#### Abstract

AN ACTION

RELATING TO RESOURCES AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE; APPROVING THE GRANT OF RIGHT-OF-WAY TO BUREAU OF INDIAN AFFAIRS, NAVAJO REGION, DIVISION OF TRANSPORTATION FOR THE CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE OF THE LUPTON BRIDGE AND APPROACE ROAD, PROJECT N9402 (2) 1,2\&3 LOCATED ON NAVAJO NATION TRUST LANDS IN LURTON CHAPTER, (APACHE COUNTY, ARIZONA)


## BE IT ENACTED:

## SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

A. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. Section $\$ 501$ (B) (2), The Resources and Development Committee of the Navajo Nation Council has the authority to grant final approval for all land withdrawals, nonmineral leases, permits, licenses, rights-of-way, surface easements and bonding requirements on Navajo Nation lands and unrestricted (fee) land. This authority shall include subleases, modifications, assignments, leasehold encumbrances, transfers, renewals, and terminations.

## SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

A. Bureau of Indian Affairs, Navajo Region, Division of Transportation has submitted a right-of-way (ROW) application on, over and across Navajo Nation Trust Lands in Lupton Chapter vicinity, Apache County, Arizona. The application request is attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit A.
B. The proposed right-of-way is on Route No. N9402, Project N9402(2) 1,2\&3, Lupton Chapter, Apache County, Arizona. Maps are attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit B, Right-ofWay Description is attached as Exhibit C.
C. The Navajo Land Department identified seven (7) grazing permittees on the proposed project site. Consent to use the land was obtained by six (6) grazing permittees and are attached along with the Utah Land Office/General Land Development Department memorandum dated May 9, 2017 are attached hereto and incorporated as Exhibit D.
D. The Executive Official Review conducted by the Department of Justice indicated the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) is required by 16 N.N.C. $\$ \$ 140$ et seq., to estimate the surface damages, if any, and BIA is required to deposit with the Navajo Nation, double the estimated damages determined by Navajo Land Department to ensure appropriate compensation, if any, to Mr. Shirley, a permittee who was unable to be located for his consent. The Memorandum by the Department of Justice is attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit E.
E. A waiver of consideration is requested. The right-of-way project would serve a public purpose because the project will benefit Navajo residents. Re-submittal of the Right-of-Way Application for Construction and Maintenance of the Lupton Bridge and Approach Road, Project $\mathrm{N} 9402(2) 1,2, \& 3$, located in Lupton, Apache County, Arizona is attached and incorporated herein as Exhibit $F$ and Terms and Conditions is attached and incorporated herein as Exhibit G.
F. The environmental and archaeological studies has been completed and attached hereto as Exhibit H.
G. It is in the best interest of the Navajo Nation to grant the right-of-way to Bureau of Indian Affairs, Navajo Region, Division of Transportation, because the project will benefit Navajos living in the area.

## SECTION THREE. APPROVAL

A. The Resources and Development Committee of the Navajo Nation Council hereby approves the Grant of Right-of-Way to Bureau of Indian Affairs, Navajo Region, Division of Transportation on, over and across Navajo Nation Trust Lands in Lupton Chapter vicinity, Apache County, Arizona. The location is more particularly described on the survey map attached as Exhibit B.
B. The Resources and Development Committee of the Navajo Nation Council hereby waives consideration for the right-of-way project because the project will benefit Navajo residents.
C. The Resources and Development of the Navajo Nation Council hereby approves the right-of-way subject to, but not limited to, the following terms and conditions incorporated herein and attached as Exhibit G.
D. The Resources and Development Committee of the Navajo Nation Council hereby authorizes the President of the Navajo Nation to execute any and all documents necessary to affect the intent and purpose of this resolution.

The purpose of the proposed action is to improve the safety and efficiency of transportation along Route N9402, BIA Project N9402(2)1,2\&3, including BIA Bridge N9402, the Lupton Chapter Bridge, and the Approach Road, whereas the local and other community residents along this route who depend upon N94021(2) for travel to Window Rock, AZ and Gallup, NM for goods and services by upgrading the existing bridge and dirt road to an all weather approach road including realignment, asphaltic pavement, and related traffic safety improvements. Currently, the existing bridge and roadway is at times impassable during wet and inclement weather due to the clayey soils, thus jeopardizes the public's health and safety. The proposed improvements will also address the expected increase in traffic volumes throughout the future.

3. To restore the lands as nearly as may be possible to their original condition upon the completion of construction, to the extent compatible with the purpose for which the right-of-way was granted.
4. To clear and keep clear the lands within the right-of-way to the extent compatible with the purpose of the right-of-way; and dispose of all vegetative and other material cut, uprooted or otherwise accumulated during construction and maintenance of the project.
5. To take soil and resources conservation protection measures, including weed control, on the land covered by the right-of-way.
6. To do everything reasonable within its power to prevent and suppress fires on or near the lands to be occupied under the right-of-way.
7. To build and repair such roads, fences and trails as may be destroyed or injured by construction work and to build and maintain necessary and suitable crossings for all roads and trails that intersect the works constructed, maintained, or operated under the right-of-way.
8. That upon revocation or termination of the right-of-way, the applicant shall, so far as in reasonably possible, restore the land to its original condition. The determination of "reasonably possible" is subject to Secretary's approval.


9. That the applicant will not interfere with the use of the lands by or under the authority of the landowners for any purpose not inconsistent with the primary purpose for which the right-of-way is granted.
10. During the term of this Grant of Easement, if any previously unidentified cultural resources are discovered within the easement area, work should be halted immediately and the BIA and/or Tribal Contractor should be contacted immediately.

## THE APPLICANT FURTHER STIPULATES AND EXPRESSLY AGREES AS FOLLOWS:

To conform and to abide by all applicable requirements with respect to the right-of-way herein applied for. The applicant agrees to conform to and abide by the rules, regulations, and requirements contained in the Code of Federal Regulations, Title 25 Indians, Part 169, as amended, and by reference includes such rules, regulations and requirements as a part of this application to the same effect as if the same were herein set out in full.

The Department of Justice (DOJ) has reviewed the above-referenced 164 Review Document request and has the following comments:

Senior Right-of-Way (ROW) Agent with Utah Land Office, Ms. Belinda Chee, along with Mr. Randall Comb, Lupton District Grazing Committee (DGC) member had identified eight grazing permittees. Seven permittees had consented and one was unable to be located for his consent. According to Ms. Whee and Mr. Comb, Mr. Perry Shirley was unable to be located for his consent because he is residing in Phoenix, Arizona. Therefore, the BIA is required by 16 N.N.C. $\S \S 1401$ et seq., to estimate the surface damages, if any, and BIA is required to deposit with the Navajo Nation, double the estimated damages determined by Navajo Land Department (NLD) to ensure appropriate compensation, if any, to Mr. Shirley, a permittee who was unable to be located for his consent. If Mr. Shirley, above-named permittee, later gives his consent and seeks no consideration, the surface damages compensation should be returned to BIA.

If the affected use area is shared by Mr. Perry Shirley and others who have already consented, then the amount of the deposit required should only reflect their prorated share of the damages. DOJ requests NLD to follow the procedures set for at 16 N.N.C. §§ 1401 et seq., in processing the ROW for BIA Navajo Route Road.

The Naa'bik'iyati Committee of the $22^{\text {nd }}$ Navajo Nation Council (NNC) has authorized the BIA Navajo Region Division of Transportation (BIA-NRDOT) to improve the BIA Route N9402(2)1,2\&3 Bridge and Approach Road traversing through Navajo Nation and Indian Allotments lands.

At the request of community members and the Navajo Nation Resource Development Committee (RDC), this road Project is scheduled for improvements so as to alleviate hardship/difficult traveling conditions during the winter and rainy seasons, especially for the school buses and the elders. This Project crosses through one (1) Indian Allotment land and a small tract of Navajo Nation Trust lands.

A Right-of-Way Application was submitted to the Navajo Nation on July 25, 2003 (enclosed) but was returned (no returned copy available) to the Bureau indicating no Navajo Nation lands were part of this Project. After lengthy research and assistance from the Bureau of Land Management Cadastral Surveys; it has been determined a small portion of this Project does include Navajo Nation Trust lands.

BIA-NRDOT is re-submitting the Right-of-Way Application and supporting documents for BIA Project N9402(2)1,2\&3, Lupton Bridge and Approach Road crossing Navajo Nation lands. Furthermore, BIA-NRDOT is requesting the Navajo Nation to waiver any and all compensation subject to this application. The supporting documentation includes:

1. One original and a photocopy of the Title 25, Part 169 Right-of-Way Application;
2. One original reproducible right-of-way plat map;
3. Two photocopies of the right-of-way plat map;
4. Two photocopies of the legal description; and
5. One photocopy of the Environmental Assessment (EA) report consisting the Archaeological Clearance report and Finding of No Significant Impact report;

In addition, BIA-NRDOT is requesting the Right-of-Way Grant of Easement Terms and Conditions include a utility provision as follows:

Control all access to adjoining properties, any utility crossings or installations, and oversize or over weight vehicles through the permitting process consistent with Title 23, Code of Federal Regulations Part 645 and 710.

# TERMS AND CONDITIONS 

Right-of-Way for BLA
Project No. N9402(2)1,2\&3
Navajo Route N9402 including the Lupton Chapter Bridge - Apache County, AZ
a. The term of the right-of-way shall be 75 years.
b. Consideration for the grant of the right-of-way is hereby waived, because the project will benefit Navajos living in the area.
c. The Grantee shall abide by all laws and regulations of the Navajo Nation and of the United States, now in force and effect or as may be hereafter in force and effect, including but not limited to the following:
i. Title 25, Code of Federal Regulations, Parts 162 and 169;
ii. All applicable Federal and Tribal antiquities laws and regulations, with the following additional condition: In the event of a discovery must cease and the Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Department must be notified immediately. As used herein, "discovery" means any previously unidentified or incorrectly identified cultural resources, including but not limited to archeological deposits, human remains, or location reportedly associated with Native American religious/traditional beliefs or practices; and
iii. The Navajo Preference in Employment Act, 15 N.N.C. $\S \S 601$ et seq., and the Navajo Nation Business Preference Law, 5 N.N.C. §§ 201 et seq.;
d. The Grantee shall clear and keep clear the lands within the right-of-way to the extent compatible with the purpose of the right-of-way, and shall dispose of all vegetation and other materials cut, uprooted, or otherwise accumulated during construction and maintenance of the project.
e. The Grantee shall at all times during the term of the right-of-way and at the Grantee's sole cost and expense, maintain the land and all improvements thereon and make all necessary and reasonable repairs.
f. The Grantee shall obtain permission to cross-existing rights-of-way from the appropriate parties before construction the proposed project.
g. The Grantee shall be responsible for and promptly pay all damages when they are sustained.
h. The Grantee shall not assign, convey or transfer, in any manner whatsoever, the right-of-way or any interest therein, or in or to any of the improvements on the
land, without the prior written consent of the Navajo Nation and the Secretary. Any such attempted assignment, conveyance or transfer without such prior written consent shall be void and of no effect. The consent of the Navajo Nation may be granted, granted upon conditions or withheld in the sole discretion of the Navajo Nation.
i. Holding over by the Grantee after the termination of the right-of-way shall not constitute a renewal or extension thereof or give the Grantee any rights hereunder or in or to the land or to any improvements located thereon.
j. The Navajo Nation and the Secretary shall have the right, at any reasonable time during the term of the right-of-way, to enter upon the premises, or any part thereof, to inspect the same and any buildings and other improvements erected or placed thereon.
k. Nothing contained herein shall be construed to affect or be deemed a waiver of the sovereign immunity from suit of the Navajo Nation.

1. The terms and conditions contained herein shall extend to and be binding upon the successors, heirs, assigns, executors, contractors and subcontractors, of the Grantee, and the term "Grantee," whenever used herein, shall be deemed to include all such successors, heirs, assigns, executors, administrators, employees and agents.
m . Grantee shall retain as much of the natural vegetation within the right-of-way as possible.
n. Grantee shall re-vegetate all disturbed areas.
o. There is expressly reserved to the Navajo Nation full territorial legislative, executive and judicial jurisdiction over the rights-of-way and all lands burdened by the right-of-way, including without limitation over all persons, including the traveling public, and all activities conducted or otherwise occurring within the right-of-way, and specifically including, but not limited to, jurisdiction to enforce speed limits and compliance with traffic control devices, jurisdiction to enforce Navajo Nation laws applicable to the operation of motor vehicles and jurisdiction to adjudicate disputes arising from motor vehicle accidents or other conduct, or activities occurring within the right-of-way, and the right-of-way and all lands burdened by the right-of-way shall be and forever remain Navajo Indian Country for purposes of Navajo Nation jurisdiction consistent with federal law.

The proposed action is the replacement of an existing bridge (No. 656) which crosses the Rio Puerco River on Navajo Route 9402 approximately 1 kilometer ( 0.6 mile ) south of the Lupton Chapter House, Lupton, Apache County, Arizona. The new bridge, a two-lane, five-span reinforced concrete bridge, will be installed at the same location as the existing bridge. The road approaches will be graveled, pending asphalt paving in the future. The project is sponsored by the Navajo Region Branch of Roads, P.O. Box 1060, Gallup, New Mexico 87305.

The project environmental assessment (EA) was reviewed in the Branch of Environmental Services, Navajo Regional Office. Based on the proposed action information contained in the environmental assessment, and the mitigation measures specified in the document, it is determined that the proposed project will not have a significant impact on the natural and human environment. Therefore, in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act, Section 102 (2) (C), an environmental impact statement will not be required.

The following references, incorporated in the project environmental assessment document, serve as the bases for this decision:

1. Agency and public involvement was solicited, and environmental issues relative to the bridge replacement project were identified. Alternative courses of action and mitigation measures were developed in response to environmental concerns and issues.
2. The EA disclosed the environmental consequences of the proposed and "no action'' alternatives.
3. In compliance with the Endangered Species Act, informal consultation was held with the Navajo Fish and Wildife Department (NFWD), Natural Heritage Program and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The project is not expected to affect any federally listed species or significantly impact any tribally listed species or other species of concern (Appendix D - NFWD Letter). If active bird nests are found prior to or during construction, the NFWD is to be contacted immediately for coordination of mitigation (Appendix D - Biological Resources Compliance Form, NNDF\&WL Review No. 003-008).
4. Potential impacts to flood plains and wetlands by the proposed project have been evaluated in accordance with Executive Orders 11988 and 11990. There are no jurisdictional wetlands in the project area (Appendix D - Biological Evaluation Report). The described action will have no effect on wetlands, riparian areas, flood plains, or other sensitive areas.
5. In compliance with the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended, Section 106 and 36 CFR 800.9 (b) consultation, a cultural resource inventory was performed for the proposed project by archaeologists from the Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Department (NNHPD), Roads Section. The NNHPD issued Cultural Resources Compliance Form (CRCF) NNHPD No. 03-110 indicating that no historic properties will be affected by the undertaking (Appendix C).

In the event of a discovery [discovery means any previously unidentified or incorrectly identified cultural resources including, but not limited to, archaeological deposits, human remains, or locations reportedly associated with Native American religious/traditional beliefs or practices] all operations in the immediate vicinity of the discovery must cease, and the Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Department must be notified.
6. The contractor shall be responsible for recontouring and reclaiming all disturbed areas within the right-of-way according to recommendations provided by the Navajo Department of Agriculture (Appendix E).
7. In compliance with the Clean Water Act, as amended, Section 401 consultation with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency for Clean water Act Certification shall be conducted prior to construction (EA, Part 3.4.).
8. In compliance with the Clean Water Act, as amended, Section 402 (p), Storm Water Pollution Protection, the contractor shall comply with all the conditions of the general NPDES permit and shall develop a Storm water Pollution Prevention Plan prior to initiating construction activities (EA, Part 3.4).
9. In compliance with the Clean Water Act, Section 404, as amended, the contractor shall consult with the Army Corps of Engineers prior to construction regarding 404 determination. It is anticipated that the project will be authorized under Nationwide Permit No. 14, Linear Transportation Crossings.
10. In accordance with the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, Subtitle C, Hazardous Waste, the contractor shall implement Best Management Practices (BMPs) Nos. 7 and 8 regarding potential spills and handling of oil, fuel, lubricants and hydraulic fluids (Appendix E - BMPs).
11. In accordance with the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, Subtitle D, NonHazardous Waste, the contractor shall implement Best Management Practices (BPs) No. 6 regarding trash disposal (Appendix E - BMPs).
12. Cumulative and secondary effects on soil, water, air, vegetation, cultural resources, wildlife resources (species and habitat) were considered, and the proposed mitigation measures were found to be acceptable.
13. In accordance with Executive Order 12898 on Environmental Justice, impacts to minority and low-income populations and communities have been considered by the Regional NEPA Coordinator, as have impacts to Indian trust resources.

The proposed project, supported by resolution of the Lupton Chapter (Appendix A), would alleviate the safety hazards associated with the existing bridge, and allow safe travel for community residents living on the south side of the Rio Puerco River.

### 1.0 Purpose of and need for the Action

### 1.1 Summary of Proposed Action:

The Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA), Navajo Regional Branch of Roads is proposing to replaced the existing bridge on Navajo Route 9402, approximately one (1) kilometer (0.6 mile) south of Lupton Chapter House, Lupton, Arizona.

The existing bridge structure crosses the Rio Puerco River. The bridge consists of a one lane, five - span steel truss with timber decking. The existing bridge will be replaced by a two lane, five (5) span reinforced concrete bridge. The proposed bridge will be at the same location as the existing bridge. The road approaches will be graveled for a final riding surface until traffic counts are high enough to justify asphall paving some time in the future. Total project area involved is approximately 8.8 acres.

The current traffic volume for this project is 482 vehicles per day for $F Y$ 2001, with a projected volume of 717 vehicles per day by 2021 . This project is proposed for construction in FY 2003.

### 1.2 Purpose and Need for Action :

The existing crossing is used daily by school buses and the local community. The Lupton Chapter requested that this bridge be replaced as the bridge is in dire need of replacement. To repair and up-keep the maintenance of the structure would cost the maintenance department more money in the future and the bridge is becoming unsafe for the commuters that use this bridge crossing.

The need for action is the existing one lane bridge is very old. The nuts and bolts are loose on the wood decking and it is falling apart. The guard rails on the bridge are not up to standard specification, thus a new bridge is required. The river bank at the north bridge corner is eroding and concrete curbing and other debris has been dumped into this section to try to prevent continuous erosion.

### 1.3 Location :

The project is located in Section 8, Township 22 North and Range 31 East in Lupton, Apache County, Arizona.

### 2.0 Alternatives :

2.1 Alternative 1; No Action:

Under the no action alternative the existing bridge will not be improved and will continue to deteriorate and become unsafe for the commuters to travel on. It will
require a significant amount of maintenance to keep it operational. The maintenance funds needed for this would put additional strain on the BIA maintenance department. Other alternatives were considered but eliminated as the existing road alignment was preferred.

Impacts to other alternatives would cost considerable through additional feasibility assessment of the environment crossing. More disturbance to the wash and the embankment will occur if a new alignment was chosen.
2.2 Alternative 2; Preferred Alternative;

The existing bridge will be removed and replaced with a new bridge structure at the same alignment location to avoid additional disturbance to the channel. The existing road approach alignment will remain unchanged. The new bridge has been designed to meet AASHTO specifications. With the new bridge in-place, the commuters will be able to cross the river safely. Without the new bridge, the community will be adversely affected.

### 3.0 Affected Environment:

3.1 Land Resources:

1. Topography, Soils, and Geology will not be affected by this project.

### 3.2 Water Resources:

## 1. Surface water:

There is no evidence of surface water, except during the rainy season on the proposed project vicinity. Any storm water that drains into the Rio Puerco River during or before construction start will be protected by stormwater / pollution and erosion / sediment control devices.
2. No springs are known to exist within the proposed project, although there is an old artesian well near by. This well is no longer used by the community The depth of this ground water is unknown.

## 3. Wetlands:

Wetland delineation will not be required. The Biological Report indicates that there is no wetland within the ROW of the project site and therefore will not be affected. ( See BE report Appendix D).
4. The Navajo Regional Branch of Roads will be applying for the Clean Water Act Section 401, Water Certification and Clean Water Act 404, Nationwide Permit \# 14 verification before the construction begins.

This project is proposed for FY-2003. The Clean Water Act Section 402, Storm Water Pollution Protection will also be applied for by the Contractor with the coordination of
the Navajo Regional Branch of Roads.

### 3.3 Air Resources:

1. Air Quality, Visibility, and Climate and Meteorology will not be affected by the bridge construction.

### 3.4 Biotic Resources:

1. The project area is located within the Great Basin Desert Scrub biotic community. The junipers primarily grow on the north and south plateaus.
2. Wildlife, The project area provides potential habitat for terrestrial wildlife such as common ravens, crows, and varieties of small birds. (See BE report Appendix D).
3. Riparian / Aquatic, Within the Rio Puerco River aquatic plant life is limited at the project site. Only Saltcedar and Rubber rabbit brush, and grasses were observed. No aquatic wildlife was observed during the survey, however, some amphibian species could utilize the water ponds within the river.
4. No threatened or endangered species were observed during the biological survey. However, during the field survey house finches and European starlings were observed nesting on the existing bridge. A qualified biologist is required to do another survey prior to construction start to ensure the bird nesting is not active. House finch is protected by MBTA.

## 5. Vegetation:

A few widely scattered Juniper, shrubs, such as Rabbit Brush, Saltcedar, sage brush, Russian thistle, Plains prickly-pear cactus, Narrowleaf yucca and various grasses exist in the general area.

No riparian nor aquatic life were observed during the survey or threatened and endangered species in the project area.

Minimal adverse impact is expected by the construction of this project.

### 3.5 Cultural Resources:

1. Traditional Cultural Properties, Historic, Religious Properties:

A survey was conducted by the Navajo Historic Preservation Dept. Roads Planning Program with negative results.
2. Archaeological Resources:

No archaeological resources were identified during the assessment survey. Since the Traditional Cultural Properties, Historic, Religious Properties and

Archaeological findings were negative. It will not be affected. ( See Appendix C).

### 3.6 Socioeconomic Conditions:

Socioeconomic Conditions will not be affected due to bridge construction. Employment and Income, Demographics and Trends, and lifestyles, Cultural values, attitudes, expectations will continue without considerable adverse effects.

Commuters that travel to work will be temporarily delayed due to distance of the detour road. Once the new bridge is completed, The commuters will have quick and safer access to where ever they are going to take care of their business.

## Community Infrastructure:

In the community of Lupton there are three Trading Posts, two gas stations, one garage, one general store, one restaurant, two churches, one pre-school, one Senior Citizen Center and a Navajo Nations Chapter House. There is one Oil Refinery but no longer in operation due to violation and was cited by USEPA.

There are no elementary, middle or High schools. The students commute to Sanders, Arizona for their education. These are the main areas of employment, other then Window Rock, Arizona ( Navajo Nation Capital ).

There are two paved roads. Navajo Route N12 which leads to Window Rock and Highway I-40 which runs west and east, leading to major towns such as Flagstaff, Arizona to the west and Gallup, New Mexico to the east.

Since there is no medical clinic, The Lupton residents go to Gallup medical centers for their health care needs.

### 3.7 Environmental Justice:

In accordance with the Presidents' Executive Order 12898 on Environmental Justice, impacts to minority and low income populations and community have been evaluated.

### 3.7.1 Indian Trust Resources:

Since there are no trust assets obtainable within the proposed project, it will not be affected and a full assessment of the trust assets will not be included in the environmental document.

### 3.8 Environmental Module:

Under this module, the Navajo Regional Branch of Roads and its contractor shall comply with the National Environmental Protection Act, Federal Regulations as well as the Navajo Nations Regulations.
3.8.1 The Navajo Branch of Roads must ensure that the contractor Implement the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act Subtitle C, hazardous substance / waste /materials

(proposed use, storage, handling, etc.) sites.
3.8.2 The contractor shall address the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act Subtitle D, nonhazardous solid waste sites.
3.8.3 Resource Conservation and Recovery Act Subtitle I, Under Ground Storage Tanks;

The under ground storage tanks will not be used, therefore it will have no affect on the project activity.

Before the contractor addresses the issues above, the contractor is required to obtain permits from the Navajo Environmental Protection Agency (NEPA) and the State of Arizona if required for proper handling, transporting, disposal, and storage of hazardous material as well as solid waste.

The contractor must also adhere to the following Governmental Acts;

1. All mitigation measures will follow the Navajo Regional Branch of Roads Best Management Practices.
2. National Historic Preservation Act of 1996
3. Clean Air Amendments of $\mathbf{1 9 7 2}$
4. Endangered Species Act of 1973
5. Archaeological and Historic Preservation Act of 1974

Floodplain Management, Executive Order 11988
3.8.4 3.8.5 Comprehensive Environmental Response Compensation, and Liability Act Sites, include any Environmental Site Assessments;

The lead agency and the contractor must follow all the USEPA requirements to avoid penalties associated with the construction activity. All permits must be obtained from permitting agencies to dispose of solid waste, hazardous material and toxic substance.

All disposal sites must be licenced to accept such wastes for proper storage.

### 3.9 Resource / Land Use Patterns;

There are no resource use patterns for the following within the proposed project; Hunting, Fishing, Gathering, Timber Harvesting, Agriculture, Mining, nor Outdoor Recreation in the Bridge construction site.

There is a need for a transportation net work and therefore a new bridge is being 5
proposed for construction to improve the transportation system. This also falls under the land use pattern other then the development of housing and commercial use.
3.10 Other Values;

The following critical elements of the environment are not present within the project site and therefore are not affected by the No Action nor the Proposed Action alternative. Area of concerns are Wilderness, Sound and Noise, Visual Setting, Farm lands, Scenic Rivers and Recreation.

### 4.0 Environmental Consequences of the Proposed Action:

Impacts;
Overall, There are no significant adverse impacts expected of any kind. Very minor and insignificant impacts could be expected due to the removal of the existing bridge and the commuters having to make a long detour to get to their destination during the duration of the bridge construction.

### 4.1 Physical Impacts and Mitigation;

Adverse physical impacts associated with the bridge construction improvement would be minimal. The existing channel will not be altered.

The existing bridge will be replaced with a new prestressed concrete bridge with improvement of the road approaches.

Mitigation; The contractor will water down the road approach disturbance to control dust during the grading. Stormwater pollution and erosion / sediment control devices will be implemented and all disturbed areas will be reseeded with native seeds.

### 4.1.1 Water Resources;

No surface or ground water were observed that would be affected by the construction of the new bridge. Adverse impact will be minimal.

However, for mitigation the contractor shall incorporate a Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan to avoid, reduce any sediment runoff into the Rio Puerco Wash.

### 4.2 Biological Impacts and Mitigation;

Other than the removal of sparse grass cover within the project area, no significant adverse impact to the wildlife, plant life or domestic livestock is expected.
4.2.1 Threatened and / or Endangered Species Impacts;

No evidence of riparian, aquatic wildlife nor terrestrial, aquatic vegetation species within the proposed project were identified, therefore no impact is expected. However, European startling and House finch were observed nesting under the existing bridge.

Only House finch is protected by MBTA. ( See Biological Evaluation Report attached ). 6

Mitigation; Mitigation for biological community, If the contractor identifies an active bird nest prior to construction start, a qualified biologist need to remove the bird occupying the nest.
4.3 Environmental Module; During construction, the contractor may generate solid waste and at times hazardous material and toxic substance.

Prior to construction start the contractor is required to obtain permits through Navajo Environmental Protection Agency for handling of solid waste, hazardous material and toxic substance and how it will be contain at the project site.

Mitigation; To minimize disposal impacts, the contractor will submit a plan to NEPA (as required) for proper disposal of such commodities and identify proper permitted landfill facilities for disposal.

### 4.4 Cumulative Impacts;

The proposed construction of the bridge will have only minor impacts on the resources of the project area. However, these impacts will be avoided, reduced, or mitigated by the implementation of Bureau of Indian Affairs, Branch of Roads Best Management Practices and Measures (See Appendix E ).

## APPENIDIX E

## BEST MANAGEMENT PRACTICES AND RESEEDING MIXTURE

### 625.02 Material.

Add the following:
The seed shall be delivered to the project site in standard, sealed, undamaged containers. Each container shall be labeled in accordance with the U.S. Department of Agriculture rules and regulations under the Federal Seed Act. Labels shall indicate the variety or strain of seed, the percentage of germination, purity and weed content, and the date of analysis which shall not be more than nine (9) months prior to the delivery date.

Seed shall consist of the type shown in section 625.07 below. Application rates of seed as specified are for Pure Live Seed (PLS). PLS is determined by multiplying the sum of the germination and hard or dormant seed by the purity.

Weed content shall not exceed $0.5 \%$.
Straw mulch shall be certified, "Weed free". Copies of the certification shall be furnished to the COR prior to application of mulch.
625.03 Turf Establishment Season.

Add the following:
Seeding and mulching shall be performed immediately when final slope grading is completed but shall not be done during the months of November 15 through March 15.
625.04 Preparing Seedbed.

The second sentence of the first paragraph is superseded with the following:
Remove all weeds, sticks, high stone concentration areas with stones of 75 mm in size or larger, and other debris detrimental to application, growth, or maintenance of the turf.

Add the following:
Seedbed preparation shall be accomplished with a disc harrow, chiseling tool or with other equipment which will provide an even mixture of fertilizer into the soil.

Tillage will not be required on slopes of $2: 1$ or steeper. However, such slopes shall be fertilized, seeded and mulched as required. Tillage operation shall be performed so as to produce a soil surface that is rough, firm and free of clods.

Tillage shall be performed across the slope when practical. No work shall be done when the moisture content of the soil is unfavorable.

In areas which, in the opinion of the COR, are too rocky to till without drastically disturbing the completed roadway sections, the COR will approve a reduction of tillage accordingly.

## Watering.

This section is superseded with the following:

Moisten seeding areas before seeding and maintain the moisture until 10 days after germination (as required). The water used shall be measured and paid for in accordance with the unit price bid for item 20601.

Fertilizing.
Add the following:
All areas to be seeded shall have ammonium phosphate, at a rate of 56 kg per Ha , uniformly applied to the surfaces to be seeded and tilled into a minimum of 76 mm of the surface.

Seeding.
Add the following:
Seeding shall be accomplished by the Dry Method.
After the tillage is completed and accepted by the COR, seed shall be planted by drill, except that on slopes too steep or rocky, seed may be broadcast provided that it is covered by dragging, hand raking or other approved methods. The type of seed and pure live seed rate is as follows:

Seed shall be planted approximately 6 mm deep, with a maximum depth of 13 mm . The distance between the drilled furrows shall not be more than 203 mm . If the furrow openers on the drill exceed 203 mm , the area shall be drilled twice. Seeding shall be done with grass seeding equipment with double disc openers, depth bands, packer wheels or drag chains, rate control attachments, seed boxes with agitators and separate boxes for small seed.

Seed of different sizes shall be sowed from at least two separate boxes adjusted or set to provide the seeding rate specified above.

## Mulching:

The first sentence is superseded with the following:
Apply straw mulch at a rate of $4500 \mathrm{~kg} / \mathrm{Ha}$ after seeding by the following methods:
ethod of Measurement.

The first sentence is superseded with the following:
Measure seeding by the hectare on the ground surface, or by the slurry. Fertilizer and mulching shall not be measured for payment but shall be considered a subsidiary obligation of the Contractor covered under the work for this section.

## Best Management Practices

In order to avoid, reduce, or mitigate potentially adverse impacts during the construction of this project, the Navajo Regional Division of Transportation Contractor will incorporate the following best management practices (to the fullest extent).

1. Construct the project in accordance with the Manual for Standard Specifications for Construction of roads on Federal Highway Projects (FP-03), and in compliance with all applicable Navajo Tribal and Federal laws, codes, safety regulations, and executive orders.
2. The BIA Contractor will avoid any increase in sedimentation of bodies of water on or near the project by preparing and implementing a Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP). The Contractor will implement the SWPPP prior to any ground-disturbing activities. Adjustments in the SWPPP, during construction, shall be coordinated with the AOTR to insure compliance with the Clean Water Act.
3. The BIA Contractor shall stockpile the existing topsoil for uses in re-vegetation of borrow pits and roadway slopes, where feasible in accordance with the FP-03 and contract specifications.
4. The cut and fill volumes will be balanced as much as possible to avoid the use of borrow sources and all slopes shall be rounded to blend into the existing terrain. All disturbed ground on the project will be disked, seeded, mulched, and re-vegetated as described in section 625 of the supplemental specifications.
5. The following BMPs will be followed for all structural improvements, including any pipelines, storage tanks, and troughs:
a) Any existing pipelines shall be protected in-place unless otherwise stated in the design plans. All existing trash shall be removed from project site, and no trash will be allowed on property.
b) All equipment brought in from off the site will be power washed before entering the site to avoid the possible introduction and invasion of noxious and invasive weeds. All construction . debris, falsework, forms, and equipment would be removed from project site at the end of each day unless specifically authorized in writing by the AOTR.
c) Ground disturbance from the heavy equipment would be re-seeded with a certified weed free seed mix. The seed would be suitable to area and match existing native species.
d) If an archeological site is encountered, construction must cease in the area, and the AOTR and BIA Regional DOT office must be notified immediately.
e) If at any time, populations of noxious weeds are encountered, construction must cease and measures must be taken to clear the right of way. The problem area would be sprayed with the appropriate herbicide. By law, the target weed must be listed on the label of the herbicide being applied, and the rate applied must be in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations in accordance with section $109.02(\mathrm{~m})$ of the supplemental specifications for this project.
6. Construction hours will be between $6: 00 \mathrm{am}$ and $8: 00 \mathrm{pm}$, Monday through Saturday, (weather permitting). In high wildlife use areas, an alternate construction schedule may be used in consultation with the Navajo Department of Fish and Wildlife and/or U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.
7. The Contractor's camp and equipment storage area will be kept clean and free of oils, waste materials, and other litter at all times, to prevent such materials from entering bodies of water. All trash will be disposed of in accordance with EPA regulations and all camp sites and equipment storage areas will be restored to their natural condition at project completion (in accordance with permit requirements). Acquiring of permits shall be closely coordinated with the AOTR.
8. The Contractor will inspect daily all construction equipment for leaks and notify the BIA AOTR/Project Manager on the removal of leaking equipment from the project site until the leaking equipment is repaired and spills cleaned up to the satisfaction of the Project Manager and Environmental Quality Office. Equipment will be washed down in a designated area to prevent transport of mud, noxious weeds, and other debris from leaving the project limits when transporting equipment off the project site. Such debris will be collected and hauled off to a disposal site by the Contractor. The Contractor must have a spill prevention plan in place to contain spills, mitigate the spills, and remove all the pollutants off the project to an approved waste repository.
9. Noxious weed control Standard Operating Procedures for work on New Lands will be as follows:
a. Ensure equipment involved in land disturbing actions, be clean of noxious weed seeds or propagative parts prior to entry on site. When working in areas with noxious weeds equipment should be cleaned prior to moving off site.
b. Survey and inventory proposed work areas for noxious weeds; take reasonable measures to avoid spread of noxious weeds found (ie - cleaning equipment with pressure washers, stockpiling overburden material for later treatment, avoiding driving through weed patches). Consult with the BIA regional DOT office on any known species of noxious weeds in the project area before construction begins.
c. Use only certified weed free erosion control and re-vegetation materials (eg. mulch, seed, natural fiber mats).
d. If fill dirt or gravel will be required, the source needs to be noxious weed free to the fullest extent possible.
e. The site should be monitored for the life of the project for the presence of noxious weeds (includes maintenance \& construction activities). If weeds are found the AOTR will be notified and the AOTR will determine the best method for the control of the particular weed species in consultation with the Regional DOT office.
f. Reclamation and re-vegetation of the work site will use species specified by the specifications. All seed should be certified weed free. The area will be monitored to determine the success of the re-vegetation, and re-vegetation may have to be continued until successful.
g. Any need for noxious weeds treatment shall be in accordance with section 109.02 (m) of the FP2003.
10. All oils, fuels, lubricants, and hydraulic fluids will be kept in sealed storage containers and or facilities that meet EPA regulations for preventing contamination of the environment. Again a spill prevention plan must be in place.
11. Damage to trees and shrubs outside of the construction limits will be replaced by the Contractor at his expense as directed by the AOTR.
12. Parking and staging areas will be limited to the construction limits. Existing roads will be used for detours, storage of equipment, and the hauling of materials and water to the fullest extent possible. The Contractor shall cooperatively work with the AOTR in the construction and maintenance of the detour road. Storage areas within the construction limits will utilize existing disturbed areas and be kept as small as possible as authorized in writing by the AOTR.
13. The installation of drainage structures will be undertaken in such fashion so as to minimize soil erosion and to provide for a minimum of 610 mm of cover over the pipe as measured from the roadway shoulder.
14. Structural replacements will be performed during periods of low- or no-flow periods to minimize water quality impacts. The Contractor shall install Lined waste pits for concrete or asphalt on the project in a level ground at least 100 feet away from any drainage and outside the construction limits. If these pits are to be located on private property, the Contractor must get permission in writing from property owners. No dumping of waste concrete will be allowed on the project site except in the lined pits which will immediately be removed from the project once the concrete or asphalt work is finished. Any and all excess concrete and asphalt materials will be disposed of (off site) in accordance to EPA regulations and the FP-2003.
15. The Contractor will acquire water-use and aggregate material permits through the BIA and land owners, and follow all requirements of such permits, including royalties and environmental protection.
16. The Navajo Regional Division of Transportation and construction Contractor will acquire and comply with the following regulations regarding the Federal Clean Water Act:
a. Section 404 permit
b. Water Quality (Section 402) Certification
c. National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit and the Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan

A Notice to Proceed with work that may impact waters of the U.S. or Navajo Nation waters will NOT be issued until the 401, 402, 404 and other project permits are in place and the requirements are reviewed and discussed with the contractor.
17. Comply with all mitigation requirements concerning archaeological sites on or near the project site as defined in the compliance documents.
