3. The Code of Federal Regulations, at 25 C.F.R. Subchapter E, among other matters,

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Equalization Formula (ISEF) provisions (Part 39), funds are allocated based on student attendance counts, student contact hours and student transportation. Due to COVID-19, such data cannot be collected as current health concerns prevent face-to-face instructions for students.

- 4. For purposes stated herein, the Diné Bi Olta School Board Association supports the suspension or waiver of 25 C.F.R. Subchapter E. See **EXHIBIT A**.
- 5. To insure that future funding is not reduced, it is in the best interests of the Navajo Nation that 25 C.F.R. Subchapter E. be suspended or waived.

#### NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

The Navajo Nation hereby supports and recommends that 25 C.F.R. Subpart E be suspended or waived until students can safely return to school.

Re: Requesting Support for BIE School System-Wide Suspension or Waiver of Indian Education Regulations (25 C.F.R. Subchapter E)

Dear President Nez and Vice President Lizer:

The Diné Bi'Olta School Board Association (DBOSBA) wants to thank you for your strong letter of August 24, 2020, which notified federal officials that the Navajo Nation will not permit face-to-face in-classroom instruction for schools operated by the Bureau of Indian Education (BIE) within the Navajo Nation during the fall 2020 semester.

DBOSBA also wants to call to your attention another aspect of the BIE school reopening plan that could have significant, harmful consequences for all BIE-funded schools serving students, families and communities within the Navajo Nation. Throughout the BIE's school reopening consultation process, tribal school officials called for the BIE to issue a system-wide waiver or suspension of regulatory requirements related to student attendance counts, student contact hours (including Special Education) and student transportation. These regulatory provisions (found in 25 C.F.R. Subchapter E) establish methodologies for collecting data used to determines the annual funding allocation made available to each school within the BIE school system. The regulatory provisions were designed to gather data associated with traditional face-to-face in-person classroom instruction.

Given the COVID-19 Pandemic, however, all schools within the Navajo Nation will employ distance learning in order to protect the health and safety of students, staff, teachers, and their families and community. If the 25 C.F.R. Subchapter E regulations apply, our schools could see future funding reduced. For instance, these regulatory provisions include the Indian School Equalization Formula (ISEF), which determines the funding allocation for BIE-funded schools. Funding is determined by factors such as student attendance counts and instructional hours provided.

Schools may only count students who are "in attendance during any of the first 10 days of school, and receive at least 5 days' instruction [during those ten days]," and schools must drop students from their counts when they are "absent for 10 consecutive school days." The number

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of instructional hours determines whether a program is considered a full-time educational program. Under certain circumstances schools may receive funding for part-time students, but it is reduced accordingly.

The regulatory requirements for student counts and instructional hours, particularly for K-3 students, are impractical under the current conditions. The regulations provide that Kindergarten children must receive four hours of instruction per day and children in grades 1 through 3 must receive 4.5 hours per day. K-3 students do not have the attention span required to engage in distance learning for long periods of time. Even the older students from grades 4 on up, cannot be expected to sit at their computer for 6 hours or more daily. These requirements are stringent and cruel for all our children and it could impose a long-term negative impact on the overall well-being of our Diné children.

The regulations also determine funding allocated for student transportation costs. The regulations require documenting the number of students served and miles traveled to establish the costs "of students from home to school and return." The regulatory provisions account for transportation across unimproved roads, as is the case for many bus routes on the Navajo Reservation. Our schools will not generate this type of data with students attending school remotely.


By not suspending or waiving these regulations, the BIE's fall 2020 school reopening plan has the potential to damage the long-term funding needs of all schools located within the Navajo Nation. The BIE has said that we can request individual waivers, but we do not know whether those waivers will be granted or the impact the waiver may have on future funding allocations. Accordingly, DBOSBA is now submitting a new letter to the BIE requesting a system-wide suspension or blanket waiver of all 25 C.F.R. Subchapter E requirements. We ask you to support our effort for a system-wide waiver of these regulations, as this waiver is vital to ensure the long-term capacity of our Navajo education system.

For further background on this issue, we are attaching a copy of the letter DBOSBA submitted to the Assistant Secretary – Indian Affairs and the BIE Director on this issue. Given the urgency of the matter, we have also drafted a proposed template letter for you to consider using in submitting your own statement to support our position for a system-wide waiver or suspension of these regulations for all bureau-funded schools.
