# RESOLUTION OF THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL

#### 23rd NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL -- Fourth Year, 2018

#### AN ACTION

RELATING TO HEALTH, EDUCATION AND HUMAN SERVICES, BUDGET AND FINANCE, NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEES AND NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; APPROVING AN EXPENDITURE FROM THE UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE IN THE AMOUNT OF TWO MILLION FOUR HUNDRED FORTY-ONE THOUSAND FIFTY-SIX DOLLARS (\$2,441,056) FOR THOREAU CHAPTER VETERANS SERVICE CENTER CONSTRUCTION; WAIVING 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I) AND 860(C) RELATING TO THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROCESS

#### BE IT ENACTED:

#### Section One. Authority

- A. The Navajo Nation established the Health, Education and Human Services (HEHS) Committee as a Navajo Nation Council standing committee and as such gave HEHS Committee oversight over veteran's services. 2 N.N.C. §§ 400(A), 401(C)(6).
- B. The Navajo Nation established the Budget and Finance Committee (BFC) as a Navajo Nation Council standing committee and as such empowered BFC to review and recommend to the Navajo Nation Council the management of all funds. 2 N.N.C. §§ 164 (A)(9), 300 (A), 301 (B)(2).
- C. The Navajo Nation Council established the Naabik'íyáti' Committee as a Navajo Nation standing committee and as such proposed legislation that requires final action by the Navajo Nation Council shall be assigned to the Naabik'íyáti' Committee. 2 N.N.C. §§ 164 (A)(9), 700 (A).
- D. The Title 12 Capital Improvement Process includes:
  - 1. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 810(F), "Capital Improvement" means a major project undertaken by the Navajo Nation that is generally not recurring on an annual basis and which fits within one or more of the following categories:
    - a. All projects requiring debt obligation or borrowing;

- b. Any acquisition or lease of land;
- c. Purchase of major equipment or vehicles, with a life expectancy of five years or more, valued in excess of an amount to be established by the Controller;
- d. Major building improvements that are not routine maintenance expenses and that substantially enhance the value or extend the useful life of a structure;
- e. Construction of new buildings or facilities including engineering, design, and other preconstruction costs with an estimated cost in excess of an amount to be determined by the Controller; and/or
- f. Major equipment or furnishing required to furnish new buildings or other projects, the cost of which is above a certain amount to be established by the Controller.
- 2. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820 (I), the "[d]evelopment of the Capital Budget shall be coordinated with development of the Operating Budget. All budget requests for capital improvements shall be in compliance with an adopted Capital Improvement Plan and shall not be approved unless in compliance with the Plan."
- 3. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 860 (C)(2), "[t]he appropriation portion of the Capital Improvement Plan is subject to approval of the Navajo Nation Council upon recommendation of the Budget and Finance Committee. Any modification or amendment affecting the approved Capital Improvement Plan is subject to review and concurrence by the Resources and Development Committee prior to consideration by the Navajo Nation Council."
- E. The Title 12 Finance Act Supplemental Appropriation requirements include:
  - 1. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. \$ 820(L), all requests for annual operating funds and supplemental funds

shall be submitted to the Office of Management and Budget ("OMB") for budget impact analysis. A preview of the appropriation legislation is available to the OMB for their budget impact analysis response. The OMB budget impact analysis is attached as **Exhibit D**.

2. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(L), when the Controller identifies additional sources of revenues above and beyond the initial or current revenue projections, supplemental appropriations may be allocated by the Navajo Nation Council. The attached memorandum, Exhibit A, from the Office of the Controller has identified the additional revenues.

#### Section Two. Findings

- A. As proposed, the Thoreau Chapter Veterans Service Center will establish a place for Veterans, active duty personnel, and their families to receive assistance with the many issues related to their military careers and the various challenges faced when assistance is required. See Thoreau Veteran Service Center Construction packet attached as Exhibit B.
- B. The Thoreau Chapter Veterans Committee, along with the Thoreau Chapter, has leveraged \$134,500 in matching funds along with the acquisition of an additional \$780,000 in project funding from the State of New Mexico Capital Outlay program, for a total amount of \$914,500 obligated to the project; this represents 22.58% of the total development cost of the project. The funding request for \$2,441,056 is outlined in the Budget forms attached as **Exhibit C**.
- C. The Office of Management and Budget has been provided a copy of the legislation and a copy of the Thoreau Chapter Veterans Service Center Construction packet for review for their response as required by 12 N.N.C. § 820(M).
- D. The Office of the Controller has provided a memorandum dated March 28, 2017, indicating the balance in the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance as of March 28, 2017, is \$6,824,260. This memorandum is provided to meet the requirements of 12 N.N.C. 820 (L); however, the Controller of the Navajo Nation has not designated the funds as recurring or non-recurring. See Exhibit A.

- E. The Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Department Cultural Resources Compliance Form and Archaeological Inventory Report Documentation Form are within the packet of information as well as the Navajo Nation Department of Fish and Wildlife Biological Resources Compliance Form. See Exhibit B.
- F. The Eastern Navajo Veteran's Organization, the Thoreau Chapter Veterans Committee, and the Thoreau Chapter have supported the Thoreau Chapter Veterans Service Center construction by a variety of resolutions and letters. See Exhibit B.
- G. The Navajo Nation finds it in the best interest to waive 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I) and 860 (C) regarding the Capital Improvement Process for the Thoreau Chapter Veterans Service Center construction.
- H. The Navajo Nation finds it in the best interest of the Navajo people to approve this appropriation request.

Section Three. Waiving 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I) And 860 (C) Regarding Funding for the Thoreau Chapter Veterans Service Center construction.

The Navajo Nation Council hereby waives the Capital Improvement Process at 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I) and 860(C) with regard to the Thoreau Chapter Veterans Service Center construction.

Section Four. Approving the Expenditure from the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance in the Amount of \$2,441,056 for the Thoreau Chapter Veterans Service Center construction.

- A. The Navajo Nation hereby approves the expenditure from the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance to the Thoreau Chapter Veterans Service Center, Business Unit Number 703039 for \$2,441,056.
- B. This supplemental appropriation of \$2,441,056 shall be to Business Unit Number 703039, as identified in Exhibit C, and from that amount of funds that exceeds the minimum fund balance of the UUFB.

Updated Undesignated Unreserved Fund Balance

The Office of Controller has updated the unaudited Undesignated Unreserved Fund Balance (UUFB) at \$6,824,260, as of March 28, 2017. Please see attached UUFB Schedule.

The appropriation in resolution CJA-02-17-Social Services for amount \$5,038,678 utilized the Minimum Fund Balance. After reviewing the Attorney General's Opinion [01-17], the Minimum Fund balance needs to be replenished to its required 10% of previous annual budget. Such required amount is \$17,265,400. Since the last report of UUFB on February 28, 2017 we performed additional analysis and revised our estimates, which had the following impact on UUFB:

- Increase UUFB for lower estimated adjustments from audit AJE's
- Increase UUFB for lower estimated expense to the Contingency Management Fund
- Decrease UUFB for the Permanent Fund set aside (CS-46-14)
- Decrease UUFB for additional capital projects

We believe our estimates to be prudent, reasonable, and conservative in nature and subject to the completion of the annual audit. The net impact of these changes resulted in UUFB of \$7,972,352. However, \$1,148,092 of UUFB was transferred to replenish the Minimum Fund Balance back up to the required 10%. Therefore, the UUFB balance is \$6,824,260 as of today.



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# **Project Data Form**

#### **Project Title:**

Thoreau Veterans Service Center - Construction

## **Projected Start Date:**

The project start date is contingent to the acquisition of construction funds. To date, the Thoreau Chapter Veterans Committee (TCVC) has received \$914,500, which represents 22.58% of the required project financing. All required site clearances have been received, the design and engineering functions have been completed, and the project is construction-ready.

## **Projected End Date:**

The construction phase is anticipated to have a 9-month completion schedule.

# **Impact Analysis**

## A. Explain the benefits to the Users or Recipients of Your Intended Project:

The construction of the Thoreau Veterans Service Center will establish a place for Veterans, active duty service personnel, and their families to receive assistance with many issues related to their military careers and the various challenges faced when assistance is required. The facility will provide critical links to services and benefit programs that can have a substantial positive impact on all that it will serve.

# B. How will this project impact the community as a whole?

Thoreau Navajo Community has a population of over 3,000 people with more than 1,200 registered to vote in Navajo Nation elections. As with many chapters, community facilities such as the Thoreau Veterans Service Center, provide a place for community members to congregate and strengthen the cultural and civic values shared by all members. By providing a venue for all community members to honor the sacrifices made by Veterans and their families, a stronger and more functional community can emerge.

# C. What impact will your Project have on the daily operations of the chapter, program, or agency?

The Thoreau Chapter Veterans Committee operates under the umbrella of the Thoreau Chapter. With the inception of the Veterans Service Center facility, coordination between the chapter officials and the Veterans Committee will continue as operational needs will dictate.

# D. How will the Benefits reduce or eliminate a deficiency or obstacle to progress?

The Thoreau Veterans Service Center will function to eliminate the lack of access to critical assistance services for Veterans, active duty personnel, and their families. By providing services in-house, and advocating for earned military-related benefits, the barriers to progress can be removed as more Veterans and their families more effectively utilize available assistance programs.

## E. What Plan or Policy, if any, will your Project help to implement?

The Thoreau Chapter Veterans Committee will establish and adopt a Facility Operations Plan for the new Veterans Service Center. The framework for the plan will address the operational requirements of the facility, the staffing requirements and responsibilities, and the regulatory controls as mandated by the terms of Navajo Nation procurement regulations, intergovernmental agreements, chapter resolutions, and mandates of the fiscal agent(s).

## F. What Economic return, if any, is expected from your Project?

The purpose of the proposed Veterans Service Center facility is not intended for financial gain. Any ancillary economic returns will be derived from a strengthened and empowered community as Veterans and their families enjoy a more secure and positive life.

## G. Will this Project create jobs? How many?

It is anticipated that the new facility will create several job opportunities. The facility will require administrative personnel to perform the daily operations and services. Additionally, several full-time maintenance/custodial and security positions will be required as well. As the aforementioned Facility Operations Plan is developed, the total number of required positions can be identified.

# H. Will this Project prevent job loss or reduction in business activities?

This project is anticipated to create jobs and stimulate local business activity within the Thoreau community.

1. Where and how much do you estimate to save on your annual operating cost(s) from your Project, e.g. utility expenses, maintenance expenses, costly repair or renovations, personnel time, work performance and salaries, others as applicable.

The project will not save any annual operating costs as the costs related to the operations of the new facility will increase from what is not currently in place.

## J. Is the Navajo Nation obligated to fund your Project?

Currently, the Navajo Nation is not formally obligated to fund the Project. The Project has received funding commitments from the State of New Mexico Capital Outlay Program, and the Thoreau Chapter. There have been project funding requests submitted to the Navajo Nation Tribal Council for legislative appropriations. Additionally, there have been funding requests submitted to the office of the Navajo Nation President for executive-level discretionary spending approval. These requests are currently being reviewed and their statuses are pending.

# Leveraging of Funds

A. How much funds (in dollars and percentage) does your project request or require from the Navajo Nation?

The total development cost for the construction of the facility is estimated to be \$4,050,000. To date, the Thoreau Chapter Veterans Committee has acquired \$914,500 in project funding. This represents 22.58% of the total development cost of the facility. The construction budget requires an additional \$3,135,500 or 77.42% of the total development cost.

B. What internal or external sources have been acquired or committed to date? Expected or planned sources without documented evidence are helpful but do not qualify.

To date, the project has received funding approvals that total \$914,500.

C. What efforts and sources have been researched, contacted and/or agreements entered into with, if any?

There have been project funding requests submitted to the Navajo Nation Tribal Council for legislative appropriations, and to the office of the Navajo Nation President for executive-level discretionary spending approval. These requests are currently being reviewed and their statuses are pending.

# **Feasibility Studies**

## A. Are feasibility studies completed and available for review?

This is a design-build project. The design and engineering functions have been completed and a construction budget and progress schedule have been established. These are all available for review.

## B. Who conducted your feasibility study and when?

The factors that determine feasibility were addressed throughout the design, engineering, and cost estimation/planning phase of the project. Cost controls were evaluated through the processes of plan review and value engineering. These evaluations were conducted throughout 2016 by R.S. Backlawski & Associates (Santa Fe) as the facility plans were developed.

## C. Is your project feasible and consistent with your funding request?

The Thoreau Veterans Service Center project has been identified as feasible. All land clearances have been obtained. Construction-ready designs and engineering have been completed. Total development cost and progress schedule estimates have been identified and are consistent with regional construction cost indexing and related contingencies.

# **Extenuating Circumstances**

# A. Please explain your situation(s) and the importance of necessary funding.

This project, from its inception, has been driven by the needs of Veterans, active duty military personnel, and their families to establish localized services that bridges the gap between available assistance benefits and the honorable men and women who have earned them. If unfunded, the systemic problems faced will proliferate and a continuing sense of hopelessness will resound. The importance of the project funding represents a signal that change is possible, and hope can and should persevere.

# B. What may happen if your Project is not funded?

From a logistical standpoint, a lack of construction funding will stall the Project. Cost estimates will become inaccurate as cost indexes change over time. Revised cost estimates and planning schedules will place an additional financial burden on the total development cost of the project. Essentially, all momentum for the project will halt, and the project will inevitably slide backwards from completion as finished work will need to be done again.

## Other Viable Alternatives Considered

A. If your project is not feasible, what option(s) is/are available?

This project has been determined to be feasible.

B. If your project cannot be immediately funded, what are your contingency plans?

If not immediately funded, the coordinated efforts of the Thoreau Chapter officials, Veterans Committee, and sponsoring New Mexico State Legislators will continue to petition and acquire legislative appropriations for the successful completion of this worthwhile project. This process is the most time-consuming and protractive methodology, yet it has produced results. Alternate funding sources will also be pursued by applying for Federal-level grant funding.

C. Has phase funding of your Project been considered?

This project is construction ready. The construction of the facility cannot be phased, as starting and stopping the project will increase the overall cost if the project is "rolled-up" and remobilized several times. It is also detrimental to the integrity of the facility if progress is stopped before the building is properly protected from environmental factors.

D. Can your Project be developed without funding?



The purpose of the Thoreau Veterans Service Center is to provide services to all members of the Navajo Nation, Eastern Agency-including all chapters and members there within.



# **Project Proposal**

# 1. Summary

The Thoreau Chapter Veterans Committee (TCVC), which supports 80 veteran chapter members and 80 active duty chapter members on deployment, has coordinated with many veterans' organizations and active service personnel, to address and provide the critical links between available services and those who have earned the benefits. The TCVC has identified a need for a regional Service Center facility that will serve Veterans, active service personnel, and their families from all areas of the Navajo Nation. The proposed facility will allow for the retention of full-time benefits specialists to advocate on Veterans' behalf to identify and apply for services at all levels of government. The facility will also accommodate medical professionals to provide in-house counseling, physical therapy, and transportation to and from the new Veterans Service Center. Coordination with the Thoreau Chapter has identified the site for the new facility within the Chapter compound. All land investigations and clearances have been obtained and the facility designs and engineering have been completed. A construction budget and progress schedule have been established and the project is construction ready.

#### 2. Introduction

Since 2014, the TCVC, along with the Thoreau Chapter has leveraged \$134,500 in matching funds to the acquisition of an additional \$780,000 in project funding from the State of New Mexico Capital Outlay program. The total amount obligated to the project to date is \$914,500. This represents 22.58% of the total development cost of the project. This project has received support from Tribal officials, New Mexico State Senators and legislators, chapter officials, and veterans' consortiums in the form of funding for the design, engineering, and coordination requirements. This grant request, if funded, will provide funds for the construction of the facility, and promote a continuation of the efforts of so many who are resolved to addressing the need for the critical services within the Navajo Nation.


# 3. Need for and Goals of the Project

Members of the armed services face many challenges throughout the honorable completion of their military careers, and often, these challenges resound following discharge. Veterans heroically sacrifice youth and longevity to be left with debilitating physical and psychological ailments. When coupled with socio-economic needs such as housing, education, post-service job training, employment, child care, and transportation, many Veterans can become overwhelmed, and battle a sense of hopelessness assimilating into civilian life. This feeling of hopelessness can lead to alcoholism, drug addiction, criminal activity, homelessness, domestic violence, child abuse/neglect and an overall diminishment of traditional values. Most veterans require some form of assistance to address the challenges they face. Various Federal, state, and tribal governments, along with private foundations, and local government-based veterans' organizations have established benefit programs to provide the necessary assistance most Veterans require. However, many Veterans remain disconnected from these vital services. The primary factors, generally, are an overall lack of understanding of the assistance programs and their related application processes. Additionally, Navajo Veterans are also faced with geographical and economic barriers that further exasperate their ability to acquire the necessary assistance. With over 9,000 veterans and active military personnel facing these challenges on the Navajo Nation, a critical need exists in every agency and every chapter.

The construction of the Thoreau Veterans Service Center will establish a place for Veterans, active duty service personnel, and their families to receive assistance with many issues related to their military careers and the various challenges faced when assistance is required. The facility will provide critical links to services and benefit programs that can have a substantial positive impact on all that it will serve.

## 4. Scope of Work

The Thoreau Chapter administrators and Thoreau Chapter Veterans Committee retained the services of R.S. Backlawski & Associates (Santa Fe) as the prime consultant for the preconstruction development of the facility. Utilizing design charrette input methodologies, the architectural design criteria was established and engineering disciplines (structural, electrical, mechanical, civil) were addressed and completed. Following this, cost estimates were established and the designs were evaluated through plan review and value engineering methods for thoroughness and cost effectiveness. As the project transitions into the construction phase, R.S. Backlawski & Associates will continue to function as the prime consultant for the construction firm that will be selected following acquisition of construction funds and subsequent public solicitation of the project. 


Figure 1: Specific location of the Dlo'ayazhi Veteran's Tract. Map is after U.S.G.S. quad: Thoreau, New Mexico 1963 PR 1980. DCD1 08-018.

Supporting Thoreau Chapter Veterans Committee and Thoreau Chapter Officials in their efforts to have McKinley County be the fiscal agent for the planning, designing, constructing, equipping and furnishing the Thoreau Veterans Service Center

#### WHEREAS:

- The Eastern Navajo Veterans Organization was established as an advocate for the thirty-one (31) Chapter Veterans Committee within the Eastern Navajo Agency of the Navajo Nation and is charged with the responsibilities of representing these Chapter Veterans Committee; and
- 2. In 1942 the Navajo Tribal Council passed a resolution to aid and defend the United States Government against all subversive and armed conflict. In 1952, the Navajo Tribal Council passed a resolution to support and assist the United States Selective Service Board to draft eligible Navajos to serve in the United States Armed Forces and to reaffirm allegiance to the United States and express patriotism; and
- 3. The Thoreau Chapter Veterans Committee was established and recognized by the membership of Thoreau Community. The purpose of TCVC is to assist, represent, advocate and promote the Navajo Veterans of this community to ensure that the benefits they rightfully earned are provided in areas of housing, medical services, education, employment and other benefits afforded all Veterans of the US Armed Forces; and
- 4. In Calendar Year 2014 TCVC members lobbied area state legislators and secured \$295,000 of Capital Outlay Funding to plan, design and construct a Veterans Service Center in the compounds of Thoreau Chapter. In Calendar Year TCVC members continued their lobbying efforts and again were able to secure an additional \$275,000 for this project and during the recent New Mexico State Legislative session six area state legislators gave an additional \$210,000 toward the Veterans Service Center for a combined total of \$780,000 of New Mexico State monies. Thoreau Chapter contributed \$134,500 as matching money and TCVC currently has \$914,500 for planning, designing, constructing, equipping and furnishing this center and continue to seek additional dollars from available resources for this project; and
- 5. In July 2015 TCVC and chapter officials gained approval from the McKinley County Commission for the county to be the fiscal agent for this project including waivers of the 5% administrative fee for administering these funds. On December 6, 2016 McKinley County Manager and McKinley County Commission Chairperson assured Navajo Nation Vice

President Jonathan Nez that once the facility is completed the key would be turned over to TCVC and the Navajo Nation would be the owner of the building; and

- 6. Although TCVC, Thoreau Chapter, McKinley County Commission, Area State Legislators, Navajo Nation President Russell Begaye and Vice President Jonathan Nez supports McKinley County to be the fiscal agent, Navajo Nation Department of Justice and employees of the Navajo Nation Design and Engineering Services continue to bottleneck this project with delays and bureaucracy. Three years have passed since the first appropriation and needed documents have not been properly processed through the Navajo Nation SAS system; and
- Needed services will be provided for Veterans from this facility when it is completed and to
  eliminate the continued delay because of Navajo Nation bureaucracy this project needs to be
  administered through McKinley County.

#### NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

The Eastern Navajo Veterans Organization hereby fully supports the efforts of Thoreau Chapter Veterans Committee and Thoreau Chapter Officials to have McKinley County be the fiscal agent for this very important project. Furthermore, The Eastern Navajo Veterans Organization respectfully requests appropriate standing committees of the Navajo Nation Council, Navajo Nation President Russell Begaye and Vice President Jonathan Nez to join TCVC in this effort and immediately process agreements between the Navajo Nation and McKinley County.

#### WHEREAS:

- The Thoreau Chapter Veterans Committee was established and recognized by the membership of Thoreau
  Community. The purpose of TCVC is to assist, represent, advocate and promote the Navajo Veterans of this
  community to ensure that the benefits they rightfully earned are provided in areas of housing, medical services,
  education, employment and other benefits afforded all Veterans of the Armed Forces of the United States; and
- As a result of lack of service providers and service center in this area for all Veterans, TCVC members took it
  upon themselves to get a Veterans Service Center in the compounds of Thoreau Chapter from where needed
  services can be provided as well as a place for Veterans to meet and discuss issues relating to their needs; and
- 3. TCVC members lobbied their state legislators in Fiscal Year 2014 and 2015 securing \$570,000 in those two fiscal years. TCVC continued lobbying in Fiscal Year 2016 and secured an additional \$210,000 for a total of \$780,000 New Mexico State Capital Outlay Funding. Thoreau Chapter contributed as matching funds \$134,500; and
- 4. Initially, TCVC requested that McKinley County be the fiscal agent but the state funds were filtered through the NM State Indian Affairs Department that involved the Navajo Nation. The reason TCVC made the request for the county to be the fiscal agent was to process documents in a timely manner so the service center can be realized in a more timely manner rather than the delays in processing documents through the Navajo Nation bureaucracy; and
- 5. TCVC and Thoreau Chapter officials met on a number of occasions with the Honorable President of the Navajo Nation Russell Begaye and Honorable Vice President Jonathan Nez who made commitments to TCVC that their request would be honored to have McKinley County be the fiscal agent and supported this effort by pledging Navajo Nation matching funds; and
- 6. TCVC has secured approval from the McKinley County Commission to be the fiscal agent for this project including waivers of the 5% administrative cost to handle these state appropriated capital outlay funds. In addition, McKinley County agrees to turn over the key to the TCVC/Navajo Nation once the center is completed and the Navajo Nation will own the service center; and
- 7. The Navajo Nation continues to delay processing documents resulting in no expenditure of these funds while Veterans continue to struggle to take advantage of their benefits they rightfully earned. When the service center becomes a reality, much needed services can be provided from the center.

#### NOW THEREFOR BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

The Thoreau Chapter Veterans Committee and the Thoreau Chapter Officials respectfully requests the Honorable Navajo Nation President Russell Begaye and the Honorable Navajo Nation Vice President Jonathan Nez to honor their commitment to TCVC they made on December 6, 2015 and March 6, 2016 to have McKinley County be the fiscal agent for this project and to keep their pledge to provide Navajo Nation matching funds to complete this project. "Requesting Navajo Nation President Russell Begaye to immediately act on an agreement between the Navajo Nation and McKinley County and authorize the county to be the fiscal agent for the Thoreau Chapter Veterans Center Project"

#### WHEREAS:

- The Thoreau Chapter Veterans Committee was established and recognized by the
  membership of Thoreau Chapter Community with the purpose to assist, represent, and
  promote the Veterans and ensure that the benefits they rightfully earned are provided in
  areas of housing, medical services, education, employment, and other benefits afforded all
  Veterans of the Armed Forces, and
- Veterans in this area have long been neglected from receiving benefits they rightfully earned due in most part because there are no service providers or facilities readily available for counseling, securing information on benefits, and adequate health care; and
- 3. Realizing this the members of the Thoreau Chapter Veterans Committee along with chapter officials lobbied the New Mexico State Legislators and secured \$295,000 in 2014 and 275,000 in 2015 to plan, design and construct a Veterans Service Center in the compounds of Thoreau Chapter. In addition the chapter membership approved \$134,000 of its capital improvement funds as matching funds. One acre of shovel ready land with existing utilities is available; and
- 4. To avoid unnecessary delays in starting and completing this project TCVC members with community support desires that McKinley County be the fiscal agent for this project. On July 7, 2015 the McKinley County Board of Commissioners approved the request from TCVC and agreed to be the fiscal agent; and
- 5. On August 27, 2015 TCVC members along with Thoreau Chapter Officials met with President Russell Begaye, Vice President Jonathan Nez and their staff to discuss this issue and at the conclusion of this meeting President Begaye instructed a member of his staff to get an agreement in place to reflect the request from TCVC; and
- 6. Currently no agreement is in place for the county or TCVC members to review and two years is upon us since the first funding was secured. The only word from the Office of the President is an email message to the county requesting for a meeting with all parties contacted leaving TCVC members out of this meeting; and
- 7. This is the bureaucracy that TCVC and Thoreau Chapter Officials were concerned about and with this type of delays it is evidence enough for an agreement to be finalized between the

Navajo Nation and McKinley County under policies and procedures of McKinley County. TCVC and Chapter Officials strongly believe that they will have this center completed sooner if they are allowed to work with McKinley County.

- Currently there are no services immediately available in the area for many of our men and women who have served their country resulting in lack of services for various issues relating to health, education, employment, and other problems associated with their service to their country; and
- 5. There is a tremendous need to have a facility where our Veterans can congregate to address these various challenges and to be provided services by certified Veterans Benefit Specialists and Counselors specialized in addressing Post Traumatic Stress Disorders for those who have seen the horrors of war. In addition many of our Navajo men and women will soon leave the service and come home, needing their fellow Veterans and this facility to be provided the needed services; and
- 6. The planning, designing and construction of this Veterans Service Center is a priority for all Veterans of this area without lengthy delays; and
- 7. The Thoreau Veterans Committee membership feel that having the McKinley County Government as the fiscal agent for expending the \$295,000 of capital outlay funds would insure that this facility be realized in a timely manner so services to our brave men and women who sacrificed much can be provided.

Resolution of the Thoreau Chapter Veterans Committee – "Requesting the Navajo Nation Capital Improvement Office to work closely with the Thoreau Chapter Veterans Committee to expend the New Mexico Capital Outlay Funds for planning, designing and constructing a Veterans Service Center in the compounds of Thoreau Chapter."

# NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

The Thoreau Chapter Veterans Committee respectfully requests Mr. Casey Begay, Director of the Navajo Nation Capital Improvement Office to work with all appropriate entities of the McKinley County Government, the New Mexico State Indian Affairs Department and the Thoreau Chapter Veterans Committee and select the McKinley County Government to be the fiscal agent for the \$295,000 capital outlay funds appropriated by the New Mexico State Legislators for planning, designing and constructing a Veterans Service Center. The Thoreau Chapter Veteran Committee further requests Mr. Casey Begay to continue his support for all Veterans and to make all necessary efforts to complete this project in a timely manner.



Legislation #0130-17 - Approving an Expenditure from the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund (UUFB) Balance in the Amount of Three Million One Hundred Thirty-Five Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,135,500) for

Thoreau Chapter Veterans Service Center Construction.

The Office of Management & Budget (OMB) reviewed the above proposed document and provides the following:

1. The balance available in the UUFB as of April 17, 2017 was \$6,824,260, but has been reduced by (1) appropriation in the amount of \$239,200 revising the UUFB balance to \$6,585,060.

2. All supplemental funding requests for the Executive Branch require approval from the Office of the President and Vice-President (a copy of the executive Order #02-2011 dated

10/24/2011 is attached).

3. The Budget Forms submitted need corrections to the business unit number. It should indicate "New" instead of using a Fiduciary business unit from the Veterans Trust fund. The use of the UUFB per the proposed resolution is a general fund amount. Funds should not be co-mingled (general funds and fiduciary funds).

The Fiscal Year 2017 Budget Instructions Manual (BIM) Section XIV, Supplemental Funding Request Policies and Procedures, and Section VII, Project Budgeting and Account Set up, explain the requirements for funding. Missing from the proposed legislation are the Supplemental Funding Proposal Summary (Appendix K) and Project Budget forms

(Appendix J).

5. How will the funds be processed? Will it be a direct disbursement to Thoreau Chapter? If so, the budget should be supported through the Division of Community Development not the Navajo Nation Veterans Administration (NNVA). Would the building belong to the

NNVA or Thoreau Chapter?

6. Because of the limited availability of funds, prioritization of all supplemental funding proposals are required pursuant to the FY 2017 budget resolution CS-49-16 (paragraph 'M'), the FY 2017 Budget Instructions Manual (Section XIV), and the Appropriations Act. This activity should be completed by the three branches to determine priorities, but to date this has not been done.



- 7. The 5-Year Capital Plan resolution was rescinded recently. It had 132 projects in the amount of \$295,669,676. A plan is required by the Appropriations Act, 12 N.N.C. Section 810 E, F, G, 820 I. and 860, for capital projects.
- 8. Other fund sources could be considered, such as the Sihasiin Fund and Capital Outlay Match Fund.
- 9. During the Spring Session, the Navajo Nation Council decided to defer all UUFB supplementals until the FY 2018 revenue projection is made clear due to a possible budget shortfall. Funds may be needed for the overall FY 2018 budget.
