RESOLUTION OF THE RESOURCES AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE Of the 23rd Navajo Nation Council---First Year 2015

AN ACTION

RELATING TO RESOURCES AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE; CONFIRMING
THE REAPPOINTMENT OF JACKSON SLIM BROSSY TO SERVE ON THE
NAVAJO TRIBAL UTILITY AUTHORITY MANAGEMENT BOARD OF
DIRECTORS FOR A TERM EXPIRING IN OCTOBER 2017 AND
CONFIRMING IS INTERIM TERM OF OFFICE

BE IT ENACTED:

Section One. Findings

- A. The Resources and Development Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council with authority to grant final confirmation of appointments to enterprise boards. 2 N.N.C. § 501(B)(9).
- B. The Navajo Tribal Utility Authority (hereinafter NTUA) is an enterprise of the Navajo Nation established pursuant to 21 N.N.C. § 2.
- C. NTUA's purpose is to operate, maintain and promote existing utility systems furnishing electric, gas, water, sewer utility services, generation, and telecommunications and information services for the benefit of residents of the Navajo Nation on a non-profit basis at a reasonable cost to residents of the Navajo Nation consistent with the economical operation of the Enterprise. 21 N.N.C. §§ 5(A)(1-6).
- D. The NTUA Management Board is delegated the authority and responsibility for the management and operation of the Enterprise as well as other powers and duties. 21

- N.N.C. § 7(A)(1); see also 21 N.N.C. § 7(A)(2-13); 21 N.N.C. §§ 7(B)(1-13); 21 N.N.C. § 7(C).
- E. Pursuant to 21 N.N.C. § 9(A), the NTUA Management Board shall consist of seven people appointed by the Government Services Committee of the Navajo Nation Council which is now the Naabik'íyáti' Committee whose authority to confirm appointments to enterprise boards has since been delegated to the Resources and Development Committee. 2 N.N.C. § 501(B)(9); see also CO-45-12.
- F. The NTUA plan of operation provides for the reappointment of its Management Board of Directors. $21 \text{ N.N.C.} \S 9(C)(1)$.
- G. Mr. Jackson Slim Brossy was previously selected by the Resources and Development Committee to be appointed to the NTUA Management Board on July 11, 2012 with his term expiring in October 2014.

 Resources and Development Resolution RDCJY-117-12 attached as Exhibit "A".
- H. The NTUA Management Board of Directors believe "[i]n view of the complexities of the utility industry and the challenges facing NTUA and to maintain continuity of experience and leadership on the Board, it is important to the Board that Mr. Jackson Slim Brossy be reappointed." NTUA—32-14 attached as Exhibit "B".
- I. Pursuant to 21 N.N.C. § 9(B)(1), four of the directors shall be members of the Navajo Nation who speak English with fluency and who have sufficient education and

- experience to qualify them for learning utility business practices and procedures and making sound judgments.
- J. to 21 N.N.C. § 9(B)(2), four of the directors shall be persons having not less than 10 vears of experience in business management substantial character and at least two of such persons shall have had such experience in management and operation of a utility business. See Jackson Slim Brossy's Letter of Interest and Résumé attached as Exhibit "C".
- K. The NTUA Management Board of Directors strongly recommends the Resources and Development Committee reappoint Jackson Slim Brossy to the NTUA Management Board of Directors for a term commencing from the October 2014 annual meeting and recognizing his interim term. NTUA Management Board Resolution NTUA-32-14 attached as Exhibit "B".
- L. Mr. Brossy has been acting as a director in the interim from the end of his appointment in October 2014 until present. Pursuant to 21 N.N.C. § 9(C)(3), vacancies in the Management Board may be filled for the unexpired term of the vacant office. Therefore, the reappointment would be for a period of three (3) years and the term would expire with the annual board meeting in October 2017 pursuant to 21 N.N.C. § 9(C)(2).

Section Two. Approval of Appointment

The Navajo Nation Council's Resources and Development Committee finds that Mr. Jackson Slim Brossy meets the qualifications for NTUA's Management Board of Directors as set


forth in 21 N.N.C. §§ 9(B)(1-2), and hereby confirms the reappointment of Mr. Jackson Slim Brossy to serve on the Navajo Tribal Utility Authority's Management Board of Directors for a term of three (3) years, with the term expiring at the annual board meeting in October 2017 pursuant to 21 N.N.C. §§ 9(C)(2-3) and further confirms his interim term of office.



- 1. The Management Board ("Board") of the Navajo Tribal Utility Authority ("NTUA" or "Authority") has been advised that the term of Jackson Slim Brossy will expire in October 2014; and
- 2. The Plan of Operation for the NTUA, at 21 NNC § 9, provides that the Board shall consist of seven (7) persons serving staggered 3-year terms; and
- 3. The Plan of Operation provides for the reappointment of members and Mr. Jackson Slim Brossy was previously selected by the Resources and Development Committee for his qualifications to be appointed to the NTUA Board; and
- 4. In view of the complexities of the utility industry and the challenges facing NTUA and to maintain continuity of experience and leadership on the Board, it is important to the Board that Mr. Jackson Slim Brossy be reappointed.

I am writing to apply for re-appointment to my current position with the NTUA Management Board. Since my initial appointment I have gained significant and valuable knowledge of the utility industry and NTUA operations in particular. Therefore I believe I am now better qualified and will be an even more effective board member. I will build upon this knowledge gained since my appointment and help continue to grow an already strong and resilient Navajo Nation enterprise. As a management consultant with several years of experience in Native American economic development initiatives, I believe that NTUA is an unsung yet very important leader in building Native economies. I hope to continue to advise and oversee management for this important Diné Nation enterprise – one that has proved reliable since 1959 and currently employs more than 600 Diné people.

I have several years experience as a management consultant focused primarily on financial advisory work on behalf of Native American tribal governments and tribally-owned enterprises. I believe this work background has and will continue to prove helpful to the management board decisions. I have worked on engagements on behalf of several tribal governments, half a dozen tribally-owned enterprises, and two large national Native American advocacy organizations. I have significant experience conducting financial deal due diligence, strategic planning, individual business optimization and accounting for tribal governments, budgets and enterprises.

My interest in growing Native economies stems from my upbringing. I am an enrolled Diné Nation member raised on the reservation and a proud graduate of Red Mesa High School. Thanks to the Chief Manuelito Scholarship, I am also a graduate of Stanford University and have earned a Masters in Public Policy from the Harvard Kennedy School of Government where I studied with the Harvard Project on American Indian Economic Development. I have always believed that Native people should be economic leaders in this country and thanks to the many opportunities I have been afforded, I have been able to see much growth in this sector. I know that the Navajo Nation will continue to exert economic influence and the basic utilities NTUA provides are the foundation for growing the Diné economy.

NTUA General Manager's Office I have made NTUA a priority in my professional and personal life and have made a point to make every meeting either in person, or via the telephone. As mentioned previously, I have gained a great deal of knowledge about this enterprise with more than \$100 million in revenue and more than 600 full-time and fully compensated employees. If re-appointed, I plan to build upon this knowledge base and continue to make every effort to make every meeting. Over my appointment I have participated in many meetings, discussions and decisions – I would like to highlight three additional duties I have engaged in.

First, after being nominated, I volunteered to serve as one of two Co-Managers for the New Markets III, LLC entity. The New Markets III entity was created to help fund the Window Rock Wastewater Treatment Facility by taking advantage of federal New Market Tax Credit incentives for economic development designed for in-need areas such as the Navajo Nation. Third, I have accompanied the General Manager and Counsel to several Washington, D.C. meetings with federal and legislative stakeholders. I have spent the better part of a week each year meeting with Senators, Congressmen, FCC officials and USDA officials on behalf of NTUA and the management board. The General Manager and Counsel have used these meetings to effectively advocate for NTUA and support the enterprise's many initiatives.

I am humbled by my initial selection to serve on the NTUA Board of Directors. I have gained significant knowledge of the utility industry, and NTUA's multifaceted operations in particular. I know NTUA is doing a great job providing utilities to the Navajo people and I hope to continue to build my board management expertise and serve NTUA and the Nation.
