

To Whom It May Concern:

Through this email, I am writing in **opposition** to Legislation No. 0364-19. My views herein are mine only and do not reflect the views of my employer.

I am a member of the Navajo Nation Bar Association and have been practicing law in the Navajo Nation courts as a prosecutor since 2012. I have not worked with Ms. Stover before. I also do not know her personally. My views and my opposition are based on the experience Ms. Stover conveyed in her letter of interest which is attached to the legislation available on the Navajo Nation Council's website. I believe that Ms. Stover **lacks sufficient legal experience** to serve as a District Court Judge. 7 N.N.C. ss 354(A)(4) requires that applicants for District Court Judge have at least four years' direct work experience in a law related area. Here, Ms. Stover's experience is limited primarily to her work as a staff attorney in the Judicial Branch. Ms. Stover lacks litigation experience in the Navajo Nation courts. As you are aware, the Judicial Branch's staff attorney positions are primarily advisory and involve *drafting* decisions for District Court Judges. They only appear before the Navajo Supreme Court in limited instances where a writ is issued against their assigned courts. I believe that our District Court Judges must have actual litigation experience. They should have experience in working through the laws and rules that they ultimately will interpret as a judge. They should have experience in working directly with Navajo people. Indeed, Navajo District Court Judges have many pro se litigants involved in their cases and deal with many varied family issues. With all due respect, a Judicial Branch staff attorney position does not allow for litigation experience and experience working with people directly. Therefore, I strongly urge the Navajo Nation Council to vote against Ms. Stover's appointment as a District Court Judge. I will support Ms. Stover's judicial aspirations after she garners litigation experience, and especially after she experiences working with people directly in a legal capacity.

First the usual disclaimer--these are my personal views and not those of any past or present client or employer:

It is great that Mss. Gilmore and Stover and Mr. Laughing are willing to serve as Navajo Nation Judges. The vacancies that they have been appointed to fill (as well as the unfilled vacancy on the NN Supreme Court) have existed for far too long and imposed an unfair burden on the current judges (and Chief Justice Jayne and Associate Justice Shirley) as well as the Navajo public.

I have always had the greatest admiration for people willing to serve as Navajo District Judges and especially those who serve in smaller, more remote districts with even less available resources and services to help the children, families and criminal defendants who are in desperate need of services to give them even a chance at the type of life we all want for ourselves and our families.

To be willing to work in an environment where, sadly, many of the same people and families come before the court repeatedly without the ability to call on resources and services that might well make a significant positive difference in the lives of those who come to the Navajo Courts takes an amazing degree of dedication.

Finally, just a thought on what the Navajo Public Information--DIBB system ought to provide the public with respect to candidates for judicial office:

- name
- date of birth
- four Navajo Clans
- Navajo Language Fluency
- Education (high school, college, law school and other education)
- State Bar Membership status
- Employment history
