RELATING TO NAABIK'IYATI' COMMITTEE; APPROVING AND ADOPTING THE LEGISLATIVE PRIORITES OF THE NAVAJO NATION AS DETERMINED BY THE $24^{\text {th }}$ NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL RELATING TO THE STATE OF ARIZONA


## WHEREAS :

A. Statements of policy, enactment of positive law, intergovernmental agreements, budget resolutions, and reallocations, must be reviewed and approved by resolution by the appropriate standing committee(s) and the Navajo Nation Council except as otherwise provided herein. 2 N.N.C. $\$ 164$ (A).
B. Statements of policy are written statements submitted to federal, state or local governments by a Navajo Nation official stating the official position of the Navajo Nation on proposed legislation or other action by that government. See 2 N.N.C. § $110(W)$.
C. The Navajo Nation established the Naabik'iyáti' Committee as a Navajo Nation Council standing committee and as such empowered Naabik'iyáti' Committee to assist and coordirate all requests for information, appearances and testimony relating to proposed county, state and federal legislation impacting the Navajo Nation. See 2 N.N.C. §§ $700(A), 701(A)(6)$.
D. The 2019 Arizona Legislative Priorities provides a list of topics addressed during the Nabbik'iyáti' Committee's State Affairs Task Force Subcommittee meetings.
E. The Navajo Nation's legislative priorities for the state of Arizona are as follows:

RELATING TO LAAW AND ORDER, HEALTH, EDUCATION AND HUMAN SERVICES, RESOURCES AND DEVELOPMENT, NAABIK'IYÁTI' COMMITTEES, AND THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL DEMANDING IMMEDIATE ASSISTANCE AND ATTENTION FROM THE UNITED STATES ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY, THE OFFICE OF NAVAJO-HOPI INDIAN RELOCATION, THE NAVAJO NATION ENVIRONMENTAI PROTECTION AGENCY, THE STATE OF ARIZONA, AND ADACHE COUNTY, ARIZONA FOR ASSISTANCE IN ADDRESSING URANIUM CONTAMINATION IN THE WATER SUPPLY NEAR SANDERS, ARIZONA

## WHEREAS :

A. The Health, Education and Human Services, Resources and Development, Law and Order, and Naabik'iytti' Committees are established as standing committees of the Navajo Nation Council. 2 N.N.C. $\$ \$ 400(\mathrm{~A}), 500(\mathrm{~A}), 600(\mathrm{~A})$, and $700(\mathrm{~A})$.
B. The Law and Order Committee is empowered to review and recommend resolutions regarding coordination between the Navajo Nation and the federal government. 2 N.N.C. $\$$ $601(\mathrm{~B})(1)(\mathrm{a})$ and $601(\mathrm{~B})(13)$.
C. The Health, Education, and Human Services Committee is empowered to review and recommend "Resolutions relating to social services, health, environmental health, education, veterans and veterans services, employment and labor." 2 N.N.C. $\$ 401(\mathrm{~B})(6)(\mathrm{a})$.
D. The Resources and Development Committee (RDC) exercises oversight authority over water, land, the environment, and environmental protection to establish optimum utilization of all Navajo Nation resources. RDC is empowered to promulgate rules and regulations governing environmental protection. 2 N.N.C $\$ \$ 500(C)(1)$ and $501(B)(1)$.
E. The Nabik'iyati' Committee is empowered to coordinate all federal programs and to assist and coordinate all requests for, information, appearances and testimony relating to federal legislation impacting the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. $-\overline{\$ S}$ $701(A)(4)$ and $701(A)(7)$.

E: \& proposed resolution that requares sunal action by the Navajo Nation Council shall oe assigned to the Nabik'yáti" comnttee before $1 \pi$, s heard by the Navalo Nation Council. 2 N.M.C. S 164 (A) (9).
G. The water supply in the area in and around Sanders Arizana is contaminated with tranium See the news artacle, "Research into Arizont town's uranim-oontaminated water supply sparks change. The artiole is attached as Exibit
H. The Puerco-Little Colorado River Watershed Navajo CommintyBased Urarium Water Quallty Assessment Probect, through To Lani Enterprises and the southwest Research and Information Center has detemined wells Located In the Park estates area of Sanders and the Sanders Solool District contaln unsafe levels of uranium See Exhibit B. Slide presentation from september 2015 .
I. The United states Mas prepared a plan to address uranim contamination within the Nayajo Nation entlutied, "Federal Actions to Address mpacts, of Uranium Contamination in the Nowajo Nation." The report is attached as Exhlbit ©.
J. Water to Sanders Park Estates communty is now being supplied by Navajo Tribal UtLA1ty Authotaty(NTUA). Alehough NTUA is providing water from a different source than the previous supplier; Arlzona Windsong Water Company (AWWC), NTUA is using AWWC's water Lines, Since the existing water lines are being used to supply water to Eark Estates residents, the likelihood of contambation remains. See Navajo Times attiole dated Aprix 14, 2016, attached as Exhibit D.
K. The Sanders Unified School District tested the urandun levels In its water supply and recelved notice on August 10, 2016, that the sample collected exceeded the maximum contaminate level for uranium. See Exhibit $E$.
I. Both the Sanders Park Estates and the Sanders School need new water lines to avoid additional contamination from the water delivery system.
M. The Nahata $0 z 11$ Comisslon Governance passed a Resolution on Tuly 30, 2015, requesting the unted states Environmental Protection Agency, the Navafo Nation Environmental Protection Agency, the Office of Navaio-Hop 1 Indian Retocation, the state of Arlzone, and Apache County, Arizona take the fol10wing actions: (1) declare a state of emergency due to urarium contamination in the public water systert in sanders, 12) Hhat these entaties collaborate to provide short-term and long-tern diternatuve water supples to the sanders unified Elementary school, (3) provide new lunes for both fark Estates and Sanders Uniefed Elementary School, (4) that these entittes provide for ongoing monitoring, documentation, and repotting of uranium, radioactivty, and heavy metals in surface yater, (5) these entithes support policy of no new uranum mining and processing in the watershed of the Colorado and Rio Grande, (6) that Sanders; Arizona be included in the federal plan to address contamination in the Navajo Nation, and (7) amend existing state of Arizona laws on water monitoring reporting fol the subject on non-transit Wells." See Nahata Dzill Comission Governance Resolution attached as exhibit F.

The Navajo Nation hereby demands immediate assistance and attention from the United States Environmental Protection Agency, the Navajo Natlon Environmental Protection Agency, the offlce Of NavaH-Hopl Indian Relocetion the state of Arizona, and Apache County, Arizona: (1) declare a state of emergency due to Granium contamation in the public water system In Sanders, (2) that these entities collaborate to provide short-term and long-term alternatime whter supplies to the Sanders unified Hementary School, (3) provide new Ilnes for both Park Estates and Sanders Unified, flementary school (4) that these entities proyide for ongoing monitoring, documentation, and reporting of uranium, radoactivity, and heavy metals in surface water, (5) these entities support a policy of no new uranium mining and processing in the watershed of the Colorado and Rto Grande, (6) that Sanders, Arizona be uncluded in the federd plan to address contamination an the Navajo Nation, and (7) amend
existing State of Arizona laws on water monitoring reporting for the subject on "non-transit wells.
