This written summary does not address recommended amendments as may be provided by the standing committees. The Office of Legislative Counsel requests each Council Delegate to review each proposed resolution in detail.



### AN ACTION

RELATING TO HEALTH, EDUCATION AND HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE;  
ESTABLISHING THE EDUCATIONAL RECOVERY TASK FORCE

BE IT ENACTED:

#### SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

A. The Health, Education and Human Services Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council. 2 N.N.C. §400 *et seq.* The committee oversees the Department of Diné Education, the Navajo Nation Board of Education, and colleges within the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. § 401(B)(1) and (3). In carrying out these oversight responsibilities, the committee “assist[s], support[s] and coordinate[s] with local communities, parent organizations and school boards and school board organizations.” 2 N.N.C. § 401(B)(4).

B. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 401(B)(5), the Health, Education and Human Services Committee is authorized to “delegate responsibilities and authorities as appropriate to the Divisions, Chapters and appropriate entities for the efficiency and streamlining of government processes provided that the Committee first approves rules and regulations governing such delegations and rescission of such delegations.” 2 N.N.C. § 401(B)(5).

#### SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

- 1 A. The education of our Navajo children has been affected and interrupted by the health  
2 crisis of COVID-19. The educational disruption has been severe, essentially resulting  
3 in a learning crisis. This crisis has affected the entire nation, reflected through low  
4 academic test scores and standardized benchmarks not being met.
- 5 B. This educational crisis must be addressed, by the Navajo Nation locally and the federal  
6 government at the national level. The responsibility for the education of Navajo  
7 children rests with both the Navajo Nation and the federal government.
- 8 C. It is in the best interests of the Navajo Nation that a Task Force be established for  
9 purposes of reviewing and addressing certain issues and concerns related to the impact  
10 of COVID-19 on the education of Navajo children.

12 **SECTION THREE. EDUCATIONAL RECOVERY FORCE ESTABLISHMENT**

- 13 A. The Navajo Nation establishes the Educational Recovery Task Force to review the  
14 following subject areas, issues and concerns:
- 15 1). Drop-out rate of Navajo students during the pandemic (including the number of  
16 students permanently dropping out).
  - 17 2). Plans for remediation of learning loss during the pandemic (including current  
18 mitigation efforts).
  - 19 3). Plans for training teachers in providing effective evidence-based online education,  
20 and whether teachers are prepared to use online teaching methods.
  - 21 4). The impact of internet connectivity issues on student participation in daily online  
22 school instructions and activities (including the number of Navajo students  
23 impacted).
  - 24 5). Plans for school official s in making home visits for purposes of following up on at-  
25 risk students.
  - 26 6). The severity of exploitation by family members of assistance made available to  
27 students under COVID-10 relief help.
  - 28 7). Parents losing jobs due to providing daily care for their children at home and not  
29 in school due to the pandemic (including number of parents losing jobs).

1 8). The inability of parents in providing on li ne learning assistance to their children  
2 due to computer literacy problems faced by parents (including the number of such  
3 parents).

4 9). Adequate mental and emotional support for Navajo students in coping with fear and  
5 anxiety related to the pandemic (including the number of students provided such  
6 support).

7 B. By written report, the Educational Recovery Task Force shall provide  
8 recommendations on addressing issues identified herein. This written report shall be  
9 presented to the Health, Education and Human Service Committee no later than 90 days  
10 of Task Force establishment.

11 C. The Educational Recovery Task Force shall consist of:

19 D. Rules and regulations shall be as follows:


- 20 1). The presence of a majority of Task Force members shall constitute a quorum.  
21 2). To the extent permitted by Navajo Nation law, and except as otherwise provided  
22 herein, the same rules and provisions of law applicable to subcommittees of  
23 standing committees of the Navajo Nation Council shall apply to the Task Force.  
24 3). The members of the Task Force, by majority vote, shall select and determine the  
25 Chairperson and Vice Chairperson of Task Force.  
26 4). The Task Force shall determine meeting dates and times.  
27 5). The Navajo Department of Diné Education shall provide technical assistance to the  
28 Task Force. The Navajo Department of Justice and Office of Legislative Counsel  
29 shall provide legal advice and guidance on any legal issues and concerns. The  
30

Office of Legislative Services and the staff of Department of Diné Education shall provide any clerical and administrative assistance.

- 6). The Task Force shall provide a written report on all assigned tasks herein, including recommendations, and provide this report to the Health, Education and Human Services Committee no later than 90 days of Task Force establishment.
- 7). The Task Force shall exist for a period of 90 calendar days, unless extended by duly approved resolution of the Health, Education and Human Services Committee.
- 8). The Task Force shall be authorized to take any other necessary and proper action not specified herein, provided such action is consistent with the intent and purposes of this resolution of the Health, Education and Human Services Committee.

#### **SECTION FOUR. SAVINGS CLAUSE**


Should any part of this action be determined invalid by the Navajo Nation Supreme Court or the District Courts of the Navajo Nation, without appeal to the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, portions not determined invalid shall remain the law of the Navajo Nation.
