TITLE OF RESOLUTION: AN ACTION RELATING TO RESOURCE AND DEVELOPMENT, BUDGET AND FINANCE, NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEES AND NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; APPROVING SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING FROM THE UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE IN THE AMOUNT OF ONE MILLION, EIGHT HUNDRED ONE, SIX HUNDRED SIXTY SIX DOLLARS (\$1,801,666) TO COALMINE CANYON CHAPTER FOR WATERLINE EXTENSION, WAIVING 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I) AND 860 (C)

PURPOSE: This resolution approves an allocation of \$1,801,666 from the UUFB for the Coalmine Canyon Chapter domestic waterline construction and waives certain provisions of the Capital Improvement Plan

NOTE: A 2/3rds vote of the full Council membership is required.

This written summary does not address recommended amendments as may be provided by the standing committee. The Office of Legislative Counsel requests each committee member to review the proposed legislation in detail.

18	BE IT ENACTED:

20	Section One. Authority
21	A. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(L), the Navajo Nation Council may adopt and approve
22	supplemental appropriations to the Annual Comprehensive Budget during the fiscal
23	year. Supplemental appropriations of General Funds within the current fiscal year are
24	permitted, (1) if and when additional sources of revenues above and beyond the initial or
25	current revenue projections are projected and which are also in excess of the reserve
26	amount set for in § 820(J), or (2) when the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund balance
27	(UUFB) is in excess of the reserve amount set forth at § 820(J).
28	B. The Navajo Nation Council established the Naabik'íyáti' Committee as a Navajo Nation
29	standing committee and as such proposed legislation that requires final action by the

- Navajo Nation Council shall be assigned to the Naabik'íyáti' Committee. 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(9), 701(A)(3).
- C. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 300 (C)(3) the Budget and Finance Committee is authorized to recommend adoption of resolutions related to the expenditure of the Nation's financial resources.
- D. Budget and Finance Committee may recommend supplemental appropriations to the Navajo Nation Council. 12 N.N.C. § 820 (L).
- E. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 501 (C)(5), the Resources and Development Committee exercises oversight authority over chapter activities, and economic and community development, for the purpose to promote, review, coordinate and approve projects to be financed by funds designed for capital improvement.

Section Two. Findings

- A. Pursuant to 26 N.N.C. § 3 the Coalmine Canyon Chapter is a duly recognized and certified Chapter of the Navajo Nation.
- B. The Coalmine Canyon Chapter, as a result of the Bennett Freeze, was restricted in community and infrastructure development; in that way depriving community members of safe drinking water, electrical services, adequate shelter and other essential, basic services. *See* Coalmine Canyon Chapter resolution CCC-01-0046-16 attached as **Exhibit A**.
- C. The Coalmine Canyon Chapter list the domestic water service line as a priority for the community. See Exhibit A.
- D. The Coalmine Canyon Chapter water service extension will serve a number of families living within the former federally mandated Bennett Freeze. *See* Domestic Water Service Line Extension Construction Project, Coalmine Canyon Chapter, attached as **Exhibit B**.
- E. The Title 12 Finance Act Supplemental Appropriation requirements include:
 - 1. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(M), all requests for annual operating funds and supplemental funds shall be submitted to the Office of Management and

Budget ("OMB") for budget impact analysis. OMB memorandum dated August 01, 2016 attached as **Exhibit C**.

- 2. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(L), when the Controller identifies additional sources of revenues above and beyond the initial or current revenue projections, supplemental appropriations may be allocated by the Navajo Nation Council. Controller's memorandum dated September 13, 2016 attached as Exhibit D and current UUFB memorandum dated March 28, 2017 attached as Exhibit D-1.
- F. The Title 12 Capital Improvement Process includes:
 - 1. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 810(F), "Capital Improvement" means a major project undertaken by the Navajo Nation that is generally not recurring on an annual basis and which fits within one or more of the following categories:
 - a. All projects requiring debt obligation or borrowing;
 - b. Any acquisition or lease of land;
 - c. Purchase of major equipment or vehicles, with a life expectancy of five years or more, valued in excess of an amount to be established by the Controller;
 - d. Major building improvements that are not routine maintenance expenses and that substantially enhance the value or extend the useful life of a structure;
 - e. Construction of new buildings or facilities including engineering, design, and other pre-construction costs with an estimated cost in excess of an amount to be determined by the Controller; and/or
 - f. Major equipment or furnishing required to furnish new buildings or other projects, the cost of which is above a certain amount to be established by the Controller.
 - 2. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820 (I), the "[d]evelopment of the Capital Budget shall be coordinated with development of the Operating Budget. All budget requests for capital improvements shall be in compliance with an adopted

- Capital Improvement Plan and shall not be approved unless in compliance with the Plan."
- 3. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 860 (C)(2) "[t]he appropriation portion of the Capital Improvement Plan is subject to approval of the Navajo Nation Council upon recommendation of the Budget and Finance Committee. Any modification or amendment affecting the approved Capital Improvement Plan is subject to review and concurrence by the Resources and Development Committee prior to consideration by the Navajo Nation Council."
- G. There are sufficient funds available in the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance to provide the Coalmine Canyon Chapter with an appropriation of One Million Eight Hundred One Thousand Six Hundred Sixty Six Dollars (\$1,801,666) to construct a domestic waterline for service to community families living within the Former Bennett Freeze Area. Budget forms attached as **Exhibit E**.
- H. The Navajo Nation, having repealed the Capital Improvement Plan in CAP-23-17, finds it in the best interest to waive 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I) and 860 (C) regarding the Capital Improvement project for the Coalmine Canyon domestic waterline construction.
- I. The Navajo Nation finds it in the best interest of the Coalmine Canyon Chapter to approve the supplemental appropriation from the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance to the Coalmine Canyon Chapter for the domestic waterline construction.

Section Three. Waiving 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I) and 860(C) Regarding Funding for the Coalmine Canyon Chapter domestic waterline construction.

The Navajo Nation, having repealed the Capital Improvement Plan in CAP-23-17, hereby waives the Capital Improvement Plan sections at 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I) and 860(C) with regard to the Coalmine Canyon Chapter domestic waterline construction.

Section Four. Approvals

A. The Navajo Nation Council hereby approves a supplemental appropriation to the Coalmine Canyon Chapter for the construction of the domestic waterline. This supplemental appropriation to be funded from the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund

Balance, and used solely for the Coalmine Canyon Chapter domestic waterline construction.

B. This supplemental appropriation of One Million Eight Hundred One Thousand Six Hundred Sixty Six Dollars (\$1,801,666) shall be to a Business Unit # NEW and from that amount of funds that exceeds the minimum fund balance of the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance.

Section Five. Effective Date

The provisions of this Act shall become effective in accordance with 2 N.N.C. § 221(B).

Section Six. Savings, Severability, and Survivability

Should any provision herein be determined invalid by the Navajo courts or other court of competent jurisdiction, all other provisions of this legislation not determined to be invalid shall remain in full force and effect.

REAFFIRMING THE REQUEST TO DCD-CDBG FOR DOMESTIC WATER SERVICE LINE CONSTRUCTION TO SERVICE 32 FAMILIES WITHIN THE COALMINE CANYON CHAPTER

WHEREAS:

- 1. Pursuant to 26 NNC Section 3, Chapter Certification and 11 Section Part 1, Section 10. The Coalmine Canyon Chapter is a duly recognized Chapter government and certified chapter of the Navajo Nation Government; and
- 2. Pursuant to 26 NNC, Chapter 1; Navajo Nation Chapters, Section 1, (B), Purpose: (1) & (2), Navajo Nation Council delegated to Chapter government authority with respect to local matter consistent with Navajo law, including custom and tradition and allows chapters to make decisions to govern with responsibility and accountability to community membership; and
- The Coalmine Canyon Chapter Officials, Staff and Committees are vested with duties & responsibilities in accordance to established Chapter Plan of Operation in which chapters are compelled to governed in addressing local community needs; and
- The Bennett Freeze Act of 1966 and the Navajo-Hopi Settlement Act of 1974 has restricted community and infrastructure development for over 50 plus years, as a result, these laws has deprived community members of safe drinking water, electrical, adequate shelter and other essential basic services; and
- The Coalmine Canyon Chapter strives for the health and safety of the community membership by providing them with improved services via community and infrastructure development by constructing electrical service lines to community members; and
- The Coalmine Canyon Chapter has listed the domestic water service line construction as Navajo Nation Capital Improvement Project priority and will fund the preconstruction cost and deemed "PROJECT READY" by the Indian Health Service.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- The Coalmine Canyon Chapter hereby request the Division of Community—CDBG to fund the 1. Coalmine Canyon Domestic Water Service Line Extension Project to benefit 32 families;
- The Coalmine Canyon Chapter hereby request all affected Tribal, Federal, and County agencies to assist to ensure the construction of this proposed undertaking; and
- 3. This resolution will supersede all prior resolutions.



Coalmine Canyon Chapter domestic water service extension construction to serve 25 families living within the former federally mandated Land Freeze which restricted any form of rehabilitation or new development for over 50 plus years will now receive domestic water service. HISTORY of COALMINE CANYON COMMUNITY

The Coalmine Canyon Chapter is located (Exhibit A) Western part of Navajo Indian Reservation within an area that was prohibited from any development or rehabilitation without express approval by the Hopi and Navajo Tribes following a long-standing land dispute that resulted in the so-called Land Freeze.

The Public Law 93-531 arose from a long land dispute between the Hopi and Navajo Tribes. The dispute began after US government delineated the boundary of the Hopi reservation in 1882, which excluded some Hopi villages, farmlands and sacred places. In 1934, the federal government further defined the boundaries of the Navajo Reservation on its western side and a portion of the Hopi Tribe's 1882 Reservation, known as District 6, which was exclusively for use by the Hopi Tribe.

In 1966, BIA Commissioner Robert L. Bennett issued a series of administrative orders that restricted development/rehabilitation in the Western portion of the Navajo Indian Reservation (as defined in 1934). This became known as the Bennett Freeze and was intended to be a temporary measure to prevent one tribe taking advantage of the other until the land dispute was settled. The Land Freeze restricted property development/rehabilitation without joint consent of the Hopi and Navajo Tribes, which had a devastating impact on the area which resulted people living in substandard housing and lack of infrastructure. Even home site leases could not be issued and community facilities and utilities could not be constructed.

In 1992, a US District Court ordered the Land Freeze lifted. The Arizona District Court ruled the Hopi Tribe had legal title to 64,000 acres and awarded the balance to the Navajo Nation. Navajo and Hopi residents finding themselves on the "wrong side" of the dividing line were forced to relocate, affecting mostly Navajo families. In 1995, the freeze was reinstated when the question of whether Hopi religious practices have rights based on occupancy.

For over 50 plus years, the former Land Freeze resulted in very limited improvements creating severe social and economic problems. People have been living in sub-standard conditions in dilapidated homes because restrictions prohibited new home construction and/or repairs. Due to these poor living conditions or lack of home sites, many young families and elderly residents relocated to nearby towns for better health services, education, the convenience of modern-day necessities, and better homes and economic opportunities.

Rehabilitation of the Former Freeze Area (FFA) is now a high priority for Begay/Nez Administration, especially after touring the impact region which is in dire need for basic infrastructure. The Presidential Tour and Navajo Nation Council listening session witnessed and heard local people testimonies asking Nation's involvement in rebuilding communities and lives. The Nation's leaders have the opportunity to move forward right now to support rebuilding communities and lives curing 50 plus years of pain. The Presidential "One Voice, One Nation" proclamation will initiate bringing all resources in this effort in helping strengthen local governments and creating economic stability. New income stream will replenish the diminishing tribal revenues and establish tax base for local governance. The formation of the ACTION Teams (Housing, Infrastructure, Economic Development, Public Safety/Health) and the nine priorities is the beginning of the Nation building.

The FFA requires significant monetary investment in projects for basic infrastructure development, housing construction and repairs, and new businesses and community facilities to support development

of economic activities. Area Chapters, Districts and Agency Council have passed resolutions asking to develop regional economic plans, financial investments but to no avail.

Location

Coalmine Canyon community is also known as, Leegin ha gid, and geographically located in the western part (Exhibit B) of the Navajo Nation, along US Highway 264 and eastern central portion of Coconino County. The chapter is approximately 402,357 acres in size. Substantial amount of acreage of land was lost due to settlement agreement

The successful recovery process will require strong leadership, clear community vision and determination of all involved to implement the projects needed in the impacted region. The chapter certification process is one way to build capacity at the local level for governance, project management and on-going operation and maintenance.

PL 93-531 had a significant emotional and physical effect on the Navajo people of the Coalmine Canyon region, because many Navajo people lived on lands partitioned to the Hopi Tribe within what was considered the Coalmine Canyon Chapter. Due to this legislation, many community members moved and relocated to Coalmine Canyon community, New Lands, or elsewhere, although a few Navajo remained in the Hopi Partitioned Land under a residential lease agreement with the Hopi Tribe.

The Former Land Freeze prevented development and progress since 1966 with the execution for the short window that construction freeze was lifted during 1992-1995. The development restriction was vigorously enforced Bureau of Indian Affairs funded Hopi Tribal Rangers which restricted and prohibited even conducting basic repairs to Navajo family homes in the affected area. The freeze caused growing families to live in over-crowed dilapidated homes which increased health and safety hazards. Many area residents under age of 65 all have been impacted and now many do not have homes.

OBJECTIVE AND GOAL

The Coalmine Canyon Chapter's objective of this proposal request is to improve health, sanitation and overall enhancement of the quality of life for families who are in dire need of basic infrastructure, such as, domestic water services. Furthermore, through the successful funding and timely completion of this project, the community will exemplify the ability to work with various service providers in meeting community prioritized need. The completion of this project will also contribute to further capital investment to continue improve quality of life and living standards. Also meet community needs and goals, the Coalmine Canyon Chapter is requesting for construction funds for development of this community which has been heavily impacted by the land dispute whereby the chapter lost substantial amount of land to the Hopi Tribe.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The targeted project is located within the Coalmine Canyon Chapter along US Highway 264 and south of chapter along BIA Route 6720, Chapter's goal is to provide adequate domestic water distribution service (20 miles) to accommodate and stimulate community growth. The objective is coordinate with the local resources to develop the water distribution service lines to areas which are not being served or

underserved areas along with booster station. Many community members have never been service due to development freeze and currently limited areas of the community is currently being served.

Coalmine Canyon Chapter Resolution (Exhibit C), requesting construction funds for domestic water service line extension to serve 25 families. The lack of domestic water service cause much hardship and if funded, will benefit families who have waited for such basic necessity in their homes, including improved living environment, such as, healthy homes, safety, promotion of development. In addition, water availability will even provide economic opportunities and efficient use of local resources.

The domestic water distribution service line has been planned by the community and in coordination with Indian Health Service, NTUA and Navajo-Hopi Land Commission. The availability of domestic water distribution service will eliminate the dependency on antiquity water hauling and have caused economic hardship due numerous trips to closest domestic watering point which is Tuba City (approximately 90 miles round trip).

All preconstruction cost on water related projects is responsibility of Indian Health Service on approved application for Indian Health Service funding. If this project is submitted to Navajo Division of Community Development--Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), to get to "Project Readiness Status) chapters are responsible for all preconstruction requirements (Environmental Assessment, Land Survey) which the chapter most often have to save for a number of years to accumulate for those mentioned dollar requirement for predevelopment related cost. If Coalmine Canyon Chapter is required to cover preconstruction cost, the Chapter has identified some capital improvement funds in its budget for that purpose (Exhibit). The Tuba City Regional Health Care Corporation Engineering and Design has provided assistance development of construction cost and field engineering data. As project continues in the process, certain data will of course be modified. National Indian Health Service has granted partial planning funds in the amount of \$50,000.00 to move forward.

PROJECT NEED

Although the Land Freeze has been lifted, many families residing outside the immediate community resettlement tract are frustrated by the lack of amenities made available to those choosing to continue to reside on their ancestral homeland. When the Bennett Freeze was lifted, many community members of Coalmine Canyon believed that they too would be afforded basic amenities. Unfortunately, most residents continued to live under substandard conditions imposed upon them by the Federal restrictions of development whereby those that chose to relocate in exchange for benefits such as, modern homes with all the modern day conveniences.

In order to enhance the quality of life for those still residing in Coalmine Canyon Chapter and in an effort to revitalize the community, basic infrastructure need to be made available to residents within the chapter. The availability of utilities is an opportunity afforded to those who wish to return home and build a home. The Chapter recognizes the need and identified development of infrastructure as a priority and approved as listed, need for water distribution service lines within the community on the Navajo Nation Capital Improvement Project List (CIP), (Exhibit D).

The Coalmine Canyon Chapter is proposing constructing domestic water distribution service lines to serve families living outside of the resettlement area and mostly along US Highway 264 and south of the chapter.

The community members of Coalmine Canyon Chapter believe that past coal and uranium mining has also affected individual home construction or establishing families due to health and environmental concerns. It is necessary for our community members have access to modern day conveniences of everyday life in an effort to upgrade their living standards and conditions. Many people living near abandoned mine site have had health related issues, such as, family members overcome by these pass mine related activities.

Employment in area is only available in Tuba City or elsewhere. Majority of the public services are available in Tuba City 20 miles west, such as, schools, medical facility, commercial, governmental services. Currently, community has difficulty with communication services, although a new cell town has been constructed which only serves NTUA cell phones, not other cell service providers. The chapter does not have land line telephone service, even though NTUA has erected telephone tower and newly constructed fiber optic.

BUDGET INFORMATION

The total construction cost of the domestic water service distribution line extension as estimated by IHS
(11-2015) is \$ (Exhibit E). Total construction funds requested by the Coalmine Canyon
Chapter is \$ Preconstruction Right-of-Way acquisition cost has been fully paid by the HIS
once selected for planning phase. National Indian Health Service has awarded partially granted
\$50,000.00 toward the planning of this said proposed project. Navajo Abandoned Mine Lands Office
granted \$37,000.00 for bathroom addition. The Chapter hired a local contractor to house wire homes to
insure electricity can be available if needed. Navajo-Hopi Land Commission has also provided funds
toward this proposed undertaking.



MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION


NTUA is the only domestic water provider and will be the lead agency during construction which will be coordinated with Indian Health Service Engineering and Design. All water and waste water projects is contracted with Navajo Engineering Construction Authority. Upon completion of the project, NTUA will manage and service the system. All construction related activities will be coordinated with NTUA, IHS and chapter.



3. BRIEF CHAPTER HISTORY

In 1953, the first chapter house, made of cinderblock, was constructed on Coalmine Mesa. Although small, this building accommodated meetings for the local community members until a bigger chapter house was built in 1958. During that period, there were no signs of potential land use controversies. People were happy; they had quality livestock that met their daily lifestyle and subsistence needs. Planning of activities and development during those earlier years was a much simpler proposition as there were fewer concerns with government regulations or land use areas.

However, by 1974, certain land use controversies had occurred, and the United States Congress passed the *Navajo and Hopi Land Settlement Act of 1974*, Public Law 93-531, as amended. From that time, it was necessary to obtain approvals from the Hopi Tribe due to requirements of this law.




Public Law 93-531 had a significant emotional and physical affect on the Navajo people of the Coalmine region because many Navajo people lived on lands partitioned to the Hopi Tribe within what was considered the Coalmine Mesa Chapter. Due to this legislation, many community members moved and relocated to Coal Mine Canyon, New Lands or elsewhere, although a few Navajo people remained in the Hopi Partitioned Land under a lease agreement with the Hopi Tribe.

When the community moved the Chapter from Coalmine Mesa to Coalmine Canyon, the Chapter officially changed its name from Coalmine Mesa Chapter to The Coalmine Canyon Chapter per resolution number CMC06-45-98 dated June 7, 1998.



Further, the "Bennett Freeze" continues to complicate the land dispute. The 1934 Reservation litigation case, which covers all of the planning area west of the FJUA, has prevented development and progress since 1966, with the exception of the short window of time that the construction Freeze was lifted during 1992-1995.



The Bennett Freeze, with vigorous enforcement, severely restricted and prohibited the completion of even basic repairs (broken windows and leaky roofs) to Navajo family homes in the affected area. The Freeze caused growing families to live in overcrowded dilapidated housing which increased health and safety problems. The construction restrictions also severely retarded opportunities for economic self-sufficiency for the Chapter.


Since the passage of the Navajo and Hopi Land Settlement Act of 1974 and the continuing freeze of development on the Chapter's land within the FJUA and the 1934 Reservation, the Chapter has struggled to rebuild its community in and outside the disputed areas.




Although the Chapter struggled

at times, even holding Chapter meetings in random places such as the rodeo grounds, the community is striving to move forward. It has built a new chapter house where it now holds

regular planning meetings. Indeed, additional success has been realized to some extent with the construction of a large residential development, the new chapter house, electric lines, and a water line service to homes near the chapter house.





While a brief summary of the Chapter's history is chronicled above, **TABLE 1** below details past events and captures a more complete account of the significant historical events that have contributed to making of modern day life of the Coalmine Canyon people.

The Office of Management and Budget has reviewed the above referenced document. Upon review of the proposed supplemental funding proposal, OMB notes the following:

- 1. The attached copy of the Navajo Nation Capital Improvement Plan 2013-2018, which was approved by resolution CAP-18-14, does <u>not</u> list Coalmine Canyon Chapter as an approved project for power line extension in the amount of \$1,801,666.00. The Appropriations Act, Section 820 (I), addresses the Capital Budget requirements in the following language: "All budget requests for capital improvements shall be in compliance with an adopted Capital Improvement Plan and shall not be approved unless in compliance with the Plan."
- 2. The Office of the Controller says the UUFB has an amount of \$7,569,087 available. OMB recently compiled the Fiscal Year 2015 unmet needs list which was submitted by the oversight committees but Coalmine Chapter is <u>not</u> on the list. There are over a \$100,000,000 in unmet needs requests which need to be considered for funding from the UUFB or other sources. These unmet needs should be considered before other requests.
- The appropriate budget forms for capital projects need to be used. This includes the Project Budget Summary, Capital Project Budget Schedule, and the Line Item Budget and Justification. The other budget forms are for operating budget requests, not capital projects budget requests.
- 4. The Supplemental Funding Proposal Summary is lacking the Branch Chief's signature.
- 5. There are multiple NECA Cost Accounting Estimating Sheets attached to the 164 document, however, none of the amounts match the Preliminary Cost Estimate of \$56,302 multiplied by 32 families to equal the requested amount of \$1,801,666.00 which is listed on the Detailed Line Item Budget and Justification page.

OMB recommends that the above mentioned findings be addressed before final approval of the budget. If you have any questions, contact R. Tenille, Senior Budget Analyst at OMB.

The gross General Fund Revenues, (see Exhibit "A"), as of August 31, 2016 is \$205,289,746, (see Footnote 1). The total General Fund set asides is \$52,152,154, (Footnote 2). The Net Revenue for the General Fund is \$153,137,592(see Footnote 3), which is 93.73% of the projection. Please note that the General Fund budget for FY 16 is set at \$172,654,000,(Footnote 4), the General Fund revenue projection is \$163,384,000, the other amount to cover the General Fund budget is coming from the Tax Suspense Fund in the amount in the gross amount of \$13, 000,000. This schedule shows the \$13,000,000 transfer from the Sales Tax Trust Fund, (Footnote 5) and the set asides.

Next, are the total expenditures by Branch, (see Exhibit "B"), as of August 31, 2016. The Legislative Branch has expenditures of \$13,776,064(see Footnote 1a); encumbrances of \$937,892(see Footnote 1b) with a remaining budget of \$4,367,402(see Footnote 1c). The Executive Branch expenditures are \$151,774,965(see Footnote 2a); encumbrances are \$8,427,427(see Footnote 2b) with a remaining budget of \$34,393,790(see Footnote 2c). The Judicial Branch expenditures are \$11,620,993(see Footnote 3a); with encumbrances of \$16,882(see Footnote 3b) and remaining budget of \$2,491,576(see Footnote 3c). Total General Fund expenditures are \$177,172,022(see Footnote 4a); total encumbrances are \$9,382,201(see Footnote 4b) with an overall remaining budget of \$41,252,768(see Footnote 4c).

The updated Undesignated Unreserved Fund Balance (UUFB), (see Exhibit "C") as of September 7, 2016 is \$7,010,037.

Updated Undesignated Unreserved Fund Balance

The Office of Controller has updated the unaudited Undesignated Unreserved Fund Balance (UUFB) at \$6,824,260, as of March 28, 2017. Please see attached UUFB Schedule.

The appropriation in resolution CJA-02-17-Social Services for amount \$5,038,678 utilized the Minimum Fund Balance. After reviewing the Attorney General's Opinion [01-17], the Minimum Fund balance needs to be replenished to its required 10% of previous annual budget. Such required amount is \$17,265,400. Since the last report of UUFB on February 28, 2017 we performed additional analysis and revised our estimates, which had the following impact on UUFB:

- Increase UUFB for lower estimated adjustments from audit AJE's
- Increase UUFB for lower estimated expense to the Contingency Management Fund
- Decrease UUFB for the Permanent Fund set aside (CS-46-14)
- Decrease UUFB for additional capital projects

We believe our estimates to be prudent, reasonable, and conservative in nature and subject to the completion of the annual audit. The net impact of these changes resulted in UUFB of \$7,972,352. However, \$1,148,092 of UUFB was transferred to replenish the Minimum Fund Balance back up to the required 10%. Therefore, the UUFB balance is \$6,824,260 as of today.


