TITLE OF RESOLUTION: AN ACTION RELATING TO AN EMERGENCY; APPROVING SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING FROM THE UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE IN THE AMOUNT OF ONE MILLION ONE HUNDRED SIXTY-SIX AND TWO HUNDRED TEN DOLLARS (\$1,166,210) FOR LONG-TERM IMPACT STUDIES AND MONITORING OF THE GOLD KING MINE TOXIC WASTE SPILL INTO THE WATERS OF THE NAVAJO NATION

PURPOSE: This emergency resolution, if approved, will provide funding to several Navajo Nation programs from the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance in the amount of \$1,166,210 for a long term impact study and monitoring of the Gold King mine waste spill into the San Juan River.

This written summary does not address recommended amendments as may be provided by the standing committee. The Office of Legislative Counsel requests each committee member to review the proposed resolution in detail.

FINDINGS 19 A. 2 N.N.C. § 164(16) provides, in part, that an emergency is limited to matters such as 20 21 disaster relief services and that such emergency matter must arise due to the pressing 22 public need for such resolution and must be a matter requiring final action by the 23 Council. 24 B. On August 5, 2015, the United States Environmental Protection Agency ("USEPA") 25 caused the Gold King Mine toxic spill that released over 3 million gallons of toxic 26 waste into the Cement Creek that reached the San Juan River on August 8, 2015. C. On August 9, 2015, the Navajo Nation Commission on Emergency Management with 27 28 the concurrence of the Navajo Nation President, pursuant to 2 N.N.C. §884(B)(1), 29 issued a Declaration of a State of Emergency in response to the toxic waste spill. 30

- Resolution of the Commission on Emergency Management, CEM 15-08-09, attached as Exhibit J.
- D. On August 21, 2015, the Navajo Environmental Protection Agency ("NNEPA") declared the San Juan River to meet the water quality standards for the Navajo Nation.
- E. The Navajo population within the affected areas is of different opinions as to whether the irrigation canals should be re-opened for irrigation. Some Navajo citizens are concerned about the impact of the water on their farms, livestock, sheep, wildlife and humans and are highly reluctant to re-open the irrigation canals. News Release from the Navajo Nation President attached as Exhibit K.
- F. Other Navajo citizens, including the District 13 Council which is comprised of the four Chapters of Tiis Tsoh Sikaad, San Juan, Upper Fruitland, and Nenahnezad, requested the President of the Navajo Nation and the Navajo Nation Irrigation Office to release the water from the San Juan River to irrigate crops and provide water for livestock. District 13 Council of August 24, 2015 attached as Exhibit L.
- G. The USEPA notified the Navajo Nation that the remediation of the San Juan River will take decades; it was then determined that the Navajo Nation will need to not only address the immediate needs but start developing a long-term plan.
- H. There were many impacts from this spill that need to be immediately analyzed including, impacts to wildlife, amphibians, livestock, crops, land, water, and humans. To develop this Plan, the monitoring, testing and studies must start immediately. There have been samples taken within the irrigation canals, only, but there is lack of funds to be able to fully carry out this Plan.
- I. The health and welfare of the Navajo people is important to the Navajo Nation, and the impacts from this toxic spill are unknown and may be unknown for many years. This Plan is very important to be able to mitigate those future impacts and prepare for the consequences of this contamination.
- J. The Navajo Nation Division of Natural Resources has developed a plan to study immediate impacts and long-term monitoring for wildlife, livestock and crops.

- K. The Navajo Nation Division of Health is proposing to develop a study for the future health of the Navajo people.
- L. The Navajo Nation Environmental Protection Agency must continue monitoring and testing of the waters, canals, soil and sediment, not only for the immediate term but in the future.
- M. There are many concerns, questions and fears expressed by our Navajo people on the impacts from this spill; this funding will allow for the Navajo Nation to be able to bring peace to our Navajo people.
- N. The attached Executive Summary, Exhibit C, states the need for emergency legislation.
- O. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(L), the Navajo Nation Council may adopt and approve supplemental appropriations to the Annual Comprehensive Budget during the fiscal year. Supplemental appropriations of General Funds within the current fiscal year are permitted, (1) if and when additional sources of revenues above and beyond the initial or current revenue projections are projected and which are also in excess of the reserve amount set for in § 820(J) or (2) when the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund balance is in excess of the reserve amount set forth at § 820(J).
- P. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(M), all requests for annual operating funds and supplemental funds shall be submitted to the Office of Management and Budget ("OMB") for budget impact analysis. See Memorandum from OMB attached as Exhibit A.
- Q. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(M), when the Controller identifies additional sources of revenues above and beyond the initial or current revenue projections, supplemental appropriations may be allocated by the Navajo Nation Council. The attached memorandum, Exhibit B, from the Controller has identified the additional revenues.
- R. The Navajo Nation finds the need for supplemental funding of One Million One Hundred Sixty-six and Two hundred ten Dollars (\$1,166,210) for long-term impact studies and monitoring of the Gold King Mine toxic waste spill into the waters of the Navajo Nation is an emergency which affect disaster relief services and it requires final action by the Navajo Nation Council.

S. The Navajo Nation finds it in the best interest to approve a Supplemental Appropriation because it is necessary to be able to start helping the Navajo people impacted by the Gold King Mine toxic spill.

SECTION 2. APPROVING SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING FROM THE UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE IN THE AMOUNT OF ONE MILLION ONE HUNDRED SIXTY-SIX AND TWO HUNDRED TEN DOLLARS (\$1,166,210) FOR LONG-TERM IMPACT STUDIES AND MONITORING OF THE GOLD KING MINE TOXIC WASTE SPILL INTO THE WATERS OF THE NAVAJO NATION AND APPROVING CARRYOVER OF FUNDS

- A. The Navajo Nation Council, having received certification by the Office of the Controller, attached as Exhibit B, of the availability of certain funds from the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance (UUFB) for supplemental appropriation hereby approves the supplemental appropriation of One Million One Hundred Sixtysix and Two hundred ten Dollars (\$1,166,210) for long-term impact studies and monitoring of the Gold King Mine toxic waste spill, as further described in Navajo Epidemiology Center (Navajo Department of Health) budget documents attached as Exhibit D, San Juan River Environmental Sampling (Navajo Environmental Protection Agency) budget documents, attached as Exhibit E, Natural Heritage Program (Navajo Division of Natural Resources) budget documents, attached as Exhibit F, Veterinary Services-Farmers and Ranchers (Division of Natural Resources) budget documents, attached as Exhibit H, and San Juan River Fish Contaminant Monitoring (Division of Natural Resources), attached as Exhibit I.
- B. This supplemental appropriation of One Million One Hundred Sixty-six and Two hundred ten Dollars (\$1,166,210) shall be to the Business Units identified in the above listed exhibits and to new Business Unit Numbers and from that amount of funds that exceeds the minimum fund balance of the UUFB.

C. The Navajo Nation Council, pursuant to 12 N.N.C. §820(N), approves a carryover of the unspent designated funds to the respective programs herein.

Yesterday at noon time we were sent five budgets to review for possible emergency supplemental funding. Three of the budgets were missing pages and two of the affected programs submitted the pages just before 5:00. Comments on each budget follow.

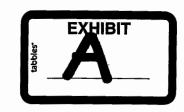
- 1. NEPA San Juan River Environmental Sampling: \$389,245
 - No fund term/period is provided.
 - The budget detail needs corrections, as marked.
 - Form One should be corrected.
 - Need Appendix J (FY 15) or K (FY 16) form supplemental funding request.
- 2. NDOH Navajo Epidemiology Center: \$194,120
 - Correct signatures needed. Manager and Division Director.
 - There is no Form 2, Performance Criteria.
 - Corrections on Form 3 needed. This changes the calculations on Form 4.
 - Need Appendix J or K form supplemental funding request.
- 3. DNR Veterinary Services Farmers/Ranchers: \$243,315
 - Form 2 is incomplete.
 - Form 4 needs corrections.
 - Need Appendix J or K form- supplemental funding request.
- 4. DNR Natural Heritage Program:

\$131,680

- Fund Source is not identified.
- All funds appear to be for Consulting. If yes, Form 5 should be blank (meaning no employees).
- Need Appendix J or K form- supplemental funding request.
- 5. DNR Natural Heritage Program: \$58,660
 - Fund Source not identified.
 - Budget Form 4 needs corrections.
 - Need Appendix J or K form- supplemental funding request.
 - Why is this budget separate from the other budget (#4 above)?

Other:

- The grand total is \$1,017,020. If the fund source is the UUFB, there is \$4,706,679 available.
- The budgets that list dates show FY 2016, starting October 1. Consideration could be given to starting August 8, the day the state of emergency was formally declared. If this is the choice, the legislation should have a carryover provision.
- Budgets could be done with "New" in the Business Unit space. Then OMB/OOC can decide what business unit to assign. If the "1xxxxx" accounts are used, then the budgets are tied to specific programs and are subject to lapse, etc.
- Consideration should be given to designate these funds be put into the Operation Yellow Water Emergency account, NO1320, which was set up with the \$363,000 contribution from the law firm. The Department of Emergency Management would then manage the funds.

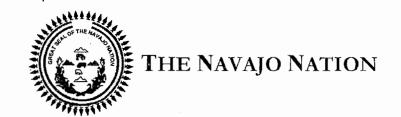

Financial Update-(General Fund Revenue, Expenditures, UUFB)

The following is the financial data from the General Fund for FY 2015. The total year to date gross General Fund Revenues, see Exhibit "A", as of August 17, 2015 is \$217,613,621 and the total set asides is \$55,870,452. The Net Revenue for the General Fund is \$161,743,169 which is 93.68% of the projection. The total expenditures by branch are shown on Exhibit "B". The Legislative Branch has actual expenditures of \$11,500,707, encumbrances of \$811,671, with a remaining budget of \$6,550,809. The Executive Branch actual expenditures are \$162,647,637, encumbrances of \$11,866,675, with a remaining budget of \$52,298,785. The Judicial Branch actual expenditures are \$11,268,902, encumbrances of \$84,014 and remaining budget of \$4,288,786. Total General Fund expenditures are \$185,417,247; total encumbrances are \$12,762,360 leaving an overall remaining General Fund budget of \$63,138,380. The updated UUFB as of August 17, 2015 is \$4,706,679, attached Exhibit "C."

Executive Summary

On August 5, 2015, the Gold King Mine released over three million gallons of toxic waste into Cement Creek that spilled into the water of the Navajo Nation on August 8, 2015. The Navajo Nation President immediately issued a State of Emergency to mobilize the Navajo Nation Divisions to respond to this disaster. The Navajo Tribal Utility Authority, Navajo Nation Water Resources, Navajo Nation Emergency Management, Navajo Nation Environmental Protection Agency ("NNEPA") and the Bureau of Indian Affairs joined efforts to address the impact to the Navajo people.

While the Navajo Nation with BIA is addressing the immediate impact, we must also consider the long-term impact and monitoring. This long-term plan will be for the testing of crops, traditional herbs, soils, livestock and the San Juan River monitoring and testing. In addition, there is a need for a long-term health plan as well. For a successful monitoring plan to be in place, the monitoring must occur today. The impact to the Navajo people from this spill will be decades. The health and welfare of our people is first and foremost is most important to the Navajo Nation. Another area of importance is to bring trust back into all Navajo farm products and the Navajo livestock industry. The need to demonstrate that our markets have wholesome products and need to promote the livelihood of our farmers and ranchers along the river is critical at this time.

The Division of Natural Resources, NNEPA and Division of Health have collectively put together a long-term plan. The attached budgets will be able to give the Divisions funding to immediately begin the monitoring that needs to take place for those impacted. The immediate need for funding is in the amount of \$1,017,020 however, to continue this monitoring will require further funding in the future. We seek your support and favorable consideration.

PART II. REASON FOR REQUEST AND STATEMENT OF NEED:

There is a need to determine and understand any long-term impacts of the water quality and sediment in the San Juan River from the spill originating from the Gold King Mine. Proper analyses of water quality and sediment samples collected from the San Juan River will be inputted into the WQ/NPDES Program database for comparison with applicable standards and data from past (pre-spill) sampling.

The amount of funding required to sample the impacts of the spill is well beyond the normal funding the WQ/NPDES Program utilizes for its ambient water quality monitoring. The spill represents a unique and unplanned situation so no funding existed to allow the necessary environmental sampling.

PART III. SCOPE OF WORK/METHODOLOGY

The scope of work involves the weekly collection of water quality and sediment samples from 8 locations on the San Juan River from Upper Fruitland, NM to Mexican Hat, UT. The sampling will occur over 26 weeks and involve 4 temporary technicians trained by WQ/NPDES Program hydrologists. The samples will be collected adhering to the WQ/NPDES Program's quality assurance program plan (QAPP) and the samples will be analyzed with the appropriate EPA approved method. The samples collected will be analyzed for metals, both the dissolved and total concentrations.

Analytical data obtained will be analyzed to determine trends in the metal concentrations and determine compliance with applicable standards and prespill levels. The data will also be used in the WQ/NPDES Program's water quality assessment report of the San Juan River to determine attainment of the designated uses of the river.

Once the analytical data has been analyzed, the findings will then be presentable.

Navajo Nation Department of Fish and Wildlife Proposed Scope of Work for Monitoring Endangered and Economically Important Wildlife Within the San Juan River Flood Plain

Prepared By: Chad S. Smith

Endangered Birds

Two Species of Federally and Tribally endangered insectivorous birds are known to nest within riparian vegetation on the Navajo Portion of the San Juan River. The Southwestern Willow Flycatcher and the Yellow billed cuckoo nest in thick riparian vegetation associated with large rivers and lakes. While the two species differ slightly in terms of diet and selectivity of nesting habitats and substrates their habitats do overlap broadly. Both species feed exclusively on terrestrial and flying insects with the Flycatcher preferring small flying insects and the Cuckoo having a less restrictive diet that includes larger terrestrial insects. It is unknown to what extent heavy metal contamination could impact insectivorous riparian birds but healthy aquatic ecosystems are critical for producing an abundance of small flying insects preferred by the southwestern willow flycatcher, and likely play an important role in the structure of invertebrate communities within the entire riparian forest ecosystem. Southwestern Willow Flycatcher nesting sites in particular are associated with areas of slack water and dense vegetation that allow for the production of flying insects with aquatic larval stages. Due to their hydrology, these sorts of habitats may become concentrated with toxic sediments that have settled out of the water column and that may be infrequently or incompletely flushed from the area during high flow events. Navajo Nation Department of Fish and Wildlife Proposes monitoring of nesting occupancy and success of both Southwestern Willow Flycatchers and Yellow Billed Cuckoos. Initial presence absence surveys should be conducted in habitats known to have recent nesting records and in a subset of other suitable habitat. Surveys and monitoring should be rigorously conducted in all potentially occupied habitat between the Animas river and Shiprock on Navajo Nation Property with additional monitoring conducted at select sites as far downstream as Mexican Hat, Utah. We propose an initial Monitoring program to be conducted for 5 years post pollution event with extension dependent on findings and need. NNDFW proposes the following annual budget for this proposed work.

Surveys and Monitoring will follow standardized federal protocol for the Southwestern Willow Flycatcher and Yellow Billed Cuckoo and must be conducted by a biologist or under the supervision of a biologist with USFWS training in both protocols.

Amphibian Monitoring

Amphibian populations are in decline worldwide and the Navajo Nation is home to at least one species that has suffered severe population declines and local extirpation in recent decades. The Northern Leopard Frog is protected as an endangered species by the Navajo Endangered Species List and approximately 95% of known populations on Navajo Nation lands are now extirpated. A handful of Leopard Frog populations remain in the San Juan River flood plain and in a few isolated desert wetlands on the Navajo Nation. While this species is of particular concern to the Navajo Department of Fish and Wildlife, all amphibians are of significant value to aquatic and terrestrial ecosystems. Amphibians link aquatic and terrestrial ecosystems together and often form the basis of vertebrate predator food chains. Amphibians are also known to be highly susceptible to a number of environmental pollutants including heavy metals and pesticides. Monitoring the impacts of increased heavy metal pollution on Native Amphibians within the San Juan River flood plain and agricultural lands serviced by the river should be an important priority in assessing long term impacts of mine waste runoff. We propose initiating a 5 year monitoring program of amphibian populations in the San Juan River and its associated wetlands and agricultural lands. We propose selection of at least ten monitoring sites within the flood plain, including NAPI lands serviced by San Juan River Water, and control sites outside the flood plain. These sites should be assessed for amphibian species diversity and population size over a period of five years. Additionally tissue samples and skin swabs should be collected from a representative sample of amphibian adult and larval stages and tested for pollutant concentration as well as the presence of fungal infections known to be associated with environmental stress. These tissue samples should be collected during the start of each field season for the duration of the study. Population monitoring will be conducted using standardized approaches for the assessment of amphibian populations, which may include point counts, walking transects, pit fall and aquatic traps, and seine netting, and nocturnal audio/visual frog counts. Tissue samples will be collected either as whole animal voucher specimens or as toe and tail clippings from animals to be released. Lethal collection of the protected Northern Leopard Frog will be strictly avoided. Tissue samples will be preserved in reagent grade ethanol for subsequent analysis in a contracted lab facility.

Ungulates and Water Fowl

Although generally not protected as threatened or endangered species, wild ungulates and waterfowl on the Navajo Nation are an important economic and subsistence resource. The recovery of the Bighorn Sheep herd within the san juan river gorges has been a significant success for the department of fish and wildlife and currently provides significant revenue to the department to implement its wildlife and habitat management goals as well as attract hunters to the Navajo Nation who employ local guides and businesses. Waterfowl and other game animals (Mule Deer, turkey, and Elk) also provide opportunities for subsistence hunting and high value recreational hunting for both Navajos and Non-Navajo visitors.

RESOLUTION OF THE COMMISSION ON EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

DECLARING A STATE OF EMERGENCY DUE TO AN UNEXPECTED RELEASE OF CONTAMINATED WASTEWATER FROM THE GOLD KING MINE NEAR SILVERTON, COLORADO

WHEREAS:

- Pursuant to 2 N.N.C, §§ 881 and 883 (A) (C), the Navajo Nation Council established the Navajo Nation Commission on Emergency Management to coordinate emergency and disaster relief service by Navajo Nation and non-tribal entities in conjunction with the Department of Emergency Management; and to recommend to the Navajo Nation Council legislation or other appropriate activity regarding natural and man-made emergencies; and
- 2. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C., § 884 (B) (1), the Navajo Nation Commission on Emergency Management is responsible for declaring a state of emergency with the concurrence of the President of the Navajo Nation; and
- 3. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C, § 884 (B) (2), the Navajo Nation Commission on Emergency Management will assist in seeking assistance from federal, state, and other tribal governments, local and private agencies to address emergency and disaster related situations; and
- 4. On August 5, 2015, an unexpected release of contaminants occurred from the Gold King Mine near Silverton, Colorado and entered the Animas River; and
- Since August 5, 2015, the contaminants have entered into the San Juan River and the plume of contaminants continues to travel towards the Navajo Nation; and
- 6. The contaminants are comprised of several potentially harmful chemicals, such as heavy metals, with unknown risks to human health, environment and terrestrial wildlife; and
- 7. The contaminants from the release of mine wastewater has further caused risks to free roaming livestock, wildlife, irrigation practices and other uses by the Navajo people; and
- The duration of future impacts to the Navajo Nation are still not fully known and as a result, there is a
 continued need for an increased level of multi-agency efforts to resolve all issues related to this
 release; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

 That the Navajo Nation Commission on Emergency Management declares a State of Emergency due to an Unexpected Release of Contaminated Wastewater from the Gold King Mine Near Silverton, Colorado; and

- 2. The Navajo Nation Commission on Emergency Management finds it is necessary for appropriate Navajo Nation entities to continue and/or immediately begin and maintain coordination and collaboration with relevant agencies, e.g., Federal, State, Counties, and Municipalities, for use of resources to meet the needs of the Navajo Nation public. This includes, but not limited to, resources of personnel, equipment, monetary funding, and other resources as may be required to protect natural, cultural, historical natural resources as well as substantial human health, safety and welfare of the citizens of the Navajo Nation; and
- 3. The Navajo Nation shall activate available emergency resources such as community education, assistance, and other means as determined fit and feasible to restore and sustain vital community infrastructure.

Navajo Nation President Begaye keeps restrictions in place for San Juan River

WINDOW ROCK - Navajo Nation President Russell Begaye has not lifted restrictions on opening the San Juan River for irrigation purposes.

"I am furious that the USEPA has placed the Navajo Nation into this position. Our farms will not last much longer without water and our resources are depleting," said President Begaye. "These past few days I have visited with the farmers along the San Juan River because they are part of this decision."

On Thursday, Aug. 20, Office of the President and Vice-President (OPVP) held a public meeting for the impacted chapters to give farmers and chapter officials a forum to express their concerns. During the meeting, five of seven San Juan River area chapter officials spoke against opening the river for irrigation.

The farmers were overwhelmingly concerned about contaminating their fields and crops.

"It was heartbreaking to hear farmer after farmer tell us they have said goodbye to their crops and made peace," said Vice-President Jonathan Nez.

President Begaye asked community members to put a resolution before their respective chapters to vote on whether or not they want to open the river for irrigation.

On Friday, Aug. 21, through resolution, Shiprock Chapter voted 104 in favor, 0 opposed and 9 abstaining to keep the canals closed for a period of one year. Shiprock area farmers utilize the Hogback pump, which affects Tse Dah K'aan, Shiprock and Gadii'ahi chapters.

During this meeting a concerned farmer said he was against opening the irrigation. The farmer said he would instead save as many crops as he could by hauling water. Most of the crops on his 33 acres have not matured.

Having been raised a farmer himself, President Begaye realizes the impacts that keeping the water shut off will have to area farmers as they depend on crops for subsistence and income.

The Shiprock vote against opening the canals represents the community's concern to use precaution and not risk possible contamination to irrigation canals and crops.

The Navajo Nation Environmental Protection Agency (NNEPA) has reported that initial data from their water samples concurs with data from neighboring jurisdictions in supporting that water from the San Juan River is safe for irrigation purposes.

The USEPA has given initial reports on the soil, but the Navajo Nation will rely on the NNEPA for final test results. These soil samples are critical in identifying levels of metals that have settled along the river banks.

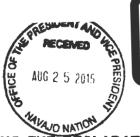
"I'm glad the water samples indicate the water is safe for irrigation use but I remain concerned over the soil and sediment that lines our river bank," said President Begaye. "Every time a heavy storm hits or the soil is disturbed it can recontaminate the water."

The NNEPA will have final results from their soil samples this week.

"The health of our Navajo people will always come first. As such, we must be diligent and cautious in making this decision," said Vice-President Nez.

President Begaye and Vice-President Nez remain firm in holding the USEPA accountable for releasing contaminants into the Animas and San Juan Rivers during the Gold King Mine spill.

While the river remains closed, the Navajo Nation will continue to work with the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) to provide water for irrigation, livestock and drinking purposes.

RESOLUTION OF DISTRICT 13 COUNCIL OFFICIALS LIFTING THE DECLARATION OF EMERGENCY FOR WATER USE FOR IRRIGATION PURPOSES FOR FARMERS, AND ALL MEMBERS OF THE COMMUNITY RESIDENCE AND REQUESTING THE NAVAJO NATION PRESIDENT RUSSELL BEGAYE AND NAVAJO NATION IRRIGATION OFFICE, SHIPROCK, NEW MEXICO TO RELEASE THE SAN JUAN RIVER IMMEDIATELY TO IRRIGATE THE CROPS AND WATER FOR THEIR LIVESTOCK.

WHEREAS:

- 1. District 13 Council consist of Burnham, Upper Fruitland, Nenahnezad and San Juan Chapter Officials, Farm Board and Grazing Members; and
- 2. District 13 Community Chapters have been impacted by a man-made disaster which began on Wednesday, August 5, 2015 north of Silverton, Colorado when a significant hazardous waste spill occurred at Gold King Mine, causing unspecified contamination of the Animas River which has ultimately converged into San Juan River of San Juan County, New Mexico and the Navajo Nation; and
- 3. District 13 Council Chapters of the Navajo Nation communities depends upon the river for potable water, farming, ranching as well as many other domestic necessities; and
- 4. District 13 Council Chapters are aware that the State of New Mexico Environment Department, Speaker of the Navajo Nation and The San Juan County Executive Officer have address this same hazardous situation, initiating advocated precautions and San Juan County declared an emergency at that time; and
- 5. District 13 Council Chapters have been informed by Navajo Nation Environmental Protection Agency, State of New Mexico Environment Protection Agency and other independent scientist that have tested San Juan River that they are sure that the River is safe to use for irrigation and livestock, water test reports attached as Exhibits; and
- 6. District 13 Council Chapters have been approached by the community members, farmers and livestock owners that the Navajo Nation Irrigation Department of Shiprock, New Mexico and the Navajo Nation President Russell Begaye to release the irrigation water to them so they can irrigate once again, the crops are suffering from lack of water.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. District 13 Council officials hereby support the lifting the Declaration of Emergency for the farmers, and all members of the community residence and requesting the Navajo Nation President Russell Begaye and Navajo Nation Irrigation Office, Shiprock, New Mexico to release the San Juan River water immediately to irrigate the crops and water for their livestock.

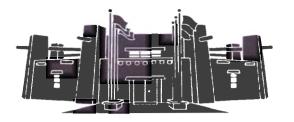

THE WATERS OF THE NAVAJO NATION

Pursuant to your request, attached is the above-referenced proposed resolution and associated legislative summary sheet. Based on existing law and review of the documents submitted, the resolution as drafted is legally sufficient. However, as with all legislation, it is subject to review by the courts in the event of a challenge.

The Office of Legislative Council confirms the appropriate standing committee(s) reviews based on the standing committees powers outlined in 2 N.N.C. §§ 301, 401, 501, 601 and 701. Nevertheless, "the Speaker of the Navajo Nation Council shall introduce [the proposed resolution] into the legislative process by assigning it to the respective oversight committee(s) of the Navajo Nation Council having authority over the matters for proper consideration." 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(5).

Please review the proposed resolution to ensure it is drafted to your satisfaction.
