PURPOSE: The purpose of this resolution is support New Mexico House Bill 278 titled "AN ACT RELATING TO MISSING PERSONS; CREATING THE MISSING AND MURDERED INDIGENOUS WOMEN TASK FORCE; MAKING AN APPROPRIATION; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY"

18	A. The Navajo Nation established the Naabik'íyáti' Committee as a Navajo Nation	
19	Council standing committee and as such empowered the Naabik'íyáti' Committee to	
20	coordinate all requests for information, appearances and testimony relating to	
21	proposed county, state and federal legislation impacting the Navajo Nation. See 2	
22	N.N.C. §§ 700 (A), 701 (A)(6). See also CO-45-12.	
23	B. The Navajo Nation established the Law and Order Committee ("LOC") as a Navajo	
24	Nation Council standing committee and as such empowered LOC to review and	
25	recommend resolutions relating to public safety within the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. §§	
26	164 (A)(9), 600 et seq. See also CO-45-12.	
27	C. The Navajo Nation has a government-to-government relationship with the State of	
28	New Mexico.

- D. During the First Regular Session of 2019, New Mexico House Bill 278 was introduced to the 54th Legislature by Representatives Andrea Romero, Derrick Lente and Melanie Stansbury. *See* New Mexico HB 2570 attached hereto as **Exhibit A**.
- E. House Bill 278 seeks to establish a task force to address missing and murdered Indigenous women comprised of the Secretary of Indian Affairs, Secretary of Public Safety, the United States Bureau of Indian Affairs, and appointed persons representing the Jicarilla Apache Nation, Mescalero Apache Tribe, the Navajo Nation and a member of a Pueblo. *Id*.
- F. The task force is established to conduct a study to determine how the State of New Mexico can increase state resources for reporting and identifying missing and murdered Indigenous women, and other enumerated purposes. *Id*.
- G. The Act also provides an appropriation of \$100,000 for the creation and maintenance of the task force. *Id*.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

- A. The Navajo Nation hereby supports New Mexico House Bill 278 titled "AN ACT RELATING TO MISSING PERSONS; CREATING THE MISSING AND MURDERED INDIGENOUS WOMEN TASK FORCE; MAKING AN APPROPRIATION; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY" attached hereto as **Exhibit** A.
- B. The Navajo Nation hereby authorizes the Speaker of the Navajo Nation Council, President of the Navajo Nation, and their designees, to advocate the Navajo Nation's support of New Mexico House Bill 278.

AN ACT

RELATING TO MISSING PERSONS; CREATING THE MISSING AND MURDERED INDIGENOUS WOMEN TASK FORCE; MAKING AN APPROPRIATION; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. TEMPORARY PROVISION--MISSING AND MURDERED INDIGENOUS WOMEN TASK FORCE--CREATED--FINDINGS--REPORT.--

- A. The "missing and murdered indigenous women task force" is created.
 - B. The task force consists of:
- (1) the secretary of Indian affairs or the secretary's designee from the Indian affairs department, who shall be chair of the board;
- (2) the secretary of public safety or the secretary's designee from the department of public safety; .211870.1

- a representative of the United States bureau of Indian affairs office of justice services designated by the southwest region's deputy regional director for Indian services of the bureau of Indian affairs;
- (4) one person who is a member of a pueblo, appointed by the governor;
- (5) one person who is a member of the Jicarilla Apache Nation, appointed by the governor;
- (6) one person who is a member of the Mescalero Apache Tribe, appointed by the governor; and
- (7) one person who is a member of the Navajo Nation, appointed by the governor.
- C. Vacancies by members of the task force appointed by the governor shall be filled by appointment by the governor.
- Task force members appointed by the governor may receive per diem and mileage as provided for non-salaried public officers in the Per Diem and Mileage Act and shall receive no other compensation, perquisite or allowance.
- The task force shall conduct a study to determine how to increase state resources for reporting and identifying missing and murdered indigenous women in the state. The task force shall collaborate with tribal law enforcement agencies to determine the scope of the problem, identify barriers to address the problem and create partnerships to improve the reporting of and the investigation of missing and

The task force shall working with tribal governments and shall respect tribal sovereignty. The task force shall collaborate with the United States department of justice to improve its processes for information sharing and coordination of resources in regard to reporting and investigating cases of missing and murdered indigenous women in the state.

The task force shall report its findings and recommendations to the governor, the legislative council service library and the appropriate interim legislative committee and present those findings to the appropriate interim legislative interim committee prior to November 1, 2020.

SECTION 2. APPROPRIATION. -- One hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) is appropriated from the general fund to the Indian affairs department for expenditure in fiscal years 2019 and 2020 to create and maintain the missing and murdered indigenous women task force. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of fiscal year 2020 shall revert to the general fund.

SECTION 3. EMERGENCY.--It is necessary for the public peace, health and safety that this act take effect immediately.
