PURPOSE: This resolution, if approved, will allocate \$1,070,298,867 of Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds for Chapter Assistance; Public Safety Emergency Communications, E911, and Rural Addressing Projects; Cyber Security; Public Health Projects; Economic Development Projects; Hardship Assistance; Water and Wastewater Projects; Broadband Projects; Home Electricity Connection and Electric Capacity Projects; Housing Projects And Manufactured Housing Facilities; Bathroom Addition Projects; Construction Contingency Funding; and Reduced Administrative Funding




This written summary does not address recommended amendments as may be provided by the standing committee. The Office of Legislative Counsel requests each committee member to review the proposed resolution in detail.

BE IT ENACTED:

SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

- A. The Navajo Nation Council is the governing body of the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. §102(A).
B. Navajo Nation Council Resolution No. CJY-41-21, attached as **Exhibit A**, mandates that
Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund ("NNFRF") Expenditure Plans be duly adopted by a

1 two-thirds (2/3) vote of all members of the Navajo Nation Council and approved by the
2 President of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005 (C) (10),
3 (11), and (12).

- 4 C. The Naabik'iyáti' Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council with the
5 delegated responsibility to hear proposed resolution(s) that require final action by the Navajo
6 Nation Council. 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(9).

7 8 **SECTION TWO. FINDINGS**

- 9 A. The World Health Organization ("WHO") declared a Public Health Emergency of
10 International Concern related to the Coronavirus ("COVID-19"), a highly contagious and
11 sometimes fatal respiratory virus, on January 30, 2020; the U.S. Department of Health and
12 Human Services declared a Public Health Emergency related to the COVID-19 outbreak on
13 January 31, 2020; and the WHO declared a global pandemic due to COVID-19 on March 11,
14 2020.
- 15 B. The Navajo Nation Commission on Emergency Management, with the concurrence of Navajo
16 Nation President Jonathan Nez, declared a Public Health State of Emergency on the Navajo
17 Nation on March 11, 2020, due to the COVID-19 outbreak. *See* Resolution No. CEM 20-03-
18 11 which is incorporated herein by reference. The Navajo Nation Department of Health has
19 subsequently issued numerous Public Health Emergency Orders. Public Health Orders 2020-
20 001 through 2022-006 are incorporated herein by reference. These Public Health Emergency
21 Orders are available at www.ndoh.navajo-nsn.gov.
- 22 C. The coronavirus pandemic of 2019 has caused large scale infections and loss of life throughout
23 the world, the United States, and the Navajo Nation. As of April 13, 2022, the Navajo Nation
24 Health Command Operations Center has confirmed 53,179 COVID-19 cases and 1,740
25 COVID-related deaths on the Navajo Nation. COVID-19 variants have recently emerged that
26 threaten to increase these numbers and continue the pandemic's assault on the Navajo People.
- 27 D. The devastating effects of COVID-19 continue throughout the Navajo Nation and extend
28 beyond the health and life devastation to wide scale negative financial effects, such as
29 employment losses, business closures, food and housing insecurity, and other economic
30 disruptions.

1 E. In response to the pandemic, United States President Joseph Biden signed the American
2 Rescue Plan Act ("ARPA") into law on March 11, 2021. Section 9901 of ARPA amended
3 Title VI of the Social Security Act to add section 602, which established the Coronavirus State
4 Fiscal Recovery Fund, and section 603, which established the Coronavirus Local Fiscal
5 Recovery Fund (together the "Fiscal Recovery Funds" or "FRF") and provided \$362 billion
6 for state, local, and tribal governments, including \$20 billion specifically designated for tribal
7 governments.

8 F. As of April 12, 2022, the United States Department of Treasury has allocated two billion
9 seventy-nine million four hundred sixty-one thousand four hundred sixty-four dollars
10 (\$2,079,461,464) to the Navajo Nation under the Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions of ARPA.
11 The Fiscal Recovery Funds are designed to build on and expand the relief provided in the
12 2020 Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act), Public Law 116-
13 136, 134 Stat. 281 (2020), and are intended to mitigate and contain the spread of COVID-19,
14 as well as to respond to the health, social and economic impacts of COVID-19 suffered by
15 residents and businesses.

16 G. Pursuant to Section 9901 of ARPA, the Fiscal Recovery Funds are specifically intended to:

- 17 1. respond to the COVID-19 public health emergency and its negative economic
18 impacts, including assistance to households, small businesses, and non-profits; and/or
19 aid to impacted industries such as tourism, travel, and hospitality;
- 20 2. respond to workers performing essential work during the COVID-19 public health
21 emergency by providing premium pay to eligible workers;
- 22 3. provide government services to the extent of the reduction in Navajo Nation revenue
23 due to the COVID-19 public health emergency, relative to revenues collected in the
24 most recent full fiscal year prior to the COVID-19 public health emergency; and
- 25 4. make necessary investments in water, sewer, and/or broadband infrastructure.

26 H. The U.S. Department of Treasury has issued guidance requiring that the use and expenditure
27 of Fiscal Recovery Funds must fall under one of the four categories above and that funding
28 recipients must report each expenditure under one of the eighty-three (83) "Expenditure
29 Categories" set forth in Appendix 1 to the U.S. Department of Treasury's Compliance and
30 Reporting Guidance for State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds, attached as **Exhibit B**.

1 I. Pursuant to ARPA:

- 2 1. Fiscal Recovery Fund costs must be incurred by December 31, 2024, meaning that
3 the Navajo Nation must obligate FRF funds by that date. Treasury's Final Rule
4 provides that "incurred" shall have the same meaning given to "financial obligation"
5 under the Uniform Guidance at 2 CFR 200.1: "Financial obligations, when
6 referencing a recipient's or sub-recipient's use of funds under a Federal award, means
7 orders placed for property and services, contracts and sub-awards made, and similar
8 transactions that require payment"; and
9
10 2. The Fiscal Recovery Fund period of performance runs from March 3, 2021, until
11 December 31, 2026, meaning that all FRF-funded projects must be completed and
12 funds must be fully expended by December 31, 2026.
13
14 3. Costs incurred by the Navajo Nation prior to March 3, 2021 are not eligible.
15
16 4. Any funds not obligated or expended for eligible uses by the dates set forth above in
17 sections I (1) and (2) must be returned to Treasury, including any unobligated or
18 unexpended funds that have been provided to sub-recipients and contractors as part
19 of the award closeout process.

20 J. While its acceptance of Fiscal Recovery Funds obligates the Navajo Nation to comply with
21 ARPA and other federal laws and regulations, the Navajo Nation can and will fulfill these
22 obligations while retaining and exercising its sovereignty in allocating and disbursing Fiscal
23 Recovery Funds.

24 K. On July 23, 2021, the Navajo Nation Council adopted Resolution No. CJY-41-21, attached as
25 **Exhibit A**, establishing the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund ("NNFRF") into which the
26 Navajo Nation's allocation of \$2,079,461,464 has been deposited. Resolution CJY-41-21 also
27 adopted an expenditure authorization and approval process for the allocation of funds from
28 the NNFRF.

29 L. The Navajo Nation Council mandated the Budget and Finance Committee to adopt application
30 and review procedures, as well as an expenditure plan template, to be used by entities
requesting Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds. Resolution CJY-41-21, Section Four. The
Budget and Finance Committee approved Resolution No. BFS-31-21 which established

1 mandatory Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund application procedures, forms, and an
2 expenditure plan template. Resolution BFS-31-21 is incorporated herein by reference.

3 M. To ensure the Navajo Nation's compliance with ARPA, Section Four of Resolution CJY-41-
4 21 also directed the Navajo Nation Department of Justice ("NNDOJ") to perform "an initial
5 determination of whether a NNFRF funding request satisfies the legal requirements of the
6 Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions of ARPA and applicable Navajo Nation laws, regulations,
7 and policies and procedures." Resolution BFS-31-21 incorporated NNDOJ's initial
8 determination into the mandatory NNFRF application procedures, forms, and an expenditure
9 plan template, which requires, among other things, identification of the entity with
10 administrative oversight over the Funding Recipient. Administrative oversight means having
11 the authority and responsibility to monitor the implementation of an approved FRF
12 Expenditure Plan and the expenditure of awarded funds. The duties of the entity with
13 administrative oversight are set forth in Section Seven of the FRF Procedures in Exhibits 1
14 through 5 of Resolution BFS-31-21.

15 N. The Office of the President and Vice-President, in coordination with the Division of
16 Community Development ("DCD"), presented ARPA and Fiscal Recovery Fund information
17 at each of the five (5) Agency Council Meetings to hear from the Navajo People concerning
18 their needs and priorities for projects and/or services funded through the NNFRF. In addition,
19 DCD has met with Navajo Nation Chapters, individually and collectively, on more than fifty
20 (50) occasions to discuss NNFRF matters.

21 O. The Navajo Nation Council hosted twenty-six (26) Naabik'íyáti' Committee Work Sessions,
22 all open to the public, to hear from the regional and Agency leadership concerning their needs
23 and priorities for projects and/or services funded through the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery
24 Fund. In addition, Standing Committees of the Navajo Nation Council held more than forty
25 (40) committee meetings, all open to the public, that have included NNFRF reports and
26 infrastructure specific discussions.

27 P. The health and financial devastation visited on the Navajo People by the COVID-19 pandemic
28 has risen to emergency levels. Critical infrastructure needs to be built by and for the Navajo
29 Nation government to provide necessary services and to allow the Navajo Nation to assist
30 residents in coping with the on-going pandemic. The time for construction of such

1 infrastructure and expenditure of the Fiscal Recovery Funds continues to lessen as the deadline
2 to completely expend Fiscal Recovery Funds by December 31, 2026, quickly approaches, after
3 which time unexpended funds must be returned to the United States Treasury. The Navajo
4 Nation Council and Office of the President and Vice-President have determined that it is
5 imperative that infrastructure and mitigation recovery services be provided to the Navajo
6 People as soon as possible.

7 Q. To lessen the financial devastation caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, the Navajo Nation
8 Council adopted Resolution No. CD-62-21 providing \$557,000,000 in Hardship Assistance
9 for Navajo members. The President signed CD-62-21 into law on January 4, 2022.

10 R. The Navajo Nation Council and Office of the President and Vice-President concur that, based
11 on their respective public consultation efforts, it is in the best interest of the Navajo people
12 and Navajo communities to next enact comprehensive Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund
13 Expenditure Plans for; Chapter Assistance; Public Safety Emergency Communication, E911,
14 and Rural Addressing Projects; Cyber Security; Public Health Projects; Economic
15 Development Projects; Hardship Assistance; Water and Wastewater Projects; Broadband
16 Projects; Home Electricity Connection and Electric Capacity Projects; Housing Projects and
17 Manufactured Housing Facilities; Bathroom Addition Projects; and Construction Contingency
18 Funding in the total amount of one billion seventy million two hundred ninety-eight thousand,
19 eight hundred sixty-seven dollars (\$1,070,298,867), as set forth in **Exhibit C**.

21 **SECTION THREE. APPROVAL OF THE CHAPTER ASSISTANCE EXPENDITURE PLAN**

22 A. The Navajo Nation hereby approves and adopts the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund Chapter
23 Assistance Expenditure Plan set forth herein and in **Exhibit D**.

24 B. The Navajo Nation hereby approves total funding for the NNFRF Chapter Assistance Expenditure
25 Plan to the Division of Community Development from the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund
26 in the total amount of eighty-one million nine hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$81,950,000), as
27 Revenue Replacement: Provision of Government Services (Expenditure Category 6.1), with
28 administrative oversight by the Office of the President and Vice-President and legislative oversight
29 by the Resources and Development Committee, to be allocated at a total of seven hundred and
30 forty-five thousand dollars (\$745,000) per Chapter.

- 1 C. For purposes of the NNFRF Chapter Assistance Expenditure Plan and Chapter Project Plans,
2 “Chapter” shall mean all the Navajo Nation chapters, whether governance certified pursuant to the
3 Local Governance Act (“LGA”) (“LGA-Certified Chapters”) or not (“Non-LGA-Certified
4 Chapters”); and the term “projects” shall mean projects, services, and programs.
- 5 D. The 12 N.N.C. § 820(O) 50-50 Chapter Distribution Formula does not apply to this Expenditure
6 Plan. The 50-50 Formula applies to appropriations intended for distribution to all Chapters of the
7 Navajo Nation. The Chapter Assistance Expenditure Plan funding will be allocated to the Division
8 of Community Development for the benefit of Chapters rather than directly to all Chapters.
- 9 E. The Division of Community Development shall manage and administer funds and Chapter Project
10 Plans on behalf of Non-LGA-Certified Chapters. The Division of Community Development may
11 award funding to LGA-Certified Chapters through sub-recipient agreements, but shall maintain
12 administrative oversight over such funding and Chapter Project Plans.
- 13 F. Each Navajo Nation Chapter shall propose FRF-eligible projects to be incorporated into and
14 funded through a chapter-specific comprehensive NNFRF Chapter Project Plan, which shall be
15 subject to administrative approval as set forth below. A Chapter’s comprehensive Chapter Project
16 Plan shall not exceed seven hundred and forty-five thousand (\$745,000) in total.
- 17 G. The Division of Community Development and the NNFRF Office shall work together to provide
18 education and technical assistance to Chapters, and to respond timely to requests for assistance
19 from Chapters, in developing their individual projects and comprehensive Chapter Project Plans.
- 20 H. Chapter Project Plans shall be subject to the following requirements, restrictions, and review and
21 approval process:
- 22 1. All projects in a Chapter’s comprehensive NNFRF Chapter Project Plan shall fall under
23 one of the authorized and allowed U.S. Treasury Expenditure Categories set forth in
24 **Exhibit B** and as restricted herein.
 - 25 2. A comprehensive NNFRF Chapter Project Plan may include NNFRF-eligible projects for
26 programs to provide government services to Chapter members; to provide basic PPE to
27 Chapter members; to provide food, fuel, firewood assistance to Chapter members
28 negatively impacted by COVID-19; to construct projects such as COVID-19 mitigation
29 renovations to Chapter houses, housing renovations, and house wiring; to plan and design
30 projects; to hire consultants to assist with NNFRF-eligible programs and projects; to hire

1 PEP workers, student workers and other temporary employees, or regular status
2 employees to assist the Chapter governments in carrying out NNFRF-eligible programs
3 and projects. Chapter Project Plans shall not include COVID-19 testing and vaccinations,
4 or any cash assistance for Chapter members such as a hardship assistance program.

- 5 3. Council Resolution No. CYJ-41-21 mandated NNNNDOJ with the responsibility to
6 conduct initial eligibility determinations on all proposed NNFRF expenditure plans; and
7 only projects that NNNNDOJ deems FRF-eligible shall be included in a Chapter's
8 comprehensive NNFRF Chapter Project Plan.
- 9 4. Each Chapter and comprehensive Chapter Project Plan shall be limited to a total of seven
10 hundred and forty-five thousand dollars (\$745,000) of Revenue Replacement Projects
11 (Expenditure Categories 6.1: Provision of Government Services and 6.2 Non-federal
12 Match for Other Federal Programs).
- 13 5. LGA-Certified Chapters may receive subawards of NNFRF for approved Chapter Project
14 Plans through a sub-recipient agreement and shall then be responsible for administering
15 and managing the Chapter projects themselves, subject to administrative oversight from
16 the Division of Community Development or other designated Administrative Oversight
17 entity. Non-LGA-Certified Chapters shall not be eligible to receive subawards of NNFRF.
18 The Navajo Nation Central Government shall administer and manage NNFRF-funded
19 projects on behalf of Non-LGA-Certified Chapters.
- 20 6. Chapter Project Plans shall not include Sanitation Deficiency Service ("SDS")-eligible
21 projects included on the Indian Health Service 2022 SDS List, attached as **Exhibit D-1**,
22 or on any prior year Indian Health Services SDS List.
- 23 7. All pre-construction related projects included in a Chapter Project Plan shall be "project
24 ready" meaning that a project's planning and design work is able to begin once funding
25 is received, and the expedited timeframe in which the project can be completed.
 - 26 a. The Chapter shall complete a separate Division of Community Development
27 (DCD) project evaluation form and supporting documents for each proposed
28 pre-construction related project which shall include project-site readiness,
29 valid land withdrawal and permitting approvals, as well as the anticipated
30 timeframe during which the project will be completed. The Chapter shall

- 1 submit the fully completed form through the DCD Portal. If DCD is not the
2 Administrative Oversight over the proposed project, the Chapter shall also
3 submit the project evaluation form and all supporting documents to the entity
4 that will have Administrative Oversight over the proposed project.
- 5 8. Construction projects shall be “construction ready” meaning that a project’s planning
6 and design work has been completed and construction is able to begin once funding
7 is received, and the expedited timeframe in which the project can be completed.
- 8 a. The Chapter shall complete a separate DCD project evaluation form for each
9 proposed construction project which shall include project site readiness, valid
10 land withdrawal and permitting approvals, as well as the anticipated
11 timeframe during which the project will be completed. The Chapter shall
12 submit the fully completed form and all supporting documents through the
13 DCD Portal. If DCD is not the Administrative Oversight over the proposed
14 project, the Chapter shall also submit the project evaluation form and all
15 supporting documents to the entity that will have Administrative Oversight
16 over the proposed project.
- 17 9. All proposed Chapter projects shall be sufficiently developed such that funding for the
18 project(s) can be obligated and encumbered in the Nation’s Financial Management
19 Information System (“FMIS”) by 5:00 p.m. on June 30, 2024, and fully expended by
20 5:00 p.m. on June 30, 2026 or such earlier dates as may be determined by resolution of
21 the Navajo Nation Council. Generally, this requires NEPA, ROW, and design work to be
22 sufficiently advanced such that these pre-construction tasks can be completed in time to
23 execute construction contracts and encumber funds by 5:00 p.m. on June 30, 2024.
- 24 a. The Administrative Oversight entity for each project shall be responsible for
25 making the determination whether the proposed Chapter project is “project-
26 ready” or “construction-ready”. If a proposed project is not deemed project-
27 ready or construction-ready, the project shall not be eligible for inclusion in a
28 Chapter’s Project Plan.
- 29 10. Immediately after a Chapter has received a NNDOJ determination that its proposed
30 projects are FRF-eligible and notice from DCD, or the other entity serving as the

Administrative Oversight, that the proposed projects are project-ready or construction-ready, the Chapter shall prepare its proposed comprehensive Chapter Project Plan.

11. Within forty-five (45) days after the enactment of this legislation, each Chapter shall submit the following to the Division of Community Development through the DCD Portal:

- a. a list of proposed projects, the total cost of which shall be equal to the Chapter's allocation;
- b. a duly enacted Chapter resolution in support of each proposed project on the list; and
- c. a draft BFS-31-21 Appendix A expenditure plan, Appendix B budget form, and supporting documents, such as checklist, Chapter resolution, preliminary cost estimate, list of recipients and quad maps, documentation of clearances, written confirmation of other funding sources, for each project or grouping of projects that fall under the same Treasury Expenditure Category. Each project shall identify its Administrative Oversight entity and its Oversight Committee.

12. If a Chapter misses the forty-five (45) day deadline and fails to submit the required project list, draft BFS-31-21 Appendix A expenditure plans, Appendix B budget forms, and supporting documents within 45 days after the enactment of this legislation, the Division of Community Development shall issue a written notice to the Chapter, with a courtesy copy to OPVP, Office of the Speaker, and the Council Delegate representing such Chapter. The written notice shall state that the Chapter failed to meet the 45-day deadline, and shall provide the Chapter an additional ten (10) calendar days to submit the required project list, draft BFS-31-21 Appendix A expenditure plans, Appendix B budget forms, and supporting documents.

- a. If the Chapter fails to submit the required documents within the additional 10-day period, the Chapter shall not be eligible to submit a Chapter Project Plan or to receive funding through the Chapter Assistance Expenditure Plan. Funds designated for the benefit of that ineligible Chapter shall be automatically reallocated to the Construction Contingencies Expenditure Plan and such

1 reallocation shall be automatic and shall not require Navajo Nation Council or
2 OPVP action.

- 3 b. DCD shall promptly provide written notice to the Council Delegate representing
4 the respective Chapter, Office of the Controller, Office of Management and
5 Budget, OPVP, NNFRF Office, and Office of the Speaker that the Chapter was
6 deemed ineligible to receive funding through the Chapter Assistance Expenditure
7 Plan.

8 13. Notwithstanding Resolution BFS-31-21 and regardless of a Chapter's LGA-certified
9 status, DCD shall submit each Chapter's BFS-31-21 Appendix A expenditure plans,
10 Appendix B budget forms, and supporting documents to NNDOJ for an initial
11 eligibility determination as required under Resolution CJY-41-21.

- 12 a. DCD shall review a Chapter's proposed project list, draft Appendix A
13 expenditure plans, Appendix B budgets forms and supporting documents,
14 including Chapter resolutions, within ten (10) working days after receipt in the
15 DCD Portal and determine whether the proposed project list, draft Appendix A
16 expenditure plans, Appendix B budget forms and supporting documents are
17 complete and meet the requirements set forth herein and in CJY-41-21 and BFS-
18 31-21.

- 19 b. If the proposed project list, draft Appendix A expenditure plans, Appendix B
20 budgets forms and supporting documents are in order, DCD shall promptly
21 approve, sign, and submit the packet for NNDOJ initial eligibility determination
22 review. If the documents are deficient or the proposed projects do not meet the
23 CJY-41-21 and/or BFS-31-21 requirements, DCD shall promptly provide
24 technical assistance to the Chapter to prepare a revised request for NNDOJ
25 review.

26 14. NNDOJ shall be allowed five (5) work days, in addition to BFS-31-21's five (5) days, to
27 complete the initial eligibility determination following DCD's submission of a request for
28 a NNDOJ eligibility review. After completing its review, NNDOJ shall provide a written
29 initial eligibility determination to DCD, the Chapter, and the Administrative Oversight
30 entity over the proposed project if other than DCD.

1 15. All Chapter Project Plans shall be subject to administrative review and approval by
2 the DCD Division Director, the Director of the NNFRF Office, and the Director(s) of
3 the government entity(s) with Administrative Oversight over each of the projects that
4 comprise the Chapter's Project Plan.

5 16. If a Chapter Project Plan for a Non-LGA-Certified Chapter is approved, DCD or the
6 other entity serving as Administrative Oversight, shall prepare and submit budget
7 forms to OMB, and shall take all necessary steps to procure goods and services on
8 behalf of the Non-LGA-Certified Chapter in order to implement the Chapter's Project
9 Plan.

10 17. If a Chapter Project Plan for an LGA-Certified Chapter is approved, DCD or the other
11 entity serving as Administrative Oversight, shall prepare a sub-recipient agreement
12 for NNDOJ approval and execution by the Navajo Nation President or his designee.
13 DCD or the Administrative Oversight entity shall prepare and submit the budget
14 forms for the sub-recipient agreement to OMB. OOC shall only disburse funding in
15 accordance with the disbursement schedule in the sub-recipient agreement. The
16 LGA-Certified Chapter shall take all necessary steps to procure goods and services,
17 execute contracts, and other measures in order to implement the Chapter's Project
18 Plan.

19 18. Resolution CJY-41-21, Section Three (F), requires a contingency reserve for NNFRF
20 Chapter construction projects. Within each construction project forms, Chapters shall
21 budget a minimum of ten percent (10%) of the total cost of construction projects on
22 Appendix B – budget form as a contingency reserve.

23 19. The Chapter Project Plans of sanctioned chapters shall *not* be subject to the 10%
24 withholding set forth by 12 N.N.C. § 9(B).

25 I. To ensure that the Chapter Assistance Expenditure Plan complies with the federal Fiscal Recovery
26 Fund deadlines so that the Nation does not have to return any funding to Treasury, any funding for
27 the Chapter Assistance Expenditure Plan that is not obligated and encumbered by DCD and/or the
28 LGA-Certified Chapters by 5:00 p.m. on June 30, 2024, or expended by DCD and/or the LGA-
29 Certified Chapters by 5:00 p.m. on June 30, 2026 shall be automatically reallocated to the NNFRF
30 Construction Contingencies Expenditure Plan. Such reallocations shall not require Navajo Nation

Council or OPVP action.

1. LGA-Certified Chapters shall immediately return to the Office of the Controller all Chapter Project Plan funds that remain unobligated and unencumbered as of 5:00 p.m. on June 30, 2024.
2. LGA-Certified Chapters shall immediately return to the Office of the Controller all Chapter Project Plan funds that remain unexpended as of 5:00 p.m. on June 30, 2026.

SECTION FOUR. APPROVAL OF THE PUBLIC SAFETY EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS, E911, RURAL ADDRESSING, AND CYBER SECURITY PROJECTS EXPENDITURE PLANS

- A. The Navajo Nation hereby approves and adopts the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund Public Safety Emergency Communications, E911, Rural Addressing, and Cyber Security Projects Expenditure Plans set forth in **Exhibits E** and **E-1** through **E-2**.
- B. The Navajo Nation hereby approves total funding for the NNFRF Public Safety Emergency Communications, E911, Rural Addressing, and Cyber Security Projects Expenditure Plans from the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund in the total amount of forty million dollars (\$40,000,000) and allocates the funding as follows:
 1. Thirty-five million dollars (\$35,000,000) to the Division of Public Safety for Emergency Communications projects, to include E911 and rural addressing, as Other Public Health Services (Expenditure Category 1.14), as set forth in **Exhibit E-1**, with administrative oversight by the Office of the President and Vice-President and joint legislative oversight by the Law and Order and Resources and Development Committees.
 2. Five million dollars (\$5,000,000) to the Department of Information Technology, Division of General Services, for Cyber Security project(s), as Other Public Health Services (Expenditure Category 1.14), as set forth in **Exhibit E-2**, with administrative oversight by the Division of General Services and joint legislative oversight by the Health Education Human Services and Resources and Development Committees.
- C. The Division of Public Safety and the Department of Information Technology, Division of General Services, are authorized to execute these Emergency Communications, E911, Rural Addressing, and Cyber Security Projects directly, or through use of contractors and sub-

1 recipients. The Division of General Services and the Division of Public Safety shall exercise
2 administrative oversight over construction contracts and subawards to sub-recipients and shall
3 ensure that costs are incurred only for FRF-eligible purposes, and that projects are completed
4 on schedule, within the authorized budgets, and according to project specifications.

25 with administrative oversight by the Navajo Department of Health and legislative oversight
26 by the Health, Education, and Human Services Committee.
- 27 3. Fifteen million two hundred forty-three thousand seven hundred fifty dollars (\$15,243,750) to
28 the Division of Behavioral and Mental Health Services, Navajo Department of Health, for
29 Detox and Residential Treatment Centers, as Substance Use Services (Expenditure Category

24 Category 2.15), as set forth in **Exhibit L-3**, with administrative oversight by the Division
25 of Community Development and legislative oversight by the Resources and
26 Development Committee.

27 4. Fifteen million five hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$15,550,000) to the Navajo Hopi
28 Land Commission Office for Housing for the Former Bennett Freeze Area and Navajo
29 Partitioned Lands to purchase modular homes for people within the twenty-three (23)
30 impacted Chapters and for planning of a manufactured housing plant in Nahata Dziil

Chapter, as Long-Term Housing Security: Affordable Housing (Expenditure Category 2.15), as set forth in **Exhibit L-4**, with administrative oversight by the Division of Community Development and legislative oversight by the Resources and Development Committee.

- C. The Housing Projects assigned to CHID, the Veterans Housing Program, and Navajo Hopi Land Commission Office are need-based.
- D. The eligibility criteria for receiving services under the Housing Projects assigned to CHID shall be approved by the Resources and Development Committee through a resolution.
- E. The eligibility criteria for receiving services under the Veterans Housing Projects Expenditure Plan assigned to the Veterans Housing Program shall be approved by the Health, Education and Human Services Committee through resolution.
- F. The eligibility criteria for receiving services under the Housing for the Former Bennett Freeze Area and Navajo Partitioned Lands Expenditure Plan assigned to the Navajo Hopi Land Commission Office shall be approved by the Navajo-Hopi Land Commission through resolution.
- G. To the fullest extent possible, all new housing shall be accessible to persons with physical disabilities and shall meet the standards and specifications within the Americans with Disabilities Act.
- H. The requirement in Resolution CJY-41-21, Section Three (F), to establish a contingency reserve for the Housing Projects and Manufactured Housing Facilities construction projects shall be implemented on a case-by-case basis through resolution(s) approved by the Navajo Nation Council and enacted pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005 (C)(10), (11), and (12).

SECTION TWELVE. APPROVAL OF THE BATHROOM ADDITIONS EXPENDITURE PLAN

- A. The Navajo Nation hereby approves and adopts the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund Bathroom Additions Expenditure Plan set forth in **Exhibits M** and **M-1**.
- B. The Navajo Nation hereby approves total funding for the NNFRF Bathroom Additions Expenditure Plan from the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund in the total amount of one hundred fifty million dollars (\$150,000,000) to be allocated as follows:
 - 1. One hundred fifty million dollars (\$150,000,000) to the Division of Community

1 Development for Bathroom Additions, as Other Public Health Services (Expenditure
2 Category 1.14), as set forth in **Exhibit M**, with administrative oversight by the Navajo
3 Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds Office and legislative oversight by the Resources and
4 Development Committee.

5 C. The Bathroom Additions Expenditure Plan is need-based. The application process and criteria are
6 included in **Exhibit M-1**.

7 D. The Division of Community Development is authorized to execute these Bathroom Additions
8 Projects directly, or through the use of contractors and sub-recipients. The Division of
9 Community Development shall exercise administrative oversight over construction contracts
10 and subawards to sub-recipients and shall ensure that costs are incurred only for FRF-eligible
11 purposes, and that projects are completed on schedule, within the authorized budgets, and
12 according to project specifications.

13 E. The requirement in Resolution CJY-41-21, Section Three (F), to establish a contingency
14 reserve for Bathroom Addition construction projects shall be implemented on a case-by-case
15 basis through resolution(s) approved by the Navajo Nation Council and enacted pursuant to 2
16 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005 (C)(10), (11), and (12).

17
18 **SECTION THIRTEEN. ADMINISTRATION OF NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY**
19 **FUND EXPENDITURE PLANS**

20 A. All entities receiving Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds, whether through an immediate
21 allocation under Resolution CJY-41-21 or subsequently approved NNFRF Expenditure Plan,
22 shall comply with all Navajo Nation laws, policies, regulations, rules, and procedures,
23 specifically including, but not limited to, those governing the NNFRF and the expenditure of
24 such funds, and any additional terms set forth in a grant, sub-recipient, or similar agreement.

25 B. Fiscal Recovery Fund costs must be incurred by December 31, 2024, meaning that the Navajo
26 Nation must obligate FRF funds by that date. Treasury guidance provides that "incurred" shall
27 have the same meaning given to "financial obligation" under the Uniform Guidance at 2 CFR
28 200.1: "Financial obligations, when referencing a recipient's or sub-recipient's use of funds
29 under a Federal award, means orders placed for property and services, contracts and sub-
30 awards made, and similar transactions that require payment."

- 1 1. For internal Navajo Nation purposes, the terms “obligated” and “encumbered” are
2 defined in Resolution BFS-31-21, Section Three on page 3 of Exhibits 1 through 5. BFS-
3 31-21 provides that, “‘Obligated’ means that an order has been placed for the delivery of
4 goods or property, or the performance of services, that will be paid for with Fiscal
5 Recovery Funds; that a contract or subcontract has been executed promising payment
6 with Fiscal Recovery Funds; or that a similar transaction has occurred requiring payment
7 of Fiscal Recovery Funds. For internal Navajo Nation purposes, funds are obligated or
8 encumbered upon completion of OOC’s review and approval of contracts and purchase
9 requisitions, and OOC’s recording of an encumbrance in the FMIS, not upon execution
10 of a contract.”
- 11 2. Any NNFRF funds not obligated and encumbered by the end of the third quarter of Fiscal
12 Year 2024 shall be reported to the Naabik’íyáti’ Committee and are subject to reversion
13 to the NNFRF by resolution of the Naabik’íyáti’ Committee. Reverted NNFRF funds
14 will then be available for reallocation to other NNFRF Expenditure Plans pursuant to
15 resolution(s) of the Navajo Nation Council enacted pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(17)
16 and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005 (C)(10), (11), and (12).
- 17 C. Projects and/or services funded with Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds must be completed
18 and all NNFRF funds fully spent by June 30, 2026, unless an earlier date is determined through
19 resolution of the Navajo Nation Council.
- 20 D. After approval pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005 (C)(10), (11), and (12),
21 Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund Expenditure Plan funds shall be available for use by a
22 funding recipient that is a branch, division, department, or other unit of the Navajo Nation central
23 government as soon as a detailed budget has been administratively approved and the Office of
24 Management and Budget has entered such budget into the Financial Management Information
25 System (FMIS).
- 26 E. The Office of the Controller shall release Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund Expenditure Plan
27 funds to a funding recipient that is external to the Navajo Nation central government, including
28 LGA-Certified chapters, Navajo Nation owned entities, and other external entities, pursuant to the
29 fund distribution schedule recommended by the Navajo Nation government entity with
30 administrative oversight and approved by the Office of the Controller and included in a fully

1 executed sub-recipient, or similar agreement deemed legally sufficient by the Navajo Nation
2 Department of Justice.

3 F. Awarded Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds shall only be obligated and expended on projects
4 and/or services, including need-based projects and services, that were included as an immediate
5 allocation under Resolution CJY-41-21 or are included in a NNFRF Expenditure Plan approved
6 and adopted by a Navajo Nation Council Resolution enacted pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(17)
7 and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005 (C)(10), (11), and (12).

8 G. All proposed modifications to an approved NNFRF Expenditure Plan or an approved NNFRF
9 Expenditure Plan budget shall comply with section 8 of Exhibits 1 through 5 of Resolution BFS-
10 31-21.

11 1. Any increase in funding for an approved NNFRF Expenditure Plan shall require approval
12 by Navajo Nation Council Resolution enacted pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(17) and 2
13 N.N.C. §§ 1005 (C)(10), (11), and (12), unless such increase in funding is due to an
14 administratively approved budget transfer from the Construction Contingencies
15 Expenditure Plan.

16 a. Proposed modifications of Expenditure Plans shall be submitted to the Navajo
17 Nation Department of Justice (“NNDOJ”) for an eligibility determination review
18 to ensure the proposed modification will be an eligible use of FRF.

19 b. Modifications that change the purpose and intent of the Expenditure Plan or
20 projects and services within the approved Expenditure Plan or that substantially
21 change the scope of work of the Expenditure Plan shall require approval by the
22 Navajo Nation Council.

23 c. As set forth in Resolution BFS-31-21, NNDOJ shall make the determination
24 whether Navajo Nation Council approval of the modification is required.

25 d. After NNDOJ has reviewed the request for a modification of an approved
26 Expenditure Plan and determined that legislative approval is not needed, or after
27 the modification is approved by a Navajo Nation Council resolution enacted
28 pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005 (C)(10), (11), and (12),
29 the Administrative Oversight entity acting on behalf of the Funding Recipient shall
30 submit a budget revision request to Office of Management & Budget (“OMB”), if

needed. The Budget Instruction Manual provisions regarding budget revision requests shall apply.

H. Awarded Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds, including cost savings, may be administratively moved between projects and/or services included within the same Expenditure Plan, as long as such projects or services share the same Treasury Expenditure Category for reporting purposes. NNDOJ shall verify that the projects and/or services share the same Expenditure Category before any NNFRF funding is moved between projects and/or services.

I. Awarded Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds, including cost savings, cannot be moved between Expenditure Plans without approval by a Navajo Nation Council Resolution enacted pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005 (C)(10), (11), and (12), unless such movement of funds is due to an administratively approved budget transfer from the Construction Contingencies Expenditure Plan to other NNFRF expenditure plans experiencing cost overruns due to construction contingencies.

J. Approved Expenditure Plans for need-based projects and services, such as Bathroom Addition or Home Electricity Connection projects, may be administratively modified without Navajo Nation Council action as long as the total funding awarded for the Expenditure Plan is not increased and the new project or service is within the same Expenditure Category.

K. To add projects or services to an approved Expenditure Plan when such projects and/or services are not need-based projects or services, shall require a NNDOJ initial eligibility determination pursuant to Resolution BFS-31-21 and the addition must be approved through resolution by the Standing Committee(s) having oversight over the Expenditure Plan and the Budget and Finance Committee.

1. If the new project and/or service increases the total funding awarded for the Expenditure Plan or does not share the same Expenditure Category as the Expenditure Plan, Resolution BFS-31-21 must be fully complied with and the addition can only be added through Navajo Nation Council resolution enacted pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005 (C)(10), (11), and (12).

L. The Emergency Procurement provisions set forth in Resolution CJY-41-21, Section Ten, shall apply to all NNFRF Expenditure Plans enacted herein, as well as to the federal American Rescue Plan Act (“ARPA”) and all Fiscal Recovery Fund procurements by the Navajo Nation, including

1 its LGA-Certified Chapters, and Navajo Nation-owned entities.

2 M. The Office of the Auditor General's Plan of Operation at 12 N.N.C. § 9 provides for withholding
3 certain funds from sanctioned chapters, divisions, and programs. Under 12 N.N.C. § 9(B),
4 following the Budget and Finance Committee's approval of sanctions, OOC shall cause 10% of
5 "monies payable from any Governmental Fund of the Navajo Nation as defined at 12 N.N.C.
6 section 810" of the Appropriations Act. The Navajo Nation hereby determines that Navajo Nation
7 Fiscal Recovery Funds are not a "Governmental Fund" for purposes of sanctions, and therefore
8 direct allocations of NNFRF to sanctioned chapters, divisions, and programs are not subject to
9 withholding.

10 N. All entities receiving Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds shall follow and apply Generally
11 Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP), as established by the Governmental Accounting
12 Standards Board (GASB) for governmental entities and by the Financial Accounting
13 Standards Board (FASB) for public and private companies and non-profits, in reporting,
14 recording, and accounting for such Funds.

15 O. Fraud, misuse of funds, violation of applicable Navajo Nation or federal laws and regulations, non-
16 compliance with FRF agreements governing grants or sub-awards, and false statements or claims
17 by any individual or entity receiving or administering Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds may
18 result in administrative, civil, or criminal sanctions and penalties, debarment and suspension,
19 ineligibility for future Navajo Nation awards or business opportunities, and the Navajo Nation may
20 pursue any other legal action or remedy available by law.

21
22 **SECTION FOURTEEN. APPROVING FUTURE ALLOCATION OF UNALLOCATED**
23 **NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS TO THE CONSTRUCTION**
24 **CONTINGENCIES EXPENDITURE PLAN**

25 A. The Navajo Nation hereby approves and adopts the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund
26 Construction Contingencies Expenditure Plan set forth in **Exhibit N**.

27 B. The Navajo Nation hereby approves total funding for the NNFRF Construction Contingencies
28 Expenditure Plan from the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund in the total amount of five
29 hundred dollars (\$500) to establish a contingency fund for NNFRF construction projects:

- 30 1. Five hundred dollars (\$500) to the Fiscal Recovery Fund Office for the Construction

Contingencies Expenditure Plan, as Revenue Replacement: Provision of Government Services (Expenditure Category 6.1), as set forth in **Exhibit N**, with administrative oversight by the Office of the President and Vice President and legislative oversight by the Resources and Development Committee.

- C. The purpose of the NNFRF Construction Contingencies Expenditure Plan is to use available, i.e., unallocated, unencumbered, cost savings, etc., funds from other NNFRF expenditure plans to fund the costs of construction contingencies on NNFRF-funded construction projects.
- D. Additional funds may be needed in the future for construction contingencies related to the inflationary costs of labor and building materials. The Navajo Nation may determine it is necessary and appropriate to allocate Navajo Nation funds from the Síhasin Fund or the General Fund to pay the costs of construction contingencies on NNFRF-funded construction projects.
- E. Notwithstanding procedures for budget transfers in the Budget Instructions Manual and the modification process established in BFC-31-21, the transfer of funds from the NNFRF Construction Contingencies Expenditure Plan business unit to other NNFRF expenditure plans business units shall be handled administratively and shall not require a resolution of the Navajo Nation Council or a Standing Committee.
- F. The Office of the President and Vice President, NNFRF Office, Office of Management and Budget, and Office of the Controller, with advice from the Department of Justice, shall develop a streamlined administrative process for approving requests for funding from the NNFRF Construction Contingencies Expenditure Plan, and to process budget transfers.
- E. All NNFRF funds that have not been allocated to an NNFRF Expenditure Plan through a Navajo Nation Council Resolution enacted pursuant to Resolution CJY-41-21 by the end of the second quarter of Fiscal Year 2024 may be allocated to the NNFRF Construction Contingencies Expenditure Plan through Navajo Nation Council Resolution enacted pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005 (C) (10), (11), and (12).
- E. All NNFRF funds that have been allocated to an NNFRF expenditure plan through a Navajo Nation Council Resolution enacted pursuant to Resolution CJY-41-21, but that have not been obligated and encumbered by 5:00 p.m. on June 30, 2024, shall automatically revert to the NNFRF and shall be reallocated to the NNFRF Construction Contingencies Expenditure Plan

1 or other NNFRF expenditure plans through Navajo Nation Council Resolution enacted
2 pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005 (C) (10), (11), and (12).

3 F. All obligated and encumbered NNFRF funds that have not been expended by the Navajo
4 Nation and its sub-recipients by 5:00 p.m. on June 30, 2026, shall automatically revert to the
5 NNFRF and shall be reallocated to the NNFRF Construction Contingencies Expenditure Plan
6 or other NNFRF expenditure plans through Navajo Nation Council Resolution enacted
7 pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005 (C) (10), (11), and (12).

8 G. Funding allocated to the Chapter Assistance Expenditure Plan that is not obligated and
9 encumbered by DCD and/or the LGA-Certified Chapters by November 20, 2024 shall be
10 automatically reallocated to the Construction Contingencies Expenditure Plan. Such reallocation
11 shall not require a resolution by the Navajo Nation Council enacted pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164
12 (A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005 (C)(10), (11), and (12).

13 H. Funding allocated to the Chapter Assistance Expenditure Plan that is not expended by DCD and/or
14 the LGA-Certified Chapters by November 20, 2026 shall be automatically reallocated to the
15 Construction Contingencies Expenditure Plan and such reallocation shall not require a resolution
16 by the Navajo Nation Council enacted pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005
17 (C)(10), (11), and (12).

18 I. The Division of Community Development, sub-recipient LGA-Certified Chapters, the Office of
19 the Controller, and the Office of Management and Budget shall cooperate to ensure that such funds
20 from the Chapter Assistance Expenditure Plan are automatically reallocated to the Construction
21 Contingencies Expenditure Plan.

22 **SECTION FIFTEEN. REALLOCATION OF SURPLUS FUNDS PREVIOUSLY**
23 **ALLOCATED UNDER SECTION 7 OF CJY-41-21**

24 A. Section 7 of Resolution CJY-41-21 allocated ten percent (10%) of the Fiscal Recovery Funds
25 received by the Navajo Nation to fund administrative costs of central support service and
26 regulatory offices. The Office of the President and Vice-President was responsible for
27 apportioning ninety percent (90%) of the ten percent (10%). The Speaker of the Navajo
28 Nation Council, after consultation with the Naabik'íyáti' Committee, is responsible
29 apportioning the remaining ten percent (10%).
30

- 1 B. Section 7, Paragraph F, of Resolution CY-41-21 provides that any funding unspent or
2 unencumbered at the end of the second quarter of Fiscal Year 2024 shall be reallocated to the
3 NNFRF and be available for allocation to other NNFRF projects and services.
- 4 C. The Office of the President and the Vice-President has determined that forty-two million one
5 hundred fifty-one thousand five hundred and thirty-one dollars (\$42,151,531) should be
6 reallocated to the NNFRF and be available for allocation to other NNFRF expenditure plans.
- 7 D. The Speaker of the Navajo Nation Council has determined that five million (\$5,000,000)
8 should be reallocated to the NNFRF and be available for allocation to other NNFRF
9 expenditure plans.

10
11 **SECTION SIXTEEN. REPORTING**

- 12 A. All entities receiving Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds shall keep and maintain accurate
13 and complete financial data and records sufficient to demonstrate that the Fiscal Recovery
14 Funds appropriated to the Navajo Nation have been used by the reporting entity in accordance
15 with the provisions of ARPA and timely relay such reports and records to the Administrative
16 Oversight entity, Office of the Controller, Office of Management and Budget, NNFRF Office,
17 and legislative oversight as directed in the grant or sub-recipient agreements if any, and when
18 requested. Such reports and records shall be maintained for at least seven (7) years after the
19 project and/or service has been completed. The Office of the Controller shall be responsible
20 for compiling and providing any and all records and financial reports required by the U.S.
21 Treasury.
- 22 B. All entities receiving Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds through an approved Expenditure
23 Plan shall report the status of their NNFRF allocations to their respective legislative oversight
24 committees at the end of each Fiscal Year quarter. The entity with administrative oversight
25 over the Expenditure Plan shall review the quarterly report prior to its presentation and shall
26 participate in the presentation to the oversight committee(s).
- 27 C. The Executive Director of the NNFRF Office, with the assistance of the Office of the
28 Controller and Office of Management and Budget, shall report the status of all allocated
29 Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds and NNFRF Expenditure Plans to the Budget and
30 Finance Committee and Naabik'íyáti' Committee at the end of each Fiscal Year quarter.

1
2 **SECTION SEVENTEEN. EFFECTIVE DATE**

3 This legislation shall be effective upon its approval pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 221(B), 2 N.N.C. § 164
4 (A)(17), and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005 (C) (10), (11), and (12).
5

6 **SECTION EIGHTEEN. AMENDMENTS**

7 Amendments to this legislation shall only be adopted by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of all members of
8 the Navajo Nation Council and approval of the President of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 2
9 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005 (C) (10), (11), and (12).
10

11 **SECTION NINETEEN. SAVING CLAUSE**

12 If any provision of this legislation is determined invalid by the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, or by a
13 Navajo Nation District Court without appeal to the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, those provisions of
14 this legislation not determined invalid shall remain the law of the Navajo Nation.
15

16 **SECTION TWENTY. DIRECTIVES**

17 A. All Navajo Nation government programs, offices, and divisions, as well as Navajo Nation-owned
18 entities, specifically including those programs, offices, divisions, and Navajo Nation-owned
19 entities receiving Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds, shall prioritize the implementation and
20 completion of NNFRF projects and/or services.

21 B. Navajo Nation regulatory offices participating in the One Stop Shop shall assess federal and state
22 requirements, procedures, and processing times that pose challenges to the rapid implementation
23 of NNFRF Expenditure Plans. Within thirty (30) days following the enactment of this legislation,
24 the One Stop Shop shall submit written recommendations to the Office of the President and Vice
25 President and the Office of the Speaker regarding how the Nation can work with its federal and
26 state partners to address these external challenges.

27 C. Navajo Nation regulatory offices participating in the One Stop Shop, and central support service
28 offices such as the Fiscal Recovery Funds Office, Office of the Controller, Office of Management
29 and Budget, and NNDOJ, shall assess the internal Navajo Nation structural and procedural issues
30 that pose challenges to the rapid implementation of NNFRF Expenditure Plans. These Executive

1 Branch divisions, departments, and offices shall develop strategic responses to increase
2 government efficiency and recommend enhanced and streamlined Executive Branch procedures
3 to expedite NNFRF projects.




Dear Speaker Damon,


After decades of struggling with an unfinished infrastructure, a sagging economy, and an inadequate education system, the Navajo Nation is on the doorstep of changing our future for our elders, our children, and our families. Over the past year we had the financial means to respond to the coronavirus and improve the lives of our constituents; we laid the foundation for the Nation. This year, we again have the opportunity to build on what we started – water lines and wastewater systems for communities, powerlines to family homes, and an internet network to help our students, to name a few. Working together we can take a giant leap forward in giving the People the protective measures they need to continue fighting against the coronavirus and its variants.

RELATING TO BUDGET AND FINANCE AND NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEES, AND THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; ESTABLISHING THE NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND AND THE EXPENDITURE AUTHORIZATION PROCESS THEREUNDER; WAIVING CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF THE NAVAJO NATION APPROPRIATIONS ACT; AMENDING 12 N.N.C. § 334 TO AUTHORIZE EMERGENCY PROCUREMENTS; AUTHORIZING REIMBURSEMENT OF THE SÍHASIN FUND AND UNDESIGNATED, UNRESERVED FUND BALANCE; AUTHORIZING CENTRAL SUPPORT AND REGULATORY COST FUNDING; AUTHORIZING FUNDING TO COMPLETE DEFUNDED NAVAJO NATION CARES FUND EXPENDITURE PLANS; AUTHORIZING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND OFFICE WITHIN THE OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENT

BE IT ENACTED

SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

- A. The Navajo Nation Council is the governing body of the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. § 102(A).
- B. The Naabik'íyáti' Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council with the responsibility to hear proposed resolution(s) that require final action by the Navajo Nation Council. 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(9).
- C. The Budget and Finance Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council with the enumerated powers to review and recommend to the Navajo Nation Council the budgeting, appropriation, investment and management of all funds and to promulgate rules and regulations relative to contracting and financial matters. 2 N.N.C. §§ 300(B)(1) and (2).

SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

- A. The World Health Organization ("WHO") declared a Public Health Emergency of International Concern related to the outbreak of coronavirus ("COVID-19"), a highly contagious and sometimes fatal respiratory virus, on January 30, 2020; the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services declared a Public Health Emergency related to the COVID-19 outbreak on January 31, 2020; and the WHO declared a global pandemic due to COVID-19 on March 11, 2020.
- B. The Navajo Nation Commission on Emergency Management, with the concurrence of Navajo Nation President Jonathan Nez, declared

a Public Health State of Emergency on the Navajo Nation on March 11, 2020, due to the COVID-19 outbreak. See Resolution No. CEM 20-03-11 incorporated herein by reference. The Navajo Nation Department of Health has subsequently issued numerous Public Health Emergency Orders. Public Health Orders 2020-001 through 2021-014 are incorporated by reference. These Public Health Emergency Orders are available at www.ndoh.navajonnsn.gov.

- C. The coronavirus pandemic of 2019 has caused large scale infections and loss of life throughout the world, the United States and the Navajo Nation. As of July 7, 2021, the Navajo Nation Health Command Operations Center has confirmed 31,043 COVID-19 cases and 1,374 COVID-related deaths on the Navajo Nation. COVID-19 variants have emerged that threaten to increase these numbers and continue the pandemic's assault on the Navajo People.
- D. The devastating effects of COVID-19 continue throughout the Navajo Nation, including employment losses, business closures, food and housing insecurity, and other economic disruptions.
- E. On March 11, 2021, President Biden signed the American Rescue Plan Act ("ARPA") into law. Section 9901 of ARPA established the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund and the Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund (together the "Fiscal Recovery Funds") by amending Title VI of the Social Security Act, which provided \$362 billion for state, local, and tribal governments, including \$20 billion designated for tribal governments.
- F. As of May 29, 2021, the United States Department of Treasury ("U.S. Treasury") allocated \$1,861,554,458.43 to the Navajo Nation under the Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions of ARPA. The Fiscal Recovery Funds are designed to build on and expand the relief provided in the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act or CARES Act.
- G. The Fiscal Recovery Funds are intended to support governmental efforts to mitigate and contain the spread of COVID-19, as well as to respond to the health, social and economic impacts of COVID-19 suffered by residents and businesses.
- H. As set forth in Central Agency Council Resolution No. CAC 07/21-11, attached as **Exhibit A**, the Central Agency Council of the Navajo Nation supports the establishment of a Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund and the expenditure authorization process set forth herein.

I. Pursuant to Section 9901 of ARPA, the Fiscal Recovery Funds were specifically intended to:

1. Respond to the COVID-19 public health emergency and its negative economic impacts, including assistance to households, small businesses, and non-profits; and/or aid to impacted industries such as tourism, travel, and hospitality;
2. Respond to workers performing essential work during the COVID-19 public health emergency by providing premium pay to eligible workers of the tribal government. Under this category, the Navajo Nation can provide premium pay to government workers performing essential work, and can provide grants to eligible employers that have eligible workers who perform essential work;
3. Provide government services to the extent of the reduction in Navajo Nation revenue due to the COVID-19 public health emergency, relative to revenues collected in the most recent full fiscal year prior to the emergency; and
4. Make necessary investments in water, sewer, or broadband infrastructure.

J. Pursuant to ARPA:

1. Fiscal Recovery Fund costs must be incurred by December 31, 2024, meaning the Navajo Nation must obligate funds by that date; and
2. The Fiscal Recovery Fund period of performance runs until December 31, 2026, meaning funded projects must be completed by that date.

K. While its acceptance of the Fiscal Recovery Funds obligates the Navajo Nation to comply with ARPA and other federal laws and regulations, the Navajo Nation can and will fulfill these obligations while retaining and exercising its tribal sovereignty.

SECTION THREE. ESTABLISHMENT OF THE NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND

- A. There is hereby established the "Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund" ("NNFRF").
- B. The Navajo Nation hereby designates that the \$1,861,554,458.43 received by the Navajo Nation as of May 29, 2021 from the U.S.

Treasury under the Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions of ARPA, as well as any additional funds that the Navajo Nation may later receive from the United States under the Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions, shall be deposited into the NNFRF.

- C. The purpose of the NNFRF is to serve as a depository into which all Fiscal Recovery Funds and investment earnings therein are deposited, and from which the Navajo Nation shall disburse funds for approved Expenditure Plans which comply with the criteria set forth in the Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions of ARPA.
- D. The Fiscal Recovery Funds allocated to the Navajo Nation are limited emergency funds provided by the federal government and are not subject to the annual set-aside provisions set forth in the Navajo Nation Code.
- E. The Navajo Nation Office of the Controller ("OOC"), acting upon the recommendation of the Navajo Nation Investment Committee, shall oversee investment of the NNFRF in accordance with ARPA and Fiscal Recovery Funds requirements, U.S. Treasury regulations and guidance, and applicable Navajo Nation Investment Policies; investment earnings, when realized, shall be deposited into the NNFRF.
- F. Any funds deposited into the NNFRF shall only be used in compliance with ARPA and Fiscal Recovery Fund purposes and restrictions, U.S. Treasury guidance, applicable federal laws and regulations, Navajo Nation laws, regulations, and policies, and duly adopted procedures and agreements between the Navajo Nation and the federal government regarding the use of the Fiscal Recovery Funds.
- G. Except as set forth in Sections Five through Seven below, expenditures of the NNFRF shall only be authorized through Expenditure Plan(s) duly adopted by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of all members of the Navajo Nation Council and approved by the President of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11) and (12).
- H. OOC and all entities receiving NNFRF shall keep records sufficient to demonstrate that the Fiscal Recovery Funds appropriated by the U.S. Congress to the Navajo Nation have been used in accordance with the provisions of ARPA. The NNFRF shall be subject to an annual audit by the Navajo Nation's independent auditor. Either the Navajo Nation Council or the Navajo Nation President may require an audit at any time. The Controller shall be responsible for providing any and all records and financial reports required by the U.S. Treasury.

- I. Within thirty (30) days of the effective date of this legislation, OOC shall set up an online accountability platform on the NNOOC website that will enable the public to observe the financial transactions conducted with NNFRF funds. To the maximum extent possible and consistent with applicable Navajo Nation and federal laws pertaining to confidential or proprietary information and documents, all checks, electronic deposits, funds transfers, contracts and contract amendments, and other documents supporting NNFRF expenditures shall be displayed on the platform and made available for public view.

SECTION FOUR. NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND EXPENDITURE PLAN ELIGIBILITY DETERMINATIONS AND APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

- A. The Office of Management and Budget ("OMB"), in consultation with OOC and Navajo Nation Department of Justice ("NNDOJ"), shall develop NNFRF application and review procedures, which shall include an NNFRF Expenditure Plan template, for adoption by the Budget and Finance Committee. OMB and OOC shall post the approved NNFRF application procedures, including an NNFRF Expenditure Plan template, and instructions on their respective websites.
- B. The NNDOJ shall do an initial determination of whether a NNFRF funding request satisfies the legal requirements of the Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions of ARPA and applicable Navajo Nation laws, regulations, and policies and procedures.
- C. Navajo Nation Divisions and Offices, non-LGA-certified Chapters, LGA-certified Chapters, Navajo Nation-owned enterprises/authorities/corporations, non-profit corporations and external entities seeking NNFRF funds shall comply with the requirements set forth in this legislation and with the requirements set forth in the NNFRF application procedures adopted by resolution of the Budget and Finance Committee ("BFC").
- D. Each proposed NNFRF Expenditure Plan shall identify and designate a Responsible Entity who shall be held accountable for the compliance, implementation, monitoring, and accounting of the proposed projects, proposals, services and/or related assistance.
- E. Following NNFRF Expenditure Plan approval by the Navajo Nation Council and President, the Navajo Nation, with the assistance of NNDOJ, shall enter into a binding agreement, such as a, grant or sub-recipient agreement, with each Responsible Entity, other than Navajo Nation divisions and offices and non-

LGA-certified chapters, to ensure that all Navajo Nation laws and regulations are followed and complied with at all times.

- F. NNFRF Expenditure Plans involving construction activities shall include a contingency reserve consistent with industry standards adequate to cover projected inflation-based cost increases. The contingency reserve shall only be released by OOC to the Responsible Entity upon receipt of documented justification for the cost increase. After Expenditure Plan completion, any unused contingency funds shall be returned to the NNFRF.
- G. The total funds allocated in an approved NNFRF Expenditure Plan for a non-Navajo Nation government program or office, including Navajo Nation-owned enterprises/authorities/corporations, may include an allocation for administrative costs at a rate not to exceed two percent (2%) of service or project cost to defray the costs of implementing, administering and monitoring said Expenditure Plan and its underlying services and projects.
- H. Until the third quarter of 2024, NNFRF Expenditure Plans for direct financial assistance to enrolled Navajo Nation members, not including business economic relief or similar programs, shall be limited to ten percent (10%) of the total Fiscal Recovery Funds received by the Navajo Nation. After the second quarter of 2024, unallocated or unexpended NNFRF funds can be allocated for direct financial assistance to enrolled members through resolution of the Navajo Nation Council and approval of the President pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C) (10), (11) and (12).

SECTION FIVE. IMMEDIATE ALLOCATION OF NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS TO REIMBURSE SÍHASIN FUND ALLOCATIONS AND UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE APPROPRIATIONS

OOC, in consultation with OMB, shall immediately reimburse the Síhasin Fund and Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance ("UUFb") from the NNFRF for any allocations or appropriations wherein the approving Navajo Nation Council resolution authorized such reimbursement and NNDOJ deems such reimbursement(s) legally defensible under the Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions of ARPA. OMB shall report the amount and status of such reimbursements to the Naabik'íyáti' Committee and the Office of President and Vice-President no later than sixty (60) days after the effective date of this legislation.

SECTION SIX. IMMEDIATE ALLOCATION OF NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS TO DEFUNDED NAVAJO NATION CARES FUND PROJECTS

The Navajo Nation hereby immediately allocates NNFRF funds to replace the Navajo Nation CARES Fund funds that were reallocated to the Navajo Nation Hardship Assistance Expenditure Plan pursuant to Navajo Nation Council Resolution No. CJY-67-20 and Naabik'íyáti' Committee Resolutions No. NABIO-49-20 and NABID-63-20, as well as any CARES Fund funding that was voluntarily returned to the Nation because the project approved by the Navajo Nation Council could not be completed by the federal CARES Act deadline(s). OMB, with the assistance of OOC, shall report the amount and status of such allocations to the Naabik'íyáti' Committee and the Office of President and Vice-President no later than sixty (60) days after the effective date of this legislation.

SECTION SEVEN. IMMEDIATE ALLOCATION OF NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS TO FUND CENTRAL SUPPORT AND REGULATORY SERVICES

- A. The Navajo Nation hereby immediately allocates ten percent (10%) of all Fiscal Recovery Funds received by the Navajo Nation to fund central support service and regulatory costs.
- B. The Office of the President and Vice-President shall be responsible for apportioning ninety percent (90%) of the ten percent (10%) amount amongst Executive Branch programs and offices providing central support and regulatory services, including, the Office of the President and Vice-President, Office of the Controller, Office of Management and Budget, Department of Justice, Navajo Nation Washington Office, Division of Human Resources, Division of Community Development, and other Divisions and offices providing central support and/or regulatory services.
- C. The Speaker of the Navajo Nation Council, after consultation with the Naabik'íyáti' Committee, shall be responsible for apportioning ten percent (10%) of the ten percent (10%) amount amongst Legislative Branch programs and offices providing central support services, including the Office of Legislative Services, Office of Legislative Counsel, Office of the Speaker, and Navajo Nation Council.
- D. The programs and offices receiving NNFRF for central support and/or regulatory services shall use such funding to develop the legal, financial, organizational, managerial, administrative, regulatory, and reporting framework necessary to support the expeditious completion of NNFRF funded projects and the provision of NNFRF funded services.
- E. The detailed budgets for the NNFRF funding allocated here for central support and regulatory services shall be processed through the executive or administrative review process

applicable to each Branch and shall not require further legislative action.

- F. Any central support and/or regulatory services funding unspent or unencumbered at the end of the second quarter of Fiscal Year 2024 shall be reallocated to the NNFRF and be available for allocation to other NNFRF projects and services.

SECTION EIGHT. AUTHORIZING THE OFFICE OF THE CONTROLLER TO DISTRIBUTE FUNDS FROM THE NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND

- A. After reimbursement of the Síhasin Fund and UUFB, allocations to the defunded Navajo Nation CARES Fund projects, and the release of the immediate disbursements provided for in this legislation, OOC shall only release and distribute NNFRF funds in conformance with duly adopted Expenditure Plans enacted by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of all members of the Navajo Nation Council and approved by the President of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11) and (12).
- B. Expenditure Plan funds shall not be released to LGA-certified Chapters, Navajo Nation-owned enterprises/authorities/corporations, non-profit corporations and/or external entities until a binding agreement, e.g., grant or sub-recipient agreement, has been executed between the Navajo Nation and the respective Responsible Entity.
- C. OOC shall be responsible for ensuring that withdrawals from all invested NNFRF funds are timed to balance Expenditure Plan needs with maximum investment earnings.
- D. OOC shall coordinate and collaborate with each Responsible Entity to ensure that all applicable Navajo Nation and federal financial, accounting, and reporting laws and regulations are adhered to and strictly followed.
- E. OOC and the respective Responsible Entity shall provide a written and oral report to the Naabik'íyáti' Committee and the Office of President and Vice-President on or about thirty (30) days after the end of each fiscal year quarter; such report will present an overview and status of all NNFRF funded projects, recommended modifications or adjustments to projects, and compliance challenges, if any.

SECTION NINE. APPLICABILITY AND WAIVER OF NAVAJO NATION APPROPRIATIONS ACT PROVISIONS TO NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS

- A. The NNFRF are externally restricted funds awarded to the Navajo Nation solely for the purposes set forth in the Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions of ARPA. Accordingly, only those provisions of the Appropriations Act, 12 N.N.C. § 800 *et seq.*, that are expressly applicable to externally restricted funds, and any future provisions in the Budget Instructions Manual(s) expressly applicable to NNFRF, as approved by the Budget and Finance Committee, shall apply to the NNFRF and all Expenditure Plan(s) funded thereunder.
- B. NNFRF shall not be a part of, and shall not be, included in the Navajo Nation Fiscal Year Comprehensive Budget and the Navajo Nation hereby waives the application of 12 N.N.C. § 820 [Overall Budget Policies], § 830 [Budget Planning and Preparation], § 840 [Budget Approval, Adoption and Certification], § 850 [Budget Implementation, Monitoring and Control], § 860 [Capital Improvement Process], and § 870 [Local Government Improvement Funds] to the NNFRF and all Expenditure Plan(s) funded thereunder.

SECTION TEN. AMENDING 12 N.N.C. § 334 TO AUTHORIZE EMERGENCY PROCUREMENTS FOR NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND EXPENDITURES

- A. Until such time as Navajo Nation procurement laws and regulations are amended to specifically support NNFRF procurements, the Navajo Nation hereby amends 12 N.N.C. § 334 as set forth below.

Title Twelve
Fiscal Matters
Chapter 3. Navajo Nation Procurement Act
Subchapter 1. General Provisions

§ 334. Emergency Procurement

- A. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Director, Division of Finance, Purchasing Department, the head of a purchasing agency, or a designee of either officer may make or authorize others to make emergency procurement when there exists a threat to public health, welfare, or safety under emergency conditions as defined in regulations promulgated by the Budget and Finance Committee; provided that such emergency procurement shall be made with such competition as is practicable under the circumstances. A written determination of emergency shall be made by the executive director of the affected division, in concert with the Director, Division of Finance, Purchasing Department or authorized designee, and a

representative of the Attorney General's Office (or the Office of Legislative Counsel for emergency procurements by the Legislative Branch). To the extent possible, certified entities under the Navajo Nation Business Opportunity Act, 5 N.N.C. § 201 *et seq.*, shall receive preference in emergency procurement. The written determination and the selection of the particular contractor shall be included in the contract file. No oversight committee approval shall be required for these contracts.

- B. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, procurements using Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds may be authorized and executed as Emergency Procurements at the discretion of the Procuring Party without further justification; provided that such emergency procurement shall be made with such competition as is practicable under the circumstances. To the extent possible, certified entities under the Navajo Nation Business Opportunity Act, 5 N.N.C. § 201 *et seq.*, that are able to complete the good or service within the Fiscal Recovery Fund's strict deadlines shall receive preference in emergency procurement. No oversight committee approval shall be required for these contracts.

- B. Until such time as the Budget and Finance Committee amends the Navajo Nation Procurement Rules and Regulations ("Procurement Regulations") adopted by BFD-192-03, procurements using NNFRF funds shall be deemed to satisfy the definition of EMERGENCY CONDITION set forth at Section VII (B) of the Procurement Regulations without further justification; and the written application and concurrence requirements set forth at Section VII (C) of the Procurement Regulations shall not apply to such procurements.
- C. As set forth in the Navajo Business Opportunity Act, if there are no responsive and responsible Priority One or Priority Two vendors responding to the Nation's solicitation for NNFRF funded goods, services, or construction and construction related services, who are qualified and able to meet the requirements of the procurement, including the demonstrated ability to meet the ARPA and NNFRF time deadlines, the Procuring Party may contract with companies not included on the Business Source List maintained by the Business Regulatory Department, as long as such companies agree to comply with Navajo Nation laws, regulations, and policies, including the Navajo Preference in Employment Act and Navajo Business Opportunity Act.

- D. Navajo citizens, Navajo-owned businesses and non-profits, Navajo business-support organizations, such as the Dineh Chamber of Commerce, and Navajo Nation-owned enterprises/authorities/corporations shall be provided a meaningful opportunity to comment before amendments are made to Navajo Nation procurement laws and regulations.

SECTION ELEVEN. AUTHORIZING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND OFFICE WITHIN THE OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENT

- A. The Office of the President and Vice-President ("OPVP") is authorized to establish a temporary NNFRF Office within OPVP by Executive Order pursuant to 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(A) and (C) (14).
- B. The NNFRF Office shall be a clearinghouse that will, at a minimum, educate the public on NNFRF matters; coordinate, facilitate and implement NNFRF responsibilities assigned to OPVP or the Executive Branch; ensure expeditious review of NNFRF eligibility determinations and other NNFRF matters by Executive Branch programs and offices; ensure Navajo Nation compliance with Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions of ARPA and Navajo Nation laws and regulations by all entities receiving NNFRF funds; facilitate and expedite the expenditure of all NNFRF funds; ensure the completion and implementation of NNFRF authorized projects and services; and assist/support OOC in monitoring the expenditure of NNFRF funds and submitting timely and accurate ARPA reports to the federal government.
- C. Prior to its opening, OPVP shall present a plan of operation or similar structural document for the NNFRF Office to the Naabik'íyáti' Committee. On or about thirty (30) days after the end of each fiscal year quarter, OPVP shall present a report to the Naabik'íyáti' Committee on overall NNFRF Office operations, accomplishments, and challenges, along with recommended modifications or adjustments to projects and processes.
- D. OPVP and OOC shall only contract with qualified and experienced Navajo Nation-owned enterprises/authorities/corporation or Navajo-owned businesses to assist in the implementation, management, and monitoring of NNFRF funds.
- E. In order to support the purposes and intent of the Navajo Nation Business Opportunity Act and Navajo Nation Preference in Employment Act, within fifty (50) days after the enactment of this legislation, the NNFRF Office shall present a plan to the Budget and Finance and Naabik'íyáti' Committees to provide

bonding, insurance, and other needed support to grow the Navajo Nation economy through private sector contracting, using ARPA, NNFRF, and/or other Navajo Nation or external funding.

SECTION ELEVEN. EFFECTIVE DATE

This legislation shall be effective upon its approval pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 221(B).

SECTION TWELVE. SAVING CLAUSE


Should any provision of this legislation be determined invalid by the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, or a District Court of the Navajo Nation without appeal to the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, those provisions of the legislation which are not determined invalid shall remain the law of the Navajo Nation.

SECTION THIRTEEN. DIRECTIVES

- A. OMB, in consultation with OOC and DOJ, shall present proposed NNFRF application and review procedures, including an NNFRF Expenditure Plan template, to the Budget and Finance Committee within twenty (20) days after the effective date of this legislation.
- B. The Division of Natural Resources and General Land Development Department shall present a proposed Plan of Operation for a "One-Stop Shop" to facilitate, review, and approval of rights-of-ways, temporary construction permits, mission site permits, leases, etc., to the Resources and Development Committee within forty-five (45) days after the effective date of this legislation.
- C. The Division of Human Resources and Department of Personnel Management shall present proposed amendments to the Navajo Nation Personnel Policies Manual to, at a minimum, facilitate the expeditious hiring of personnel with NNFRF funds to the Health, Education, and Human Services Committee within sixty (60) days after the effective date of this legislation.
- D. OPVP, with the assistance of the Business Regulatory Department and OOC Purchasing Section, shall present proposed amendments to the Navajo Nation's procurement and business opportunity laws and regulations to, at a minimum, expedite NNFRF procurements, to the Budget and Finance Committee within sixty (60) days after the effective date of this legislation.

Attached please find the most current Indian Health Service (IHS) Sanitation Deficiency System (SDS) report for domestic water, waste water and solid waste unmet needs for existing Navajo homes. The SDS is mandated by Public Law 94-437, the Indian Health Care Improvement Act, as amended. Although we update this list annually and submit it to our Headquarters office for inclusion into the national list, it may be amended at any time, and we seek and welcome your comments for the purpose of thoroughness. This Navajo SDS list was reviewed and updated during the 2021 calendar year, and was officially made part of the IHS Headquarters record on November 16, 2021.

The first page of the report is a summary of the identified reportable and eligible sanitation deficiencies for the Navajo Nation. The following six pages of the report is a one-line listing of the 349 reportable sanitation facilities projects, in priority order, that are necessary to correct these sanitation deficiencies. The funding priority is based on several scoring factors, with the dominant factors being the deficiency levels and the cost per home of each project.

The total estimated cost of all reportable Navajo Area projects is approximately \$543.3 million, an increase of \$7.7 million from the previous year.

In preparing this SDS list we have worked with the local Chapters, the Navajo Tribal Utility Authority, and the Nation's Department of Water Resources. More employees are telecommuting due to COVID-19 and in the event the Nation shuts down again, this will be even more critical. These security measures will ensure business continuity and data loss prevention for every day communication (i.e. email, email encryption, Virtual Private Network, SharePoint, teleconferencing, telecommuting) and provide a secure Identity Management. Cybersecurity will cover the 695 laptops purchased from CARES Act Funding and any mobile device (i.e. laptops, iPads, tablets, Surface, phones) connecting to the NN network. The proposal stops the spread of the spread of COVID-19 by reducing the movement of individuals and promoting social distancing, enhancing telework capabilities and improving cybersecurity.

This project will benefit NN Government agencies and all stakeholders. NN employees will benefit as the NN Insurance premiums will decrease as soon as multi-factor authentication is implemented. The cybersecurity technologies in this project supports public health, emergency management, health command center, telehealth services, emergency medical responses, including emergency medical transportation, law enforcement and townhall meetings. The cybersecurity technologies protect Navajo Nation data whether it is in transit or at rest. From email communication to data stored in a database to data sharing to video conferencing. Cybersecurity attacks are on the rise for all Government entities and the Nation strives to mitigate attacks by nefarious entities taking advantage of a Nation dealing with the pandemic. Secure access (internally and externally) and faster access to critical data and services is of paramount importance. Proposed ARPA Funding Plan for NN Cybersecurity

SUMMARY

The Navajo Nation's network security is more critical more than ever due to the ongoing pandemic and the need to ensure business continuity for every day network communication. DIT will implement layered security measures to improve the security posture. Measures such as email encryption, multi-factor authentication, email filtering/phishing protect and network access control.

DIT procured 695 laptops from the CARES funds act for NN employees to use to telecommute resulting in approximately over 20% of NN employees with the capability to telecommute. Many other NN employees have laptops and other mobile devices that can be used for telework. Due to this fact, communications need to be secured. Securing communications to transport sensitive data for NN employees and will streamline processes within NDOH regarding COVID data processing.

The NN Government as a whole is sending more confidential data over the internet to outside stakeholders. As an example, Division of Behavioral and Mental Health Services, the Health Command Operations Center, Insurance Services, Department of Personnel Management and the Office of the Controller have sensitive COVID data that needs protection. These departments need to share this data with other parties like IHS and regional health care facilities which is imperative to the decision-making process by NN Leadership and OPVP to mitigate COVID.

The following cybersecurity measures are applicable only to systems maintained by the Navajo Nation Department of Information Technology (DIT). Those listed in the "Out of Scope" column in Table 1 are excluded.

DIT will use a risk-based approach to cybersecurity. DIT will find and classify confidential and sensitive data on the Navajo Nation network. DIT will implement security standards on workstations and networks. DIT will implement security measures to improve security posture by ensuring the Navajo Nation network resources are used for Navajo Nation business purposes only.

Then a risk assessment of each department/program's security measures will be performed by DIT. Departments will benefit from centralized administration and management of their systems. The Navajo Nation's security posture will improve greatly as we progress through this plan.

TO IMMEDIATELY IMPROVE THE NAVAJO NATION'S SECURITY POSTURE AND HAVE A NOTICEABLE AND POSITIVE EFFECT

DIT will purchase and implement Email Encryption, Email Filtering/Phishing Protection, Multifactor Authentication, and Network Access Control.

Email Encryption has long been on the table for DIT. This will ensure that only the intended recipient will be about to read the contents of an email. Policies can also be put in place to scan for PII and other sensitive information. The overall confidence of third-parties doing business with the Navajo Nation will increase regarding security.

Email Filtering/Phishing Protecting will analyze incoming emails for red flags that signal spam/phishing content and automatically move those emails to quarantine.

Multifactor Authentication eliminates the threat of brute-force and social-engineering attacks by requiring two pieces of information for authentication, something you know (username/password) and something you have (temporary passcode). When implemented, a login to OWA or SharePoint will require

a username/password combination PLUS and one-time code provided to the end-user via email, SMS or phone call.

The implementation of the proposed Navajo Nation Cybersecurity plan is wholly dependent on acquiring funding in the amount of \$5,000,000.00. Below is a prioritization of tools and services required.

Due to the pandemic, these types of facilities have been overrun with the number of incoming patients. Additional facilities and renovations are needed to avoid overcrowding support facilities, which can increase the transmission rate of the COVID-19 virus. Each facility will have space for 10 patients for detox services and outpatient treatment services, including traditional healing grounds and recreational facilities. The residential facilities will offer a comprehensive care recovery process with constant support services.

The Navajo Department of Health (NDOH) is submitting this supplemental memo to provide justification for our funding request in the amount of \$5 million for the planning, design, and construction of a dedicated public health materials and goods storage warehouse that will support the services we continue to provide to the Nation during this ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

Public Health and Economic Impacts:

Due to a continued widespread supply shortage and an ongoing pandemic, the Nation continues to purchase larger volumes of food and supplies to meet greater than expected economic and public health needs throughout the Nation.

As of March 8, 2022, the Nation continues to have both confirmed cases and deaths of our community members from COVID-19 as shown in the most recent NDOH situation report:¹

It is unknown when this pandemic will end, and the supply market continues to be volatile. The NDOH supplies PPE, goods, and services to covid and non-covid individuals requiring isolation and quarantine to reduce the spread of covid. The department oversees the Health Command Operations Center, within in this structure, Community Health Representatives, Health Educators, Public Health Nurses, and the Special Diabetes Program staff have assisted the pandemic response by ensuring over 10,000 PPE (masks, cleaning supplies, food) were provided to community members between October to December 2021 and 2,561 patients with covid or was exposed to covid received a food between October to March 9, 2022. NDOH purchases and receives donations of gloves, face shields, masks, cleaning supplies, medical supplies, isolation and quarantine kits, equipment, wood, water, toilet tissue, Kleenex, diapers, baby products, and hand sanitizers. NDOH purchases food to include canned food, water, honey, oatmeal, dry food products for adults and children, including traditional foods (flour, beans).

Supply Chain Issues:

The COVID-19 pandemic resulted in a global, national, and regional wide disruptions in the availability of PPE supplies, goods, materials, and food due to supply chain issues and panic buying.

The Navajo Nation continues to struggle through the pandemic by not only trying to locate and secure supplies but also struggles with storing supplies that can facilitate the needs of our 300,000 community members over a very large geographic area that encompasses nearly 27K square miles. Almost all the 110 Chapters of the Navajo Nation do not have storage space/warehouses and continue to rely on the central government to store and deliver PPE and food during this ongoing pandemic.

Alternative Considerations:

The Navajo Nation has a critical shortage of reliable, safe, secure storage spaces for public health supplies. The volume of PPE required to meet not only the needs of the Nations Divisions/Programs/Clinics, but to also meet the needs of community members, far exceeds regular storage spaces that are traditionally available in more urban areas. The space needs to meet the Nation's needs are approximately 50,000 square feet. Leasing facilities of this size that can be centrally located in not an option.

Summary

Having a centralized warehouse will reduce the number of haphazard storage points currently being utilized, will improve supply availability, will reduce the need of our community members to travel long distances and exposing themselves to contracting COVID-19, and will provide for easier access, distribution, and quicker, more efficient delivery of public health supplies throughout the Nation.



In addition, individuals are turning to substances to ease their anxiety, depression, and stress related to pandemic. The increase in This funding will provide three transitional housing facilities for recovery from mental health or substance abuse. The overcrowding in support facilities can increase the transmission rate of the COVID-19 virus, therefore additional facilities are needed to accommodate the number of patients to ensure the ability to offer services safely. Funding will be used to construct three new transitional housing facilities.

A transitional house is typically used as an intermediate step, transitioning from a recovery facility back into daily life. Allowing for a transitional space gives the individual an opportunity to begin resuming normal activities before re immersion into daily life. This transition period promotes confidence and has been shown to reduce the likely recurrence of mental health issues and substance abuse.

3. The Local Governance Act (LGA) and Title 26 granted certain governmental authority to oversee and make local decision of local matters in the best interest of the local community in utilization of local resources; and,
4. The Coalmine Canyon Chapter believes that the natural scenic landscape and historical cultural sites contribute to the tourist industry. Therefore, the chapter has included the Dinosaur Tracks for economic development in the Chapter Land Use Plan approved by the Resource and Development Committee on January 11, 2017 with the intent of preserving the natural scenic integrity of 73.88 acres which is considered a factor to attracting and retaining this economic investment; and,

The Coalmine Canyon Chapter is aware of all the negative tourism activities at the Dinosaur Tracks and desires to enhance the tourist visiting experience by establishing amenities such as a restroom facilities, vending booths, designated parking spaces, employing trained professional guides and other improvements as needed.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:



CSWTA, Inc., Archaeological Consultants conducted a cultural resources inventory survey which included both a Traditional Cultural Properties Assessment and an Archaeological Survey for the proposed Dinosaur Track Commercial site. The project survey was done at the request of the To'Nanees'Dizi Chapter of Tuba City, Arizona. Navajo speaking personnel of CSWTA, Inc. conducted the Traditional Cultural Properties assessment. Files were checked at the Traditional Culture Program office in Window Rock, Arizona for sacred places. A pedestrian archaeological survey was conducted by Carol S. Yazzie-Ward and Loretta Flatrock on May 7, 2011 under NNHPD permit B11281.

The field assessment and surveys conducted totaled an area of approximately 73.88 acres. The survey recorded one cultural resources site #AZ-K-59-15 which is a paleontological site.

Archaeological clearance is recommended for the proposed Dinosaur Commercial project site.

INTRODUCTION

On May 7, 2011, Carol S. Yazzie-Ward and Loretta Flatrock with CSWTA, Inc. conducted a cultural resources inventory survey on approximately 73.88 acres of land at the request of To'Nanees'Dizi Chapter of Tuba City, Arizona for the proposed Dinosaur Track Commercial site. One cultural resource was inventoried and no traditional cultural property or sacred places were inventoried. The cultural resources inventory was completed under Navajo Nation Cultural Resources Inventory Permit #B11281 issued to CSWTA, Inc.

DESCRIPTION OF UNDERTAKING

CSWTA, Inc., Archaeological Consultants conducted a cultural resources inventory survey which included both a Traditional Cultural Properties assessment and an Archaeological Survey on 73.88 acre parcel of land at the request of To'Nanees'Dizi Chapter of Tuba City, Arizona. The Traditional Cultural Properties assessment was conducted by Navajo speaking personnel of CSWTA, Inc. Loretta Flatrock conducted a pedestrian archaeological survey on May 7, 2011 under NNHPD permit B11281.

The To'Nanees'Dizi Chapter proposes to develop a commercial project site on a 1,760.18 feet by 1,828.37 feet square parcel of land. The chapter will develop the area around the dinosaur tracks for tourism that is adjacent to the Moenave Road and a vendor area with parking area. The total area of potential effect equals 3,218,260.30 square feet or 73.88 acres. Ground disturbance may be expected to be intensive and extensive from the use of heavy equipment.

EXISTING DATA REVIEW

Before fieldwork was conducted a site file search of the project area was conducted at the Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Department (NNHPD) in Window Rock, Arizona. The file search indicated that no sites were previously recorded within 300 feet of the project area. One project was previously reported: #HPD 06-616. No Traditional Cultural Properties or sacred places were previously recorded within 300 feet of the project area.

AREA ENVIRONMENTAL AND CULTURAL SETTING

The project area is located in the vicinity southwest Tuba City, Coconino County, Arizona at an elevation between 4,589 feet to 4,608 feet above mean sea level. The project is at Moenave Road (graded and improved dirt road) and US Highway 160 junction in rolling sand dunes and shallow sandy deposits overlying sandstone bedrock. Deep Aeolian sands cover much of the project site. The nearest water resource is Moenkopi Wash to the south of the project area.

The project area is located within the Navajo Nation section of the Colorado Plateau. The dominant geologic formation in these areas is generally sandstone in origin with lesser amounts of shale, volcanic and alluvial deposits. Soils include both well and poorly sorted Aeolian sands, clay and alluvium. These high desert environments provide few water resources. Annual precipitation may be less than 10 inches. Area weather is moderate throughout the year at this elevation. Snow is uncommon and summer temperatures of 100° are common.




Figure 1. Project area on Moenave SE Quadrangle, 7.5-minute series, Coconino County, Arizona within the To'Nanees'Dizi Chapter.





Figure 2. Detailed map of the Dinosaur Track Commercial Site on 73.88 acres.

Wind is frequently an extreme force for the area. Vegetation consists of ring muhly, globemallow, shadescale, locoweed, verbena, yucca, galleta, greasewood, stinkweed, Indian ricegrass and tamarisk.

Prehistoric Anasazi people settled this region because of permanent water, ample game to hunt and sustainable agriculture. Modern usage is Navajo.

FIELD METHODS

The archaeological survey was conducted on May 7, 2011, inclusive, by CSWTA, Inc. archaeological crewmembers were Carol S. Yazzie-Ward and Loretta Flatrock. Approximately 73.88 acres were surveyed for the proposed Dinosaur Track Commercial project site. The survey included a buffer zone of 50 feet around the perimeter of the project area. The total area surveyed equaled 3,400,187.80 square feet or 78.05 acres. All exposed ground surfaces were carefully examined and special attention was given areas of erosion and deflation. The area was surveyed by sub-parallel pedestrian transects spaced 10-12 meters apart. The area has been heavily impacted for many years by vehicle and pedestrian traffic. Priscilla Littlefoot, Executive Manager and Robert Yazzie, Vice-President of To'Nanees'Dizi Chapter were interviewed for knowledge of Traditional Cultural Properties or sacred places.

CULTURAL RESOURCE FINDINGS

Location/Identification of Each Resource

One cultural resources site was inventoried. This paleontological site has hundreds of dinosaur footprints dated back to approximately 200 million years ago. The dinosaur tracks have been a tourist attraction for many years along this stretch of Moenave Road. Now several unorganized vendor booths are adjacent to the tracks. The To'Nanees'Dizi Chapter is proposing to develop this area to protect the dinosaur tracks from further vandalism. Allowing tourists to walk over the area only on designated trails. No Traditional Cultural Properties or sacred places were inventoried.

Significant areas of tracks and other fossils yet to be unearthed from erosion or exploitation is likely for the greater area.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Archaeological clearance is recommended for the proposed Dinosaur Track Commercial project site with associated utilities. Intragovernmental Land Use Agreement

This Intragovernmental Land Use Agreement (hereinafter "Use Agreement") is made and entered into between the Division of Economic Development (hereinafter "DED"), P.O. Box 663, Window Rock, AZ 86515, and the Navajo Nation Tourism Department.

WHEREAS the DED is a Division of the Navajo Nation, formed under the Division of Economic Development Master Plan of Operation and is existing under the laws of the Navajo Nation; and

WHEREAS the DED currently has Shiprock Visitor Complex Center, more fully described below: and

WHEREAS the lot is currently withdrawn for Shiprock Visitor Complex Center purposes and is under the jurisdiction of Navajo Nation Division of Economic Development; and

WHEREAS the Navajo Nation Division of Economic Development Navajo Tourism Department is an agency in the Executive Branch of the Navajo Nation duly created by the Navajo Nation Council, which is currently in need of space for carrying out its duties and responsibilities for operating the Shiprock Visitor Complex Center; and

NOW THEREFORE the parties agree that the Navajo Tourism Department may occupy and use the lot and building for the period described below, and under the terms and conditions of this Use Agreement. It is explicitly understood that this Use Agreement is between two Navajo Nation departments/agencies for use by the Navajo Nation government and thus does not impact alienation or demise of any interest in real property held in trust by the Navajo Nation, since both parties are entities of the Navajo Nation. Therefore, the Navajo Nation does not need to lease to itself and thus does not need to comply under the Navajo Nation Business Site Leasing Regulations of 2005 and the Administrative and Management Plan.

THE SPACE COVERED BY THIS AGREEMENT

The space which is covered by this Use Agreement is a building and a lot of approximately 7.0± acres located in Shiprock, New Mexico, and specifically described below:

LEGAL DESCRIPTION (survey attached).

The drawings and specifications for this space are attached to this Use Agreement as Attachment A and are incorporated herein by reference and made a part of this Use Agreement.

TERM OF USE

The Navajo Tourism Department will occupy the premises described above for twenty-five (25) term years. This Use Agreement shall terminate once the lot has been officially withdrawn for Shiprock Visitor Complex Center purposes. The Navajo Tourism Department may extend its occupancy by giving written notice thereof to the DED.

WITHDRAWAL OF LAND

The Navajo Tourism Department shall amend the purpose of the withdrawal of this lot in compliance with the Land Withdrawal Designation Regulations, RDCJN-33-15. DED shall cooperate as needed in processing and approving the amendment of the land withdrawal.

COMPENSATION FOR USE

Compensation is to be paid by the Navajo Tourism Department to the general funds in the amount of zero \$0.00 (0) dollar per month, which shall be paid on the first day of each month during the Term of Use. This Use Agreement is contingent upon the availability of funds.

TERMS AND CONDITION OF USE

1. **FIXTURES AND PERSONAL PROPERTY.** Trade fixture signs, and personal property not permanently affixed to the property shall remain the property of the Navajo Tourism Department and the Navajo Tourism Department shall have the right to remove such fixtures and property. Any improvements to the property, excluding personal property and trade fixtures, shall become a part of the property and will remain under the control of the Navajo Tourism Department at the termination of this Use Agreement.

2. **REPAIRS AND MAINTENANCES.** The Navajo Tourism Department shall maintain and keep in good condition the roof, exterior wall, structural parts of the premises, the fire protection system, structural floor, and pipes and conduits outside the premises for furnishing various utilities to the premises. DED will not be responsible for damage to these items which is caused by the negligence or intentional conduct of the Navajo Tourism Department, nor will it be responsible for consequential damages sustained by the Navajo Tourism Department from the failure of items to be maintained.

The Navajo Tourism Department shall be responsible for all other maintenance and repair of the premises covered by this Use Agreement. This shall include, but not limited to, the utility meters, pipes, conduits, fixtures, storefronts, signs, locks, closing devices, window sashes, cases, door and door frames, floor covering, and specifically to all internal and external glass.

3. **RIGHT TO MAKE ALTERATIONS.** The Navajo Tourism Department may make alterations to the premises which must be consistent with the character and the structure of the lot and space.

4. **CONDUCT OF BUSINESS.** The Navajo Tourism Department, under the terms and conditions of this Use Agreement, will use the premises solely and exclusively for conducting the business of the Navajo Tourism Department and will not permit the premises to be used for any other purpose. In the conduct of such business, the Navajo Tourism Department will keep the premises neat, clean, and fully accessible as determined and required by the DED.

5. SIGNAGE. All signage must be installed at the sole expense of the Navajo Tourism Department, and must be removed at the sole expense of the Navajo Tourism Department at the termination of its occupancy of the premises.

6. UTILITY SERVICE. The Navajo Tourism Department shall be responsible for all utilities, including water, sewer, electrical, and telephone lines and any installation costs necessary for the operation and construction for Navajo Tourism Department. The use charges for such utilities shall be paid solely and exclusively by the Navajo Tourism Department. If the DED is charged, at any time, for such utilities or any utility service used by the Navajo Tourism Department, the DED shall pass this cost onto the Navajo Tourism Department, and charge such utility costs to the account of the Navajo Tourism Department.

7. NOTICES. Any and all notices required to be given under this agreement shall be given in writing by ordinary mail and will be deemed given as of the date on which they are post marked. Notices, and copies thereof, must be given as specified below:

8. INTEGRATED DOCUMENT. It is understood that this Use Agreement is final and a fully integrated document representing the complete agreement of the parties and supersedes any and all other agreements, whether written or oral, governing the use of the particular DED space covered by the Use Agreement by the Navajo Tourism Department.

9. NO WAIVER. The acceptance of performance, or failure to object to, any breach, default, or failure of performance, under the terms of this Use Agreement, shall not constitute a waiver of the right to demand performance under this agreement as specified in the agreement.

10. NAVAJO NATION. The parties to this agreement affirm that, as agencies of the Navajo Nation, they are governed by all laws of the Navajo Nation. If a dispute arises under this Agreement, the Parties shall use their best faith efforts to resolve any dispute informally and as expeditiously as possible, through negotiations at the staff level. Each Party shall designate a staff person to meet with staff from the other Parties at a mutually agreeable time and place. The Parties will honor all reasonable requests for information. If the dispute cannot be resolved within five (5) days, the Parties will refer the matter to the Executive Division Director level for resolution. If the Parties are still unable to resolve the dispute, the matter will be referred to the President or his or her designee for resolution. In the event the Parties are from different Divisions, and the Parties are unable to resolve the dispute with the assistance of their Division Directors, the matter will be referred directly to the President or his or her designee.

11. AMENDMENT. The terms of this Use Agreement may be amended upon mutual written consent of the Parties and concurrence by the Navajo Nation Department of Justice.

1.0 Introduction

The Navajo Tourism Department of Window Rock, Arizona wishes make application for a business site lease to construct the proposed Shiprock Visitor Center on 7.0 acres of land in Shiprock, New Mexico. The proposed visitor center would provide tourist information and highway direction while visiting the Navajo Nation.

In regard to the Navajo Department of Fish and Wildlife Biological Resource Conservation Plan (RCP), the proposed action would be located in a designated Area 4, Community Development Area location – areas in and around towns with no restrictions on development. We request a biological resource compliance form for the proposed action. Figure 1 illustrates the location of the proposed business site along NM State Highway 491.



1.1 Description of the Proposed Action

Navajo Nation Tourism Department proposes to establish a business site lease on 7.0 acres of land. The proposed parcel encompasses former Chief Conoco Service Station in Shiprock, adjoining NM State Highway 491. A proposed visitor center with associated infrastructure, including parking, will be constructed within the proposed business site lease area. The proposed development will feature highway turnouts, a traveler welcome building and parking area. The visitor center building would be designed with a reception area, information and brochure counter, restrooms, a gift shop, beverage-food mart with table and chairs dining area, and a small theater. Infrastructure utility taps are operational and located nearby.

Paved turnouts from Highway 491 would access the business site. No access roads to the business site lease will be constructed. The proposed business site perimeter would be fenced for security, and to avoid livestock encroachment.

1.2 Location

The proposed Shiprock Visitor Center is located on USGS topographic map entitled *Shiprock, NM*, a 7.5 minute quadrangle map at Figure 1. The waypoint description of the project location is shown at Table 1.

At an elevation 4,890' amsl, the proposed business site tract is located in Shiprock, west of State Highway 491, Shiprock Chapter, San Juan County, New Mexico.

2.0 Existing Land Uses

The proposed business site tract is located on a vacant lot, formerly occupied by the Chief Conoco Service Station. Large concrete slabs are still evident of the former business site. The business site and vicinity property is located in an atypical riparian woodland biome. The ecosystem was characterized of natural cottonwood trees, willows, shrubs, perennial grasses, and forbs. Most of the natural woodland has been destroyed by previous agriculture development. The Navajo Land Little League baseball fields are located on the previous farming area, south of the proposed project area. The former Bureau of Indian Affairs farm and irrigation system were located just south of the proposed project area. The old irrigation system and old storage barns are still standing on vicinity properties.

On the south side of State Highway 491 right of way, NTUA utility corridors, fiber optic telecommunication line, scattered home sites, Wells Fargo Bank, the former BIA offices and housing, the old BIA farm and a vacant lots are the predominant land uses in the area. Utility corridors are located along Highway 491, including a NTUA water main line and natural gas line, under and above ground telecommunication fiber optic lines. The Shiprock hotel is proposed in the graded vacant lot next to the Wells Fargo Bank, adjacent to the project area on the south side.

On the north side of Highway 491, the Dine' Christian Church (formerly the Shiprock Chapter House), Sinclair Gas Station, Navajo Injury law firm, Shiprock VFW, and the Shiprock District Court House and police station are all located across Highway 491 from the proposed project area. There are approximately ten existing homes within 1/8 mile of the proposed project area. Nearest home

is located approximately one hundred yards north of the proposed development. The existing Farm Mesa irrigation canal is located northeast of the proposed project area, across Highway 491, adjacent to the abandoned gravel pit on the north side.

Soils onsite are largely atypical, disturbed from previous dumping, excavation and grading. Surface topography and geology/soils within the proposed project area is not expected to present any specific problems to the proposed project.

There are no Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) Subtitle D Solid Waste sites, illegal trash dumps on the proposed project area. There are no Resource Conservation & Recovery Act (RCRA) Subtitle C Hazardous Waste sites on the proposed project area, along the highway, nor on the perimeter of the proposed business site.

The former Chief Conoco Service Station Leaking Underground Storage Tank (LUST) monitoring wells are located onsite. Recent Navajo EPA monitoring well data indicate the LUST site is nearing a neutral state, e.g., the site is about cleaned up. Monitoring the LUST site will continue until the LUST is deemed safe.

3.0 Onsite Survey Methods

Onsite pedestrian surveys of the proposed project area were conducted on August 10, September 16, and October 9, 2019. The entire project area was covered during the field survey. Onsite habitat was evaluated for all Endangered Species Act (ESA), Navajo Endangered Species List species of concern (NESL), and Migratory Bird Treaty Act (MBTA) species. All conservation status species that have the potential to occur in the proposed project and action areas were looked for and considered.

Action Area

The proposed project action area would include additional area surrounding the proposed business site, called the zone of influence, which would consist of the surrounding terrain within a 1/8-mile (0.1 mile) radius of the proposed project area boundaries.

3.4 Vegetation and Wildlife - Biotic Resources

3.4.1 Existing Conditions

Riparian woodland along rivers below 6,000 feet are normally heavily vegetated with forests, or *Bosques* (Ivey, R. Dewitt, 1983). Currently, in the proposed project area, fallow fields and irrigation ditches are major features of this zone. Natural deciduous riparian woodland forest also extends and occurs along the San Juan River and streams flowing through the arid and semiarid basins of the Four Corners region. These forests trees are dominated by the Plains cottonwood *Populus deltoides*, subspecies *sargenta*, Fremont cottonwood *Populus fremonti*, or with thickets of Willows (*Salix* spp.) and groves of salt cedar *Tamarix ramosissima*, and Russian olive *Elaeagnus angustifolia*. These species are in effect ribbons of the *Deciduous Forest Biome* (Hiel, K. D., O'Kane S. L. Jr., Reeves, L. M., & Clifford, A., 2013), (Ivey, R. DeWitt, 2006) and (Turner, R.M. & Brown, 1994).

Shrubs of this biome include Coyote Willow *Salix exigua*, several other species of willow *Salix* spp., New Mexico olive *Forestiera pubescens*, Skunkbush *Rhus trilobata*, Salt Cedar *Tamarix chinensis*, Arctic rush *Juncus arcticus*, Horsetail rush *Equisetum hyemale*, Western golden top *Euthamia occidentalis*, Panicked bulrush sedge *Scirpus microcarpus*, Southern cattail *Typha domingensis*, Narrow leaf cattail *Typha latifolia*, and the Common reed, Carrizo *Phragmites australis*. (Hiel, K. D., O'Kane S. L. Jr., Reeves, L. M., & Clifford, A., 2013), (Ivey, R. DeWitt, 2006) and (Turner, R.M. & Brown, 1994).

Beside the rivers sandbars and dunes, marshes of rushes *Juncus* spp. and sedges *Carex* spp. are common, as are flats of saltgrass *Distichlis spicata*. Parodi scratchgrass *Muhlenbergia asperifolia* are located on sandbars and dunes (Hiel, K. D., O'Kane S. L. Jr., Reeves, L. M., & Clifford, A., 2013), (Ivey, Robert DeWitt, 2006) and (Turner, R.M. & Brown, 1994).

Annual plants (noxious weeds) such as cheatgrass *Bromus tectorum*, Russian thistle *Salsolia kali*, tansy mustard *Descurainia obtusa*, sunflower *Helianthus annuus*, and kochia weed *Bassia hyssopifolia* may occur on the parcel (Ivey, Robert DeWitt, 2006).

Birds, indigenous to the ecosystem, are the Mountain plover *Charadrius montanaca*, Catbird *Dumetella carolinensis*, Sparrow *Ammodramus*, Veery *Catharus fuscescens*, Red-head woodpecker *Melanerpes erythrocephalus*, and Yellow-breasted Chat *Icteria virens*. Other characteristic bird fauna of this ecosystem include the Black-billed magpie *Pica pica*, Eastern phoebe *Sayornis phoebe*, and American redstart *Setophaga ruticilla*. (Turner, R.M. & Brown, 1994). Due to the abundance of forage, Golden eagles *Aquila chrysaetos*, Cooper's hawk *Accipiter cooperii*, and Redtail hawks *Buteo jamaicensis* are occasionally sighted on the riparian woodlands.

Distinct fauna of the Riparian Woodland Ecosystem, vicinity properties, include the Beaver *Castor canadensis*, Muskrat *Ondatra zibethicus*, Western jumping mouse *Zapus princeps* and Raccoon *Procyon lotor*.

3.4.2 Effects

The existing tract is located in a community development area. The proposed project area has been generally cleared of the riparian woodland type except for a few thickets of shrubs and small trees along the former irrigation ditches. Near the entrance a few large cottonwood trees remain. Initial field surveys indicate that suitable foraging and nesting habitat for small mammals and birds is not present on the project area, therefore the proposed project would not cause a loss of potential nesting, cover and forage habitat for the terrestrial flora and fauna species.

3.4.3 Mitigation

Indirect mitigation is recommended for all fauna and flora on the proposed area. Natural vegetative habitat can be restored over time, if the area is left alone and without periodic clearing and burning. The proposed undertaking will have minimal effect on the existing vegetation and potential habitat in the area.

3.5 Endangered Species Act & Navajo Endangered Species List

3.5.1 Existing Conditions

The Navajo Department of Fish and Wildlife's *Biological Resource Land Clearance Policy and Procedures* (BRLCP&P) was consulted. The land clearance procedure qualifies the Shiprock Visitor Center tract and surrounding area as an Area 4, a community development area. Suitable ESA and NESL habitat is not found within the tract or adjacent to the tract in the zone of influence.

3.5.2 Effects

The project is not expected to affect any federally listed species, nor significantly impact any tribally listed species or other species of concern. Impacts posed by the proposed project can be expected to be minimal. Initial field surveys indicate that the T&E species are not present on the proposed project area, therefore the proposed project would not cause an incremental loss of potential nesting, cover and forage habitat. The proposed project area is in a community development setting, and will not have an effect on the habitat or other elements necessary for the continued survival of T&E species.

3.5.3 Mitigation

Construction activities shall be confined to the proposed project area to avoid further disruption of any foraging habitat. The proposed business site would be landscaped over time.

The single phase electrical powerline would be designed according to the avian protection on power lines. The *Navajo Nation Raptor Electrocution Prevention Regulations*, Navajo Council Resource and Development Committee Resolution RCS-43-08, would be complied with to reduce the unlikelihood of potential raptor electrocution. All single or three phase electrical power poles and cross arms would follow the design standards to protect Golden Eagles and Ferruginous Hawks. No other direct mitigation is recommended for the fauna species.

5.0 CONCLUSIONS


The preferred alternative and project description is logical and desirable. Project engineering feasibility has been considered. There is no federally designated critical habitat in vicinity of the project, and no wetland or riparian habitat occurrences on site. The proposed project should have no effect on ESA threatened and endangered species, NESL sensitive species, or MBTA species. The proposed action is insignificant, and would have no effect on sensitive wildlife.

RCP Designation/BRCF Request

Relative to the Navajo Department of Fish and Wildlife Biological Resource Land Clearance Policies and Procedures (RCP), the proposed project is located in an *Area 4 – Community Development Area*. An area with fewest restrictions on development, with the least impact on wildlife species. We request a biological resource compliance form for the proposed action.





THE CONCEPT OF INDIRECT AND INDUCED ECONOMIC IMPACTS

The impact of Rhino Health Expansion on the local and regional economies is greater than the total of the Rhino Health Expansion Project's (Project) direct spending on payroll, goods and services, and construction. This is because money spent by the Project is spent again by the recipient employees and local businesses. Employees use their salaries and wages to purchase goods and services from other businesses. Businesses make their own purchases and hire employees, who also spend their salaries and wages throughout the local and regional state economies.

This economic ripple effect is measured by what is known as an "Input-Output" economic model, which uses a series of "multipliers" to provide estimates of the number of times each dollar of "input," or direct spending, cycles through the economy in terms of "indirect and induced output," or additional spending, personal income, and employment. The mechanics of the input-output model are described in in Diagram A and is attached as Exhibit "A."

This analysis reports the "total" economic impacts – including direct, indirect, and induced economic impacts – of the Project's purchases of goods and services, payroll expenditures, and spending on construction projects. The analysis estimates total impacts in three distinct ways – spending, employment, and income.

The methodology of estimating indirect and induced economic impacts is based on estimates provided by Rhino Health Expansion (RHE) and the Division of Economic Development (DED) of estimated direct Project expenditures. In order to estimate direct spending in this way, the RHE and DED identifies their estimates as attached within Legislation Tracking 0180-19, at Exhibit "A" and Exhibit "B," respectively.

Table 1 reports the total project estimates to analyze the multiplier effect of the Project.

Sihasin Fund Requirement Leveraging - §2502 (C). The Project's funding from RHE satisfies the matching requirement of the Sihasin Fund (Fund) by matching the Legislation's fund request, with:

1. RHE providing \$24 million to starting up the project and recruiting customers and sales in the United States, or 55% of the \$44 million project.
2. Through 2025, the Sihasin Fund would leverage \$83,850,000 or 81% when RHE's payroll is added.

For 2019-25, direct spending by the Project on goods and services purchases, payroll, and construction projects will total \$103.8 million. This direct spending is estimated to lead to an estimated \$109 million in indirect and induced spending, for an estimated \$212.8 million in total spending impact by the Project.




Graph 3: Total Employment Impacts. 2019-2025.


SUMMARY OF SPENDING, EMPLOYMENT, AND PERSONAL INCOME IMPACTS

The estimated spending, employment, and personal income impacts of investments made by the Sihasin Fund and Rhino Health Expansion spending is a significant boost to the local economy directly affecting Navajo population residing near the Project's location.

There exists a significant opportunity for the Project to extend the employment expenditure and job opportunities through spinoff companies and companies that support the operation of the Project. The Project, being a base industry require suppliers of raw materials, machinery/equipment repair and maintenance, paper-product, transportation and logistics suppliers to maintain operations.

Overall, the Project provides:

1. **Capital Asset Purchase.** Through the Division of Economic Development all purchases made on behalf of the Project will be recorded by the Navajo Nation as capital assets.
2. **Employment Opportunity.** There exists an extensive labor surplus from the local population predominately Native American and primarily Navajo within the Project's location.
3. **Education.** Post-secondary institutions at Navajo Technical University and the University of New Mexico, predominately attended by Navajo students could benefit from the industrial and management operations of the Project.
4. **Incubator.** The Project, as a base industry requiring a wide array of suppliers and with a business incubator on the property of the Project, significant opportunities exists for developing Navajo small businesses and businesses within the Navajo Nation.

5. **Made in the Navajo Nation.** The products produced can be identified by buyers and consumers across the United States and other countries as being made by the Navajo people.

Introduction

Rhino Health is a manufacturer of disposable nitrile gloves and is currently operating a production facility (Phase I) in Church Rock, New Mexico. The company is planning to expand the manufacturing capacity by constructing an adjacent facility (Phase II). Upon completion, the process wastewater from the Phase I & II facilities will be integrated for treatment/recycling and discharge. This preliminary engineering report (PER) describes design alternatives for wastewater treatment/recycling and the associated appraisal-level CAPEX, OPEX, footprint, and other pertinent information.

Manufacturing Processes at Rhino Health (Church Rock, NM)

Two single-former lines are in operation at the Phase I facility located at Church Rock, NM since the end of 2019. To expand the production capacity, a Phase II facility with six double-former lines will be constructed adjacent to the existing plant. The wastewater treatment/recycling system in design would accommodate the needs of process water for both Phase I & II facilities. **Table 1** depicts the manufacturing processes in sequence and the associated type of wastewater generated.

Three main raw materials are used for the manufacturing of nitrile disposable gloves and they are NBR (nitrile butadiene rubber), polymer, and coagulants. Two types of wastewater, dilute and concentrate, are generated during the glove production. The dilute wastewater is generated continuously from the rinsing processes whereas the concentrate wastewater is generated from periodic clean-out of the raw-material tanks as shown in Table 1. The dilute wastewater will be treated directly with the planned wastewater treatment/recycling system. The concentrate wastewater, which constitutes a very small portion of the total process wastewater, will be collected in holding tanks for coagulation and solids removal before being introduced slowly into the wastewater treatment/recycling system to prevent slug input to the wastewater treatment plant (POTW) at Gallup, NM.

The Phase I facility of Rhino Health consumes about 140,000 gallons of tap water per day in production and generates about 119,000 gallons of process wastewater, which is currently discharged directly into the sewer system. The difference amounts to 15% of the daily water demand and is attributed to evaporation loss during production. With the Phase II expansion, the combined water demand would be about 709,000 gallons per day with the projected wastewater flow to be about 603,000 gallons per day without recycling. Table 2 provides the average composition of the process wastewater from the current Phase I operation. Table 3 shows the composition of the tap water currently provided to Rhino Health by the City of Gallup (City thereafter) for production. The quality of tap water provided to the Phase I & II facilities is expected to remain the same for the next 3-5 years due to the delay of the Navajo Gallup Water Supply Project (NGWSP). The water/wastewater quality data listed in Tables 2 and 3 was obtained from two sampling events conducted by the staff of Orizhen Group at Rhino Health in 2020.

Pretreatment Requirements for POTW Discharge

Industrial wastewater generally requires pretreatment before being discharged into the sanitary sewer. However, the City currently does not have an ordinance for industrial wastewater

pretreatment. Orizhen Group is working with the City to develop pretreatment requirements for the Phase II expansion. Based on the U.S. EPA's categorical pretreatment standards for process wastewater generated from manufacturing of latex-dipped products (40 CFR, 428.106), there are no pretreatment requirements of pH, BOD₅, and TSS for new sources with the exception of oil & grease at 100 mg/L daily maximum. The City may choose to impose local limits based on the POTW's design capacities and the municipal background loadings. Another concern from the City is bis(2-ethylhexyl) phthalate or DEHP. In 2020, there were NPDES permit violations of DEHP at the POTW and Orizhen is working with the City to determine whether the discharge at the Rhino Health Phase I operation plays a role in the violations. In the interest of time, Orizhen Group decided to proceed with the PER before Rhino Health reaches an agreement with the City on the pretreatment requirements.

Design Basis for Wastewater Treatment/Recycling

Based on the available information of the current Phase I operation at Rhino Health, and the anticipated infrastructural and regulatory constraints, design bases as shown in **Table 4** are selected to formulate the wastewater treatment/recycling alternatives for the Phase I & II operations at Rhino Health, Church Rock, NM.

Limitation of the Sewer Discharge Capacity

Based on the utility services contract currently in effect between Rhino Health and City, the allotted wastewater flow rate for sewer discharge is 140,000 gallons per day for the Phase I operation. Due to the capacity constraint of the existing sewer pipe at the planned construction site,

it is anticipated that the maximum wastewater flow for sewer discharge will remain 140,000 gallons per day for the combined Phase I & II operations unless a sewer upgrade is implemented.

Potential Concentration Increases of Raw Wastewater

Nitrile glove manufacturing is a 24/7 operation and consequently, the wastewater characteristic does not fluctuate like that of municipal wastewater over a 24-hour cycle. However, the wastewater concentrations in terms of BOD₅, TSS, and TDS for the Phase II operation can potentially be higher than those reported in Table 4 obtained from the current Phase I operation. The double-former lines planned for the Phase II expansion have a design capacity (pieces of gloves/hour, per line) substantially higher than that of the single-former lines in the current Phase I operation. Even with the much larger tank sizes for the processing fluids as well as the increased tap-water usage rate for the Phase II operation, the higher glove production rate may lead to higher concentrations of BOD₅, TSS, and TDS in the wastewater. The level of increase is difficult to project because it highly depends on the steady-state operation of the manufacturing processes for the Phase II expansion. Consequently, the designs of the wastewater treatment/recycling alternatives proposed in this PER are only valid within the concentration limits of the raw wastewater specified in the section "Limitations on the Proposed Design Alternatives" below.

Wastewater Treatment/Recycling Alternatives

Based on the available information from the existing Phase I operation, the planned Phase II operation, and relevant constraints, four alternatives listed below for wastewater treatment and recycling are formulated. For each alternative, design information for process descriptions, costs, energy consumption, and system footprint is presented in this PER

Design Alternatives

- No wastewater recycling,
- 80% wastewater recycling,
- 90% wastewater recycling, and
- Zero liquid discharge (100% recycling).

Design Information Provided for Each Alternative

- Process descriptions,
- Process flow diagram (PFD),
- Projected ionic concentrations and flow rates of the process streams,
- CAPEX,
- OPEX,
- Energy consumption,
- Total system footprint and dimensions, and
- Lead time for detailed design, construction, delivery, and startup.

No Wastewater Recycling

For this design alternative, 709,000 gallons of tap water will be consumed daily with 603,000 gallons of process wastewater generated for the combined Phase I & II operations. No wastewater treatment/recycling will be implemented at the site. To proceed with this option, the current sewer line will have to be upgraded in size from 8" to 15" due to the capacity constraint at the planned construction site. Based on a 2010 report prepared by DePauli Engineering & Surveying, LLC for


the City on the Wastewater Collection/Recycling Model Project, CAPEX to upgrade the sewer collection system at the Phase II site was estimated to be about \$6.42M (in 2010 dollars). This CAPEX excludes the cost of lift station upgrade, which had since been completed. Taking inflation into consideration, the CAPEX would be about \$7.68M in 2021. With the projected tap-water demand of 709,000 gpd, the cost for purchasing tap water and discharging wastewater is estimated to be about \$2.73M annually at a rate of \$0.0786 per ft³.

80% Wastewater Recycling

For this design alternative, the dilute wastewater generated from glove manufacturing is processed through the proposed treatment train with the objective to recycle about 80+% of the wastewater. Figure 1 shows the process flow diagram (PFD) of the proposed treatment train. Coagulation followed by flocculation and microfiltration (MF) is used as pretreatment at the beginning of the treatment train to reduce turbidity of the raw wastewater. Thereafter, the wastewater is treated with granular activated carbon (GAC) to lower the dissolved organic loading into the subsequent nanofiltration (NF) process for fouling control. The NF process is designed to achieve about 80-85% water recovery with a projected TDS of 40 mg/L in the permeate stream. This level of water recovery is required in order to meet the sewer discharge limit of 140,000 gpd mandated by the City. Although NF possesses a reduced recovery rate than brackish reverse osmosis (BWRO), the process offers a higher tolerance for membrane foulants to ease the operation and maintenance. The NF permeate (i.e., recycled wastewater) is then returned to the feed reservoir and mixed with supplemental tap water (at 209,000 gpd) that is used to make up the water loss in glove manufacturing and wastewater treatment. The combined feed water for the glove manufacturing will have a TDS of about 270 mg/L. The NF concentrate, on the other hand, is directed to an aerobic bioreactor followed by a settling basin for the removal of BOD₅, TSS, and other pollutants of concern before being discharged into the sewer. It is estimated that between 104,000 and 138,000 gallons of wastewater may be discharged into the sewer per day for this design alternative.

The concentrate wastewater generated from periodic clean-out of the process-fluid tanks is first pumped to an integrated mixing/settling tank for coagulation and subsequent solids removal. The volume of 40,000 gallons for the integrated tank is sized based on the total tank volume per line for the Phase II operation (about 33,400 gallons) as shown in Table 1. The coagulated and clarified wastewater is then stored in a holding tank before being further treated via a biological process. Since the line clean-out occurs on average at a frequency of one line per month (in a rotating mode), the clarified wastewater from the holding tank can be slowly fed into the aerobic bioreactor for treatment over a period of 2-4 weeks so that slug input to the POTW can be prevented. The sludge from the integrated mixing/settling tank and the bioreactor is dewatered using a plate-and-frame filter press before being disposed of at the local landfill.

CAPEX for the proposed wastewater treatment/recycling system is estimated to be about \$2.5M (based on the flow capacity with the safety factor) whereas the OPEX is about 0.73M per year. For the estimation of the OPEX, projected wastewater flow of 603,000 gpd (without the safety factor) is used for the calculations so that the cost saving of wastewater recycling can be compared on an equal basis across all the design alternatives. With ~83% of the process wastewater recycled, the annual expenditure for water consumption and wastewater discharge is reduced from \$2.72M to about \$0.8M. Factoring in the OPEX of the wastewater recycling system, the annual saving is about \$1.2M for this design alternative.



90% Wastewater Recycling




Figure 2. PFD for the Design Alternative with 90% Wastewater Recycling

The treatment train for this design alternative is very similar to that proposed for the alternative with 80% wastewater recycling. **Figure 2** shows the process flow diagram (PFD) of the proposed treatment train. A two-stage BWRO process, instead of a NF process, is employed to achieve 90% recovery needed for this alternative. The retentate from the 1st stage BWRO is further concentrated using the 2nd stage BWRO to provide additional recovery. The permeate streams from both BWRO units are combined and mixed with supplemental tap water (at 171,000 gpd) in the feed reservoir. The RO concentrate is directed to an aerobic bioreactor followed by a settling basin for the removal of BOD₅, TSS, and other pollutants of concern before being discharged into the sewer. It is estimated that between 61,000 to 81,000 gallons of wastewater may be discharged into the sewer per day for this design alternative.

CAPEX for the proposed wastewater treatment/recycling system is estimated to be about \$2.6M (based on the flow capacity with the safety factor) whereas the OPEX is about 0.74M per year. With 90% of the process wastewater recycled, the annual expenditure for water consumption and wastewater discharge is reduced from \$2.72M to about \$0.66M. Factoring in the OPEX of the wastewater recycling system, the annual saving is about \$1.33M for this design alternative.

Zero Liquid Discharge (ZLD)




Figure 3. PFD for the Design Alternative with 100% Wastewater Recycling (ZLD)

ZLD institutes 100% recycling of the process wastewater with no discharge to the sewer system. Figure 3 shows the process flow diagram (PFD) of the proposed treatment train. In this design alternative, the clarified bioreactor effluent, originally destined for sewer discharge, is treated first with a reverse osmosis (RO) process. The RO retentate at a TDS of about 40,000 mg/L is then further concentrated to a brine with a TDS of 104,000 mg/L using a facilitated reverse osmosis (FRO) process. The purpose is to significantly reduce the feed flow rate of the concentrated brine to the mechanical vapor decomposition (MVR) unit so that its size (hence the CAPEX and OPEX) can be decreased. The salt mixture generated from the MVR is disposed of at landfill. The permeate from the RO/FRO processes as well as the condensate from the MVR unit is returned to the feed reservoir for glove manufacturing.

CAPEX for the proposed wastewater treatment/recycling system is estimated to be about \$3.4M (based on the flow capacity with the safety factor) whereas the OPEX is about 0.86M per year. Although 100% of the process wastewater is recycled, tap water at a rate of 108,000 gpd is still needed to make up the evaporation loss during glove manufacturing. The annual expenditure for water consumption is reduced from \$2.72M to about \$0.42M. Factoring in the OPEX of the wastewater recycling system, the annual saving is about \$1.45M for this design alternative.

Comparison of the Design Alternatives

A comparison of the design alternatives is conducted to determine the optimal option for cost-benefit. Table 5 depicts the costs, energy consumption, annual saving, and annual return on investment (ROI) for all the design alternatives. The annual cost saving of each alternative is the difference between the annual water utility cost without recycling and the aggregate expenditure of the reduced water consumption for an alternative with recycling along with the associated OPEX for treatment. The annual ROI provides a metric to gauge the cost-benefit of an alternative and is the ratio of the annual cost saving to the associated CAPEX. A higher ROI value is indicative of a better investment.

To select the design alternative based on cost-benefit, the wastewater treatment system with 90% recycling will be recommended for the best ROI value. However, for ease of operation and maintenance, the treatment system with 80+% wastewater recycling would be the recommended option. This design alternative can also be upgraded in the future by adding a BWRO unit downstream of the NF unit to provide additional recovery.

The design alternatives with 80+% and 90% wastewater recycling have a similar footprint of about 11,000 ft² with dimensions roughly of 150 feet in length and 75 feet wide. The lead time for these alternatives is about 6 months for detailed design, system construction, delivery, installation, and startup after contract execution.

Limitations on the Proposed Design Alternatives

Effectiveness of the proposed design alternatives can potentially be impacted by the following factors:

1. Wastewater Flow

The wastewater treatment/recycling system is sized based on the wastewater flow recorded from the current Phase I operation and the recommendation from the manufacturer of glove production equipment. A safety factor of 1.33 is applied in system sizing to account for variability in flow. However, the production lines (double former) for the Phase II expansion is quite different from those (single former) for the Phase I operation. Consequently, the actual wastewater flow for the Phase II expansion can potentially be much higher than the projected flow rate, leading to deterioration of effectiveness for the treatment system.

2. Pollutant Concentrations in Process Wastewater


The pollutant concentrations, such as BOD₅, TSS, and TDS, from the Phase II expansion can potentially be much higher than those measured in the process wastewater from the current Phase I operation due to the difference in glove manufacturing equipment. Pollutant concentrations exceeding 1.5 times of the recorded Phase I concentrations may start to negatively impact the effectiveness of the treatment system.

3. Regulatory Pretreatment Requirements

Despite significant collaboration with the City, industrial pretreatment requirements for Rhino Health is still under development. The design alternatives proposed in this PER are formulated without taking into consideration of any regulatory pretreatment requirements, except for the maximum sewer discharge of 140,000 gpd permitted by the City for the combined Phase I & II operations.



I. Introduction

DePauli Engineering and Surveying, LLC (DES) analyzed the feasibility of the City of Gallup Water System meeting the water demands for the proposed expansion of the existing Rhino Health Glove Factory. The glove factory is located at 309A East U.S. Highway 66 in Church Rock, New Mexico. When expansion is complete the factory will have a constant potable water demand of 145-gallon per minute (gpm) combined with the occasional filling of 250,000-gallon storage tank in 8 hours. Additionally, the City of Gallup Water System improvements were evaluated to provide a fire flow service of 2,000-gpm for 2-hours within the Navajo Nation's Churchrock Industrial Park located along NM 118.

Development of the proposed system improvements considered the City of Gallup's existing water infrastructure, condition and age of the existing infrastructure, future Navajo Gallup Water Supply Project Reach 27.7B, and the City of Gallup's contractual requirements to the NGWSP Reach 14 turnouts and improvement costs.


DES utilized WaterCAD® water system modelling software to simulate the entirety of the City of Gallup's water system including completion of the future NGWSP Reach 27.7B project. The water model used the estimated NGWSP demands for the year 2040. WaterCAD® provided a means to quickly determine the required water system improvements needed for the expanded glove factory operation.

Six improvement scenarios were analyzed based on the City of Gallup water system's configuration and performance in the Church Rock Vicinity. The baseline scenario includes NGWSP Reach 27.7B with 16" waterline and the existing 8" connector line as the baseline. Scenario variables include increasing the size of NGWSP Reach 27.7B waterline, increasing the connector waterline size and adding a second 8-inch connector waterline for a looped system.

Based on the modeling results from WaterCAD®, DES recommends that the NGWSP Reach 27.7B pipeline diameter be increased from 16-inches to 18-inches and that a second 8-inch waterline be constructed to create a looped water system within the service area. The second 8-inch connector waterline provides fire protection to the Navajo Nation's Churchrock Industrial Park and service redundancy to the glove factory if either connector waterline is out of service.

II. Project Planning and Development

Rhino Health is proposing to increase the production capacity of the glove factory in Church Rock, New Mexico. The factory is located within the Navajo Nation's Churchrock Industrial Park (CRIP) located along NM Highway 118. See Figure 1 for a Vicinity Map of area. The CRIP is located outside of the City of Gallup and is located on Navajo Nation Trust Land.

The Navajo Tribal Utility Authority (NTUA) operates waterlines within their Church Rock water system that deliver water to the CRIP. However, the NTUA water system is not capable of meeting the anticipated glove factory demands without significant capital investment to complete system wide improvements.

Due to the limited capacity of existing Navajo Tribal Utility Authorities water and wastewater facilities in Church Rock, the Navajo Nation Department of Economic Development has entered into an agreement to receive a utility service from the City of Gallup. The agreement provides the CRIP up to 100-gallon per minute of potable water from the City of Gallup. A key component of the agreement also states that water service to the adjacent Red Rock Park shall not be affected.

The expanded glove factory is projected to have constant 145-gallon per minute water usage with an occasional filling of a 250,000-gallon storage tank in 8-hours. The resulting peak demand during plant operation and tank filling procedure is 665-gallon per minute for an 8-hour period. A fire flow of 2,000-gallons per minute for 2 hours within the CRIP was also analyzed to determine fire protection within the vicinity. It should be noted that the expanded Rhino Glove Factory water demand will exceed the currently contacted water supply amount for the entire CRIP.

DES utilized WaterCAD® water system modelling software to predict various water system scenarios to determine the most viable City of Gallup water system improvements to reliably meet the water demands from the glove factory expansion. The City of Gallup provided their skeletonized water system model that was used to develop, plan and design the NGWSP Gallup Regional Water System.

The water system model scenarios include all current and anticipated demand. Water demands include existing demands, full use of contracted demands, the future 2040 City and County water demands, peak demands to the NGWSP Gallup Regional Water System turnouts to NTUA water systems and the Rhino Health expanded Church Rock facility proposed demands. All future projected demands are taken from the NGWSP water demand projections for the year 2040. The Rhino Health Church Rock demands were provided by Bohannon Huston on behalf of the Navajo Nation Department of Water Resources and Rhino Health.

III. Planned NGWSP Gallup Regional Water System

The City of Gallup Water Model is a skeletonized model of the actual water system. However, there has been no skeletonization of the waterlines in the vicinity of the CRIP. The CRIP accesses City of Gallup water from an existing 8-inch asbestos cement waterline located along the north right of way line of U.S. Highway 66 (NM 118). The existing 8-inch asbestos line turns north on the eastern property line of the CRIP and Rhino Health factory and runs a little

over a half mile to Red Rock Park. The 8-inch line from US Highway 66 to Red Rock Park is designated as the connector line in this modeling exercise.

At the southwest corner of Red Rock Park, the connector line ties-in to NGWSP Reach 27.7A. Reach 27.7A is a 16-inch ductile iron waterline that will deliver water to Church Rock and Iyanbito via the NGWSP Gallup Regional Water System Churchrock Turnout. The Churchrock Turnout consists of a meter station and pump station. The meter station is complete, in-place, and being operated by City of Gallup. The pump station is planned for construction in 2022 and will be operated by NTUA.

The 2040 demand at the Churchrock turnout is 871-gallon per minute with a summer peak flow of 1132-gallon per minute. The pump station will lift Gallup Regional Water System water approximately 55-feet to 65-feet to the downstream NTUA water systems. To ensure the pumps operate efficiently a minimum hydraulic grade of 6784-feet must be maintained within the meter station.

NGWSP Reach 27.7B is planned to be a 16-inch ductile iron waterline that will directly connect to NGWSP Reach 27.7A and the 8-inch connector line. Reach 27.7B is scheduled for construction in 2022 and will be a critical component that delivers water to the eastern boundary of the Gallup Regional System from the source waters located on the north end of the system.

A map of the currently planned NGWSP Gallup Regional Water System is provided in Figure 2. The map also shows the 8-inch US Highway 66 and Connector waterline.


IV. Analyzed Alternatives

i. Analysis without Fire Flows

Six piping alternatives were developed to satisfy the demands of the expanded Rhino Health Church Rock Factory. The six (6) alternatives consist of the NGWSP Reach 27.7B waterline, the Connector Waterline, the Highway waterline, and in two alternatives the inclusion of a proposed Loop Waterline. See Figure 3 for a map of the various alternative components.

All the alternatives were analyzed against the following criteria at peak flow in the summer of 2040:

- Church Rock Turnout Flow of 1132-gallons per minute maintained,
- Church Rock Turnout Minimum Hydraulic Grade of 6784-feet maintained,
- Continuous flow 145-gallons per minute maintained to Church Rock Glove Factory,
- Filling of 250,000-gallon tank in 8 hours (520-gallons per minute) a maximum of twice a month,
- Minimum Pressure of 60-psi maintained at Church Rock Glove Factory Finished Floor,
- The conditions above met with the 8-inch asbestos cement connector line out of service.

All six of the analyzed alternatives provide enough hydraulic capacity to meet the first 5 criteria. However, only Alternative "E" and Alternative "F" provide the resiliency to maintain water

service to Church Rock glove factory with an outage on the Connector, Loop, or Highway waterlines.

Model runs for the six scenarios provided the following insights on Gallup Regional Water System performance:

- Increasing the diameter of the NGWSP Reach 27.7B waterline raises the operating pressure in the eastern portion regional water system by 3 to 5 psi during tank filling operations at the factory.
- In “looped” alternatives, increasing the diameters of the connector and/or loop waterlines to 10-inches lowers the hydraulic grade at the Church Rock turnout below the required 6784-feet.
- Increasing the size and or changing the material of the Highway waterline has negligible effect on water system performance. The constraints on the pipeline is the limited hydraulic capacity of the existing distribution network to the west. The 8-inch Loop waterline is the best solution to this capacity issue.

ii. Fire Flow Analysis

Additionally, the six alternatives were analyzed during a fire event within the CRIP. The fire event required 2,000-gallons per minute for 2 hours. To stress the water system as much as possible, the fire event was modeled to coincide with tank filling operations at the glove factory. The alternatives were analyzed against the previous six criteria with the addition of one. The additional fire flow criteria is:

- During fire flow minimum pressure within the CRIP and at the Church Rock Turnout is 20-psi.

Only the “looped” alternatives, Alternative “E” and “F” maintained the minimum pressure of 20-psi during the fire flow event. The 18-inch Reach 27.7B alternative almost allowed for 25-psi. When the modeled fire event does not occur during tank filling operations the “looped” systems maintain a 30-psi minimum pressure.

V. Selected Alternative


Based on the modeling analysis present above, Alternative "F" is the selected piping alternative to reliably deliver water to the expanded Rhino Health Glove Factory. The selected piping configuration with an 18-inch Reach 27.7B waterline and new 8-inch PVC loop waterline is not only the best option for Rhino Health, it also provides fire protection to CRIP. The selected pipe configuration also completes a "looped" water system that will provide the needed water to Rhino Health and the CRIP during maintenance of the Connector, Loop, or highway waterline. A map of the selected alternative is contained in Appendix A.

The estimated cost to upgrade NGWSP Reach 27.7B pipeline diameter from 16-inches to 18-inches is \$665,233.71. The estimated cost to plan, design, permit, and construct the 8" Loop waterline is \$1,064,765.69. The total estimated cost for the NGWSP Reach 27.7B upgrade and construction of an 8-inch loop waterline for CRIP water supply Alternative "F" is \$1,729,999.40. Detailed cost estimates are contained in Appendix B.

The costs for the planning, design, permitting, and construction management of NGWSP Reach 27.7B are part of the NGWSP and are not included in the cost estimates. The estimates only use construction costs to determine the cost difference between the upgraded and planned projects. The additional construction costs for the NGWSP Reach 27.7B 18" waterline upgrade may also be covered by the Navajo Gallup Water Supply Project. All NGWSP participants must formally accept the upgrade as part of the project for the NGWSP to cover the upgrade costs.

Dear Ms. Pinto and Mr. Halona:

The City of Gallup hereby petitions the Navajo Nation and files application for Right-of-Way of a 120' Roadway and Public Utility Corridor proposing to cross Navajo Tribal Trust lands. The project alignment is generally located in the Churchrock Chapter area within Section 9, Township 15 North, Range 17 West, N.M.P.M., in the northeastern outskirts of Gallup, McKinley County, New Mexico. The project is further identified on the Right-of-Way Survey, Final Plat included as part of the application package.

The project scope is comprised of an unimproved maintenance road, a water line, 115KV transmission line, 13.8KV distribution line, sewer line, and a communication line to be owned, operated, and maintained by the City of Gallup. The unimproved roadway will be owned by the City of Gallup and may be maintained by McKinley County through a memorandum of agreement. Operation and maintenance of the waterline and associated facilities will be the responsibility of the City of Gallup

In accordance with 25 CFR 169.105 Due Diligence Requirements; the City of Gallup understands the vital importance for construction of the permanent improvements in a timely manner. Reach 27.7B is one of thirteen sub-Reaches forming the NGWSP Reach 27 designed to deliver municipal and industrial water to Gallup and neighboring Navajo communities. Funded by the New Mexico Finance Authority Water Trust Board and the Bureau of Reclamation Cooperative Agreement, Reach 27.7B construction is expected to be completed by December 2023. Surface, ground water and/or a combination of both surface and ground water will be conveyed through the municipal system of the City of Gallup providing an uninterrupted water supply to the communities of Churchrock, Iyanbito, Pinedale, and Mariano Lake.

Project coordinators have worked closely with Churchrock Chapter House staff and Chapter House officials in efforts to thoroughly disseminate project information to the individual land owners (Chapter Official letter enclosed). Application for right of way across Indian Allotment Land has been submitted to the Bureau of Indian Affairs under separate cover.


- 2) The City Manager under Article III of the Gallup City Charter is the chief administrative officer of the city and has the authority to execute the application

- 4) The City of Gallup does not believe there will be damages but is subject to the Tort Claims Act of the State of New Mexico limiting damages for any one incident to \$750,000.
- 5) We do not have a certified corporate charter since we are a part of the State of New Mexico. The City was incorporated on April 7, 1891 by the Bernalillo County Commission. The City of Gallup was created before McKinley County existed and also 21 years before New Mexico became a State. I am attaching the Abstract of Title regarding those proceedings which created the City of Gallup.
- 6) We are attaching a copy of the City Charter that was last amended by the voters in April of 1981. We are also attaching a copy of the Resolution of the City Council authorizing the filing of the application.
- 7) The City of Gallup is a political subdivision of the State of New Mexico and therefore is only authorized to do business in the State of New Mexico. There is no document that exists authorizing the doing business, other than document listed in #5 above.


Dear Speaker Damon,





RESOLUTION OF THE
NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL
24th NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL - THIRD YEAR, 2021

AN ACTION

RELATING TO AN EMERGENCY AND THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; ALLOCATING \$557,000,000 OF NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS; APPROVING THE NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND HARDSHIP ASSISTANCE EXPENDITURE PLAN; WAIVING CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL RESOLUTION CJY-41-21 AND BUDGET AND FINANCE COMMITTEE RESOLUTION BFS-31-21

BE IT ENACTED:

SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

- A. The Navajo Nation Council is the governing body of the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. § 102(A).
- B. Navajo Nation Council Resolution No. CJY-41-21, attached as **Exhibit A**, mandates that Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund ("NNFRF") Expenditure Plans be duly adopted by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of all members of the Navajo Nation Council and approved by the President of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11), and (12).
- C. The Navajo Nation Code provides that "[m]atters constituting an emergency shall be limited to the cessation of law enforcement services, and disaster relief services, fire protection services or other direct services required as an entitlement under Navajo Nation or Federal law, or which directly threaten the sovereignty of the Navajo Nation. Such an emergency matter must arise due to the pressing public need for such resolution(s) and must be a matter requiring final action by the Council. 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(16).

SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

- A. The World Health Organization ("WHO") declared a Public Health Emergency of International Concern related to the Coronavirus ("COVID-19"), a highly contagious and sometimes fatal respiratory virus, on January 30, 2020; the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services declared a Public Health Emergency related to the COVID-19 outbreak on January 31, 2020; and the WHO declared a global pandemic due to COVID-19 on March 11, 2020.

- B. The Navajo Nation Commission on Emergency Management, with the concurrence of Navajo Nation President Jonathan Nez, declared a Public Health State of Emergency on the Navajo Nation on March 11, 2020, due to the COVID-19 outbreak. See Resolution No. CEM 20-03-11, incorporated herein by reference. The Navajo Nation Department of Health has subsequently issued numerous Public Health Emergency Orders. Public Health Orders 2020-001 through 2021-020 are incorporated herein by reference. These Public Health Emergency Orders are available at www.ndoh.navajo-nsn.gov.
- C. The coronavirus pandemic of 2019 has caused large scale infections and loss of life throughout the world, the United States, and the Navajo Nation. As of December 16, 2021, the Navajo Nation Health Command Operations Center has confirmed 40,659 COVID-19 cases and 1,570 COVID-related deaths on the Navajo Nation. COVID-19 variants have recently emerged that threaten to increase these numbers and continue the pandemic's assault on the Navajo People.
- D. The devastating effects of COVID-19 continue throughout the Navajo Nation and extend beyond the health and life devastation to wide scale negative financial effects, such as employment losses, business closures, food and housing insecurity, and other economic disruptions.
- E. In response to the pandemic, on March 11, 2021, United States President Joseph Biden signed the American Rescue Plan Act ("ARPA") into law. Section 9901 of ARPA amended Title VI of the Social Security Act to add section 602, which established the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund, and section 603, which established the Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund (together the "Fiscal Recovery Funds" or "FRF") and provided \$362 billion for state, local, and tribal governments, including \$20 billion specifically designated for tribal governments.
- F. As of November 1, 2021, the United States Department of Treasury has allocated two billion seventy-nine million four hundred sixty-one thousand four hundred sixty-four dollars (\$2,079,461,464) to the Navajo Nation under the Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions of ARPA. The Fiscal Recovery Funds are designed to build on and expand the relief provided in the 2020 Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act), Public Law 116-136, 134 Stat. 281 (2020), and are intended to mitigate and contain the spread of COVID-19, as well as to respond to the health, social and economic impacts of COVID-19 suffered by residents and businesses.

- G. Pursuant to Section 9901 of ARPA, the Fiscal Recovery Funds are specifically intended to:
1. Respond to the COVID-19 public health emergency and its negative economic impacts, including assistance to households, small businesses, and non-profits; and/or aid to impacted industries such as tourism, travel, and hospitality;
 2. Respond to workers performing essential work during the COVID-19 public health emergency by providing premium pay to eligible workers;
 3. Provide government services to the extent of the reduction in Navajo Nation revenue due to the COVID-19 public health emergency, relative to revenues collected in the most recent full fiscal year prior to the COVID-19 public health emergency; and
 4. Make necessary investments in water, sewer, and/or broadband infrastructure.
- H. The U.S. Department of Treasury has issued guidance requiring that the use and expenditure of Fiscal Recovery Funds must fall under one of the four categories above and that funding recipients must report each expenditure under one of the sixty-six (66) "Expenditure Eligibility Categories" set forth in Appendix 1 to the U.S. Department of Treasury's Compliance and Reporting Guidance for State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds, attached herein as **Exhibit B**.
- I. Pursuant to ARPA:
1. Fiscal Recovery Fund costs must be incurred by December 31, 2024, meaning that the Navajo Nation must obligate FRF funds by that date. Treasury's Interim Final Rule provides that "incurred" shall have the same meaning given to "financial obligation" under the Uniform Guidance at 2 CFR 200.1: "*Financial obligations*, when referencing a recipient's or sub-recipient's use of funds under a Federal award, means orders placed for property and services, contracts and sub-awards made, and similar transactions that require payment."; and
 2. The Fiscal Recovery Fund period of performance runs from March 3, 2021 until December 31, 2026, meaning that all FRF-funded projects must be completed and funds must be fully

expended by December 31, 2026.

3. Costs incurred by the Navajo Nation prior to March 3, 2021 are not eligible.
 4. Any funds not obligated or expended for eligible uses by the dates above in sections I (1) and (2) must be returned to Treasury, including any unobligated or unexpended funds that have been provided to sub-recipients and contractors as part of the award closeout process.
- J. While its acceptance of Fiscal Recovery Funds obligates the Navajo Nation to comply with ARPA and other federal laws and regulations, the Navajo Nation can and will fulfill these obligations while retaining and exercising its sovereignty in allocating and disbursing Fiscal Recovery Funds.
- K. On July 23, 2021, the Navajo Nation Council adopted Resolution No. CJY-41-21, attached as **Exhibit A**, establishing the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund ("NNFRF") into which the Navajo Nation's allocation of \$2,079,461,464 has been deposited. CJY-41-21 also adopted an expenditure authorization and approval process for the allocation of funds from the NNFRF.
- L. In Section Four of CJY-41-21, the Navajo Nation Council mandated the Budget and Finance Committee to adopt application and review procedures, as well as an expenditure plan template, to be used by entities requesting Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds. The Budget and Finance Committee approved Resolution No. BFS-31-21 which established mandatory Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund application procedures, forms, and an expenditure plan template. BFS-31-21 is incorporated herein by reference.
- M. To ensure the Navajo Nation's compliance with ARPA, Section Four of CJY-41-21 also directed the Navajo Nation Department of Justice ("DOJ") to perform "an initial determination of whether a NNFRF funding request satisfies the legal requirements of the Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions of ARPA and applicable Navajo Nation laws, regulations, and policies and procedures." Resolution No. BFS-31-21 incorporated DOJ's initial determination into the mandatory NNFRF application procedures, forms, and an expenditure plan template, which requires, among other things, identification of the entity with administrative oversight over the Funding Recipient. Administrative oversight means having the authority to monitor the implementation of an approved FRF Expenditure Plan and the expenditure of awarded funds. The duties of the entity with

administrative oversight are set forth in Section Seven of the FRF Procedures in exhibits 1 through 5 of BFS-31-21.

- N. The Office of the President and Vice-President, in coordination with the Division of Community Development ("DCD"), presented ARPA and Fiscal Recovery Fund information at each of the five (5) Agency Council Meetings to hear from the Navajo People, through their elected officials, concerning their needs and priorities for projects and/or services funded through the NNFRF. In addition, DCD has met with Navajo Nation Chapters, individually and collectively, on more than fifty (50) occasions to discuss NNFRF matters.
- O. The Navajo Nation Council hosted twenty-six (26) Naabik'iyáti' Committee Work Sessions, all open to the public, to discuss the needs of the Navajo People and priorities for projects and/or services funded through the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund. In addition, Standing Committees of the Navajo Nation Council held more than twenty (20) committee meetings, all open to the public, that have included NNFRF reports and infrastructure specific discussions.
- P. The financial devastation visited on the Navajo People by the COVID-19 pandemic has risen to emergency levels, particularly with winter weather looming, and the Navajo Nation Council has determined that it is vital that the Navajo People be provided immediate financial assistance.
- Q. It is in the best interest of the Navajo People to enact the NNFRF Hardship Assistance Expenditure Plan in the total amount of five hundred fifty-seven million dollars (\$557,000,000), as set forth in **Exhibit C**, as an emergency legislation to counteract limited access to direct services necessary to recover from the devastation caused by the COVID-19 pandemic and mitigate exposure to future variants.

SECTION THREE. APPROVAL OF NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND HARDSHIP ASSISTANCE EXPENDITURE PLAN

- A. The Navajo Nation hereby approves and adopts the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund Hardship Assistance Expenditure Plan set forth in **Exhibit C**.
- B. The Navajo Nation hereby approves total funding for the NNFRF Hardship Assistance Expenditure Plan from the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund in the total amount of five hundred fifty-seven million dollars (\$557,000,000) and allocates the funding as follows:

1. Five hundred fifty-seven million dollars (\$557,000,000) to the Office of the Controller for Household Assistance - Cash Transfers (Expenditure Eligibility Category 2.3), as set forth in **Exhibit C**, with administrative oversight by the Office of the President and Vice-President and legislative oversight by the Budget and Finance Committee.

SECTION FOUR. ADMINISTRATION OF HARDSHIP ASSISTANCE EXPENDITURE PLAN

- A. All entities receiving Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds, whether through an immediate allocation under CJY-41-21 or subsequently approved NNFRF Expenditure Plan, shall comply with all Navajo Nation laws, policies, regulations, rules, and procedures, specifically including, but not limited to, those governing the NNFRF and the expenditure of such funds, and any additional terms set forth in a grant, sub-recipient, or similar agreement.
- B. Fiscal Recovery Fund costs must be incurred by December 31, 2024, meaning that the Navajo Nation must obligate FRF funds by that date. For internal Navajo Nation purposes, the term "obligated" is defined in BFS-31-21, Section Three on page 3 of Exhibits 1 through 5.
- C. Projects and/or services funded with Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds must be completed and all NNFRF funds fully spent by December 31, 2026.
- D. Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund Expenditure Plan funds shall be available for use by a funding recipient that is a branch, division, department, or other unit of the Navajo Nation central government as soon as a detailed budget has been administratively approved and the Office of Management and Budget has entered such budget into the Financial Management Information System.
- E. Awarded Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds shall only be obligated and expended on projects and/or services, including need-based projects and services, that were included as an immediate allocation under CJY-41-21 or are included in a NNFRF Expenditure Plan approved and adopted by a Navajo Nation Council resolution enacted pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11), and (12).
- F. Awarded Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds, including cost savings, cannot be moved between Expenditure Plans without approval by a Navajo Nation Council resolution enacted pursuant

to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11), and (12).

- G. All entities receiving Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds shall follow and apply Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP), as established by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) for governmental entities and by the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) for public and private companies and non-profits, in reporting, recording, and accounting for such Funds.
- H. Fraud, misuse of funds, violation of applicable Navajo Nation or federal laws and regulations, non-compliance with FRF agreements governing grants or sub-awards, and false statements or claims by any individual or entity receiving or administering Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds may result in administrative, civil, or criminal sanctions and penalties, debarment and suspension, ineligibility for future Navajo Nation awards or business opportunities, and the Navajo Nation may pursue any other legal action or remedy available by law.

SECTION FIVE. WAIVING PROVISIONS OF RESOLUTIONS CJY-41-21 AND BFS-31-21

- A. For the purposes of the NNFRF Hardship Assistance Expenditure Plan only, the Navajo Nation Council hereby waives Section Four (B) of CJY-41-21 which states "The NNDOJ shall do an initial determination of whether a NNFRF funding request satisfies the legal requirements of the Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions of ARPA and applicable Navajo Nation laws, regulations, and policies and procedures."
- B. For the purposes of the NNFRF Hardship Assistance Expenditure Plan only, the Navajo Nation Council further waives the first sentence of Section Four (H) of CJY-41-21 which states that "Until the third quarter of 2024, NNFRF Expenditure Plans for direct financial assistance to enrolled Navajo Nation members, not including business economic relief or similar programs, shall be limited to ten percent (10%) of the total Fiscal Recovery Funds received by the Navajo Nation."
- C. For the purposes of the NNFRF Hardship Assistance Expenditure Plan only, the Navajo Nation Council also waives any and all provisions in BFS-31-21, including its exhibits and appendices, that require NNDOJ to do an initial determination of whether a NNFRF funding request satisfies the legal requirements of the Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions of ARPA

and applicable Navajo Nation laws, regulations, and policies and procedures."

- D. All Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds that have not been allocated to a NNFRF Expenditure Plan through a Navajo Nation Council resolution enacted pursuant to CJY-41-21 by the end of the second quarter of Fiscal Year 2024 may be re-allocated to the NNFRF Hardship Assistance Expenditure Plan through Navajo Nation Council resolution enacted pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A) (17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C) (10), (11), and (12).
- E. The allocation of unallocated NNFRF funds to the NNFRF Hardship Assistance Expenditure Plan shall require a separate or revised expenditure plan be submitted to the Navajo Nation Department of Justice for an eligibility determination.

SECTION SIX. REPORTING

- A. All entities receiving Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds shall keep and maintain accurate and complete financial data and records sufficient to demonstrate that the Fiscal Recovery Funds appropriated by the U.S. Congress to the Navajo Nation have been used by the reporting entity in accordance with the provisions of ARPA and timely relay such reports and records to the administrative oversight, Office of Controller, Office of Management and Budget, FRF Office, and legislative oversight as directed in the grant or sub-recipient agreements if any, and when requested. Such reports and records shall be maintained for at least seven (7) years after the project and/or service has been completed. The Office of the Controller shall be responsible for compiling and providing any and all records and financial reports required by the U.S. Treasury.
- B. All entities receiving Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds through an approved Expenditure Plan shall report the status of their NNFRF allocations to their respective oversight committees at the end of each Fiscal Year quarter. The entity with administrative oversight over the Expenditure Plan shall review the quarterly report prior to its presentation and shall participate in the presentation to the oversight committee(s).
- C. The Office of the Controller, with the assistance of the Executive Director of the NNFRF Office, shall report the status of the NNFRF Hardship Assistance Expenditure Plan to the Budget and Finance and Naabik'íyáti' Committees at the end of each Fiscal Year quarter.

SECTION SEVEN. EFFECTIVE DATE

This legislation shall be effective upon its approval pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11), and (12).

SECTION EIGHT. AMENDMENTS

Amendments to this legislation shall only be adopted by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of all members of the Navajo Nation Council and approval of the President of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(17) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11), and (12).

SECTION NINE. SAVINGS CLAUSE

If any provision of this legislation is determined invalid by the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, or by a Navajo Nation District Court without appeal to the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, those provisions of this legislation not determined invalid shall remain the law of the Navajo Nation.

SECTION TEN. DIRECTIVES

All Navajo Nation government programs, offices, and divisions, as well as Navajo Nation owned entities, specifically including those programs, offices, divisions, and Navajo Nation owned entities receiving Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds, shall prioritize the implementation and completion of NNFRF projects and/or services.





After decades of struggling with an unfinished infrastructure, a sagging economy, and an inadequate education system, the Navajo Nation is on the doorstep of changing our future for our elders, our children, and our families. Over the past year we had the financial means to respond to the coronavirus and improve the lives of our constituents; we laid the foundation for the Nation. This year, we again have the opportunity to build on what we started – water lines and wastewater systems for communities, powerlines to family homes, and an internet network to help our students, to name a few. Working together we can take a giant leap forward in giving the People the protective measures they need to continue fighting against the coronavirus and its variants.

Thank you to Delegate Carl Slater for his tenacious effort in bringing this resolution through the process. Thank you Speaker for your support and we appreciate the support of the 24th Navajo Nation Council. There is much to do over the next few years and we look forward to working with the Navajo Nation Council. We sign CJY-41-21 into law.

RELATING TO BUDGET AND FINANCE AND NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEES, AND THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; ESTABLISHING THE NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND AND THE EXPENDITURE AUTHORIZATION PROCESS THEREUNDER; WAIVING CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF THE NAVAJO NATION APPROPRIATIONS ACT; AMENDING 12 N.N.C. § 334 TO AUTHORIZE EMERGENCY PROCUREMENTS; AUTHORIZING REIMBURSEMENT OF THE SÍHASIN FUND AND UNDESIGNATED, UNRESERVED FUND BALANCE; AUTHORIZING CENTRAL SUPPORT AND REGULATORY COST FUNDING; AUTHORIZING FUNDING TO COMPLETE DEFUNDED NAVAJO NATION CARES FUND EXPENDITURE PLANS; AUTHORIZING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND OFFICE WITHIN THE OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENT

BE IT ENACTED

SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

- A. The Navajo Nation Council is the governing body of the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. § 102(A).
- B. The Naabik'íyáti' Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council with the responsibility to hear proposed resolution(s) that require final action by the Navajo Nation Council. 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(9).
- C. The Budget and Finance Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council with the enumerated powers to review and recommend to the Navajo Nation Council the budgeting, appropriation, investment and management of all funds and to promulgate rules and regulations relative to contracting and financial matters. 2 N.N.C. §§ 300(B)(1) and (2).

SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

- A. The World Health Organization ("WHO") declared a Public Health Emergency of International Concern related to the outbreak of coronavirus ("COVID-19"), a highly contagious and sometimes fatal respiratory virus, on January 30, 2020; the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services declared a Public Health Emergency related to the COVID-19 outbreak on January 31, 2020; and the WHO declared a global pandemic due to COVID-19 on March 11, 2020.
- B. The Navajo Nation Commission on Emergency Management, with the concurrence of Navajo Nation President Jonathan Nez, declared

a Public Health State of Emergency on the Navajo Nation on March 11, 2020, due to the COVID-19 outbreak. See Resolution No. CEM 20-03-11 incorporated herein by reference. The Navajo Nation Department of Health has subsequently issued numerous Public Health Emergency Orders. Public Health Orders 2020-001 through 2021-014 are incorporated by reference. These Public Health Emergency Orders are available at www.ndoh.navajonnsn.gov.

- C. The coronavirus pandemic of 2019 has caused large scale infections and loss of life throughout the world, the United States and the Navajo Nation. As of July 7, 2021, the Navajo Nation Health Command Operations Center has confirmed 31,043 COVID-19 cases and 1,374 COVID-related deaths on the Navajo Nation. COVID-19 variants have emerged that threaten to increase these numbers and continue the pandemic's assault on the Navajo People.
- D. The devastating effects of COVID-19 continue throughout the Navajo Nation, including employment losses, business closures, food and housing insecurity, and other economic disruptions.
- E. On March 11, 2021, President Biden signed the American Rescue Plan Act ("ARPA") into law. Section 9901 of ARPA established the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund and the Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund (together the "Fiscal Recovery Funds") by amending Title VI of the Social Security Act, which provided \$362 billion for state, local, and tribal governments, including \$20 billion designated for tribal governments.
- F. As of May 29, 2021, the United States Department of Treasury ("U.S. Treasury") allocated \$1,861,554,458.43 to the Navajo Nation under the Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions of ARPA. The Fiscal Recovery Funds are designed to build on and expand the relief provided in the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act or CARES Act.
- G. The Fiscal Recovery Funds are intended to support governmental efforts to mitigate and contain the spread of COVID-19, as well as to respond to the health, social and economic impacts of COVID-19 suffered by residents and businesses.
- H. As set forth in Central Agency Council Resolution No. CAC 07/21-11, attached as Exhibit A, the Central Agency Council of the Navajo Nation supports the establishment of a Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund and the expenditure authorization process set forth herein.

I. Pursuant to Section 9901 of ARPA, the Fiscal Recovery Funds were specifically intended to:

1. Respond to the COVID-19 public health emergency and its negative economic impacts, including assistance to households, small businesses, and non-profits; and/or aid to impacted industries such as tourism, travel, and hospitality;
2. Respond to workers performing essential work during the COVID-19 public health emergency by providing premium pay to eligible workers of the tribal government. Under this category, the Navajo Nation can provide premium pay to government workers performing essential work, and can provide grants to eligible employers that have eligible workers who perform essential work;
3. Provide government services to the extent of the reduction in Navajo Nation revenue due to the COVID-19 public health emergency, relative to revenues collected in the most recent full fiscal year prior to the emergency; and
4. Make necessary investments in water, sewer, or broadband infrastructure.

J. Pursuant to ARPA:

1. Fiscal Recovery Fund costs must be incurred by December 31, 2024, meaning the Navajo Nation must obligate funds by that date; and
2. The Fiscal Recovery Fund period of performance runs until December 31, 2026, meaning funded projects must be completed by that date.

K. While its acceptance of the Fiscal Recovery Funds obligates the Navajo Nation to comply with ARPA and other federal laws and regulations, the Navajo Nation can and will fulfill these obligations while retaining and exercising its tribal sovereignty.

SECTION THREE. ESTABLISHMENT OF THE NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND

- A. There is hereby established the "Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Fund" ("NNFRF").
- B. The Navajo Nation hereby designates that the \$1,861,554,458.43 received by the Navajo Nation as of May 29, 2021 from the U.S.

Treasury under the Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions of ARPA, as well as any additional funds that the Navajo Nation may later receive from the United States under the Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions, shall be deposited into the NNFRF.

- C. The purpose of the NNFRF is to serve as a depository into which all Fiscal Recovery Funds and investment earnings therein are deposited, and from which the Navajo Nation shall disburse funds for approved Expenditure Plans which comply with the criteria set forth in the Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions of ARPA.
- D. The Fiscal Recovery Funds allocated to the Navajo Nation are limited emergency funds provided by the federal government and are not subject to the annual set-aside provisions set forth in the Navajo Nation Code.
- E. The Navajo Nation Office of the Controller ("OOC"), acting upon the recommendation of the Navajo Nation Investment Committee, shall oversee investment of the NNFRF in accordance with ARPA and Fiscal Recovery Funds requirements, U.S. Treasury regulations and guidance, and applicable Navajo Nation Investment Policies; investment earnings, when realized, shall be deposited into the NNFRF.
- F. Any funds deposited into the NNFRF shall only be used in compliance with ARPA and Fiscal Recovery Fund purposes and restrictions, U.S. Treasury guidance, applicable federal laws and regulations, Navajo Nation laws, regulations, and policies, and duly adopted procedures and agreements between the Navajo Nation and the federal government regarding the use of the Fiscal Recovery Funds.
- G. Except as set forth in Sections Five through Seven below, expenditures of the NNFRF shall only be authorized through Expenditure Plan(s) duly adopted by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of all members of the Navajo Nation Council and approved by the President of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11) and (12).
- H. OOC and all entities receiving NNFRF shall keep records sufficient to demonstrate that the Fiscal Recovery Funds appropriated by the U.S. Congress to the Navajo Nation have been used in accordance with the provisions of ARPA. The NNFRF shall be subject to an annual audit by the Navajo Nation's independent auditor. Either the Navajo Nation Council or the Navajo Nation President may require an audit at any time. The Controller shall be responsible for providing any and all records and financial reports required by the U.S. Treasury.

- I. Within thirty (30) days of the effective date of this legislation, OOC shall set up an online accountability platform on the NNOOC website that will enable the public to observe the financial transactions conducted with NNFRF funds. To the maximum extent possible and consistent with applicable Navajo Nation and federal laws pertaining to confidential or proprietary information and documents, all checks, electronic deposits, funds transfers, contracts and contract amendments, and other documents supporting NNFRF expenditures shall be displayed on the platform and made available for public view.

SECTION FOUR. NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND EXPENDITURE PLAN ELIGIBILITY DETERMINATIONS AND APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

- A. The Office of Management and Budget ("OMB"), in consultation with OOC and Navajo Nation Department of Justice ("NNDOJ"), shall develop NNFRF application and review procedures, which shall include an NNFRF Expenditure Plan template, for adoption by the Budget and Finance Committee. OMB and OOC shall post the approved NNFRF application procedures, including an NNFRF Expenditure Plan template, and instructions on their respective websites.
- B. The NNDOJ shall do an initial determination of whether a NNFRF funding request satisfies the legal requirements of the Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions of ARPA and applicable Navajo Nation laws, regulations, and policies and procedures.
- C. Navajo Nation Divisions and Offices, non-LGA-certified Chapters, LGA-certified Chapters, Navajo Nation-owned enterprises/authorities/corporations, non-profit corporations and external entities seeking NNFRF funds shall comply with the requirements set forth in this legislation and with the requirements set forth in the NNFRF application procedures adopted by resolution of the Budget and Finance Committee ("BFC").
- D. Each proposed NNFRF Expenditure Plan shall identify and designate a Responsible Entity who shall be held accountable for the compliance, implementation, monitoring, and accounting of the proposed projects, proposals, services and/or related assistance.
- E. Following NNFRF Expenditure Plan approval by the Navajo Nation Council and President, the Navajo Nation, with the assistance of NNDOJ, shall enter into a binding agreement, such as a, grant or sub-recipient agreement, with each Responsible Entity, other than Navajo Nation divisions and offices and non-

LGA-certified chapters, to ensure that all Navajo Nation laws and regulations are followed and complied with at all times.

- F. NNFRF Expenditure Plans involving construction activities shall include a contingency reserve consistent with industry standards adequate to cover projected inflation-based cost increases. The contingency reserve shall only be released by OOC to the Responsible Entity upon receipt of documented justification for the cost increase. After Expenditure Plan completion, any unused contingency funds shall be returned to the NNFRF.
- G. The total funds allocated in an approved NNFRF Expenditure Plan for a non-Navajo Nation government program or office, including Navajo Nation-owned enterprises/authorities/corporations, may include an allocation for administrative costs at a rate not to exceed two percent (2%) of service or project cost to defray the costs of implementing, administering and monitoring said Expenditure Plan and its underlying services and projects.
- H. Until the third quarter of 2024, NNFRF Expenditure Plans for direct financial assistance to enrolled Navajo Nation members, not including business economic relief or similar programs, shall be limited to ten percent (10%) of the total Fiscal Recovery Funds received by the Navajo Nation. After the second quarter of 2024, unallocated or unexpended NNFRF funds can be allocated for direct financial assistance to enrolled members through resolution of the Navajo Nation Council and approval of the President pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11) and (12).

SECTION FIVE. IMMEDIATE ALLOCATION OF NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS TO REIMBURSE SÍHASIN FUND ALLOCATIONS AND UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE APPROPRIATIONS

OOC, in consultation with OMB, shall immediately reimburse the Síhasin Fund and Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance ("UUFb") from the NNFRF for any allocations or appropriations wherein the approving Navajo Nation Council resolution authorized such reimbursement and NNDOJ deems such reimbursement(s) legally defensible under the Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions of ARPA. OMB shall report the amount and status of such reimbursements to the Naabik'iyáti' Committee and the Office of President and Vice-President no later than sixty (60) days after the effective date of this legislation.

SECTION SIX. IMMEDIATE ALLOCATION OF NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS TO DEFUNDED NAVAJO NATION CARES FUND PROJECTS

The Navajo Nation hereby immediately allocates NNFRF funds to replace the Navajo Nation CARES Fund funds that were reallocated to the Navajo Nation Hardship Assistance Expenditure Plan pursuant to Navajo Nation Council Resolution No. CJY-67-20 and Naabik'íyáti' Committee Resolutions No. NABIO-49-20 and NABID-63-20, as well as any CARES Fund funding that was voluntarily returned to the Nation because the project approved by the Navajo Nation Council could not be completed by the federal CARES Act deadline(s). OMB, with the assistance of OOC, shall report the amount and status of such allocations to the Naabik'íyáti' Committee and the Office of President and Vice-President no later than sixty (60) days after the effective date of this legislation.

SECTION SEVEN. IMMEDIATE ALLOCATION OF NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS TO FUND CENTRAL SUPPORT AND REGULATORY SERVICES

- A. The Navajo Nation hereby immediately allocates ten percent (10%) of all Fiscal Recovery Funds received by the Navajo Nation to fund central support service and regulatory costs.
- B. The Office of the President and Vice-President shall be responsible for apportioning ninety percent (90%) of the ten percent (10%) amount amongst Executive Branch programs and offices providing central support and regulatory services, including, the Office of the President and Vice-President, Office of the Controller, Office of Management and Budget, Department of Justice, Navajo Nation Washington Office, Division of Human Resources, Division of Community Development, and other Divisions and offices providing central support and/or regulatory services.
- C. The Speaker of the Navajo Nation Council, after consultation with the Naabik'íyáti' Committee, shall be responsible for apportioning ten percent (10%) of the ten percent (10%) amount amongst Legislative Branch programs and offices providing central support services, including the Office of Legislative Services, Office of Legislative Counsel, Office of the Speaker, and Navajo Nation Council.
- D. The programs and offices receiving NNFRF for central support and/or regulatory services shall use such funding to develop the legal, financial, organizational, managerial, administrative, regulatory, and reporting framework necessary to support the expeditious completion of NNFRF funded projects and the provision of NNFRF funded services.
- E. The detailed budgets for the NNFRF funding allocated here for central support and regulatory services shall be processed through the executive or administrative review process

applicable to each Branch and shall not require further legislative action.

- F. Any central support and/or regulatory services funding unspent or unencumbered at the end of the second quarter of Fiscal Year 2024 shall be reallocated to the NNFRF and be available for allocation to other NNFRF projects and services.

SECTION EIGHT. AUTHORIZING THE OFFICE OF THE CONTROLLER TO DISTRIBUTE FUNDS FROM THE NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND

- A. After reimbursement of the Síhasin Fund and UUFb, allocations to the defunded Navajo Nation CARES Fund projects, and the release of the immediate disbursements provided for in this legislation, OOC shall only release and distribute NNFRF funds in conformance with duly adopted Expenditure Plans enacted by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of all members of the Navajo Nation Council and approved by the President of the Navajo Nation pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A) and 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(C)(10), (11) and (12).
- B. Expenditure Plan funds shall not be released to LGA-certified Chapters, Navajo Nation-owned enterprises/authorities/corporations, non-profit corporations and/or external entities until a binding agreement, e.g., grant or sub-recipient agreement, has been executed between the Navajo Nation and the respective Responsible Entity.
- C. OOC shall be responsible for ensuring that withdrawals from all invested NNFRF funds are timed to balance Expenditure Plan needs with maximum investment earnings.
- D. OOC shall coordinate and collaborate with each Responsible Entity to ensure that all applicable Navajo Nation and federal financial, accounting, and reporting laws and regulations are adhered to and strictly followed.
- E. OOC and the respective Responsible Entity shall provide a written and oral report to the Naabik'íyáti' Committee and the Office of President and Vice-President on or about thirty (30) days after the end of each fiscal year quarter; such report will present an overview and status of all NNFRF funded projects, recommended modifications or adjustments to projects, and compliance challenges, if any.

SECTION NINE. APPLICABILITY AND WAIVER OF NAVAJO NATION APPROPRIATIONS ACT PROVISIONS TO NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS

- A. The NNFRF are externally restricted funds awarded to the Navajo Nation solely for the purposes set forth in the Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions of ARPA. Accordingly, only those provisions of the Appropriations Act, 12 N.N.C. § 800 et seq., that are expressly applicable to externally restricted funds, and any future provisions in the Budget Instructions Manual(s) expressly applicable to NNFRF, as approved by the Budget and Finance Committee, shall apply to the NNFRF and all Expenditure Plan(s) funded thereunder.
- B. NNFRF shall not be a part of, and shall not be, included in the Navajo Nation Fiscal Year Comprehensive Budget and the Navajo Nation hereby waives the application of 12 N.N.C. § 820 [Overall Budget Policies], § 830 [Budget Planning and Preparation], § 840 [Budget Approval, Adoption and Certification], § 850 [Budget Implementation, Monitoring and Control], § 860 [Capital Improvement Process], and § 870 [Local Government Improvement Funds] to the NNFRF and all Expenditure Plan(s) funded thereunder.

SECTION TEN. AMENDING 12 N.N.C. § 334 TO AUTHORIZE EMERGENCY PROCUREMENTS FOR NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND EXPENDITURES

- A. Until such time as Navajo Nation procurement laws and regulations are amended to specifically support NNFRF procurements, the Navajo Nation hereby amends 12 N.N.C. § 334 as set forth below.

Title Twelve
Fiscal Matters
Chapter 3. Navajo Nation Procurement Act
Subchapter 1. General Provisions

§ 334. Emergency Procurement

- A. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Director, Division of Finance, Purchasing Department, the head of a purchasing agency, or a designee of either officer may make or authorize others to make emergency procurement when there exists a threat to public health, welfare, or safety under emergency conditions as defined in regulations promulgated by the Budget and Finance Committee; provided that such emergency procurement shall be made with such competition as is practicable under the circumstances. A written determination of emergency shall be made by the executive director of the affected division, in concert with the Director, Division of Finance, Purchasing Department or authorized designee, and a

representative of the Attorney General's Office (or the Office of Legislative Counsel for emergency procurements by the Legislative Branch). To the extent possible, certified entities under the Navajo Nation Business Opportunity Act, 5 N.N.C. § 201 et seq., shall receive preference in emergency procurement. The written determination and the selection of the particular contractor shall be included in the contract file. No oversight committee approval shall be required for these contracts.

- B. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, procurements using Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds may be authorized and executed as Emergency Procurements at the discretion of the Procuring Party without further justification; provided that such emergency procurement shall be made with such competition as is practicable under the circumstances. To the extent possible, certified entities under the Navajo Nation Business Opportunity Act, 5 N.N.C. § 201 et seq., that are able to complete the good or service within the Fiscal Recovery Fund's strict deadlines shall receive preference in emergency procurement. No oversight committee approval shall be required for these contracts.

- B. Until such time as the Budget and Finance Committee amends the Navajo Nation Procurement Rules and Regulations ("Procurement Regulations") adopted by BFD-192-03, procurements using NNFRF funds shall be deemed to satisfy the definition of EMERGENCY CONDITION set forth at Section VII (B) of the Procurement Regulations without further justification; and the written application and concurrence requirements set forth at Section VII (C) of the Procurement Regulations shall not apply to such procurements.
- C. As set forth in the Navajo Business Opportunity Act, if there are no responsive and responsible Priority One or Priority Two vendors responding to the Nation's solicitation for NNFRF funded goods, services, or construction and construction related services, who are qualified and able to meet the requirements of the procurement, including the demonstrated ability to meet the ARPA and NNFRF time deadlines, the Procuring Party may contract with companies not included on the Business Source List maintained by the Business Regulatory Department, as long as such companies agree to comply with Navajo Nation laws, regulations, and policies, including the Navajo Preference in Employment Act and Navajo Business Opportunity Act.

- D. Navajo citizens, Navajo-owned businesses and non-profits, Navajo business-support organizations, such as the Dineh Chamber of Commerce, and Navajo Nation-owned enterprises/authorities/corporations shall be provided a meaningful opportunity to comment before amendments are made to Navajo Nation procurement laws and regulations.

SECTION ELEVEN. AUTHORIZING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A NAVAJO NATION FISCAL RECOVERY FUND OFFICE WITHIN THE OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENT

- A. The Office of the President and Vice-President ("OPVP") is authorized to establish a temporary NNFRF Office within OPVP by Executive Order pursuant to 2 N.N.C. §§ 1005(A) and (C) (14).
- B. The NNFRF Office shall be a clearinghouse that will, at a minimum, educate the public on NNFRF matters; coordinate, facilitate and implement NNFRF responsibilities assigned to OPVP or the Executive Branch; ensure expeditious review of NNFRF eligibility determinations and other NNFRF matters by Executive Branch programs and offices; ensure Navajo Nation compliance with Fiscal Recovery Funds provisions of ARPA and Navajo Nation laws and regulations by all entities receiving NNFRF funds; facilitate and expedite the expenditure of all NNFRF funds; ensure the completion and implementation of NNFRF authorized projects and services; and assist/support OOC in monitoring the expenditure of NNFRF funds and submitting timely and accurate ARPA reports to the federal government.
- C. Prior to its opening, OPVP shall present a plan of operation or similar structural document for the NNFRF Office to the Naabik'iyáti' Committee. On or about thirty (30) days after the end of each fiscal year quarter, OPVP shall present a report to the Naabik'iyáti' Committee on overall NNFRF Office operations, accomplishments, and challenges, along with recommended modifications or adjustments to projects and processes.
- D. OPVP and OOC shall only contract with qualified and experienced Navajo Nation-owned enterprises/authorities/corporation or Navajo-owned businesses to assist in the implementation, management, and monitoring of NNFRF funds.
- E. In order to support the purposes and intent of the Navajo Nation Business Opportunity Act and Navajo Nation Preference in Employment Act, within fifty (50) days after the enactment of this legislation, the NNFRF Office shall present a plan to the Budget and Finance and Naabik'iyáti' Committees to provide

bonding, insurance, and other needed support to grow the Navajo Nation economy through private sector contracting, using ARPA, NNFRF, and/or other Navajo Nation or external funding.

SECTION ELEVEN. EFFECTIVE DATE

This legislation shall be effective upon its approval pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 221(B).

SECTION TWELVE. SAVING CLAUSE

Should any provision of this legislation be determined invalid by the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, or a District Court of the Navajo Nation without appeal to the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, those provisions of the legislation which are not determined invalid shall remain the law of the Navajo Nation.

SECTION THIRTEEN. DIRECTIVES

The Division of Natural Resources and General Land Development Department shall present a proposed Plan of Operation for a "One-Stop Shop" to facilitate, review, and approval of rights-of-ways, temporary construction permits, mission site permits, leases, etc., to the Resources and Development Committee within forty-five (45) days after the effective date of this legislation.
- C. The Division of Human Resources and Department of Personnel Management shall present proposed amendments to the Navajo Nation Personnel Policies Manual to, at a minimum, facilitate the expeditious hiring of personnel with NNFRF funds to the Health, Education, and Human Services Committee within sixty (60) days after the effective date of this legislation.
- D. OPVP, with the assistance of the Business Regulatory Department and OOC Purchasing Section, shall present proposed amendments to the Navajo Nation's procurement and business opportunity laws and regulations to, at a minimum, expedite NNFRF procurements, to the Budget and Finance Committee within sixty (60) days after the effective date of this legislation.

Specifically, the funds can be used to alleviate "the immediate impacts of COVID-19 pandemic on housing insecurity, while addressing conditions that contribute to poor public health and economic outcomes during the pandemic, namely concentrated areas with limited economic opportunity and inadequate or poor-quality housing."

Eligibility Criteria: ARPA Connecting Homes to Electricity 3.12;

Housing Support; Other Housing Assistance

The information that Utility providers will require or obtain from applicants for the Connecting Navajo Nation Homes to Electricity Program includes, but is not limited to:

1. Complete the appropriate electric service providers' application.
2. The applicant will have to provide their name, reliable phone number(s), email address, mailing and physical address, the latitude and longitude, and chapter affiliation.
3. They must submit a valid homesite lease or residential lease.
4. Proof of primary residency required.

The criteria to determine eligibility for applicants is based on successful submission of aforementioned documents request. The Utility provider will perform a feasibility study which includes the following criteria:

1. The home must be found to be physically feasible to live in.
2. Whether the home is on a permanent foundation and is a sound structure (livable).
3. Applicant is willing and able to pay for monthly services.
4. Applicant must have no outstanding balance on existing utility accounts.
5. If a home is located within 1 mile of an existing powerline they will be considered for a powerline connection.
6. Homes located more than 1 mile from an existing powerline may be considered for a powerline connection if rights-of-ways can be obtained prior to funding deadline or exhaustion of funds.
7. If the home is located over 1 mile they may be considered for a solar system.
8. If a home does not have a homesite lease or residential lease, the home may be considered for a solar system.
9. If an applicant is to receive house wiring assistance, the applicant must agree to own, operate and maintain the house wiring system.

Community Power Line Projects must meet the following criteria to be eligible to receive NN Fiscal Recovery Funds for construction:

1. Community Power Line Projects must be supported by a Chapter Resolution which identifies the project participants that they wish to be connected.
2. Electric Service Provider must be able to acquire the necessary land approvals/consents and permits timely to ensure construction is completed in time to meet the funding deadline or exhaustion of funds.
3. Homes must be feasible to receive electric service, if structures are deemed unfeasible prior to construction, then the Chapter will need to provide an updated Chapter Resolution reflecting this change prior to construction.
4. House wiring must be completed and approved prior to electric service connection.

5. If an applicant is to receive house wiring assistance, the applicant must agree to own, operate and maintain the house wiring system.

Homes that meet the criteria above will enter the right-of-way process where Utility Provider will obtain permit holder consent, chapter resolution (if applicable), Biological Resources Clearance Form (BRCF), Cultural Resources Compliance Form (CRCF), Traditional Cultural Proper Record (TCP), Tribal Authorization Access (TAA), and Service Line Agreement (SLA), if applicable. If the applicant's home is able to get through this process then it may be approved for construction.

The priority can be described as "first to complete the process will be first served" meaning, if an applicant is able to complete the application, has a valid homesite lease, the home passes a physical inspection, and obtain all the applicable land clearance requirements, then that applicant will be served. Homes will continue to receive services until all the funding is expended or the imposed time limit runs.

Eligibility Criteria (Solar Systems)

Single home connections must meet the following criteria to be eligible to receive NN Fiscal Recovery Funds for Solar Systems:

1. Customers/Applicants must complete 'NTUA ARPA Off-Grid Residential Solar Program Feasibility Application'.
2. Customers/Applicants must provide all necessary documents.
3. Homes must be feasible for Solar System.
4. Location of residence shall be located on the Navajo Nation.
5. House wiring must be completed and approved for connection.

1. The home must be found to be physically feasible to live in.
2. Whether the home is on a permanent foundation and is a sound structure (livable).
3. Applicant is willing and able to pay for monthly services.
4. Applicant must have no outstanding balance on existing utility accounts.
5. If an applicant is to receive house wiring assistance, the applicant must agree to own, operate and maintain the house wiring system.

Prioritization of Applicants (Solar Systems)

Prioritization of applicants will be based on the needs of the communities and their constituents and Veterans that reside within the Navajo Nation.



The school has frequent outages that last extended periods of time, most often leading to the cancellation of school and health services. Without reliable power, there is no way to provide proper care, sanitation or screening for COVID and other health related issues for staff, students, health professionals and community members.

There are 340+ students that attend Pine Hill Schools, with a staff of 200+ and 66 staff housing units. In addition, it will also provide reliable power to each building/housing unit on site; therefore, allowing students, staff, healthcare professionals and community members to have the means necessary for consistent and continued proper sanitation and hygiene.

Overcrowding and the lack of domestic water have added to the negative impacts of COVID-19. This project will address this problem in two ways. First, \$14,000,000 will be expended to purchase and transport modular homes that will serve the people of the 23 impacted Chapters (the nine Bennett Freeze Chapters and the 14 NPL Chapters). Second, \$1,550,000 will be expended to develop a plan for a manufactured housing plant on the Nahata Dziil Chapter. The plant will create the capacity for the Navajo Nation to make a long-term impact to the overcrowding problem and to create jobs for Relocates from the Navajo-Hopi Land Dispute.

One of the priorities of the OPVP and the NNC is to finally address the impacts of the Bennett Freeze and Forced Relocation. A long-term plan is in place for the nine Bennett Freeze Chapters and the primary Relocation community, Nahata Dziil. This is an effort known as the Navajo Thaw. This effort will be expanded to provide planning and development funding for the 14 Chapters of the NPL. This project will leverage funding being pursued from Congress by the Navajo Nation to more fully resolve the overcrowding, lack of infrastructure, lack of public facilities, and lack of jobs. ☐ document attached

\$1,550,000.00 for the study and resulting plan to locate a housing manufacturing plant on the Nahata Dziil Chapter.

Purpose: To address the conditions of the families who are currently living in congested dwellings leading to overcrowding. Due to the Bennett Freeze, numerous families in this region were restricted to building homes or repairing their homes until the Freeze was lifted. Lifting of the Freeze did not come with funding to address the dilapidated homes families and most are not financially sound to afford adequate housing. Also to address the conditions facing the families in the Navajo Partitioned Land areas (Chapters) and these are people that are suffering from effects of the Relocation Act of 1974. The Dine' Relocates have been subjected to Social, Psychological, and Economic hardships ever since they moved from the HPL region. Some have lost homes and for the most part, exceeded the size of the dwellings allocated due to the expansion of families or known as the Second Generation. The Second Generation, which are the offspring of the original relocates, are experiencing lack of resources to adequately provide housing for their families and usually they continue to reside with their parents and other family members.

COVID-19: Overcrowded homes due to several families living in one home creates the unsafe environment and the chances of infection is very high.

Recipients: Second and third generation family members of an original Relocatee in the Former Bennett Freeze Area or Navajo Partitioned Land area.

Eligibility: Three eligibility criteria will be required: (the Selection Criteria have been developed by NHLCO in coordination with the chapters affected and applicable Navajo Nation Departments.)

- Home Site Lease
- The Chapters, through Chapter resolution, will select the beneficiaries for the project
- Applicants must certify that they are either a second or third generation family member of an original Relocatee

The eligibility criteria will be reviewed and approved by NHLC resolution.

This program addresses public health challenges that partly caused the unequal impact of the impact on the Navajo Nation.

A shockingly high number of homes on the Navajo Nation lack access to one or more of the following utilities: electricity, water, wastewater, and broadband. The Navajo people receiving the utilities will directly benefit from the program.



Eligibility Criteria: 1.12 Public Health: Bathroom Additions

In order for an applicant to request ARPA funds for a bathroom addition under this legislation they must provide the following information:

1. Complete the NTUA Bathroom Addition with Waterline or Cistern System and Septic/Wastewater Service application.
2. The applicant will have to provide their name, reliable phone number(s), email address, mailing and physical address, the latitude and longitude, and chapter affiliation.
3. They must submit a valid homesite lease or residential lease.
4. Proof of primary residency required.

The criteria to determine eligibility for applicants is based on successful submission of aforementioned documents request. NTUA will perform a feasibility study which includes the following criteria:


1. The home must be found to be physically feasible to lived in.
2. Whether the home is on a permanent foundation and is a sound structure (livable).
3. Home needs to have access to a power source (electric or solar).
4. Applicant is willing and able to pay for monthly services.
5. Applicant must have no outstanding balance on existing utility accounts.
6. If a home is located within ½ mile of a community water system they will be considered for a waterline connection.
7. If the home is located over ½ mile they will be considered a water cistern system.
8. If the applicant is to receive a cistern system, the applicant must be willing and able to own, operate and maintain the system (which includes hauling water to refill).
9. For either a waterline connection or a water cistern system, the applicant must be willing and able to own, operate and maintain the septic system.

Homes that meet the criteria above will enter the right-of-way process where NTUA will obtain the Biological Resources Clearance Form (BRCF), Cultural Resources Compliance Form (CRCF), Traditional Cultural Proper Record (TCP), Tribal Authorization Access (TAA), and Service Line Agreement (SLA), if applicable. If the applicant's home can get through this process, then it can be approved for construction.

The priority can be described as "first to complete the process will be first served" meaning, if an applicant is able to complete the application, has a valid homesite lease, the home passes a physical inspection, and obtain all the applicable land clearance requirements, then that applicant will be served. Homes will continue to receive services until all the funding is expended or the imposed time limit runs.







The Tuba City Regional Health Care Corporation ("TCRHCC") hereby provides its comments on Legislation No. 0086-22: *An Action Relating to Naabik'iyáti' Committee and Navajo Nation Council; Allocating \$1,070,298,867 of Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds; Approving the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds Expenditure Plans for: Chapter Assistance; Public Safety Emergency Communication, E911, and Rural Addressing Projects; Cyber Security; Public Health Projects; Economic Development Projects; Hardship Assistance; Water and Wastewater Projects; Broadband Projects; Home Electricity Connection and Electricity Capacity Projects; Housing Projects and Manufactured Housing Facilities; Bathroom Addition Projects; Construction Contingency Funding; and Reduced Administrative Funding* (the "Legislation").

Unfortunately, Appendix A to the Legislation only allocates fifteen million dollars (\$15,000,000) for TCRHCC as a subrecipient of the Navajo Department of Health, for TCRHCC's Long Term Care, Cancer and Rehabilitation Center, rather than the full twenty-five million dollars (\$25,000,000) requested by TCRHCC. Although \$15,000,000 is the amount apparently requested by the Navajo Department of Health in the Fiscal Recovery Funds Request Form and Expenditure Plan for Navajo Nation Government Units, part of composite Appendix A to the Legislation, as explained further below, that is a grave oversight and TCRHCC respectfully requests that Appendix A to the Legislation be amended by the Navajo Nation Council to provide the full amount of twenty-five million dollars (\$25,000,000) as requested by TCRHCC from the Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds. TCRHCC was assured via the Navajo Nation Department of Justice

Initial Eligibility Determination For Navajo Nation Fiscal Recovery Funds on January 26, 2022 (Attachment A) that twenty-five million would be the amount allocated in the Legislation for the Long Term Care, Cancer and Rehabilitation Center, and the full twenty-five million dollars is critical to match the amount TCRHCC will – at a minimum – be responsible for obtaining from other sources, including a twenty-five million dollar loan from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Background of TCRHCC


TCRHCC is authorized by the Navajo Nation Council as a tribal healthcare organization pursuant to the Indian Self Determination and Education Assistance Act, P.L. 93-638, as amended (the "ISDEAA"). Pursuant to its Compact with the Indian Health Service ("IHS"), TCRHCC operates the former Navajo Area IHS Tuba City Indian Medical Center, and multiple satellite facilities and clinics, providing services to IHS beneficiaries in TCRHCC's service area within the Western Navajo Agency and Coconino County, including the Cameron, Bodaway/Gap, Coalmine Canyon, Kaibeto, LeChee, Coppermine, Tonalea, and To'Naneez'Dizi Chapters of the Navajo Nation, the Hopi Village of Moenkopi, and the San Juan Southern Paiute Tribe. TCRHCC operates a Level III Trauma Center and American Association of Diabetes Educators (AADE) Accredited Program with a primary patient service population of nearly 36,000, and also serves as a Medical Referral Center for over 100,000 patients across the Navajo Nation, including for IHS beneficiaries from the Hopi and San Juan Southern Paiutes tribes.

TCRHCC holds current Accreditations by The Joint Commission on Accreditation for Hospital, Laboratory, Patient Centered Medical Home and Home Health Services and provides comprehensive healthcare services including inpatient/outpatient health services, emergency services; dental and ophthalmology services; orthopedics; OB/GYN; oral surgery; limited urological procedures, pediatric, rheumatology, neurology, dermatology, podiatry, rehabilitative and mental health services, and, most recently in its one-of-a-kind oncology center located on Native American lands, world-class cancer treatment.

The Critical Need for the Full Allocation of \$25,000,000 for TCRHCC's Long Term Care, Cancer and Rehabilitation Center

The COVID-19 Pandemic has severely highlighted the health disparities present in our communities. TCRHCC is the regional referral center for Western Navajo Nation, which includes the transfers from Kayenta Health Center, Kayenta, AZ, and the Hopi Health Care Center on the Hopi Nation. The chronic underfunding of health services makes combatting already present health disparities insurmountable. It is uncertain whether we will continue to live with the presence of the COVID-19 virus and if it will ever completely be eradicated. Our communities have up to three generations living in their households. This exposes elders to the youngest in the house, which also means there is greater risk of children unknowingly bringing COVID-19 into the household. The graph below gives ranges of positive tests in the TCRHCC Service Area:

Positive Patients by Age Group



For TCRHCC to continue to send our Elders more than 100 miles away is irresponsible and ignores our obligation to care for elders in a culturally appropriate environment. Many Navajo elders are unable to live alone at home and have limited options or methods to remain in their home without supportive assisted care. As the Navajo elder demographic ages and prolongs the amount of time they are able to live independently, tribal governments are having to figure out how to provide a comprehensive range of services that are culturally-sensitive and appropriate, and how to preserve the dignity and quality of life for this important and cherished group. The longevity of life among Navajos requires Navajo leaders, communities, and families to assess how best to provide comprehensive care and services for elders.

Unfortunately, it is no longer a viable option to rely on families and extended family members to address the needs of the elders, as this practice has diminished considerably due to younger family members having to relocate from remote rural communities to distant urban communities in search of employment opportunities. More nursing homes or long term care facilities are needed in other regions of the Navajo Nation as Navajo families desire to keep their elderly family members as near as possible to provide all the necessary amenities to extend the life of their loved one(s).


There are two types of care needed; Intermediate Level care which is assistive and does not include the use of nursing care. The motivation for assistive care is to keep an elder in a safe environment to provide such assistance as routine medication administration, where the elders are frail, disabled, or have forgetfulness or the mental inability to recall a medication regimen on their own. The second level of care is Skilled Nursing Care which is essential to care that requires nursing, rehabilitation or other professionally licensed care for a specified care plan prescribed by a physician. TCRHCC is proposing an Assisted Living Center to accommodate sixty (60) elders or disabled persons and provide an additional thirty (30) beds for Skilled Nursing Care.

A second issue that will be addressed with this project is expanding our Hematology Oncology Clinic. This is necessary, as unfortunately there were many community members that

did not receive their cancer screening appointments for almost the entire 2 years of the pandemic. This expansion will address this in response to lockdowns and closure of healthcare outpatient services due to the wait time for a FDA approved COVID 19 vaccinations. We have seen an increase in referrals and are stepping up our campaign for cancer screening. The new Specialty Care Clinic will double the space we will see patients in and fit the need that we project will grow as our elder population also grows. Cancer is a critical concern because of the legacy of uranium related cancers on the Navajo caused by the history of uranium mining and the toxic waste left behind.¹ Since opening its Oncology Center, TCRHCC has collected first-hand data showing clusters of cancers related to uranium exposure.

Top 10 Diagnoses by Patients (C and D groups only)




Conclusion

For the foregoing reasons, TCRHCC strongly urges the Navajo Nation Council to amend composite Appendix A (Attachment B) to Legislation No. 0086-22 to allocate the full amount of twenty-five million dollars (\$25,000,000) as requested by TCRHCC to provide critical health care services to the Navajo Nation's elderly population in its proposed Long Term Care Facility. Surely the needs of our elders must come first. The attached Power Point was presented Health Education and Human Services Committee on April 13, 2022 and approved ((Attachment C). Thank you for your consideration and the opportunity to comment on Legislation No. 0086-22. TCRHCC is committed to identifying, strengthening, and developing health and supportive services and strategies for the benefit of the communities it serves. Resolutions in support of TCRHCC's request by its governing Board of Directors are attached hereto as composite (Exhibit 1).

WHEREAS:

1. Pursuant to Navajo Nation Council Resolution CJY-33-10 (July 21, 2010) and Naabik'iyáti Committee Resolution NABID 96-18 (December 27, 2018), TCRHCC is authorized and designated as a "Tribal Organization" for the purpose of managing and operating contracts with the Indian Health Service ("IHS") under the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act, Public Law 93-638, as amended ("ISDEAA"); *and*
2. Tuba City Regional Health Care Corporation (TCRHCC), a non-profit, 501(c)3, tribal organization as defined in the Indian Self-Determination Act, Public Law 93-638; *and*
3. The TCRHCC service area within the Western Navajo Agency and Coconino County communities including Cameron, Bodaway/Gap, Coalmine Canyon, Kaibeto, LeChee, Coppermine, Tonalea, and To'Naneez'Dizi Chapters, and including the Hopi Village of Moenkopi and the San Juan Southern Paiutes of Tuba City, and TCRHCC receives federal funding on behalf of such Tribes; *and*
4. The TCRHCC Regional Health System with a primary patient service population of nearly 36,000 also serves as a Medical Referral Center for over 100,000 patients across the Navajo Nation, including Hopi and San Juan Southern Paiutes. TCRHCC is also the largest referral center serving the Navajo Nation; *and*
5. TCRHCC Mission includes ensuring the life-long (prenatal through elderly years) health of all populations served, particularly those in its service area (hereinafter "Mission"); *and*
6. TCRHCC has invested capital for a Long-Term Care Facility, a Feasibility Study has been completed; *and*
7. TCRHCC Case Managers/Social Workers send elders to Skilled Nursing and Assisted Living Facilities, both levels of care will be covered in this center; *and*

8. TCRHCC has worked with the Navajo Housing Authority who has assisted with design funds of \$500,000; *and*
9. The COVID pandemic has highlighted the risks of multigenerational housing for elders and the immunocompromised; *and*
10. Communities will see delayed effects of the loss of our Elders from this pandemic in the lack of traditional knowledge and language, a long term care facility will provide accessibility to families to visit their elder locally, many of our elders today are now more than 100 miles away in these type of facilities; *and*
11. TCRHCC will apply to the USDA for the balance of the construction funding, and be obligated to repay this loan in approximately 25 years; *and*
12. TCRHCC has worked with the Arizona Senate through Senator Kelly to apply for funds from the Build Back Better legislation in the amount of \$8 Million and will receive this funding if approved by the US legislative process; *and*
13. Expand the Specialty (Oncology, Hematology) Care Clinic to allow clinical staff to provide more services for this group of patients, and relocate the current service out of an aging modular building; *and*
14. Expand the Rehabilitation services (Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy, Speech Therapy) by relocating out of an aging modular trailer, this will create a central area for outpatient services and for skilled nursing services for our elders.



Good afternoon! I write today in my capacity as a Native person with young children and relational ties to Navajo Nation, as a business owner, and as a civil servant. I offer written suggestions that if made would garner my support for legislation 0086-22. Despite being at a critical time in the world both in terms of how we consume in the world, and at what Putin has threatened to be a World War, I see little that helps to establish Navajo Nation to diversify its economy or to invest in it for the sustainable and resilient future. This bill still places much reliance and dependence on sources of water, energy on the dependence of others. Pushing forward in the way that states and cities have to meet sustainability goals could be addressed through this legislation and historical time of investment in the rebuilding of the Navajo economy and society.

I would encourage any bill to demand net-zero at the most and energy efficiency at the very minimum, plus measures in place to conserve water. I would encourage you to invest more in small businesses. There are registered 216 certified priority one and two companies in the Navajo Nation. With the way this legislation is currently written, these companies could be sidelined as the business as usual of hiring outside companies to come in do the work and leave with the money could occur again. I would encourage the leaders to put measures in place that require the use of priority one and priority two contractors. For this to happen you would need to add the amendment that grants NCDFI money that can be given as grants to the small businesses to be able to acquire the bonding as small business assistance.

I have included a list of other changes I would offer to this legislation:

- Change line 15-16 to eighty million three hundred eighty-eight thousand three hundred dollars (\$80,388,300).

On page 15

- Line 7 add after the word "Transitional" "Energy-Efficient, Water Conserving Housing"

- Line 24 add “Design of facilities and housing will be to Americans with Disability Act “(ADA”) compliance or ADA ready and will provide energy-efficiency and water conservation measures in the form of greywater and water conserving appliances, productive landscaping, solar and off-grid backup technology.”
- Line 29—change amount to ninety-three million nine hundred sixty-two thousand three hundred ninety-eight dollars “\$93,962,398”

Three million (\$3,300,000) for the Navajo Townsite Demolition and Housing Renovation project for the Navajo Chapter as Provision of Government Services (Expenditure Category 6.1), as set forth in **Exhibit G-11**, with administrative oversight by the Division of Economic Development and legislative oversight by the Resources and Development Committee.”
- Next paragraph add “12. Fifty Million dollars (\$50,000,000) to Navajo Community Development Financial Institution Inc. for small business grants to help restore and establish new small businesses owned and operated by Navajo Entrepreneurs as Small Business Economic Assistance (Expenditure Category 2.9) as set forth in **Exhibit G-12**, with administrative oversight by the Division of Economic Development and legislative oversight by the Resources and Development Committee.”





The Judicial Branch Programs and Courts serving the entire Navajo Nation will utilize funds to assist in addressing backlog of court cases, to facilitate court/program operations for recovery to full capacity, and anticipated increased workload during re-opening of courts/programs. The 58 proposed positions will telework and be on intermittent schedules to accommodate new personnel within District/program offices. Operating funds have been budgeted to ensure Judicial personnel can telework by means of laptops/WIFI access, portable printers/scanners, and offices will be upgraded to meet safety mandates for prevention/ mitigation of COVID-19. Travel expenses are requested to provide outreach, training and transport of clients and staff. Supplies are included to implement COVID-19 safety measures for both permanent and proposed personnel as they telework and work on site. Personnel Protection Equipment (PPE), office, operating and custodial supplies are requested. Communications & Utilities budget is to assist staff in teleworking requirement and provide remote access to case management system. Repairs and Maintenance budget will provide improvements to internet connectivity for the Judicial Branch and increase Information Technology (IT) Safety measures. Contractual Services budget for IT and HVAC improvement for improved air quality to districts and programs. Special Transactions for media expenses to communicate with the public and employees through radio and newspaper advertising. Funds were budgeted

to serve all Judicial Districts and programs within the Navajo Judicial Branch.

At the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Judicial Branch implemented a Continuity of Operations Plan (COOP) and Roadmap to Full Capacity (Roadmap). These plans allow public access to Judicial System Services in phases while ensuring the safety of both Judicial employees and the public. While the COOP and Roadmap are prevention plans, Judicial Branch recognizes that our Judicial Branch Employees health and safety are paramount. Judicial Courts, Programs and Administrative Offices are currently under Administrative Orders whereas, Judicial will not shut down their offices, and authorizes teleworking options but will require staff to continue work from within offices and with the general public as essential workers.

These funds will assist and provide positive impact the services to the public and the Navajo Nation. The Judicial Branch is impacted by the Coronavirus which created a case backlog due to a prolonged period of essential services operations. Courts/programs addressed only a required sub-group of statutorily required cases. Service levels to the public will increase throughout the recovery/re-opening period. The Judicial Branch District Courts and Programs will continue to provide services to the public without interruption, while protecting the health and wellbeing of both the Navajo Judicial Branch employees and the public. The Judicial Courts protect the sovereignty of the Navajo Nation and provide legally mandated services to the Navajo Nation communities. Peacemaking and Probation and Parole Services are also essential functions of the Judicial government. These services do not cease during a public health emergency.





Address the social and health disparities created by the COVID 19 Pandemic "Dikos Ntsaaigii-Náhást'éits'áadah" and resulting community violence, prevention of community violence and intervention also related to domestic violence court services as defined by the Domestic Abuse Protection Act. 2. Mitigate and respond to COVID 19 public health emergency at the To'hajiilee Court, Alamo Court and New Mexico portion of the Navajo Nation. 3. Strengthen technology supports for security of court data, maintenance of multi-user computer systems, and maintains internet and intranet web applications for court staff and the community.

Travel- Both To'hajiilee and Alamo District have limited tribal vehicles. If the Judge or Court Administrator need to use the vehicle to attend hearings in Alamo, then there is only 2 vehicles left, so there is a need for POV if the probation or peacemaking program needs to do their work and services. Distance between the two Judicial districts AND with the Administrative Office of the Courts is large, and we are a high mileage program and court(s). Judge or Judicial Hearing Officer and Court staff also need training. All court staff need equipment, including new laptops for all new additional staff. To update current court room entry ways, there is a need to add additional space, doors at the front of the court room and move the witness stand 6 ft away. Connex is needed to store supplies and an outdoor LED sign will help with communicating with litigants and programs. Additional space needed for additional positions at Alamo District and the existing Hogan at Alamo needs phone lines, parking space. This will provide additional office space for the additional Alamo staff. Alamo and To'hajiilee helped each other to remain open for filings processing judgments and holding hearings throughout pandemic. Although there were no in person hearings for their safety, training and technology assisted these court staff with virtual hearings. Additional positions will help us recover from this pandemic. Court Administrator and Office Technician position at Alamo will increase at 100% the processing of invoices, 6B documents through FMIS and support for Alamo court staff. There has been no Court Administrator or OT at the Alamo Judicial District to do this work for that district since the creation of Alamo Circuit Court. The Court Administrator position for these two judicial districts has been funded through To'hajiilee Judicial District. These funds will also address the anticipated increase of case during the re-opening/recovery period, 2022-2024.



PART II. REASON FOR REQUEST AND STATEMENT OF NEED:

The Aneth Judicial District is requesting for American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding of \$314,454 to cover the cost of a Document Technician to assist with the backlog of cases: assist with daily operations of the District court; additional cost will cover staff travel expenses, general operating supplies, general office supplies, custodial supplies and training and registration, fees and dues, and telecommuting support for new staff and other court employees. The district requires roof repairs on its aging building, a new storage bin for supplies and the over flow of district case records. Aneth Judicial District has a small workforce and we have gone through several shutdowns since the onset of the pandemic. Purchase of nonporous desks, nonporous office equipment and space saving economical cubicles will mitigate shut downs in the future. The cubicles will provide case privacy and more importantly, barriers from seasonal flues, viruses and the continued threat from COVID-19 and its variants. Purchase of first aid kits, wall mounted defibrillator and PPE for additional staff will mitigate the seasonal flus, colds and COVID-19 from shutting down the Aneth court. With ARPA funding to the Navajo Judicial Branch, Aneth Judicial District will continue to recover from this pandemic and will continue to provide court services to its residents and communities. The requested amounts will fund the court's operations for the duration of CY 2022 to CY 2024. Additional funding will provide adequate recovery from the pandemic. It will get the Aneth court back into the day-to-day operation and continue to provide a safe working environment for Aneth District court staff and its users and the anticipated increase of cases during the re-opening/recovery period, Calendar Year 2022-2024.

The pandemic cause court cases to be prioritize in accordance to the Judicial Branch Continuity of Operations Plan (COOP), where cases were schedule as essential cases. Pueblo Pintado district did not know this pandemic would continue to two years with various variants, sub variants surfacing the back log of cases has become an issue. Pueblo Pintado Circuit Court request the following budget for: 2001. Personnel in hiring a Court Administrator to oversee the management of backlog of caseload. The District Court Clerk will assist with scheduling, hearing procedures, data entry in the court software onto closure. The Office Technician will assist with management of incoming individuals coming for hearing or virtual hearings, incoming phone calls, prepares administrative documents for training(s), meeting attendance, etc. for the new staff. 3000 Travel Expenses: Meals & lodging expense/Other miscellaneous travel expense/Transportation to & from authorized related function(s) during the COVID-19 pandemic. Due to the criteria imposed, staff will abide by social distancing guidelines 4000 Supplies: The pandemic Covid-19 has caused an increase in the use of office supplies and it is anticipated that will also increase more once the courts open back up to public at the Pueblo Pintado Court as we are entering Phase 2; As staff telework, this has increased our use of supplies for telework; 5500 Communications & Utilities: Pueblo Pintado court needs cellular phones and wireless devices to communicate effectively and keep essential services operating. FY 2023-2024 service fees/rates will be adjusted in the future.

6000 Repairs and Maintenance: During the Covid-19 pandemic, as we rely on devices to communicate with staff using laptop/printers remotely to conduct provide essential services, it takes additional repairs & maintenance fees for building/furniture equipment & computer upgrade hardware; The use of technology equipment has increased due to our inability and limitation for a full staff to be present at the court building. Xerox machine is needed as we only have one machine. The Pueblo Pintado Court is in process moving into phase 2 and need proper ventilations and adequate room for social distancing; jury trials are requested from other district to utilize our court building and we need room to conduct adequate services. For security, Judges Benches in Court room 1, 2, 3 need renovation/upgrades to the standards of adequate court room facilities. Renovation of judicial complex due to hazardous material in the units is required. 7000 Special Transaction: The Court staff need to keep credentials and meeting their performance. These funds will also address the anticipated increase in cases during the re-opening/recovery period, 2022-2024. 9000 Capital Outlay: This court being a small court in size, needs storage space to store cases back log or closed.

PART II. REASON FOR REQUEST AND STATEMENT OF NEED:

PERSONNEL--The Ramah Court is requesting for two additional positions for the three-year period prescribed under ARPA. A Judicial Hearing officer is needed to assist with the backlog of cases, operate and manage Court hearings, filings, and to assist the public and other departments. There will be an increase in Court filings as the Nation begins to open back up to regular operations. The Ramah Court currently does not have a document technician and as our operations move to mainly electronic and wireless means of communication, we desperately need a document technician to assist in managing our backlog, archives and requests for other electronic documents.

SUPPLIES--COVID-19 has led to an increase in the use of office supplies to manage the day to day operations at the Ramah Court. Teleworking and closing our building to the public has increased our use of office supplies. We anticipate the amount of supplies to increase when we begin addressing the backlog of cases.



EQUIPMENT--In addition, our various communication equipment and electronics have sustained extra wear and tear during this pandemic. The Ramah Court relies heavily on non-in-person means of communication; i.e. post-office mailing, printing, copies, custodial supplies for sanitation, and additional office furniture for telework.

TECHNOLOGY--As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Ramah Court is in dire need of technological communication devices which will enable us to continue delivering services. Currently we are not set up to handle the amount of telephonic and virtual court appearances scheduled. As the Nation begins to open back up to regular operating status, we will need to ensure due process and opportunities to be heard are guaranteed. Ramah Court needs new landline telephones and wireless devices for staff to continue operations of court proceedings through devolution or closure of court due to COVID-19. Four Cell phones and MiFi's are needed for Judge, Court Administrator, Staff Attorney, office technician and court clerks while they are teleworking. The court Judge needs a cellphone and MiFi to continue court proceedings and meetings. The Court Administrator needs a cellphone and MiFi to continue needed court operations, attend mandatory meetings, and to communicate with staff. The Staff Attorney requests both MiFi and Cell phone to continue teleworking, organize pro se clinics, take calls from the public, attend branch meetings and attend court hearings. A fourth Cell phone and MiFi is needed for the Office Technician and Court Clerk for use to continue operations due to devolution or closure of court due to COVID-19 court closure. Cell phone and MiFi will also be used when staff is teleworking to maintain social distancing requirements within the court building. These funds will also address the anticipated increase in cases during the re-opening/recovery period, 2022-2024.

PART II. REASON FOR REQUEST AND STATEMENT OF NEED:

The Covid-19 pandemic has impacted the judicial district services by closing the Shiprock Judicial facility in March 2020, no in-person service. The Shiprock personnel is performing virtual service via phone, court's email, post office, and drop box service; limited personnel on duty on a daily basis, and performing essential services only. Personnel focused on essential services which is about only 15% to 20% of the district performance if it was at full capacity of its personnel. First and second year of the pandemic has resulted in backlog in the district case management (case disposition, process and issuance of court documents, hearings), records/archiving management (closed cases), and bring posting of cash bonds/fines and fees to date (2019, 2020, 2021 posting and the next three years 22, 23, 24). Judicial District has one full-time Judge, the one Judge is occupied with a docket for essential cases and hearings on essential cases. Positions include the Judicial Hearing Officer, Document Technicians (2), Financial Technician, and District Court Clerk. Virtual services requires mailing of Notices of Hearings and Court Orders and postage cost, and copying paper for production of court documents, additional funds will be required. Extra Duty Pay for employees is included as the policy has been adopted for the Judicial Branch. These funds will also address the anticipated increase in cases during the re-opening/recovery period, 2022-2024.



Strengthen technology supports for security of court data, maintenance of multi-user computer systems, and maintenance of internet and intranet web applications for court staff and the community.

Travel- Both To'hajiilee and Alamo District have limited tribal vehicles. If the Judge or Court Administrator need to use the vehicle to attend hearings in Alamo, there are only 2 vehicles left, so there is a need for POV if the probation or peacemaking program needs to do their work and services. Distance between the two Judicial districts AND the Administrative Office of the Courts is large, and we are a high mileage program and court(s). Judge or Judicial Hearing Officer and Court staff also need training. All court staff need equipment, including new laptops for all new additional staff. To update current court room entry ways, there is a need to add additional space, doors at the front of the court room and move the witness stand 6 ft away. Connex is needed to store supplies and an outdoor LED sign will help with communicating with litigants and programs. Additional space needed for additional positions at To'hajiilee, roof at To'hajiilee needs to be repaired to allow staff back into office with safe air quality; the parking lot and security needs to be updated at To'hajiilee. This will provide additional office space for the additional staff To'hajiilee and Alamo. Alamo and To'hajiilee helped each other to remain open for filings processing judgments and holding hearings throughout pandemic. Although there were no in person hearings for their safety, training and technology assisted these court staff with virtual hearings. Additional positions will help us recover from this pandemic. 
Navajo Nation President Jonathan Nez declared a State of Emergency in response to the rapidly growing numbers of the coronavirus which closed majority of the government services except for essential services. The Chief Justice of the Nation , also, ordered closures of the courts with limited essential service to the public via email, fax and mailing through the U.S. Postal Services. The Tuba City Judicial District is requesting ARPA Funding to address impacts of COVID-19 and its negative effects on court operations. The Year 2020, the Year of COVID-19, had many unexpected negative effects on the court operations with high numbers of backlog of cases and many cases continued. Some customers are patiently waiting for a decision in their cases and to have their day in court and some customers get upset with the court staff. With the ARPA funding, we are requesting for additional staffing to address the backlog of cases. These funds will also address the anticipated increase in cases during the re-opening/recovery period, 2022-2024.

To Address the back log of cases for the Supreme Court and necessary administrative functions of the court, we are requesting for a Court Administrator and Law Clerk under line item 2110 for a total of three years. The Supreme Court of the Navajo Nation is the only court within the Judicial Branch that lacks a court administrator. The Supreme Court is also the only appellate court of the Navajo Nation; these two positions are critical to the Supreme Court's duties related to appellate litigation, rule making authority, case management, regulation and discipline of legal practitioners, which is substantially different from district court functions. Supreme Court is also requesting for special duty pay for those who are essential employees working during the pandemic and who meet the salary limits.

Supplies will be used for essential staff who are working in the office and telecommuting during the pandemic. General Office Supplies include pens, paper, envelopes, storage boxes, Xerox paper, folders, binders, usb jump drives, and other supplies. PART II. REASON FOR REQUEST AND STATEMENT OF NEED:

Navajo Probation Services covers 16 million acres or 25,000 square miles with a population of over 332,000 residents. Probation Services is a component of the Judicial Courts of the Navajo Nation, a direct services department, referral source to the Courts for rehabilitative services and support. Probation currently has 25 probation officers nationwide to handle condition cases for both probation and parole; short term cases that includes community work service supervision; pre-trial and deferred prosecution services; field supervision, presentence report investigation (PSR-PSI) among other court requests for services for adult and juvenile cases. Probation officers prioritize accordingly to ensure services are provided among all referrals but come up short due to lack of manpower. There is a high increase of presentence report referrals to probation by the Court (a statutory requirement for investigations), interviews and a recommendation. A complete and comprehensive document is submitted to the Court for sentencing. Because of the time line as a required procedural rule and procedure of the Courts, probation officers' primary focus is on report writing for PSRs which leaves very little time for other rehabilitative measures. Probation services is requesting for additional positions for six (06) Report Writers, whom will focus primarily on investigating, interviews and writing a complete and adequate comprehensive report for the Court. This position of PSR Writers will allow probation officers to focus on client needs, reducing recidivism rates and addressing other rehabilitative needs. Probation Services is requesting for additional positions of Report Writers to be positioned solely for presentence reports. Request is for two Report Writers for each of three Regions. Eastern Region consists of Aneth; Shiprock, Crownpoint, Pueblo Pintado and To'hajilee and Alamo. Central Region consists of Window Rock; Ramah, Dziłyíjilín, and Dilkon. The Western Region consists of Chinle, Kayenta and Tuba City. Report Writers will be working from larger districts with office space availability. I sincerely believe that creating a position for this crucial position will benefit effective and further successful outcome of probation's direct services as well as alleviating well-being of staff in terms of burn out. A Report Writer would assist with an essential statutory required duty when a court requests for a comprehensive report resulting in a recommendation. The primary duty of a Report Writer will involve conducting court ordered investigations involving the defendants who have been found by the Court to have committed a crime or criminal acts. Report Writers will focus on the assessment of the referred case for personal information and home environment, also includes further detail of defendant's employment, education and a history of the defendant's criminal record. A report also includes statements from victims and witnesses that a Report Writer needs to locate and conduct an in depth interview. The Report Writer may also be requested to look into details of the defendants health, both physical and mental. The Report Writer will make recommendation to the Court as to appropriate disposition/sentences for adjudicated juvenile offenders or recommending sentence for adult cases. In the recommendation, the Report Writer may conclude an outline of further rehabilitative services. The position also requires field work for interviews and observation of home environment. The intent of the Report Writer position is to primarily focus on report investigation, writing and recommendations.



The Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) requests ARPA-FRF Funding in the amount of \$4,436,757 for a three-year budget and project period. This funding will allow the AOC to hire ten (10) new staff and support one Health & Safety Advisor position for two years, one Construction Project Manager for two years. Funds will help cover travel expenses, to purchase non-capital items that have a value of less than \$5,000, Operating Supplies, Personal Protection Equipment (PPE), Custodial Supplies, COVID-19 self-test kits, Rental expenses for additional meeting spaces and equipment/records storage space, Monthly service charges for Cellular Phones and Mifis, purchase facility Repair & Maintenance supplies and services to address health and safety needs, Media Advertisement to support contract procurement and hiring/recruitment, and health/safety and court case management Training support. The Judicial Branch is impacted by the Coronavirus and it resulted in case backlog due to a prolonged period of essential services operations, and addressing only a required sub-group of statutorily required court cases. The AOC is critical to supporting the core administrative functions for each business unit, and the new personnel positions will be addressing the need for timely processing of financial documents, and the needs for maintaining safe court facilities during the re-opening of the courts and programs to the public. The use of Information Technology will be maintained to continue remote operations and access to the courts and programs via the internet and telephone. AOC will be involved in every aspect of addressing the case backlog in every court, and addressing the daily needs to keep branch personnel and the public safe from the spread of the Coronavirus.

The equipment Judicial Branch is requesting will provide storage, fast, secure and other electronic transport of data in the form of Just Ware Case Management data, Court Document data in raw or print format (Complaints, Orders, Judgements, Dispositions, Citations, etc.), Video data (Appearances, Hearings, etc.) and other electronic data relevant to court cases without the need for manual transport and person-to-person contact across the Navajo Nation, including the courts that are located outside the boundaries of the Navajo Nation. COVID-19 has dictated the 'social distancing', 'safer at home' terms to mitigate the spreading of the virus.



The applications will provide email security, account authentication and create backups of Court data, electronic Court documents, Just Ware servers and data, Justice Web repayment services and Judicial website servers. COVID-19 has invited more than normal influx of computer malware and ransomware, these applications and appliances are required to counter these types of intrusions into the Navajo Nation computer network.

The Operations and Maintenance (O&M) funds will be utilized by all eighteen (18) business units. Equipment, and supplies will be purchased and divided amongst all business units within the Judicial Branch. Purchases and contracts will be processed through the 6B Procurement Process and financial documents/records will be on file for transparency and accountability.

PART III. LIST ALTERNATIVE FUNDING SOURCES BEING PURSUED AND CONTINGENCY PLAN IF REQUEST IS NOT FUNDED:

The Administrative Offices of the Courts has limited Navajo Nation General Funds for personnel and operating funds to provide administrative assistance to the courts and programs of the Judicial Branch, maintain safe and adequate court facilities for all court users and staff. The declining Navajo Nation revenue has resulted in limited funding for the Navajo courts. The funding is paramount in providing legally mandated services to the public.





1. Introduction

The School needs emergency help. The School is out of water. Both wells are not working, and the only water is being supplied by the neighboring Jacob's Well system. The pipes in the ground are 45 years old and need replacing. The water tank needs repair. Water samples have exceeded the EPA Maximum Contaminant Levels for arsenic, lead, radionuclides and endocrine disrupting phthalates. The system has grown over the years and served the Indian Health Service Clinic and other facilities that are especially needed by the community as it fights the COVID-19 virus.

Steps for Clean Water:

- Sources- Well #1 and Well # 2, BOTH NOT WORKING
- Connection to neighboring system- Jacob's Well (off campus)
- Hilltop Tank and School Tank Raw Water Storage
- Optimized Treatment- removes arsenic, lead, phthalates, and radionuclides
- Out to distribution- pump supplies pressure
- Lines to buildings

The Ramah Navajo School Board, Inc., ("School") is a private, self-governing 501(c)(3) nonprofit corporation which runs a complex of Head Start, Elementary, Junior High and High Schools, and other services at Pine Hill, New Mexico. While the School cooperates with the Ramah Navajo Chapter of the Navajo Nation, it is a separate entity. In 1970, the Board established the Ramah Navajo High School in Ramah, NM, one of the first Indian community schools governed by an all-Indian, locally controlled school board. By 1975, the current Pine Hill Elementary and High Schools were under construction at their present site 12 miles south of the town of Ramah and the students began learning there even before the buildings were completed. The local efforts were a model for the groundbreaking federal 1975 Indian Self-Determination and Educational Assistance Act, PL 93-638, which provided similar educational opportunities across the country to Indian students. The 50th anniversary of the Board's founding was celebrated in February 2020 just before the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic became a national health crisis. Federal funds, under the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic security (CARES) Act, are available for addressing immediate health and safety needs related to the pandemic but need to be expended by the end of 2020. The water system is 45 years old and deficient and inadequate for the additional demands on the system for sanitation and prevention of the spread of the virus. The Navajo Nation including the Ramah Navajo community has been disproportionately negatively impacted by the virus. A contributing factor to the COVID-19 impact on the Navajo Nation is the lack of running water for sanitation purposes. On an emergency back-up basis, the School's system occasionally supplies water to much of the southern half of the Ramah Navajo Chapter, including the school complex, Jacob's Well, unit 3, unit 5 and the Hilltop tank's systems.

The School has contracted with WHPacific for the preparation of a Preliminary Engineering Report (PER), to evaluate the present condition of the School's water system and determine the suitability for continued use and recommended improvements. A PER is a planning document required as part of the process of obtaining financial assistance for the development or improvement of drinking water projects. The PER describes the proposed project from an engineering perspective, analyzes alternatives to the proposal, defines project costs, and provides information critical to the underwriting process.

United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Rural Development Bulletin 1780-2, *Preliminary Engineering Reports for the Water and Waste Disposal Program*, has been adopted by many state and federal agencies as the template for the development of the PER required for the funding application process. As such, RD Bulletin 1780-2 was used as the guide for the preparation of the document.

2. Project Planning

a) Location




Figure 1. Location Map

The proposed project is in the unincorporated community of Pine Hill in Cibola County in the heart of the Ramah Chapter of the Navajo Nation on a property of about 240 acres owned by the School. It is about 35 miles southwest of Grants, NM, on Indian Service Route ("Route") 125, about 22 miles south of the town of Ramah. The Pine Hill School is near the intersection of Routes 125 and 140. A Location map is shown in Figure 1.

The project water system is the oldest part of a larger system "NN3500250 Pinehill Community and School RNUA". RNUA is the Ramah Navajo Utility Authority, a separate for-profit part of the Ramah Navajo Chapter government. This PER deals with the "campus" community served by the School's water system including Pine Hill Schools (Head Start, Elementary, Junior High and High School and administration buildings), 70 residences for teachers and staff and dormitories for residential students, the School Farm and Fairgrounds, as well as the related entities of KTDB 89.7 Radio Station, Pine Hill Volunteer Fire Department and Emergency Medical Services, United States Post Office, Pine Hill Health Center and Pharmacy, and Pine Hill Behavioral Health. The small shopping center of Pine Hill Market and Gas Station, a branch of the First Financial Credit Union and a formerly operating laundromat are served by the School's water and wastewater lines. Nearby "off-campus", in the Pinehill community are the RNUA yard - located off Indian Route 122 near the intersection with Indian Route 184, Jacob's Well - located on Indian Service Route 139, the Ramah Navajo Department of Transportation office and patrol yard - located approximately one mile south of the intersection of 125 and 122 and abutting 125, and four Navajo Housing Administration developments - located just east across 184 and at the intersection of 182 and

122. Figure 4 shows the relative location of the off-campus entities and the tanks and wells mentioned in this report.

The elevation of the project site ranges from 7402 at the wastewater plant discharge to the arroyo to 7500 feet in the north side of the campus at the top of the hill. The elevation at the bottom of the existing water tank is approximately 7499 feet. Located on a low hill above flat terrain, the service area is bound by Route 125 on the West and Route 184 on the east, for a West-East distance of about 3,500 feet and is about 2,800 feet north to south. To the east, the Continental Divide, with an average elevation about 7800 feet, meanders as close as six miles away and El Morro National Monument and the Zuni Mountains are to the northeast. The terrain slopes southwestward toward tributaries of the Zuni River and the Little Colorado River.

Plants and trees native to the region include grasses, chamisa, sagebrush, Ponderosa pine, piñon, and juniper. Elk, deer, turkeys and eagles are often seen near the site. Data from the nearest weather station at Grants indicates the climate is semi-arid with summer thunderstorms common in July and August. Snow is possible from November through March and has occurred as late as May. Average monthly summer temperatures range from 49° to 89° F and in the winter from 15° to 51° F. The record high and low are 98.1 degrees F July 3, 2007, and -23.1 degrees F on February 3, 2011.

b) Environmental Resources Present

The project area is rural with considerable development around the School for which the project provides water. Area agriculture activities are centered on livestock and farming in the form of traditional vegetable gardens supplements store bought groceries. Ranching includes mostly sheepherding or cattle ranching. Multigenerational families live in clustered housing developments or scattered isolated homes in the area. Most of the population are members of the Navajo Nation and consists of families from small children to elders, with a majority employed at the school or the above related entities.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Flood Insurance Rate Map 35006C1000C dated August 15, 2020, the project area, categorizes the flood risk as Zone D which indicates the flood risk has not been quantified. The project sits on the top of Pine Hill which should remove it from any floodplain.

The building site for the school and support buildings was determined by the people of Ramah Navajo. The site has been extensively used for 50 years and staff have encountered no artifacts. It is unknown if an archaeological survey has been completed for the site, previous ancestral uses for the land were minimal and it is unlikely that any cultural resources are present in the specific project site. Cliff dwellings and pueblo ruins, like the site on top of El Morro National Monument, are known in the area, but it is disrespectful to visit or build on them.

Since 1975, during the construction of the school and other community buildings, or since then during the installation and maintenance of water distribution or sewage collection lines, no cultural resources were encountered. In future water and sewer line construction no disruption of natural or historical resources are anticipated.

No endangered species are known to be present.

c) Population Trends

Population Trends. The 2017 Regional Water Plan for Northwest New Mexico prepared for the Interstate Stream Commission indicates a projection of little growth for Cibola County. Estimates from the US Census American Community Survey for 2010-2016 for the Ramah Chapter show a down and up fluctuation between 1247 and 1401 total population for a net projection of about 0.5% growth. The water use at the School depends on many factors such as the current COVID-19 pandemic, new school and community programs, and alternative education opportunities. The Ramah Navajo Department of Transportation performed another study in 2015 which indicated that population was closer to 4000 registered Ramah Navajo Band members who live within the reservation boundary.

The Pine Hill School, New Mexico, is an unincorporated community in Cibola County within the Navajo Nation census tract 2430. It is not a Census Designated Place and Census Data for this community is not readily available. The approximate student population of the school is 316. The school is not limited to students from the immediate community and has dormitory facilities to better serve students from more remote areas. Public Water System Permit NN3500250 for Pinehill Community and School RNUA has the system serving 1007 people. Attendance at the school and the size of the staff at the school and associated facilities are expected to remain steady.

The current 2020 census will give more current data when it is complete. The closest towns in New Mexico, such as Gallup, Grants and Zuni report reasonably stable populations as shown by University of New Mexico Bureau of Business & Economic Research. Gallup and Grants have shown a small decrease in population over the 2000 to 2010 period, while Zuni has shown a small population increase. Cibola County has a 2010 population of 32,900, showing a growth pattern over the previous ten years. The population of the RNSB community is expected to have about 0.5 % annual growth.

Archeologists date the presence of Navajo people in the area back to 600 AD. According to the Ramah Navajo Chapter profile on enavajo.org, seven Navajo families returned in 1868 from the Long Walk to their traditional homeland of Tlohchin, "Wild Onion". The chapter was certified by the Navajo Nation in 1957, a chapter house was built in 1964. The Ramah Navajo School Board, Inc., was established 1970 and just in February 2020 celebrated its 50th anniversary.

d) Community Engagement

Due to the tight timetable of funding, community engagement by the consultant will be limited to a summary of project status delivered to RNSB staff and RNSB Board. The RNSB conducts Board of Director meetings as deemed necessary to communicate to the public ongoing events or projects. The organizational documents require monthly meetings open to all system users and residents. The contract for the PER for Water System Improvements was approved on August 12, 2020.




Figure 2. Campus Area Layout

b) History

The Pine Hill Schools and community were built in stages. In 1975, two wells were drilled to a depth of 3,500 feet, cased, equipped with sand screens and the bottoms were gravel packed. The static water level is at 800 feet. Most of the water distribution and wastewater collection lines were put in with the initial construction of the school in 1975 and have exceeded their design life. The current water treatment plant operation and maintenance manual indicates the Culligan treatment system was put in place in 1990 and consists of water softening, filtration, chlorination and fluoridation. Equipment includes 2 water softeners, 2 pressure filters, and chemical feeding equipment for fluoride and chlorine supplied by Southwest Water Conditioning, Inc., a Culligan representative. There are two raw water storage tanks, one 250,000-gallon tank on the schools' campus and a second is the Hilltop tank, a 500,000-gallon tank located 2 miles to the northwest operated by the RNUA but occasionally receiving water from the School system. A booster pump is used to obtain distribution pressure after treatment. A Fire Suppression pump is also part of the system.

Over the years, additional buildings were constructed on the School campus. The following is a brief history of the growth of the campus.

1. On September 26, 1975 the Pine Hill High School and Elementary Schools were dedicated. They were originally built to accommodate 248 students.
2. In 1976, the Kindergarten and gymnasium buildings were completed. A Health Center was built in Pine Hill and operates under contract by the Indian Health Service.
3. In 1981, the Library and Media Center were built, and the North Central Association officially accredited the schools.
4. In 1989, The Middle School and Multi-Purpose buildings were completed.
5. In 1992, the Pine Hill Market was built.
6. In 1993, the Child Care Center opened.
7. In 1995, the 66-unit staff housing project was completed.

8. By 1997, the Behavioral Health Center, Parent Resource Center, and the Volunteer Fire Department and Emergency Medical Services building were completed.
9. In 2007, the new Pine Hill School Dormitory was completed.

c) Condition of Existing Facilities

Operator

The Board employs Ron Francis, Water Operator Level 2 for treatment and Level 1 for distribution. While there are some meters on the system, the school buildings are not charged separately for water and the staff housing and other users are charged a flat rate, so there is no meter reader on staff.

Water Rights

The Navajo Nation has extensive but unquantified water rights under the Winters Doctrine (1908). The Zuni River Adjudication is currently underway. The Zuni portion of the adjudication has been rescheduled to allow the Zuni Pueblo to work cooperatively with the Navajo Nation and the Ramah Band of Navajos. In the San Juan River basin, the adjudication process resulted in a negotiated settlement that quantified the Navajo Nation's Federally Reserved water rights for that basin. The Navajo Nation intervened in the Zuni adjudication in 2002 and continues to be involved. The groundwater withdrawals for the school and community should be considered in any settlement.

This Preliminary Engineering Report evaluates the water system of the Board for the planning period 2020-2040. Current water demands are approximately 133 acre-feet per year, based on the 1,007 users on the water permit, and at a 0.5% growth rate would increase to 1,113 users and 147 acre-feet by 2040.

Water Quality

Recent water quality testing show exceedances of EPA Maximum Contaminant Levels regulations in phthalates, arsenic and radionuclides as well as non-compliance violations on submittal of various sampling results. The water treatment building and equipment needs replacing. The chlorine fumes have eaten holes in the door frames. The arsenic and radionuclides violations show the need for more extensive treatment. Blending water between the wells to dilute the arsenic and radionuclides helps and requires additional methods for a long-term solution.

Water Supply

The two wells are 3,500 feet deep with a static water level of 800 feet. Well 1 was recently overhauled and has been producing all the water for the system, until it recently went offline due to clay chunks interfering with the operation. Well 2 urgently needs an overhaul to correct electrical problems that shut the well off, as well as to replace worn and corroded parts. Well 1 produces 80 gallons per minute. Well 2 produces 40 gallons per minute when it is functioning. Additional equipment such as a properly equipped service truck would improve response time to line breaks. With both wells inoperable the system is relying on the water from Jacob's Well and the Hilltop Tank. Repairs of both Wells 1 and 2 are underway.

Water Distribution

The School's system within the campus includes approximately 3.2 miles of 6-inch cast iron and galvanized steel water distribution line, and 1.2 miles of 4-inch and 2-inch as shown in Figure 4, located throughout the service area. Since the School owns all the property, there are no private easements or public permits for the waterlines, except where the lines cross IR 125 and IR 140. The exact location of these lines and the wastewater collection system were mapped as well as abandoned-in-place water lines from an old trailer park that sat on part of the campus.




Figure 3. Existing Water System Layout

A general schematic layout and general service maps of the existing water system are included in Figure 3. The existing lines were surveyed and located to aid in construction but the records of the construction of the lines are not available. Additionally, the consultant used Ground Penetrating Radar (GPR) to locate lines. Due to materials, some lines are approximate as no trace wire or other commonly used locating tags were identifiable.

Raw water from the School's two wells is pumped into the 250,000-gallon School tank. Water needed for local demand is treated by the RNSB treatment facility and treated water is piped to the campus and the shopping center users. Excess raw water is pumped to the Hilltop 0.5 million-gallon tank about 2 miles northwest of the campus where it is mixed with raw water from Jacob's Well. Jacob's Well is 2.5 miles north of the campus and was completed in 2009. Jacob's Well has only a small storage tank at the site, so water is pumped to the Hilltop Tank 2.4 miles to the west and returns to Jacob's Well for treatment at Jacob's Well. The Jacob's Well treatment facility treats water for the off-campus Pinehill Community and the water fill station at Jacob's Well. Jacob's Well, the Hilltop Tank and the School tank roughly form an equilateral triangle. The Hilltop tank is at elevation 7606 feet, the highest elevation for several miles in any direction, about 100 feet higher than the School tank. The School system and the Jacob's Well system

are owned and operated independently but regionally connected for mutual support. While this 'regionalization' of the two entities benefits both in times of well failure or infrastructure upgrades, meter readings and monthly reports to establish a water accounting between the two entities are recommended to improve operations.

Water Storage

The School system includes one deteriorated 250,000-gallon galvanized steel raw water storage tank. A 500,000-gallon tank is connected to the system and may be able to supply water during rehabilitation of the 250,000-gallon tank.




Figure 4. Tanks and Wells

The USDA Rural Development design standard recommends 2 days of emergency storage as follows:

- 100 gallons per person
- 1007 persons
- 201,400 gallons emergency storage.

As noted above, the system has only one storage facility on campus, the 250,000-gallon storage tank which barely has the minimum requirements for emergency storage. The existing School system is limited in both capacity and system pressure. The ground level raw water 250,000-gallon tank is the only storage and it is before the water treatment. The booster pump and existing 6 and 4-inch water lines provide limited flow throughout the system. An additional 60,000-gallon elevated or pressurized pneumatic tank for treated water would allow for more operational flexibility and emergency response capacity.

Fire Hydrants

Fire hydrants are located throughout the campus and residential areas, but these will also need to be replaced. The Volunteer Fire Department at the School is not in operation. Fire response and prevention support is currently dependent on the Candy Kitchen Volunteer Fire Station, or the El Morro Volunteer Station located about 20 miles north and east of Pine Hill. The School facilities staff expressed a willingness

during their hiring interviews to be part of the response to fires but have not received fire-fighting training. Additional equipment such as a truck to respond to brushfires would increase the department's capabilities. If the Volunteer Fire Department could be affiliated with the county, volunteers may be eligible through the Public Employees Retirement Association for a pension of \$125 per month after ten years of active service with the department at retirement at age of 55 or more. For 25 years of active service the pension is \$250 per month. Coordinating the School water system maintenance needs of flushing hydrants periodically according to the hydrant maintenance plan could be coordinated with fire-fighting practice and using the water productively for landscape needs.

d) Financial Status of Any Existing Facilities

The School's water system is not effectively metered, and a flat rate of \$14.00 per month is charged for residential service. Some commercial connections are metered and charged a minimal amount based on usage. Funding for operation and maintenance of the system comes from a variety of sources, each with its rules and limits for use of funds. Employees charge their time to different accounts depending on whether they are working on a water leak in the main line or doing building maintenance by replacing a leaking faucet. The Facilities Management Division has a staff of one administrative and four field staff of which about half of their time is devoted to water and wastewater duties. An Operating Budget for a similarly sized system might have annual revenues of approximately \$180,000. New service lines and meters to all residences are included in the proposed improvements outlined in the PER.

e) Water/ Energy/ Waste Audits

No water, energy, or waste audits have ever been conducted for the RNSB system.

4. Need for Project

a) Health, Sanitation, and Security

The COVID-19 virus has taken a disproportionate toll on the Navajo Nation and the Ramah chapter. Providing safe clean water needed to support the schools will take extraordinary efforts. The fifty-year old current system, built for less than half of the demand of the accumulated expansion of the campus and surrounding community, is inadequate for the current demand, much less for the additional health demands of the government mandated protocols for reopening the schools.

Adequate fire protection is not currently available for many of the buildings on the school campus. There is a Fire Suppression pump, but it only serves the Elementary School and the Dormitory. The Gymnasium is scheduled to be demolished and rebuilt with a fire suppression system included. The fire suppression capability of the water distribution system is also limited by pipe size and water pressure. Larry Barker with Albuquerque's KRQE Channel 13 News in 2014 described the Pine Hill School as the "most dangerous school in America". While his report focused on dysfunctional fire alarm systems which have since been fixed, this project will address many other safety issues raised.

b) Aging Infrastructure

The system has been in use continuously since 1975. The 6-inch and 4-inch galvanized steel pipes were not installed with cathodic protection or the protection was disrupted with line breaks and repairs. Some of the pipes were laid directly on the sandstone layer that is as close as four feet below ground level and pipe vibration through use has caused repeated repairs in some areas. The School has been

fortunate to receive grants for construction of facilities but obtaining funding for operation and maintenance has been more difficult. Line repairs have been costly. The water treatment building has deteriorated with use and does not have room for the expanded filtration required to achieve compliance with regulations. Dead end lines at the dormitory and the farm should be connected to form a loop.

c) Reasonable Growth

While the current population growth rate is projected to be minimal, the history of the schools and community show a far-sighted trend of expansion to try to solve all the problems of the community from education to mental health. Response to the Covid-19 pandemic might result in improved medical facilities, expanded greenhouse production of local food, a revived vocational curriculum or other infrastructure improvements. Water system capacity to handle at least a 0.5% percent annual growth rate in infrastructure should be included in planning for the twenty-year period.

5. Alternatives Considered

a) Alternative 1

1. Description

The major distribution system components of Alternative 1 are shown on Figure 2 and include:

Abandon existing waterlines in-place and replace with new larger capacity lines. Ensure that the new lines are laid out in loops to avoid dead end lines including connecting the dormitory to the farm to eliminate two dead end lines. Repair or replace the sprinkler system in the football field. Provide for fire suppression flow to all buildings. Install meters for each building and line. Install isolation valves, pressure relief valves and air release valves as needed to operate the system.

Conduct a thorough overhaul of Well #2 and address issues with well #1. Replace the water treatment building with a structure large enough to accommodate more equipment for controlling arsenic and radionuclides. Upgrade the water treatment process to remove arsenic, phthalates and radionuclides. Service lines and water meters will be coordinated with the upcoming gym replacement to ensure smooth connection.

The survey of the existing system was used to estimate the replacement system. Approximately 17,020-feet of 8-inch and 1475-feet of 4-inch and 5,000 feet of 2-inch water lines will be constructed to connect the system. Also needed are 48 water valves, 24 hydrants, and 128 water meters. Water system modeling during the design phase may refine these numbers.

Evaluate the structural integrity, internal coating and cathodic protection system of the 250,000-gallon School tank.

2. Design Criteria

Based on freezing temperatures it is suggested that main water lines should be installed with at least 5 feet of cover.

Water treatment and distribution will have to meet the requirements of the federal Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA) under which the EPA delegated enforcement to the Navajo Nation.

The USDA Rural Development design standard of 100 gpd per person were reviewed for this project. The water permit indicates the system serves 1007 people. Reasonable growth of 0.5% per year would add 113 more people which would result in 1120 people and 112,000 gallons per day x 2 days = 224,000 gallons. Emergency storage is required for a minimum of two days, or a minimum of 224,000 gallons.

3. Map

A map of new water lines, water treatment building and tank is shown in Figure 5.

4. Environmental Impacts

Flood Insurance Rate Maps gathered from FEMA shows the area has not been surveyed for flood risk, but Pine Hill campus is located on a hill so flooding should not be an issue. All waterlines, building and tanks will be installed in previously disturbed areas, and no environmental issues anticipated.

5. Land Requirements

All land involved in the project is owned by the School, so no easements or rights-of way are needed.

6. Permits Required

All waterline construction will be located on the School's land, so no permits are needed except where lines will cross Indian Service routes or roadways, chiefly Route 140 and 125. The proposed new water treatment building will be located near the existing 250,000-gallon tank. Navajo Nation EPA will need to approve final design of the treatment process.

7. Potential Construction Problems

The project site is subject to freezing weather so installation of the waterlines before winter is needed. Construction of the concrete foundation slab for the building will need to take place within the months of March through October to provide adequate curing temperatures and acceptable weather conditions. Previous construction projects were not carried through to completion so houses did not receive a certificate of occupancy and the Elementary school could not be used until completed by a second contractor two years later.

8. Sustainability Considerations

The new water line will be PVC pipe which poses no environmental hazards and has a long service life with little maintenance issues when installed properly. Financial sustainability might be improved by tracking the actual costs of the water and wastewater operations and maintenance to improve budgeting and accrue an O&M fund to handle inevitable line breaks, well problems and emergencies without having to tap into other funds.

9. Estimate

The estimate below represents the engineer's opinion of probable cost for design and construction of the project. Annual operation and maintenance costs, over the life of the improvement, need to be considered when estimating a lifetime cost. Operation and maintenance costs over a 20-year period are shown in Section 6 in the Life Cycle Costing Section for the alternatives. Budgeting information is shown in the Appendix and may be used to estimate operation and maintenance costs.

Operation and maintenance costs over a 20-year period are shown in Section 6 in the Life Cycle Costing Section for the alternatives. Budgeting information is shown in the Appendix and may be used to estimate operation and maintenance costs.

d) Alternative 4

1. Description

Alternative No. 4 -No Change

If no change is made to the current facility, the Board will continue to experience deteriorated water lines and hydrants, one dysfunctional well, low pressure water service, inadequate fire protection and insufficient water treatment.

All infrastructure installed in 1975 has exceeded its design life. They will remain in use, continuing to age. It is critical to note all infrastructure requires maintenance and becomes a cost burden for the community. Maintenance costs would most likely increase.

Water meters would not be installed, and the current flat rate billing would remain in effect. Water quality standards would not be met for phthalates, arsenic and radionuclides.

2. Design Criteria

Design criteria are not applicable to this alternative; however, the existing system does not meet the needs of the community or the recommended standards set by USDA Rural Development, the Navajo Nation and EPA.

3. Map

A map of the existing system is shown in Figure 3.

4. Environmental Impacts

Potential human illness and environmental impacts may occur if the existing system were unable to provide safe and adequate water service to the community in the future.

5. Land Requirements

No land acquisition is required for this alternative.

6. Potential Construction Problems

This alternative does not require any construction.

7. Sustainability Considerations

Sustainability will not be considered in this alternative.

8. Cost Estimate

No costs are associated with this alternative. Operation and maintenance costs are likely to increase due to ageing infrastructure.

6. Selection of an Alternative

a) Life Cycle Cost Analysis

The Life Cycle Cost Analysis used the projected present worth of the three alternatives, Alternative 1 System-wide Improvements, Alternative 2 System-wise Improvements plus repair of the 250,000-gallon School tank, and Alternative 3 System -wide Improvements plus replacement of 250,000-gallon School tank. Alternative 4 is a no build option and is not included in the Life Cycle Cost Analysis. The Salvage Value for the alternatives was assumed to be \$0.

To determine the present value of a future cost, the following equation was used:

7. Proposed Project (Recommended Alternative)

a) Preliminary Project Design

Alternative 1 is the recommended alternative. The evaluation of the tank integrity would determine if Alternative 2 or 3 would be needed.

Alternate 1 is shown in Figure 3 and proposes the following improvements:

Abandon existing waterlines in-place and replace with new larger capacity lines. Ensure that the new lines are laid out in loops to avoid dead end lines. Repair or replace the sprinkler system in the football field. Provide for fire flow to all buildings. Install meters for each building and line.

Conduct a thorough overhaul of Well #2 and address issues with well #1. Replace the water treatment building with a structure large enough to accommodate more equipment for controlling arsenic and

radionuclides. Upgrade the water treatment process to remove arsenic, phthalates and radionuclides. Service lines and water meters will be coordinated with the upcoming gym replacement to ensure smooth connection.

The survey of the existing system was used to estimate the replacement system. Approximately 17,020-feet of 8-inch and 1475-feet of 4-inch and 5,000 feet of 2-inch water lines will be constructed to connect the system. Also needed are 48 water valves, 24 hydrants, and 128 water meters. Water system modeling during the design phase may refine these numbers.

Evaluate the structural integrity, the internal coating and the cathodic protection system of the 250,000-gallon School tank.

1. Design Criteria

Based on freezing temperatures it is suggested that main water lines should be installed with at least 5 feet of cover.

Water treatment and distribution will have to meet the requirements of the federal Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA) under which the EPA delegated enforcement to the Navajo Nation.

The USDA Rural Development design standard of 100 gpd per person were reviewed for this project. The water permit indicates the system serves 1007 people. Reasonable annual growth of 0.5% would add 113 more people which would result in 1120 people and 112,000 gallons per day x 2 days = 224,000 gallons needed for fire protection. Emergency storage is required for a minimum of two days, or a minimum of 224,000 gallons.

b) Design Criteria

Nominal system design criteria used to plan and implement the proposed water system for the School are presented in Table 8 below.

USDA Rural Development recommended design criteria includes a value of 100 GPCD water consumption for rural water systems. RD recommended storage for rural systems is based on a two (2) days emergency storage of 700 gallons per Equivalent Dwelling Unit (EDU), and distribution system static pressures between 20 and 90 pounds per square inch (psi) to all customers served. The water usage at the school is difficult to estimate based on EDU's, so 100 gallons per capita per day was used.

EPANET, a water distribution system modeling software package developed by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) Water Supply and Water Resources Division, will be used to model the Board's water system. An assumption was made that the Board's service area adapted to a general pattern of water consumption, in which there is a peak of consumption in the morning, where approximately 60% of the water is consumed in 3 hours and a second peak in the afternoon, with 25% in two hours. The remaining 15% is used the remaining hours. Water usage data, shown in the appendix were used to develop the demand using the pattern just described. Project Schedule

Covid-19 funds are available in August 2020. Construction is estimated to commence in October 2020.

c) Permit Requirements

All waterline construction will be located within private and tribal rights-of-way. Coordination with the Navajo Nation tribal authorities should commence as soon as possible.

d) Sustainability Considerations

The new water line will be PVC pipe which poses no environmental hazards and has a long service life with little maintenance issues when installed properly. Financial sustainability might be improved by tracking the actual costs of the water and wastewater operations and maintenance to improve budgeting and accrue an O&M fund to handle inevitable line breaks, well problems and emergencies without having to tap into other funds.

g) Annual Operating Budget

Water and wastewater operations and maintenance are funded from a complex of funding sources and are not itemized out separately. The following method is proposed to allow for more specific budget. If the School had water use like a small town, assuming 4 people per home x 100 gallons per day per person x 30 days per month = 12,000 gallons per month per home. 12,000 gallons per month x \$5.00 per 1000 gallons = \$60.00 per month bill per home. \$60 x 250 homes = \$15,000 per month x 12 months = \$180,000 per year. That amount would need to cover the costs of the water treatment chemicals, electricity for pumping, staff salaries, resin disposal, line breaks, pump and equipment replacement every 20 years, etc. Current funding methods may be preferred, but this method shows that providing drinking water is a substantial part of the school's budget.

8. Conclusion and Recommendations

The recommended alternative will complete substantial water system improvements for the School's system. This option will provide safe drinking water and reduced maintenance costs to the School's community. Life cycle cost analysis indicates the differences in cost between the alternatives.

Using 2020 CARES Act funding to replace the water system and components would generally be an allowable expense under the Act as it directly applies to public health and the mitigation of the spread of COVID-19 and other viruses. This Report should provide a major part of the documentation that the Ramah Navajo School Board would need to submit for COVID-19 funding of a request for \$5.0 to 6.4 million from the 2020 CARES Act for the water system improvements.

Ramah Navajo School Board History

The history of Ramah Navajo School Board, Inc. and the Pine Hill Schools is one to be proud of and to learn from. It is a story of our families, ancestors and community leaders who were responsible for founding the school against great odds and opposition. Prior to 1942, there were no local educational facilities for the Ramah Navajo people. The first school for the Ramah Navajo was a Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) Day School built in 1943 in Mountain View that had a capacity for only 30 students, one teacher for first through third grades. Definitely, this did not meet the educational needs of the community. After the third grade, students were sent to Albuquerque, New Mexico; Fort Wingate, New Mexico; Brigham City, Utah; Riverside, California; and other off-reservation boarding schools far from the Ramah Navajo community. When the Mountain View Day School became overcrowded, plans were made to enlarge the school, but the non-Indian residents in Ramah village requested that a dormitory be built in Ramah for the Navajo students to attend Ramah Public School. While the Ramah Navajo Community (RNC) objected to this step, a BIA dormitory was built in 1954 near the Ramah village, closing the Mountain View Day School. For the next 13 years, Ramah Navajo students attended the Ramah Public School. (<https://www.facebook.com/Ramah-Navajo-School-Board-inc> PO Box 70, Pine Hill, NM 87357 PH: 505-775-3256 | FX: 505-775-3240 In 1968, the Ramah Public High School was condemned and closed. The Gallup McKinley County School District (GMCS) claimed that low enrollment did not justify the building of a new Ramah Public High School. However, enrollment of the Navajo students declined partly because the BIA did not expand the dormitory space and the public school did not expand the bus line. Only K-6th grade students were allowed to remain in the dormitory. The 7th through 12th grades were sent to BIA schools in Utah, California, Arizona, Oklahoma, and New Mexico specifically at Albuquerque, Santa Fe and Fort Wingate. Faced with this educational challenge Ramah Navajo community leader, Mr. Chavez P. Coho worked with the Navajo Nation DNA legal services to address this lack of educational system within the Ramah Navajo community. In August 1968, the Navajo Legal System Program (DNA) filed a lawsuit against the GMCS to keep the Public High School open for the RNC. RNC claimed that the GMCS Board surely knows that it is exiling a significant number of Navajo children to off-reservation public and BIA schools. In 1969, the Ramah Navajo provide busing to Zuni Public Schools (ZPS). ZPS was the closest public school but from the heart of the RNC, was 45 miles one way. This time RNC won, but the GMCS refused to let its buses cross the county line into Cibola County (then Valencia County) where the majority of the Ramah Navajo students lived. The situation that the Ramah Navajos faced in 1968-1970 is summarized as follow:

- No local high school for their children - Even though the parents wanted their children to remain at home and attend a school that was nearby; there were no bus service to the local GMCS or the Valencia (now Cibola) County schools; and
- Unbearable were the absences from home for months at a time of the Ramah Navajo children who were forced to attend BIA boarding schools in other States. The Ramah Navajo Community people under the leadership of Mr. Coho organized a community wide meeting. At the February 6, 1970 Ramah Navajo Chapter meeting, community leaders and parents, after a lengthy and sincere discussion, formed a local school board on a motion by Rose Henio and second by Leo Narcisso Martine. That day, selected were the following as the founding school board members: - Bessie Begay

(now Bessie Randolph), the only teacher for the Head Start children – Mr. Chavez P. Coho, Council Delegate to the Navajo Nation - Bertha Lorenzo, a longtime community leader especially for secretarial work - Juan Martine, a longtime community leader knowledgeable for land matters - Sam Martinez, a community leader knowledgeable for medicine man ways. None of the five had, in today's terms, any advance education. However, they determined, had a defined purpose, and were, committed to bringing solutions. On February 10, 1970, the Ramah Navajo School Board was incorporated as a non-profit organization under New Mexico law. The Navajo Nation did not have incorporation capability at the time. On February 25, 1970, the new School Board members traveled to Washington, D.C. to seek funds for a new community school. They met with the United States Congressman Ed Foreman, United States Senator Joseph M. Montoya, United States Senator Walter F. Mondale, United States Senator George McGovern, aides to Senator Edward Moore Kennedy and others. They also met with the BIA officials, while in halting English, outlined their true grassroots plan for the school. At one point during the one of those meetings the elder Navajo Bertha Lorenzo stated: We have been waiting since 1920. We want our children back home I won't let you leave nor are we leaving we won't leave this building until we get a definite commitment from the BIA. Support from the BIA came that same day in the form of a letter from Commissioner of Indian Affairs, Louis Bruce. After three days in Washington, the School Board members went to New York City to make proposals to private foundations. Per Diem and travel money was scarce but they made do with what some friends back East gave them to eat. No one stood up for the Ramah Navajos during this entire period when the Ramah Navajo people were trying to get their school so their children would not have to leave home. This remarkable grassroots success was achieved by the community people by asserting themselves and directing their energy for a noble cause for greater Ramah Navajo community. The School Board effort made a national impact. It helped set the stage for the enacting of the National Indian Self-Determination Act in 1975. The people's effort led to a major Federal Indian policy passed by the United State Congress known as the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act of 1975 or Public Law 93-638. On April 4, 1970, a letter was received from BIA-Washington Office to commit funding of approximately \$368,000.00 for support of 167 students for one year with three additional years of funding to follow. On April 21, 1970, the School Board resulted in receiving from the Navajo Nation's Office of Navajo Economic Opportunity, the amount of \$68,000.00. With these funds, the School Board was able to start a Ramah Navajo High School at the old public school in Ramah, which had been closed for several years. The School Board used its funds to lease the old Ramah High School from the village of Ramah, renovated the buildings and operated the Ramah Navajo High School for five years. During the first summer, some classes were held in tents while the buildings were being renovated by local Navajo carpenters and laborers. Ramah Navajo High School, the first Indian-controlled school built from scratch in the United States was dedicated on September 12, 1970. A telegram from President Richard M. Nixon stated: The establishment of this school as the first Junior-Senior High School in the country represents an important new direction in Indian Education which my Administration will encourage. The School Board started immediately to outline plans for a new school to be constructed. In 1973, after heavy lobbying efforts, Congress appropriated funds for new school construction in Pine Hill, 22 miles South of Ramah and in the heart of RNC. In 1972, KTDB, the First Indian-owned and Indian-controlled radio station in the United States, began broadcasting in Navajo language from a trailer at Mountain View. The call letters, KTDB, stands for Tlochini Dine bi radio (translated to "Ramah Navajo People's Radio"). In 1973, Tsa Aszi (Yucca) Magazine of the Navajo culture and traditions was started as the First Indian High School magazine in the country and received national acclaim. The Health Center began in small buildings in Mountain View in 1974. Finally, in 1975, the school students moved from

Ramah to Pine Hill to begin learning in the High School and Elementary buildings built to accommodate 248 students. The move to the campus took place even before water, electricity and phones were hooked up because the lease had run out on the old buildings in Ramah. Present at the dedication on September 26, 1975, were the School Board President Chavez P. Coho, Ramah Navajo Chapter President Dempsey J. Pino, Navajo Nation Chairman Peter McDonald Sr.; and U.S. Senator Joseph M. Montoya. During the new school's first year, high school students voted to name their new school. Pine Hill School was chosen as an appropriate name for a school on a hill top surrounded by pine trees. The Kindergarten and Gymnasium buildings were completed in 1976. A new Health Center was built in Pine Hill and operated under contract by the School Board with the Federal government. The Library and Media Center opened in 1981. The North Central Association (NCA) officially accredited the Pine Hill School in 1981. This was seen as a major accomplishment by the community since it gave validation that its school was now the equal or better of other schools. The Middle School and Multi-Purpose buildings were completed in 1989. The Child Care Center opened in 1993 and the 66-unit staff housing project was completed in 1995. The School Board continues to review the RNSB Master Plan and to search for funding to build and renovate the facilities for the Pine Hill School. The new Pine Hill School Dormitory was completed and opened during the 2007-2008 school year. The Child Care Center has added a new modular unit to expand its services and construction has begun on a Community Resource Center (also known as a Parent Resource Center). The Resource Center will be constructed near the School to serve as a site for parent meetings and activities, as well as a general meeting site for other programs in the community. Also planned for the immediate future are renovations for the swimming pool so it can be reopened. Funds are also being sought for an enclosure for the pool for year-round use. Repairs to the Fitness Trail just east of the school are planned as soon as the utility lines for new dorm completed. Funds are already committed for the repair of the three greenhouses at the School Farm so these can be back to productive use. Today, Pine Hill School has a cumulative total of more than 750 students graduating from high school. The school is fully accredited by the State of New Mexico and the NCA. The Ramah Navajo community through the efforts of the Ramah Navajo Chapter and the RNSB, Inc. is nationally recognized as a model for the Indian Self-Determination. The School Board's success has inspired other tribes around the world that the indigenous people of the Earth can do wonders with their minds and not only their hands.
