TITLE OF RESOLUTION: PROPOSED NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL RESOLUTION; AN ACTION RELATING TO RESOURCES AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE, BUDGET AND FINANCE COMMITTEE; NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE AND THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; APPROVING SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING FROM THE UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE IN THE AMOUNT OF \$157,662.57 FOR THE TSE SI ANI CHAPTER POWER LINE EXTENSION PROJECT; WAIVING 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I) AND 860(C) RELATING TO THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROCESS

PURPOSE: This resolution, if approved, will approve supplemental funding from the unreserved, undesignated fund balance (UUFB) in the amount of \$157,662.57 for the Tse Si Ani Chapter Power Line Extension Project, waiving 12 N.N.C. § 820(I) and § 860(C) relating to the Capital Improvement Process. The Tse Si Ani Chapter Power Line Extension Project is not included in the Title 12 Capital Improvement Plan as approved by Navajo Nation Council Resolution CAP-18-14.

This written summary does not address recommended amendments as may be provided by the standing committee. The Office of Legislative Counsel requests each committee member to review the proposed resolution in detail.

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20	SECTION ONE. AUTHORITIES	
21	A. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820 (L), "[t]he Navajo Nation Council may adopt and	
22	approve supplemental appropriations to the Annual Comprehensive Budget during	
23	the fiscal year. Supplemental appropriations of General Funds within the current	
24	fiscal year are permitted, if and when additional sources of revenues above and	
25	beyond the initial or current revenue projections are projected and which are also in	
26	excess of the reserve amount set forth at § 820(J)."	
27	B. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 300 (C)(1)(3) and (4) the Budget and Finance Committee is	
28	authorized to recommend adoption of resolutions related to the expenditure of the	
29	Nation's financial resources.	
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- C. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 501 (C)(1), the Resources and Development Committee is the oversight committee for the Navajo Nation Chapters.
- D. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(9), a proposed resolution that requires final action by the Navajo Nation Council shall be assigned to the Naabik'íyáti' Committee before it is heard by the Navajo Nation Council.

SECTION TWO. TITLE 12 FINANCE ACT SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION PROCESS AND THE TITLE 12 CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROCESS

- A. The Title 12 Finance Act Supplemental Appropriation requirements include:
 - Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(L), when the Controller identifies additional sources of revenues above and beyond the initial or current revenue projections, supplemental appropriations may be allocated by the Navajo Nation Council.
 - Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820 (L), "Supplemental appropriations made from non-recurring revenues shall only be made for non-recurring operations or purposes, as set forth at § 820 (F). The Controller of the Navajo Nation shall be responsible for designating recurring and non-recurring revenues and purposes."
 - Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(M), all requests for annual operating funds and supplemental funds shall be submitted to the Office of Management and Budget ("OMB") for budget impact analysis.
- B. The Title 12 Capital Improvement Process includes:
 - Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 810(F), "Capital Improvement" means a major project undertaken by the Navajo Nation that is generally not recurring on an annual basis and which fits within one or more of the following categories:
 - (1) All projects requiring debt obligation or borrowing;
 - (2) Any acquisition or lease of land;
 - (3) Purchase of major equipment or vehicles, with a life expectancy of five years or more, valued in excess of an amount to be established by the Controller;

- (4) Major building improvements that are not routine maintenance expenses and that substantially enhance the value or extend the useful life of a structure;
- (5) Construction of new buildings or facilities including engineering, design, and other pre-construction costs with an estimated cost in excess of an amount to be determined by the Controller; and/or
- (6) Major equipment or furnishing required to furnish new buildings or other projects, the cost of which is above a certain amount to be established by the Controller.
- 2. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820 (I), the "[d]evelopment of the Capital Budget shall be coordinated with development of the Operating Budget. All budget requests for capital improvements shall be in compliance with an adopted Capital Improvement Plan and shall not be approved unless in compliance with the Plan."
- 3. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820 (M), the Office of Management and Budget shall coordinate the overall preparation, adoption and implementation of both the annual operating and capital budgets of the Navajo Nation. All requests for annual operating funds and supplemental funds shall be submitted to the Office of Management and Budget for budget impact analysis and other appropriate action.
- 4. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 501 (B)(4)(c), the Resources and Development Committee is to review and recommend to the Navajo Nation Council through the appropriate process supplemental appropriations to the capital improvement projects annual budget to fund necessary additional capital improvement projects.
- 5. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 860 (C)(2) "[t]he appropriation portion of the Capital Improvement Plan is subject to approval of the Navajo Nation Council upon recommendation of the Budget and Finance Committee. Any modification or amendment affecting the approved Capital Improvement Plan is subject to

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review and concurrence by the Resources and Development Committee prior to consideration by the Navajo Nation Council."

SECTION THREE. FINDINGS

- A. The Tse Si Ani Chapter is requesting \$157,662.57 from the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance (UUFB) for the Tse Si Ani Chapter Power Line Extension Project. The Tse Si Ani Chapter Power Line Extension Proposal describes the project and is attached as Exhibit C. The budget documents regarding this request are attached as Exhibit D.
- B. The Tse Si Ani Chapter Power Line Extension Project is not included in the Title 12 Capital Improvement Plan as approved by Navajo Nation Council Resolution CAP-18-14.
- C. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(L), the attached memorandum, Exhibit A, dated July 13, 2016, the Office of the Controller has identified the additional revenues above and beyond the initial or current revenue projections.
- D. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(M), the attached memorandum, Exhibit B, dated July 1, 2016 contains the Office of Management and Budget Impact Analysis.
- E. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820 (L), the attached memorandum, Exhibit A, from the Office of the Controller did not specify whether this request for supplemental appropriation is from recurring or non-recurring revenues and whether it is for recurring or non-recurring purposes. The staff from the Controller's Office could be asked to make this determination when the issue comes before the standing committee(s) or the Navajo Nation Council.
- F. The Navajo Nation finds it in the best interest to waive Capital Budget and Capital Improvement Plan requirements as stated in 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I) and 860 (C) regarding the Tse Si Ani Chapter Power Line Extension Project .
- G. The Navajo Nation finds it in the best interest to approve Supplemental Appropriation of \$157,662.57 for the Tse Si Ani Chapter Power Line Extension Project.

SECTION FOUR. WAIVING 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I) AND 860 (C) REGARDING THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROCESS FOR THE TSE SI ANI CHAPTER POWER LINE EXTENSION PROJECT

The Navajo Nation Council hereby waives 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I) and 860(C) with regard to the Capital Improvement process and the Tse Si Ani Chapter Power Line Extension Project.

SECTION FIVE. APPROVING SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING FROM THE UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE IN THE AMOUNT OF \$157,662.57 FOR THE TSE SI ANI CHAPTER POWER LINE EXTENSION PROJECT

- A. The Navajo Nation Council, having received certification by the Office of the Controller of the availability of certain funds from the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance (UUFB) for supplemental appropriation hereby approves the supplemental appropriation of \$157,662.57 for the Tse Si Ani Chapter Power Line Extension Project, as further described in budget documents attached as **Exhibit D.**
- B. This supplemental appropriation of \$157,662.57 shall be from that amount of funds that exceeds the minimum fund balance of the UUFB.

Proposal

The Office of Management and Budget has reviewed the above referenced document. Upon review of the proposed supplemental funding proposal, OMB notes the following:

- 1. The Lupton Chapter appears to be requesting \$157,662.57 (previous request was for \$134,708) from the UUFB for Power Line extension for <u>6</u> households. The new total cost shows \$157,662.57 of the proposal on page 10 of the Tse si ani Chapter FY2015 Capital Improvement Funding page with \$10,500 being contributed by NTUA and \$10,000 being contributed by the Chapter. However, per the Tse si ani Chapter Resolution # TSA-2014-11-048, there are 7 households (with names included) in need of electrical services. The 164 document does not include a memo stating the confusion of possibly $\underline{7}$ households receiving powerline extension as opposed to the requested 6 households for this particular powerline project. This causes confusion and it is not clear on how many actual households are in need of power line extension.
- 2. In a previous memo, OMB requested that the proper capital project forms be used and although they were attached to the 164 document, the Project Budget Summary and Project Budget and Justification forms were left blank. These forms needed to be filled out. Other forms for operating budget were submitted and are the incorrect forms.
- \checkmark 3. The Division of Community Development should ensure that the proper documents are all in order; i.e., proper forms and information, accurate budgets, etc.
 - 4. The Office of the Controller says the UUFB has an amount of \$7,570,000 available. OMB recently compiled the Fiscal Year 2015 unmet needs list which was submitted by the oversight committees but Lupton Chapter is not on the list. There are over a \$100,000,000 in unmet needs requests which need to be considered for funding from the UUFB or other sources. These unmet needs should be considered before other requests.

OMB recommends that the above mentioned findings be addressed before final approval of the budget. If you have any questions, contact R. Tenille, SBA at OMB.

Proposal

The Office of Management and Budget has reviewed the above referenced document. Upon review of the proposed supplemental funding proposal, OMB notes the following:

- 1. The Lupton Chapter appears to have two requests within this 164 document. The first are requesting \$134,708 from the UUFB for Power line extension and the second is requesting to put this project on the Navajo Nation Capital Improvement Plan 2013-2018, which was approved by CAP-18-14. This needs to be done separately by sending the CIP listing to the Capital Improvement Office with oversight approval. If this is a request for supplemental funding then it needs to be extremely clear and not be two requests within one.
- 2. The Lupton Chapter appears to be requesting \$134,708 from the UUFB for Power Line extension for 7 households dated January 13, 2015. The total cost shows \$134,708 of the proposal on page 10 of the Tse si ani Chapter FY2015 Capital Improvement Funding page with \$10,500 being contributed by NTUA and \$10,000 being contributed by the Chapter. If these other fund contributions are correct, the total cost should be \$114,208.19 instead of \$134,708. However, there is another NTUA estimate dated March 4, 2016 with a total cost of \$178,162.57 and this is only for 6 households for power line extension. This causes confusion and it is not clear on what the actual cost is and how many actual households are in need of power line extension.
- 3. There is a mix of project forms that the Chapter is using with only page 4 being correct. The Program Budget Summary and the Detailed Line Item Budget and Justification forms need to be corrected. The proper capital project forms can be found on the OMB website.
- 4. The Office of the Controller says the UUFB has an amount of \$9,570,000 available. OMB recently compiled the Fiscal Year 2015 unmet needs list which was submitted by the oversight committees but Lupton Chapter is not on the list. There are over a \$100,000,000 in unmet needs requests which need to be considered for funding from the UUFB or other sources. These unmet needs should be considered before other requests.

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A. PROPOSAL OUTLINE/NARRATIVE

1. Abstract/Summary

To get a realistic impression of an ethnic community, it is absolutely necessary to look at its seamy side and to analyze Navajo community problems. Due to the fact that the reservations in the United States are on a different level of development, their problems are varying and of different graveness. But in many cases one problem produces the next, so there is definitely no shortage of worrying aspects among the Navajo Nation related to infrastructure issues.

Navajos live in their chapter communities, and while the neighboring cities and towns have grown immensely over the last 40 years, rural areas on the Navajo Reservation have not seen that kind of development. For the Navajo Nation's economy to be strong, the rural economy needs to grow. The Navajo Nation is still plagued by problems of malnourishment, illiteracy, unemployment and lack of basic infrastructure, like schools, hospitals, sanitation, water and powerlines. This has led to the youth moving out of the communities to work in the cities. Our communities need to grow in tandem with cities and standard of life has to improve there for inclusive growth to happen.

Navajos have lived through many generations and visiting different chapter communities very easily shows that we lag behind cities by decades. While the cities and towns have the latest services and products available within their communities, the Navajo Nation chapter communities are still coping with age old products. It is easy to see the rising disconnect between cities, towns and chapter communities. Some examples are:

- While urban communities in the United States are increasing their access to advanced telecommunications, Navajo communities lag far behind. A report from the U.S. Commerce Department stated that only 20% of rural Navajo households have a telephone, compared to 95% of the general population. On our Navajo reservation, we also lack 911 services, which put our people at risk individually and as communities during emergency crises. Even in areas with basic telecommunications infrastructure, the high cost of phone connections and service prevent many of our people from having telephone service.
- Navajo families also have limited access to computers. The number of Navajos with a
 household computer is much lower than the national average, as is access to the
 Internet. Navajo families have access to technology in some community facilities, but
 most are likely to access the Internet at schools and libraries, and due to the remoteness
 of the Navajo reservation, it makes it difficult to drive 25 to 80 miles to a nearby
 resource to access the Internet. Lack of access to the Internet further exacerbates what

- analysts have called the "digital divide," which prevents full participation in educational, economic, and healthcare opportunities, and widens the gap between those with access to digital technology and those without.
- Telephones and computers are not the only technologies in short supply on the Navajo reservation. Many communities lack basic infrastructure such as roads, utilities, and adequate housing. Of the 95 percent who have access to electricity, 35 percent of Navajo households do not have electricity. Lack of access to basic and advanced infrastructure and technologies limit the Navajo Nation's economic development, educational attainment, workforce training, and access to appropriate healthcare.

2. INTRODUCTION

Profile of the Tse Si Ani Chapter

The Tse Si Ani Community is located within the chapter of the Navajo Nation, approximately twenty-four miles west of Gallup, New Mexico. The community is located in a checkered board area of Navajo tribal trust land, allotted land, state and private lands. Interstate I-40 is the area's major east-west transportation route passing through the Tse Si Ani area. Although chapter resources provide a scenic byway in close proximity to I-40, most chapter residents reflect the same demographics found throughout the Navajo Nation, with over 50% unemployed, and only 4 commercial employers in the area, the largest of which is the Navajo Nation itself, with 4 employees in the Chapter. Agriculture remains important in the Tse Si Ani Chapter, with over 28% of the residents holding grazing permits and limited agriculture opportunities do little to address the poverty and unemployment within the chapter area.

Many chapter residents continue to live life as in earlier times with 15% without electrical power and 31.7% of households without running water. Without basic utilities, these families live essentially a Third World lifestyle in the midst of one of the richest nations in the world. Geographically, Tse Si Ani Chapter is located in the south central part of the Navajo Nation within District 18 and Fort Defiance Agency, with the Arizona/New Mexico line marking the eastern boundary for the Chapter. Window Rock is 26 miles to the north and Gallup, New Mexico, the closest town, is 24 miles to the east, which enables families from our community to travel to nearby neighboring towns to stock up on basic necessities and other supplies.

History and Background of Project

Navajo Tribal Utility Authority (NTUA) has long recognized the need to address the lack of electrical services in the Tse Si Ani Community. With 15% of the chapter's household without electricity, this creates a major threat to health and safety. Basic plumbing, including toilets and bath facilities are at the core of modern hygiene practices. NTUA supplies and extends

electricity, natural gas, water, wastewater treatment, renewable energy and telecommunication services to homes and businesses throughout the 27,000 square mile Navajo Nation and neighboring communities. Even in areas with basic electrical infrastructure, the rising high cost of electrical connections and service prevent many of our people from having electrical services.

Project Intent and Outcome

When the powerline extension is complete, six (6) families will be one step closer to the 21st Century and to restore life to its proper plane in the national economy and reinforce many of the chapter activities being carried on to achieve goals and objectives. Increased income and improved living standards will result from the use of electricity and may exert a favorable influence on the problems arising from the migration of our youth to urban communities and the distribution of population. Basically, what the Tse Si Ani Chapter needs is to empower the community people by providing them education and proper health care. They need to have infrastructure like electricity and water so they are free from the cycle of emergency crises. We need to provide them self-sufficiency and employment so they will want to stay in the community instead of migrating to nearby towns and cities.

Chapter Administrative Capacity

The Tse Si Ani Chapter government consists of three elected officials - chapter president, vice president and secretary/ treasurer, who oversee other sub-committees, including the Lupton Gateway Community and Economic Development Inc., Tse Si Ani Community Land Use Plan Committee, and Community Emergency Response Team (CERT). The Tse Si Ani senior staff includes a Chapter Manager, who oversees all chapter activities, including financial management. The administrative staff also includes an Administrative Assistant, Office Assistant and a Postal Clerk. As one of only 12 Local Governance Act (LGA) certified chapters out of the 29 Fort Defiance Agency Chapters, Tse Si Ani Chapter is able to exercise local governance using the Five Management System (FMS) Policies and Procedures. As such, the Chapter controls its own accounting (fiscal), procurement, recordkeeping, personnel and property management. Obtaining the elite LGA certification reflects the Chapter's ability to oversee a CDBG project.

Project Management Experience

Ms. Laura Lee Yazzie, Chapter Manager, will serve as the project coordinator, including overseeing financial management. Ms. Yazzie has been a part of the Navajo Nation and the Tse Si Ani Chapter Administration since 1990. She is intimately knowledgeable about chapter administration after having served a 12-year term as the Tse Si Ani Chapter Secretary/ Treasurer. Since 2009, Ms. Yazzie has served as the Lupton Community Services Coordinator

and since the Chapter's LGA certification in 2010, she serves as the Chapter Manager. Ms. Yazzie develops complex resolutions, monthly progress and financial reports, performs staff evaluations, and coordinates with chapter officials and community members in planning, implementing, and chapter community and economic development projects. She developed and implemented the Five Management System Manuals (Records, Procurement, Property, Fiscal and Personnel), obtained certification for the Tse Si Ani Chapter and developed the Strategic Plans with board oversight. Ms. Yazzie also develops and administers the chapter budget, monitors expenditures, and ensures compliance with applicable Navajo Nation laws, regulations, policies and procedures.

Management of Chapter

In completing and maintaining the requirements to become one of only 12 LGA Chapters among 29 chapters within the Navajo Nation Fort Defiance Agency, Tse Si Ani has proven itself in the top 3.6% of chapters in its ability to effectively administer chapter projects and operational programs. In order to assure a consistent quality in project management, Tse Si Ani Chapter implemented its own system manuals, providing guidance in five different areas in records, procurement, property, fiscal and personnel. These manuals are revised as needed and provide specific guidance on policies and procedures to assure efficient operation of the chapter and its programs.

In addition to in-house monitoring of chapter management, maintaining the LGA certification requires outside audits as well. Every 2 ½ years, the Navajo Nation Office of the Auditor General requires the chapter to conduct a full review of the chapter's financial records to ensure compliance with all Navajo Nation laws, policies and procedures. In March 2012, Harshwal & Company LLP, an outside CPA Firm, conducted the Tse Si Ani Chapter's FY 2010-2011 financial audit, with a final financial report of a "clean, unqualified audit with no findings." A second 3-year audit was conducted in October 2015, again, Tse Si Ani Chapter received a "clean, unqualified with no findings." In May 2014, Tse Si Ani Chapter was selected as the fiscal agent for the 2nd Annual Navajo Nation Safety & Health Conference 2014, sponsored by the Navajo Nation Occupational Safety & Health Administration. Tse Si Ani Chapter is presently serving as a fiscal agent for a \$1.4 million project, called the Little Colorado River Watershed Chapters Association (LCRWCA). The LCRWCA includes four clusters or areas of five chapters each, totaling twenty chapters in the watershed of the Little Colorado River in Arizona portions of the Navajo Nation. The LCRWCA was established to collaborate and work together with the Navajo Nation, the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service, local community-based organizations, and other agencies, in a multi-phase initiative to plan, develop, finance, implement, manage, monitor and evaluate priority natural resources conservation projects in all twenty participating chapters.

Status of Community Land Use Plan

The Tse Si Ani CLUP Committee Members recently reviewed the Community Land Use Plan (CLUP), based on the chapter's assessment on the business climate and social fabric over the past six years. The Plan was originally completed by an outside consultant in 2005. The Plan covers summary and community participation, community assessment, land suitability analysis, infrastructure analysis, and recommendations for implementation. In December 2015, the community members approved the appointment of three (3) new CLUP members. The members began their work to reevaluate and revise the CLUP. The report is based on:

- A proposed strategic plan for better integrating the Tse Si Ani Chapter community into the Navajo Nation economic growth;
- A needs assessment to research the gap between assisting small business needs and what is available;
- A shift in focus on the need to create jobs and make Tse Si Ani more business friendly while maintaining the community's quality of life and core community values;
- A discussion of economic, social and environmental trends in the community and neighboring communities.

This project particularly addresses identified gaps in critical infrastructure in serving the Tse Si Ani Chapter residents. Availability of electricity is a critical service currently lacking to the eight homes identified by this project.

Status of Chapter's Capital Plan

The Capital Plan for Tse Si Ani Chapter has been incorporated into the 2014-2016 Strategic Plan. Capital improvement efforts included in that plan are:

- Ensure adequate infrastructure for revitalization
- Repair and renovation of low-income housing
- Construction of mixed-income housing

Addition of basic services such as electricity and running water, including modern plumbing in the homes of the Tse Si Ani residents are a top priority for the Chapter's strategic and capital plan. The powerline extension project for the Tse Si Ani community will further provide long-term efforts and will benefit one of the key areas identified by the Chapter.

Resolution Approving Application

Attached to this proposal includes a copy of the Tse Si Ani Chapter Resolution TSA-2016-06-032, requesting the placement of "Scattered Powerline Extension Project" to the Navajo Nation Capital Improvement Plan 2013-2018, Fort Defiance Agency/Proposal Number F/59.

NEEDS AND GOALS

While there are lights shining brightly with the flip of a switch, there are families who do not have the convenience of flipping a switch to read, cook, watch TV, let alone have access to computers and kitchen appliances. With no internet services, our children are unable to conduct research for a report, watch educational shows or to utilize Goggle or Wikipedia. We have a huge shortage of good teachers in our schools and the school drop-out rate is high. In a world of modern conveniences, and the health and hygiene improvements made possible through electricity, 15 % of the homes in the Tse Si Ani community do not have electricity. While schools strive to obtain computer access for students in urban areas, children in our community do not even have lights to turn on to do homework, have a hot shower or open a refrigerator door to get a snack.

The very real health hazards created by lack of electricity motivated the Tse Si Ani Chapter Officials and Staff to identify the scattered powerline extension project as a priority project. For the Tse Si Ani Chapter leadership, it is not just the statistical health risks associated with living conditions in a home without electricity, but also knowing the people who live there and how such a deficiency affects their daily lives. We feel that addressing this need for the people in our community must be rectified as soon as possible.

Number of People Served/Low and Moderate Income

As delineated in the Form B attached to this proposal, all of the 6 households served by this project are low-income.

Description of How People Selected

Ongoing assessments of availability of basic services have been conducted by the Tse Si Ani Chapter Staff. Individuals selected for the process were a result of their residence in an area where resources were unavailable to offer basic electrical services.

Impact and Benefits of the Project

Electricity is one of those discoveries that have changed the daily life of everybody on the planet. Electricity is the key component to modern technology and without it most of the things that we use every day simply would not work. Our mobile phones, our computers, the Internet, our heating system, refrigerators, television, light bulbs – nearly everything in the home would be completely different without electricity. As long as electricity is available, no one thinks much about it. The importance is realized when the power goes out. Whether it is during the day or at night, electricity keeps our lives in order. It affects our business, our schedule and even our entertainment. Everything in our world today depends on having the power to keep things running. In our homes, everything we need and enjoy is plugged into a wall socket and requires electricity. Our lives are improved no end by electricity, and it is certainly true that most people's living quality would be significantly reduced and affected if electricity were to somehow disappear. Electricity is the basis of most modern inventions and naturally without it, the 21st Century would be comparable to the 19th, which is basically what is happening within the Navajo Nation communities who do not have basic electrical services.

How Project Meets Community Needs

Basic health issues of community members are a high priority for the Tse Si Ani Chapter. Although a relatively small number of homes will be served by this powerline project, each family and/or individual served will be gaining a basic utility service critical to their health and well-being. As stated in the Tse Si Ani Chapter's strategic plan, the Chapter "exists to provide solution-oriented services facilitating economic growth and enhancing quality of life." This project goes to the very root of that purpose. Electricity is critical to improve health care delivery, education services, job creation, and security.

4. Scope of Work

Role of Key Personnel, Programs, Entities

<u>Project Manager</u>: The primary person responsible for project oversight will be Laura Lee Yazzie, Chapter Manager. She has over 26 years of experience administering Navajo Nation and Chapter projects. As Chapter Manager, she has extensive experience in developing complex resolutions, monthly progress and financial reports, and working with chapter officials and community members in planning, implementing and communicating about community and economic development plans.

<u>Construction Supervision</u>: Mr. Alvin Blackgoat, Tse Si Ani Chapter President, will provide oversight for technical aspects of the powerline project. He has extensive experience as a licensed electrician and has arranged required chapter review and provided technical assistance

to make this project possible. Mr. Blackgoat will ensure technical and regulatory compliance as the project is implemented.

<u>Programs and Entities</u>: The Electrical Construction Department/NTUA will be the primary entity partnering on the Chapter for this project. They will be responsible for actual construction and installation of project components. Upon completion of the project, the ownership of the powerline will belong to NTUA, who will handle the operation and maintenance responsibilities, including final reports and inspections.

Project Description/Summary of Design

The Tse Si Ani Chapter Powerline Extension Project involves the construction of utility service lines, overhead/underground service, service hook and inspection for 8 homes. We are requesting for CIO funding to extend lines from a main extension to provide electrical hook-ups to the homes.

Describe Accessibility Design Features

Not applicable.

Alternative Methods Considered/Feasibility Studies

Navajo Tribal Utility Authority is the only electric utility company operating within the Navajo Nation. NTUA's utility construction projects in remote areas require more equipment and employee travel time, therefore, increasing their costs of materials, supplies, and gasoline to provide these essential services. The health and well-being to residents who lack electricity were identified based on the lack of electricity to 6 home sites. The Tse Si Ani Chapter Staff reviewed existing resources, created a plan for extension of powerlines and last mile electrical hook-ups at homes currently without electricity. Possible routes for line extensions were reviewed according to a number of factors including but not limited to the individual's homesite lease, geological obstacles, right-of-way requirements by NTUA, and avoiding risks to archeological sites. Funds are needed to extend power lines to the 8 homes and provide electrical hook-ups as needed for individual homes. The most feasible and cost effective plan proved to be a powerline extension.

Who Will Operate and Maintain

NTUA will be responsible for actual construction and installation of project components. Upon completion of the project, the ownership of the powerline will belong to NTUA, who will handle the operation and maintenance responsibilities, including final reports and inspections.

Archaeological and Environmental Clearance

NTUA will expedite a cost estimate for an archaeological and environmental survey to construct a powerline extension to 6 homes in the Tse Si Ani Community.

Status of Rights-of-Way, Easements, Land Withdrawals

NTUA will expedite a right-of-way assessment to construct a powerline extension to 8 homes in the Tse Si Ani Community.

Status of Bathroom Additions, House Wiring

Six of the targeted homes have electrical housewiring to make use of extended power lines. NTUA will budget \$1,500.00 per customer provided their house is wired and ready for hook-up prior to construction.

Construction and How It Will Be Completed

Ms. Laura Lee Yazzie and Mr. Alvin Blackgoat will serve as project administrators for the technical implementation, while Ms. Laura Lee Yazzie, Chapter Manager, will maintain fiscal responsibility with overseeing the grant management. Ms. Ethelind Johns and Ms. Shannon Burnette, Electrical Construction Department, NTUA, will provide direct supervision in the construction of powerline extensions and hook-ups to homes. Ms. Yazzie will work with Ms. Johns and Ms. Burnette to perform the powerline extension project. Ms. Yazzie will monitor the project timeline with the goal of meeting the deadline to complete the project.

Who Was Involved In Planning

Ms. Laura Lee Yazzie, Tse Si Ani Chapter Manager, oversaw the planning process which included input from:

- Tse Si Ani Chapter Officials
- Public input during chapter meetings
- Input from the families on the powerline extension list
- Electrical Construction Department Staff/NTUA

Both written and verbal input was compiled and reviewed until the recommendations were made to undertake the construction of the powerline extension project.







Dear Mr. Adakai:

According to research the children who come into a school setting reading is already at the five (5%) percentile. Students who find learning to read relatively easy are approximately 20 to 25% percentile. Finally, students who find learning to read challenging is at the 60% percentile. Of this 60%, 30% experience extreme difficulty learning to read (Honig, B., Diamond, L., & Gutlohn, L., 2000).

Additionally, these are several factors that put students at risk for the reading failure which including poverty, phonological processing difficulties, language barriers, parents' low reading abilities, and/or biological of psychological learning deficits (Lyon 1998). These factors also hinder other important core subjects in school curriculums such as mathematics, science, etc.

Moreover, other elements that contribute to deter children's success is attending, electricity to attend to homework, internet research, learning technology, and finally an early introduction to learning which makes the endeavor upon obtaining resources to erect a new Headstart school building in the Tse Si Ani Chapter as an absolute need for our Diné people which are the majority population on the Navajo Nation.

Hunters Point Boarding School, Inc. (HPBS, Inc.) is in the sphere of the Tse Si Ani Chapter, Oak Springs Chapter, Saint Michael's Chapter, and Fort Defiance Chapter and the school makes a sincere effort to work with these chapter entities to plan, develop, improve, and enhance the safety, welfare, and education of our children.

In conclusion, based on these findings it is a truly a commendable effort that would certainly warrant our support to get students in school early before embarking into a regular elementary school setting such as HPBS, Inc., a K-5 school, so they are prepared to dedicate themselves to a genuine effort to learn.

The purpose of this letter is to state the Hunters Point Boarding School, Inc. is respectfully in full support of the Tse Si Ani Chapter in their attempt to obtain the Navajo Nation Community development Block Grant (CDBG) projects to develop a community that will holistically address each sacred capacity of life for its residents.

Generally, the Economic and Community Development Unit (ECDU) reviews documents for the Division of Community, but it appears that this request is from the Navajo Area on Aging Agency (NAAA). I have coordinated the review of this request with Christine Schwamberger, Attorney, who assists NAAA. As you know, all supplemental appropriation requests should be in compliance with the Budget Instruction Manual (BIM), Section XIV. In reviewing this request, it appears that there are several requirements lacking.

First, Section XIV(B)(2) requires that the Branch Chief provide a written concurrence. In reviewing the document, there is no written concurrence from President Begaye. Please obtain. Second, Section XIV(B)(2)(b)(i-ii) require that there is a contingency plan if this request is not granted and what other sources of funding have been considered and pursued. aforementioned information is lacking. Please provide. Third, Section XIV(B)(2)(d) also requires that the budget is prorated based on the remaining time left within the fiscal year. In reviewing the budget forms, it appears that the budget is for the whole amount and not prorated. Fourth, the DOJ is in agreement with the issue raised by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) noted in its memorandum dated June 13, 2016. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(I), all budget request for capital improvement shall be in compliance with the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). According to OMB, this project is not on the CIP that was approved by the Navajo Nation Council in Resolution No. CAP-18-14. Section 820(I) further provides that if the request is not compliance with the CIP, it should not be approved.

Lastly, Section XIV(E) requires that all supplemental request for capital projects are to be submitted to the Capital Improvement Office (CIO) for proper review pursuant to the established Capital Plan and budget policies and procedures. In practice, the Capital Plan has been the Transportation and Community Development (TCDC) Objective Criteria, Resolution No. TCDCJY-77-99 (Attachment 1). The TCDC Objective Criteria outlines the process to develop a Capital Plan, the required documents that need to be submitted and the duties of various entities that assist in the development and review of the Capital Plan. Because there is no documentation from CIO that indicates whether this request is in compliance with the Capital Plan, it is not clear whether this request is sufficient. It is recommended that there is written documentation from CIO that indicates that this request is in compliance with the Capital Plan.

The Office of Management and Budget has reviewed the above referenced document. Upon review of the proposed supplemental funding proposal, OMB notes the following:



The Lupton Chapter appears to be requesting \$157,662.57 (previous request was for \$134,708) from the UUFB for Power Line extension for 6 households. The new total cost shows \$157,662.57 of the proposal on page 10 of the Tse si ani Chapter FY2015 Capital Improvement Funding page with \$10,500 being contributed by NTUA and \$10,000 being contributed by the Chapter. However, per the Tse si ani Chapter Resolution # TSA-2014-11-048, there are 7 households (with names included) in need of electrical services. The 164 document does not include a memo stating the confusion of possibly 7 households receiving powerline extension as opposed to the requested 6 households for this particular powerline project. This causes confusion and it is not clear on how many actual households are in need of power line extension.

- 2. In a previous memo, OMB requested that the proper capital project forms be used and although they were attached to the 164 document, the Project Budget Summary and Project Budget and Justification forms were left blank. These forms needed to be filled out. Other forms for operating budget were submitted and are the incorrect forms.
- ✓ 3. The Division of Community Development should ensure that the proper documents are all in order; i.e., proper forms and information, accurate budgets, etc.
 - 4. The Office of the Controller says the UUFB has an amount of \$7,570,000 available. OMB recently compiled the Fiscal Year 2015 unmet needs list which was submitted by the oversight committees but Lupton Chapter is not on the list. There are over a \$100,000,000 in unmet needs requests which need to be considered for funding from the UUFB or other sources. These unmet needs should be considered before other requests.

OMB recommends that the above mentioned findings be addressed before final approval of the budget. If you have any questions, contact R. Tenille, SBA at OMB.


