RESOLUTION OF THE RESOURCES AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE 24th Navajo Nation Council --- First Year, 2019

AN ACTION

RELATING TO RESOURCES AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE; APPROVING A MISSION SITE PERMIT FOR THE WHITE WATER COMMUNITY CHURCH ON NAVAJO NATION TRUST LANDS IN THE VICINITY OF NASCHITTI COMMUNITY CHAPTER, NAVAJO NATION

BE IT ENACTED:

SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

- A. Pursuant to 16 N.N.C. § 1151 (C), the Resources Development Committee of the Navajo Nation Council has the authority to give approval for permits for mission sites on behalf of the Navajo Nation.
- B. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 501 (B)(2), the Resources Development Committee of the Navajo Nation Council has the authority to give final approval for all land withdrawals, non-mineral leases, permits, licenses, rights-of-way, surface easements and bonding requirements on Navajo Nation lands and unrestricted (fee) land. This authority shall include subleases, modifications, assignments, leasehold encumbrances, transfers, renewals, and terminations.

SECTION TWO. TITLE 16 OF THE NAVAJO NATION CODE PROVISIONS WITH RESPECT TO ACREAGE OF MISSION SITES

Pursuant to 16 N.N.C. \S 1159 (B) the following acreage limitations shall apply to all applicants for permits:

- 1. Mission site for purely religious activities: one and one-half (1 1/2) acres;
- 2. Mission site for religious activities and community services facilities: three and one-half (3 1/2) acres;
- 3. Mission site for religious activities and either substantial medical or accredited educational programs: eight (8) acres; and
- 4. The Resources and Development Committee may, in the case of applications for mission sites in or near areas withdrawn

for townships in the Navajo Nation, limit site acreage to less than two and five-tenths (2 5/10) acres, and may set rental fees with due regard for present or future competing demands for land use in such areas.

SECTION THREE. FINDINGS

- A. The White Water Community Church, HCR 330 Box 50 Suite 4105, Tohatchi, New Mexico 87325 has applied for a mission site permit within the Naschitti Community Chapter. The application is attached as **Exhibit E**.
- B. The proposed mission site is to be located on 1.5 acres, more or less, of trust lands within the vicinity of Naschitti Community Chapter, Navajo Nation (New Mexico). The land description appears on the survey plat attached hereto and incorporated as **Exhibit B**.
- C. Three Land User Consent documents are attached as Exhibit C.
- D. The Naschitti Community Chapter Resolution No. NAS-08-08-083 supporting the White Water Community Church for a mission site permit and the signed petition by the local residents in support of the Tunnel Spring Fellowship Center are attached as Exhibit D.
- E. Resources and Development Committee Resolution No. RDCJN-33-15 delegated the authority to process and approve Land Withdrawals to the Director of the Navajo Land Department. Resolution RDCJN-33-15 approved Land Withdrawal Designation Regulations ("Regulations"). Section One of the Regulations states:

"\$1. Purpose.

The purpose of these Regulations is to clarify and expedite the Land Withdrawal Designation process on the Navajo Nation, and explains that a Land Withdrawal Designation does not authorize development or disturbance on Navajo Nation land. This Land Withdrawal Designation process does not apply to how to get a lease. Prior to any development on land, a lease must be obtained in addition to the withdrawal. The purpose of a Land Withdrawal Designation is to designate an area of land for further development by,

a. Ensuring that the rights of grazing permittees, who are in compliance with their grazing permits, are properly addressed as applicable and as required under 16 N.N.C.

§§ 1401 et seq. and to prevent any subsequent claims to the land; and

- b. Ensuring that the affected Chapter supports the Land Withdrawal Designation and use of the land."
- F. Having received the consents of the land users, **Exhibit C**, and the receipt of the Naschitti Community Chapter Resolution No. NAS-08-08-083, **Exhibit D**, the purpose of the Land Withdrawal Designation has been met ensuring the rights of grazing permittees have been addressed and ensuring that the affected Chapter supports the Land Withdrawal Designation and use of the land as a mission site.
- G. The Resources and Development Committee approval of a Land Withdrawal for the purposes of a mission site with this legislation will serve a public purpose of expediting the process of the approval of a Mission Site Permit.
- H. The Terms and Conditions for the Mission Site Permit is attached as **Exhibit A**.
- I. The Cultural Resources Compliance Form, the Archaeological Inventory Report, the Navajo Nation Environmental Protection Agency's Public Water Systems Supervision Program memorandum, the Environmental Department Air & Toxics Department memorandum, the Office of Environmental Health, Indian Health Service memorandum, and the Survey for the Threatened, Endangered and Navajo Sensitive Species for the White Water Community Church are attached as **Exhibit F**.
- J. The application for mission site permit has been reviewed through the Executive Official Review Document No. 011271, including the Department of Justice, and found "Sufficient" or "Approved." Executive Official Review Document No. 011271 is attached as **Exhibit G**.

SECTION FOUR. APPROVAL

A. The Resources and Development Committee of the Navajo Nation Council hereby approves the withdrawal of on 1.5 acres, more or less, of trust lands within the vicinity of Naschitti Community Chapter, Navajo Nation (New Mexico), as described in. Exhibit B, for Tunnel Spring Fellowship Center, for use as a mission site.

- B. The Resources and Development Committee of the Navajo Nation Council hereby approves the Mission Site Permit for the White Water Community Church, subject to but not limited to the attached Terms and Conditions contained herein as **Exhibit A** which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference.
- C. The Resources and Development Committee of the Navajo Nation Council hereby authorizes President of the Navajo Nation to execute all documents to affect the intent and purpose of this resolution.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS FOR MISSION SITE PERMIT WHITE WATER COMMUNITY CHURCH (PERMITTEE)

- 1. This Mission Site Permit is issued to the White Water Community Church to use and occupy Navajo Nation Trust Lands for religious purposes, and shall be subject to the terms and conditions set forth herein. The term of the Mission Site Permit is effective beginning on the date the permit is approved by the Resources & Development Committee of the Navajo Nation Council or authorized representative. The Permit is authorized by Resources and Development Committee No.
- 2. This permit is revocable at the discretion of the Resources and Development Committee of the Navajo Nation Council. The permit shall immediately be revoked for the failure to use the land herein described for religious purposes. It is understood and agreed that this instrument is 'NOT A LEASE' and is not to be taken or construed as granting any leasehold interest or right in or to the land herein described, but is merely a temporary permit, terminable and revocable.
- 3. The Permittee shall be given at least thirty (30) days written notice before this Mission Site Permit is terminated and revoked. Upon termination of the Mission Site Permit, the Permittee shall have ninety (90) days in which to remove from the site to dispose of any and all buildings, structures, materials and equipment and other personal property owned by the religious organization. After the expiration of the ninety (90) days, the Permittee shall peacefully and without legal process deliver the possession of the premises to the Navajo Nation. All improvements not removed after ninety (90) days will become the property of the Navajo Nation, unless the Navajo Nation demands in writing that the improvements be removed.
- This Permit is not transferable, except with the consent of the Resources and Development Committee of the Navajo Nation Council.
- This Permit shall be reviewed every five (5) years to reevaluate the rent and compliance with the terms and conditions.
- 6. The legal land description of the premises is described as follows:

TRACT DESCRIPTION

A TRACT OF LAND LOCATED IN THE SOUTHWEST QUARTER (SW1/4) OF SECTION 2, TOWNSHIP 21 NORTH, RANGE 17 WEST, N.M.P.M., SAN JUAN COUNTY, NEW MEXICO SITUATED IN THE NASCHITTI AREA AND IS MORE PARTICULARLY DESCRIBED AS FOLLOWS:

Commencing at the Point of Beginning a point being the Southwesterly corner of said parcel which bears North, 39°59'29" East, a distance of 1,230.12 feet from the Southwest corner of said Section 2;

THENCE North 24°08'44" East, a distance of 206.54 feet; THENCE South 65°51'10" East, a distance of 316.33 feet;

THENCE 24°08'44" West, a distance of 206.54 feet; THENCE 65°51'12" West, a distance of 316.33 feet to the Point of Beginning

Said Parcel containing 1.5± Acres more or less in area and being subject to any restrictions, easements and reservations of record.

The annual rental rate will be \$22.50per year and is due on or before the first day of December each year the Permit remains in effect. Pursuant to 16 N.N.C. § 1157, if the Permittee fails to pay the rent when due, this permit shall automatically terminate. The Permittee is responsible to make direct payments to the Navajo Nation Accounts Receivable Section, Post Office Box 3150, Window Rock, Arizona 86515.

- 7. The Permittee may develop, use and occupy the area under the permit for the purpose(s) of Mission Site. The Permittee may not develop, use or occupy the area under the permit for any other purpose without the prior written approval of the Navajo Nation. The approval of the Navajo Nation may be granted, granted upon conditions or withheld in the sole discretion of the Navajo Nation. The Permittee may not develop, use or occupy the area under the permit for any unlawful purpose.
- 8. In all activities conducted by the Permittee within the Navajo Nation, the Permittee shall abide by all laws and regulations of the Navajo Nation and of the United States, now in force and effect or as hereafter may come into force and effect including but not limited to the following:
 - a. Title 25, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 162;
 - b. All applicable federal and Navajo Nation antiquities laws and regulations, with the following additional condition: In the event of a discovery all operations in the immediate vicinity of the discovery must cease and the Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Department must be notified immediately. As used herein, "discovery" means any previously unidentified or incorrectly identified cultural resources, including but not limited to archeological deposits, human remains, or location reportedly associated with Native American religious/traditional beliefs or practices;
 - c. The Navajo Preference in Employment Act, 15 N.N.C. §§ et seq., and the Navajo Nation Business Opportunity Law, 5 N.N.C. §§ et seq.; and
 - d. The Navajo Nation Water Code, 22 N.N.C. § 1101 et seq. Permittee shall apply for and submit all applicable permits and information to the Navajo Nation Water Resources Department, or its successor.
- 9. The Permittee shall ensure that the air quality of the Navajo Nation is not jeopardized due to violation of applicable laws and regulations by its operations pursuant to the permit.
- 10. The Permittee shall clear and keep clear the lands within the permit area to the extent compatible with the purpose of the permit, and shall dispose of all vegetation and other materials cut, uprooted, or otherwise accumulated during any surface disturbance activities.
- 11. The Permittee shall at all times during the term of the permit and at the Permittee's sole cost and expense, maintain the land subject to the permit and all improvements located thereon and make all necessary and reasonable repairs.

- 12. The Permittee shall indemnify and hold harmless the Navajo Nation and their respective authorized agents, employees, land users and occupants, against any liability for loss of life, personal injury and property damages arising from the development, use or occupancy or use of the permit area by the Permittee.
- 13. The Permittee shall not assign, convey or transfer, in any manner whatsoever, the permit or any interest therein, or in or to any of the improvements on the land subject to the permit, without the prior written consent of the Navajo Nation. Any such attempted assignment, conveyance or transfer of the permit without such prior written consent shall be void and of no effect. The consent of the Navajo Nation may be granted, granted upon condition or withheld in the sole discretion of the Navajo Nation.
- 14. The Navajo Nation may terminate the permit for violation of any of the terms and conditions stated herein. In addition, the permit shall be terminable in whole or part by the Navajo Nation or authorized representative for any of the following causes:
 - Failure to comply with any terms and conditions of the permit or of applicable laws or regulations;
 - b. Non-use of the permit; and
 - c. The use of the land subject to the permit for any purpose inconsistent with the purpose for which the permit is granted.
- 15. At the termination of the permit, the Permittee shall peaceably and without legal process deliver up the possession of the premises, in good condition, usual wear and tear excepted. Upon the written request of the Navajo Nation, the Permittee shall provide the Navajo Nation, at the Permittee's sole cost and expense, with an environmental audit assessment of the premises at least sixty (60) days prior to delivery of said premises.
- 16. The Permittee shall give written notice to the Navajo Nation Land Department regarding any change to the Permittee's contact information, address, leadership, organizational name, or any other substantial change to the organization. The notice shall be given within thirty (30) days and delivered to the Navajo Land Department at Post Office Box 2249, Window Rock, Arizona 86515.
- 17. Holding over by the Permittee after the termination of the permit shall not constitute a renewal or extension thereof or give the Permittee any rights hereunder or in or to the land subject to the permit or to any improvements located thereon.
- 18. The Navajo Nation shall have the right, at any reasonable time during the term of the permit, to enter upon the premises, or any part thereof, to inspect the same and any improvements located thereon.
- 19. By acceptance of the grant of permit, the Permittee consents to the full territorial legislative, executive and judicial jurisdiction of the Navajo Nation, including but not limited to the jurisdiction to levy fines and to enter judgements for compensatory and punitive damages and injunctive relief, in connection with all activities conducted by the Permittee within the Navajo Nation or which have a proximate (legal) effect on persons or property within the Navajo Nation.

- 20. By acceptance of the grant of the permit, the Permittee covenants and agrees never to contest or challenge the legislative, executive or judicial jurisdiction of the Navajo Nation on the basis that such jurisdiction is inconsistent with the status of the Navajo Nation as an Indian nation, or that the Navajo Nation government is not a government of general jurisdiction, or that the Navajo Nation government does not possess full police power (i.e., the power to legislate and regulate for the general health and welfare) over all lands, persons and activities within its territorial boundaries, or on any other basis not generally applicable to a similar challenge to the jurisdiction of a state government. Nothing contained in this provision shall be construed to negate or impair federal responsibilities with respect to the land subject to the permit or to the Navajo Nation.
- 21. Any action or proceeding brought by the Permittee against the Navajo Nation in connection with or arising out of the terms and conditions of the permit shall be resolved administratively under the laws of the Navajo Nation and no action or proceeding shall be brought by the Permittee against the Navajo Nation, in any court of any state.
- Nothing contained herein shall be interpreted as constituting a waiver, express or implied, of the sovereign immunity of the Navajo Nation.
- Except as prohibited by applicable federal law, the law of the Navajo Nation shall govern the
 construction, performance and enforcement of the terms and conditions contained herein.
- 24. The terms and conditions contained herein shall extend to and be binding upon the successors, heirs, assigns, executors, administrators, employees and agents, including all contractors and subcontractors, of the Permittee, and the term "Permittee," whenever used herein, shall be deemed to include all such successors, heirs, assigns, executors, administrators, employees and agents.
- 25. There is expressly reserved to the Navajo Nation full territorial legislative, executive and judicial jurisdiction over the area under the permit and all lands burdened by the permit, including without limitation over all persons, including the public, and all activities conducted or otherwise occurring within the area under the permit; and the area under the permit and all lands burdened by the permit shall be and forever remain Navajo Indian Country for purposes of Navajo Nation jurisdiction.



Sliding Fee Scale for Navajo Nation Mission Site Permits

Purpose: These policies serve as a guide for the Navajo Land Department to determine Mission Site Permit fees in order to assure that a fair cost-determination has been made.

Policy: A sliding scale for permit fees will be provided to Mission Site Permit applicants, and based on their ability to pay. Ability to pay is determined by the size and annual income of the mission, as well as the number of acres utilized. The sliding scale is not a comprehensive formula, but is used for guidance to determine permit fees. The Navajo Land Department shall determine the permit fee for each mission on a case-by-case basis. The Navajo Land Department has the authority to adjust the sliding scale and permit fee as they see fit, in accordance with Navajo Nation and federal law.

Scope: These policies apply to all Mission Site Permits in the Navajo Nation.

Procedure:

- 1. Entities applying for Mission Site Permits must provide written verification of income.
- 2. Self-declaration may only be used in special circumstances. Entities that are unable to provide written verification must provide a signed statement of income, and why they are unable to provide independent verification. This statement will be presented to the Navajo Land Department for review and final determination as to the sliding fee percentage.
- Permit fees will be determined at the discretion of the Navajo Land Department on a
 case-by-case basis for entities unable or unwilling to provide any level of documentation.
- Pursuant to 16 N.N.C. § 1157 the Navajo Land Department will require a minimum charge of \$15.00 per acre per year for all mission sites in the Navajo Nation.
- 5. Permit cost will increase based on the annual income of the mission and the number of acres used, pursuant to Table 1 below. An additional \$15 will be assessed for each acre and each \$10,000 increase in annual income. An additional fee may also be added for missions with large congregations.

- 7. The Navajo Land Department requires payment by December 30 of each year, prior to the year for which fees are due. If any mission fails to pay the required amount by the due date, their Mission Site Permit will automatically terminate in accordance with 16 N.N.C. § 1157.

14. REPORT:

- a. Description of Undertaking: The client is proposing to construct and develop a church within the 1.50 acre (0.60ha.) survey area. Construction may include ground leveling, trenching, installing an electrical powerline and sanitation facilities, the placement of associated structures, paving of a parking lot, and fencing.





Figure 1. General Project Location Map (DCRM 2008-77).

- b. Area of Environmental & Cultural Setting: The project area is located within the community of Naschitti, New Mexico on Tribal Trust Lands in the Fort Defiance Agency. The proposed Church site of White Water Community is located approximately 4.0 miles (6.4 km) east of Naschitti Chapter House and 800 feet (243.8 m) northwest of Naschitti Wash. The project area is accessible by two track roads leading off Navajo Road 69 (See Figure 1). The elevation is approximately 5690 ft (1,734.3 m) above mean sea level.

The project area is located on a southeast facing slope and overlooking the Naschitti Wash to the Southeast. The surface sediments consist of aeolian loamy sandy deposits. Vegetation in the project area consists of bunch grass, shadscale, and Russian thistle. Vegetation coverage is approximately 20-percent. The project area is located on undeveloped open lands.

Naschitti. The Navajo name for Naschitti is Nahashch'idii ("Badger"). The Chapter is located in the eastern quadrant of the Navajo Nation and is about forty miles north of Gallup, New Mexico. The Naschitti community was founded and established in 1893. The name originates from a badger that was digging for shelter or for food, but instead dug up water. People made a well out of the badger's discovery and have gotten drinking water from it for years. The first trading post in Naschitti was built around 1915 about one half mile south of the present store. (LSR Innovations: 2004)

c. Existing Data Review: Prior to field work, a records check was conducted at the Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Department's (NNHPD) office in Window Rock, Arizona. The records indicate that one previous survey was been conducted within a 300 ft (91.44 m). This previous survey is NNHPD No. 02-852. No cultural resource was identified during the survey.

A check of Van Valkenburgh (1974) indicates that the closest sacred place is Chuska Peak (Ch Ooshgail/White Colored Spruce Trees) located approximately 12 miles (19.3 km) to the west

d. Field Methods: On September, 2008, Clifford Werito conducted a field inventory of cultural resources on the proposed church lease site. All four corners of the survey site were located. The project area measures 206.08 (62.8m) by 316.33 ft (96.4m). The project area was surveyed by walking parallel transects spaced no more than 10 ft apart with no buffer zone added. In all, a total 1.50-acre (0.60ha.) was surveyed.

In accordance with NNHPD guidelines, the project archaeologist was to conduct an interview in effort to obtain information regarding local traditional cultural properties (TCPs) and unmarked burials in the area. Kevin Yazzie was interviewed in English; he did not know of any TCPs or unmarked burials.

The Environmental Assessment (EA), EA-09-106, for the proposed White Water Community Church Missionary Site with Associated Facilities, on approximately 1.5 acres of Navajo Tribal Trust land near Naschitti, San Juan County, New Mexico, has been reviewed in the Division of Environmental, Cultural and Safety Management, Navajo Regional Office. FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT DOCUMENT, EA-09-106 WHITE WATER COMMUNITY CHURCH MISSIONARY SITE WITH ASSOCIATED FACILITIES

Location: Naschitti, NM, Quadrangle, USGS 7.5 Minute Series Map SW ¼, Section 2, T21N, R17W, NMPM Naschitti Chapter, San Juan County, New Mexico

The proposed action is approval, by the Bureau of Indian Affairs, of a Revocable Use Permit for development of a 1.5-acre tract of Navajo Tribal Trust land as a church site. Mr. Kevin Yazzie proposes to develop a missionary site with associated facilities on undeveloped land adjacent to a residential site. The proposed project will consist of clearing the proposed project area, leveling the ground, trenching, installing electric lines, water lines and sanitation facilities, constructing associated structures, paving a parking lot and driveway and fencing the site. The operator shall seek applicable clearances from various agencies, i.e., access permits, utility clearances, etc. The proposed missionary site is located approximately four miles east of Naschitti, New Mexico. The project is sponsored by Kevin Yazzie, P.O. Box 4199, Gallup, New Mexico 87305.

The project environmental assessment (EA) was reviewed in the Division of Environmental, Cultural and Safety Management, Navajo Regional Office. Based on the environmental assessment and the mitigation measures specified in the document, it is determined that the proposed action will not have a significant impact on the natural and human environment. Therefore, in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act, Section 102 (2) (C), an environmental impact statement will not be required.

The following references, incorporated in the environmental assessment, serve as the bases for this decision:

- 1. Agency and public involvement was solicited. Environmental issues relative to the proposed project were identified. Alternative courses of action and mitigation measures were developed in response to environmental concerns and issues.
- 2. The EA disclosed the environmental consequences of the proposed and "no action" alternatives.
- 3. In compliance with the Endangered Species Act of 1973, informal consultation was held with the Navajo Nation Department of Fish and Wildlife (NNDFW), Natural Heritage Program (NHP). The NNDFW provided a list of species of concern known to occur within three miles of the proposed project site and with the potential to occur on the Naschitti, NM, USGS 7.5-Minute Quadrangle containing the project boundaries. The proposed project area is an Area 3: Low Sensitivity Wildlife Resources Zone (October 24, 2008, letter from the NNDFW). NCI conducted a pedestrian field survey of the proposed action area on September 24, 2008. The survey consisted of ten-foot, parallel transects within the entire proposed project area and a ten-foot buffer zone around the entire project area. Binoculars were used to survey the project area and vicinity for raptors and raptor nests. All plants, animals, and animal sign and habitat observed

within the action area were recorded. The proposed action area represents potential foraging and nesting habitat for Ferruginous hawk and Mountain plover and potential habitat for the Mesa Verde cactus. However, none of these species were observed within or surrounding the proposed action area during the survey. No impacts to any Federal or Tribal TES species are expected from the proposed action (EA-Appendix A-T&E Species Survey Report). The NNDFW issued Biological Resources Compliance Form (BRCF), NNDF & WL Review No. <u>031309A</u> indicating Compliance with Tribal and Federal laws protecting biological resources (EA-Appendix E-BRCF).

- 4. Potential impacts to floodplains and wetlands by the proposed project have been evaluated in accordance with Executive Orders 11988 and 11990 respectively. The proposed project area does not contain any wetlands, seeps, springs or riparian areas (EA, Part 3.2.1
- 5. Water Resources- the Naschitti Wash is approximately 0.25 miles south of the proposed action area and is the nearest water source within the area (EA, Part 3.2.1.). Sedimentation, resulting from both wind and water erosion, would be realized down-gradient of the proposed action until successful vegetation has established. This may increase sedimentation into the Naschitti Wash and nearby drainages. Low impacts to water quality would be expected for the short term and long term. Long term impacts to surface hydrologic quality and quantity would be low (EA, Part 4.2.).
- 6. In compliance with the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended, Section 106 and 36 CFR 800.9 (b), a cultural resources inventory of the proposed project area was conducted by Dinétahdóó Cultural Resources Management (DCRM). The Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Department (NNHPD) issued Cultural Resources Compliance Form (CRCF), NNHPD No.HPD-08-780 indicating "No historic properties affected" (EA, Appendix B, CRCF).

In the event of a discovery [discovery means any previously unidentified or incorrectly identified cultural resources including, but not limited to, archaeological deposits, human remains, or locations reportedly associated with Native American religious/traditional beliefs or practices] all operations in the immediate vicinity of the discovery must cease, and the Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Department must be notified.

- 7. RCRA, Subtitles C and D, Hazardous and Non-Hazardous Solid Waste- no RCRA Subtitle C hazardous waste sites occur on the proposed church site or adjacent to it. No hazardous materials will be used on the project site. Hazardous substances that may be found at the site may include copper wire and acids/gels (corrosives), oil, fuel, hydraulic fluid and coolants associated with vehicles (EA, Part 3.9.1 & Appendix D-Photographs). Non-hazardous solid waste generated at the proposed project area, if any, will be stored in appropriate containers and disposed at an approved facility on an as-needed basis (EA, Part 3.9.2.).
- 8. Community Infrastructure utilities in the Naschitti Chapter area are provided by the Navajo Tribal Utility Authority (NTUA). NTUA issued a utility clearance letter to the project sponsor, who will work with the NTUA to obtain the utilities (EA-Appendix E-March 18, 2009, Letter from the NTUA to Mr. Yazzie). A septic system may be used for sewer disposal. If a sewer lagoon is decided upon, Mr. Yazzie will work with the NTUA (EA, Part 4.8).

- 9. Cumulative and secondary effects on soil, water, air, noise, vegetation, cultural resources, and wildlife resources (species and habitat) were considered, and the proposed mitigation measures were found to be acceptable.
- 10. In accordance with Executive Order 12898 on Environmental Justice, impacts to minority and low-income populations and communities have been considered by the Regional NEPA Coordinator, as have impacts to Indian Trust Resources.

The proposed action will provide the White Water community residents with a permanent facility where they can congregate for religious services and other church/community activities.

The Navajo Nation Environmental Protection Agency's Public Water Systems Supervision Program ("PWSSP") reviewed Document No. 011271, White Water Community Church Mission Site in Naschitti, New Mexico. This application for mission site will include a worship building, fellowship hall, youth ministry hall, parking space and playground on a 1.5 acre lot and will require water and wastewater infrastructure. PWSSP recommends conditional approval of this document.

All proposed drinking water projects will need to be permitted by the PWSSP-NNEPA. All proposed drinking water projects (extensions, upgrades, new wells, new public water systems, etc.) must also comply with the design review and construction permit requirements of the PWSSP pursuant §§1501 and 1601 of the Navajo Nation Primary Drinking Water Regulations.

All proposed wastewater projects will need to be permitted by the Domestic Wastewater Program-NNEPA. Extensions, upgrades, new sewer infrastructure, septic tanks, and other wastewater infrastructure must comply with the design review and construction permit requirements pursuant to §201 of the Domestic Wastewater Program.

Based upon the review of the above-noted document, a vote of sufficiency is recommended. However, the following comments and recommendations are provided.

The Terms and Conditions provide that the permittee will abide by all laws and regulations of the Navajo Nation including ensuring air quality of the Navajo Nation is not jeopardized due to violation of applicable laws and regulations by its operations pursuant to the permit.

Attention is directed to the Navajo Nation Open Burn Regulations. The regulations prohibit open burning of household waste, unless the burning is an exempted activity defined in the regulations. The Applicant should become familiar with §201, Prohibition of Open Burning and, §302, Open Burn Permit Requirement. Given that there is an inadequate network of solid waste disposal facilities on the Navajo Nation, instances of open burning often coincide with open dumping, which is also prohibited on the Navajo Nation. In the event that the White Water Community Church will utilize open burning in its related activities, the permittee should become familiar with activities for which burn registrations should be pursued.

On September 24, 2008, Mr. Wayne Hall, District Sanitarian and Delores Loretto, Environmental Health Specialist, evaluated the land where the proposed church building for the White Water Community Church is to be constructed. The purpose of the land evaluation was to evaluate the sanitary requirements for the structure. The proposed church construction site is located approximately three mile east of the Naschitti Chapter route 69 east of the route 491 right of way. The exact location of the proposed construction site was determined from your map.

Electricity-The site is accessible to a single-phase power line less than 100 feet away.

Water-No water is currently provided to the site. Water lines for the church must be paid for by the organization. IHS will not be able to assist in the construction of the individual water line for the church. Federal law requires that 86-121 projects serve only homes.

Sewage-No sewer lines are currently available to the location. On-site sewage disposal is possible in the space provided at the site. A sand filtration sewage disposal system is recommended due to the high clay content of the soil at the site.

Flooding-The site is not subject to flooding.

This site will be appropriate for construction of a church as soon as water is provided to the location.

In September of 2008, Mr. Kevin Yazzie retained Nelson Consulting, Inc. to conduct a threatened/endangered/sensitive species survey for the proposed White Water Community Church missionary site. The project is located on Navajo Nation Tribal Trust lands within the boundaries of the Navajo Nation, in San Juan County, New Mexico. The purpose of the survey was to comply with the Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended, and the Navajo Nation code requirements for endangered species (17NNC507). No threatened, endangered, or sensitive species, or designated critical habitats of listed species, were found during the field investigation of the proposed action area. The area does contain potential raptor foraging habitat and potential nesting habitat. Threatened, endangered, and sensitive species clearance is recommended for the proposed project.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Mr. Kevin Yazzie, located in Naschitti, New Mexico, 87325, retained Nelson Consulting Inc. (NCI) to conduct a threatened, endangered, sensitive species (TES) survey for the proposed White Water Community Church missionary site.

The maximum disturbance associated with the proposed action would be approximately 1.50 acres. The proposed project would consist of clearing the proposed project area (PPA) and constructing a missionary site and associated facilities. Survey plats describing the dimensions of the proposed project are located in Appendix A. The purpose of this project is to provide religious services within San Juan County

The purpose of the TES species survey was to comply with the Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended, and the Navajo Nation code requirements for endangered species (17NNC507). Navajo Nation code requirements for endangered species are enforced by the Navajo Natural Heritage Program (NNHP), Department of Fish and Wildlife (DFW). Other laws, such as the Migratory Bird Treaty Act (MBTA) and the Eagle Protection Act (EPA), also protect sensitive biological resources. The objectives of the survey were to compile a list of federal or tribal TES species, including species of concern, potentially occurring in the PPA; to provide a physical and biological description of the proposed action area; to determine the presence of federally or tribally listed TES species and/or critical habitat in the proposed action area; to assess potential impacts the proposed project may have on TES species or critical habitat present in the proposed action area; and to determine the presence of any invasive weed species in the proposed action area.

LOCATION

The missionary site is proposed to be developed in the San Juan Basin of northern New Mexico. approximately four (4) miles east of Naschitti. New Mexico. The project is located on Navajo Nation Tribal Trust Lands. More specifically, the PPA is located within:

SW¹/₄. Section 02 Township 21 North. Range 17 West New Mexico Principal Meridian. San Juan County. New Mexico

The missionary site is at 5.685 mean feet above sea level. The project is located on the Naschitti and Grey Hill Springs. United States Geological Survey (USGS) 7.5 Minute Quadrangle map (see Appendix A. Figure 2). Construction is proposed for spring of 2009. The GPS coordinates at the proposed missionary site are:

AFFECTED ENVIRONMENT

Most of northwestern New Mexico is contained within the Colorado Plateau, with the San Juan Basin being the dominant feature. The primary topographic features of the San Juan Basin are broad mesas and plateaus, interspersed with deep canyons and dry washes. The Basin drains into the Colorado River via the San Juan River, which is fed by the La Plata, Animas, and the Los Piños Rivers.

Surface geology and stratigraphy of the proposed project is comprised of the Menefee Formation. The Menefee Formation is also present at Mesa Verde National Park, and is named for Menefee Mountain near the park. The Menefee consists of interbedded claystone, carbonaceous siltstone, and coal beds, and ranges in thickness from 400 to over 1000 feet. Depositional environments include nearshore marine and fluvial environments, with swamp areas producing coal beds.

The PPA is located on a relatively flat area with cobblestones. Sandstone outcrops are located in the northwest of PPA. The PPA is adjacent to Naschitti Wash, which would constitute a perennial water source. The Naschitti Wash is located approximately 0.25 miles south of the proposed action area. Ground water supplies are moderately deep and very limited.

The Soil Conservation Service (now the Natural Resource Conservation Service [NRCS] has surveyed the soils in the proposed action area. Complete soil information is available in the <u>Soil Survey of Fort Defiance Area, Parts of Apache and Navajo Counties, Arizona and McKinley and San Juan Counties, New Mexico</u>, developed by the United States Department of Agriculture, NRCS. Soils of the proposed action are mapped as the Notal-Jocity family complex, 0-2 % slopes. Soils of this map unit are located at elevations between 5,800 to 6,500 feet. The unit is 50% Notal, 0 to 2% slopes and 40% Jocity family, 0 to 2% slopes.

- Notal soils are formed from stream alluvium derived from sandstone and shale. No single
 profile is typical, but the profile commonly observed is clay loam at approximately 0 to 3
 inches, clay at 3 to 38 inches, silty clay loam at 38 to 45 inches, and clay at 45 to 60 inches.
 Permeability is slow, and this soil type is well drained. Effective rooting depth is more than
 80 inches. Runoff is high. The available water capacity is high.
- Jocity family soil is well drained. It is found in flood plains on valley floors, and parent material is stream alluvium derived from sandstone and shale. The typical profile consists of loam at 0 to 4 inches, clay loam at 4 to 9 inches, sandy clay loam at 9 to 15 inches, clay loam at 15 to 20 inches, loam at 20 to 27 inches, fine sandy loam at 27 to 48 inches, and silt loam at 48 to 60 inches. Permeability is moderately high with high available water holding capacity. Effective rooting depth is 80 inches or more.

Vegetation within the proposed action area consists of small shrubs and bunch grass communities. Dominant flora observed in the area surrounding existing disturbance consisted of spiny shadeshale (Atriplex confertifolia) and broom snakeweed (Gutierrezia sarothrae). Grass species included cheatgrass (Bromus tectorum), alkali sacaton (Sporobolus aeroides), and galleta (Pleuraphis jamesii). Several forb species also occur in the area. Ground cover (including litter) varies from approximately 15% to 20% within the proposed action area.

No unique vegetation such as cottonwoods or willows is found within the proposed action area. No federal or State of New Mexico listed noxious/invasive weeds were observed during the on-site inspection of the proposed action area. Plant species observed within the proposed action area are listed in Appendix B.

Wildlife potentially occurring in the PPA includes a variety of mammals, birds, and reptiles common to the San Juan Basin. The PPA provides potential raptor foraging habitat; however, no raptors or signs thereof were observed during the survey. According to the BLM-FFO's latest geographic information system (GIS) raptor nest data, no active or historic raptor nests have been recorded within 1/3-mile of the PPA. Appendix C provides a list of fauna observed within the PPA.

According to the NHP-DFW species data list for the PPA is located in Area 3: Low Sensitivity Wildlife Resources. This area has a low, fragmented concentration of species of concern. Species in this area may be locally abundant on "islands" of habitat, but islands are relatively small, limited in number and well spaced across the landscape. However, the NHP-DFW has recognized that the area within Area 3 may not be completely surveyed for the potential occurrence of sensitive species of habitat.

THREATENED AND ENDANGERED SPECIES

Threatened and Endangered Flora

In following the guidelines of the Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended, and Navajo Nation code requirements, NCI consulted with the NHP-DFW to determine TES flora species with potential to occur in the PPA. NHP-DFW Species of concern include species that are listed as protected, candidate, or rare by the NHP-DFW or by the United States. According to the NHP-DFW, one (1) NHP-DFW flora species of concern has the potential to occur in the PPA: Mesa Verde cactus, which is known to occur within three miles of the PPA (Appendix D). This species is described in Table 1.0 below. During a field survey of the PPA on 24 September 2008, Cassandra Gould, an NCI biologist, observed no flora species of concern.

Threatened and Endangered Fauna

Three NNHP fauna species of concern have the potential to occur in the Naschitti, NM 7.5-minute quadrangle (Attachment D). Of these species, one (1) is federally listed (Mountain Plover). These species are described in Table 1.0 below. During a field survey of the PPA on 24 September 2008, Cassandra Gould, an NCI biologist, observed no listed (NNHP-NDFW or federal) fauna species or signs thereof.

Species Eliminated From Detailed Evaluation

Listed in Table 1.0 are TES Fauna species that are known to or have the potential to occur in the proposed action area. The table also provides specific reasons for elimination of species from detailed evaluation.

Species Warranting Detailed Evaluation

According to the NNHP, four (4) NHP-DFW listed flora and fauna species have the potential to occur in the general region of the PPA. This includes one flora species which is known to occur within three miles of the location. Habitat present within and immediately surrounding the PPA provides potential habitat for two of the listed fauna species. The species with potential to occur in the PPA are discussed below:

Mesa Verde Cactus (Sclerocactus mesae-verdae)

Navajo/Federal Status: NESL group 2: ESA Threatened

<u>Habitat:</u> Occurs on sparsely vegetated, low, rolling, clay hills formed from Mancos or Fruitland shale formations at 1500-1700 m (4900-5500 ft). This species prefers soils that are highly alkaline, gypsiferous, and vertic.

<u>Evaluation</u>: The elevation of the PPA (5585') is near to the range of this species. However, the geology of the area is Menefee Sandstone, and the location is located in existing disturbance and within a residence area. A ten-foot transect survey was conducted on the PPA, but no plants of this species were located.

Ferruginous Hawk (Buteo regalis)

Navajo/Federal Status: NELS group 3: MBTA

<u>Habitat</u>: The Ferruginous Hawk nests on badland outcrops, small buttes, cliffs, H-frame powerline structures, or the ground in grassland areas. Most nests on the Navajo Reservation are on clay or rock pinnacles, small buttes, or short cliffs less than 30 meters in height; fewer are placed in the tops of juniper trees or on the ground; and there is one record of a nest on the cross arm of a transmission-line tower. Habitat surrounding the nest site must support populations of their preferred prey items of cottontails, jackrabbits, prairie dogs, ground squirrels, and gophers.

<u>Evaluation</u>: The open desert scrub within the PPA provides potential foraging habitat for the Ferruginous Hawk. The sandstone outcroppings near the location constitute potential nesting habitat. No Ferruginous Hawks or Ferruginous Hawk nests were observed during the biological survey.

Mountain Plover (Charadrius montanus)

Navajo/Federal Status: NELS group 4: MBTA: ESA proposed threatened

<u>Habitat</u>: The Mountain plover nests in flat to slightly rolling expanses of grassland, semidesert, or badland, in an area with short, sparse vegetation; large, bare areas; and which is typically disturbed. The Mountain plover may also nest in plowed or fallow cultivation fields. Nest is a scrape in dirt often next to a grass clump or old cow manure pile. Migration habitat is similar to breeding habitat. Evaluation: The open desert scrub within the PPA provides potential foraging habitat for the Mountain plover. The badland sandstone outcroppings near the location constitute potential nesting habitat. No Mountain plover or Mountain plover nests were observed during the biological survey.

SURVEY METHODS AND MATERIALS

NCI conducted a pedestrian field survey of the proposed action area on 24 September 2008. The survey consisted of ten-foot, parallel, pedestrian transects within the entire proposed project area and the ten-foot buffer zone around the entire project area. Binoculars were used to survey the project area and vicinity for raptors and raptor nests. All plants, animals, and animal sign and habitat observed within the proposed action area were recorded

POTENTIAL IMPACTS

The proposed action area represents potential foraging and nesting habitats for the Ferruginous hawk and Mountain plover and potential habitat for the Mesa Verde Cactus. However, no Ferruginous hawk. Mountain plover, or Mesa Verde cacti were observed within or surrounding the proposed action area during the biological survey on 24 September 2008.

Potential impacts from the proposed action would include the short-term destruction of approximately 1.50 acres of habitat utilized by the Ferruginous hawk, Mountain plover, and Mesa Verde cactus. The project area represents moderate to good raptor foraging habitat, as H-power lines and powerlines were observed in the project area during the on-site inspection of 24 September 2008. However, no recent raptor use of these structures was observed. The proposed White Water Community Church would utilize overhead powerline construction in a fashion that is raptor- and wildlife-safe. Otherwise, the powerline would be buried to avoid raptors and other wildlife in the surrounding area.

No impacts to any federal or Tribal TES species are expected from the proposed White Water Community Church Missionary Site.

CERTIFICATION

It is believed by Nelson that the proposed project would not violate any of the provisions of the Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended. Conclusions of this report are based on actual field examination and are correct to the best of my knowledge.







Figure 2.0: Project Area Map Kevin Yazzie

MISSION SITE PERMIT

The Mission Site is issued to the White Water Community Church, Post Office Box 4199, Gallup, New Mexico 87305 to use and occupy Navajo Nation Trust Lands for religious purposes, and shall be subject to the terms and conditions set forth herein.

The Permittee shall comply with all Federal and Tribal Laws, including archaeological and environmental laws and regulations.

This Permittee is revocable at the discretion of the Resources Committee of the Navajo Nation Council with the approval of the Secretary of the Interior, or his/her authorized representative. The permit shall immediately be revoked for the failure to use the land herein described for religious purposes.

The Permittee shall be given at least thirty (30) days written notice before this Mission Site Permit is terminated or revoked. Upon termination of the Mission Site Permit, the Permittee shall have ninety (90) days in which to remove from the site to dispose of any and all buildings, structures, materials and equipment and other personal property owned by the religious organization. After the expiration of the ninety (90) days, the Permittee shall peacefully and without legal process deliver up the possession of the premises to the Navajo Nation. All improvements not removed after ninety (90) days will become the property of the Navajo Nation, unless the Navajo Nation demands in writing that the improvements be removed.

This Permit is not transferable, except with the consent of the Resources Committee of the Navajo Nation Council and approval of the Secretary of the Interior, or his/her authorized representative.

The annual rental is set at \$22.50 per year (\$15.00 per acre) and is due on or before the first day of January of each year the Permit remains in effect. If the Permittee fails to pay the rent when due, it shall be assessed a \$50.00 late fee and 6% interest on the balance due.

Pursuant to 25 CFR § 162.604 (g), the permittee must comply with the following stipulation:

- a) While the permit premises are in trust or restricted status, all of the permittee's obligations under this permit, and the obligations of his sureties, are to the United States as well as the owner of the land.
- b) Nothing contained in this permit shall operate to delay or prevent a termination of federal trust responsibilities with respect to the land by the issuance of a fee patent or otherwise during the term of the permit; however, such termination shall not serve to abrogate the permit. The owners of the land and the permittee and his surety or sureties shall be notified of any such change in the status of the land.

c) The permitee agrees that he/she will not use or cause to be used any part of the permit premises for any unlawful conduct or purpose.

The legal land description of the premises is described as follows:

Commencing at the Point of Beginning a point being the Southwesterly corner of said Parcel which bears North 39°59'29" East, a distance of 1,230.12 feet from the Southwest corner of said Section 2:

thence North 24°08'44" East, a distance of 206.54 feet;

thence South 65°51'10" East, a distance of 316.33 feet;

thence South 24°08'44" West, a distance of 206.54 feet;

thence North 65°51'12" West, a distance of 316.33 feet to the Point of Beginning

Said Parcel containing 1.5± Acres more or less in area and being subject to any restrictions, easements and reservations of record.

It is understood and agreed that this instrument is "NOT A LEASE" and is not to be taken or construed as granting any leasehold interest or right in or to the land herein described, but is merely a temporary permit, terminable and revocable.

This permit shall be reviewed every five (5) years to reevaluate the rent and compliance with the terms and conditions of the permit.

 - c) The District Grazing Committee has identified three land users and all have consented and the Navajo Land Department has received the Chapter resolution, Council Delegates' endorsement and a petition signed by local residents, all of which are found at Tab "C" within Exhibit "No. 1"; and
 - d) Biological, historical, cultural and archaeological surveys and clearances for the permit were completed and are attached within Exhibit "No. 1"; and

- e) It is in the best interest of the Naschitti community and the Navajo Nation that the requested Revocable Use Permit-Mission Site be approved for the White Water Community Church.
- 2. The Navajo Nation hereby approves the granting of a Revocable Use Permit-Mission Site for the White Water Community Church under the Terms and Conditions and as further described within Exhibit "No. 1".
- 3. The President of the Navajo Nation is hereby authorized to execute all documents necessary to implement the intent and purpose of this resolution.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS FOR MISSION SITE PERMIT WHITE WATER COMMUNITY CHURCH (PERMITTEE)

- The term of the Mission Site Permit (Permit) is effective beginning on the date the permit is approved by the Secretary of the Interior and is revocable at the discretion of the Resources Committee of the Navajo Nation Council with the approval of the Secretary of the Interior or his or her authorized representative.
- Consideration to the Navajo Nation for the grant of the permit shall be \$ 22.50 per year due the first of January of each year the permit remains in effect.
- 3. The Permittee may develop, use and occupy the area under the permit for the purpose(s) of <u>Mission Site</u>. The Permittee may not develop, use or occupy the area under the permit for any other purpose without the prior written approval of the Navajo Nation and the Secretary of the Interior. The approval of the Navajo Nation may be granted, granted upon conditions or withheld in the sole discretion of the Navajo Nation. The Permittee may not develop, use or occupy the area under the permit for any unlawful purpose.
- 4. In all activities conducted by the Permittee within the Navajo Nation, the Permittee shall abide by all laws and regulations of the Navajo Nation and of the United States, now in force and effect or as hereafter may come into force and effect, including but not limited to the following:
 - Title 25, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 162;
 - b. All applicable federal and Navajo Nation antiquities laws and regulations, with the following additional condition: In the event of a discovery all operations in the immediate vicinity of the discovery must cease and the Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Department must be notified immediately. As used herein, "discovery" means any previously unidentified or incorrectly identified cultural resources, including but not limited to archeological deposits, human remains, or location reportedly associated with Native American religious/traditional beliefs or practices;
 - c. The Navajo Preference in Employment Act, 15 N.N.C. §§ 601 et seq., and the Navajo Nation Business Opportunity Law, 5 N.N.C. §§ 201 et seq.; and
 - d. The Navajo Nation Water Code, 22 N.N.C. § 1101 et seq. Permittee shall apply for and submit all applicable permits and information to the Navajo Nation Water Resources Department, or its successor.
- The Permittee shall ensure that the air quality of the Navajo Nation is not jeopardized due to violation of applicable laws and regulations by its operations pursuant to the permit.
- The Permittee shall clear and keep clear the lands within the permit area to the extent compatible
 with the purpose of the permit, and shall dispose of all vegetation and other materials cut, uprooted,
 or otherwise accumulated during any surface disturbance activities.

- 7. The Permittee shall at all times during the term of the permit and at the Permittee's sole cost and expense, maintain the land subject to the permit and all improvements located thereon and make all necessary and reasonable repairs.
- 8. The Permittee shall indemnify and hold harmless the Navajo Nation and the Secretary of the Interior and their respective authorized agents, employees, land users and occupants, against any liability for loss of life, personal injury and property damages arising from the development, use or occupancy or use of the permit area by the Permittee.
- 9. The Permittee shall not assign, convey or transfer, in any manner whatsoever, the permit or any interest therein, or in or to any of the improvements on the land subject to the permit, without the prior written consent of the Navajo Nation and the Secretary of the Interior. Any such attempted assignment, conveyance or transfer of the permit without such prior written consent shall be void and of no effect. The consent of the Navajo Nation may be granted, granted upon conditions or withheld in the sole discretion of the Navajo Nation.
- 10. The Navajo Nation may terminate the permit for violation of any of the terms and conditions stated herein. In addition, the permit shall be terminable in whole or part by the Navajo Nation with approval of the Secretary of Interior or his or her authorized representative for any of the following causes:
 - Failure to comply with any terms and conditions of the permit or of applicable laws or regulations;
 - b. Non-use of the permit; and
 - c. The use of the land subject to the permit for any purpose inconsistent with the purpose for which the permit is granted.
- 11. At the termination of the permit, the Permittee shall peaceably and without legal process deliver up the possession of the premises, in good condition, usual wear and tear excepted. Upon the written request of the Navajo Nation, the Permittee shall provide the Navajo Nation, at the Permittee's sole cost and expense, with an environmental audit assessment of the premises at least sixty (60) days prior to delivery of said premises.
- 12. Holding over by the Permittee after the termination of the permit shall not constitute a renewal or extension thereof or give the Permittee any rights hereunder or in or to the land subject to the permit or to any improvements located thereon.
- 13. The Navajo Nation and the Secretary shall have the right, at any reasonable time during the term of the permit, to enter upon the premises, or any part thereof, to inspect the same and any improvements located thereon.
- 14. By acceptance of the grant of permit, the Permittee consents to the full territorial legislative, executive and judicial jurisdiction of the Navajo Nation, including but not limited to the jurisdiction to levy fines and to enter judgments for compensatory and punitive damages and injunctive relief, in connection with all activities conducted by the Permittee within the Navajo Nation or which have a proximate (legal) effect on persons or property within the Navajo Nation.
- 15. By acceptance of the grant of the permit, the Permittee covenants and agrees never to contest or challenge the legislative, executive or judicial jurisdiction of the Navajo Nation on the basis that such jurisdiction is inconsistent with the status of the Navajo Nation as an Indian nation, or that the Navajo Nation government is not a government of general jurisdiction, or that the Navajo Nation

government does not possess full police power (i.e., the power to legislate and regulate for the general health and welfare) over all lands, persons and activities within its territorial boundaries, or on any other basis not generally applicable to a similar challenge to the jurisdiction of a state government. Nothing contained in this provision shall be construed to negate or impair federal responsibilities with respect to the land subject to the permit or to the Navajo Nation.

. 4

- 16. Any action or proceeding brought by the Permittee against the Navajo Nation in connection with or arising out of the terms and conditions of the permit shall be resolved administratively under the laws of the Navajo Nation, and no action or proceeding shall be brought by the Permittee against the Navajo Nation in any court of any state.
- Nothing contained herein shall be interpreted as constituting a waiver, express or implied, of the sovereign immunity of the Navajo Nation.
- 18. Except as prohibited by applicable federal law, the law of the Navajo Nation shall govern the construction, performance and enforcement of the terms and conditions contained herein.
- 19. The terms and conditions contained herein shall extend to and be binding upon the successors, heirs, assigns, executors, administrators, employees and agents, including all contractors and subcontractors, of the Permittee, and the term "Permittee," whenever used herein, shall be deemed to include all such successors, heirs, assigns, executors, administrators, employees and agents.
- 20. There is expressly reserved to the Navajo Nation full territorial legislative, executive and judicial jurisdiction over the area under the permit and all lands burdened by the permit, including without limitation over all persons, including the public, and all activities conducted or otherwise occurring within the area under the permit; and the area under the permit and all lands burdened by the permit shall be and forever remain Navajo Indian Country for purposes of Navajo Nation jurisdiction.
