Purpose of this Legislation:

to approve \$2.5 million from the Sihasin Fund for a portion of Utah State University's costs for constructing a new \$14 million-dollar education building in Monument Valley.

20	SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY	
21	A. The Budget and Finance Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council	
22	with the responsibility to "review and recommend to the Navajo Nation Council the	
23	budgeting, appropriation, investment and management of all funds." 2 N.N.C. §301(B)(2).	
24	B. The Health, Education, and Human Services Committee is a standing committee of the	
25	Navajo Nation Council with authority over education matters, including colleges and	
26	universities within the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. §400(C)(1), 2 N.N.C. §401(C)(3).	
27	C. The Health, Education, and Human Services Committee also has authority to recommend to	
28	the Navajo Nation Council resolutions related to education. 2 N.N.C. §401(B)(6)(a).	
29	D. The Naabik'íyáti' Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council that	
30	considers all proposed final actions by the Navajo Nation Council. 2 N.N.C. §164(A)(9).	

E. The Navajo Nation Council is the governing body of the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. §102(A).

As such, the Council may approve appropriations from the Navajo Nation's Síhasin Fund.

E. 12 N.N.C. §2502, as amended by CIA-03-18, states the purpose of the Navajo Nation Síhasin.

F. 12 N.N.C. §2502, as amended by CJA-03-18, states the purpose of the Navajo Nation Síhasin Fund ("Síhasin Fund") as follows:

§2502 Purpose

- A. The purposes of this Fund are to provide financial support and/or financing for:
 - 1. The planning and development of economic development and regional infrastructure supporting economic development and community development, including such infrastructure as, but not limited to, housing, commercial and government buildings, waterline, solid waste management development, powerline Projects, and transportation and communication systems, within the Navajo Nation; and
 - 2. Education opportunities for members of the Navajo Nation.
- B. For the Purpose in §2502(A)(1), Fund expenditures for infrastructure shall not be limited by 12 N.N.C. §1310(F) or TCDCJY-77-99.
- C. Leveraging the Fund by way of guaranteeing loans, match funding, direct funding in part, and other weighted uses of the Fund, including loan financing from the Fund, for the purposes in §2502(A)(1), shall be favored over direct funding in whole.
- G. The Síhasin Fund provides that "Fund Principal" shall consist of all deposits made to the Síhasin Fund and that "Fund Income" shall consist of all earnings (interest, dividends, etc.) generated and realized by the Fund Principal, and that Síhasin Fund Income shall be deposited in, and added to, the Fund Principal until such time as a Fund Expenditure Plan is duly approved. 12 N.N.C. §2504 and §2505(C).
- H. The Síhasin Fund also provides that "Fund Principal and Income shall not be expended except pursuant to a Fund Expenditure Plan consistent with the purposes set forth in §2502 of this Chapter and adopted by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of all members of the Navajo Nation Council." 12 N.N.C. §2505(A).

1 SECTION TWO. FINDINGS A. Utah State University is requesting \$2,500,500 from the Síhasin Fund as a contribution from 2 3 the Navajo Nation to construct a new education building at Monument Valley (the "Project"). EXHIBIT A. 4 B. Utah State University has provided a description and feasibility study for this Project. 5 EXHIBIT B. 6 7 C. Utah State University has also provided a detailed Cost Estimate for the entire Project. EXHIBIT C. 8 9 D. Utah State University has also provided a letter from the University Vice-President explain 10 the University's commitment to spend the requested \$2,500,00 in Síhasin funds on construction costs for the Project. EXHIBIT D. 11 E. Approving the \$2,500,000 for this Project satisfies the preference for leveraging of funds in 12 12 N.N.C. §2502(C), because the State of Utah has pledged \$5,000,000 for the Project and 13 14 the University itself has also pledged \$5,000,000. See EXHIBIT A. F. Providing the \$2,500,000 in Síhasin funds will enable Utah State University to serve more 15 Navajo students and bring more higher education, training, and other learning opportunities 16 to the community and the Navajo People. 17 G. The Navajo Nation therefore finds the approval of the requested Síhasin funds to be in the 18 best interests of the Navajo Nation and the Navajo People. 19 20 SECTION THREE. APPROVING \$2,500,000 FROM THE SÍHASIN FUND TO UTAH 21 STATE UNIVERSITY FOR A NEW EDUCATION BUILDING IN 22 MONUMENT VALLEY: APPROVING THE RELATED 23 EXPENDITURE PLAN 24 A. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. §2505(A), the Navajo Nation hereby approves \$2,500,000 from the 25 Síhasin Fund to Utah State University for partial costs to build a new education building in 26 Monument Valley, as explained in the attached EXHIBITS A-D. The Navajo Nation hereby 27 approves the related Expenditure Plan as set forth in **EXHIBITS A-D**. 28

B. The Navajo Nation Controller shall determine whether the source of the \$2,500,000 amount

from the Síhasin Fund will be from Fund Principal or Fund Income or a combination of both.

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- D. The Síhasin funds approved herein shall be made available to the Office of Navajo Nation Scholarship and Financial Assistance ("ONNSFA"), within 30 business days of the University's written notification to the Office of the Controller and ONNSFA that the construction phase of the Project has commenced. The funds will thereafter be made available for the University's use on a drawdown basis. Upon first receipt of any amount of the funds approved herein, Utah State University shall promptly implement the Expenditure Plan approved herein.
- E. Drawdown of the approved Síhasin funds shall be governed by an appropriate grant agreement, memorandum of agreement, or other legal document executed by Utah State University and the Navajo Nation. Said agreement shall be binding upon the parties, shall be approved by the Controller and the Department of Justice, and shall establish a project schedule, payment or drawdown plan, fund management plan, or other relevant procedures governing the Project.
- F. ONNSFA shall have administrative oversight authority over the expenditure of the Síhasin funds approved herein, and shall monitor the University's implementation of the approved Expenditure Plan.
- G. The approved Síhasin funds shall not be comingled with any other funds, and shall be used by strictly for the Expenditure Plan approved herein. Utah State University shall be responsible for ensuring that all expenditures comply with the approved Expenditure Plan, and with all provisions of the legal agreement described in Section Three (E) above.
- H. As a condition of receiving the approved Síhasin funds, Utah State University shall allow the Navajo Nation full access to its financial records related to the Síhasin funds it has received, for the purpose of the Navajo Nation's review and audit of the University's expenditures of the Síhasin funds.
- I. Unspent and unencumbered Síhasin funds shall not lapse at the end of any Navajo Nation

1	Fiscal Year, as might otherwise occur under 12 N.N.C. §820(N), so long as all Síhasin funds
2	are accounted for as of September 30 th of every year, starting with September 30, 2023.
3	
4	SECTION FOUR. DIRECTIVE
5	As a condition of receiving the Síhasin funds approved herein, Utah State University shall
6	submit written reports, and verbal reports if so requested, explaining the ongoing status of the
7	Expenditure Plan approved herein and its expenditures of the \$2,500,000. Said reports shall be
8	provided to the Health, Education, and Human Services Committee, the Budget and Finance
9	Committee, and the Naabik'íyáti' Committee by the end of each Fiscal Year Quarter until all
10	approved Síhasin funds are exhausted.
11	
12	SECTION FIVE. EFFECTIVE DATE
13	This Action and the related Expenditure Plan shall become effective pursuant to 12 N.N.C.
14	§2505(A) and 2 N.N.C. §221(B).
15	
16	SECTION SIX. SAVING CLAUSE
17	If any part of this Action is invalidated by the Supreme Court of the Navajo Nation, or by any
18	Navajo Nation District Court without appeal to the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, the
19	remainder of this Action shall be the law of the Navajo Nation.

Monument Valley Funding Request

Utah State University is applying to the Navajo Nation for funds to support the completion of a new higher education facility in Monument Valley, Utah. The facility will benefit those who live in the Monument Valley, Oljato, and Kayenta service regions of the Navajo Nation.

Established in 1888, Utah State University is Utah's land grant institution of higher education. As Utah's Land Grant institution our mission is to provide educational opportunities to all residents of the state. We have 3 residential campuses (Logan, Price, Blanding) and 30 centers that provide certificates, associate, baccalaureate, master's and doctoral degrees. This includes four sites in San Juan County, Utah: Monument Valley, Montezuma Creek, Blanding, and Monticello.

The proposed project incorporates traditional classrooms and distance learning connections. Students will have access to a vast array of certificates and degrees, ranging from technical certifications to doctorate degrees, as well as academic guidance and support, counseling services, and career mentoring. In addition, the proposed project will benefit local high school students by expanding the concurrent enrollment courses and programs offered through Monument Valley, UT high school. USU will also expand its support for small businesses in the area through the Small Business Development Center (SBDC).

The USU educational facility will be built on San Juan School District land and supported in collaboration with the San Juan School District and Monument Valley Utah High School. Monument Valley residents will benefit through the following features:

- Delivery of education through face-to-face, online, and broadcast classes for career technical training and higher education degrees. A list of programs and degrees are provided in Appendix B and include:
 - o 28 certificate programs
 - o 10 associate degrees
 - 29 bachelor's degrees
 - o 27 master's degrees
 - 3 doctoral degrees
 - o 3 professional education licensures
- Assistance to students from locally hired staff who are located in the same building, providing skill assessment, career guidance, goal setting, tracking progress and followthrough, as well as qualitative forms of support such as mentoring, encouragement, and coaching.

- Expansion of USU's collaboration with the San Juan School District, providing high school concurrent enrollment courses and career technical education programs, which help high school students gain employment skills and experiences at an extremely important developmental stage of their lives.
- Creation of a facility that allows the entire community to engage in and witness the progress of students. As such, students become peer role models for other community members, especially the youth.
- Expansion of USU Extension Services that will increase resources, training, and education for community residents in the areas of husbandry and agriculture.

Included is a PDF with a rendering of what the building may look like. This is not the final design, nor have final decisions been made. The rendering gives a sense for what the building may look like, possible office locations, and where the building will be located on the San Juan School District property. Also, a more detailed description of the project is included in Appendix A.

A building of approximately 12,000 square feet is estimated to cost \$14,000,000 to build. The building size and associated cost reflects what is necessary to house a broad spectrum of programs that will benefit students in the region while at the same time keeping costs reasonable. To date the State of Utah has pledged \$5,000,000 towards the project and the university is committing another \$5,000,000. USU is in the process of raising additional funds. The Ray and Tye Noorda Foundation have discussed a commitment of \$750,000. Fidelity have also discussed a \$750,000 donation. The Mariner Eccels Foundation have donated \$100,000 to go towards developing community agriculture trainings and workshops.

Assistance from the Navajo Nation in the form of a financial contribution would allow USU to approach other philanthropic organizations. Therefore, we humbly ask the Navajo Nation for a contribution of \$2,500,000 toward this dynamic and impactful project.

APPENDIX A

USU Monument Valley Building Project Overview

Utah State University has been providing education to the residents in the Monument Valley area for over 40 years. Since 2003, USU has been offering classes and services in a leased building that was previously a Seventh Day Adventist hospital. That building suffers greatly from age including structural flood damage that renders its continued use problematic. The space was not designed as an educational facility. This limits what programs the university can offer. The dilapidated building is not a resource that is representative of USU's dedication to the residents of Monument Valley.

The new USU facility will directly support priorities important to people who live in the area.

- Education: Education is one of the key ways to reduce poverty, improve opportunity, and create positive change. Higher levels of education increase the chance a person will find a job and acquire the skills needed in today's economy. An investment in higher education in Monument Valley will provide residents with the opportunity to gain an education that will allow them to improve their individual situations.
- Economic Development: USU has plans to provide a Small Business Development Center in the new facility. The Center will be available to residents in the area and will focus on assisting individuals and businesses develop, grow, and create job opportunities for others.
- Behavioral and Mental Health: USU Blanding offers programs in psychology, social work, nursing, and health professions. In fact, two residents of Monument Valley recently completed their Masters of Social Work studies while attending the current USU Monument Valley facility. Additionally, USU works closely with the Utah Navajo Health System (UNHS) to provide mental health services to USU students in the San Juan County, Utah area. All of these programs support improved health education for residents in the Monument Valley area.

Purpose

A new University building in the Monument Valley area will allow USU to provide more programs of relevance in the Four-Corners region, improve educational delivery, and provide spaces for community meetings and economic and business development. The building will reflect the local culture, strengthen ties to the school district, enhance concurrent enrollment opportunities, and serve the Navajo community with greatly improved educational infrastructure.

Progress to Date

USU has an agreement with the San Juan School District to locate USU's new building on district property very close to Monument Valley High School and the Utah Navajo Health Services Clinic. USU is currently working with AJC Architects to design the new facility.








Concept Rendering - South Patio





Dear Honorable Council Delegate Daniels,



I would like to express my gratitude for your unwavering support of the USU Monument Valley academic building.

I am pleased to provide you with an overview of the estimated construction costs for the building. Please keep in mind this is a working document, as we are currently collaborating with AJC Architecture to design and engineer the structure. The attached document, prepared by AJC, offers an initial breakdown of the project costs. As we progress through the architectural and engineering process, minor adjustments to the figures may occur. However, I want to assure you that we have set a firm budget of \$14,000,000, and we are committed to keeping the project's total cost below this threshold.

Regarding the allocation of the \$2.5 million funds received from the Navajo Nation, I would like to clarify they will be dedicated entirely to construction expenses. Although I cannot provide a detailed breakdown of which aspects of the building will be covered by these funds, at this time we have established a separate construction account housing funds that will only be utilized to build the building. This account will exclusively be utilized to cover the construction costs of the building and will not be allocated towards staff salaries, equipment purchases, or any other miscellaneous expenses. The \$2.5 million, along with other funds we raise for the project, will be devoted solely to construction expenses. Including areas such as the nursing lab, CNA lab, and welding lab.

Should we receive the funds, we are willing to provide updated details on the status of the project, budget expenses, and information on the utilization of the funds. USU has a long track record of being good stewards of funds raised for building projects and directing those funds solely to construction expenses.

As we work through the building design process we are committed to creating a structure that honors the Navajo People and reflects the culture of Monument Valley.
