# RESOLUTION OF THE NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' STANDING COMMITTEE OF THE 24th NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL -- First Year, 2019

#### AN ACTION

RELATING TO NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE; IDENTIFYING THE FUNDING OPTION AND PROJECT MANAGEMENT AND PROCUREMENT METHOD FOR PROJECTS FUNDED BY THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR, INDIAN AFFAIRS, OFFICE OF FACILITIES, PROPERTY AND SAFETY MANAGEMENT, DIVISION OF FACILITIES MANAGEMENT & CONSTRUCTION

#### BE IT ENACTED:

#### SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

The Naabik'íyáti' Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council and among other statutory powers, the committee has the delegated responsibility to "review and continually monitor the programs and activities of federal and state departments and to assist development of such programs designed to serve the Navajo People and the Navajo Nation through intergovernmental relationships between the Navajo Nation and such departments." See 2 N.N.C. §§ 700 (A) and 701 (A) (7).

#### SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

- A. The United States Department of Interior, Indian Affairs, Office of Facilities, Property and Safety Management, Division of Facilities Management and Construction ("Division of Facilities Management & Construction") has selected five major Facilities, Improvement and Repair projects to fund on the Navajo Nation.
- B. The Division of Facilities Management & Construction requires a "Tribal Resolution identifying the funding option and project management and procurement method" to be used for each of the funded projects.

- C. The Facility Improvements and Repair projects are listed in five letters from the United States Department of Interior, Indian Affairs. These letters are attached as Exhibit A. The Facility Improvements and Repair projects include a Demolition and Space Reduction projects at Greasewood Springs Community School; a Facility Improvement and Repair project at Greyhills Academy High School; a Demolition Project for various unspecified locations on the Navajo Nation; a Facilities Improvement and Repair Project at Many Farms Consolidated School; and a Facility Improvement and Repair Project at Shonto Preparatory School.
- D. The Navajo Nation and Bureau of Indian Affairs document showing the proposed projects and the budgeted amounts for the five projects is attached as **Exhibit B**. The estimated total for all five projects is listed at \$45.8 million.
- E. The Navajo Nation President's DECISION OF FUNDING CONTRACT FOR PROJECT MANAGEMENT for each of the five projects are attached as **Exhibit A**.

SECTION THREE. IDENTIFYING THE FUNDING OPTION AND PROJECT MANAGEMENT AND PROCUREMENT METHOD TO BE USED FOR EACH OF THE FIVE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR, DIVISION OF FACILITIES MANAGEMENT AND CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

The Division of Facilities Management & Construction (DFMC). Indian Affairs would like to consult with the Navajo Nation regarding demolition project for the Greasewood Springs Community School. The funding is approved and must begin by September 2018. Your acceptance of any approved funds will be considered an agreement to adhere to this schedule.

In accordance with the Assistant Secretary's commitment to and support of Tribal selfgovernance and self-determination, we are soliciting your input regarding an appropriate method for completing the demolition of housing project at Oreasewood Springs Community School

This project consists demolishing thirty-six (36) housing to include all site utilities, improvements such as streets, curbs and gutters. Remove all hazardous materials from the structure interiors and exteriors and or grounds, demolish and remove site parking and roads, all concrete areas. In anticipation of receiving funds not to exceed \$1.3 million, Indian Affairs request the Navajo Nation select a procurement method for demolition from the following options.

Option Number 1: P.L. 100-297 Grant. The tribe or tribally-controlled school board (Grantee) elects to perform this project via a P.1 100-297 grant.

Grantees will be responsible for overall project management, status reporting, review coordination with DFMC and Division of Safety and Risk Management (DSRM), and completing all procurement actions, including the scope of work, in accordance with applicable federal, state, and local building codes and standards, as well as additional requirements identified by DFMC.

DLMC will conduct an Organizational Capacity Review (OCR) to determine the Grantee's management capabilities in accordance with 25 U.S.C. 2503(b)(4)(B)(iii). Upon completion of the OCR, a final decision awarding the grant will be made.



Option Number 2: P.L. 93-638 Contract - The tribe or tribal organization (Contractor) elects to perform the project via a P.L. 93-638 contract. #### Dear President Begaye:

The Shonto Preparatory School has been selected for a major Facilities, Improvement and Repair (Fl&R) project. To ensure the success of these projects, the Division of Facilities Management and Construction (DFMC) will work closely with Shonto Preparatory School to complete each phase of the project. Funding for this project is limited and contingent on future Congressional appropriations.

A Tribal Resolution identifying the funding option and project management and procurement method should be submitted to DFMC. The Lacilities Improvement & Repair project will consist of design and construction of major HVAC, water and sewer system replacement, and I ife Safety upgrades of approximately \$10 to \$15 million.

Grantees will be responsible for overall project management, status reporting, review coordination with DFMC and Division of Safety and Risk Management (DSRM), and completing all procurement actions, including the scope of work, in accordance with applicable federal, state, and local building codes and standards, as well as additional requirements identified by DLMC

DEMC will conduct an Organizational Capacity Review (OCR) to determine the Grantec's management capabilities in accordance with 25 U.S.C. 2503(b)(4)(B)(iii). Upon completion of the OCR, a final decision awarding the grant will be made.

Option Number 2: P.L. 93-638 Contract - The tribe or tribal organization (Contractor) elects to perform the planning phase activities via P.L. 93-638 contract. The Contractor will be responsible for overall project management, status reporting, review coordination with DFMC and DSRM, and completing all procurement actions, including the scope of work, in accordance with applicable federal, state, and local building codes and standards, as well as additional requirements identified by DFMC.

Option Number 3: IA Performs the Activities - The responsible Regional Facilities Manager, with support from the DFMC, will be responsible for overall project management, status reporting, review coordination with DFMC and DSRM, and completing all procurement actions, including the scope of work, in accordance with applicable federal, state, and local building codes and standards, as well as additional requirements identified by DFMC.

For Option 1 or 2, an informational meeting will be scheduled to discuss the required application process and other matters related to the respective project. For Option 3, DFMC assures you that the facility users and your designated tribal representative(s) will be fully involved throughout each phase of the project.

Project Management Responsibilities: The progress and execution of each project will be the subject of close and detailed reporting and scrutiny. DFMC will provide oversight to help ensure deadlines are met in order to achieve established milestones throughout all phases of the project. To be successful, we must work together closely to ensure continual progress. Regular status reporting will be required to ensure progress toward achieving milestones, to maintain data required in eCPIC, and for DFMC to regularly report progress to the Department of Interior and other oversight authorities. Additionally, if the tribe or tribal organization elects either option 1 or 2, it must select a project manager that meets the DFMC Minimum Project Manager Standards (will be provided at the informational meeting to follow).

Extensions of deadlines will be granted under extenuating circumstances only. Failure to adhere to the requirements of the Contract or Grant will result in a project review by Indian Affairs to consider withdrawing, withholding, and/or redirecting the use of all or some project funds for more efficient and timely use toward other projects. This would likely result in postponing a project until some future date when the schedule is back on track and new funding can be identified.

Tribal Intention and Resolution Regarding Funding Contract for Project Management and Procurement Option Selected: We request you select one of the above implementation options and inform DFMC within the specified timeframe. If we do not receive a response from your office within the timeframe. Indian Affairs will initiate this project using Option Number 3. A Tribal Resolution will be required should you decide to use Option 1 or 2. Please attach the Tribal Resolution with your notice of selection. If a tribal resolution cannot be obtained within the given period, please inform us of your intended option using attachment 1. The Tribal Resolution will be required. If necessary an Organizational Capacity Review will be conducted, prior to entering the formal planning stage.

Deadline for a Tribal Response to this Consultation Letter: Please provide your response with all requested attachments, and other documentation to DFMC within 15 business days from the date of receipt of this letter. Please ensure you include, at a minimum, the completed and signed attachment indicating tribal decisions for funding option and project management.

For your convenience, a response form (Decision of Lunding Contract for Project Management) is attached. Please review carefully, select your option, sign and date. 
