RESOLUTION OF THE NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' STANDING COMMITTEE 25th NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL -- Second Year, 2024

AN ACTION RELATING TO THE NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE; APPROVING AND ADOPTING THE LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES OF THE NAVAJO NATION RELATING TO THE STATE OF ARIZONA FOR 2024

WHEREAS:

- A. Statements of policy, enactment of positive law, intergovernmental agreements, budget resolutions, and reallocations, must be reviewed and approved by resolution by the appropriate standing committee(s) and the Navajo Nation Council except as otherwise provided herein. 2 N.N.C. § 164(A).
- B. Statements of policy are written statements submitted to federal, state or local governments by a Navajo Nation official stating the official position of the Navajo Nation on proposed legislation or other action by that government. 2 N.N.C. § 110(W).
- C. The Navajo Nation established the Naabik'íyáti' Committee as a Navajo Nation Council standing committee and as such empowered Naabik'íyáti' Committee to assist and coordinate all requests for information, appearances and testimony relating to proposed county, state and federal legislation impacting the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. §§ 700(A) and 701(A)(6).
- D. Each of the 25th Navajo Nation Council Delegates representing Arizona chapters and communities recommended Arizona Legislative Priorities for 2024 for their respective area(s) of oversight to the Arizona Caucus of the Navajo Nation Council; after review and discussion, the Arizona Caucus compiled the recommendations into the 2024 Arizona Legislative Priorities attached and incorporated herein as Exhibit A.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

The Navajo Nation hereby approves the Navajo Nation's legislative priorities relating to the State of Arizona for 2024, attached as **Exhibit A**, as determined by the 25th Navajo Nation Council and authorizes the Navajo Nation President, the Navajo Nation Speaker, and their designees, and the Naabik'íyáti' Committee members, to advocate the position of the Navajo Nation with the State of Arizona, State of Arizona Legislature, Arizona State Agencies, and the State of Arizona Governor's Office for the preservation of funding and policies in the Navajo Nation's priority areas.

2. Empowerment Scholarship Accounts

 Support for the implementation of measures to ensure the accountability of funds for Arizona's private school voucher program, known as the Empowerment Scholarship Accounts, and increased funding for state funded schools on the Navajo Nation

3. Address fraudulent sober living facilities in partnership with the State of Arizona

- a. Supporting the Arizona Attorney General's efforts to prosecute and convict perpetrators of fraudulent sober living homes
- b. Provide shelter and mental health, detox, and medical services to those in need

- e. Supporting Navajo representation on state commissions/committees

6. Missing and Murdered Diné (Navajo) Relatives

- Collaboration with the Navajo Nation Council's Missing and Murdered Diné Relatives
 Task Force
- b. Support for the implementation of the Navajo Nation Victim's Rights Act of 2023
- c. Domestic violence and human trafficking prevention

7. Infrastructure

- a. Roads
 - i. Construct more bus pullouts on state roads to increase safety for all commuters
 - ii. Pedestrian safety and signage improvements along state routes and within state public school campuses
 - iii. Repaint fog-lines and pavement markings for safety
 - iv. Improve and repair lighting at all state highway junctions and intersections
 - v. Maintenance yards follow up with specific community impacted
 - vi. Secure support for additional funding through the Highway User Revenue Fund (HURF) for Apache, Navajo, and Coconino Counties
 - vii. Supporting additional MOAs with local agents to provide road maintenance assistance, especially during the winter season

b. Broadband

- i. Secure Broadband Equity Access and Deployment (BEAD) Program funding to expand high-speed internet access across the Navajo Nation
- ii. Briefing on smart highways
- iii. Deployment on Navajo and engagement on federal grants
- c. Water Infrastructure/Water
 - i. Arizona State Water Infrastructure Finance Authority
 - 1. Support eligibility of tribes and support further allocations to the fund
 - ii. Support for funding for water conservation projects
 - 1. Earthen dams
 - 2. Recharge of aquifer
 - 3. Erosion control
 - 4. Conserving/retaining water/watersheds/well rehab ANEZ
 - iii. Ensure the safety of community/school water source in Sanders, Arizona

8. Elections and Voter Protection

- a. Support for the Navajo Nation's comments and revisions to the 2023 Arizona Election Procedure Manual submitted to the Arizona Secretary of State
- b. Apache County same day voter registration

9. Health Care

- a. Establish substance abuse/addiction detox, treatment, and rehabilitation centers on the Navajo Nation
- b. AHCCCS
 - i. Uphold consistent tribal consultation with the Navajo Nation
 - ii. Support for home care and Non-Emergency Medical Transportation
 - iii. State/Navajo Nation regulatory
 - iv. Fraudulent billing for services
 - v. Home retrofits
- c. Increase support for Diné traditional healing and teachings to help improve the overall health of our people
- d. Promote education and prevention of sexually transmitted diseases and viruses across the Navajo Nation
- e. Continue advocating for resources to prevent and mitigate the spread of Covid-19, RSV, and other viruses

- Support for new public safety facility for the Navajo Police Department in Window Rock, Arizona
- c. Collaborate with the State of Arizona to promote and uphold the requirements of the Sex Offender Registration and Notification Act (S.O.R.N.A.) to protect children and the public from sex offenders on the Navajo Nation
- d. Completion of police substations to increase public safety presence in rural areas

- e. Work with state agencies to prevent human trafficking
