RESOLUTION No. CAP-18-16: RELATING TO RESOURCES AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE, BUDGET AND FINANCE COMMITTEE, NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE AND THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; APPROVING SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING FROM THE UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE IN THE AMOUNT OF \$270,000.00 FOR THE TIIS TSOH SIKAAD FENCING PROJECT; WAIVING 12 N.N.C. 820 (I) AND 860(C) RELATING TO THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROCESS

Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. 1005 (C)(10), action for Legislation CAP-18-16 is being submitted to the Navajo Nation Council, through the Office of the Speaker within the ten (10) day requirement. The Navajo Nation President is empowered with the authority to line-item veto legislations passed by the Navajo Nation Council and such authority is not subject to override by the Navajo Nation Council, pursuant to 2 N.N.C. 164 (A)(17).

After review of Resolution No. CAP-18-16, I hereby exercise my line-item veto to:

- 1. Resolution CAP-18-16; Section 3. I line-item veto the supplemental appropriation amount of \$270,000.00
- 2. Exhibit "C"
 - a. Project Budget Summary, Part II, FUNDING SOURCES I line-item veto the Amount column and TOTAL of \$270,000

- b. Project Budget Summary, Part III, BUDGET SUMMARY, I line-item veto
 - i. 8000 Public Assistance, Column (A) and (B) the amount of \$270,000
 - ii. TOTAL in Column (A) and (B) the amount of \$270,000
- c. Detailed Line Item Budget and Justification Part II. Detailed Budget, 8000 Infrastructure (non cap) Column (C) and Column (D) I line item veto \$270,000; and I line-item TOTAL Column (C) and Column (D) \$270,000
- d. SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING BUDGET PROPOSAL SUMMARY, PART I. Amount Requested I line item veto \$270,000

The justification to exercise my line-item veto are set forth below:

The Office of the President and Vice-President ("OPVP") were informed of a long-standing dispute regarding a grazing issue and construction of a fence line that is part of this Resolution CAP-18-16. This dispute dates back to October 20, 1989 starting with the Grazing Committee and appealed all the way to the Navajo Nation Supreme Court. The *Benally* case was finally closed on August 27, 2012. *See* Johnny Charles and Fannie Lookingglass v. Irene Benally, No. SC-CV-35-12. The final decision of the Court settled the grazing dispute and construction of a fence. The Court stated that the fence could be constructed to encompass the grazing areas .0389 and .0390, subject to Navajo law and with the consent of the Benally family the Appellants in the case.


The proposed fence in this Resolution CAP-18-16 is also part of the same fence in the final decision of the *Benally* case. As such, the concern of the OPVP is the Benally family has stated consent has not been granted for construction of the fence for their permit areas as required by the Court. However, in review of the Resolution CAP-18-16 and attached to this memorandum is a consent form that appears to be signed by David Benally. In speaking with the family, the consent form is not valid and the signatures have been forged. Attached is a letter from one of the signatories that stated her name was also forged on this consent form. Therefore, it is unclear whether consent has been granted and the Nation is in compliance with the Court's final decision.

The Navajo Nation is a three branch government with the Supreme Court the highest court within the Judicial Branch. We must be give due respect to each Branch and as leaders we must lead that charge. Less than a year ago, during our bond financing review we learned a great lesson that if we do not respect our own laws and Court rulings how do we expect outside

industries to respect our laws and our Courts. We cannot allow for legislations to supersede or conflict with the decisions of the Courts, we must abide by their rulings.

As President of the Navajo Nation, I must act in the best interest of the Navajo Nation and whether I agree or disagree with the final decision of our Navajo Nation Supreme Courts is not debatable I must respect their decisions, as such I exercise my line-item veto authority.

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RESOLUTION OF THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL

23rd NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL - Second Year, 2016

AN ACTION

RELATING TO RESOURCES AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE, BUDGET AND FINANCE COMMITTEE, NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE AND THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; APPROVING SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING FROM THE UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE IN THE AMOUNT OF \$270,000.00 FOR THE TIIS TSOH SIKAAD FENCING PROJECT; WAIVING 12 N.N.C. § 820(I) AND 860(C) RELATING TO THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROCESS

BE IT ENACTED:

SECTION 1. FINDINGS

- A. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820 (L), "[t]he Navajo Nation Council may adopt and approve supplemental appropriations to the Annual Comprehensive Budget during the fiscal year. Supplemental appropriations of General Funds within the current fiscal year are permitted, if and when additional sources of revenues above and beyond the initial or current revenue projections are projected and which are also in excess of the reserve amount set forth at § 820(J)."
- B. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(9), a proposed resolution that requires final action by the Navajo Nation Council shall be assigned to the Naabik'íyáti' Committee before it is heard by the Navajo Nation Council.
- C. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 300 (C)(1)(3) and (4) the Budget and Finance Committee is authorized to recommend adoption of resolutions related to the expenditure of the Nation's financial resources.
- D. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 501 (C)(1), the Resources and Development Committee is the oversight committee for the Division of Community Development, Capital Improvement Office.
- E. The Title 12 Finance Act Supplemental Appropriation requirements include:

- 1. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(M), all requests for annual operating funds and supplemental funds shall be submitted to the Office of Management and Budget ("OMB") for budget impact analysis. On May 11, 2015, the Office of Management and Budget presented its memorandum with regard to this supplemental request for appropriation. The memorandum is attached as Exhibit A.
- 2. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(M), when the Controller identifies additional sources of revenues above and beyond the initial or current revenue projections, supplemental appropriations may be allocated by the Navajo Nation Council. The attached memorandum, Exhibit B, from the Office of the Controller has identified the additional revenues.
- F. The Title 12 Capital Improvement Process includes:
 - 1. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 810(F), "Capital Improvement" means a major project undertaken by the Navajo Nation that is generally not recurring on an annual basis and which fits within one or more of the following categories:
 - (1) All projects requiring debt obligation or borrowing;
 - (2) Any acquisition or lease of land;
 - (3) Purchase of major equipment or vehicles, with a life expectancy of five years or more, valued in excess of an amount to be established by the Controller;
 - (4) Major building improvements that are not routine maintenance expenses and that substantially enhance the value or extend the useful life of a structure;
 - (5) Construction of new buildings or facilities including engineering, design, and other preconstruction costs with an estimated cost in excess of an amount to be determined by the Controller; and/or

- (6) Major equipment or furnishing required to furnish new buildings or other projects, the cost of which is above a certain amount to be established by the Controller.
- 2. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820 (I), the "[d] evelopment of the Capital Budget shall be coordinated with development of the Operating Budget. All budget requests for capital improvements shall be in compliance with an adopted Capital Improvement Plan and shall not be approved unless in compliance with the Plan."
- 3. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820 (M), the Office of Management and Budget shall coordinate the overall preparation, adoption and implementation of both the annual operating and capital budgets of the Navajo Nation. All requests for annual operating funds and supplemental funds shall be submitted to the Office of Management and Budget for budget impact analysis and other appropriate action.
- 4. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 501 (B)(4)(c), the Resources and Development Committee is to review and recommend to the Navajo Nation Council through the appropriate process supplemental appropriations to the capital improvement projects annual budget to fund necessary additional capital improvement projects.
- 5. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. Ş 860 (C)(2) appropriation portion of the Capital Improvement Plan is subject to approval of the Navajo Nation Council upon recommendation of the Budget and Any modification or amendment affecting Committee. the approved Capital Improvement Plan is subject to Resources and review and concurrence by the Development Committee prior to consideration by the Navajo Nation Council."
- G. The Tiis Tsoh Sikaad Fencing Project is not included in the Title 12 Capital Improvement Plan as approved by Navajo Nation Council Resolution CAP-18-14.

- H. Any modification or amendment affecting the approved Capital Improvement Plan is subject to review and concurrence by the Resources and Development Committee prior to consideration by the Navajo Nation Council. 12 N.N.C. § 860.
- Tiis Tsoh Sikaad Fencing Project will reconstruct the fence between District 13 and Districts 12, 14 and 15. The fence was constructed in the early 1930s to the 1950s and is in bad need of repair and reconstruction. The reconstruction will control the livestock from roaming from one district to another; will reduce the number of stray horses and unidentified livestock in the area; and will facilitate the maintenance of the projected carrying capacities within the respective districts and, thereby, prevent overgrazing. Maps for the Tiis Tsoh Sikaad Fencing Project are attached as Exhibit D.
- J. Tiis Tsoh Sikaad Chapter, Naschitti Community Chapter, White Rock Chapter, Nenahnezad Chapter, Burnham Chapter, Newcomb Chapter and Sheep Springs Chapter and the Northern Navajo Agency District 13 Grazing Committees have passed resolutions in support of the reconstruction of the fence between District 13 and Districts 12, 14 and 15. The resolutions are attached as Exhibit E.
- K. Guidelines for Fencing are described in documents attached as Exhibit F.
- L. A Bureau of Indian Affairs letter to the Burnham CLUP President stating that the Northern Agency-Division of Natural Resources will assist with fence material for the fence protect and will assist with the cost of an Archaeological Survey to be performed by the Navajo Nation Archaeology Department is attached as Exhibit G.
- M. The Navajo Nation finds it in the best interest to waive 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I) and 860 (C) regarding the Capital Improvement for the Tiis Tsoh Sikaad Fencing Project.
- N. The Navajo Nation finds it in the best interest to approve Supplemental Appropriation for the Tiis Tsoh Sikaad Fencing Project.

SECTION 2. WAIVING 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I) 1 AND 860 (C) REGARDING THE TIIS TSOH SIKAAD FENCING PROJECT

The Navajo Nation Council hereby waives 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I) and 860(C) with regard to the Tiis Tsoh Sikaad Fencing Project.

SECTION 3. APPROVING SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING FROM THE UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE IN THE AMOUNT OF \$270,000 FOR THE TIIS TSOH SIKAAD FENCING PROJECT

- The Navajo Nation Council, having received certification by Α. the Office of the Controller of the availability of certain funds from the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance (UUFB) appropriation, hereby approves for supplemental supplemental appropriation of \$270,000.00 for the Tiis Tsoh Sikaad Fencing Project as further described in budget documents attached as Exhibit C.
- This supplemental appropriation of \$270,000.00 shall be to В. a new Business Unit Number and from that amount of funds that exceeds the minimum fund balance of the UUFB.

The Office of Management and Budget has reviewed the above referenced document. Upon review of the proposed supplemental proposal, OMB notes the following:

- The attached copy of the overall Navajo Nation Capital Improvement Plan 2013-2018, which was approved by the Navajo Nation Council (CAP-18-14), does not include the Tiis Tsoh Sikaad Fencing project as an approved project for fencing in the amount of \$270,000.00.
- 2. This Navajo Nation Capital project should be listed for funding purposes on the Capital Improvement Plan before it is considered eligible for funding in accordance with the Appropriations Act (12 NNC they Section 820-I and 860 E.I.). 12 NNC Section 820 (I) reads as follows in part: "All budget requests for capital improvements shall be in compliance with an adopted Capital Improvement Plan and shall not be approved unless in compliance with the Plan."
- 3. Pursuant to the Appropriations Act, Section 860, the Capital Improvement Office within the Division of Community Development is charged with the responsibility to administer and coordinate Navajo Nation Capital Improvements. Thus, DCD/CIO should provide guidance on the propriety of this proposal. There is no information from DCD/CIO.
- 4. If Burnham Chapter proposes to use Navajo Nation government wage rates, then the attached copy of the Scope of Work and Estimated Cost has temporary fence laborers listed at an hourly rate of \$10.04. According to the Navajo Nation Salary Schedule "AB", Grade 55, Step A has an hourly rate of \$8.95. Documentation may need to be justified in order to start at a higher step. The total amount cost should be changed to \$8,592.00. Fringe benefits should be changed to \$1,046.51. According to the Navajo Nation Salary Schedule "AB", a Field Supervisor is classified at Grade 60, Step A with an hourly rate of \$13.75. Hourly labor rates for the Fence Project Supervisor are listed at \$12.96. This amount needs to be changed to \$2,200.00 with a total amount of \$12,884.91. This amount will apply to the 1st and 2nd group.
- The attached copy of the Scope of Work and Estimated Cost has a total labor cost of \$66,239.94. The amount should be \$65,528.92 since hourly rates need to be adjusted

- and fringe benefits were calculated at 13.05% when it should have been calculated at 8.84% for a temporary employee.
- 6. The quotes for Big R of Farmington, LLC, Lowe's Home Centers, LLC, The Home Depot, and Frank's Supply Company, Inc. all have expired quotes from June 2014 to September 2014. These quotes will need to be updated to current date.

OMB recommends that these projects be in compliance with the Appropriations Act, Section 820-I and have the project listed for funding purposes on the overall Navajo Nation Capital improvement Plan. Otherwise, a waiver or amendment to 12 NNC 860 (I) may be necessary. If you have any questions, contact Raquel Tenille at (505) 871-6575.



There have been eight supplemental appropriations during the Fiscal Year 2015 in the amount of \$12,364,442. If you review "Exhibit C" of the financial report, the September 30, 2014 UUFB was \$47.9 million, an amount of \$17.5 is reserved for Minimum Fund Balance, there are eight supplemental appropriations during Fiscal Year 2015, these are deducted which brings the UUFB balance to \$17,981,883 as of April 16, 2015.
- 2. The request is seeking funding to construct a new Chapter house.

PART II. REASON FOR REQUEST AND STATEMENT OF NEED:

To re-construct the Historical Fence Line between District 13 that is adjacent with District 12, 14 and 15. The Fence Line meanders along the north side of the Chac wash. The fence was constructed in the early 1930's through the 1950's.

Reconstruction of the fence obstructions would enable the Livestock Producers to better manage and control their livestock from roaming from one District to another and would reduce and/or eliminate the number of strays, unidentified livestock and horses that are depleting the forage and water supplies. Furthermore, the fence would assist in maintaining the projected carrying capacities within the respective Districts and minimize livestock trespassing issues. In addition, the fence will prevent over-grazing and destruction of the grazing lands and to make proper Range Management Programs is implemented.

Total estimated budget is \$270,000.00 to complete the fence project.

PART III. SCOPE OF WORK/METHODOLOGY

The 1st Phase of construction will begin south of Gleason Bridge along the Chaco River to the Great Bend. The District Fence Line boarders six Navajo Chapters o Tiis Tsoh Sikaad Chapter, Whiterock Chapter, Naschitti Chapter, Sheepsprings Chapter, Sanostee Chapter, and Newcomb Chapter. According to field data's collected from the BIA Northern Agency there is approximately 23 miles of fence that need reconstruction. The fence will implement better range management and control of drifting fetal horses and livestock.



DEFIANCE AGENCY CHAPTER(S) AND NAVAJO NATION TO PROVIDE FENCING MATERIAL TO RE-CONSTRUCT FENCE LINE BETWEEN DISTRICT 15 AND 13, DISTRICT 14 AND 13 AND DISTRICT 12 AND 13.

WHEREAS:

- The Tiis Tsoh Sikaad Community Chapter is a certified chapter of the Navajo Nation pursuant to Navajo Nation Council Resolution CAP-34-98 and is delegated authority with respect to local matters consistent with Navajo Law, including custom, tradition, and fiscal matters; And
- 2. The Bureau of Indian Affairs and Navajo Nation constructed the District fence lines in the early 1950's and these fence lines consisting of wooden posts and barbwires have deteriorated and in places covered by sand. These conditions are failing to keep animals from trespassing from other neighboring districts. The fence has outlasted its life span and is now in dire need of repairs with new construction to serve its purpose; AND
- 3. The new fence will benefit the Bureau of Indian Affairs and the Navajo Nation government carrying out their trust responsibility by providing protection to the renewable natural resources. It would also help the land users to improve range management as intended in the 25 CFR 167.5 Land Management District of the Navajo Grazing Regulations; AND
- 4. The new fence lines will provide better control of the grazing practices within the district and Keep sheep units within the carrying capacity as authorized by the permit within their customary use area; And
- 5. The rebuilt fence line will give the land users an opportunity to plan for conservation projects.

 The fence line is necessary as part of developing a Sound Range Management Plan when the permittee has the opportunity to do conservation project on his Customary Use Area.
- 6. A similar request was made in 1997 but the Bureau of Indian Affairs returned no reply to the Chapter as how to pursue the fencing project between the districts.

Pursuant to 26 N.N.C., Section 1 (B) White Rock Chapter is vested with the authority and responsibility to promote, to receive, act upon and protect the interest of the general welfare of it constituents and interact with other entities of the Navajo Nation and other local agencies for appropriate actions; and
- Pursuant to CAP-34-98 the Navajo Nation Council enacted the Local Governance Act, and White Rock Chapter was L.G.A. certified by the Resources and Development Committee on December 21, 2010; and
- 4. White Rock Chapter is aware of the historic fence that was constructed between the respective districts by the BIA in the 1950s. Furthermore, the fence has deteriorated and is need of reconstruction; and
- 5. The deterioration of the fence has resulted in livestock trespassing to and from adjacent districts, which is not in compliance with the Navajo Grazing Regulations (25 CFR 167.13); and
- 6. It is within the authority of the BIA Branch of Natural Resources to protect tribal lands against waste, to ensure preservation of the forage, the land and water resources on the Navajo Reservation and to regulate grazing of livestock on such lands; and
- 7. The re-construction of the fence will provide better control of livestock while maintaining the carrying capacities within the respective districts and minimizing livestock trespass issues, which will meet the overall objectives outlined above #4; and
- 8. The project will require collaboration and cooperation from adjoining chapters and technical assistance from the BIA Branch of Natural Resources.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE WHITE ROCK CHAPTER THAT:

1. 





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NATURAL RESOURCES CONSERVATION SERVICE CONSERVATION PRACTICE STANDARD

FENCE (Feet) CODE 382

DEFINITION

A constructed barrier to livestock, wildlife or people. PURPOSES

This practice may be applied as part of a conservation management system to facilitate the application of conservation practices that treat the soil, water, air, plant animal and human resource concerns.

CONDITIONS WHERE THIS PRACTICE APPLIES

This practice may be applied on any area where livestock and/or wildlife control is needed, or where access to people is to be regulated. Fences are not needed where natural barriers will serve the purpose. CRITERIA

Fencing materials shall be of a high quality and durability, and the construction performed to meet the intended management objectives.

Fences shall be positioned to facilitate management requirements.

Standard or conventional (barbed or smooth wire), suspension, woven wire, or electric fences shall consist of acceptable fencing designs to control the animal(s) or people of concern and meet the intended life of the practice.

Height, number, and spacing of wires will be installed to facilitate control and management of the animal(s) and people of concern.

Height, size, spacing and type of posts will be used that best provides the needs for the style of fence required and is best suited for the topography of the landscape.

CONSIDERATIONS

Consider installing fences in locations that will facilitate maintenance avoiding irregular terrain and/or water crossings.

Consider wildlife movement needs when locating fences.

Consider livestock management, handling, watering and feeding when locating fences.

Boundary fences shall comply with state laws and standards for construction.

Where applicable, clear right-of-ways will be established which will facilitate fence construction and maintenance.

Consider soil erosion potential when planning and constructing a fence on steep slopes.

PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS

Plans and specifications are to be prepared for specific field sites based on the NRCS National and State Fence Standards and appropriate state or local statutes or laws.

OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE

Regular inspection of fences should be part of an ongoing management program. Inspection of fences after storm events is needed to facilitate the function of the intended use of the fence.

Maintenance and repairs will be performed as needed to facilitate the intended operation of the installed fence.



Conservation practice standards are reviewed periodically, and updated if needed. To obtain the current version of this standard, contact the Natural Resource Conservation Service.

SPECIFICATIONS

Fencing (feet) 382

Fences covered by this specification include standard wire, suspension, letdown, rock jack and figure 4, pole and timber, permanent power and special use fences.

The type of fence needed is determined by the kind of livestock operation planned, the following provides guidance on which fence meets minimum needs.

Fences can be constructed using either barbed, smooth or woven wire or poles or there combinations. They must be constructed of good quality materials, in a manner that will equal or exceed, in strength and durability the following specifications:

C. Posts

1. Line Posts

a. Wooden - Untreated posts of such species as Juniper, Osage orange (Bois d' Arc), Oak, Mesquite, Black Locust and Redwood can be used. Pine, treated as indicated on Table 1 or other treatment according to Pederal Specification TT-W-571 may also be used. All posts must have a 3 inch nominal top diamenter (3/8 inch variance) and a minimum life expectancy of at least 10 years.

- Corner, Gate, and Brace Posts
 - a. Wooden same species as in I-C-1-a (Exhibits 1 and 2)
 - (1) Size Length sufficient to provide for the construction of at least a 44-inch-high fence, and permit setting at least 36 inches in the ground; top diameter nominal size 6 inches (1-inch variance) or larger.
 - (2) Bracing Required at all corners, gates, and at all angles in the line fence. Horizontal braces must be the equivalent of a nominal size 4-inch diameter to (3/8-inch variance) line post, or 2-inch nominal size (2.375-inch outside diameter) steel pipe, with minimum length of 6.0 feet notched or doweled into the top one-half of the brace post and post being braced, installed not less than 3 feet above ground line. A tension member composed of two complete loops, twisted, of (a) 9-gage smooth wire or (b) barbed or smooth wire as shown in section I-A shall extend from a point above the horizontal brace to ground level of the post being braced into the ground to a deadman.

In corrosive soils use a non-deadmanned double "H" brace or a deadmanned "H" brace using a 1/2-inch or larger steel rod extending from the deadman and tied to the tension wire a minimum of 4 inches above the ground.

Use of a deadman may be omitted when the stretch of fence is 300 feet or less. The brace wire shall be twisted to secure the brace and provide needed rigidity.

- b. Steel (Exhibits 1 and 2)
 - (1) Where new steel pipe is used for corner, gate, and brace posts, the following criteria shall be met:
 - (a) Steel pipe will equal or exceed the requirements for 2-inch (2.375-inch outside diameter) nominal size standard steel pipe (ASTM A-120 Schedule 40).



- (c) Steel braces should be galvanized or painted. If painted, they shall be brushed with a wire brush, treated with a rust inhibitor, primed with a metal primer paint, and then painted with two coats of a high grade, weather resistant epoxy or enamel paint.
- (d) Alternative to angle brace will be to use deadman or anchor plate as described for wooden posts.

D. Gates

Gates shall equal or exceed the quality of adjoining fence. They may be made of aluminum, steel, or wire. Wire gates will be constructed of equal of better quality wire and line posts used in the fence construction and must have a stay approximately every 4 feet. (See Exhibit 1).

E. Stays

Stays may be made of galvanized twisted wire, or made from the same wire used in the fence. Wooden or fibergrass stays may also be used. (See Exhibit 3).

F. Wire Splicing

When splicing of wire is necessary, either the "Western Union" or "loop splice" is acceptable.

G. Anchoring

In crossing narrow drainage ways or draws, a weight or deadman anchor equivalent to a 12" x 12" concrete block should be fastened to the fence wires by suspension wire or wires of equivalent gauge of the fence. (See Exhibit 4).

II. Suspension Fences

Suspension fences are applicable only where a majority of the terrain will allow the use of approximately 100-foot spacing between line posts.

Dimensions an quality of all materials used, fence heights, and fence construction will be in accordance with the requirements set forth in section I, Standard Wire Fence, except as noted in the following items.

A. Line posts shall be spaced approximately 80 or 100 feet spart. In areas of difficult terrain, spacing will need to be shortened to allow fence to follow the contour of the land. (See Exhibit 5).

Material Specifications

- A. Timber for bucks will be at least 5 inches in diameter. Poles must be at least 3 inches in diameter at the small end.
- B. The top pole of buck and pole or worm type fences can not be less than 3 feet nor more than 4 feet high for livestock control or 6 feet for deer control. A combination of wire on top of the buck and pole fence may be used for deer exclusion.
- C. Bucks should be firmly anchored to the ground or anchored with rock.
- D. Pole placement and number must approximate at least minimum vertical spacing as set forth for regular fences.
- E. The bottom poles of a worm type fence will be raised off the ground by means of rocks or log bucks at ends and in the center whenever the log sags excessively.
- F. Where worm fences are used in deer country, they must not exceed 42 inches in height. In antelope areas, crossings will be provided where the bottom poles are not less than 16 inches above ground.



Permanent Power Fences (Exhibit 11 and 12)

Power fencing is an acceptable alternative to standard fencing for cross fences only.

A. Wire

 Perimeter portion of fence will be constructed of at least four wires, with the total height to the top wire not less than 40 inches. Interior fences will be constructed of at least three wires, with a total height to the top wire not less than 36 inches.

Fences for cattle and/or sheep in a short duration or cell grazing system may be 2-wire with the top wire 26 inches high for sheep and 26 to 30 inches high for cattle.

Wire will be new, smooth, and meet or exceed the following:

Tensile strength - 110,000 psi Galvanizing - Type III Gage - 12 1/2





- b. Wooden. Two inch top diameter or larger posts otherwise meeting standard fence specifications or insultimber or Australian iron wood are acceptable when set in the ground 18 inches deep.
- c. Steel Posts. "T" steel posts will be one pound per foot and of sufficient length for the height of fence, with high quality commercial, black polypropolyene or polyethylene plastic or porcelsin ceramic insulators. On corrosive soils, the coating may be either hot dip galvanizing or psinted (Commercial Standard 184) with one or more coats of high grade, weather resistant paint or baked enamel.
- d. Reinforcement Bars Steel reinforcement type bars may be used on two wire fences. They must be set in the ground to a depth of 18 inches and extend above the top wire 4-6 inches. Minimum size for line post is 5/8" or #5 bar.

2. Corner, Gate, and Brace Assembles (Exhibit 13 & 14)


Gates. "Lift" or Australian" gates are acceptable. Posts on either side of these gates will be the same as standard brace posts as defined in the section for Standard Wire Fence. All other gate assemblies will meet the standards as indicated below.

Wooden Posts. Same as Standard Wire Fence except posts must have a minimum of 4-inch top diameter, be set in the ground 3 feet deep, and be long enough to allow 3-4 inches above the top wire. Pull posts shall be 6 inches and set in the ground 3 feet deep.

Reinforcement Bars Steel reinforcement bars may be used for bracing on two wire electric fences only. The bars will be a minimum of 1-3/8 inches or #11 and set in the ground a minimum of two feet. The holes will be back filled with concrete. The angle section of the assembly must be welded to the main post. (See Exhibit 14)

Bracing. Same as Standard Fence except as noted above.

Spacing. Brace assemblies of single pull posts will be spaced at intervals no greater than 4000 feet throughout the length of the fence. Single pull posts will only be used in straight line sections where equal pull is exerted in both directions. Brace assemblies ("H" braces, or single six inch wooden posts with one or more earth anchors to withstand 1100 pounds of pull) will be placed any place the fence breaks, ends or makes a 15 degree or greater bend. (See Exhibits No. 16 to 17).

VII. Used Steel Pipe

Used steel pipe may be substituted for new steel pipe provided it is approved prior to construction by an authorized SCS representative who determines that it is good quality pipe relatively free of pits and scaling. Substituted used steel pipe shall be any one of the three types listed below:


/III. Special Fencing Considerations for Wildlife

The free movement of elk, deer, pronghorn and bighorn sheep should be considered in every fence design and the following guide will be used:


- 1. Mule deer and/or white-tailed deer
 - a. Fencing for cattle, or cattle and sheep. Four strands of barbed or smooth wire with a minimum height of 38 inches (97 cm) and a maximum height of 44 inches (112 cm) and a barbless bottom wire at least 10 inches above the ground, 16 inches for cattle only.
- 2. Pronghorn satelope: Fences must be built so antelope can move from one pasture to another. This may be accomplished when:
 - a. Fencing for cattle. Provide a three or four strand fence with the top wire no higher than 44 inches (112 cm) and no less than 38 inches (97 cm) above the ground, and a barbless bottom wire that averages 16 inches (41 cm) above the ground.
 - b. Fencing for Sheep. Provide a four-strand fence with the top wire no higher that 42 inches (107 cm) and no lower than 32 inches (97 cm) above the ground, and a barbless bottom wire at least 10 inches (25 cm) above the ground.








DOUBLE WRAP DETAIL










WIRE FENCE BRACES (STANDARD)











ELEVATION (POSTS 80' APART)





ELEVATION (POSTS 100'APART)



Typica 4 Wire Hot/Ground System



REINFORCTMENT BAR GATE, BRACE OR CORNER POST






SPECIFICATIONS

Fences shall consist of either barbed, smooth, or woven wire, or combinations thereof, and must be constructed of good material and in a workmanlike manner to equal or exceed, in strength and durability, one constructed in accordance with the following specifications:

Types of Fences

1. Standard Fences for Exclusion or Control of Livestock.

4 wire barbed and/or smooth - min. height 42 inches. 3 wire barbed and/or smooth - min. height 40 inches. Woven, barbed and/or smooth - min. height 40 inches.

2. Suspension-Fences.

4 wire barbed - min. height 42 inches.

Modified 3 wire suspension for specialized grazing management.

3. Modified fences for wildlife considerations.

The following guide will be used where free movement of big game animals is a consideration in fence design.

- a. Mule deer. The top wire not higher than 42 inches above the ground.
- b. Pronghorn antelope. Fences must be built so antelope can move from one pasture to another. This may be accomplished by: ...
 - (1) Placing bottom barbed or smooth wire at least 15 inches above the ground.
 - (2) Leaving gates open during migration periods when livestock are not in pastures.
 - (3) Leaving a gap not greater than 32 inches high in net wire sheep fences.
 - (4) Using small cattle guards of six feet wide and four feet in line length, installed about one mile apart.
- c. ... Fences for exclusion on control of big game.

Where big game management is a major consideration, a site specific specification will be developed. The specifications must be approved by the State Resource Conservationist.



 d. <u>Let-down fences (Modified Standard) for elk movement and/or</u> winter snowpack (Exhibits 1, 2, and 3)'

Permanent Electric Fence (Exhibit 4)

- 2 wire smooth min. height 24 inches or 18 inches for sheep and goats for specialized grazing management.
- 3 wire smooth min. height 36 inches for conventional cross fencing.
- 5. Special fences to be designed by the state resource conservationist.

Standard Fences for Exclusion or Control of Livestock (Exhibits 5, 6, and 7)

 Wire. Barbed wire, woven wire and wire netting fencing shall conform to the requirements of Federal Specification RR-F-221 for the specified types and styles of fencing. Barbed wire and woven wire shall have zinc coating of at least 0.50 ounce per square foot of wire surface.

Woven wire shall be a minimum of 26 inches high with 14 1/2 gauge or larger intermediate and stay wires spaced on not more than 12 inch centers. All barbed or smooth wire will be 13 1/2 gauge or larger or 15 1/2 gauge high tensile double strand. Minimum strand breaking strength of 950 foot pound is required for all wire. All wire, whether woven or stranded, will be of new galvanized material.

Woven wire fences shall be topped by at least two double strand wires.

When splicing of wire is necessary, the "Western Union" splice will be recommended. This splice is made by overlapping the ends of each wire and wrapping each wire five times around the other wire (Exhibit 8). The use of a fence splicing tool will facilitate this operation and result in a neat job. If sleeve is used, a crimping tool is required.

2., Staples. Staples shall be of nine gauge polished (bright) hard wire and should be 1 1/2 inches long for soft woods and 1 1/4 inches long for hardwood posts. The staples should be driven diagonally with the wood grain to avoid splitting. Space should be left between the staple and the post to permit movement of the wire. The wires of soft metal 12 gauge may be substituted for staples.

3. Posts.

Line Posts.

a. Wooden Type. Untreated posts from such species as juniper (cedar), except Rocky Mountain, oak, osage orange, black locust, and redwood or pine posts treated with a creosote coal-tar solution, or pentachlorophenol, with less than six pounds retention per cubic foot, in accordance with Federal Specification TI-W-571c, are acceptable. b. Steel. Standard "Tee" or "U" section steel posts with anchor plate weighing not less than 1.33 pounds per foot of length, exclusive of anchor plate, may be used in lieu of wooden line posts. Length shall be the same as for wooden posts. Steel posts shall be rolled from high carbon steel. The coating may be either hot dip galvanizing or painting in accordance with Commercial Standard 184 with one or more coats of high grade, weather resistant steel paint or baked enamel. Steel posts shall be studded, embossed or punched for the attachment of wire to the posts. Wire shall be attached to the posts by wrapping with number 16 gauge galvanized wire or by use of manufacturer's special designed clips.

Size. Length must be sufficient to provide for the construction of at least a 42 inch-high fence to permit stapling of the top wire without splitting, and be set solidly in the ground a minimum depth of two feet in sandy soils or 18 inches in all other soils. Ninety-five percent of top diameters of wooden posts (two inches above the top wire) must be three inches or larger. In rocky soil where penetration cannot be obtained with ordinary hand tools, straddlejacks may be used.

<u>Spacing</u>. On 4 wire and net wire standard fences, maximum interval shall not exceed 20 feet if no stays are used between posts, or 30 feet if stays are used between posts at intervals not to exceed ten feet.

On 3 wire standard fences, maximum interval shall not exceed 16 1/2 feet between posts.

Corner, Gate and Brace Posts (Exhibits 8, 9, 10, and 13)

Brace Posts

a. Wooden. Same species as above.

Size. Length sufficient to provide for the construction of at least a 42 inch-high fence and permit setting at least 36 inches in the ground, top diameter commercial size six inches or larger:

- b. Alternate. Steel corner or brace posts set in concrete with a three inch (0.D.) new or (equivalent weight of 7.58 pounds per linear foot) pipe or larger with brace member welded to the posts.
- c. If soil conditions prevent proper brace or line post installations trees may be used. Fasten the wire as indicated in Exhibit 15.
- d. Rock cribs may be used in shallow rocky areas.



Bracing. Required at all corners, gates and at all definite angles in the line fence. In straight sections, brace units (pull posts) shall be spaced at intervals not to exceed 1,320 feet. Wire shall be tied off at the brace units. Braces can be a four inch diameter top line post of the approved species with minimum length of 6.0 feet notched into the top one-half of the brace post and post being braced, or two inch (0.0.) new or used pipe or angle iron (2" x 2" x 1/4") or equivalent installed not less than three feet above ground line. A tension member composed of two complete loops of number nine gauge smooth wire, or two complete loops of number 12 1/2 gauge double strand barbed or smooth wire, shall extend from a point approximately six inches below the top of the brace post to ground level of the post being braced. The brace wire shall be twisted to secure the brace and provide needed rigidity. (Exhibit 10)

The standard bracing designed by the New Mexico Highway Department is an accepted alternative. (Exhibit 13)

Suspension Fences for the Exclusion or Control of Livestock (Exhibit 11)

Dimensions and quality of all materials used, fence heights and fence construction shall be in accordance with the requirements set forth in Specifications for Regular Fences except as noted in the following items:

Woven wire is not acceptable for suspension fence design.

Bracing shall be required at all corners, gates, definite angles in the line is at prescribed spacing in straight line sections of the fence as described low. All corner, gate, brace and pull posts shall be eight feet long with eight inch diameter top and imbedded in the ground at least 3 1/2 feet. Suspension fences shall not be constructed on a curve; directional changes in line shall be by definite angles properly braced.


In straight sections of a suspension fence, anchor or pull posts shall be spaced at intervals not to exceed 1,320 feet. Any straight section of fence more than one-half mile long shall have a minimum of two (2) line anchor or pull post assemblies. The pull post assemblies should be equally spaced along straight sections. It is desirable to tie off all wires at stretch panels and start with a new wire on the next 1/4 mile section.

When wooden line posts are used, they shall have a minimum top diameter of four inches. Line posts shall be spaced 80-100 feet apart. Galvanized twisted wire stays shall be spaced approximately 15 feet apart in the line. Six stays shall be used between posts spaced 100 feet apart. For a lesser spacing, the number of stays should be reduced accordingly to the approximate 15 foot spacing.

All stays should swing free of the ground to permit the fence to sway when contacted by animals.


Any <u>suitable fastener</u> showing good workmanship and allowing the wire to freely contract and expand may be used to secure the wire to the post. Some examples of acceptable fasteners are small plates of 20 gauge metal cut 1/2 x 1 inch in a and used to fasten wire to post with sixpenny nails, staple secured gonally but not tight against the wire, etc.

CORNER AND ANGLE BRACE




STRADDLE JACK FOR WIRE FENCE

RE-CONSTRUCTING THE HISTORICAL FENCE LINE IN DISTRICT 13 THAT IS ADJACENT TO DISTRICT 12, 14 AND 15.

THE ORGANIZATION:

Tils Tsoh Sikaad Chapter is located in San Juan County, New Mexico, approximately 30 miles south of Shiprock, New Mexico and 12 miles east of U.S. Highway 491, on Navajo Route 5. Tils Tsoh Sikaad is also accessible from NM Highway 371 on Navajo Route 5 going west.

The Community Land Use Planning Committees (CLUP) and the Grazing Official through numerous meetings on behalf of Tils Tsoh Sikaad Chapter requested from the Northern Agency BIA Natural Resources, the Eastern Agency BIA Natural Resources, the Fort Defiance Agency BIA Natural Resources, and the Navajo Nation to provide assistance to re-construct the Historical Fence Line between District 13 that is adjacent to Districts 12, 14, and 15.

OBJECTIVE:

To address the need to re-construct the Historical Fence Line between District 13 that is adjacent with Districts 12, 14, and 15. The Fence Line meanders along the north side of the Chaco Wash. The fence was constructed in the early 1930's through the 1950's.

Reconstruct of the fence obstructions would enable the Livestock Producers to better range manage and control their livestock from roaming one District to another and would reduce and/or eliminate the number of strays, unidentified livestock and horses that are depleting the forage and water supplies. Furthermore, the fence would assist in maintaining the projected carrying capacities within the respective Districts and minimize livestock trespassing issues. In addition, the fence will prevent over-grazing and destruction of the grazing lands and to make proper Range Management Programs is implemented. 



Below is Southwest Conservation Corp's draft estimate based on project information and photos provided on August 27, 2014.

Proposal 1

Southwest Conservation Corps (SCC) proposes to complete the removal of existing fence and construction of 23 miles of fence along Chaco River between the southern edge of the Northern Agency Boundary and the Fort Defiance and Eastern Agency. The project includes construction of 2 Livestock Control Flood Gates and five metal gates, as well as disposal of the existing fence. It is SCC's understanding that the materials would be provided for the project. If this is not the case, we are happy to explore options, but this is outside of our typical partner arrangement. SCC is a non profit youth development program not a contractor. Please see attached documents for additional details.

SCC will utilize 4, 5 person crews to complete the project for a total of 11 weeks. Each crew of Navajo Youth will be lead by an experienced leader (Navajo preference). The crews will be trained in fence construction, outdoor skills, backcountry camping, ATV safety, and risk management. Each crew member will receive a weekly living allowance and an AmeriCorps Education Award Scholarship upon successful completion of the project. The crews will be outfitted with a vehicle, trailer, tools, food, camping gear, and equipment to complete the project. If needed, the group will also be supported with two ATVs and trailers that will be used to move new and existing fence materials along the fence line.

I know this is a high priority project to get underway and completed for Lorenzo Bates, Council Delegate and the Chapter. We have been in contact with Rick Nez as well. Thank you.



Minutes of Meeting by Marty Chee

Davis Henry the Grazing Committee member introduces himself and welcomes the visitors to Tiis Tsoh Sikaad Chapter (Burnham).

Tracy Raymond with the Bureau of Indians, Affairs Northern Agency started with his computer presentation. Mr. Raymond asked why Tiis Tsoh Sikaad Chapter needs a fence line. The answer was on the next slide. A fence line is one form of animal control. On another slide, there stretch across the screen was the Chaco River (dry). On that map of Chaco River Tracy drew a line which would show the proposed fence line.

Mr. Raymond showed some pictures of different land formations. These land formations had different type of fence lines. The old fence lines were tied into the rocks and cliffs. In one picture the fence post was set down on the ground. Another picture showed the wires hanging so low to the ground a set of track crossed one side to the other side.

Mr. Raymond explained he did see some fence lines that were well maintain. Fence lines that go right up to a cliff stop there and continue where the cliff stops. Tracy Raymond concluded by saying he would like to have taken more pictures, further down the wash.

Tracy Raymond has created a budget, which has a cost estimate of \$270,000. Mr. Raymond reported the BIA must dismantle the old fence line. This job will be done by rolling up used barbwire and pulling out old fence post. An added expense is the crossing of the De-Na-Zin Wash. Tracy Raymond was interested where the money will come from.

James M. Dee Bureau of Indians Affairs Northern Navajo Agency presented the Agenda for this 8/8/12 meeting. Mr. Dee reviewed the agenda to the group.

Davis Henry, Grazing Committee member presented on his past horse entrapments. Davis explained to the group why the horses were crossing the Chaco Wash. The horses were looking for greener pastures. Davis Henry named the windmills where he setup his portable correl. Mr. Henry had pictures of posts which held up the V-mesh fence, in capturing horses. Mr. Henry explained he did have to make improvements to the correl after each entrapment. Davis Henry ended his presentation by expressing his feelings with the stud horses.





Irwin Jim offered his advice on where the fence line should be placed. He would like the fence line to be moved up, to allow less water damage.

Effie Delmar Eastern Agency explained if we were to accompany the grazing committee down the Chaco Wash, we would get an idea on where to put the fence line. Mr. Dee asked Jerome Willie, Bureau of Indian Affairs, Fort Defiance Agency to comment on this matter. Jerome asked "Is this fence line to be maintained?"

Mr. Dee then brought up the topic of employment. Mr. Dee advised the group it would be better to split the work fifty fifty on the shared agency boundaries. For example, the boundary that Fort Defiance and Northern Agency share can split their work fifty-fifty.

Hoskie Bryant with Naschitti Chapter, made a comment in the Navajo Language.

Lester Begay with Tiis Tsoh Sikaad, made a comment about Navajo Taxation.

Mr. Dee introduced the idea of sharing the cost between the three different agencies. He continued to say that we can request funding from NRCS. In order to get funding from NRCS, a NRCS Contract must submit.

Mr. Dee gave a small summary, on how the Tiis Tsoh Sikaad Chapter prepared a fence line proposal. The chapter sent out resolutions to the neighboring chapter, to begin that process. LoRenzo Bates even lobbied and met with Sharon Pinto, to find funding. Mr. Dee finished by saying we should use a Navajo owned construction firm.

The Meeting was place on hold, because of the lunch meal prepared by the Tiis Tsoh Sikaad Chapter.

Mr. Dee explained the cost estimate on the proposed Fence Line/ Acquisition. Tracy Raymond had created a budget report, which he displayed from the computer. Mr. Raymond had listed the Old Fence Line Removal, Labor Cost Materials for the fence line, Livestock Control Flow Gates, Labor Cost Livestock, and Labor Cost Flow Gates.

Mr. Dee introduced the idea of working with the NRCS in Phoenix. Mr. Dee expressed his concern by saying this fence line must be kept longer than 30 years. Setting the fence near the wash would allow moisture damage. Mr. Raymond reminded the group of the vegetation that would be lost. The wash area has some good green vegetation explained Mr. Raymond.

Effic Delmar with Eastern Agency informed the group of a similar fencing project. In 1970's Standing Rock lost some land. Ms Delmar did not want this to happen again.

Mr. Dee asked some of the White Rock Officials if it was necessary for their chapter to do a Public Hearing. Mr. Will Somebody advised, the group to speak with the permittee's from that area. Davis Henry agreed knowing that permit holders have an input on this fence line.



Jim Dee expressed his concern for the Chaco Wash. The range near the wash has some good green grass, but the wash can and will flood. Flooding will carry everything away.

Jim Dee reads through some of Resolutions from the surrounding chapters.

Next topic from the agenda: Who will maintain these Range Improvements-Henry Davis Henry explains that the Tiis Tsoh Sikaad Chapter can maintain these fence lines. Jim Dee asked that an agreement must come first, before government spending. Effie Delmar requested it be a written agreement between agencies.

Jane Jones a Tiis Tsoh Sikaad resident, expressed her opinions for the fence line. The fence line maintenance is shared within her family. She and her family purchase tee post and fence wire. Jane did warn the group about the gates that walk away. People have a problem of stealing gates. For the phase two, Jane Jones would like to have all her supplies she purphase return to her. She ended her speech by reminding the people the expense of fencing material.

Jim Dee is willing to help draft up a maintenance agreement, and Davis Henry agreed.

Tracy Raymond accepted the help from the neighbor agencies.

Jim Dee announced a meeting for August 15, 2012. This will begin data collection.

Jim Dee ended this meeting at 2:00P.M.

Introduction

The District Management Fence Line meandered along the north side of Chaco River (Wash), was constructed around the 1940s and 1950s. The Navajo Reservation boundary and Eastern Agency boundary met south of Gleason Bridge. The District Fence line began south of Gleason Bridge along the Chaco Wash and extended to approximately Ram Springs north of Burnham Chapter. The six Navajo Nation Chapters impacted by the fence line and are adjacent to the Chaco Wash are: Sanostee Chapter, Burnham Chapter, Newcomb Chapter, Sheepsprings Chapter, Naschitti Chapter, and Whiterock Chapter. The District Management Fence Line also impacted three Bureau of Indian Affairs Agency Offices which are: Northern Agency, Eastern Agency, and Fort Defiance Agency.

Today, the remnants of the old Fence Line are still visible by buried and rotted cedar posts, and buried and visible rusted barbed wire. Attached are pictures of the remains of the District Fence Line.

The sheep herders and cattle ranchers along the fence line remember the time when the Fence Line was functional. The Fence Line kept stray animals on the north or south side of the fence line. The Fence Line also helped conserve forage and water for the livestock such as cattle and sheep. The Fence Line also controlled feral horses from eating up the range and depleting water on either side of the Fence Line. The Fence Line served its' purpose of range management.




Summary

Exhibit 3: Navajo Nation Location Map



You requested a possible meeting with Tils Tsoh Sikaad (Burnham) Chapter officials on June 9, 2010 or June 10, 2010 concerning archeological clearance for the rebuilding of the District Management Fence Line for district 13. The Chapter Officials have a prior schedule to attend a Chapter Official Convention in Gallup, New Mexico during June 9 – 10, 2010.

The Tils Tsoh Sikaad Chapter Officials and the Community Land Use Planning Committee would really appreciate your office rescheduling a meeting at a later date since this Rebuilding of the District Management Fence Line is one of the priorities of the Chapter for managing livestock.

You requested an estimate of the fencing material necessary for completing the project. Attached is a rough draft letter written by Albert Davis, President of Burnham Chapter, estimating the necessary fencing material as thirty-five miles of material within Northern Agency, three miles of fencing material within Fort Defiance Agency, and nine miles of fencing material within Eastern Agency and the total as forty-seven miles of fencing materials. A map showing the adjacent chapters along the Chaco River (wash) is also attached.

We are very appreciative that one of your staff requested our CLUPC members to determine an estimate of how many miles of fencing will be required for the rebuilding of the Land Management District 13 Fence line.

The Burnham Chapter has been working on rebuilding the Land Management District 13 Fence Line, which runs along the Chaco River (Chaco Wash). This Land Management District 13 Fence Line was constructed by the Bureau of Indian Affairs Natural Resources about the early 1950's and is now completely deteriorated. The wooden posts are rotted and buried in the sand, barb wires rusted and buried in the sand, etc.

We have estimated that Northern BIA Agency would have to come up with thirty-five miles of fencing materials, Fort Defiance BIA Agency would have to come up with three miles of fencing materials, and Eastern BIA Agency will come up with nine miles of fencing materials. The totals fence line would require up to forty-seven miles of fencing material.
