RESOLUTION OF THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL

23rd NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL-First Year, 2015

AN ACTION

RELATING TO RESOURCES AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE, BUDGET AND FINANCE COMMITTEE, NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE AND THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; APPROVING SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING FROM THE UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE IN THE AMOUNT OF \$2,922,425.00 FOR TEESTO CHAPTER CONSTRUCTION PROJECT; WAIVING 12 N.N.C. § 820(I) AND 860(C) RELATING TO THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROCESS

BE IT ENACTED:

SECTION 1. FINDINGS

- A. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820 (L), "[t]he Navajo Nation Council may adopt and approve supplemental appropriations to the Annual Comprehensive Budget during the fiscal year. Supplemental appropriations of General Funds within the current fiscal year are permitted, if and when additional sources of revenues above and beyond the initial or current revenue projections are projected and which are also in excess of the reserve amount set forth at § 820(J)."
- B. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A)(9), a proposed resolution that requires final action by the Navajo Nation Council shall be assigned to the Naabik'íyáti' Committee before it is heard by the Navajo Nation Council.
- C. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 300 (C)(1)(3) and (4) the Budget and Finance Committee is authorized to recommend adoption of resolutions related to the expenditure of the Nation's financial resources.
- D. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 501 (C)(1), the Resources and Development Committee is the oversight committee for the Division of Community Development, Capital Improvement Office.
- E. The Title 12 Finance Act Supplemental Appropriation requirements include:

- 1. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C §280(M), all requests for annual operating funds and supplemental funds shall submitted to the Office of Management and Budget ("OMB") for budget impact analysis. On April 15, 2015, the Office of Management and Budget presented its memorandum with regard to this supplemental request for appropriation. The memorandum is attached as Exhibit A. The deficiencies identified by the Office of Management and Budget were remedied and on April 21, 2015, a notation was made by OMB on the Section 164 Review Form that the documents were sufficient. See Exhibit B.
- 2. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(M), when the Controller identifies additional sources of revenues above and beyond the initial or current revenue projections, supplemental appropriations may be allocated by the Navajo Nation Council. The attached memorandum, Exhibit C, dated April 21, 2015 from the Office of the Controller has identified the additional revenues.
- F. The Title 12 Capital Improvement Process includes:
 - 1. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 810(F), "Capital Improvement" means a major project undertaken by the Navajo Nation that is generally not recurring on an annual basis and which fits within one or more of the following categories:
 - (1) All projects requiring debt obligation or borrowing;
 - (2) Any acquisition or lease of land;
 - (3) Purchase of major equipment or vehicles, with a life expectancy of five years or more, valued in excess of an amount to be established by the Controller;
 - (4) Major building improvements that are not routine maintenance expenses and that substantially enhance the value or extend the useful life of a structure;

- (5) Construction of new buildings or facilities including engineering, design, and other preconstruction costs with an estimated cost in excess of an amount to be determined by the Controller; and/or
- (6) Major equipment or furnishing required to furnish new buildings or other projects, the cost of which is above a certain amount to be established by the Controller.
- 2. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820 (I), the "[d] evelopment of shall Capital Budget be coordinated development of the Operating Budget. All budget capital improvements requests for shall be compliance with an adopted Capital Improvement Plan and shall not be approved unless in compliance with the Plan."
- 3. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820 (M), the Office of Management and Budget shall coordinate the overall preparation, adoption and implementation of both the annual operating and capital budgets of the Navajo Nation. All requests for annual operating funds and supplemental funds shall be submitted to the Office of Management and Budget for budget impact analysis and other appropriate action.
- 4. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 501 (B)(4)(c), the Resources and Development Committee is to review and recommend to the Navajo Nation Council through the appropriate process supplemental appropriations to the capital improvement projects annual budget to fund necessary additional capital improvement projects.
- N.N.C. 860 (C)(2) 5. Pursuant to 12 Ş appropriation portion of the Capital Improvement Plan is subject to approval of the Navajo Nation Council recommendation of the Budget and Any modification or amendment affecting Committee. the approved Capital Improvement Plan is subject to concurrence by the Resources and and Development Committee prior to consideration by the Navajo Nation Council."

- G. The Teesto Chapter Construction Project is not included in the Title 12 Capital Improvement Plan as approved by Navajo Nation Council Resolution CAP-18-14.
- H. Any modification or amendment affecting the approved Capital Improvement Plan is subject to review and concurrence by the Resources and Development Committee prior to consideration by the Navajo Nation Council. 12 N.N.C. § 860.
- I. An April 1, 2015 letter from the Teesto Chapter President states the need for a new chapter house because in "the early morning hours of September 6, 2014, Teesto Chapter house was burned to the ground due to arsonists. ... The Office of Risk Management is still on the process of reviewing the insurance claim; but indication is that the claim will not be anywhere near the cost for a new building. ... The Navajo Nation Design and Engineering Services Department will lead the project team and serve as the Construction Manager." The Teesto Chapter President's letter is attached as Exhibit D.
- J. The Teesto Chapter through resolution dated April 13, 2015 declared the burnout of the Teesto Chapter as a State of Emergency and requested assistance to allocate the funds to construct a new chapter building. The Teesto Chapter resolution is attached as Exhibit E.
- K. The Teesto Emergency Chapter House Construction Project is described in documents attached as Exhibit F.
- L. The Environmental Assessment for a Teesto Chapter Community Development Project in Teesto Chapter is attached as Exhibit G.
- M. The Navajo Nation finds it in the best interest to waive 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I) and 860 (C) regarding the Capital Improvement for the Teesto Chapter Construction Project.
- N. The Navajo Nation finds it in the best interest to approve Supplemental Appropriation for the Teesto Chapter Construction Project.

SECTION 2. WAIVING 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I) 1 AND 860 (C) REGARDING THE TEESTO CHAPTER CONSTRUCTION PROJECT

The Navajo Nation Council hereby waives 12 N.N.C. §§ 820(I) and 860(C) with regard to the Teesto Chapter Construction Project.

SECTION 3. APPROVING SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING FROM THE UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE IN THE AMOUNT OF \$2,922,425.00 FOR TEESTO CHAPTER CONSTRUCTION PROJECT

- A. The Navajo Nation Council, having received certification by the Office of the Controller of the availability of certain funds from the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance (UUFB) for supplemental appropriation hereby approves the supplemental appropriation of \$2,922,425.00 for the Teesto Chapter Construction Project as further described in budget documents attached as Exhibit H.
- B. This supplemental appropriation of \$2,922,425.00 shall be to a new Business Unit Number and from that amount of funds that exceeds the minimum fund balance of the UUFB.

SECTION 4. INSURANCE PAYMENT FOR THE LOSS FROM THE BURNOUT OF THE TEESTO CHAPTER HOUSE SHALL BE REPLACED INTO THE NAVAJO NATION UUFB

The Navajo Nation Council approves the placement of any insurance payment received by the Navajo Nation Risk Management Department for the loss from the burnout of the Teesto Chapter House be replaced in the UUFB.



- 1.) Part III of the Budge Form 2 shows the length of time for construction activity in Fiscal Year quarters; each quarter should have the correct Fiscal Year shown in the blank spaces.
- 2.) Appendix B: Cost Estimate-Design and Construction should show how amounts have been calculated to match Part III of Budget Form 1.
- 3.) The attached copy of the Navajo Nation Capital Improvement Plan 2013-2017, resolution CAP-18-14 does not show or list Teetso Chapter House as an approved project for construction in the amount of \$2,9222,425.00 The Appropriations Act, section 820 (I), addresses the Capital Budget requirements in the following language: "All budget request for capital improvements shall be in compliance with an adopted Capital Improvement Plan and shall not be approved unless in compliance with the Plan". Therefore, it may be necessary to either amend or waive this requirement.

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

The Office of the Controller has been asked to provide the UUFB balance.

- 1. The balance of the UUFB is \$17,981,883 as of April 16, 2015. (see attached Financial Report). The Minimum Fund balance is taken out at the beginning of the fiscal year, the minimum fund balance was established by CJA-07-06 which is 10% of prior year General Fund budget (I have attached CJA-07-06). There have been eight supplemental appropriations during the Fiscal Year 2015 in the amount of \$12,364,442. If you review "Exhibit C" of the financial report, the September 30, 2014 UUFB was \$47.9 million, an amount of \$17.5 is reserved for Minimum Fund Balance, there are eight supplemental appropriations during Fiscal Year 2015, these are deducted which brings the UUFB balance to \$17,981,883 as of April 16, 2015.
- 2. The request is seeking funding to construct a new Chapter house.

RE: Funding Request for New Chapter House

Dear Honorable Delegates:

In the early morning hours of September 6, 2014, Teesto Chapter house was burned to the ground due to arsonists. Since then, the Chapter government has been in a state of turmoil and instability while trying to provide services to the community. Like other Chapter houses, Teesto Chapter House is the central area for government services. The Chapter is temporarily using a former pre-school building ,which has half the space of the former Chapter House. Safety issues arise when the capacity level is exceeded especially during Chapter meetings.

Although Teesto Chapter is a self-governing entity, it still depends on the Navajo Nation for funding. It generates very little revenue on its own, due to lack of economic development and tax revenue. The Office of Risk Management is still on the process of reviewing the insurance claim; but indication is that the claim will not be anywhere near the cost for a new building. Therefore, a request for funding is hereby submitted to the Navajo Nation Council from the undesignated reserve for design and construction costs estimated at \$2,922,425. The final insurance settlement/claim will be given back to the Navajo Nation's Undesignated Reserve Fund.

The Navajo Nation Design and Engineering Services Department will lead the project team and serve as the Construction Manager. Due to the emergency nature of this project, the project team recommends the "design-build" project delivery approach. The design-build can save time and money for the owner, and streamlining project delivery through a single contract between the owner and the design-build team transforms the relationship between designers and builders into an alliance, which fosters collaboration and teamwork.

Requesting and Recommending the Office of the Navajo Nation President and Vice President, the Resources Development Committee, the Budget and Finance Committee, Division of Community Development, Office of Controller and the Navajo Nation Council to Recognize and Declare the Burnout of the Teesto Chapter House as a State of Emergency; and to Allocate from the Undesignated Unreserved Fund Balance as Emergency Funding in the Amount of \$2,922,425 Million for a New Chapter House at Teesto, AZ

WHEREAS:

- 1. The Teesto chapter is a Local Governance Act certified chapter pursuant to 2 N.T.C sec 4045 (a) and 26 N.T.C. 103 established to review all matters affecting its constituents and community; and
- 2. The Teesto chapter is vested with certain authorities and responsibilities to consider and take actions on matters of local concerns that are in the best interest of the health, safety and welfare of its chapter members and residents; and
- 3. The Teesto chapter house burned to the ground on in the early morning hours on September 06, 2014 losing all equipment, files, furniture, etc. that included the CHR's office and the Senior Citizen Center Office, kitchen, table, chairs, and so forth; and
- 4. The local headstart center is now the chapter office and chapter meetings are held in this small 3,200 square foot building. The Chapter Manager, AMS, CHR and Planner all share one half of the room and there is a front office for the clerical and post office and post office staff; and
- 5. The meeting hall is what use to be the classroom that is about 30' x 26' room where chapter meetings are held. These small spaces clearly violate the rules and regulations of public use facilities but there is no alternative but to conduct chapter and program business in these very limiting spaces; and
- 6. Two old vintage stone buildings are being renovated but would be of generic nature. One for community meetings that would be more adequate in size than the classroom and other building is for administrative offices and post office that would also be more adequate; and
- 7. The Teesto chapter administration and chapter officials have been meeting with the Division of Community Development, Design & Engineering Services, Risk Management and the Department of Justice to plan for a new chapter house; and
- 8. It is estimate a new chapter house can take as many as 4-5 years that the community cannot afford to wait that long. This is an emergency situation and emergency planning, funding and allocation priority has to be considered. There is no Navajo Nation protocol that exists to address emergency situations such as a burnout of what is the reference point for any community which is the chapter house.

- 3. The Teesto chapter and community expresses its sincere appreciation to the Navajo Nation leadership, Divisions and Programs for all its support and assistance during these months of displacement and time of dire need.



1. Introduction




Figure 1: General Location of Teesto Chapter House.

Teesto Chapter is located in the south-central region of the Navajo Nation in northeast Arizona, Navajo County, a strikingly beautiful place surrounded by vast grasslands and rolling hills that are interrupted by volcanic buttes and cinder cones. The Teesto Chapter House Tract is located one mile east of the junction of Arizona State Highway 87 and Navajo Route 60 (Figure 1). The Chapter serves over 1,250 people including the population within the Chapter's boundary, as well as members of the Chapter that live in areas known as Hopi Partition Lands.

On September 6, 2014, Teesto Chapter underwent a shocking and devastating event when its Chapter House burnt to the ground in the early morning hours, leaving the chapter in a state of turmoil and instability. Important documents and irreplaceable treasures such as old Navajo Rugs were lost in the fire. Since then, the Chapter has been utilizing a former preschool building, which is only half the size. The meeting hall regularly exceeds the capacity during chapter meetings and large gatherings, which raised safety concerns.

For the past few months, Teesto Chapter and Navajo Nation Design and Engineering (NNDES) have been collaborating on the development of a new Chapter House project and has completed the initial planning stage. The Chapter Members passed a resolution supporting a funding request to the Navajo Nation Council that is presented in **Appendix A**.

The purpose of the project is to build a new Chapter House that meets the needs of the its members. It is an opportunity to provide a building that is more functional, energy efficient, and meets current building codes. The total cost estimate the design and construction phases will be \$2,922,425. A cost break down is provided in **Appendix B**. The proposed floor plan and utility plans are presented in **Appendix C**.

The total size of the Chapter tract is 27 acres; however, the proposed chapter house project will impact less than 2 acres in the southeast corner of the tract. Other community facilities are also situated within the tract. The tract was formally withdrawn and land withdrawal documents are presented in **Appendix D.** The tract is located across the street from NHA Housing Subdivision. Surrounding these central developments are family grazing lands and scattered-pattern housing developments.

2. Need Statement

Like other Chapter houses, Teesto Chapter House is the central area for government services. The senior center, for example, was one of the programs that was administered in the Chapter House. It's a place to gather for meetings, check your mail, have lunch (if you're a senior citizen), or just visit people coming and going.

The total number of people that the Chapter services is estimated to be 1250, based on the U.S. census count in 2010 for Teesto Chapter, plus a five-year population growth estimate, and Chapter members who reside in the Hopi Partition Lands (areas that were formally part of Teesto Chapter), but are not counted in the census count for Teesto Chapter.

Since the incident, the Chapter's administration offices have been trying to recompile important documents while providing services from a former preschool building with less than 3,200 square feet. The temporary facility has three small offices, a small meeting hall, a small conference room, and a contracted postal unit (local post office). The meeting hall regularly exceeds the capacity during chapter meetings and large gatherings, which raised safety concerns.

The Chapter House facility was insured under the Navajo Nation's Risk Management Program. Due to the older building, its value is nowhere near the amount for a new building. In fact, the NNRM states that the insurance claim will not meet the entire project cost. Although Teesto is a self-governing entity, it still depends on the Navajo Nation for funding. It generates very little revenue on its own mainly due to lack of economic development that can otherwise generate revenue for governmental purposes. For this reason, Teesto is seeking an emergency funding request to the Navajo Nation Council. The funding source will be the Navajo Nation's undesignated reserve.

3. Scope of Work

Since the fire, the Chapter (officials and staff) have held a number of meetings with Navajo Department of Risk Management, DES, CIO, and Office of the President and Vice President. The NNDES has lead the project team to the completion of the planning stage where the project scope, budget, and schedule have been identified.


The scope of work is to build a new Chapter House that meets the needs of the its members. It is an opportunity to provide a building that is more functional, with modern mechanical systems, and meets current building codes. The building will be 8,250 square feet. A conceptual building plan and utility plan are presented in **Appendix B**.

Due to the emergency nature of this project, the project team recommends that the "design-build" project management approach be applied. The Navajo Nation Design and Engineering Services Department will lead the project team and serve as the Construction Manager. The project management approach will be "design-build," due to the emergency nature of the project.

The design-build construction approach changes the traditional sequence of work, which can save time and money for the owner, while providing the opportunity to achieve innovation in the delivered facility. "Design-build" is a method of project delivery in which one entity—the design-build team—works under a single contract with the project owner to provide design and construction services.

Streamlining project delivery through a single contract between the owner and the design-build team transforms the relationship between designers and builders into an alliance, which fosters collaboration and teamwork.





Owner manages only **ONE** contract with a single point of responsibility:

- Designer and contractor are on the same team, providing unified recommendations
- Changes are addressed by design-build entity, not used as excuses

The design-build method places the responsibility for design errors and omissions on the design-builder, relieving the owner of major legal and managerial responsibilities and the burden for these costs and associated risks are transferred to the design-build team.

The sequence of the work is approach for the work will generally follow the sequence below:

- 1. Conceptual Plan development
- 2. Advertise RFP for Design-Build Project
- 3. Selection of Design-Build team
- 4. Construction
- 5. Monitoring and Inspection
- 6. Close out.

4. Budget

The total cost estimate the design and construction phases will be \$2,918,849. The cost estimate is based on recent Navajo construction projects where: (1) square footage cost for construction is near \$267; (2) Architect/Engineering costs (A/E) are about 10% of construction, and (3) additional costs and contingencies are included. A cost break down is provided in **Appendix A.**

5. Schedule

The project time schedule is 12 months. This is under the design-build approach that can often save time and money.

- 6. Two old vintage stone buildings are being renovated but would be of generic nature. One for community meetings that would be more adequate in size than the classroom and other building is for administrative offices and post office that would also be more adequate; and
- 7. The Teesto chapter administration and chapter officials have been meeting with the Division of Community Development, Design & Engineering Services, Risk Management and the Department of Justice to plan for a new chapter house; and
- 8. It is estimate a new chapter house can take as many as 4-5 years that the community cannot afford to wait that long. This is an emergency situation and emergency planning, funding and allocation priority has to be considered. There is no Navajo Nation protocol that exists to address emergency situations such as a burnout of what is the reference point for any community which is the chapter house.



Appendix C: Conceptual Building and Utility Plans




PRELIMINARY ARCHITECTURAL CIRCULATION SCHEME

WHEREAS:

- 1. Pursuant to 2 N.T.C., Section 695 (b) (5), the Resources Committee of the Navajo Nation Council is empowered to give final approval of all land withdrawals for residential subdivisions, rights-of-way, including all surface easements and other clearances related to, but not limited to powerline, waterline and sewerline extensions; and
- 2. The Teesto Chapter proposes that the Resources Committee withdraw 8.91 acres of Navajo Tribal Trust land for community development purposes. The requested acreage will be added to the 19.067 acres previously withdrawn by the Advisory Committee by Resolutions ACS-305-72 and ACJA-11-73. The Advisory Committee resolutions are attached hereto and incorporated herein respectively as Exhibits "A" and "B"; and
- 3. The Teesto Chapter passed a resolution on April 13, 1992 in support of the proposed land withdrawal for community development. The Teesto Chapter resolution is attached and marked as Exhibit "C"; and
- 4. The lands proposed to be withdrawn are located within Section 10, Township 24 North, Range 18 East, G&SRB&M. The Survey Section with the Navajo Land Department has resurveyed the previously withdrawn area, including the additional 8.91 acres, consisting of 27.88 acres, more or less, as the new total area for Teesto Chapter House Tract. The survey plan and legal description of the resurveyed area is attached and marked as Exhibit "D"; and
- 5. There are no affected land users in the area being proposed for community development. The field clearance certification with the appropriate chapter officials is attached and marked as Exhibit "E"; and
- 6. The archaeological clearance and environmental assessment have been completed for the 8.91 acres being proposed for development. The archaeological clearance and environmental assessment are attached and marked respectively as Exhibits "F" and "G"; and

- 7. The Transportation and Community Development Committee of the Navajo Nation Council will be in a position to consider the proposed comprehensive land use plan for the Teesto Chapter when the Resources Committee of the Navajo Nation Council formally withdraws the requested acreage; and
- 8. It is in the best interest of the Navajo Nation that said lands be withdrawn for community development purposes.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- 1. The Resources Committee of the Navajo Nation Council hereby approves the withdrawal of 8.91 acres, more or less, of Navajo Tribal Trust lands as additional acreage to be added to the 19.067 acres previously withdrawn for Teesto Chapter for community development purposes. Said lands being withdrawn are those lands not previously withdrawn but which are included in the resurvey of the combined areas consisting of 27.88 acres, and are located within Section 10, Township 24 North, Range 18 East, G&SRB&M, as more particularly described on the survey plat marked as Exhibit "D", attached hereto and made a part hereof.
- 2. The Resources Committee of the Navajo Nation Council further approves that the lands being withdrawn for community development purposes shall remain in a withdrawn status for so long as it is used for the purpose authorized.

This report is an Environmental Assessment (EA) of the impacts resulting from the construction of a post office, day care center, senior citizens center, a multi-purpose building and a solid waste transfer station on 8.9 acres adjacent to the Teesto Chapter complex.

This EA has been prepared to comply with the requirements as set forth in the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA), and the Navajo Nation under the Fish and Wildlife Permit #930604-039 issued to CSWTA, Inc.

This EA describes only one project action alternative and the required no action alternative. PROPOSED ACTION

A. Project Description

The Teesto Chapter proposed to enhance the community by construction of five (5) needed services: a post office, a day care center, a senior citizens center, a multi-purposed building, and a solid waste transfer station.

B. Purpose and Need

Presently, Teesto has a contract Post Office with the US Postal Service. The post office facility is situated within the Chapter office and comprises of 306 mail boxes. The Chapter employs a part-time Postal Clerk to handle some daily mail delivered from Winslow. A majority of residents either receive mail forty-five (45) miles in Winslow or get their mail at roadside mail boxes. Essentially, a post office is needed due to lack of space at the current Chapter House and increasing demand for mail services.

A day care center would allow more women to apply for outside work, and would provide care for children while their parents are away. It could also provide occasional relief for parents suffering from stress, as at the death of a relative, or when medical problems arise. Traditionally, grandparents or other relatives have been called upon for child care, but this situation is not always possible or desirable.

A senior citizens center is desirable as a place for the elderly to gather, to visit and to receive care that they might not have access to otherwise.

The Teesto Chapter has long sought a multi-purpose center as a locus for youth activities, for area-wide fairs and other activities requiring a large seating space as needed for the popular basketball games and dances.

In compliance with a US EPA mandate to close all open landfills in the Navajo Nation, a solid waste transfer station is needed to fulfill that requirement. This is desirable to eliminate airborne pollutants and blowing trash from the community. A solid waste transfer station is planned for easy access adjacent to the chapter house.

C. Location

The five service centers mentioned will be constructed along Navajo Route 60 just south of the Teesto Chapter house. The 8.9 acre project area is located on the USGS Egloffstein Butte Quadrangle, 7.5 minute series map in Township 24 North, Range 18 East, Section 10.

D. Vicinity Maps




Figure 1. The Teesto Chapter project area in the vicinity of Teesto on Navajo Tribal Trust Lands, Fort Defiance Agency, Navajo County, Arizona.




Figure 2. The Teesto Chapter proposed project plotted on Egloffstein Butte Quadrangle, 7.5 minute series, Navajo County, Arizona.





Figure 3. Detailed plan for the Teesto Chapter proposed project.






Figure 4. Photographs of the Teesto Chapter proposed project area.




Figure 5. Detailed plan for the Teesto Chapter solid waste transfer station.

Figure 1 shows the Teesto Chapter project area in the vicinity of Teesto on Navajo Tribal Trust Lands, Fort Defiance Agency, Navajo County, Arizona. Figure 2 shows Teesto Chapter proposed project plotted on Egloffstein Butte Quadrangle, 7.5 minute series, Navajo County, Arizona. Figure 3 shows a detailed plan for Teesto Chapter proposed tract. Photograms of the proposed project area are shown in Figure 4. Figure 5 is a detailed site plan of the solid waster transfer station.

II. ALTERNATIVES

Alternative A - Preferred Alternative

The Teesto Chapter proposed to construct a US Post Office, day care center, senior citizens building, multi-purpose building, and a solid waste transfer station on 8.9 acres of Navajo Tribal Trust Lands adjacent to the Teesto Chapter house. Water and electricity will be provided by the Navajo Tribal Utility Authority (NTUA) and sewage will be handled by an existing sewage lagoon northwest of the Chapter which serves the Teesto Navajo Housing Authority Housing. It may be possible to extend a sewer line and tie into this system (Appendix). Access will be from Navajo Route 60, as is currently allowed for.

B. Alternative B - No Action Alternative

Alternative B presents the NEPA-required alternative of no action. Under this alternative, the Teesto Chapter would not construct the desired service facilities; the previously described purpose and need would not be met.

III. AFFECTED ENVIRONMENT

A. Topography

The proposed project site is on the first terrace above Teesto Wash at an elevation 5700 feet, but the nearby Hopi Buttes rise to just over 6700 feet. The subject 8.9 acre parcel is itself relatively flat, sloping about 4 degrees from south to north, toward Teesto Wash.

B. Climate

Teesto has a semi-arid continental climate with occasional sub-zero winter temperatures and frequent summer temperatures of over 100 degree Fahrenheit. The mean monthly temperature is 54 degrees Fahrenheit. Monsoon rains in July and August usually exceed winter precipitation that generally comes from the southwest with breezes ranging from 4.8 to 15.3 mph.

C. Air Quality

The air quality within the project area is generally quite good, with no major sources of anthropogenic emissions. Stock raising and homesites have depleted ground cover upwind of the Teesto Chapter house, but wind blown contaminants are less that they would be if the site were downwind from sandy Teesto Wash. Within the project area no TSP levels have been determined. The annual Federal Primary air quality standard is 75 ug/m3, Federal Secondary standard is 60 ug/m3; there is no evidence that these standards are exceeded in the project area.

D. Geology

The bedrock geology of the area is composed of Mesozoic sandstones of the Chinle formation, overlain by Quaternary volcanic forms such as dikes, plugs and lava flows (Chronic 1983).

E. Soils

The project area is in the Palma-Clovis soil association. It consists of reddish-brown (Munsell 5 YR) sandy soils formed in mixed aeolian and alluvial materials from sandstone. Slopes range up to 15 percent on the high plains and escarpments surrounding Teesto. Palma soils have reddish-brown sandy loan or loamy sand surface layers and reddish-brown shady loam or fine sandy loam subsoils and substrata. They occur on low ridges and undulation plains within slopes of 0 to 15 percent. Hummocky areas occur where wind

has deflated around clumps of vegetation. Clovis soils have brown or reddishbrown sandy loam or loam surface layers and sandy clay loam subsoils that grade to calcareous fine sandy loam below 30 inches. The study site is dominated by colluvial sandy loams with localization of basalt gravels.

F. Water (Ground and Surface)

The Hopi Buttes region north of Teesto is drained by the Little Colorado River, about 45 miles south of Teesto. Local drainage to the Little Colorado is through Teesto Wash. Ground water depth in the Teesto area is generally greater than 500 feet. Snow melt is the major contributor for groundwater recharge because sporadic rainfall is lost due to rapid run-off, sparse vegetation and high evaporation rate.

G. Vegetation

Teesto is in a transition zone between the Great Basin Desert Scrub Formation and the Plains and Great Basin Grassland Formation of the Colorado Plateau (Brown 1982). Table 1 presents a complete list of plants in the Teesto area, but the following predominate on the project area: rabbitbrush (Chrysothamnus nauseosus), snakeweed (Gutierrezia sarothrae), galleta grass (Hilaria jamesii) and a few specimens of thin leaf yucca (Yucca angustifolia). Although Teesto Wash lies at the northeast edge of the project area, it is so dry that it hardly qualifies as a riparian environment; not even the salt cedar (Tamarisk), which is ubiquitous in riparian environments in the southwest, is present at Teesto.

The field survey consisted of walking east-west transects through the site, and an additional walk along the drainage on the northeast edge of the site. Table 1 list those plant species observed during the survey.

H. Resource Use Patterns

Teesto has been a "central place" or locus of Navajo activity for over a century, with the old J. C. McJunkin Trading Post as a hub of commerce. Since the demise of that post, residents have travelled to nearby communities like Dilkon, or to larger commercial centers like Winslow or Flagstaff for goods and services. Stock raising has been a staple of life support, with rug weaving as a supplemental endeavor.

Limited livestock grazing occurs in the region; however, it is limited by low forage value and lack of surface water. Electrical power to the site will be provided by NTUA via a three phase power line. There is a sewer lagoon northwest of the Chapter that serves the Teesto Navajo Housing Authority

Housing. It may be possible to extend a sewer line and tie into this system.

I. Wildlife

The wildlife value of this virtually suburban area is low. Located as it is adjacent to the Teesto Chapter House, a moderately well traveled paved road and situated just across that road from a housing development, the site provides low quality habitat for even common species of wildlife such as rabbits. No tracks or scat of any wildlife were seen, not even rabbits. There were not even burrows of the almost omnipresent kangaroo rat (*Dipodomys*). Table 2 list those species observed during the field survey.

J. Domestic Livestock

There was evidence that horses and sheep had traversed the area in the recent past. A heavily used livestock path parallels the fence line along the eastern boundary of the Chapter House, passing down to Teesto Wash from the highway.

K. Threatened, Endangered and/or Sensitive Species

The Hopi Buttes may provide habitat for Threatened, Endangered and/or Sensitive Species of plants and animals, but there is no habitat for any of them in the vicinity of the Teesto Chapter project area, and a careful pedestrian survey of the project acreage revealed no evidence of any T&E species of plants or animals. Before the survey, the investigator visited the Arboretum of Flagstaff to refresh his memory of the salient features of T&E flora.

L. Socioeconomics

The proposed construction is not expected to have any negative impact upon the Teesto community. On the contrary, local people may be expected to be employed for the duration of the construction and subsequent life of the five service facilities.

M. Archaeological

An archaeological survey of the Teesto community was conducted during April 16, 1989, to June 16, 1989, by John E. Bradley with San Juan College. Archaeological clearance was approved in April 1994. Bradley result that thirteen (13) prehistoric and two (2) historic sites were reported. Bradley reported that all thirteen (13) of the prehistoric sites were "potentially eligible for the National Register of Historic Places." All construction related activities will occur within the specified 8.91 acres. Additionally, the proposed undertaking will have no effect provided that construction activities avoid site SJC-1898 by a minimum of 15 meters (50 feet).

N. Other Values

The clerk of the Teesto Chapter house was interviewed with regards to possible cultural values, such as ethnobotanical use of the subject area or sacred places. She was not aware of any, nor did she believe that any of the elders present at the Chapter House knew of any Traditional Cultural Properties. All utilities already to exist of the proposed project area.

IV. IMPACTS

A. Physical Impacts

Impacts to the physical environment are not expected to involve all 8.9 acres. All five service buildings will be built along the south edge of the Chapter area, fronting Navajo Route 60. Use of heavy equipment will result in short term air pollution from exhaust and increased dust, and possible from contaminants such as fuel, grease, radiator fluid and break/transmission fluids. Construction waste such as lumber, plywood, insulation, cement, roofing, and paint will need to be hauled to an approved dump site.

B. Biotic Impacts

Some native plants will be destroyed by construction, but no Threatened and/or Endangered species are included nor are any plants of ethnobotanical importance known to be present. New power lines will offer perching sites for raptors, but it is unlikely that any raptors would choose to alight in the middle of the bustling Teesto community other than kestrels.

C. Threatened and Endangered Species Impacts

No impacts to threatened or endangered species nor habitat for same are present in this urban environment; no negative impacts are expected.

D. Socioeconomic Impacts

It is anticipated that only positive, long-term socioeconomic impacts will result from the proposed construction as local people will be employed in construction as local people will be employed in construction and operation of the service facilities.

E. Archaeological Impacts

No impact to archaeological resources is likely to occur because all are potentially eligible sites listed in report SJC-88-151 will not be affected by the proposed undertaking.

F. Tribal Cultural Impacts

No adverse impacts to tribal culture are anticipated from the proposed project.

V. MITIGATION MEASURES

A. Physical Resources

Regular watering of the project site may be advisable during construction to control dust which may bother people at the Chapter House. Trucks and other heavy equipment should be kept on the immediate construction site to avoid damage to the already fragile vegetative community surrounding the site. Revegetation with native grasses and shrubs would reduce wind-blown dust, erosion and surface wash. Such landscaping should be addressed in the Master Plan.

B. Biotic Resources

Construction staging area and work crew parking areas should be located on the Chapter House property that has already been denuded of vegetation. Heavy equipment parking should be restricted from the roadside drainage area which would speed silt from erosion into Teesto Wash.

C. Socioeconomic Resources

If any local residents can be employed for any aspect of the construction and operation of facilities, then they should be given opportunity for said employment.

D. Archaeological Resources

Clearance was approved on April 1994. All construction related activities will occur within the 8.9 acres. In the event of a discovery ("discovery" means any previously unidentified or incorrectly identified cultural resources including but no limited to archaeological deposits, human remains, or locations reportedly associated with Native American religious/traditional beliefs or practices) all operations in the immediate vicinity of the discovery must cease and the Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Department must be notified at (602) 871-7132.

E. Tribal Culture Resources

The proposed project is expected to positively impact the Teesto community. However, any objections raised by local residents should be given serious consideration and should be resolved.

F. Other Resources

No other mitigations were considered.

VI. CONCLUSION REGARDING SIGNIFICANCE

No significant impacts to resources of concern are expected to result from construction of the five community service facilities on the subject property in Teesto. Therefore, based upon the information made available to and collected by CSWTA, Inc., we conclude that a Finding of No significant Impact (FONSI) be recommended for this project.



Pursuant to your April 15, 2015 memoranda for 164 Document #003763, the Teesto Chapter has passed a resolution requesting for *emergency funds* and has declared a state of an emergency to have a new Chapter House rebuilt. It is understandable upon the prioritization and approval of the Infrastructure and Capital Improvement Plan, the Chapter House project was already a priority, and classified as a Community Center Phase II. It is incorporated into the CIP PLAN. It housed Community Health Representative Office, Senior Citizen Center Office, and Chapter Administration Office. It was deemed still suitable for occupancy and was structurally sound but on the threshold of being condemned and completely depreciated.

However, the first week of September in 2014, during the Navajo Nation Fair, the Teesto Chapter had burned down to the ground. Obviously, it is now mandated and is a priority by the Teesto community to have one rebuilt as soon as possible, and has asked NAVAJO NATION for help.

Since the inception and approval of the NN Capital Improvement Plan, the NN Council has not approved a finance plan to fund the capital outlay projects, although several funding options have been presented. Subsequently, Teesto Chapter has resorted to requesting for *emergency funds* from the Undesignated Unreserved General Funds.

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
