PURPOSE OF RESOLUTION: This resolution, if approved, will amend resolution HEHSCAP-05-20, Entitled "An Action Relating To Health, Education And Human Services; Approving 2020 - 2024 Navajo Nation School Board Apportionment Plan." The amendment concerns T'iisyaakin Residential Hall, Inc.

This written summary does not address recommended amendments as may be provided by the standing committees. The Office of Legislative Counsel requests each Council Delegate to review each proposed resolution in detail.

On April 15, 2020, Health, Education and Human Services approved HEHSCAP-05-29 20, resolution entitled "AN ACTION RELATING TO HEALTH, EDUCATION AND 30

HUMAN SERVICES; APPROVING 2020 - 2024 NAVAJO NATION SCHOOL BOARD APPORTIONMENT PLAN." Resolution HEHSCAP-05-20, attached hereto as **Exhibit A**.

- B. Under the 2020 2024 Navajo Nation School Board Apportionment Plan, generally, schools are consolidated for purposes of being represented by one school board. The Tiisyaakin Residential Hall is included in the new Apportionment Plan and it is combined with schools for purposes of operating under one governing board.
- C. Tiisyaakin Residential Hall "provides residential services for Holbrook High School students, grades 9th to 12th at large from the Navajo Nation and surrounding areas." See, *Tiiyaakin.org*. It is located in Holbrook, Arizona. *Id.* "Student residing in the residential hall attend Holbrook High School and they stay Sunday through Friday and then are bused home weekly." The residential hall is "federally funded under P.L. 100-297, through the Bureau of Indian Education." *Id.*
- D. The governing board, supported by the Principal of the Holbrook High School, is requesting the apportionment plan be amended to allow the residential hall to have its own governing board (not to be a part of other consolidated schools). **Exhibit B**, May 8, 2020 resolution and letter of HHS Principal. In its resolution requesting amendment, the current governing board states "[Tiisyaakin Residential Hall] board is comprised of members from the surrounding communities familiar with the students and local culture which the home living program serves;" It states that a plan to include such a residential hall would be detrimental to its "mission of delivering a high-quality experience to its students and staff through continued excellence...." In support, the Principal of Holbrook High School reports above average graduation rates of Native students at the high school and advises against any disruption in the current T'iisyaakin Residential Hall system.
- E. Due to unique circumstances presented, and in the interests of fairness, it is in the best interest of the Navajo Nation to amend the 2020 2024 Navajo Nation School Board Apportionment Plan.

BE IT ENACTED:

SECTION 1. FINDINGS AND PURPOSE

 The Health, Education and Human Services Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council. Among various responsibilities, it approves apportionment plans for school boards for use in elections every four years. 11 N.N.C. § 11. The Election Code provides:

> "On or before the first Monday of November 2003 and every four years thereafter, the Health, Education and Human Services Committee of the Navajo Nation Council shall set the size of each Local Community School Board and shall apportion the number of school board seats among the Chapter or Chapters represented in each Local Community School Board. apportionment shall establish election precincts for each Local Community School Board containing approximately equal numbers of students attending the Local Community School at the time of the apportionment. The Health, Education and Human Services Committee, for purposes of public comment or collecting data, may extend the time for approval of an apportionment plan. Should an extension be ordered, the Navajo Board of Election Supervisors shall adjust, if necessary, the opening filing period for elective school board positions." 11 N.N.C. § 11(B).

2. For purposes of public hearings, the Health, Education and Human Services Committee on February 16, 2020 approved possible apportionment plans as options. Thereafter, with the assistance of Navajo Department of Diné Education, public notices were provided, and hearings were conducted in the five agencies of the Navajo Nation as follows: To'Nanees'Dizi Chapter on February 24, 2020; Chinle Chapter on February 25, 2020; Shiprock Chapter on February 26, 2020; Crownpoint Chapter on February 27, 2020; and at the Fort Defiance Chapter on February 27, 2020. See attached Exhibit B.

SECTION 2. ADOPTING 2020-2024 SCHOOL APPORTIONMENT PLAN

- The Health, Education and Human Services Committee of the Navajo Nation Council hereby approves the 2020-2024 Navajo Nation School Board Apportionment Plan, attached as Exhibit "A."
- The Navajo Election Administration and the Navajo Board of Election Supervisors shall use the apportionment plan adopted herein for use in the 2020 Navajo Nation Chapter Elections.

SECTION 3. SAVINGS CLAUSE

Should any portion of this action of the vision of the Health, Education and Human Services Committee or any portion of the apportionment plan adopted herein be determined invalid by the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, or the District Courts of the Navajo Nation without appeal to the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, those portions the action or apportionment plan which are not determined invalid shall remain the law of the Nation.



During this time, specifically under the leadership of Executive Director Rene White-Alcott, I have found the dormitory to operate in an exceptional manner. Rene and her staff are always available to address HHS-dorm student concerns and are extremely proactive in monitoring their students' academic, behavioral, and emotional well-being.

HHS's 4-year and 5-year Native American graduation rates are regularly 17-20% above state averages and the dorm's efficiency plays an integral role in this happening. HHS takes pride in providing Northern Arizona Native American students a meaningful educational opportunity and a functioning dorm is an intricate entity in this endeavor. As a result, the Holbrook School District would be greatly disheartened to witness any change in this operation.

In closing, as I communicate to concerned dorm parents during registration interviews, I would feel comfortable placing my own children in the dorm today under their current leadership; I wouldn't have said that twenty years ago. As a result, I request you strongly reflect on creating any disruption to current Tiisyaakin Residential Hall systems as their present state of affairs has a proven productive impact on Navajo Nation students. RESOLUTION OF TIISYAAKIN RESIDENTIAL HALL, INC.

REQUESTING OF SUPPORT AND APPROVAL TO AN AMENDMENT OF THE HEALTH, EDUCATION AND HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE RESOLUTION (HEHSCAP-05-20), ENTITLED "AN ACTION RELATING TO HEALTH, EDUCATION AND HUMAN SERVICES: APPROVING 2020-2024 NAVAJO NATION SCHOOL BOARD APPORTIONMENT PLAN" AS THE AMENDMENT WOULD ALLOW TIISYAAKIN RESIDENTIAL HALL, INC. TO BE A STANDALONE ENTITY REPRESENTED BY ITS OWN LOCALLY CONTROLLED COMMUNITY SCHOOL BOARD

WHEREAS:

- Pursuant to the Navajo Nation Code at 10 N.N.C. § 200; and P.L. 93-638, Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act of 1975; P.L. 100-297, Tribally Controlled Schools Act of 1988, all as amended; and the Tiisyaakin Residential Hall, Inc. Policies and Procedures, the Tiisyaakin Residential Hall, Inc. Board (Board) has been delegated the duty and responsibility and has full legal authority to act for and on behalf of Tiisyaakin Residential Hall (TRH); and
- 2. Navajo and federal law both emphasize that TRH and similarly situated community schools and homeliving programs should be governed locally and establish that Local Community School Boards have been delegated the responsibility and authority to govern community schools and homeliving programs, in order to carry out this mandate. See 10 N.N.C. §§ 1(A), 3(S) and 200(A); P.L. 93-638; P.L. 100-297 and P.L. 114-95; and
- 3. The Board has been informed that the Health, Education and Human Services Committee approved a resolution entitled "An Action Relating to Health, Education and Human Services; Approving 2020-2024 Navajo Nation School Board Apportionment Plan." HEHSCAP-05-20. The resolution approves Apportionment Plan 6, which creates 16 regional, consolidated boards to represent the P.L. 100-297 grant schools on the Navajo Nation and the border town dormitories; and
- The Board acknowledges that many of the proposed apportionment plans consolidate the current Local Community School Boards into regionalized boards that represent many different schools; and

- 5. TRH is currently governed by an autonomous Local Community School Board, which provides for the care and education of students through the homeliving program; and
- 6. The TRH Board is comprised of members from the surrounding communities familiar with the students and local culture which the homeliving program serves; and
- 7. TRH has a highly successful staff and student retention rate, which greatly exceed that of other P.L. 100-297 schools and homeliving programs. On average, 95% of students return to TRH after their first year. Last contract year 96% of employment contracts were renewed and 100% of employees returned to work for another year; and
- 8. TRH's students are thriving academically and socially as evidenced by reaching maximum student counts on an annual basis and as measured by student success rates, where graduation rates are regularly 17-20% above state averages. TRH emphasizes and fosters a special relationship with Holbrook High School where academics are the top priority; and
- 9. TRH staff have built a strong rapport with the community, families, and students through their efforts, and through emphasizing cultural values; TRH staff have a responsibility to perform a unique duty to teach students as surrogate parents emphasizing cultural values, practices and language preservation, while they attend the Holbrook Public Schools, off the Navajo Nation lands; and
- 10. TRH has always received clean audits; and
- 11. TRH has consistently received the maximum allowable number of years following reauthorization proceedings; and
- 12. As a result of the foregoing, TRH has demonstrated the ability to create a thriving academic environment conducive to student achievement without the need for strong external oversight; and
- The TRH Board has shown fiscal, curricular, and programmatic responsibility through aboveaverage student and employment retention rates; and
- 14. The TRH Board is committed to its mission of delivering a high-quality experience for its students and staff through continued excellence and believes transferring control of its School to a regionalized, consolidated board with oversight responsibilities over seven other vastly different schools with differing needs and challenges could be highly detrimental to this mission.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- Tiisyaakin Residential Hall, Inc.'s Local Governing Board requests support and approval of an Amendment to the Health, Education and Human Services Committee Resolution (HEHSCAP-05-20), entitled "An Action Relating to Health, Education and Human Services: Approving 2020-2024 Navajo Nation School Board Apportionment Plan". The Amendment would allow Tiisyaakin Residential Hall, Inc. to be a standalone entity represented by its own locally controlled community school board; and
- 2. Tiisyaakin Residential Hall, Inc.'s Local Governing Board encourages the Honorable Health, Education and Human Services Committee to affirm, reinstate, and respect the primacy of the Tiisyaakin Residential Hall, Inc. The Diné Bi Olta School Board Association, Inc., pursuant to the Navajo Sovereignty in Education Act of 2005 amendment, provides school board services and training to local school boards serving BIA/BIE-funded schools under the provisions of Public Law 93-638 Contract with the Bureau of Indian Affairs education services early childhood through 12th grades and adult education, including dormitory, facility, student transportation and food services; and
- DBOSBA and the HEHS Committee members are aware that all the schools being consolidated under Plan 6 are comprised of school board members registered from different surrounding communities who would also be familiar with the students and local culture which the schools serve; and
- DBOSBA acknowledges under the School Board Reapportionment that Plan 6 will have a critical
 negative impact to the "mission of delivering high-quality experience to all Diné students" attending
 school organizations that will be consolidated; and
