TITLE OF RESOLUTION: AN ACTION RELATING TO HEALTH, EDUCATION AND HUMAN SERVICES AND NAABIK'ÍYÁTI'; AMENDING NABIMY-29-19 AND RECOMMENDING DIRECT P.L. 93-638 FUNDING FOR FACILITY IMPROVEMENT AND REPAIRS FOR GREYHILLS ACADEMY HIGH SCHOOL

**PURPOSE:** This resolution will amend NABIMY-29-19 and recommend direct P.L. 93-638 funding for Facility Improvement and Repairs for Greyhills Academy High School.

This written summary does not address recommended amendments as may be provided by the standing committees. The Office of Legislative Counsel requests each Council Delegate to review each proposed resolution in detail.

- A. The Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA), U.S. Department of the Interior, on July 9, 2018 provided notice to the Navajo Nation that it would fund five Facility and Repair projects at certain schools within the Navajo Nation, including projects at the Greyhills Academy High School. For each project, the Navajo Nation was given options on how each project would be managed.
- B. Through resolution NABIMY-29-19, Navajo Nation proceeded with the projects. For the Greyhills Academy High School, the Navajo Nation provided notice to the BIA that the project would be managed through a "P.L. 93-638 Tribal/Federal Contract." See Exhibit A. Among the funds, one million nine hundred thousand dollars (\$1,900,000.00) was awarded to Greyhills Academy for repairs to the school's alarm system, its hydraulic elevator and HVAC units. *Id*.
- C. On June 5, 2019, the school board for the Greyhills Academy High School, by resolution 2019-001 requested the Navajo Nation "to support the transfer of \$1.9 Million P.L. 93-638 Facility Improvement & Repair Funds to be transferred to Greyhills Academy High School." See Exhibit B, resolution 2019-001.
- D. It is in the best interests of the Navajo Nation to permit and request direct funding of federal funds made available for the Greyhills Academy High School.

#### SECTION THREE. AUTHORIZING AND REQUESTING DIRECT FUNDING

- A. The Navajo Nation, concerning funds granted to the Navajo Nation by the Bureau of Indian Affairs though notice dated July 9, 2018, hereby supports and recommends that the Bureau of Indian Affairs provide funding, in the amount appropriated, directly to Greyhills Academy High School. Subject to approval of this request, the school board for Greyhills Academy shall assume all responsibility for implementing the federal grant awarded the school, including all compliance requirements under federal law and regulations.
- B. The President of the Navajo Nation is authorized, and shall do all things necessary, to implement the purposes and intent of this resolution.
- C. Resolution NABIMY-29-19 is amended as provided by this action.

#### AN ACTION

RELATING TO NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE; IDENTIFYING THE FUNDING OPTION AND PROJECT MANAGEMENT AND PROCUREMENT METHOD FOR PROJECTS FUNDED BY THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR, INDIAN AFFAIRS, OFFICE OF FACILITIES, PROPERTY AND SAFETY MANAGEMENT, DIVISION OF FACILITIES MANAGEMENT & CONSTRUCTION

#### BE IT ENACTED:

#### SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

The Naabik'iyati' Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council and among other statutory powers, the committee has the delegated responsibility to "review and continually monitor the programs and activities of federal and state departments and to assist development of such programs designed to serve the Navajo People and the Navajo Nation through intergovernmental relationships between the Navajo Nation and such departments." See 2 N.N.C. §§ 700 (A) and 701 (A) (7).

#### SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

- A. The United States Department of Interior, Indian Affairs, Office of Facilities, Property and Safety Management, Division of Facilities Management and Construction ("Division of Facilities Management & Construction") has selected five major Facilities, Improvement and Repair projects to fund on the Navajo Nation.
- B. The Division of Facilities Management & Construction requires a "Tribal Resolution identifying the funding option and project management and procurement method" to be used for each of the funded projects.

- C. The Facility Improvements and Repair projects are listed in five letters from the United States Department of Interior, Indian Affairs. These letters are attached as Exhibit A. The Facility Improvements and Repair projects include a Demolition and Space Reduction projects at Greasewood Springs Community School; a Facility Improvement and Repair project at Greyhills Academy High School; a Demolition Project for various unspecified locations on the Navajo Nation; a Facilities Improvement and Repair Project at Many Farms Consolidated School; and a Facility Improvement and Repair Project at Shonto Preparatory School.
- D. The Navajo Nation and Bureau of Indian Affairs document showing the proposed projects and the budgeted amounts for the five projects is attached as **Exhibit B**. The estimated total for all five projects is listed at \$45.8 million.
- E. The Navajo Nation President's DECISION OF FUNDING CONTRACT FOR PROJECT MANAGEMENT for each of the five projects are attached as Exhibit A.

SECTION THREE. IDENTIFYING THE FUNDING OPTION AND PROJECT MANAGEMENT AND PROCUREMENT METHOD TO BE USED FOR EACH OF THE FIVE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR, DIVISION OF FACILITIES MANAGEMENT AND CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

The Navajo Nation through the 24th Navajo Nation Council Naabik'iyati' Committee hereby identifies the funding option and project management and procurement method to be used for each of the five United States Department of Interior, Indian Affairs, Office of Facilities, Property and Safety Management, Division of Facilities Management and Construction projects as shown in Exhibit A.




