RESOLUTION OF THE RESOURCES AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE Of the 23rd Navajo Nation Council---First Year 2015

AN ACTION

RELATING TO RESOURCES AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE; APPROVING BUDGET MODIFICATION IN THE AMOUNT OF \$1,997,849 WITHIN THE NAVAJO NATION ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY SUPERFUND HAZARDOUS SUBSTANCE FUND - SPECIAL REVENUE BUDGET UNIT NO. 511007

BE IT ENACTED.

Section One. Findings

- A. The Hazardous Substance Fund-Special Revenue Fund was established pursuant to 4 N.N.C. §2701 to fund the activities of the Navajo Superfund Program in the administration, implementation and enforcement of the Navajo Nation Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act.
- B. The Resources and Development Committee was designated the legislative oversight committee for the Hazardous Substance Fund. BFJA-09-11.
- C. The funds will be used to construct a building for staff of the Navajo Superfund Program and the Resources Conservation Recovery Program. Both programs work under the Navajo Nation Environmental Protection Agency Waste Regulatory Compliance Department. The building currently being used is dilapidated and is not large enough to house the staff. The budget is \$1,997,849 and attached as Exhibit A.
- D. A memorandum dated June 11, 2015 from the Environmental Program Supervisor of the Navajo Nation Environmental Program states that \$551,790 of the \$1,997,849 is from the United States Environmental Protection Agency and must be encumbered before the end of the Fiscal Year 2015. The June 11, 2015 memorandum is attached as Exhibit D.

- E. Pursuant to the May 22, 2015 memorandum from the Office of the Controller, attached hereto as Exhibit B, there are sufficient funds in the Hazardous Substance Fund-Special Revenue Fund to provide for the requested allocation.
- F. The Office of Management and Budget has reviewed the request for a revised special revenue fund allocation. Attached as Exhibit C is the May 28, 2015 memorandum from the Office of Management and Budget.
- G. It is in the best interest of the Navajo Nation to approve this budget modification in the amount of \$1,997,849.

Section Two. Approval

The Navajo Nation hereby approves the budget modification in the amount of \$1,997,849 within the Navajo Nation Environmental Protection Agency Superfund Hazardous Substance Fund-Special Revenue Budget Unit No. 511007 as set forth in the budget documents hereto attached as Exhibit A.


NAVAJO NATION EPA VISION:

The Resource Conservation & Recovery program and Navajo Superfund program are two programs under the Waste Regulatory Compliance Department of Navajo Nation Environmental Protection Agency that require an office building to better consolidate all Waste Regulatory Compliance Department ("WRCD") staff.

The Programs are housed in two separate locations within Window Rock and St. Michaels, Arizona. The WRCD is housed with the Underground Storage Tank program and the Leaking Underground Storage Tank program next door to the land withdrawn for the proposed office building.

An effort to coordinate a new office building with the U. S. Department of Environmental Protection Agency, Superfund Division has been in the works since 2012. The intention was to utilize funding made available through litigation from the Tronox Suit but we learned within the past month of May 2014 that this funding is not available as projected for a majority of the funding. Initially, Resource Conservation & Recovery program was to provide 18% of the final cost but after funding shortfalls, the program now has to satisfy 57% of the total cost projected by the Navajo Nation Design & Engineering.

The Navajo Superfund program did initiate and establish the land withdrawal for the office building, and infrastructure is proving that a lot of ground work is necessary to facility the correct structuring of waterlines, powerlines, sewage and ground work for the weight of the building as the intended area. A not to scale rendition of the location of the construction area is provided in the photograph below showing the Waste Regulatory Compliance Department building next door, and northwest of the Window Rock Training Center, Window Rock, Arizona. A goal of Navajo Nation EPA is to have adequate office space for all staff.

PROPOSAL TYPE:

SCOPE OF WORK, BUDGET

The Resource Conservation & Recovery Program ("RCRP"), Waste Regulatory Compliance Department, Navajo Nation Environmental Protection Agency, is a generally funded program with a current 2014 budget of \$238,401.50 that covers personnel, fleet, travel, supplies, operating, telephone, training, and insurance.

Whereby, USEPA is allowing \$337,000.00 and \$175,000.00 from their cost share to pay for a new building but if the RCRP staff is to also share this building, additional funding would be needed at a cost share of \$748,000.00. RCRP does not have this amount to put forward.

The Superfund Program has taken steps within this fiscal year in acquiring building cost and has completed the land acquisition that is located near the current Window Rock Training Center and the current Waste Regulatory Compliance building. The land acquisition is attached. The U. S. Environmental Protection Agency, Region 9 Superfund has projected their cost-share portion to be \$337,000.00 and \$175,000.00 as of June 25, 2014. This total cost is \$552,000.00 of the approximately \$1,300,000.00. Additional funds, \$650,000, from the NN Superfund Special Revenue have been acquired to assist in obtaining funds for the estimate attached quote.

The adjusted amount for request is \$748,000.00 from the Capital Improvement Project funds so this building can be cost shared to accommodate a staff of three from the Resource Conservation & Recovery program and 10 staff from Navajo Superfund with additional space for the Uranium Commission which is being developed. With added funds of \$650,000, there remains a need of \$349,849 to meet the quote of \$2,299,849 that can be shown on application dated 7/30/14.

All Programs of the Navajo Nation Environmental Protection Agency cover any of the 110 Navajo Chapter governments, and travel outside the Navajo Nation as approved for supporting matters related to work activities of the Navajo and its people.





I. Resource Conservation & Recovery Program:

It is the responsibility of the Resource Conservation & Recovery Program (RCRP) to ensure compliance with the Navajo Nation Solid Waste Act ("Act") and regulations. The Program provides an effective and integrated approach to facilitate civil enforcement for solid waste on the Navajo Nation through Notice of Violations for responsible parties who violate the Act.

Illegal Dumping Enforcement Initiative:

NNEPA-RCRP's illegal dumping enforcement initiative and overall goals are to:

- * Reduce and prevent illegal dumping activity on the Navajo Nation.
- * Raise awareness of the reservation's illegal dumping problem.
- * Promote proper solid waste management with the Division of Community Development, Solid Waste Management Program.

In addressing the illegal dumping problem, RCRP utilizes both administrative and judicial enforcement as authorized under the Navajo Nation Solid Waste Act. However, without public education supplementing the enforcement effort, the initiative will be ineffective and nonproductive.

Transfer Stations

The Navajo Nation Division of Community Development, Solid Waste Management Program has provided infrastructure for the Navajo Nation in establishing Transfer stations and/or convenience centers where individuals can dispose of their solid waste. This solid waste is collected and transported to a certified handling or disposal facility. The Solid Waste Management Program continues to work with Navajo Chapters.

NNEPA-RCRP developed a recycling list to assist Navajo Nation residents other means in recycling waste. Solid Waste Management Program also maintains a recycling list.

Transfer stations are located at several chapter houses on the Navajo Nation, however, not all 110 chapters have transfer stations.

In accordance with the Navajo Nation Solid Waste Regulations - What constitutes a legal landfill?

A legal landfill complies with the following requirements:

- Installation of methane gas and ground water monitoring systems
- * Leachate collection
- * Installation of a non-permable liner
- * Daily cover
- * Financial assurance

A sanitary landfill of this caliber is very expensive to build and maintain.

Currently, there is no legal landfill on the Navajo Nation. Please do no bury solid waste, this would be violation of the Act.

Open dumps on the Navajo Nation

The USEPA and the NNEPA completed an open dumpsite inventory in 1995, and catalogued 465 large open dump sites on the reservation, from ½-acre to 10 acres. After being provided a Notice of Violation, responsible person(s) clean up a dumpsite that is smaller than ½-acre in size. The large open dumpsites are closed by the Solid Waste Management Program once appropriate funding is received which is part of infrastructure.

Compliance with the Act for open dumping affects the following Sections:

Section 201: Disposal. No person shall:

- * Dispose of any solid waste in a manner that will harm the environment, endanger the public health, safety and welfare or create a public nuisance.
- * Dispose of any solid waste in a place other than a facility which is in compliance with these (Solid Waste) Regulations and other applicable laws.
- * Dispose of any waste not defined as Solid Waste in a solid waste landfill facility.

Section 204: Open Dumping:

* All open dumping shall be prohibited.

ILLEGAL DUMPING IS SUBJECT TO VARIOUS FINES AND PENALITIES

Responsible parties issued a Notice of Violation from evidence or eye-witness accounts who are caught illegally disposing of their solid waste within the boundaries of the Navajo Nation. The consequences would be:

- * Look forward to cleaning up the site.
- Picking up waste litter along the roadways.

Either of the above mentioned.

Penalties:

- Civil penalties in the amount of \$500.00 per day per violation not to exceed \$25,000.00; and
- Criminal penalties in the amount of \$500.00 per day per violation not to exceed \$5,000.00 or imprisonment for not more than 180 days per violation or both.

Projects currently underway with the Resource Conservation & Recovery program include:

- 1) CERLA process for the Tuba City Open Dumpsite, Tuba City, Arizona
- 2) Highway 160 Project Site, Tuba City, Arizona for waste identified as residual radioactive material ("RRM") for removal and proper disposal at a radioactive repository.
- Assisting Navajo Superfund with the Uranium Legacy Issues for mining sites and UMTRCA sites as needed.

4) Providing technical assistance for waste under the Act and regulations.

- 5) Monitoring the <u>www.nnpledge.navajo-nsn.gov</u> Pledge webpage for Navajo individuals to get further involved with their "trash", either "composting", "audit of their trash they make each day or how much recycling they do"; and "cleanup or beautification projects they are undertaking across Navajo Nation" as an initiative of the Navajo Nation Vice President Rex Lee Jim.
- 6) Chinle landfill closure with USEPA, Region 9 and the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Navajo Nation Regional Office

7) Ongoing investigations of civil complaints for the Navajo Nation Solid Waste Act, Subtitle D waste (non-hazardous), and regulations.

- Ongoing citations of Notice of Violations, Compliance Letters, and Civil Orders to responsible parties.
- 9) Ongoing presentations for education of the Navajo Nation Solid Waste Act and regulations.

10) Ongoing educational material to presentations, conferences, fairs and businesses.

- 11) Ongoing coordination of solid waste projects with Department of Community Development, Solid Waste Management program, i.e., Electronic Waste Recycling and Collection; Household Hazardous Waste Collection
- 12) Seeking grants for solid waste projects for all 110 Chapters as they become available.

II. Navajo Superfund:

The Navajo EPA Superfund provides the following services for the Navajo Nation:

Mission of the Navajo Nation Superfund Program

To respond to releases and threatened releases of hazardous substances and to locate, investigate, and arrange for the cleanup of abandoned hazardous waste sites on the Navajo Nation.

1) Superfund Sites

- a) Prewitt Abandoned Oil Refinery NPL Site
- b) UNC Churchrock Uranium Mill NPL Site

2) Abandoned Uranium Mine Sites

- a) 520 abandoned uranium mine sites on the Navajo Nation, posing risks to health and safety due both to physical hazards, such as shafts, pits, and debris piles, and to potential exposure to uranium ore, contaminated materials, and heavy metals.
- b) Contaminated Home Structures Project with the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency, Region 9 for removal of contaminated homes built with uranium source materials from mining or milling operations.

3) Sheep Dip Vats

- a) Key Activities:
- · Another 24 dip vat sites will be sampled for chapters located in Arizona and New Mexico.
- The Navajo Superfund Program will continue to negotiate with BIA on a work plan that will address the bioremediation methods for the next four dip vat sites and future sites.
- The Navajo Nation needs to be involved with any future work plan process regarding selection of sites for remediation and the cost-effective bioremediation considered by the BIA.
 - 4) Comprehensive Environmental Response Compensation Liability Act:
 - a) EPA maintains a Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Information Systems ("CERCLIS") list which contains information on hazardous waste sites, potentially hazardous waste sites, and remedial activities across the nation.  - 5) Tribal Response Program under 128(a) has allowed capacity building, resulting in enactment of the NNCERCLA in March 2008 which mimics the federal CERCLA or Superfund Law and differs by including Petroleum as a hazardous substance and allows for cultural resource damages as well as natural resource damages; Other regulations, laws, and guidance are under development or are being processed through legislation.

BE IT ENACTED:

Section One. Findings

- A. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. §500, the Resources and Development Committee is hereby established as a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council,
- B. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. §501 B 2 (a), the Resources and Development Committee grants final approval for all land withdrawals, non-mineral leases, permits, licenses, rights-of-way, surface easements and bonding requirements on Navajo Nation lands and unrestricted (fee) land. This authority shall include subleases, modifications, assignments, leasehold encumbrances, transfers, renewals, and terminations.
- C. Resolution No. ACD-164-82, attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit "A", the Advisory Committee established the Window Rock Administrative Reserve consisting of 536.35 acres, more or less, for the exclusive use of the Navajo Tribal government for the benefit of pperations required for its administration, and for residential, commercial, community facilities and related purposes attached hereto as Exhibit "A".
- D. The Navajo Environmental Protection Agency Superfund Program, P.O. Box 2946, Window Rock, Arizona 86515 has submitted a memorandum requesting the withdrawal of 0.35 acres, more or less, of Navajo Nation Trust Land located adjacent to their Underground Storage Tank Program within the Window Rock Administrative Reserve area attached hereto as Exhibit "B".
- E. The proposed area consists of 0.35 acres, more or less, of Navajo Nation Trust Lands located in the Southeast Quarter (SE1/4) of Section 5, Township 26 North, Range 31 East, G&SRM, Window Rock, Apache County, Navajo Nation (Arizona). The location is more



particularly described on the survey map attached hereto as Exhibit "C".

- F. The Project Review Section within the Navajo Land Department has determined that there are no grazing permittees because the 0.35 acre tract is located within the 536.35-acre area that was withdrawn for the Window Rock Administrative Reserve.
- G. All environmental and archaeological surveys and studies have been completed and received appropriate clearances attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference.

Section Two. Approval

The Navajo Nation hereby approves the assignment of 0.35 acres, more or less, of Navajo Nation Trust Lands of the original 536.35 acres of land withdrawn by ACD-164-82 for Navajo Environmental Protection Agency Superfund Program Modular Office Building at Window Rock, Apache County, Navajo Nation (Arizona). The location is more particularly described on the survey map attached hereto as Exhibit "C."

RESOLUTION OF THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE OF THE NAVAJO TRIBAL COUNCIL

Authorizing the Withdrawal of Certain Parcel of Land Held in Trust by the United States for the Benefit of the Navajo Tribe

WHEREAS:

- 1. Navajo Tribal Council Resolution CJN-24-55 authorized the Chairman of the Navajo Tribal Council, with concurrence and recommendation of the Advisory Committee, subject to the approval of the Secretary of the Interior or his authorized representative, to execute Orders withdrawing designated tribal land for use in connection with authorized programs of benefit to the Navajo Tribe; and
- 2. The Advisory Committee of the Navajo Tribal Council by Resolution CJA-1-81 has been delegated the authority to approve withdrawal of land for business, residential, commercial, and for other beneficial purposes; and
- 3. Since 1934, the Navajo Tribal Council and its administration have possessed this parcel of land with the Bureau of Indian Affairs and used the land for the purposes of the operation of the Tribal and the Bureau governments, and recreational areas, state and federal agencies and supporting residential, commercial, community facility, and related purposes; and
- 4. The Bureau of Indian Affairs, Navajo Area Office has relinquished the majority of its claim of a Window Rock Administrative Reserve Area, as shown on Exhibits "A & B" attached hereto, no longer required by BIA for the purpose of which the reserve was asserted; and
- 5. The need exists to maintain an independent land area to be occupied by the facilities necessary to maintain the Navajo Tribal Government and its supporting residential, commercial, recreational community facility and other related functions, with future development controlled by the Navajo Tribe; and
- 6. The Chairman of the Navajo Tribal Council has acknowledged the acceptance of the subject land area and attached hereto as Exhibit "C" is a copy of said acceptance; and

This delegation of authority shall serve to delegate my authority for the oversight and management of the Waste Regulatory Compliance Department programs including the signing of all documents. However, this delegation of authority to sign documents shall <u>not</u> extend to 1) legislation and regulations; 2) budget transfers without justification or U.S. EPA approval; 3) documents that lack the concurrence of the appropriate program supervisor; (4) documents for the delegates own programs; (5) travel and leave requests for the program supervisors and (6) any other documents that the delegatee feels requires the department manager's signature. Finally, this delegation of authority may not be transferred beyond the above-referenced personnel. Delegation to expire on September 30, 2015 @ 5:00p.m.



The program needs to submit an approved budget modification for the \$1,347,849 amount to OMB after approval has been attained by the oversight committee.

NN President on May 4th 2015 after Legislative Approval

The Navajo Superfund Program (NSP) received a May 22, 2015 response from the Office of the Controller regarding Fiscal Year 2015's Recommended Budget for the Hazardous Substance Fund at \$1,997,849. This total involves the following: \$1,197,849 for the new building, \$650,000 from FY15's recommended budget for the new building, and \$150,000 for the recently legislated and approved Dine Uranium Remediation Advisory Commission (DURAC) that will be for uranium work and start-up costs. A copy of the May 22, 2015 from the Office of the Controller is attached.

The urgency is to prevent the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Washington DC Office (USEPA WO) from taking USEPA WO's allotted federal share of \$551,790 if concrete evidence is not provided to show that enough FY15 allocated funds are available to allow work to begin in FY15 at the secured new office site. NSP has been fortunate enough to have had \$551,790 allocated from the USEPA WO who does not normally provide for building funds. USEPA WO had realized that NSP's current and rented private office building located on private land has to be replaced due to severe dilapidation that continues to present risks to staff and equipment. The amount of \$551,790 has to be utilized before September 30, 2015 otherwise it will be returned and never be re-allocated.

I have attached NN Department of Justice's letter of approval for use of the recent settlement funds in Special Revenue 511007 that were received in February 2015 with two more deposits thereafter. Also, attached is email for approval of same for use of \$100,000 for the building furniture and \$150,000 for DURAC's startup costs.

NSP has abided by the Navajo Nation building process which required NN Design & Engineering's (NND&E) involvement. Those businesses that met NND&E's qualification process were allowed to provide quotes. Only one of two provided a quote. These businesses had to provide quality

modular buildings as part of NND&E's goal to prevent continued purchases of office buildings that became dilapidated over several short prior years. NND&E's goal is to look for longer lasting buildings that are placed on engineered sites with placement of steel framed buildings on cemented bases that would ensure that correct performance happens the first time. In this manner, funds are expended efficiently and effectively.

NSP has also requested for use of \$150,000 for the recently legislated establishment of the Dine Uranium Remediation Advisory Commission. This is for uranium work and start-up costs and will have to be replenished, as more planning details are discussed.

The building is sized for seventeen staff members, fourteen to work under the Navajo Superfund Program (NSP) and three to work under the Resource Conservation Recovery Program (RCRP). Both the NSP and RCRP work under the NNEPA Waste Regulatory Compliance Department. Currently, there is not enough space in the dilapidated office building. Files in cabinets and equipment had to be moved to a recently purchased storage building because office space was necessary to house two new staffed positions, the Sr. Environmental Engineer and Sr. Public Information Officer. Other direly needed planned positions cannot be considered until there is ample space, such as in the new building.

In consideration of limited time, the federal funds will be expended in FY15 and special revenue funds not utilized in FY15 will be rolled over into FY16. To do this, Mr. Robert Willie informed that I will need to write a memo for the rollover.

Settlement Funds

Dear Ms. White,

The purpose of this letter is to respond to your inquiry as to whether or not Tronox Settlement funds may be used for purposes relating to the construction of a building for the Navajo Nation Environmental Protection Agency Superfund Program. The answer to your question is yes.

Here's why.

This decision is based upon an examination of the following documents:

- 1. The Tronox Settlement Agreement entered into in late November 2010;
- 2. The Navajo Nation CERCLA passed in 2008;
- The Navajo Nation EPA Superfund Program Fund Management Plan as passed by the Navajo Nation Council in January 2011.

The Tronox Settlement Agreement, hereinafter referred to as Tronox Settlement 1, was entered into among numerous parties, including the United States and the Navajo Nation, in late November of 2010. The Agreement divided proceeds of a Settlement by the parties. As part of this Settlement the Navajo Nation received \$1,231,978.00 "in connection with" the Navajo Nation's bankruptcy claim regarding the former Shiprock Uranium Mill site. This language is found in paragraph 117s, p. 161 of Tronox Settlement 1 which also provides that the "distribution received shall be transferred pursuant to the instructions set forth in Paragraph 130.

Paragraph 125r of Tronox Settlement 1 sets forth the Navajo Nation share of any Anadarko Litigation proceeds that might be received as a result of the litigation against Anadarko and Kerr McGee for fraudulent transfer of Kerr McGee assets. The share was set at 1% of said proceeds. As you realize, this case resulted in a Settlement Agreement (Tronox Settlement 2) that was entered into in April of 2014. The appeal deadline for Tronox Settlement 2 expired in late January of 2015. As of this date the Navajo Nation has received distributions of \$26,743,252.86, \$11,472,980.33 and \$6,195,409.38.

Paragraph 125r of Tronox Settlement 1 further provides that the distributions will be transferred pursuant to the instructions set forth in paragraph 130.

While paragraphs 117s and 125r clearly connect the Navajo distributions to the Shiprock site, there is nothing in those paragraphs to suggest that the proceeds from those distributions can only be spent on matters relating to the Shiprock site.

A comparison of paragraphs 117s and 125r (dealing with the Shiprock Site) with paragraphs 117p and 125o (dealing with the 49 abandoned mines that comprised part of the U.S. claim) is instructive for interpretation purposes. Each of the paragraphs relating to the U.S. claim sets forth specific spending instructions for those funds. The funds distributed to the U.S. relating to those 49 mines must "be retained and used to conduct or finance response actions at or in connection with the" 49 mines. This type of language is lacking in the provisions dealing with the Navajo funds.

While this clearly indicates that the restrictions on the use of the U.S. funds are greater than those on the use of the Navajo funds it does not mean that use of the Navajo funds is open or unrestricted.

As noted above the monies distributed to Navajo are also covered by paragraph 130 of Tronox Settlement 1 which is set forth in its entirety below.

"Cash payments to the Navajo Nation required in this Settlement Agreement shall be made to the Navajo Nation Environmental Protection Agency for deposit in the Hazardous Substances Fund, with additional routing instructions to be provided by the Navajo Nation at the time of transfer."

Therefore, when attempting to define the possible restrictions on the use of the Tronox settlement funds by the Navajo Nation it is important to examine all laws and regulations relating to the Navajo EPA Hazardous Substances Fund which is the repository of all Navajo Tronox funds in accordance with the Tronox Settlement 1 Agreement.

This brings us to the Navajo Nation CERCLA and the Navajo Nation EPA Superfund Program Fund Management Plan.

The Navajo CERCLA is codified at 4 NNC §2101 et seq. The applicable provision for this discussion is found at 4 NNC §2701 which provides in part that "The monies deposited into the Hazardous Substances Fund shall be expended by the Director for the use of the Navajo Superfund Program, as provided in this Section, in accordance with the Special Revenue Fund Management Plan and pursuant to an approved Budget." 4 NNC §2701 contains no other relevant restrictions on the use of monies deposited into the Hazardous Substances Fund.

An examination of the Superfund Program Fund Management Plan reveals that the most relevant section for this discussion is Section III E. entitled "Expenditure of Funds". This section specifically allows funds to be spent for "Administration, implementation and enforcement" of the Navajo CERCLA and even contains specific account designations for leases (account 5000) and Capital Expenditures relating to real property (account 9000).

Therefore, given the fact that there are no relevant restrictions on the use of the Navajo Tronox Settlement funds contained in the Tronox 1 Settlement Agreement, and, given the fact that the Tronox Settlement 1 Agreement specifically directs that the Navajo funds be deposited into the Navajo EPA Hazardous Substances Fund, and given the fact that the Navajo CERCLA specifically requires that funds deposited into the Hazardous Substances Fund be "expended by the Director for the use of the Navajo Superfund Program, and given the fact that the Superfund Program Fund Management Plan

specifically allows for funds to be spent for "Administration, implementation and enforcement" of the Navajo CERCLA, it seems clear that Tronox Settlement funds, which have been deposited into the Navajo EPA Hazardous Substances Fund, can be utilized for expenses related to the construction and operation of a new Superfund Program building.

Please realize that all other budgetary and expenditure related restrictions and procedures must be followed.
