BE IT ENACTED:

## Section One. Authority

A. The Resources and Development Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council. 2 N.N.C. § 500(A).
B. The Resources and Development Committee of the Navajo Nation Council has authority to give final approval of all land withdrawals, non-mineral leases, permits, licenses, rights-of-way, surface easements and bonding requirements on Navajo Nation lands and unrestricted (fee) land. This authority shall include subleases, modifications, assignments, leasehold encumbrances, transfers, renewals, and terminations. 2 N.N.C. § 501 (B)(2).

## Section Two. Findings

A. United States of America Department of Health and Human Services Indian Health Service has submitted a request for a lease to occupy 43.13 acres, more
or less, on Navajo Nation Trust Lands in Dilkon, Arizona. The proposed Lease is attached hereto as Exhibit 1.
B. The proposed Lease of 43.13 acres, more or less, is described in Exhibit 2.
C. The land was withdrawn in 1978 through Resolution ACAP-41-78. The Resolution is attached hereto as Exhibit 3.
D. Environmental and archaeological studies and clearances have been completed and are attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference. The Environmental Assessment is attached hereto as Exhibit 4. The Biological Resources Survey is attached hereto as Exhibit 5. The Cultural Resources Survey is attached hereto as Exhibit 6. The Navajo Nation Environmental Protection Agency memorandum is attached hereto as Exhibit 7.
E. The Lease for the United States of America Department of Health and Human Services Indian Health Service use of 43.13 acres, more or less, in the vicinity of Dilkon Chapter has completed an Executive Official Review with various Departments and Programs providing approval and supplemental comments. Executive Official Review Document No. 012027 is attached hereto as Exhibit 8.

## Section Three. Approval:

A. The Resources and Development Committee of the Navajo Nation Council hereby approves a Lease for the United States of America Department of Health and Human Services Indian Health Service, for 43.13 acres, more or less, of Navajo Nation Trust Lands in the Dilkon Chapter vicinity, Navajo Nation (Navajo County, Arizona). The location is more particularly described on the survey maps attached as Exhibit 2.
B. The Navajo Nation hereby approves the Lease subject to, but not limited to the Terms and Conditions in the Lease attached hereto as Exhibit 1.
C. The Navajo Nation hereby authorizes the President of the Navajo Nation to execute any and all documents necessary to implement the intent and purpose of this resolution.

THIS LEASE, made and entered into this date by and between the Navajo Nation, a federally recognized Indian Tribe whose address is P.O. Box 9000, Window Rock, AZ 86515, and whose interest in the property hereinafter described is that of owner, hereinafter called the Lessor, pursuant to the authority contained in 2 N.N.C. $\S 501$ (B)(2)(a), 16 N.N.C. $\S \$ 2301$ et seq., and 25 U.S.C. $\S 415$ (e), as implemented by the regulations contained in 25 CFR 162; and amendments thereto, which by reference are made a part hereof; and

The UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, Department of Health and Human Services, Indian Health Service, hereinafter known as (IHS), hercinafter called the Lessee, Resolution No. ACAP-41-78 pursuant to the authority contained in Public Law 94-437, Section 804, and amendments thereto, which by reference are made a part hereof.

WITNESSETH THEREFORE: The parties hereto, for the consideration hereinafter mentioned, covenant and agree as follows:

## 1. DEFINITIONS.

(A) "Approved Encumbrance" means an encumbrance approved in writing by Lessor and the Secretary in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Lease.
(B) "Encumbrancer" means the owner and holder of an Approved Encumbrance, including all successors and assigns.
(C) "Hazardous Substance" means any "hazardous substance" as defined under the provisions of section 101(14) of the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act of 1980, 42 U.S.C. $\S 9601(14)$, including all amendments or successors thereto, and "petroleum" as defined under the provisions of section 9001 (8) of the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, 42 U.S.C. § 6991(8).
(D) "Secretary" means the Secretary of the United States Department of the Interior or his duly authorized representative or successor.
(E) "Storage Tank" means an "underground storage tank" as defined under the provisions of section 6991(1) of the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, 42 U.S.C. 6901 et
seq., including all amendments and successors thereto, notwithstanding what percent of volume is located beneath the surface of the ground.

## 2. LEASED PREMISES

Whereas, The Lessor hereby leases to the Lessee a parcel of land approximately 43.13 acres as depicted (Exhibit A, Survey and Land Legal Description and Exhibit B, Aerial Photo and Plot Plan) on attachment together with all rights, infrastructure and roads belonging or appertaining thereto, and more particularly described below

This parcel as described in attached Exhibit A and lies within the Southwest Quarter (SW1/4) of Section 16, and the Northwest Quarter (NW 1/4) of Section 21, Township 23 North, Range 19 East, Gila and Salt River Meridian. In the vicinity of Dilkon Chapter, Navajo County, State of Arizona. NLD will submit one copy of this document to BIA for recording pursuant to 16 N.N.C. §2322(B).

## 3. LEASE TERM

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the said premises for the term beginning on the date of execution of this lease and extending for a period not to exceed 20 years. This lease provides for no renewal options. However it is anticipated that a new succeeding lease will be negotiated prior to expiration date.

## 4. TERMINATION RIGHTS

The Government may terminate this Lease, in whole or in part, by providing not less than 90 days' prior written notice to the Lessor. The effective date of the termination shall be the day following the expiration of the required notice period or the termination date set forth in the notice, whichever is later.

In the event the Lessor, during the term of this lease period, shall enter into a contract with the Lessee to operate the health program on these premises under the provision of PL 93-638, or compact, the lease shall terminate immediately.

## 5. RENTAL CONSIDERATION

The Lessee shall pay the Lessor no annual rent. Consideration for the parcel of land leased shall be in lieu of the benefit of IHS providing health care services.

## 6. LEASE PURPOSE

The Lessor and the Lessee agree that the leased premises will be used for the Dilkon Health Center and 20 new housing units for IHS staff providing clinical services to Navajo People.

## 7. UTILITY SERVICE LINE AGREEMENTS.

(A) Lessee specifically is authorized to enter into appropriate service line agreements with utility companies for the provision of utility services to the Leased Premises, including gas, water, sewer, electricity, telephone, television and other utilities, without further consent by Lessor, on the condition that:
(1) such agreements are for the sole purpose of supplying utility services to the Leased Premises;
(2) such agreements authorize utility service lines only within the Leased Premises;
(3) such agreements do not extend beyond the term of this Lease;
(4) executed copies of such agreements, together with plats or diagrams showing with particularity the location, size and extent of such service lines, are filed by the utility companies with Lessor and with the Secretary within thirty (30) days of their execution; and
(5) such agreements are otherwise in accordance with the provisions of 25 C.F.R. Part 169.51-169.56, including any amendments or successors thereto.
(B) Nothing contained herein shall be construed to limit the right of Lessor to enter into service line agreements with utility companies for service lines across the Leased Premises, provided that such service lines do not unreasonably interfere with Lessee's use of the Leased Premises.

## 8. CONSTRUCTION OR PLACEMENT OF IMPROVEMENTS

Additional improvements may be built or placed on said land by the Lessee when it is determined to be beneficial to the program, and when such construction or placement has been negotiated and agreed to by the parties hereto in writing and memorialized by a lease amendment for any changes of terms herein. All improvements made on the leased premises shall be constructed in accordance with IHS Architect/Engineer Design Guide.

## 9. IMPROVEMENTS AND PERSONAL PROPERTY

(A) All buildings and other improvements on the Leased Premises, excluding removable personal property and trade fixtures, shall remain on the Leased Premises after termination of this Lease.
(B) Lessee shall remove all removable personal property and trade fixtures prior to
termination of this Lease. Should Lessee fail to remove said personal property and trade fixtures prior to termination of this Lease, said property shall thereupon become property of Lessor, and may be disposed of in any manner by Lessor.
(C) As used in this section, the term "removable personal property" shall not include property which normally would be attached or affixed to buildings, other improvements or land in such a way that it would become a part of the realty, regardless of whether such property in fact is so attached or affixed.
(D) All Hazardous Substances, Hazardous Substance storage systems or conveyance facilities, including but not limited to Storage Tanks, placed on or under the Leased Premises are the property of Lessee and shall remain the property of Lessee upon termination of this Lease. Within a reasonable time prior to termination of this Lease, Lessee shall remove any such substances or improvements, shall assess the Leased Premises for contamination, shall remediate all contamination, if any, and shall address any third party damages occasioned by any contamination or otherwise by the use or storage of such substances or improvements on the Leased Premises. Should Lessee fail to complete such responsibilities prior to the termination of this Lease, Lessee shall remain responsible therefor, and shall be required to post a bond in an amount reasonably required to ensure that such responsibilities are completed within a reasonable time after termination of this Lease.

## 10. PROPERTY DAMAGE.

In the event of destruction of or damage to any improvement on the Leased Premises, Lessee shall have the option not to replace or repair said improvement. Lessee shall provide Lessor with written notice of exercise of Lessee's option within thirty (60) days of the said event of damage. Should Lessee exercise its option to not to replace or repair in accordance with this subsection, this Lease shall terminate ninety (90) days after the effective date of notice thereof. Lessee shall clear the Leased Premises of all debris prior to termination of this Lease. If the building is only partially destroyed or damaged and poses no health and/or safety concern, the services will resume in a reduced capacity and the lease will continue under the same terms and conditions stated herein. The Government shall be permitted a reasonable amount of time, not to exceed 180 days from the event of destruction or damage, to repair or restore the Premises, if the Government submits to the Lessor a reasonable schedule for repair of the Premises within 30 days of the event of destruction
or damage.

## 11. HOLDING OVER.

Holding over by Lessee after termination of this Lease shall not constitute a renewal or extension thereof or give Lessee any rights hereunder or in or to the Leased Premises or to any improvements located thereon.

## 12. EMINENT DOMAIN

If, at any time during the term of this lease, the leased premises or any part thereof is taken or condemned under the laws of Eminent Domain, then and in every such case, the leasehold estate and interest of the Lessee in said premises, or part thereof taken, shall forthwith cease and terminate. All compensation awarded by reason of the taking of the leased land and any taking of or injury to the buildings or improvements located thereon shall be credited to the Lessor and the Lessee as their interests appear at the time of such taking.

## 13. FEDERAL TRUST

Nothing contained in this lease shall operate to delay or prevent a termination of Federal trust responsibilities with respect to the land by the issuance of a fee patent during the term of this lease; however, such termination shall not abrogate the lease. The lessor and the lessee shall be notified of any such change in the status of the land.

## 14. HAZARDOUS SUBSTANCES.

Lessee shall not cause or permit any Hazardous Substance to be used, stored, generated or disposed of on or in the Leased Premises without the prior written approval of Lessor, which approval may be given, given upon conditions or denied in the sole discretion of Lessor. Without limitation of the foregoing, if Lessee causes or permits the presence of any Hazardous Substance on the Leased Premises and such results in contamination to the Leased Premises or any building or other improvement thereon, Lessee shall promptly take any and all actions necessary or appropriate to restore the Leased Premises or building or other improvement to the condition existing prior to the presence of any such Hazardous Substance on the Leased Premises. Except in emergency situations, Lessee shall obtain written approval from Lessor prior to commencement of any such remedial action.

## 15. OFFICIALS NOT TO BENEFIT

No Member of or Delegate to Congress, or Resident Commissioner shall be admitted to any share or part of this lease contract, or to any benefit that might arise therefrom.

## 16. CHANGE OF OWNERSHIP

(A) If during the term of the Lease, title to the Property is transferred, the Lease is assigned, or the Lessor changes its legal name, the Lessor and its successor shall notify the Government within five days of the transfer of title.
(B) If title to the Property is transferred, or the Lease is assigned, the Government, the original Lessor (Transferor), and the new owner or assignee (Transferee) shall execute a Novation Agreement providing for the transfer of Transferor's rights and obligations under the Lease to the Transferee. When executed on behalf of the Government, a Novation Agreement will be made part of the Lease via Amendment.
(C) If the title to property transfers the Lease Contracting Officer (LCO) may request additional information (e.g., copy of the deed, bill of sale, certificate of merger, contract, court decree, articles of incorporation, operation agreement, partnership certificate of good standing, etc.) from the Transferor or Transferee to verify the parties' representations regarding the transfer, and to determine whether the transfer of the Lease is in the Government's interest.
(D) If the LCO determines that recognizing the Transferee as the Lessor is not in the Government's interest, the Transferor shall remain fully liable to the Government for the Transferee's performance of obligations under the Lease, notwithstanding the transfer. Under no condition shall the Government be obligated to release the Transferor of obligations.

## 17. INTEGRATED AGREEMENT

This Lease, upon execution, contains the entire agreement of the parties and no prior written or oral agreement, express or implied, shall be admissible to contradict the provisions of the Lease.

## 18. MUTUALITY OF AGREEMENT

The obligations and covenants of the Lessor, and the Government's obligation to perform such other obligations as may be specified herein, are interdependent.

## 19. SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS.

The terms and conditions contained herein shall extend to and be binding upon the successors, heirs, assigns, executors, administrators, employees and agents, including all contractors and subcontractors, of Lessee. Except as the context otherwise requires, the term "Lessee," as used in this Lease, shall be deemed to include all such successors, heirs, executors, assigns, employees and agents.

## 20. SITE MAINTENANCE AND ENVIRONMENTAL CONDITIONS

The Lessee shall maintain the land with its appurtenances under this lease at it sole cost and expense in good repair, safe, and healthful condition, including improvements constructed or alterations to the premises during the term of the lease agreed upon by all parties to this agreement in writing in accordance with applicable tribal and Federal environmental regulations.

The Lessor shall, to the extent of its knowledge, notify Government Lease Contracting Officer of the introduction of any hazardous or adverse conditions onto the Property by Lessor or others, including but not limited to, the Government leasing land with its appurtenances under lease.

## 21. UTILITIES

The Lessee shall pay the cost of services such as utilities, trash and snow removal, general maintenance, and janitorial during the term of this lease.

## 22. DISCOVERY OF HISTORIC PROPERTIES

If historic properties, archeological resources, human remains, or other cultural items not previously reported are encountered during the course of any activity associated with this Lease, all activity in the immediate vicinity of the properties, resources, remains, or items will cease and the Lessee will contact Lessor to determine how to proceed and appropriate disposition.

## 23. CONDITION OF LEASED PREMISES.

Lessee has examined and knows the Leased Premises and improvements thereon and accepts the same as-is. No representations as to the condition of the Leased Premises have been made by Lessor, any agent of Lessor prior to or at the time of execution of this Lease. Lessee warrants that it has not relied on any warranty or representation made by or on behalf of Lessor, but solely upon Lessee's independent investigation.

## 24. CONSTRUCTION; MAINTENANCE; REPAIR; ALTERATION.

(A) All buildings and other improvements placed on the Leased Premises shall be constructed in a good and workmanlike manner in compliance with applicable laws and building codes. All parts of buildings or other improvements visible to the public or from adjacent premises shall present a pleasant appearance and all service areas shall be screened from public view.
(B) Lessee shall maintain the Leased Premises and all buildings and other improvements thereon and any alterations, additions or appurtenances thereto, in good order and repair and in a safe, sanitary and neat condition.
(C) Lessee shall have the right to make reasonable alterations, additions or repairs to buildings or other improvements on the Leased Premises, consistent with other provisions of this Lease.

## 25. CONSTRUCTION BOND

If required by Federal law, including the Miller Act, 40 U.S.C. $\S 3131$ et seq., prior to the commencement of construction of any improvement on the leasehold premises, the Lessee shall require its construction contractor to post construction bonds in an amount sufficient to cover such construction as may be approved by the Lessor.

## 26. NON-RESPONSIBILITY NOTICES

Prior to the commencement of construction of any improvement on the leased premises, or prior to the beginning of any repair or alteration thereto, or work or labor thereon, Lessee shall post nonresponsibility notices at the site on Lessor's behalf, and Lessee agrees to post said notices ten (10) days prior to commencing any construction.

## 27. SUBLEASES AND ASSIGNMENTS.

Lessee shall not assign, convey or otherwise transfer this Lease, or any interest therein, without the prior written approval of Lessor and the Secretary, and then only upon the condition that the assignee or other successor in interest shall agree, in writing, to be bound by each and every covenant, agreement, term and condition of this Lease. Any such attempted assignment, conveyance, or transfer, without such written approval shall be void and of no effect. The approval of Lessor may be granted, granted upon conditions, or withheld at the sole discretion of Lessor.

## 28. QUIET ENJOYMENT.

Lessor hereby covenants and agrees that, upon performing each of its covenants, agreements, terms and conditions contained in this Lease, that Lessee shall peaceably and quietly have, hold and enjoy the Leased Premises without any hindrance, interruption, ejection or molestation by Lessor or by any other person or persons claiming from or under Lessor.

## 29. ENCUMBRANCE.

This Lease or any interest therein may not be encumbered and no such encumbrance shall be valid or binding.

## 30. VIOLATION.

(A) Time is declared to be of the essence in this Lease. Should Lessor determine that a provision of this Lease has been violated, Lessor shall send notice of the violation to the Lessee in accordance with Section 40 herein.
(1) Cure the violation and notify the Lessor in writing that the violation has been cured;
(2) Dispute the determination that a violation has occurred; or
(3) Request additional time to cure the violation with an explanation of why the additional time is necessary.
(B) If a violation is not cured within ten (10) days, Lessor must determine whether:
(1) To grant additional time for the Lessee to cure the violation;
(2) To conduct additional inquiries to determine the validity of the Lessee's objections to the findings that the Lease has been violated; or
(3) Take any action authorized or allowed under applicable law.
(C) If additional time is granted to cure a violation, the Lessee must proceed diligently to complete the necessary corrective actions within a reasonable period from the date on which the Lessor grants the additional time or within the specified time period set forth in the Lessor's written decision to grant additional time.
(D) In accordance with Section 38 herein, the parties agree to use good faith efforts to resolve such disputes through mediation, informal discussion, or other non-binding methods of dispute resolution.
(E) No waiver of a breach of any of the terms and conditions of this Lease shall be construed to be a waiver of any succeeding breach of the same or any other term or condition of this Lease. Exercise of any of the remedies herein shall not exclude recourse to any other remedies authorized or allowed under applicable law which may be exercised by Lessor or any other rights or remedies authorized or allowed under the applicable law now held or which may be held by Lessor in the future.

## 31. SANITATION.

Lessee hereby agrees to comply with all applicable sanitation and solid waste disposal laws, regulations or other sanitation or solid waste requirements of the United States and the Navajo Nation, except to the extent those Tribal laws are inconsistent with Federal regulations or other applicable Federal laws.

## 32. LIABILITY.

To the extent authorized by applicable Federal law, including the Federal Tort Claims Act, codified as amended primarily at 28 U.S.C. $\S \S 2671-80$ (2006), Lessee will be liable for the negligent or wrongful acts or omissions of its officers or employers while acting within the scope of their office or employment. Lessee's commitment to pay any lawful obligation or liability incurred by Lessee under this Lease is backed by the full faith and credit of the United States.

## 33. INSURANCE.

As a Federal Agency, Lessee is self-insured and shall be responsible for any tort claims that arise and for any loss or damage to the Leased Premises, or any building, improvement, or equipment, including removable personal property and equipment, placed upon the Leased Premises by the Lessee, resulting from the actions or omissions of Lessee.

## 34. INSPECTION.

The Lessor and the Lessor's authorized representative shall have the right, at any reasonable time during the term of this Lease, to enter upon the Leased Premises, or any part thereof, to ensure compliance with the provisions of this lease.

## 35. MINERALS

All minerals, including sand and gravel, contained in or on the Leased Premises are reserved for the use of Lessor. Lessor also reserves the right to enter upon the Leased Premises and search for and remove minerals located thereon, paying just compensation for any damage or injury caused to Lessee's personal property or improvements constructed by Lessee.

## 36. DELIVERY OF PREMISES.

At the termination of this Lease, Lessee shall peaceably and without legal process deliver up the possession of the Leased Premises in good condition, usual wear and tear excepted. Upon the written request of the Navajo Nation, Lessee shall provide to the Navajo Nation, at Lessee's sole cost and expense, an NEPA review of the Leased land at least sixty (60) days prior to delivery of said premises.

## 37. ATTORNEY'S FEES.

Lessee will be liable for attorney's fees and litigation costs in accordance with applicable federal statutes subjecting the United States and its agencies to liability for such fees and costs.

## 38. DISPUTE RESOLUTION.

In the event that a dispute arises under this Lease, the Parties agree to use their good faith efforts to resolve such disputes through mediation, informal discussion, or other non-binding methods of dispute resolution.

## 39. JURISDICTION AND NO WAIVER OF SOVEREIGN IMMUNITY

(A) The laws of the Navajo Nation apply to the Leased Premises, except to the extent that those laws are inconsistent with applicable Federal regulations or other applicable Federal law. As an agency of the United States government, Lessee is subject to Federal laws and nothing in this Agreement shall be construed as requiring Lessee or its employees, agents, or sublessees to violate Federal law.
(B) Nothing in this Lease shall in any way or to the extent limit the right of the United States to rely upon sovereign immunity or any State or Federal statute limiting liability or damages from injuries sustained in connection with the use or occupancy of the designated area under this Lease. Nothing in this Lease shall be interpreted as constituting a waiver, express or implied, of the sovereign immunity of the Navajo Nation or the United States.

## 40. NOTICES AND DEMANDS.

(A) Any notices, demands, requests or other communications to or upon either party provided for in this Lease, or given or made in connection with this Lease, (hereinafter referred to as "notices,") shall be in writing and shall be addressed as follows:

(B) All notices shall be given by personal delivery, by registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, or by facsimile transmission, followed by surface mail. Notices shall be effective and shall be deemed delivered: if by personal delivery, on the date of delivery if during normal business hours, or if not during normal business hours on the next business day following delivery; if by registered or certified mail, or by facsimile transmission, followed by surface mail, on the next business day following actual delivery and receipt.
(C) Lessor and Lessee may at any time change its address for purposes of this section by notice.

(iiná bá) is hereby providing the following update to the Phase II Final Environmental Assessment (EA) for Proposed Dilkon Health Center and Staff Quarters, dated February 2016, as prepared by the United States Public Health Service, Navajo Area Indian Health Service, Window Rock, Arizona. The performance of this EA update is in accordance with the Scope of Work (SOW) provided by the government and on our Environmental and Survey Services Proposal, dated April 22, 2016.

The structure of this EA update was designed to simplify the review and approval process by the various agencies needed to receive a Findings of No Significant Impact (FONSI) for the subject project. Therefore, each section of this update is organized to reflect the previous EA findings or conclusions with the current findings and conclusions under this update immediately following in italics for comparison purposes. The general format of this update is in accordance with the outline contained within the SOW provided by the government.

## Proposed Action

The proposed action for the subject project is to construct a new health center with staff quarters located in the community of Dilkon, Arizona within the Navajo Nation.

## Project Description

A new health center with approximately 129,232 square feet (sf) and a total of 109 new staff quarter units will be constructed on a tract of land located at the southwest corner of Navajo Routes 15 and 60. The Navajo Tribal Utility Authority (NTUA) will provide water, wastewater with disposal system, natural gas and electricity for the proposed project. Frontier Communication will provide telecommunications. The disposal of solid waste and hazardous medical waste for the new health center will be transported to a state-permitted landfill. A total of 87.84 acres has been set aside by the Dilkon Chapter and surrounding Chapters for the proposed project. The health center would be positioned within a tract of land measuring 43.130 acres and a sewer lagoon within a tract of land measuring 40 acres, with a sewer right-of-way (ROW) connecting the two (2) tracts totaling 4.710 acres.

## Purpose and Need

The new health center will replace the Winslow Indian Health Care Center (WIHCC) as the parent facility for the region. New services to be provided as direct services at the new facility will include a Level III 24 -hour emergency room, podiatry, audiology, 11 short-stay nursing unit beds for low-acute care. The majority of clinical, community health, administrative, and support services currently provided by the WIHCC facility will be provided at the new center. Full-time basic health care services will continue at the existing Leupp Health Center and at WIHCC.

## Location and Vicinity Maps

The location of the proposed health center is shown on the attached United States Geological Survey (USGS) Dilkon, Arizona 7.5-Minute Series Topographic Map (2011) as Figure 1 - Site Location Map and the general land conditions (as of March 1, 2016) for the proposed project areas can be seen on the Google Earth Image Orthophotographic Map attached as Figure 2 - Site Layout Map. A boundary survey with legal description for the proposed project area(s) is included as an attachment to this report.

## Alternatives

Two (2) alternatives were previously proposed for the subject project; Alternative A - No Action, or Alternative B - Proposed Action.

At the present time, these are still the only two (2) alternatives being considered for the subject project. The proposed alternative is Alternative B, which when successful, will help meet the needs in upgrading the health care needs of the Winslow Service Unit (WSU) user population.

## Topography

The proposed project is situated in the Hopi Butte Region. The average altitude of Dilkon, Arizona is 4,849 feet above mean seal level (MSL). The proposed action will not significantly impact the topography of the project area.

There is no apparent change in existing topography which can be seen on the recent photographs obtained on May 16, 2016 and are illustrated in the Photographic Documentation of Site Conditions attached to this update. Minor topographic change will occur within areas of construction due to clearing, grubbing, grading, and storm water BMP installation.

## Climate

The climate for the region is a semi-arid climate with temperatures that range from approximately 89.6 degrees Fahrenheit in the summer to approximately 19.4 degrees in the winter.

There is no apparent change in the climate for the proposed project area.

## Air Quality Impact

No adverse effect to visibility to Class I visibility areas is anticipated due to proposed construction activities. Construction dust would be minimized meeting specifications. No significant impacts to air quality are anticipated.

There are no new recognized or anticipated changes in air quality for the proposed project area.

## Land Resources Impact

The proposed construction would occur within the 109.83 acres of withdrawn land and will not significantly impact the topography of the prosed project area. No significant impact is anticipated upon land resources.

The subject property for the proposed health center tract is currently abandoned and is not being utilized to any extent. The existing ROW for the sewer easement will not result in a change in land use or resource, as will the area of the proposed sewer lagoon. The proposed action alternative will not adversely remove any critical or sensitive lands from being a resource to the local community.

## Water Impacts

The proposed project would not involve dredging or filling activities in any surface water of the United States or jurisdictional wetland regulated under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act. Because this project would disturb an area greater than one (1) acre, a Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) would be required. There is no visible surface water or perceived wetlands at the proposed health center tract or at the sewer lagoon tract. No significant impacts to resources are anticipated.

There is no apparent change in the status of water (surface or groundwater) within the proposed project area.

## Vegetation Impacts

The proposed new construction will cause a permanent loss of vegetation on about two-thirds of the withdrawn land at the proposed project area. The Navajo Nation Department of Fish and Wildlife (NNDFW) issued a Biological Resources Compliance Form (BRCF) 06DHHS01 on January 26, 2016 granting approval to proceed with the proposed project.

As part of this EA update, the NNDFW issued a revised (updated) BRCF on May 18, 2016. A copy of this form (06DHHS01SA) is attached to this report.

## Wildlife Impact

There are no threatened or endangered species known to occur on or near the proposed project areas. The Navajo Nation Department of Fish and Wildlife (NNDFW) issued a Biological Resources Compliance Form (BRCF) 06DHHS01 on January 26, 2016 granting approval to proceed with the proposed project.

As part of this EA update, the NNDFW issued a revised (updated) BRCF on May 18, 2016. A copy of this form (06DHHS01SA) is attached to this report.

## Domestic Livestock Impact

Community stockmen use the proposed sewer lagoon site for grazing of sheep, horses and cattle.
Depending upon the proposed action for the development of the sewer lagoon tract, there may be the loss of grazing area for the previously mentioned use. If a new lagoon is built, some loss of available acreage would occur. If the existing lagoon is brought back online the same grazing area could potentially remain available. However, this is not a recommended practice for sewer lagoon areas. Adequate fending should be in place and maintained to keep all domestic livestock out of contaminated lagoon waters during use.

## Threatened and Endangered Species Impact

There are no threatened or endangered species known to occur on or near the proposed project areas. The Navajo Nation Department of Fish and Wildlife (NNDFW) issued a Biological Resources Compliance Form (BRCF) 06DHHS01 on January 26, 2016 granting approval to proceed with the proposed project.

As part of this EA update, the NNDFW issued a revised (updated) BRCF on May 18, 2016. A copy of this form (06DHHS01SA) is attached to this report.

## Socioeconomic Impact

The Navajo Nation and Dilkon area residents have lower incomes and higher unemployment rates that the U.S. population. Construction of the new health facility will provide employment for the local labor force. The quality of life will be improved for the families in the Dilkon area following the completion of the project. While the project will probably encourage a population growth with people moving into the community for employment at the proposed facility, it is not felt to be a negative impact.

There may also be the existence of short-term employment during the construction phase of the proposed project by the hiring of local, skilled tradesmen and laborers that will also boost the local economy and quality of life.

## Archaeological Impact

The Navajo Nation Archaeological Department (NNAD) - NAU Branch Office conducted a Cultural Resource Inventory (CRI) for the proposed site that is documented in Report No. NNAD - 04-108. A combined total of 109.83 acres of land was surveyed, which included a 43.13 acre site for the health center and staff quarters, a 39.83-acre site for the sewer lagoon, and a 4.71-acre strip of land (ROW) for the sewer line easement, including a 21.99 -acre buffer zone. The survey recorded four (4) sites and three (3) sites were determined to be protected under the Archaeological Resources Protection Act (ARPA) and are eligible for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places (NHRP). NNAD - NAU mitigated Site AZ-0-38-45 and completed all archaeological field work related to report N01246 Data Recovery and Reburial, as documented in a letter dated August 15, 2006. A determination of "no historic properties affected" was recommended for Sites AZ-0-38-46 and AZ-0-43-25. The NNHPD issued a Compliance Letter that provides archaeological clearance for the proposed construction to proceed as planned.

As part of this EA update, the NNHPD issued a revised (updated) CRCF on July 20, 2016. Stipulations concerning site work around cultural sites AZ-O-38-46/AZ-O-38-50, AZ-O-43-25/AZ-O-38-51 are imposed on the subject proposed effort and are listed on the issued CRCF. A copy of this form is attached to this report.

## Tribal Culture Impact

The proposed project will cause a positive impact by enhancing the tribal culture over the current level of cultural events in the community. The health facilities will provide a place to encourage and practice traditional healing ceremonies.

There is no apparent change in the anticipated tribal culture for the proposed project area under the proposed alternative.

## Solid Waste/Hazardous Materials Disposal Impact

The disposal of solid waste and hazardous medical waste for the new health center will be transported to a state-permitted landfill.

There is no apparent change in the proposed handling and disposal of solid waste/hazardous materials for the proposed project area.

## Mitigation Measures

The following mitigation measures are considered to be representative for any project being considered on the Navajo Nation, regardless of the outcome or findings from this EA.

- No travel, parking, or other construction activities shall be allowed outside the construction Right-ofWay.
- The Contractor shall advise all project personnel that archaeological materials, human remains, and other heritage resources may occur hidden by dirt or vegetation in the project area and inform them that they should be alert for these resources. The Contractor shall inform all personnel of the requirement to not collect or disturb any archaeological or cultural remains. Any archaeological artifacts or other heritage resources discovered during construction shall be left intact and undisturbed, all work in the area shall stop immediately, and the Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Department (NNHPD) shall be notified immediately [(928) 871-7148]. Commencement of operations shall be allowed upon clearance by the NNHPD
- If during construction operations any human remains, funerary objects, sacred objects or objects of cultural patrimony as defined in the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (P.L. 101-601; Stat. 3048; 25 U.S.C. 3001) are discovered, the Contractor shall stop operations in the immediate area of the discovery, protect the remains and objects, and immediately notify the Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Department (NNHPD) of the discovery by telephone [(928) 871-7148] with written confirmation. The Contractor shall continue to protect the immediate area of the discovery until notified by the NNHPD that operations may resume.
- Hazardous wastes will not be generated during construction activities. Vehicle maintenance, other than routine lubrication and fueling operations, will be performed off-site at a temporary locked and secured equipment yard to prevent accidental releases of petroleum by-products or other potentially hazardous materials.
- The Navajo Nation Department of Fish and Wildife (NNDFW) highly recommend that project activities avoid the Migratory Bird breeding season of March 1-August 15 or surveys will precede construction activity.

We are please to inform you that all archaeological fieldwork related to Data Recovery has been completed for N01246. On July 26, 2006, excavation was completed on Site $A Z O-38-45$ and the site was backilled. Human remains excavated from four buriats at Site AZ-0-38-45 were also reburied at a location approved by Indian Health ServiceOEHE Excavation of Site AZ-O-38-45 completes the data recovery phase of the project and our attention will now turn to artifact processing, artifact analysis and report writing: In our opinion, the dafa recovery effort undertaken by NNAD-NAU has mitigated adverse effects to the archaeologically significant site within the area of effect proposed by the construction of an IHS Health Clinic in the Dilkon community. We recommend that construction of the clinic, as currently proposed by IHS-OEHE, be allowed to proceed

Data Recovery on Site AZ-O-38-45 was begun on June 26, 2006. Fieldwork was scheduled to take six 4-day sessions, and work was completed ahead of schedule in the allotted amount of time. The crew enjoyed generally good weather, with the exception of a few days of high heat and humidity suffered by the crew.

Site AZ-O-38-45 was a Pueblo II-Late Pueblo II single component occupation. During the data recovery phase, a total of 16 features were identified, although this number may change in the final report as some features are consolidated or dropped. The site consists of several rooms, and a square room that possibly functioned as an informal
kiva, bell-shaped storage pits, thermal (or roasting) features, trash middens, and four human burials. One burial was located in the floor a mealing room, and three burials in midden 1, located at the south end of the site. The burials located in the midden were badly dísturbed by rodent activity, scavengers and natural erosion. As a result, all thiree burials from midden 1 were fragmentary at best, and one burial consists only of the foot bones of one individual. Following excavation of all identified features; the crew supervised mechanical stripping and trenching of the site to locate human remains buried outside of formal features and in areas surrounding burials in the midden. Mechanical stripping and trenching did not reveal any further burials of features. The sile was then backilled and leveled.

Staff archaeologist and osteologist Kimberly Spurr was present to provide basic information on the age, sex and condition of the individual burials in accoidance with the Navajo Jishichaa Policy. On July 26, 2006, the burials from AZ-O-38-45 were reinterred at a location approved by Indian Health Service-OEHE. All burial goods associated with the burials were also reinterred with their associated human remains. The rebuirial location is located in the proposed area of effect and will not be impacted by construction of the clinic, employee housing or thie sewer lagoon. The burial plot was backfilled and leveled to grade.

At this fime work is proceeding on processing the artifacts generated during excavation of the site and this work should be complete by the end of August, 2006, Following artifact processing, lithic and ceramic artifact analysis will be completed by NNAD-NAU staff archaeologists. Botanical samplés will be submitted for analysis as soon as they have been processed and entered into our database. NNAD-NAU cannot finalize the accompanying fechnical report until we have received all resufts from analysis of botanical, faunal and pollen samples that are sent away for analysis, In the interim report write-up describing the findings of the data recovery work effort will continue, but IHS and the locat chapter officials should be aware that construction of the Dilkon:IHS Health Clinic, employee housing and the sewer lagoon are not contingent upon completion of the final data recovery technical report. The report is a contract requirement and deliverable to Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Department, and it is up to NNHPD to determine that the project itself has been the subject of a complete cultural resource investigation, and to grant archaeclogical clearance. NNADANAU will submit a letter report to Ron Maldonado, NNHPD Compliance Manager recommending clearance for construction.

## I. PROPOSED ACTION

## A. Summary of Proposed Action

The Indian Health Service (IHS) under the authority of Public Law 94-437 is proposing the construction of a new health center with staff quarters located in the Navajo Area Indian Health Service (NAIHS) on the Navajo Nation at Dilkon (Navajo County), Arizona to meet the health needs of the population for the Dilkon Service Area (DSA). This Environmental Assessment (EA) Report has been prepared to analyze and document the potential environmental consequences from the construction activities.

## B. Project Description

The Dilkon Health Center (DHC) with approximately 12,006 gross square meters (gsm) and a total of 109 new staff quarter units will be constructed on a tract of land located at the southwest corner of Navajo Routes 15 and 60 in the community of Dilkon, Arizona. The Navajo Tribal Utility Authority (NTUA) will provide water, wastewater with disposal system, natural gas and electricity for the proposed project. In addition, Frontier Communication will provide telecommunications.

Disposal of Solid Waste and Hazardous Medical Waste for the new health facilities will be transported to state - permitted landfills.

## C. Purpose and Need for Action

The new DHC will replace the Winslow Indian Health Care Center (WIHCC) as the parent facility. New services to be provided as direct services at the new DHC include a Level III - 24 hour emergency room, podiatry, audiology, 11 short stay nursing unit beds for low acute care. The majority of clinical, community health, administrative, and support services currently provided by the WIHCC facility will be provided at the new DHC. Full time basic health care services will continue at the existing Leupp Health Center and at WIHCC.

## D. Location

USGS MAP Dilkon Quadrangle 1967; T38N, R19E; in sections 16, 19, 20, 21, and 30; Navajo County, Arizona.

A total of 35.548 hectares ( 87.84 Acres) has been set aside by the Dilkon Chapter and surrounding Chapters in the DSA and a consent for land use has been signed by the land users for construction of the new health facilities (17.454 hectares / 43.130 Acres), the new sewer lagoon ( 16.188 hectares / 40 Acres) and new sanitary sewer easement ( 1.906 hectares / 4.710 Acres).

## II. ALTERNATIVES

In planning the new health facilities to serve the people in the project area, HIS considered two (2) alternatives. In considering the different options, there are various constraints, including environmental, archaeological, technical, and fiscal requirements. A project can be postponed, cancelled, or altered because of any of these constraints.

## A. Alternative A: No Action

This option was to provide families in the DSA with minimal health facilities by maintaining the existing health center in Dilkon, Arizona. The environmental impacts would be minimal since little construction would be undertaken. However, this option would do little to change the present patient care conditions so it was rejected.

## B. Alternative B: Proposed Action

This option will provide a new health care program to meet the needs in the DSA. This option was chosen to aid in the upgrading of the health care for the Winslow Service Unit (WSU) user population. The environmental impacts of this decision are the subjects of this assessment. The approved Project Justification Document (PJD) delineates on the health and technical details of this decision including considerations for Alternate Sources of Health Care.

## III. AFFECTED ENVIRONMENT

## A. Topography

The DSA is situated in the Hopi Butte Region. The average altitude of Dilkon, Arizona is 1,478 meters ( m ) above sea level.

## B. Soils

In accordance with the preliminary soils borings conducted on project site, the subsurface materials encountered across the site include silty sand, medium
dense, non-plastic and moist from surface and down. Sandstone was encountered at a depth of 4.3 m below the ground surface at boring No. $\mathrm{BH}-$ 11 at the sewer lagoon site and groundwater was encountered near the river bed boring No. BH 012 .

## C. Air Quality

The earth moving equipment and increased vehicles will impact the air quality during construction only.

## D. Climate

The climate is semi - arid and temperatures range at approximately 32 degrees Celsius in the summer to approximately minus 7 degrees Celsius in the winter.

## E. Water

The proposed project would not involve dredge or fill activities in any surface water of the U.S. or jurisdictional wetland regulator under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act. Because this construction project would disturb an area greater that one hectare, a Storm Water Protection Pollution Plan (SWPPP). Because no waters of the U.S. or jurisdictional wetland would be affected at the proposed project site, no Section 401 Clean Water Act certification is necessary.

No impact to ground water resources is anticipated to occur either during construction or as result of completion of the proposed Alternative B.

The Navajo Tribal Utility Authority (NTUA) owns and operates the District 7 Potable Water System consisting of three (3) water wells (each with 1,893 liters per minute rate capacity) located in Lower Greasewood, eight (8) storage tanks with a total usable storage of 8,367,600 liters and four (4) boosters. Systems produces an average of $21,280,000$ liters per month. There is no visible surface water at the health center site and the sewer lagoon site.

## F. Vegetation

The proposed project site is located in the upper Sonoran life zone; the major vegetation types of the region are composed of low water use - drought tolerant consisting of greasewood, gram grass, rabbit brush, Russian thistle, snakeweed, narrowleaf yucca, cholla cactus and Mormon tea. The project is not expected to affect any federally listed or significantly impact any tribally listed species or other species of concern.

## G. Wildlife

Animal life known to inhabit the area include coyotes, jackrabbits, cottontail rabbits, lizards, snakes, rodents, crows, and ravens. Continual human activity at the sites precludes occupation by most wild fauna not tolerant of human disturbance.

## H. Domestic Livestock

Community stockmen use the proposed sewer lagoon site for grazing of sheep, horses and cattle.

## I. Threatened and Endangered Species

NAIHS has notified the Navajo Nation Department of Fish 8\% Wildlife - Natural Heritage Program (NNDFW -NHP) of the proposed project and requested a determination of effects upon federally and tribally listed species. NNDFW NHP responded in writing that "The project is not expected to affect any federally listed or significantly impact any tribally listed species of concern. Reference Appendix B.

## J. Archaeological

The Navajo Nation Archaeological Department (NNAD) - NAU Rranch Office conducted a Cultural Resource Inventory for the proposed site that is documented in Report No. NNAD - 04-108. A combined total of 44.448 hectares (ha) tract of land was surveyed, which included a 17.454 ha site for the health center and staff quarters, a 16.188 ha site for the sewer lagoon, and 1.906 ha strip of land for the sewer line easement and a 8.9 ha buffer zone. The survey recorded 4 sites and 3 sites were determined to be protected under the Archaeological Resources Protection Act (ARPA) and are eligible for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places (NHRP). NNAD - NAU mitigated Site AZ-0-38-45 and completed all archaeological field work related to report "NO1246 Data Recovery and Reburial" as documented in letter dated August 15, 2006. Reference Appendix C.

A determination of "no historic properties affected" was recommended for Sites $\mathrm{AZ}-\mathrm{O}-38-46$ and $\mathrm{AZ}-\mathrm{O}-43-25$.

The Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Department (NNHPD) issued a Compliance Letter that provides archaeological clearance for the proposed construction to proceed as planned. Reference Appendix D.

## K. Socioeconomic

Navajo Nation and DSA residents have lower incomes and higher unemployment rates than the U.S. population. Construction of the new facilities will provide employment for the local labor force. The quality of life will be improved for the families in the DSA with the completion of this project. While the project will probably encourage a population growth with people moving into the community of Dilkon for employment at the facilities, it is not felt to be a negative impact.

## IV. ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACTS

## A. Land Resource Impacts

This proposed new construction would occur within the 44.448 ha tract of withdrawn land and will not significantly impact the topography of the project area. No significant impact is anticipated upon land resources.

## B. Air Resources Impacts

No adverse effect to visibility to Class I visibility areas is anticipated due to proposed construction activities. Construction dust would be minimized meeting specifications. No significant impacts to air quality are anticipated.

## C. Water Resources Impacts

There is no wetlands stream channel in the project area. A storm water pollution prevention plan would be developed by the contractor and submitted to Navajo Nation EPA and USEPA. No significant impacts to resources are anticipated.

## D. Biotic Impacts

The proposed new construction will cause a permanent loss of vegetation on about two-thirds of the withdrawn land at the health center site. Buildings, parking, streets, etc. will consume this area. The small unavoidable loss of invertebrates and other animals that are normally associated with earth moving activities will not be significant.

## E. Biological Impacts

No threatened or endangered species are known to occur on or near the project site. Accordingly, without the species or their habitats, there will be no impacts. Native landscaping appropriate to the area would be provided as part of the project.

## F. Archaeological Impacts

There will be no impacts to the archaeological properties as recorded in NNAD NAU Report No. NNAD - 04-1089 recommendations. One site was mitigated and two sites were avoided.

## G. Socioeconomic Impacts

The proposed project would enhance employment and educational opportunities for the demographic population. Socioeconomic impacts will be minimal to the surrounding communities.

## H. Tribal Culture Impacts

The proposed project will cause a positive impact by enhancing the tribal culture over the current level of cultural events in the community. The health facilities will provide a place to encourage and practice for traditional healing ceremonies.

## I. Solid Waste / Hazardous Materials Disposal Impacts

The non - hazardous solid waste and hazardous materials / waste will be controlled, stored, and disposed of as follows: Licensed vendors are used to pickup, transport and disposed of all solid waste at state - permitted landfills off the Navajo Nation land in accordance with respective state regulations. The Concept of Operation for Housekeeping units contains the procedures for the handling, collection and temporary storage of all solid waste and hazardous medical waste, until it is hauled away from the health facilities.

## V. MITIGATING MEASURES

## A. Physical Resources

Construction of the proposed facilities will be in accordance with the established procedures of the IHS. Although IHS projects do not usually create waste materials, any such material resulting from this construction would be limited to soils, rock, and ground cover vegetation and would be disposed of in authorized disposal areas. All construction areas will be cleaned up and graded to conform to the existing landscape. Erosion control structure(s) will be installed and other reclamation measures will be taken, as deemed necessary, in compliance with the "Navajo Land Clearing, Excavation, and Reclamation Stipulations for Right - of - Way over Indian Lands," as these stipulations may apply to this project. Disturbed soils may or may not be reseeded, as deemed necessary.

The project is not expected to affect any federally listed species or significantly impact any tribally listed species or other species of concern.

Potential impacts to wetlands should also be evaluated. The U.S. Fish \& Wildife Service's National Wetlands Inventory (NWI) maps should be examined to determine whether areas classified as wetlands are located close enough to the project site(s) to beimpacted. In cases where the maps are inconclusive (e.g., due to their small scale), field surveys must be completed. For field surveys, wetlands identification and delineation methodology contained in the "Corps of Engineers Wetlands Delineation Manual' (Technical Report Y-87-1) should be used. When wetlands are present, potential impacts must be addressed in an environmental assessment and the Army Corps of Engineers, Phoenix office, must be contacted. SUBJECT: Archaeological sites associated with proposed IHS undertaking in Dilkon, Arizona (IHS NA 04-05-031a)

In July, 2004 members of the Navajo Nation Archaeology Department-Northern Arizona University branch office recorded four archaeological sites during a cultural resources inventory for IHS at Dilkon, Navajo County, Arizona! N ND 04108 The proposed undertaking consisted of an IHS health center and staff housing area, sewer lagoon, and sewer line. The survey was conducted by Neomie Tsosie, with a report submitted by Neomie Tsosie and Davina Two Bears to IHS in January, 2005. Within the project area Ms. Tsosie found or re-located three prehistoric sites that were considered to be significant and eligible for nomination to the National Register. The fourth site, an abandoned historic Navajo camp, was not considered to be eligible for nomination.

On January 18, 2005 Robert Begay, NNAD Director, requested that NNAD-NAU re-visit the sites to get a general idea of their surface nature and extent, and to prepare a "ballpark" estimate of what it might cost to conduct archaeological testing and/or data recovery at the three eligible sites. According to IHS, the sites cannot not be avoided, in which case the effects of the proposed undertaking will have to be mitigated. For prehistoric sites that are Register-eligible, this generally means that the sites must be fully excavated for that portion within the project area. The field visit by NNAD demonstrated that the three prehistoric sites (AZ-O-38-45, AZ-O-38-46 and AZ-O-43-25) are entirely within the project area.

Going on the assumption that the three sites will have to be excavated for the project to proceed, there are two ways that this can be accomplished. The first method would be to conduct a testing program at the three sites and provide IHS with a report on what we found and a cost breakdown on how much the third phase-data recovery-would cost. The second method would combine testing and data recovery into one phase-i.e., we would first trench the site to get an idea of the nature and extent, and then immediately proceed with data recovery. The first method would take somewhat longer but provide a more accurate estimate of data recovery costs; the second method could be executed more quickly but the cost of data recovery would have to be more roughly estimated and negotiated between NNAD and IHS in advance of work. The final report would have to be approved by the Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Department before clearance could be granted.

Based on our field observations of the surface manifestations at each site, Phil and I came up with the following estimates on how much testing and data recovery would cost. The estimates include monies for lab analysis and report production and include all NNAD and tribal fees. I would like to stress that these are preliminary estimates for the purposes of discussion; the actual budget amount will vary to some degree, but it should be reasonably close:

If there is a possibility that one or more sites can be avoided, than considerable cost savings can result. It is also possible that AZ-O-43-25 will not have significant, intact cultural deposits and that the data recovery phase can be eliminated for this site.

There were four (4) sites, five (5) Isolated Occurrences and three (3) In-Use Areas encountered and recorded during survey (Figure 2). All of the cultural resources have been evaluated for significance. 3 of the 4 sites are protected under the Archaeological Resources Protection Act (ARPA), and are eligible for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP). 3 of the 4 sites are protected under the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA). The remaining cultural resources are not protected under the NRHP, ARPA, and NAGPRA. All cultural resources are not protected under AIRFA. A determination of "no historic properties affected" is recommended for the proposed IHS undertaking, provided that the stipulations in Table 6 are met. The Site Forms for Sites AZ-O-38-45, AZ-O-38-46, AZ-O-38-47 and AZ-O-43-25 are appended to this report (Appendix A, page A-1).

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## Introduction

This cultural resources inventory NNAD-04-108 (I.H.S. NA-04-05-031a) consists of an archaeological survey and ethnographic interviewing for the construction of sewer lines, sewer lagoon, a health center and staff housing. The Indian Health Service (IHS) proposes to construct a health center and staff housing, and a sewer lagoon with a $2,051.0 \mathrm{~m}(6,729.0 \mathrm{ft})$ long easement to connect the two sites. The project was requested and funded by the Navajo Area Indian Health Service and completed by the Navajo Nation Archaeology Department, Northern Arizona University Branch Office (NNAD-NAU), Flagstaff, Arizona. The project area is located on Navajo Tribal Trust Lands and is within the vicinity of the Fort Defiance Agency. Neomie Tsosie, NNAD-NAU staff archaeologist, was in charge of the project. Fieldwork was conducted in four days, July 20, 21, 23 and 26, 2004. The purpose of the survey was to locate and record cultural resources within the project location and provide management recommendations. There were four newly recorded sites, five Isolated Occurrences and three In-Use Areas encountered during survey. The NNAD performs archaeological surveys on Navajo Nation land under the authorization of the Navajo Nation Cultural Resources Protection Act (CMY 19 88). The lead federal agency for this undertaking is the Indian Health Service.

## Description of Undertaking

The Indian Health Service (IHS) proposes to construct a health center and staff housing on a 17.6 ha ( 43.0 ac) site and a new sewer lagoon on a $16.2 \mathrm{ha}(40 \mathrm{ac})$ site, in addition to a new sewer line $2,051.0 \mathrm{~m}(6,729.0 \mathrm{ft})$ long by $9.1 \mathrm{~m}(30.0 \mathrm{ft})$ wide to connect the two project areas. The sewer line ROW total is $1.9 \mathrm{ha}(4.74 \mathrm{ac})$. All of these activities will involve extensive ground-disturbing activities, including trenching and surface blading. The IHS requires a $9.1 \mathrm{~m}(30.0 \mathrm{ft})$ Right-of-Way (ROW) for the construction of the sewer line. The total area of effect for the health center and staff housing, sewer lagoon and sewer line is $35.5 \mathrm{ha}(87.74 \mathrm{ac})$. The area of effect equals the two project areas plus the sewer line length times the I.H.S. ROW. This project will provide needed facilities to meet the health and related demands of the growing community of Dilkon, Arizona.

## Location

The proposed construction site for the health center and staff housing, sewer lagoon and sewer line that make up the project area are located on Navajo Tribal Trust Land within the Dilkon Chapter and Fort Defiance Agency, Navajo County, Arizona. The project area is located on the following 7.5 Minute USGS Topographic maps: Dilkon Quadrangle 1967 and French Butte Quadrangle 1967; in Township 23 North, Range 19 East; in Sections $16,19,20,21$, and 30 . Figure 1 depicts the general location of the project area. Figure 2 depicts the specific location of the project area.

## Area Environmental and Cultural Setting

The project consists of three proposed construction areas that are located in the vicinity of Dilkon, Navajo County, Arizona (Figures 1 and 2), which is topographically located primarily within the Hopi Buttes. Soils are alluvial and eolian sand intermixed with basalt and chert gravels eroding out of the Wingate Sandstone Formation. The nearest permanent drainage to the proposed health center is Coyote Wash, which is located approximately .1 km $(.06 \mathrm{mi})$ south. The landscape consists of low, broad mesas, wide valleys, volcanic cinder cones, rolling desert grasslands, sand dunes and hills. Animals observed include cattle, birds, various lizards and sheep. Elevation ranges from $1,792 \mathrm{~m}(5,880 \mathrm{ft})$ to $1,756 \mathrm{~m}(5,760 \mathrm{ft})$. The geology and rainfall yields a biotic community that can be characterized as Plains and Great Basin Grassland. Common plants are Greasewood (Díwózhiishzhiin), Grama grass ( $T l$ 'oh nástasi), rabbit brush ( $K$ 'itiltsoi nistaaigíi), snakeweed (Ch'il diilyésiitsoh), narrowleaf yucca (Tsá'ászi'ts'óóz), Russian thistle (Ch'il deenini), cholla cactus (Hosh ditsahiitsoh), and Mormon tea (Tf'oh azihii tibáhigil).

In general, Dilkon can be characterized as a rural setting with scattered and clustered homes comprised of extended family groups. In-use structures might include two or more homes, a Hogan, shed, ramada and corral. Major development in the area consists of subterranean waterline systems, Navajo Housing Authority housing developments, the Dilkon Bashas Shopping Center, privately owned gas stations and the Dilkon School Complex. These areas of development also include the ongoing improvement and maintenance of dirt roads used by local residents and bus routes. Typically livestock roads and nearby homestead activity have heavily impacted the proposed project area.

## Existing Data Review

Prior to fieldwork, a records check was conducted for previous archaeological surveys and sites recorded within $152.4 \mathrm{~m}(500 \mathrm{ft})$ of the proposed project area (Table 1). The records check revealed that nine previous archaeological surveys were conducted with four sites recorded within $152.4 \mathrm{~m}(500 \mathrm{ft})$ of NNAD 04-108. The following is a brief summary of the culture history of the legally withdrawn land for the proposed health center, staff housing area. This data review highlights and explains some aspects of the archaeology and material culture encountered during the cultural resources inventory. The framework is sttuctured and presented from research by L. Theodore Neff (2002), Miranda Warburton (1991) and George Gumerman (1988). L. Theodore Neff's archaeological survey took place in the vicinity of southeastern Hopi Buttes, while George Gumerman's survey and excavation took place in the southwestern Hopi Buttes. Both Miranda Warburton and L. Theodore Neff present technical reports for surveys done in the Indian Wells and Hopi Buttes area, which are immediately northeast of the Dilkon area.

Archaic (ca. 5550-500 B.C.): It has been argued that there is no evidence of occupation during the Archaic period in extant literature about the prehistory of the area. However, one Pinto-San Jose type projectile point has been recorded in the Hopi Buttes area, which dates to the Middle to Late Archaic period (ca. 5600-2900 B.C.) (Neff 2002:27). According to Neff, the discovery of this projectile point is the first observed evidence of Archaic period occupation in the Hopi Buttes area (2002: 27-29). The Archaic period, in general, was eventually brought to a close by an increased dependence on cultivated crops.

Basketmaker II (ca. A.D. 100-500): Although there has been extensive research on Basketmaker sites in areas near Navajo Mountain (for Navajo Moutain N16 Road Project) and Black Mesa (for the Black Mesa Archaeological Project), there has been little documentation of Basketmaker sites in general, in the Hopi Buttes area. According to Gumerman, only one Basketmaker II site is known to have been excavated in Hopi Buttes, but the findings of this excavation are unreported (Gumerman 1988:178).

Basketmaker III (ca. A.D. 500-800): Sites excavated by Gumerman in the Hopi Buttes area indicate interaction between Kayenta Branch Anasazi and those occupying this area. During this period, the Southwest as a region became a more culturally distinct area from those of Mesoamerica, the Plains and Great Basin. Agriculture and sedintism became increasingly frequent modes of subsistence and pit structures became more prominent forms of architecture. Manufacture of brown and gray wares is introduced and the Anasazi, Mimbres/Mogollon and Hohokam became distinct cultural groups.

Pueblo I (ca. A.D. 750-900): Gumerman notes that pithouse architecture from this period exhibits both Anasazi and Mogollon characteristics (1988:181). Anasazi architectural markers for pithouses are described as "(1) an encircling bench, (2) a ventilator shaft (in one case a ventilator shaft with dual opening), and (3) low mud ridges dividing the floor into unequal sections" (Gumerman 1988:181). Additional evidence of an Anasazi influence at these sites includes a burial of adult human remains and Tusayan white ware ceramics (Gumerman 1988-181). Mogollon architectural markers from pithouses include a "ramp entry or a short, wide entry area with a rather amorphous shape" (Gumerman 1988:181). Gumerman cites additional evidence of Mogollon influence at Hopi Buttes PI sites including cremation burials, paddle and anvil brown ware ceramics, and shell bracelets (1988:181).

Pueblo II (A.D. 950-1050)-III (A.D. 1100-1200/1250): Around Indian Wells, higher water levels and high precipitation accommodated an increase in population. Architectural features associated with this period include pithouses, roomblocks, plazas, kivas and Great Kivas, with ceramic assemblages reflecting a link between the Winslow Branch and the Kayenta Branch and Sinagua (Warburton 1991:32). Population peak in the area southeast of Hopi Buttes peaks around A.D. 1050 and continues beyond A.D. 1300 (Neff 2002:29).

Pueblo IV (A.D. 1300-1600): Gumerman identifies severe environmental changes as the primary cause of a small presence of PIV sites in the Hopi Buttes area. Following this period of climatic change, "the people of the Hopi Buttes area moved to the Hopi Mesas and large pueblos along the Little Colorado river." According to Gumerman, at this time "the parochial nature of the Winslow Branch people broke down, and they began participating in the much larger social and economic network then in operation" (Gumerman 1988:200).

The current explanation and interpretation of Navajo occupation of the Southwest from an Anglo ethnohistorical and archaeological approach puts the Navajo in this region by 1600 A.D., possibly earlier. Navajo traditional oral history presents a different account of how Navajos were introduced into this landscape.

The following is a synthesis derived from a chronology of Navajo origins compiled by Robert Begay (2003:50-55). According to the Navajo Creation Story, the ancestral Navajos emerged into the Glittering World, after this emergence the Navajo Holy People created Dinetah, or "Navajoland". Monsters prey on the Navajo until Changing Woman gives birth to twin brothers, Monster Slayer and Born for Water, who then kill off the Monsters. Navajo are "remade" by Changing Woman who also creates the first 4 clans at this time. The Navajos, who made
up these first 4 clans, then disperse throughout Navajoland to live and prosper in keeping with Navajo traditions and religion.

Today, Navajo livestock homesteads, a Basha's Shopping Center, several gas stations and convenience stores, and the small community of Dilkon characterize the cultural setting of the area. In the NNAD 04-108 project area specifically, livestock grazing and small plot agriculture farming typify current Navajo land use.

## Field Methods

Neomie Tsosie, from NNAD-NAU, conducted fieldwork for this project on July 20, 21, 23 and 26, 2004. The survey was conducted as a $100 \%$ Class III parallel pedestrian survey of the proposed project areas, as well as the buffer zones for the Health Center, sewer lagoon, and sewer line. For I.H.S. projects NNAD routinely adds a $10.6 \mathrm{~m}(35 \mathrm{ft})$ buffer zone to each side of the ROW for a total survey swath of $30 \mathrm{~m}(100 \mathrm{ft})$. The area surveyed for the sewer line is the total length multiplied by the survey swath or $6.25 \mathrm{ha}(15.4 \mathrm{ac})$. NNAD also adds a $15 \mathrm{~m}(50$ $\mathrm{ft})$ cultural buffer zone around I.H.S. project areas, or the health center and sewer lagoon tracts. The total area surveyed is therefore 43.25 ha ( 106.81 ac ).

The cultural resources inventory entailed recording and mapping identified archaeological sites and Isolated Occurrences, and conducting interviews to obtain information on Traditional Cultural Properties (Table 4). When artifacts or features were located during the survey, the surrounding area was inspected to determine the nature of the cultural resources encountered. Archaeological sites were recorded by noting the type, number and distribution of artifacts present, describing any architectural remains or other features, and mapping the site via compass and pace technique. An attempt was made to visit every home located near the proposed project areas; however, in some cases no one was present at the home. Interviews concerning Traditional Cultural Properties (TCPs) were conducted by Neomie Tsosie in English with local residents. Specific TCP concerns include traditional plant/herb gathering areas, sacred places, and human burials that might be affected by the proposed IHS project. All Points-of-Intersections (PIs) along the proposed sewer line were marked with wooden laths prior to the day of survey. IHS personnel, who assisted in this process, was Rod Begay, Project Manager, Navajo Area Indian Health Service.

Environmental data for the site location was also recorded, including vegetation, topography and soil type. The site and Isolated Occurrences are plotted on the Dilkon Quadrangle 1967 and French Butte Quadrangle 1967 7.5 Minute USGS Topographic maps (Figure 2). A Garmin 12XL GPS unit was used to establish the position of the sites and IOs. The site forms and maps for Sites AZ-O-38-45, AZ-O-38-46, AZ-O-38-47 and AZ-O-43-25 are presented in Appendix A (p. A-1).

## Cultural Resource Findings

There were four recorded sites, five Isolated Occurrences and three In-Use Areas encountered during survey (Figure 2). The site forms for sites AZ-O-38-45 (p. A-2), AZ-O-38-46 (p.A-4), AZ-O-38-47 (p.A-6) and AZ-O-43-25 (p.A-8) are appended to this report in Appendix A (p. A-1), and site maps are depicted in Figures 3, 4, 5 and 6. All of the cultural resources have been evaluated for significance.

## Recorded Sites

Four sites, AZ-O-38-45, AZ-O-38-46, AZ-O-38-47 and AZ-O-43-25, were discovered during survey for project NNAD 04-108. The sites are described and illustrated below and the complete Site Forms and one Site Update Form for AZ-O-38-45 are provided in Appendix A (p. A-1). Evaluations and recommendations are presented in a later section of the text. Table 2 gives the legal location and UTM coordinates for the recorded sites.

Vegetation consists of Grama grass (Tl'oh nástasi), snakeweed (Ch'il dillyésiitsoh), narrowleaf yucca (Tsá'ászi'ts 'óóz), Russian thistle (Ch'il deenini), cholla cactus (Hosh ditsahiitsoh), rabbit brush ( $K^{\prime}$ 'iiltsoí nistaaigí) and Mormon tea (Tf'oh azihii tibáhigí). The nearest permanent drainage is Coyote Wash located approximately $.4 \mathrm{~km}(.2 \mathrm{mi})$ south of the site.

## Dimensions of the Site: $75 \mathrm{~m} \times 50 \mathrm{~m}$

Site Type: PII-PIII Ceramic and Artifact Scatter
Site Description: The site is a moderately dense artifact scatter containing ceramic and lithic artifacts. The artifacts are eroding out of a sand dune. Ceramic types present include Walnut Black-on-white, Tusayan Corrugated Gray ware, Padre Black-on-white, Sosi Black-on-white, Black Mesa Black-on-white and an unknown decorated Tusayan and Little Colorado White Wares. Part of a miniature Little Colorado White Ware Black-on-white pot was also noted, possibly Walnut Black-on-white. Other notable ceramic artifacts included a segment of a spindle whorl, made from a Holbrook A Black-on-white jar sherd. Lithic artifacts were primarily core reduction flakes made primarily from basalt with some made of white chert, purple chert and pinkish-gray chert. No lithic tools or groundstone were observed. Erosion and livestock trampling are the primary causes of disturbance. The site is located in the northeast central portion of the proposed project area for the IHS Sewer Lagoon.

Gray Ware jar sherds. Artifact Concentration 2 contains approximately 20 basalt and white chert core reduction flakes, 15-20 unidentified Black-on-white Tusayan White Ware jar sherds, Tusayan Corrugated Gray Ware jar sherds, and unidentified Tusayan Gray Ware jar sherds. Feature 1 is a hearth approximately 1 m in diameter. The hearth contains ash-stained soil but no pieces of charcoal or burned material. Erosion, flooding, and livestock trampling are the primary sources of disturbance. The site is located at the southwest central edge of the proposed project area for the IHS Sewer Lagoon, approximately $80 \mathrm{~m}(260 \mathrm{ft})$ from the southeast edge of the proposed Sewer Lagoon.

## Isolated Occurrences

A total of five Isolated Occurrences (IOs) were encountered and recorded during the NNAD 04-108 survey Table 3 presents the Legal Description, UTM Coordinates, Description and 7.5 Minute USGS Topographic Map Reference for the IOs. Figure 2 depicts the location of all the IOs.

## Traditional Cultural Properties

Fieldwork for this project included conducting ethnographic interviews to obtain information on Traditional Cultural Properties (TCPs) and other concerns the local residents might have in the project area. Interviews were conducted in English by Neomie Tsosie during survey. Questions were specifically asked about knowledge of traditional herbs/plant gathering areas, sacred places, or burials that might be affected by the proposed IHS Health Center, Sewer Lagoon and Sewerline project within or near the project area. An attempt was made to visit every home that would be affected by the proposed undertaking; however, in some cases no one was home. Two individuals were available for and participated in the TCP interviews. The two participants provided a complete account of the project area regarding TCPs. No TCPs were identified within the project area by these two consultants. See Table 4 for the results of the TCP interviews and the dates of the interviews.

## In-Use Areas

Table 4 provides a brief description of the three In-Use Areas encountered within the project area surveyed. Currently In-Use Areas were simply noted and not fully recorded during this project, in keeping with the Navajo Nation policy to protect the privacy of property rights of its people.

## Evaluation of Significance

Table 5 summarizes the eligibility of Sites AZ-O-38-45, AZ-O-38-46, AZ-O-38-47 and AZ-O-43-25 recorded during survey for NNAD 04-108. Although site AZ-O-38-45, was originally thought to be either site NA 10576 or NA10757, which were excavated in 1973 by Charles D. James III (James III 1973; Trott and Mc Pherson 1985) of the Museum of Northern Arizona (MNA), upon examining site maps and records at MNA, it was determined that both sites are located approximately $400 \mathrm{~m}(1,312 \mathrm{ft})$ outside of the project area. NA9339 was also recorded by MNA, but it is located approximately $80 \mathrm{~m}(\mathrm{ft})$ outside of the project boundary, however, it is unclear from MNA records what project this site was recorded under, and/or if it was excavated. Therefore, site AZ-O-38-45 remains significant and eligible for nomination for protection under the NRHP, as it meets the 50 year guideline and contains the potential to contribute to knowledge about southwest ancient people. AZ-O-$38-45$ is protected under ARPA, since the site is more than 100 years old and is of scientific interest. AZ-O-3845 is not of religious significance to extant Native Americans, therefore it is not protected under AIRFA. However, the site AZ-O-38-45 is eligible for protection under NAGPRA, as it may contain human remains

The sites AZ-O-38-46 and AZ-O-43-25 are protected under the Archaeological Resources Protection Act (ARPA), because they meet the 100-year guideline and are of scientific interest. Sites AZ-O-38-46 and AZ-O-43-25 are also eligible for protection under the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP), as they meet the 50 year guideline and contain the potential to contribute to knowledge about southwest ancient people. Sites AZ-O-38-46 and AZ-O-43-25 are not, however, protected under AIRFA, because they are currently not of religious significance to extant Native Americans. The sites, AZ-O-38-46 and AZ-O-43-25, are however eligible for protection under the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA), because they may contain human remains.
. Site AZ-O-38-47 is not eligible for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP), nor does it qualify for protection under ARPA, as it is less than 50 years old. The site contains a Hogan depression. A Hogan is the traditional Navajo habitation structure. It has been well documented that in addition to housing Navajos, sacred Navajo ceremonies are often conducted within the Hogans of Navajo practitioners and their patients. Also, it is a common practice to bless Hogans before they are inhabited, making Hogans a sacred place to Navajos. Although the Hogan may have been blessed in the Navajo tradition, and therefore eligible for protection under AIRFA, none of the homeowners expressed concerns regarding the proposed construction activities and the Hogan depression. Given this information and the fact that the Hogan is dismantled, site AZ-O-38-47 is not protected under AIRFA.

The Isolated Occurrences lack integrity, significance and potential for scientific research, beyond recording for this project. Thus, they are not eligible for nomination to the NRHP, nor do they merit protection under ARPA. None of the IOs have known religious or ceremonial significance to extant Native Americans and thus do not warrant consideration under AIRFA. They are not protected under NAGPRA.

Although some of the three In-Use Areas (IUAs) are likely to have been blessed in the Navajo tradition and are eligible for consideration under AIRFA, none of the homeowners expressed concerns regarding the proposed construction activities. Since the IUAs were constructed within the past 10-30 years, the three IUAs are not eligible for nomination to the NRHP, nor do they merit protection under ARPA. They are not protected under NAGPRA.

## Recommendations

Specific guidelines for avoiding sites within the project area are outlined in Table 6. There were four (4) sites, five (5) Isolated Occurrences and three (3) In-Use Areas encountered and recorded during survey (Figure 2). All of the cultural resources have been evaluated for significance. 3 of the 4 sites are protected under ARPA, and are eligible for nomination to the NRHP. 3 of the 4 sites are protected under NAGPRA. The remaining cultural resources are not protected under the NRHP, ARPA, and NAGPRA. All cultural resources are not protected under AIRFA. A determination of "no historic properties affected" is recommended for the proposed IHS undertaking, provided that the stipulations in Table 6 are met. The Site Forms for Sites AZ-O-38-45, AZ-O-38-46, AZ-O-38-47 and AZ-O-43-25 are appended to this report (Appendix A).

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## Appendix B

Proposed Guidelines for Treatment of Discovery Situations

In all discovery situations the existing ground surface in the vicinity of the discovery will be mapped to show the relationship of the discovery to the project area, topographic features, cultural features, and surface artifacts. The map will be prepared using, at a minimum, a compass and measuring tape; at the option of the archaeologist, a transit, a plane table and alidade, or other surveying equipment may be used. Beyond that, specific types of features will be treated as follows.

ASH STAIN: The location will be mapped, the feature will be profiled and photographed, and charcoal fragments will be collected for radiocarbon dating. If it appears that the feature can be dated through radiocarbon analysis, artifacts, or stratigraphy, and if the ash stain is dense enough and dark enough to be likely to yield botanical remains, pollen and flotation samples will be collected and analyzed. At the discretion of the archaeologist, in consultation with the NNHPO, radiocarbon samples will be analyzed.

HEARTHS: The location will be mapped, and the feature will be profiled and photographed, and charcoal fragments will be collected for radiocarbon dating. If it appears that the feature can be dated through radiocarbon analysis, archaeomagnetism, artifacts, or stratigraphy, and if the ash stain is dense enough and dark enough, to be likely to yield botanical remains, a flotation sample will be collected and analyzed. Since burning destroys pollen, no pollen samples will be taken from hearths. At the discretion of the archaeologist, in consultation with NNHPO, radiocarbon samples will be analyzed.
MIDDENS: The location will be mapped, and the feature will be profiled and photographed. Charcoal fragments will be collected for radiocarbon dating. Pollen and flotation samples will be collected and analyzed. If natural stratigraphy is present in middens, samples will be collected according to natural stratigraphy, not from arbitrary levels. In order to recover data on the stratification of artifacts in the midden, at least one $1-$ by $1-\mathrm{m}$ column, located immediately adjacent to the area disturbed by construction, will be hand excavated in levels no greater than 10 cm thick, and all excavated fill will be screened through mesh no larger than $1 / 4$ inch. Auger holes will be placed every 2.5 to 5.0 m along the unexcavated portion of the right-of-way for a sufficient distance to define the boundary of the midden and ascertain whether or not additional features are present. Because middens are generally associated with substantial occupations and other features, consultation with the NNHPO, the BIA, and the SHPO will be required after the initial recording has been completed.

## PIT HOUSES AND BURIED SURFACE STRUCTURES (PUEBLOS AND FIELD HOUSES): The

 location will be mapped and the feature exposure will be profiled and photographed. Charcoal fragments and any wood samples will be collected for radiocarbon dendrochronological analysis. Charcoal and wood samples of adequate size and quality will be submitted for dendrochronological analysis; charcoal will be radiologically analyzed only if the feature cannot be dated by other means. Pollen and flotation samples will be taken from the floor, subfloor pits, hearths, and other appropriate contexts, and will be analyzed.Auger holes will be placed every 1.5 to 5.0 m along the unexcavated portion of the right-of-way for a sufficient distance to define the boundary of the feature and ascertain whether or not additional features are present. Because dwellings usually yield substantial amounts of significant information, and because they are usually associated with other features, consultation with the NNHPO, the BIA, and the SHPO will be required after the initial record has been completed. In general, however, additional excavation of these types of features (beyond the initial recording described above) will occur only if the feature is likely to sustain additional damage from erosion, additional construction, or maintenance.

PREHISTORIC BURIALS: Prehistoric burials will be completely excavated, mapped, profiled, and photographed. Charcoal, pollen, and flotation samples will be collected as appropriate from the burials and associated artifact and features. Charcoal will be submitted for analysis if the burial cannot be dated by other means. Pollen and flotation samples will be analyzed, along with skeletal remains and artifacts.

HISTORIC AND UNDATED GRAVES: The Navajo Nation burial policy will be followed in these cases.
Except for items associated with burials and graves, all materials recovered from discovery situations will be curated by the NNAD for the Navajo Tribal Museum. Human remains and grave goods will be treated in accordance with the Navajo Nation policy on burials and human remains.

The Navajo Nation Environmental Protection Agency's Public Water Systems Supervision Program and the Domestic Wastewater Program reviewed Document No. 12027, United States Public Health Service, Land Lease for the proposed Dilkon Health Center in Dilkon, Arizona. With new waterline projects that intertie Dilkon to the Leupp Chapter, this project may have sufficient water supply. PWSSP recommends approval of this document.

All proposed drinking water projects will need to be permitted by the PWSSP-NNEPA. All proposed drinking water projects (extensions, upgrades, new wells, new public water systems, etc.) must also comply with the design review and construction permit requirements of the PWSSP pursuant $\$ \$ 1501$ and 1601 of the Navajo Nation Primary Drinking Water Regulations.

All health clinics are being built with treatment centers to purify the water for dialysis centers. The treatment is considered to be a consecutive public water system and will need to an operating permit.

All proposed wastewater projects will need to be permitted by the Domestic Wastewater Program-NNEPA. Extensions, upgrades, new sewer infrastructure, septic tanks, and other wastewater infrastructure must comply with the design review and construction permit requirements pursuant to $\$ 201$ of the Domestic Wastewater Program.

As with any action of government however, it can be subject to review by the courts in the event of proper challenge.

Nevertheless, "the Speaker of the Navajo Nation Council shall introduce [the proposed resolution] into the legislative process by assigning it to the respective oversight committee (s) of the Navajo Nation Council having authority over the matters for proper consideration." 2 N.N.C. §164(A)(5).
