Section Two. Findings


- A. Middle College High School (MCHS) is a charter public high school located in Gallup, NM. <u>https://www.mchsgallup.com/about-mchs</u>. MCHS offers concurrent enrollment with the University of New Mexico-Gallup. *Ibid*. This allows students to gain college experience and attain college credit by the time they graduate high school. *Ibid*.
- B. MCHS is ranked the 12th best public high school in the state of New Mexico. *Ibid*.
 MCHS has nearly doubled its enrollment of Native American students from 21% of their student body in the school year 2015-2016 to 40% in the school year 2017-2018. Exhibit A. Native students are now the school's largest demographic. *Ibid*. 92% of their Native American graduates attend college after graduation. *Ibid*.
- C. Middle College High School operates under the Gallup-McKinley County School
 District as a charter school. On October 16, 2017, the Gallup-McKinley County School
 Board approved the MCHS renewal application. Exhibit B.
- D. On April 25, 2018 the Gallup-McKinley County School District approved to "issue an intent to revoke the charter for Middle College High School." Exhibit C.
- E. In response, the Rock Springs Chapter, Manuelito Chapter, and Tsé Lichii' Chapter have issued chapter resolutions supporting the continuation of Middle College High School.

- The Navajo Nation hereby authorizes the Navajo Nation President, the Navajo Nation Speaker, and their designees, to advocate on their behalf.








Middle College High School Demographic Changes


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READING PROFIENCY BY SCHOOL (2017)

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
Gallup-McKinley County High Schools




MATH PROFIENCY BY SCHOOL (2017)

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Postsecondary Progress of Middle College High School 2017 Graduates (Where They Are Six Months After Graduation)



Class of 2017 Postsecondary Locations


The following graphic displays disaggregate the information recorded above. As present trends show, more than eighty-two percent of Middle College's 2017 graduates are attending college six months after graduation. This timeframe is significant because it demonstrates retention beyond their first semester away from Middle College High School.

In addition to looking at the overall total, it is instructive to examine the school's data by ethnicity. Of significance is the success of the school's minority students, particularly Native American and Hispanic, who represent the school's two largest ethnic groups.




2017 Postsecondary Locations by Ethnicity

Dear Honorable Diné Education Board Members:

I am writing this letter in support of Middle College High School. This school is recognized as the 12th best public high school in the state of New Mexico, based on data collected by the US Department of Education. I am familiar with the school and the success of its Native American students who move onto higher education. It concerns me that the Gallup McKinley County School District is threatening to shut down this school. The decision appears to be based on politics and money.

As I reported to the Rock Springs Chapter last week, the Gallup McKinley County School Board is responsible for looking after the best interests of all of our students, not the wishes of its superintendent. They have been elected to be our voice in supervising the operation of the district. It seems they may have gotten things backwards because they are listening to the superintendent instead of the superintendent listening to them. They need to remember that it is our people who support the local economy through sales taxes and that it is because of this that the people at the district have their jobs.

Local school districts are funded from state money. This pot of money gets divided between all the local districts. The threat to close Middle College and steal its students is a trickery by Gallup McKinley Schools to get a larger portion of this pot of money. It is motivated by greed. Who is looking out for the interests of the students? Who is looking out for our families right to choose where their children get to go to school?

I am asking for your support of Middle College High School. Please consider joining the action of several Chapter Houses that have passed resolutions mandating the continuation of the school. A resolution from the Department of Diné Education would remind the Gallup district of its obligation to meet the needs of all of our students. In my days as Speaker of the Council, we enacted the practice of fundamental law to ensure that our sovereignty was recognized in all policy decisions. Please take action to honor this commitment. It is important that the Gallup McKinley School District understands that it has a responsibility to our people.

RESOLUTION OF THE NAVAJO NATION BOARD OF EDUCATION

Relating to Education; Opposing the Closure of the Middle College High School Charter School Within the Gallup McKinley County School District

WHEREAS:

- 1. The Department of Diné Education (hereinafter the "Department") is the administrative agency within the Navajo Nation with responsibility and authority for implementing and enforcing the educational laws of the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. § 1801 (B); 10 N.N.C. § 107 (A). The Department is under the immediate direction of the Board. 10 N.N.C. § 107 (B).
- 2. The Navajo Nation Board of Education (hereinafter the "Board") is the education agent in the Executive Branch for the purposes of overseeing the operation of all schools serving the Navajo Nation. 10 N.N.C. § 106 (A). The Board carries out its duties and responsibilities through the Department of Diné Education. 10 N.N.C. §106 (G)(3).
- 3. Native American students represents the fastest growing and largest enrollment demographic at Middle College High School at forty percent (40%).
- 4. Middle College High School prepares students for success in college, with ninety-two percent (92%) of Native American students both enrolling in and continuing to be enrolled in college more than six months after graduating from Middle College High School.
- 5. The Gallup-McKinley County School Board voted in a special meeting on April 25, 2018 to "issue a notice of intent to revoke the charter for Middle College High School."
- 6. The Gallup-McKinley County School District recognizes the authority of the Navajo Nation Government in accordance with the provisions of the Indian Education Act, regarding any proposed action that has implications for tribal students.
- 7. Three (3) Navajo chapters (Baahaali, Red Rock, and Manuelito) have also passed resolutions of support for the Middle College High School.

- 2. The Navajo Nation Board of Education further requests the Gallup McKinley County School District to reconsider their decision or future actions to close the Middle College High School.
- 3. The Navajo Nation Board of Education hereby recommends and empowers the Superintendent of Schools to take any actions deemed necessary and proper to carry out the purposes of this resolution and directive.
