# RESOLUTION OF THE NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE OF THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL

23rd NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL -- Second Year, 2016

### AN ACTION

RELATING TO LAW AND ORDER, BUDGET AND FINANCE AND NAABIK'ÍYÁTI'; APPROVING THE NAVAJO DIVISION OF PUBLIC SAFETY, FISCAL YEAR 2015 TRIBAL HOMELAND SECURITY GRANT PROGRAM, GRANT AWARD IN THE AMOUNT OF \$1,764,852, WAIVING THE INDIRECT COST RATE AND ACCEPTING THE MANAGEMENT AND ADMINISTRATION FUNDING

### BE IT ENACTED:

### SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

- A. The Law and Order Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council and is empowered to grant final approval for agreements negotiated by public safety programs with other federal agencies subject to Naabik'íyáti' Committee approval when required by law. See 2 N.N.C. §§ 600 (A) and 601 (B)(1)(a).
- B. The Budget and Finance Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council and is empowered to authorize, review, approve and accept agreements, including contracts and grants, between the Navajo Nation and any federal, state or regional authority upon the recommendation of the standing committee which has oversight of the division, department or program which has applied for the agreement, or upon recommendation of the Chapter." See 2 N.N.C. §§ 300 (A) and 301 (B) (15).
- C. The Naabik'íyáti' Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council and among other statutory powers, the committee has the delegated responsibility to "review and continually monitor the programs and activities of federal and state departments and to assist development of such programs designed to serve the Navajo People and the Navajo Nation through intergovernmental relationships between the Navajo Nation and such departments." See 2 N.N.C. §§ 700 (A) and 701 (A) (7).

- D. Regarding grants, the Naabik'íyáti' Committee negotiates indirect cost rates; and, it is authorized to waive such costs. See 2 N.N.C. § 701 (A) (10).
- E. The Naabik'íyáti' Committee of the Navajo Nation Council reviews and approves "the negotiation and setting of the Navajo Nation's indirect cost or administrative cost rate agreements with the cognizant federal agent." 2 N.N.C. §701(A)(10).
- F. The Naabik'íyáti' Committee may waive such costs when it determines it is in the best interests of the Navajo Nation and when the "division, department or program requesting the waiver demonstrates a statutory and/or regulatory requirement that limits the indirect cost or administrative cost rate available for a particular grant or contract, or . . [t]here is a showing of necessity and a commitment of available general funds by the division, department or program requesting the waiver which is available to offset the loss in indirect costs or administrative costs." 2 N.N.C. §701(A)(10)(a) and (b).

### SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

- A. The Navajo Division of Public Safety (NDPS) applied for the Fiscal Year 2015 Tribal Homeland Security Grant Program (THSGP) and was approved for grant funding in the amount of \$1,764,852.00, from the United States Department of Homeland Security (USDHS), attached hereto as **Exhibit A** (Award Letter and Agreement Articles).
- B. The NDPS will be using the grant awarded funds to implement an advanced 9-1-1 system across the Navajo Nation. See **Exhibit B** (Memorandum from Michelle Tom, Undated).
- C. This will include the purchase of equipment (hardware and software), consultants to assist with the project, travel and training expenses for Public Safety Telecommunications Operators. Id.
- D. The Navajo Nation faces unique challenges in implementing the advanced 9-1-1 systems, for instance: the large geographical land base, lack of rural addressing and antiquated 9-1-1 communication collectively present

overwhelming challenges for the Navajo People. See Exhibit C (THSGP Investment Justification).

- E. The Navajo Nation does not receive funding from the 9-1-1 Universal Service Fund Fee. *Id*.
- F. The NDPS Tiger Team project goal is to deliver significant public safety benefits by establishing state-of-the-art operational and infrastructure improvements across the Navajo Nation and data resulting from the Tiger Team project indicates that: (1) approximately 200,000 people reside on the Navajo Nation; (2) Land mass is 27,425 square miles; (3) there is no existing 9-1-1 framework on the Navajo Nation; (4) sixty percent (60%) of homes do not have landlines; and (5) only fifty-three percent (53%) of the Navajo Nation has wireless coverage. Id. at 2.
- G. The NDPS is proposing a gradual consolidation from seven (7) inadequate centers to one state-of-the-art facility; based on the estimated annual call volume, between 1.1 and 1.5 million, a single Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs) center staffed with five (5) dispatchers could be handled effectively from one center for the entire Navajo Nation. Id. at 2.
- H. A single PSAPs funded by the THSGP would ensure: (1) significant improvement of call response times; (2) large cost efficiencies in deployment of new 9-1-1 capability, network and facilities; and (3) consistency in operational training, processes, and procedures for the new 9-1-1 system. Id. at 2 and 4.
- I. The NDPS requested the grant award to include an indirect cost rate at 17.18%, subsequently USDHS denied the request and the NDPS filed an appeal, no denial letter was presented. See Exhibit B.
- J. The THSGP includes a five percent (5%) Management and Administration funding in the amount of \$88,243. For these reasons, the NDPS requests a waiver of the Indirect Costs with regard to this grant award. See Exhibit C at 5.
- K. The Office of Management and Budget, attached hereto as Exhibit D, lists the following concerns:

- 1. The document in regards to Notice of Award in the amount of \$1,764,852.00 for the Project Period Performance 09/01/2015 through 08/31/2018. CGS is unaware if an application was submitted on this and such did not go through the 164 Executive Review process based on, 2 N.N.C. § 164, review requirements.
- 2. It appears Indirect Cost (IDC) rate 17.18% was not calculated correctly in NN OMB-BF1-4 (See attached Calculation Check on Budget for IDC Recovery Pursuant to Formula at Appendix Q Section 1.e., of FY 2016 NN BIM).
- L. The Navajo Division of Public Safety requests approval of the Fiscal Year 2015 Tribal Homeland Security Grant Program award in the amount of \$1,764,852.00 from the United States Department of Homeland Security; approve a request for the 17.18% indirect cost waiver; and to accept the five percent (5%) Management and Administration funding included in the grant.

### SECTION THREE. APPROVE GRANT AWARD AND INDIRECT COST WAIVER

The Navajo Nation hereby approves the Navajo Division of Public Safety, Fiscal Year 2015 Tribal Homeland Security Grant Program award in the amount of \$1,764,852.00 from the United States Department of Homeland Security; approve a request for the 17.18% indirect cost waiver; and to accept the five percent (5%) Management and Administration funding included in the grant.



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### Article I - Summary Description of Award

THSGP is one tool among a comprehensive set of initiatives authorized by Congress and implemented by the Administration to help strengthen the Nation against risks associated with potential terrorist attacks. Funding under THSGP is provided to strengthen Tribes' capacity to prepare for and respond to emergency situations. The FY 2015 THSGP plays an important role in the implementation of the National Preparedness System (NPS) by supporting the building, sustainment, and delivery of core capabilities essential to achieving the National Preparedness Goal of a secure and resilient Nation. The FY 2015 THSGP's statutorily allowable costs support efforts to build and sustain core capabilities across the Prevention, Protection, Mitigation, Response, and Recovery mission areas. Through this award, the Navajo Nation DEM shall use grant funding in the amount of \$1,764,852.00 for costs related to building capabilities at the Tribal levels through planning, organization, equipment, training, and exercise activities. Funding under the FY 2015 THSGP supports the following approved investments: Navajo Nation DEM, AZ - Next Generation (NG) Emergency 9-1-1 Project, \$1,764,852.00

### Article II - Environmental Planning and Historic Preservation (EHP) Compliance Hold

A program hold is placed on INVESTMENT #1 Infrastructure Build Out PRoject, 911 Routing Expoansion, and 911 System Expansion, and the recipient is prohibited from obligating, expending, or drawing down Tribal Homeland Security Grant Program (THSGP) funds in the amount of \$886,252.00 in support of INVESTMENT #1 Infrastructure Build Out PRoject, 911 Routing Expoansion, and 911 System Expansion, with a limited exception for any approved costs associated with

the preparation, conduct, and completion of required environmental planning and historic preservation (EHP) reviews, as discussed in FEMA Information Bulletin No. 404. In order to release this hold, the recipient is required to obtain the required DHS/FEMA EHP compliance approval for this project pursuant to the FY 2015 THSGP Notice of Funding Opportunity. Please contact your DHS/FEMA GPD Headquarters Program Analyst to receive specific guidance regarding EHP compliance.

### Article III - Acknowledgement of Federal Funding from DHS

All recipients must acknowledge their use of federal funding when issuing statements, press releases, requests for proposals, bid invitations, and other documents describing projects or programs funded in whole or in part with Federal funds.

### Article IV - Activities Conducted Abroad

All recipients must ensure that project activities carried on outside the United States are coordinated as necessary with appropriate government authorities and that appropriate licenses, permits, or approvals are obtained.

### Article V - Age Discrimination Act of 1975

All recipients must comply with the requirements of the *Age Discrimination Act of 1975* (42 U.S.C. § 6101 et seq.), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of age in any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance.

- ii. By the end of the month following the month in which this award is made, and annually thereafter.
- c. Reporting of Total Compensation of Subrecipient Executives.
- 1. Applicability and what to report. Unless you are exempt as provided in paragraph d. of this award term, for each first-tier subrecipient under this award, you shall report the names and total compensation of each of the subrecipient's five most highly compensated executives for the subrecipient's preceding completed fiscal year, if—

### d. Exemptions

- iii. A domestic or foreign nonprofit organization;
- iv. A domestic or foreign for-profit organization;
- v. A Federal agency, but only as a subrecipient under an award or subaward to a non-Federal entity.
- 2. Executive means officers, managing partners, or any other employees in management positions.
- 3. Subaward:
- i. This term means a legal instrument to provide support for the performance of any portion of the substantive project or program for which you received this award and that you as the recipient award to an eligible subrecipient.
- ii. The term does not include your procurement of property and services needed to carry out the project or program (for further explanation, see Sec. \_\_\_ .210 of the attachment to OMB Circular A-133, "Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations").
- iii. A subaward may be provided through any legal agreement, including an agreement that you or a subrecipient considers a contract.
- 4. Subrecipient means an entity that:
- i. Receives a subaward from you (the recipient) under this award; and
- ii. Is accountable to you for the use of the Federal funds provided by the subaward.
- 5. Total compensation means the cash and noncash dollar value earned by the executive during the recipient's or subrecipient's preceding fiscal year and includes the following (for more information see 17 CFR 229.402(c)(2)):
- i. Salary and bonus.
- ii. Awards of stock, stock options, and stock appreciation rights. Use the dollar amount recognized for financial statement reporting purposes with respect to the fiscal year in accordance with the Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 123 (Revised 2004) (FAS 123R), Shared Based Payments.
- iii. Earnings for services under non-equity incentive plans. This does not include group life, health, hospitalization or medical reimbursement plans that do not discriminate in favor of executives, and are available generally to all salaried employees.
- iv. Change in pension value. This is the change in present value of defined benefit and actuarial pension plans.
- v. Above-market earnings on deferred compensation which is not tax-qualified.
- vi. Other compensation, if the aggregate value of all such other compensation (e.g. severance, termination payments, value of life insurance paid on behalf of the employee, perquisites or property) for the executive exceeds \$10,000.

### Article XVII - False Claims Act and Program Fraud Civil Remedies

All recipients must comply with the requirements of <u>31 U.S.C.</u> § <u>3729</u> which set forth that no recipient of federal payments shall submit a false claim for payment. See also <u>38 U.S.C.</u> § <u>3801-3812</u> which details the administrative remedies for false claims and statements made.

### Article XVIII - Federal Debt Status

All recipients are required to be non-delinquent in their repayment of any Federal debt. Examples of relevant debt include delinquent payroll and other taxes, audit disallowances, and benefit overpayments. See <u>OMB Circular A-129</u> and form SF-424B, item number 17 for additional information and guidance.

### Article XIX - Fly America Act of 1974

All recipients must comply with Preference for U.S. Flag Air Carriers: (air carriers holding certificates under 49 U.S.C. § 41102) for international air transportation of people and property to the extent that such service is available, in accordance with the *International Air Transportation Fair Competitive Practices Act of 1974* (49 U.S.C. § 40118) and the interpretative guidelines

issued by the Comptroller General of the United States in the March 31, 1981, <u>amendment</u> to Comptroller General Decision B-138942.

### Article XX - Hotel and Motel Fire Safety Act of 1990

In accordance with Section 6 of the *Hotel and Motel Fire Safety Act of 1990*, <u>15 U.S.C. §2225a</u>, all recipients must ensure that all conference, meeting, convention, or training space funded in whole or in part with Federal funds complies with the fire prevention and control guidelines of the *Federal Fire Prevention and Control Act of 1974*, as amended, <u>15 U.S.C. §2225</u>.

### Article XXI - Limited English Proficiency (Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title VI)

All recipients must comply with the *Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964* (Title VI) prohibition against discrimination on the basis of national origin, which requires that recipients of federal financial assistance take reasonable steps to provide meaningful access to persons with limited English proficiency (LEP) to their programs and services. Providing meaningful access for persons with LEP may entail providing language assistance services, including oral interpretation and written translation. In order to facilitate compliance with Title VI, recipients are encouraged to consider the need for language services for LEP persons served or encountered in developing program budgets. Next Generation (NG) Emergency 9-1-1 Project

Consisting of 27,425 square miles in the states of Arizona, New Mexico, and Utah, the Navajo Nation (NN) geographically, is the largest Native American reservation in the U.S. There are approximately 200,000 residents that live on the reservation. The NN offers hikers numerous isolated trails and routes attracting many non-Navajo visitors. Additionally, special events like the annual Fair attracts hundreds of thousands of visitors.

The NN is also plagued with natural disasters like flash flooding and mud issues caused by snow. As recent as March 2015, an emergency declaration was issued due to 42 areas severely affected by mud from snowfall. In September 2013, more than 40 communities were affected by flash flooding caused by heavy rains.

In the U.S., citizens take for granted that in the event of a natural hazard or act of terronsm, a citizen's first action will be a call to 9-1-1. From that call, first responders will respond to the aid of the citizen. However, within the NN, basic 9-1-1 capabilities barely exist. Many calls to 9-1-1 onginating on the NN are routed first to neighboring county Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs). Counties cannot dispatch first responders to the NN, so calls are either transferred to the NN public safety centers or caller information is verbally relayed to Navajo dispatch by a county dispatcher. In this environment there is no automatic caller location (address or x/y coordinate for a wireless call) provided to the Navajo dispatcher. If the caller is unfamiliar with the area, then the ability for a first responder to find the caller is diminished. A visiting hiker on an isolated trail dialing 9-1-1 will likely wait several hours or longer for responders to locate them. Rural addressing exits in only a very small percentage of the NN. Many roads to residential areas are upaved. First responder dispatch centers rely on the caller to provide details on their location. If the caller is familiar with the area or injured, then the caller may not be able to provide details on their location.

The NN faces challenges that are unlike any other area in the U.S. for implementing advanced 9-1-1 systems. The large geography, lack of rural addressing, and antiquated 9-1-1 communication collectively present overwhelming challenges for the Navajo people. Further, the NN receives no funding from the 9-1-1 Universal Service Fund Fee.

The current Navajo Division of Public Safety (NDPS) Tiger Team project goal is to deliver significant public safety benefits by establishing state-of-the-art operational and infrastructure improvements across the NN. With regard to the THSGP grant justification, one critical ongoing Tiger Team project provides the initial research and planning for future hardware and infrastructure implementation of the NG 9-1-1 system prior to application of FY2015 THSGP funds.

Data resulting from this project indicates that:

- 1. Approximately 200,000 people reside on the NN reservation
- 2. Land mass is 27,425 sq. mi.
- 3. There is no exisitng 9-1-1 framework on the
- 4. 60% of homes do not have landlines
- 5. Only 53% of the NN has wireless coverage

Currently there are 7 PSAP centers across the NN responsible for 9-1-1 calls. In the past, funding to support network, systems, and staff for 7 centers has been insufficient. The NDPS is proposing a gradual consolidation from 7 inadequate centers to one state-of-the-art facility. Based on the estimated annual call volume (1.1 - 1.5 million), a single PSAP staffed with 5 call takers could efficiently and effectively handle the entire NN. A single PSAP funded by this grant would ensure:

- 1. Significant improvement of call response times
- 2. Large cost efficiencies in deployment of new 9-1-1 capability, network, and facilities
- 3. Consistency in operational training, processes, and procedures for the 9-1-1 system

II.B. Investment Focus

Building New Capabilities

II.C. Provide a description of this Investment, including the planning, organization, equipment, training, and/or exercises that will be involved. (1,500 character max)

Planning began in April 2014 by the NDPS. A Tiger Team comprised of 5 core NDPS employees and an industry expert consutant from TechSource, Inc. was established to begin efforts to bring NG 9-1-1 to the NN. The initial goals of the Tiger Team were:

- 1. Evaluating existing 9-1-1 capabilties & services
- 2. Producing a planning & implementing guideline 9-1-1 Service Plan
- 3. Engaging industry experts to provide technical advisors
- 4. Laying the foundation for testing and deployment

Extended members of the team include more than 20 telecommunications providers who currently provide landline and wireless services across the NN. A key planning phase element is to evaluate consolidating the 7 Police Districts' PSAP dispatch centers to a single center within the NN. This is expected to yield improvement in resource utilization, call answer times, and response times.

Equipment: The 4 main areas of technology for 9-1-1 are: (1) Emergency Trunks & Call Communications, (2) 9-1-1 Call Answer Equipment (enabling caller ID location services), (3) Emergency Responder Dispatch Systems, and (4) Radio Communications. These are critical requirements to enable effective emergency response.

Training: NN will institute the same training guidelines and certifications as are required for U.S. county PSAPs.

Exercises: Exercises and table-top and active drills will be part of NDPS strandard operating procedures.

III.A. Identify the goals and objectives that will be supported by this Investment. (1,500 character max)

The NG 9-1-1 project would support the NN's ability to effectively respond to its citizens in emergency situations. This project would appreciably enhance the NN's emergency response "capabilities neccessary to save lives, protect property, and the environment, and meet basic human needs after an incident has occured," as stated in the National Preparedness Goal.

This investment would also directly support the core capability of operational communications capability and ensure it has the capacity for timely communications in support of security, situational awareness, and operations among and between affected communities across the reservation in the event of a natural hazard or act of terrorism. This investment will enhance the capabilities of the NN's emergency response personnnel, including police, fire, and emergency medical services by routing 9-1-1 emergency calls to the Shiprock, NM PSAP.

By centralizing all emergency calls across the NN, this investment will enable improved 9-1-1 call processing times and service levels, allow energency personnel to better locate callers, and generate consistency in operational processes and procedures from 9-1-1 call processing. This investment will dramatically improve the NN's overall ability to respond to the threats and hazards that pose the greatest risk.

III.B. Describe existing capability levels that address the identified goals/objectives and what will be in place to support the Investment prior to the use of FY 2015 funds. (1,500 character max)

The NDPS has secured funding to purchase a 9-1-1 Call Tracking System (CTS) and a Computer-Aided Dispatch (CAD) system. The 9-1-1 CTS will enable 9-1-1 trunks to be installed at the Shiprock PSAP to receive 9-1-1 calls within the Shiprock district. Along with the call, the caller's telephone number will be provided. The CAD system will enable first responders to be dispatched efficiently to the incident. The two systems will be integrated to enable caller information to automatically flow to the CAD system. Currently this capability is limited to only one of the seven PSAPs.

III.C. Explain the capability gap(s) that this Investment is intended to address. (1,500 character max)

There are three critical functions required for successful emergency response across the entire NN: (1) ability to locate the caller, (2) ability to dispatch the first responder, and (3) ability to communicate via radio. The investment project would address key capability gaps:

- 1. Develop a database for 9-1-1 call location validation. The challenge is that traditional master street address guide structure will not work in this deployment due to the non-existence of standard rural addressing. A GIS database will need to be developed to enable wireline telphone numbers to be linked to a latitude and longitude coordinate to enable caller location validation.
- 2. Leverage GIS mapping to display the incident location on the map to enable efficient dispatch for the first responder.
- 3. Support the deployment of services across the entire NN. This means consolidation or integration of the other six PSAPs.
- 4. Provide radio interoperability across the NN. This would allow for any 9-1-1 call to be answered at any PSAP and be dispatched to the correct first responder. There are signal gaps within several valley areas that need to be corrected with newer technology.
- 5. Provide a broadband network connectiong all seven emergency response districts. Currently an approximately two-mile gap exists in delivering this capability.



The Navajo Nation Department of Justice ("NNDOJ") has reviewed the above referenced DHS grant award. NNDOJ will surname the document but it points out the indirect cost ("IDC") issue to the Navajo Division of Public Safety ("NDPS").

The two NDPS memos—both undated—are contradictory on IDC. One memo says that IDC was not requested in the initial application, but the other memo states "In the Initial application packet, program did request for IDC."

NNDOJ reminds NDPS that "waiver" is for situations where the funding source does not allow it. Here, NDPS does not state the reason DHS gave for denying IDC for this grant. Therefore, if DHS does not allow IDC, NDPS could request a waiver. But if DHS denied IDC for a procedural or other reason, then NNDOJ will leave it to NDPS to resolve the IDC issue.
