SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

- A. The Law and Order Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council. 2 N.N.C. § 600(A).
- B. The Law and Order Committee is the oversight committee for the Navajo Nation Labor Commission. 2 N.N.C. § 601(C)(1).
- C. The Naabik'iyáti' Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council. Among other duties and responsibilities, the committee confirms those appointments to the Labor Commission made by the President of the Navajo Nation. 15 N.N.C. § 303(A).

SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

- A. The Navajo Nation Labor Commission is established to "hear and adjudicate cases as the quasi-judicial hearing body under the Navajo Preference in Employment Act." 15 N.N.C. §302(A).

- 1 B. The membership of the Labor Commission consists of five members. 15 N.N.C.
2 § 303(A). All five members must be licensed by the Navajo Nation Bar
3 Association. 15 N.N.C. § 303(B)(2). Of the five, two members must be state
4 licensed attorneys, in Arizona, New Mexico or Utah. 15 N.N.C. § 303(B)(3).
- 5 C. Two of the members of the Labor Commission are appointed by the Health,
6 Education and Human Services Committee. 15 N.N.C. § 303(A). Three
7 members are appointed by the President of the Navajo Nation, with concurrence
8 of the Naabik'iyátí Committee of the Navajo Nation Council. 15 N.N.C. §
9 303(A).
- 10 D. Navajo Nation President Jonathan Nez has appointed Mr. Casey Watchman. Mr.
11 Watchman is a licensed member of the Navajo Nation Bar Association, and
12 pursuant to 15 N.N.C. § 303(B), is familiar with Navajo Nation labor practices,
13 human resources and employment. See Exhibit "A," appointment letter and
14 application.

15 16 **SECTION THREE. APPOINTMENT CONFIRMATION**

17 The Naabik'iyátí Committee hereby confirms the appointment of Mr. Casey
18 Watchman to the Navajo Nation Labor Commission. Mr. Watchman, pursuant to 15
19 N.N.C. § 303(D), shall serve a 4-year term.

I am seeking to be re-appointed to the renovated Navajo Nation Labor Commission, a body on which I sat on since I was first appointed in October, 1997. I was first appointed by President Albert Hale, and have been reappointed by all successor Navajo Nation presidents, with the exception of President Russell Begaye. My appointment officially expired this past September 31, 2018 after the Navajo Nation Council amended the plan of operation of the Commission, by requiring that all members be members in good standing with the Navajo Nation Bar Association. I am attaching my most current resume.

I have been in the legal field that spans some 38 years, first taking and passing the NNBA bar in November, 1980, and remain a member in good standing to date. Much of my career has been in engagement of a private law practice. Over these ensuing decades of practice, I have represented literally hundreds of Navajo citizens in all fields of practice: Civil, Criminal, Administrative, and a few personal injury cases.

I am very much interested in continuing my service with the Navajo Nation Labor Commission. In that regard, I respectfully seek your blessing, and ask that my letter of interest to return to the Navajo Nation Labor Commission be accepted.

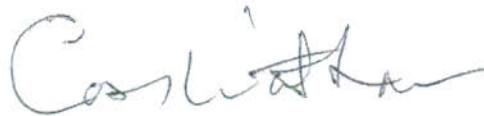
My service to the Commission has been eventful to say the least. We have seen Navajo law on employment evolve like never before, and it faces great challenges on jurisdiction from internal entities. The Navajo Nation preference law is what it is, because it was passed by the Navajo Nation Council during a time of immense employment strife back in the early 1980's. I

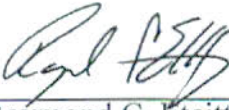

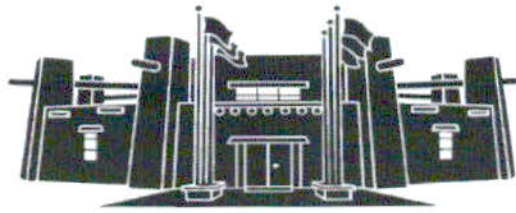
