PURPOSE: The purpose of this legislation is to amend Title 1 at Sections 701, 703, 752 and 753 of the enrollment procedures.

This written summary does not address recommended amendments as may be provided by the standing committees. The Office of Legislative Counsel requests each Council Delegate to review each proposed resolution in detail.

701, 703, 752, AND 753

BE IT ENACTED:

SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

- A. The Health, Education and Human Services Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council and is empowered to review and recommend resolutions relating to social services, health, environmental health, education, veterans and veterans services, employment and labor. 2 N.N.C. §§ 164(A)(1), 400(A) and 401(B)(6)(a) (2012); CO-45-12.
- B. The Law and Order Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council and is empowered with the authority to review and make recommendations to the Navajo Nation Council on amendments to and enactments in the Navajo Nation Code. 2 N.N.C. §§ 164(A)(1), 600(A), and 601(B)(14) (2012); CO-45-12
- C. The Naabik'iyáti' Committee of the Navajo Nation Council, pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(9), reviews proposed legislation which requires final action by the Navajo Nation Council. CO-45-12.

1 D. The Navajo Nation Council must review and approve enactments or amendments of
2 positive law. 2 N.N.C. § 164(A) (2012); CO-45-12.

4 **SECTION TWO. FINDINGS**

5 A. As a sovereign nation, the Navajo Nation has the inherent right to self-governance
6 and to determine the requirements for enrollment in the Navajo Nation. *See generally*
7 1 N.N.C. § 701 *et seq.*

8 B. Currently, under Navajo Nation law, persons must possess one-fourth degree of
9 Navajo Indian blood to be eligible for enrollment. *See generally* 1 N.N.C. § 701.

10 C. The foundation of the Navajo way of life is reflected in K'é. K'é stresses the duties
11 and obligations of individuals to their community. *See Atcitty v. Dist Ct. for the*
12 *Judicial Dist. of Window Rock*, No. SC-CV-25-96, slip op. at 7-8 (Nav. Sup. Ct
13 1996).

14 D. Under Diné Customary Law, "it is the right and freedom of the people that our
15 children are provided with education to absorb wisdom, self-knowledge, and
16 knowledge to empower them to make a living and participate in the growth of the
17 Navajo Nation." 2 N.N.C. § 204(F).

18 E. "Knowing one's point of origination... is extremely important to the Navajo people,
19 because only then will a person know which adoone'e (clan) and Dine'e (people) the
20 person is." *In re A.M.K.*, No. SC-CV-38-10, 2010 WL 4159270 (Navajo Oct. 8,
21 2010).

22 F. There is a long history of American Indian children, including Navajo children, being
23 removed from Indian homes and families. The Indian Child Welfare Act ("ICWA")
24 was enacted to "promote the stability and security of Indian tribes and families" . . .
25 with the understanding that "[t]here is no resource that is more vital to the continued
26 existence and integrity of Indian tribes than their children and that the United States
27 has a direct interest, as trustee, in protecting Indian children who are members of or
28 are eligible for membership in an Indian tribe." 25 U.S.C. §§ 1901(3)(4); 1902.

29 G. Currently, under Navajo Nation law, children who do not possess one-fourth degree
30 of Navajo blood and ineligible for enrollment in another tribe cannot seek ICWA

1 relief. The amendments to the enrollment requirements will allow for the application
2 of ICWA for Navajo children involved in state dependency cases who do not possess
3 the current requisite one-fourth degree Navajo blood.

4 H. In addition to providing ICWA relief, the amendments to the enrollment requirements
5 will allow for persons of Navajo ancestry who have unique circumstances such as
6 adoption, overseas birth, and other special situations to obtain membership into the
7 Navajo Nation.

8 I. It is within the best interest of the Navajo Nation to amend 1 N.N.C. §§ 701, 703, 752
9 and 753 for the reasons stated herein.

11 SECTION THREE. AMENDMENT TO TITLE 1

12 The Navajo Nation amends Title 1 as follows:

14 NAVAJO NATION CODE

15 TITLE 1. GENERAL PROVISIONS

16 CHAPTER 3. ENROLLMENT PROCEDURES

17 SUBCHAPTER 1. GENERAL PROVISIONS

18 § 701. Composition

19 The membership of the Nation shall consist of the following persons:

20 A. All persons of Navajo blood whose names appear on the official roll of the
21 Navajo Nation maintained by the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

22 B. Any person who has Navajo ancestry, is at least one-fourth degree Navajo blood,
23 but who has not previously been enrolled as a member of the Navajo Nation, is
24 eligible for membership and enrollment. is a member and shall be enrolled, if
25 approved by a final decision of the Enrollment Screening Committee issued
26 pursuant to Sections 752 and 753 of this Title.

27 C. Children born to any enrolled member of the Navajo Nation shall automatically
28 become members of the Navajo Nation and shall be enrolled, provided they are at
29 least one-fourth degree Navajo blood.

1 **~~§703. Member of another tribe~~**

2 ~~— No person, otherwise eligible for membership in the Navajo Nation, may enroll as a~~
3 ~~member of the Navajo Nation, who, at the same time, is on the roll of any other tribe of~~
4 ~~Indians.~~

6 **§752. Enrollment Screening Committee**

7 A. An Enrollment Screening Committee consisting of designated representatives of
8 the Navajo Nation President, the Vice-President, the Executive Director of the
9 Division of Natural Resources, the Office of Vital Records and Identification
10 Agency Census Clerk, and the Attorney General is established. The Enrollment
11 Screening Committee shall consider all applications for enrollment for those
12 persons ineligible for automatic enrollment under Section 701(C) of this Title in
13 the first instance.

14 B. In all cases where ~~the records of the Navajo Agency do not show that the~~
15 ~~applicant is of at least one-fourth degree Navajo blood or the applicant does not~~
16 ~~establish such fact by documentary evidence independent of this own statement~~
17 an applicant is not eligible for automatic enrollment, the Office of Vital Records
18 shall forward the application for enrollment to the Enrollment Screening
19 Committee. The applicant shall submit evidence of Navajo ancestry to the
20 Enrollment Screening Committee, through ~~consisting of the~~ affidavits ~~of~~
21 ~~disinterested persons, certified copies of public or church records, or other~~
22 ~~documents, or through witness testimony. the like, the Screening Committee shall~~
23 ~~reject the application. In all cases where the applicant appears to be enrolled in~~
24 ~~another Indian tribe, the Screening Committee shall reject the application.~~ In all
25 cases the Screening Committee ~~or any successor committee lawfully established~~
26 shall inform the applicant of his or her rights of appeal under this Section. The
27 Committee or its successor shall establish a record of any hearing or proceeding
28 on any application, and this record shall contain the evidence used by the
29 Committee in making its decision, a statement of its decision, and its reasons
30 therefore, and the date.

1 C. The Committee ~~or its successor~~ shall transmit ~~this record established under~~
2 ~~Subsection (B) to an appropriate District Court of the Navajo Nation and a copy~~
3 ~~of its decision~~ to the Office of Vital Records and Identification and the Office of
4 the Prosecutor.

5 **§753. Standards for Screening Committee ~~recommendations~~ Decisions**

6 The Screening Committee shall be guided by the following standards in making its
7 ~~recommendations: decision whether to recognize an applicant as a member of the Navajo~~
8 Nation and order his or her enrollment:

9 A. ~~If the applicant appears to be a Navajo Indian of full blood it shall recommend~~
10 ~~approval.~~

11 B. ~~If the applicant appears to have Navajo blood of one-fourth degree or higher, but~~
12 ~~not full blood, i~~

13 A. ~~It shall base its decision on recommendations on his degree of Navajo blood, how~~
14 ~~long he or she has lived within the Navajo Nation among the Navajo People, whether~~
15 ~~he or she is presently living within the Navajo Nation among them, whether he or she~~
16 ~~can identify their Navajo clan can be identified as a member of a Navajo clan,~~
17 ~~whether he or she can speak and understand the Navajo Language, whether he or she~~
18 ~~is knowledgeable of Navajo customs and traditions, and whether he or she is married~~
19 ~~to an enrolled Navajo. The Screening Committee is authorized to make investigations~~
20 ~~to determine such facts, but the burden of proof in all cases shall rest on the~~
21 ~~applicants.~~

22 B. If the applicant is unable to demonstrate and of the considerations listed in
23 §753(A), the Screening Committee shall permit the applicant to present mitigating
24 circumstances to be taken into consideration for enrollment.

25 C. The Enrollment Screening Committee is authorized to make investigations to
26 determine such facts, but the burden of proof in all cases shall rest on the applicant.

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30 **SECTION FOUR. CODIFICATION**

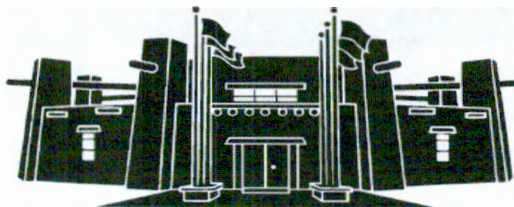
1 The provisions of the Act which amend or adopt new sections of the Navajo Nation
2 Code shall be codified by the Office of Legislative Counsel. The Office of Legislative
3 Counsel shall incorporate such amended provisions in the next codification of the Navajo
4 Nation Code.

5
6 **SECTION FIVE. SAVINGS CLAUSE**

7 Should any provision of this Act be determined invalid by the Navajo Nation
8 Supreme Court or the District Courts of the Navajo Nation, without appeal to the Navajo
9 Nation Supreme Court, the remainder of the Act shall remain the law of the Navajo
10 Nation.

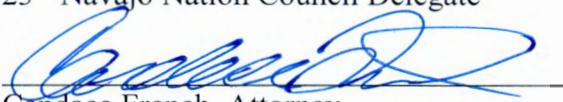

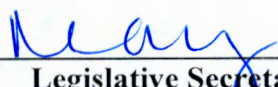

Imagine waking up one morning in Seba Dalkai, Arizona, and when you leave your home, there are 10 homes within the 5 miles radius who are comprised of non-Navajos and your the only full - blooded Navajo left in your area. When you arrive to work, all of your workers are non-Navajos and only 1 is 1/2 Navajo Indian. When you pick up your children from the school, the majority of the students are non-Navajo and on KTNN, which is now only spoken in the English reports there are lack of resources on the Navajo Nation. After work, you need to seek traditional services because your child is sick, you travel throughout your area and the newly enrolled Navajos (based on this legislation) inform you they do not know what a medicine is and when you finally reach a close family member, they tell you Navajo ceremonies are extremely scarce, hardly anyone speaks the Navajo language and you have to contact someone from another agency and hope that person is still alive and knows these traditaion teachings.

This is what our Navajo Nation will come to if this type of legislation is passed. I also a full-blooded Navajo born into the Bitter Water Clan. I am so full - blooded and raised on the Navajo Nation. My parents, my grandparents and my great grandparents are fluent and all full blooded Navajos. I am also an educated Navajo woman. I have a Bachelor's Degree in Political Science, a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice, a Certificate in American Indian Law and a Master's Degree in Social. Work. I am just one Navajo woman who a voice to advocate for our family members within our Teesto Agency. My maternal grandmother is 88 years old and she only speaks the Navajo language.

This bill is an ENROACHMENT on our Navajo sovereignty. When you allow ANYONE to be enrolled with the Navajo Nation, ANYONE can come, live, claim land, claim they know the language and exhaust all of our limited resources. The enrollment that is currently standing is there for a reason and not there to allow anyone to be enrolled. If that is the case, that means, we allow anyone to be enrolled and these newly enrolled members will take over our sovereignty and diminish what is already standing today.

Secondly, our culture, our language and traditions will dwindle away. It say anyone with Navajo ancestry! Does that mean, if I want to enroll my friend who is from Hispanic background and I tell her to you can be enrolled and I'll vouch for her, she can be enrolled? That would mean, anyone who touches, talks or someone who is around a Navajo person, can be enrolled. That will dehumanize our identity of being Navajo.

Thirdly, why is the council even entertaining such a legislation? My great- paternal grandmother was apart of the Long Walk. She SACRIFICED her life, her relatives sacrificed their life so today, we and our own children can live on the Navajo reservation. My family did not make these huge sacrifices so just ANYONE can be an enrolled member of the Navajo Nation.

This act will create chaos among the Navajo people and deplete all of our Navajo Nation resources and subject our children and future of the Navajo people to diminish. I am not in support of this legislation and I would like for this bill to be vetoed.
