RE: CAP-18-22, *An Action Relating to the Budget and Finance, Resources and Development, and Naabik'iyáti' Committees and the Navajo Nation Council; Allocating \$68,025,000 in Sihasin Funds for the Navajo Nation Department of Water Resources to Complete Twelve (12) Water Connection Projects Across the Navajo Nation; and Approving the "2021 Water Connection Projects Expenditure Plan" Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. §§2501-2508*

Dear Speaker Damon,

Although costly, water development new projects are important to the Navajo people. We have considered Resolution CAP-18-22 and now approve several projects and line-item veto others. When making this decision, we included in our analysis the following factors: the urgency of the project, arsenic contamination, working with other governments and whether the project is included in ARPA legislation 0086-22. The construction season for 2022 has already begun and it is imperative that legislation 0086-22 pass so work may begin on all infrastructure projects without further delay. Some delays to the start of construction include supply chain issues related to the lack of readily-available supplies or parts, shipping costs, and inflation. The Department of Water Resources informed our office that water projects have increased by more than 20%. With these factors in mind, we approve the following:

- Sanostee Connection Phase 1 in the amount of \$11,325,000.
- Rock Ridge/Mitten Rock (Sanostee) Connection Phase 2 in the amount of \$6,937,500.
- Two Grey Hills Connection Phase 2 in the amount of \$11,700,000.
- Tohatchi Connection Phase 1 in the amount of \$11,850,000.
- Mexican Springs Connection Phase 2 in the amount of \$2,525,000.
- Rock Springs/Tseyatoh Connection in amount of \$3,237,500.
- Standing Rock Connection in the amount of \$4,337,500.
- Tohajiilee – Albuquerque Project and 10-year Assistance in the amount of \$1,875,000.00

Pursuant to the Line-Item Veto Authority vested in the Navajo Nation President, I am striking the following allocations:

- Newcomb Connection Phase 1 in the amount of \$4,400,000.
- Sheep Spring Connection Phase 1 in the amount of \$3,225,000.

- Narbona Pass (Sheep Springs) Connection Phase 2 in the amount of \$4,000,000.
- Naschitti Connection in the amount of \$2,612,500.

In Exhibit "B" there seems to be a project included inadvertently - the "Coyote Canyon Connection" in the amount of \$3,086,000; the project description states there is "0 total funding shortfall". To err on the side of caution, and for consistency with the intent of the Resolution and Exhibit "A", the (12) water project summary, we have struck through that allocation.

To be clear on the action taken in the line-item veto, the modified strike-through in the body of the Resolution in the form of a series of dash marks, rather than a solid line, indicates that the line-item veto action is taken on a portion of the appropriation. Throughout the document efforts were made to reconcile the line-item vetoes in the actual Resolution with the strike-through of language in the Exhibits. If strike-through language differs, the line-item vetoes in the Resolution shall be controlling. We trust this form will show our intent in the body of the Resolution and specified in the Exhibit.

It is important to recognize that several of the approved water projects will commence with Sihasin funding but will eventually become ARPA-funded projects. This will minimize the depletion of the Sihasin Fund. It will also allow construction of the projects to get underway without further delay. We call upon the Council, and its Committees, to work with our administration for a seamless transition and to assist in further streamlining of processes to allow construction to begin as soon as possible and be completed in an expedited manner.

Pursuant to the authority granted by the People and vested in the Navajo Nation President, I am exercising the line-item veto for CAP-18-22 to a portion of the Resolution.

BE IT ENACTED:

SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

- A. The Budget and Finance Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council with the responsibility to "review and recommend to the Navajo Nation Council the budgeting, appropriation, investment and management of all funds." 2 N.N.C. § 301(B)(2).
- B. The Resources and Development Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council with the authority to oversee all matters involving water, land, the environment, community development, and public utilities. 2 N.N.C. § 500(C).
- C. The Naabik'íyáti' Committee is a standing committee of the Navajo Nation Council that considers all proposed final actions by the Navajo Nation Council. 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(9).
- D. The Navajo Nation Council is the governing body of the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. § 102(A).
- E. The Navajo Nation Code (at 12 N.N.C. § 2502, as amended by Resolution No. CJA-03-18) provides that the purpose of the Navajo Nation Síhasin Fund ("Síhasin Fund") is as follows:

§ 2502 Purpose

- A. The purposes of this Fund are to provide financial support and/or financing for:
 - 1. The planning and development of economic development and regional infrastructure supporting economic development and community development, including such infrastructure as, but not limited to, housing, commercial and government buildings, waterline, solid

waste management development, powerline projects, and transportation and communication systems, within the Navajo Nation; . . .

- B. For the Purpose in § 2502(A)(1), Fund expenditures for infrastructure shall not be limited by 12 N.N.C. § 1310(F) or TCDCJY-77-99.
- C. Leveraging the Fund by way of guaranteeing loans, match funding, direct funding in part, and other weighted uses of the Fund, including loan financing from the Fund, for the purposes in § 2502(A)(1), shall be favored over direct funding in whole.
- F. The Síhasin Fund provides that "Fund Principal" shall consist of all deposits made to the Síhasin Fund and that "Fund Income" shall consist of all earnings (interest, dividends, etc.) generated and realized by the Fund Principal, and that Síhasin Fund Income shall be deposited in, and added to, the Fund Principal until such time as a Fund Expenditure Plan is duly approved. 12 N.N.C. § 2504 and § 2505(C).
- G. The Síhasin Fund provides that "Fund Principal and Income shall not be expended except pursuant to a Fund Expenditure Plan consistent with the purposes set forth in § 2502 of this Chapter and adopted by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of all members of the Navajo Nation Council." 12 N.N.C. § 2505(A).

SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

- A. The Navajo Nation Department of Water Resources is requesting funding assistance of ~~sixty-eight million twenty-five thousand dollars (\$68,025,000)~~ from the Síhasin Fund for ~~twelve (12)~~ water connection projects throughout the Navajo Nation. Summary project information is provided in the project list attached as **Exhibit A**. The list of water connection projects are as follows:

1. Sanostee Connection Phase 1
2. Rock Ridge/Mitten Rock (Sanostee) Connection Phase 2
3. ~~Newcomb Connection Phase 1~~
4. Two Grey Hills Connection Phase 2
5. ~~Sheep Springs Connecton Phase 1~~
6. ~~Narbona Pass (Sheep Springs) Connection Phase 2~~

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7. ~~Naschitti Connection~~
8. Tohatchi Connection Phase 1
9. Mexican Springs Connection 2
10. Rock Springs/Tsayatoh Connection
11. Standing Rock Connection
12. Tohajiilee - Albuquerque Project and 10-year Assistance

B. The water connection projects will provide much needed water to the Navajo Chapters and communities and are in the best interest of the Navajo Nation.

SECTION THREE. ALLOCATION OF SÍHASIN FUNDING AND APPROVAL OF EXPENDITURE PLAN

- A. The In accordance with 12 N.N.C. § 2505(A), the Navajo Nation hereby allocates ~~\$68,025,000~~ in Síhasin funds for the ~~twelve~~ ~~(12)~~ ~~water~~ connection projects as explained and proposed herein.
- B. The Navajo Nation hereby approves the "2021 Water Connection Expenditure Plan" attached hereto as **Exhibit B**.
- C. The Síhasin Funds allocated for the "2021 Water Connection Expenditure Plan" may be further leveraged by bond or loan financing pursuant to the Navajo Nation Bond Financing Act (12 N.N.C. § 1300 et seq., as amended) using Síhasin Fund earnings for repayment and financing costs, upon approval of the Budget and Finance Committee and further approval by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of all members of the Navajo Nation Council.

SECTION FOUR. APPROVAL OF EXPENDITURE PLAN ADMINISTRATION

The Navajo Nation hereby approves the implementation and administration of the "2021 Water Connection Projects Expenditure Plan" with certain provisions and restrictions, as follows:

- A. The Navajo Nation Controller shall determine whether the source of the annual allocations for the total amount of ~~\$68,025,000~~ approved herein will be Síhasin Fund Principal or Síhasin Fund Income, or a combination of both.
- B. The Síhasin funding for the "2021 Water Connection Projects Expenditure Plan" shall be disbursed to the Navajo Nation

Division of Natural Resources, Department of Water Resources ("DWR") within thirty (30) days after the effective date of this legislation. The DWR shall then disburse the Síhasin Funds according to specific drawdown requests and instructions submitted to DWR.

- C. DWR shall be responsible for carrying out and implementing its proposed ~~twelve~~ (12) ~~water~~ connection projects, in accordance with its Expenditure Plan approved herein. The Síhasin funding shall be used solely to design, plan, construct, install, or purchase equipment for the ~~twelve~~ (12) water connections projects, as described in **Exhibit B**, attached hereto. ~~JMN~~

- D. Any and all savings of funds shall be returned to the Síhasin Fund Principal once all twelve (12) water connection projects have been completed or upon the reversion deadline in Section 4(E) below.
- E. The Síhasin funding allocated for the ~~twelve~~ (12) water connection projects shall not lapse on an annual basis pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(N); however, any Síhasin funds not spent or encumbered within thirty-six (36) months of the date that funds are provided to DWR shall revert to the Síhasin Fund Principal, unless otherwise approved by both the Resources and Development and the Naabik'íyáti' Committees of the Navajo Nation Council. ~~JMN~~

- F. The ~~twelve~~ (12) water connection projects shall be designed, planned, constructed, installed, or purchased by DWR, and continuously thereafter the operation, maintenance, and repairs for the ~~twelve~~ (12) water connection projects shall be performed by DWR, except for certain equipment that will become the property and responsibility of the homeowner once construction or installation is completed. ~~JMN~~

- G. A utility right-of-way may be necessary for some of the ~~twelve~~ (12) water connection projects. In such cases, the applicable responsible party will apply for and hold the right-of-way, which will be granted by the Navajo Nation in accordance with all applicable laws and regulations pertaining thereto. ~~JMN~~

SECTION FIVE. DIRECTIVES

- A. At least once per Navajo Nation Fiscal Year quarter, DWR in cooperation with the Navajo Nation Division of Natural Resources (DNR) shall provide a written report (with an oral presentation, if requested) to both the Resources and Development and Naabik'íyáti' Committees, explaining the current status of all activities pursuant to the "2021 Water

Connection Projects Expenditure Plan" and the responsibilities of DWR and DNR as authorized and directed in this legislation.

- B. The Síhasin Fund shall be reimbursed, in the ~~\$68,025,000~~ amount allocated in this legislation, from prospective funds available to the Navajo Nation from any and all state and federal sources, including Congressional appropriations under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, other COVID-19 related relief and other applicable federal laws or appropriations. - C. The Water Management Department, with assistance of the Navajo Nation Washington Office, shall continue to seek additional federal funding to cover the ~~twelve~~ ~~(12)~~ water projects contained herein, including, but not limited, to the recent Infrastructure Fund, IIJA, P.L. 117-58. JMN

SECTION SIX. EFFECTIVE DATE


This legislation and the "2021 Water Connection Projects Expenditure Plan" approved herein shall become effective pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 2505.

SECTION SEVEN. SAVINGS CLAUSE

If any provision of this legislation is determined invalid by the Supreme Court of the Navajo Nation or by any Navajo Nation District Court, without appeal to the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, the remainder of this legislation shall remain valid as the law of the Navajo Nation.



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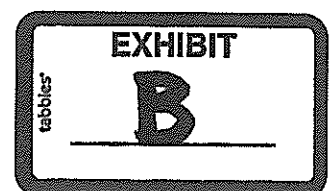

Sanostee Connection – Phase 1

Project Descriptions:

The Connection Plan Projects include design and construction of:

- **Sanostee Connection – Phase 1 (\$9,060,000.00)**

The Sanostee Connection – Phase 1 (Figure 1) includes a scope, budget, and schedule to design and construct a dedicated 9.65-mile, 10-inch diameter PVC pipeline from the Navajo-Gallup Supply transmission pipeline to the Sanostee South Tank (see green line in Figure 2), a 450,000-gallon water storage tank, a 700 gallon per minute pump station, hydropneumatic surge tanks, and a Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) remote telemetry unit. This connection would allow approximately 661 gallons per minute of project water from the San Juan River.

A dedicated Sanostee Connection will provide Project water to approximately 2,200 residents of Sanostee Chapter. Currently, Sanostee Chapter relies on groundwater wells that are in violation of the Safe Drinking Water Act Primary MCL for Arsenic. According the Navajo Tribal Utility Authority's (NTUA) 2018 Consumer Confidence Report (CCR), the arsenic concentration in the Sanostee water supply is 17.8 ppb, which is 78% above the violation limit. According to U.S. EPA, prolonged exposure to elevated arsenic concentrations can lead to skin lesions, blood disorders, and increased risk of cancer. The preferred solution to this issue is to connect the existing Sanostee water distribution system to the San Juan Lateral.

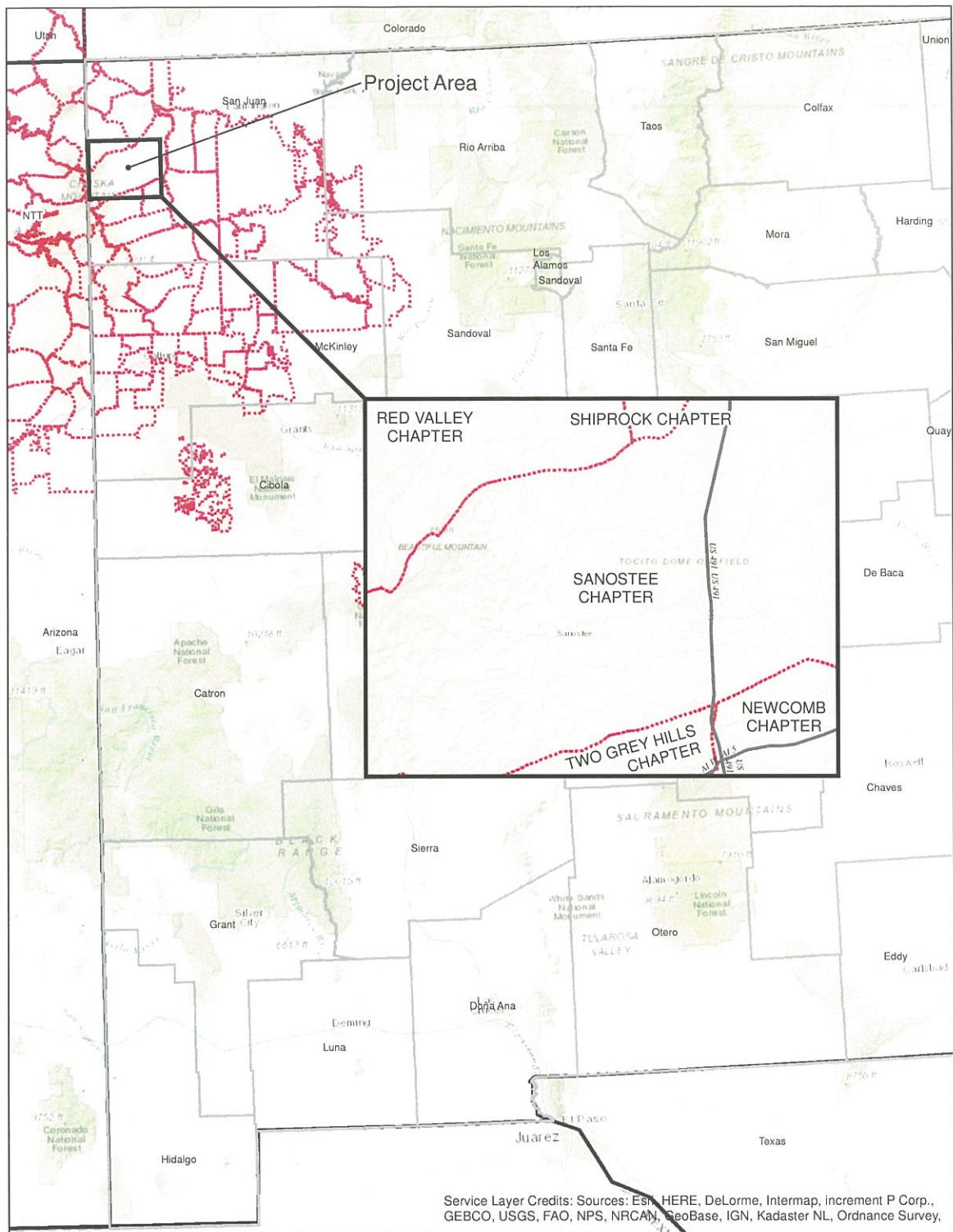
Since 2020, the Sanostee Chapter has prioritized this project as No. 1 on their New Mexico ICIP as the Regional San Juan Lateral Water Project (Appendix A). As a result, the Sanostee Chapter has been awarded funding through 2019 & 2020 New Mexico Capital Outlay (\$590,000), 2020 Tribal Infrastructure Fund (\$203,935), and the 2003 Federal Consolidation Appropriations (\$100,000). See total Cost-share contributions below. The Department of Water Resources – Water Management Branch is the lead agent and continues to assist Sanostee Chapter with their efforts.

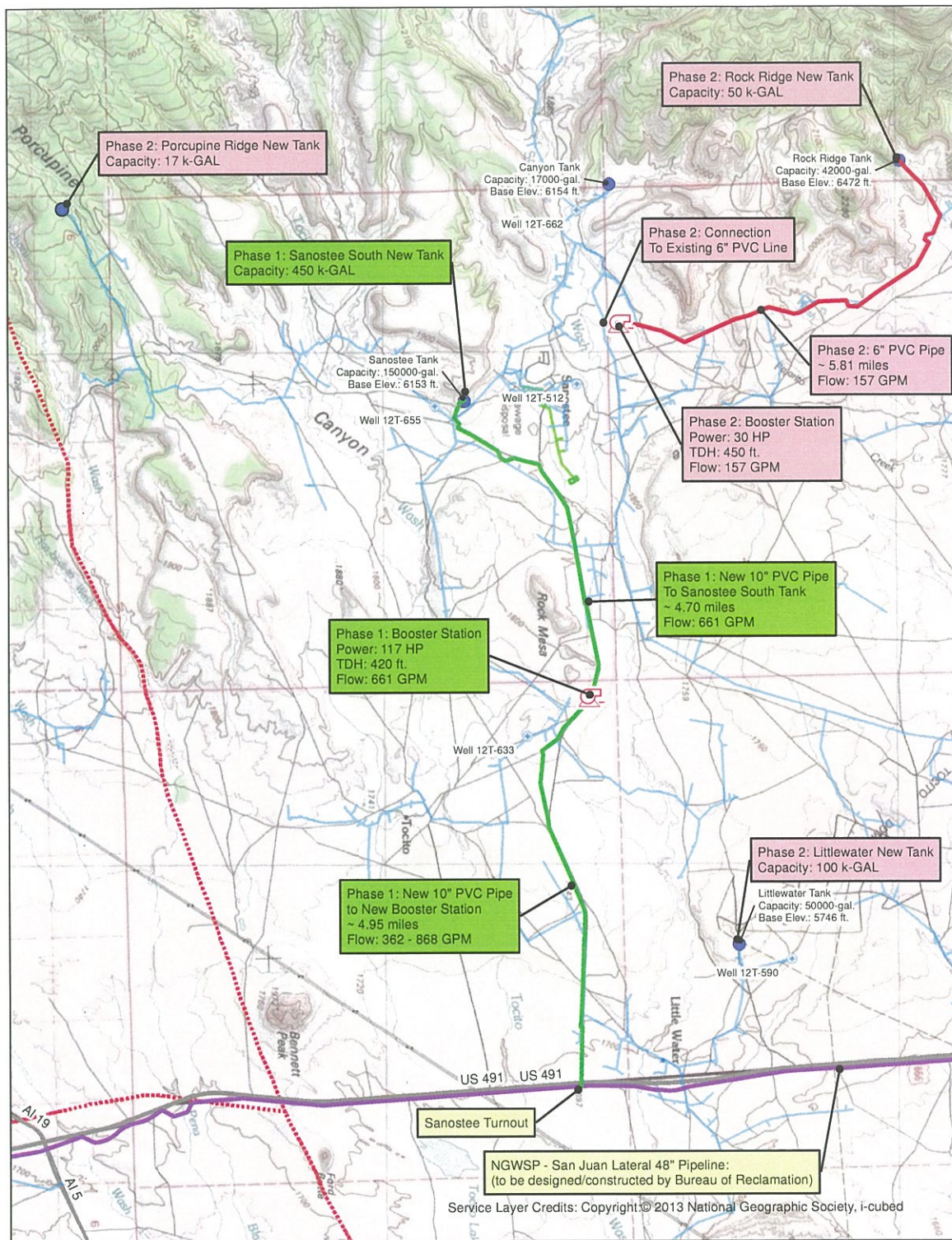

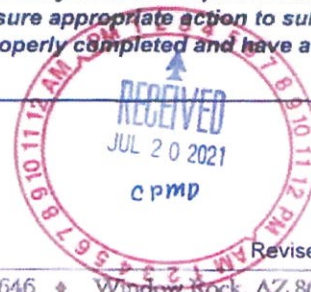

Laws 2021, Chapter 139, Section 57, FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (500,000) The agency for the department of environment project originally authorized in Subsection 86 of Section 26 of Chapter 81 of Laws 2020 to acquire easements and rights of way and to plan, design and construct, including surveying and archaeological and environmental studies, water system improvements for the regional San Juan lateral water project in the Tse Alnaozti'i' chapter of the Navajo Nation in San Juan county is changed to the Indian affairs department.

The Grantee's total reimbursements under this Agreement shall not exceed FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (500,000) which is hereinafter referred to as "Appropriation Amount."


B. In the event the Appropriation Amount in this Agreement is greater than the amount stated in the laws cited in Article I.A. above, the Grantee acknowledges and agrees that the amount stated in those laws is the maximum amount available to it under this Agreement.

In the event of a conflict between the Reversion Date and/or the purpose of the Project and/or the Reversion Date as set forth in this Agreement, and the corresponding appropriation language in the laws cited herein Article I. A., the language of the laws cited herein shall control.

This project is referred to throughout the remainder of this Agreement as the "Project"; the information contained in Article I. A. is referred to collectively throughout the remainder of this Agreement as the "Project Description" The Project Description includes Attachment A to this Agreement, which is incorporated by this reference as if fully set forth herein. The Rock Ridge/Mitten Rock Connection is the second phase of the Sanostee Connection – Phase 1 project (see Figure 1). The Rock Ridge/Mitten Rock Connection includes a scope, budget, and schedule to design and construct a dedicated 5.8-mile, 6-inch diameter PVC pipeline from an existing 6-inch PVC line to a new proposed Rock Ridge water storage tank (see red line in Figure 2). This project will include the construction of one new 50,000-gallon and two 17,000-gallon water storage tanks within service zones named Rock Ridge, Littlewater, and Porcupine, respectively. Currently, the residents who live within the Rock Ridge and Mitten Rock service areas rely on the same groundwater wells that Sanostee Chapter utilizes. These wells are in violation of the Safe Drinking Water Act Primary MCL for Arsenic. The preferred solution to this issue is to connect these smaller service areas to the San Juan Lateral through the Sanostee Connection – Phase 1.

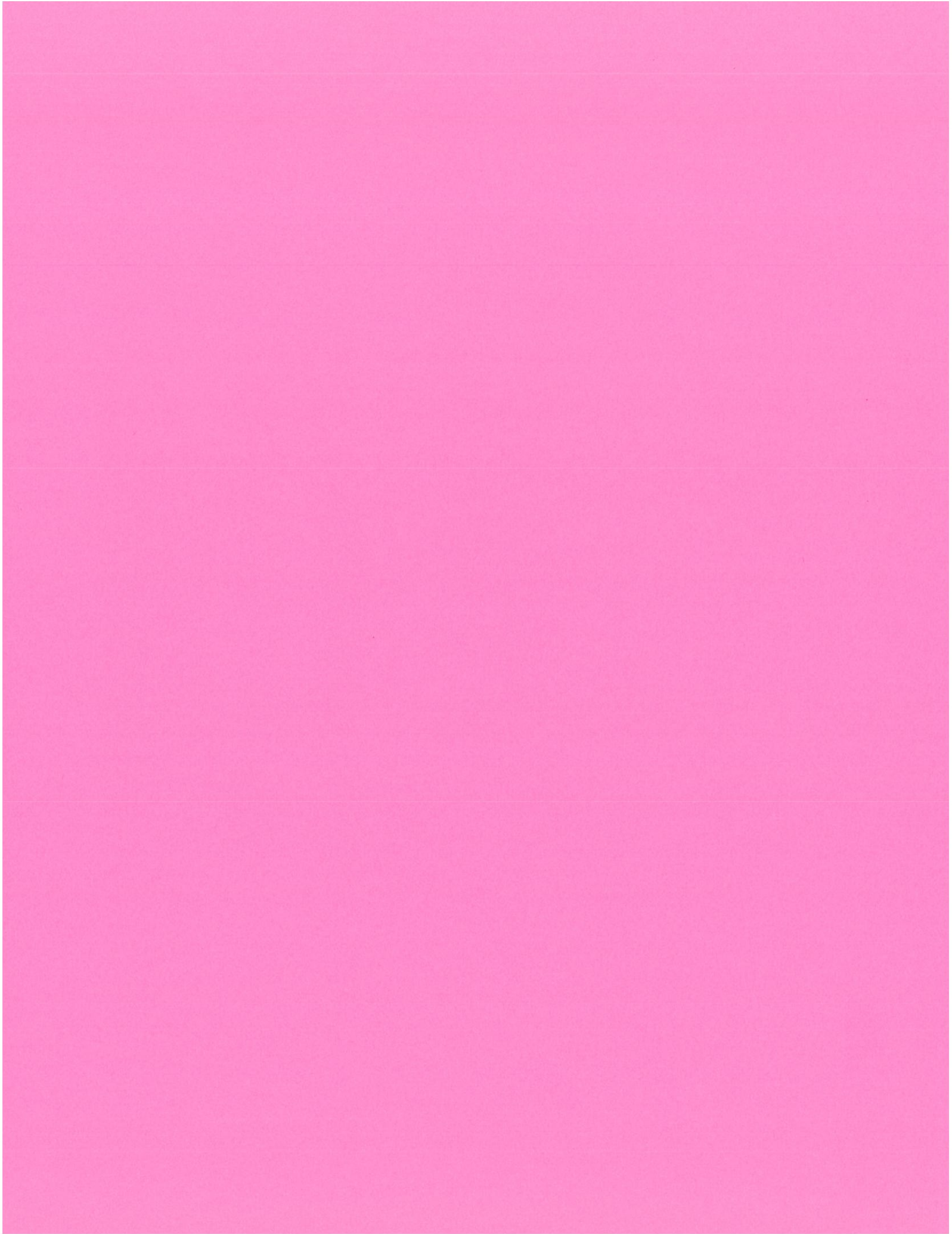

Newcomb Connection – Phase 1

The Newcomb Connection – Phase 1 (see Figure 3) includes a scope, budget, and schedule to design and construct a dedicated 3.4-mile, 6-inch diameter PVC pipeline from the Navajo-Gallup Supply transmission pipeline to the Newcomb Proper Tanks and Newcomb West Tank, construct a new 104,000-gallon water storage tank, gas chlorination facility, a hydropneumatic surge tank, and a Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) remote telemetry unit (see green line on Figure 4). This connection would allow a flow rate of approximately 831-1,023 gallons per minute of project water from the San Juan River. The flow rate would depend on whether the Navajo-Gallup pipeline pumping plant is active or not. Part of this flow rate will be utilized in the Phase 2 of this Project, which will convey Project water to the Two Grey Hills Chapter.

A dedicated Newcomb Connection will provide Project water to approximately 650 residents of Newcomb Chapter. Currently, Newcomb Chapter relies on groundwater wells that are producing approximately 18% less water than when originally constructed. The water production decline in the wells is due to aquifer depletion or well fatigue. This connection will also provide water the approximately 1,000 residents of Two Grey Hills Chapter with the Phase 2 project, who currently have arsenic in their water supply. Refer to the Two Grey Hills Chapter Connection Plan Proposal for Phase 2 of this project. The preferred solution to this issue is to connect the existing Newcomb water distribution system to the San Juan Lateral.

- **Two Grey Hills Connection – Phase 2 (\$9,360,000.00)**

The Two Grey Hills Connection – Phase 2 (see Figure 3) includes a scope, budget, and schedule to design and construct a dedicated 12.1-mile, 6-inch diameter PVC pipeline from the Navajo-Gallup Supply transmission pipeline to the Two Grey Hills South Tanks, construct new 80,000-gallon and 87,000-gallon water storage tanks, two (2) 300 gallon per minute pump stations, gas chlorination treatment facility, hydropneumatic surge tanks, and a Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) remote telemetry unit (see red line on Figure 4). The 6-inch pipeline will tap off of the Newcomb Connection – Phase 1.

A dedicated Two Grey Hills Connection will provide Project water to approximately 1,000 residents of Two Grey Hills Chapter. The Two Grey Hills Chapter relies on groundwater wells that are currently in violation of the Safe Drinking Water Act Primary MCL for Arsenic. According to the Navajo Tribal Utility Authority's (NTUA) 2018 Consumer Confidence Report (CCR), the arsenic concentration in the Two Grey Hills water supply is 15.6 ppb, which is 56% above the violation limit. According to U.S. EPA, prolonged exposure to elevated arsenic concentrations can lead to skin lesions, blood disorders, and increased risk of cancer. The preferred solution to this issue is to connect the existing Two Grey Hills water distribution system to the San Juan Lateral.

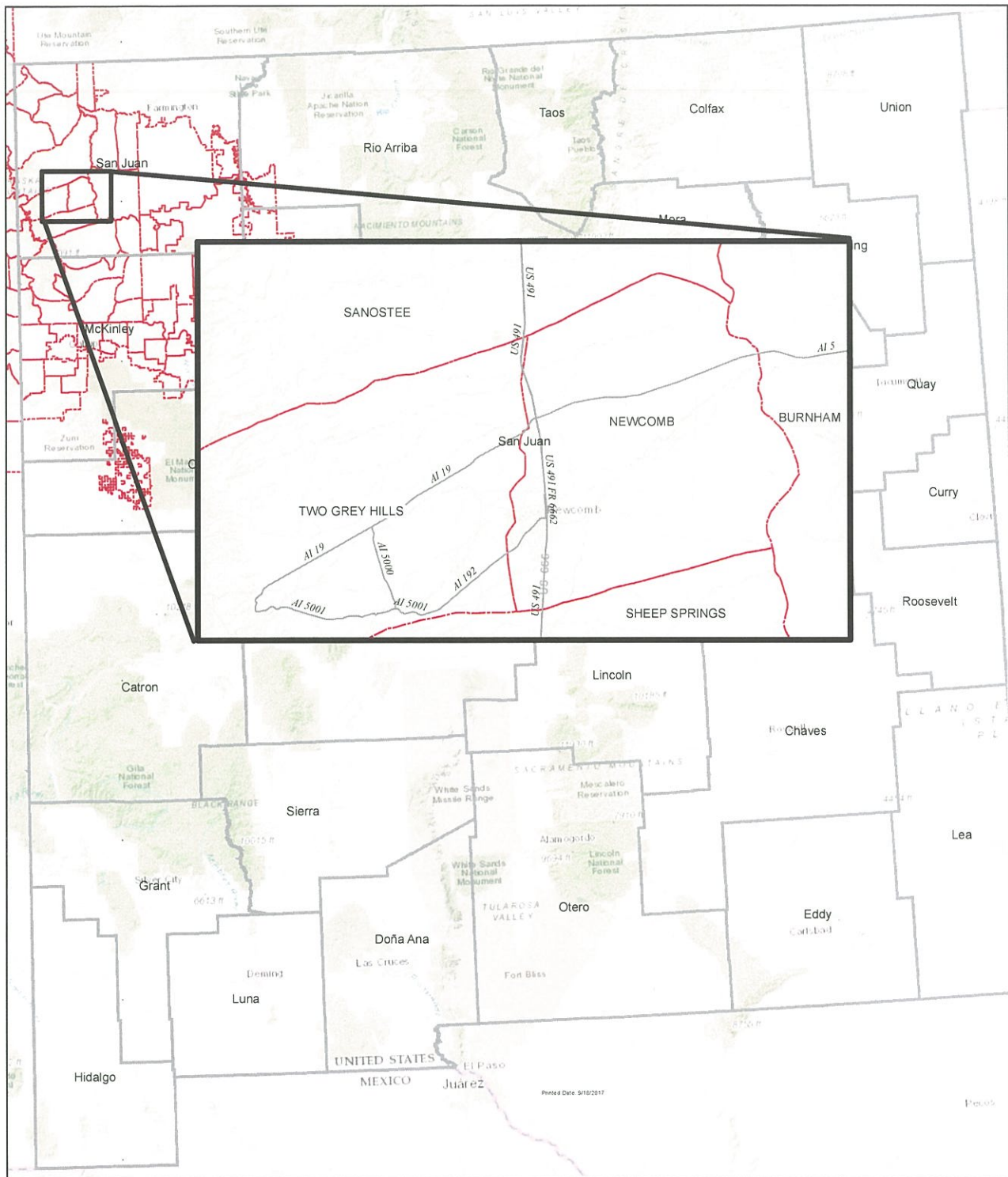

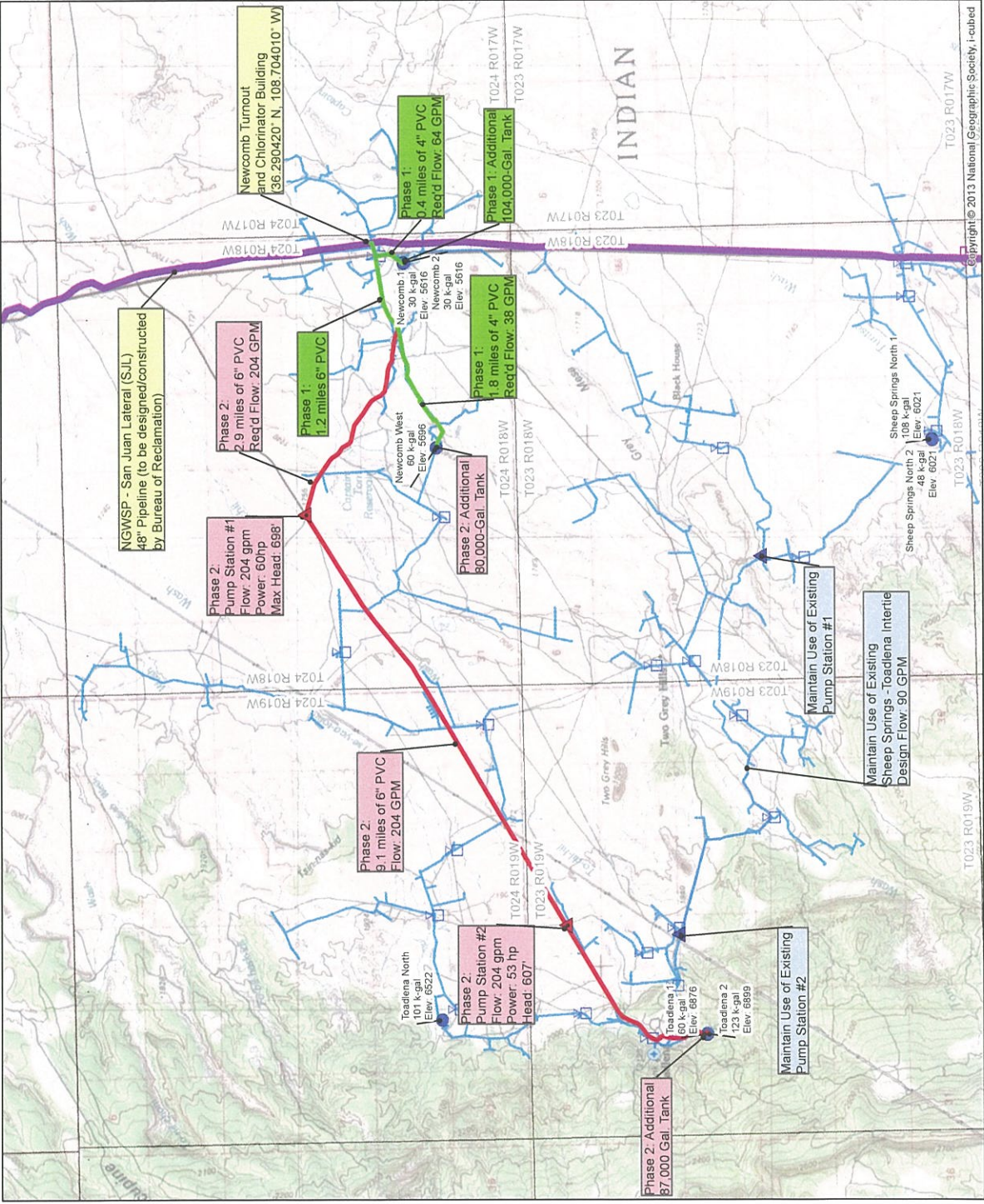

The Sheep Springs Connection Phase 1 (see Figure 5) includes a scope, budget, and schedule to design and construct a dedicated 3.45-mile, 6-inch diameter PVC pipeline from the Navajo-Gallup Supply transmission pipeline to the Sheep Springs North Tank, construct a new 60,000-gallon water storage tank to allow approximately 373-532 gallons per minute of project water from the San Juan River, a gas chlorination facility, a hydropneumatic surge tank, and a Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) remote telemetry unit (see green line on Figure 6).

A dedicated Sheep Springs Connection will provide Project water to approximately 1,000 residents of Sheep Springs Chapter. Currently, Sheep Springs Chapter relies on groundwater wells that are producing approximately 13% less water than when originally constructed. The water production decline in the wells is due to aquifer depletion or well fatigue. The wells have reported to have issues with silt in the wells causing the wells to be shut down and requiring maintenance. The preferred solution to these issues is to connect the existing Sheep Springs water distribution system to the San Juan Lateral.

Since 2020, the Sheep Springs Chapter has prioritized this project as No. 2 on their New Mexico ICIP as the Regional San Juan Lateral Water Project (Appendix A). As a result, the Sheep Springs Chapter has been awarded funding through 2021 Tribal Infrastructure Fund (\$315,078) and the 2003 Federal Consolidation Appropriations (\$100,000). See total Cost-share contributions below. The Department of Water Resources – Water Management Branch is the lead agent and continues to assist Sheep Springs Chapter with their efforts.

The Narbona Pass Connection Phase 2 (see Figure 5) includes a scope, budget, and schedule to design and construct a dedicated 3.94-mile, 4-inch diameter PVC pipeline from the Sheep Springs South Tank to the Narbona Pass (Washington Pass) Tank, construct a new 108,000-gallon water storage tank to allow approximately 70 gallons per minute of project water, two (2) 70 gallon per minute pump stations, hydropneumatic surge tanks, and a Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) remote telemetry unit (see red line on Figure 6).

A dedicated Narbona Pass Connection will provide Project water to approximately 200 residents of the Narbona Pass service area. Currently, Narbona relies on a groundwater well that is currently producing approximately 41% less water than when originally constructed. The water production decline in the wells is due to aquifer depletion or well fatigue. The wells have reported to have issues with silt in the wells causing the wells to be shut down and requiring maintenance. The preferred solution to this issue is to connect the existing Narbona Pass service area system to the main Sheep Springs water distribution system.

No funding has been secured for the design and construction of the Phase 2 Project. However, the Department of Water Resources – Water Management Branch will continue to assist these communities with their efforts.

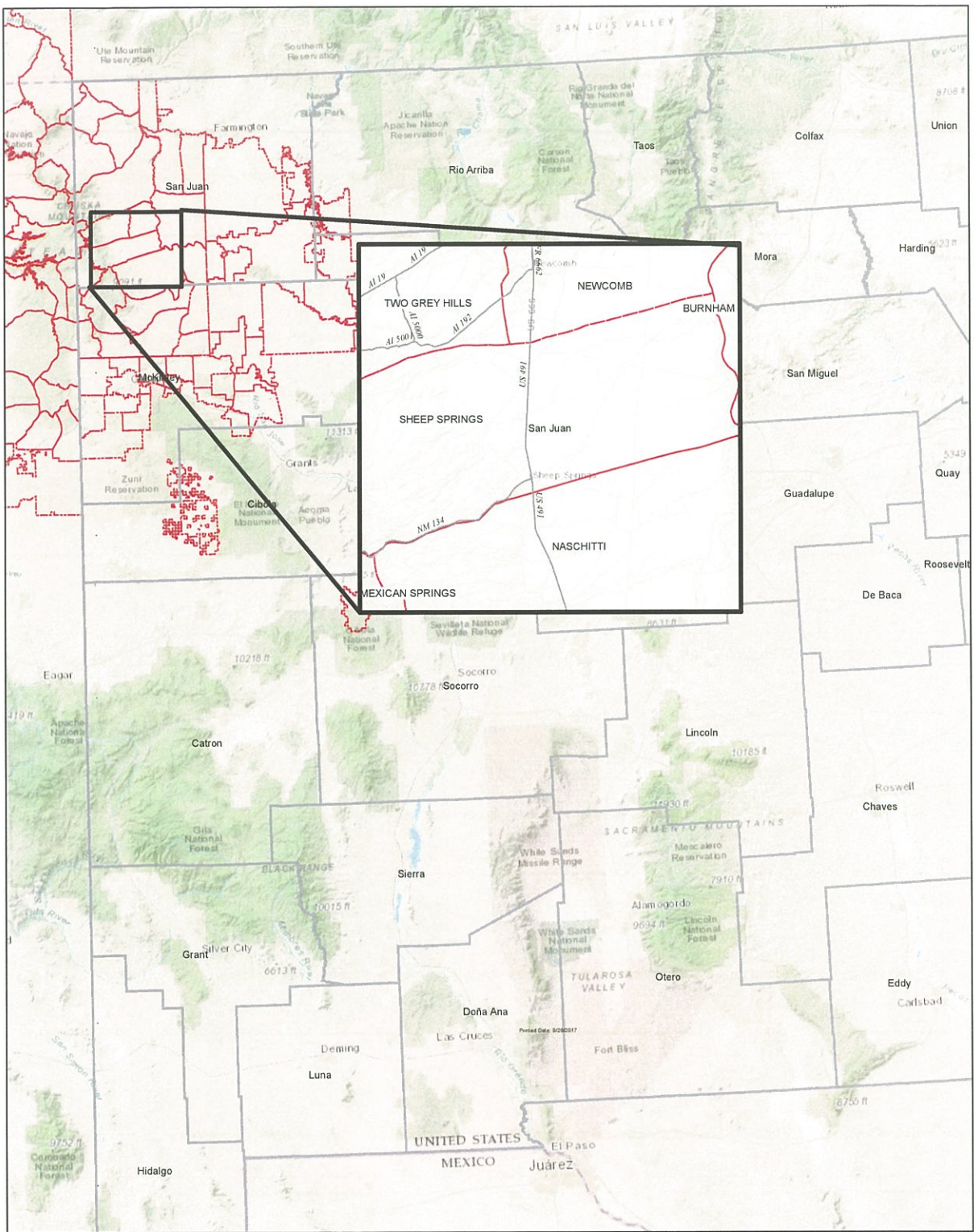

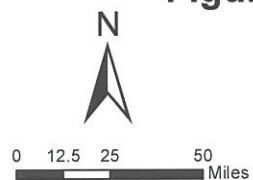


San Juan Lateral Connection Plan: Sheep Springs Chapter

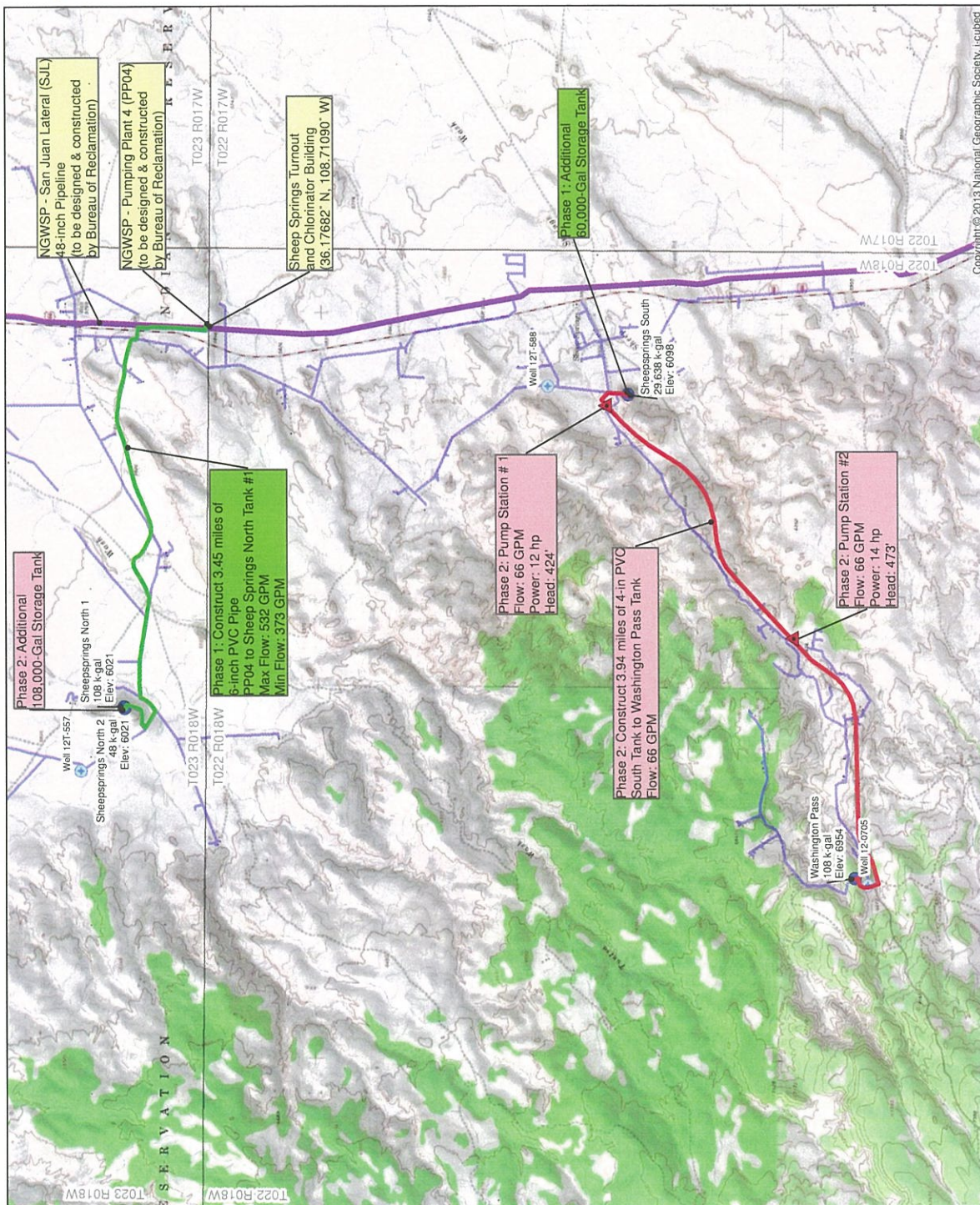



Since their participation, the Naschitti Chapter has been awarded funding through 2020 New Mexico Capital Outlay (\$599,000) and the 2003 Federal Consolidation Appropriations (\$100,000). See total Cost-share contributions below. The Department of Water Resources – Water Management Branch is the lead agent and continues to assist Naschitti Chapter with their efforts.

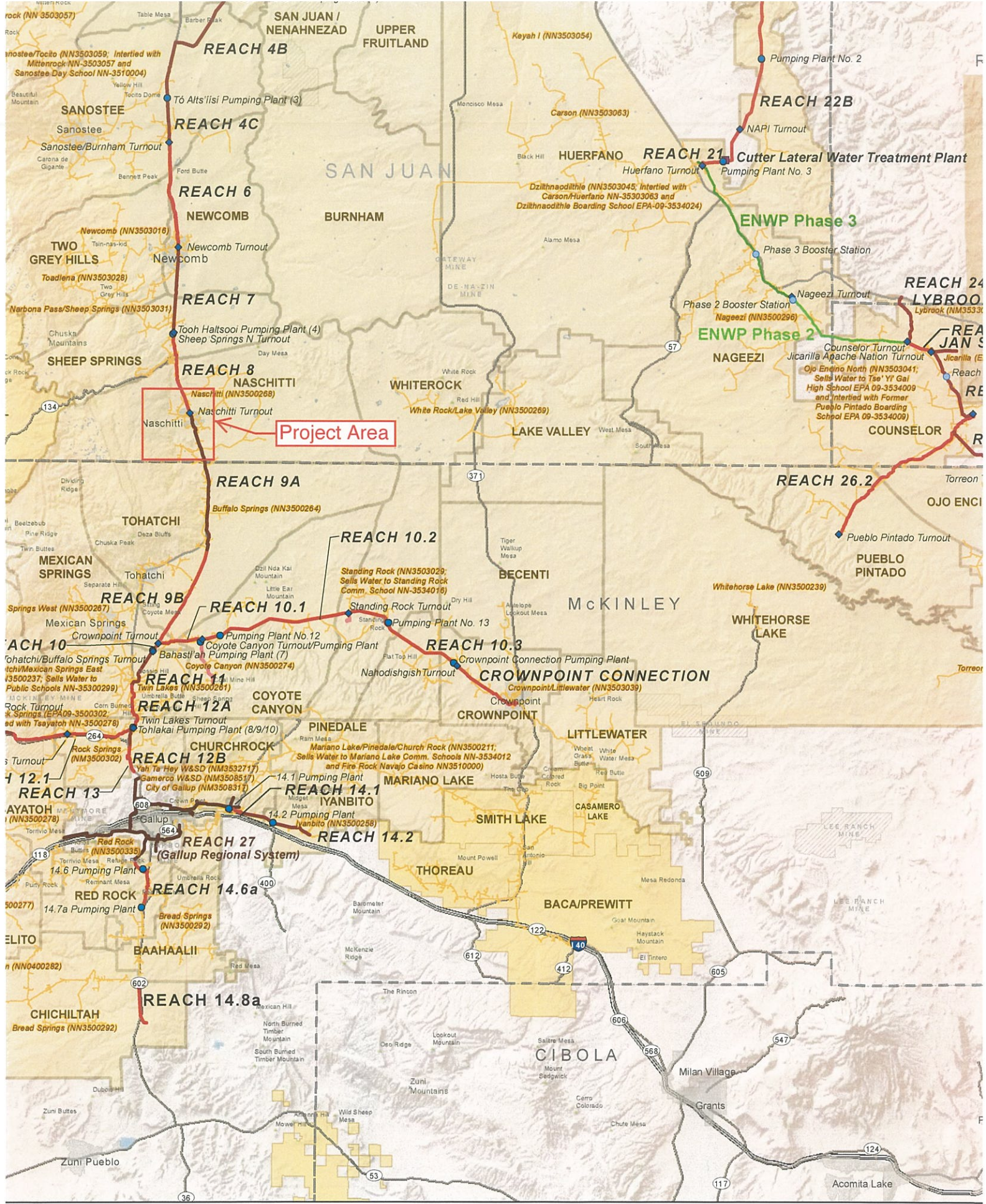

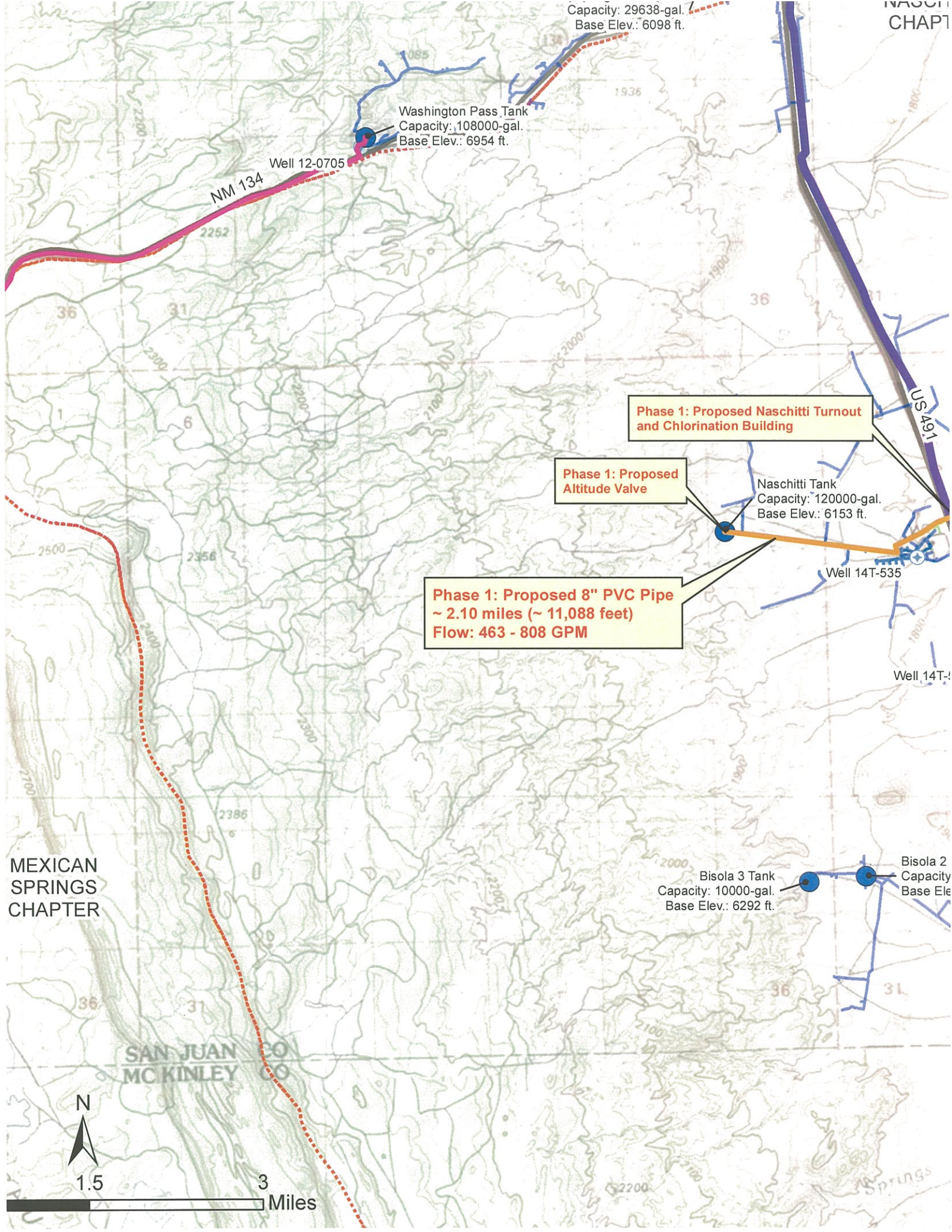



The Tohatchi Connection – Phase 1 (see Figure 9) includes a scope, budget, and schedule to design and construct a dedicated 11.28-mile, 10-inch diameter PVC pipeline from the discharge side of Pumping Plant No. 7 of the Navajo-Gallup Supply transmission pipeline to the existing Tohatchi Tank (see red line on Figure 10). As a result, the Tohatchi Chapter has been awarded funding through 2020 Tribal Infrastructure Fund (\$593,245) and the 2003 Federal Consolidation Appropriations (\$100,000). See total Cost-share contributions below. The Department of Water Resources – Water Management Branch is the lead agent and continues to assist Sanostee Chapter with their efforts.

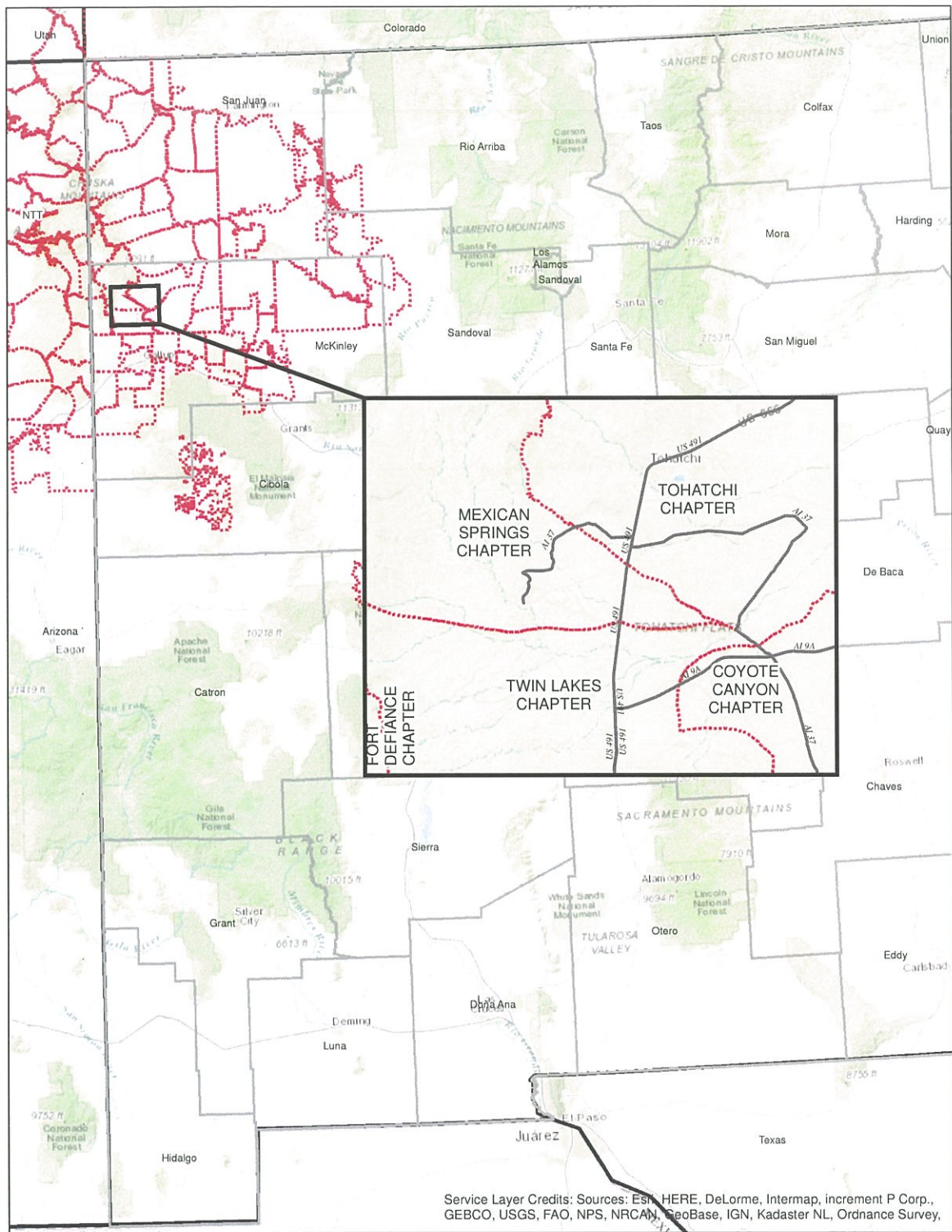

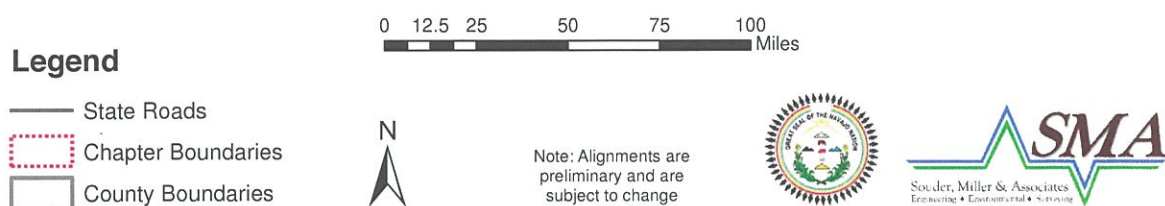

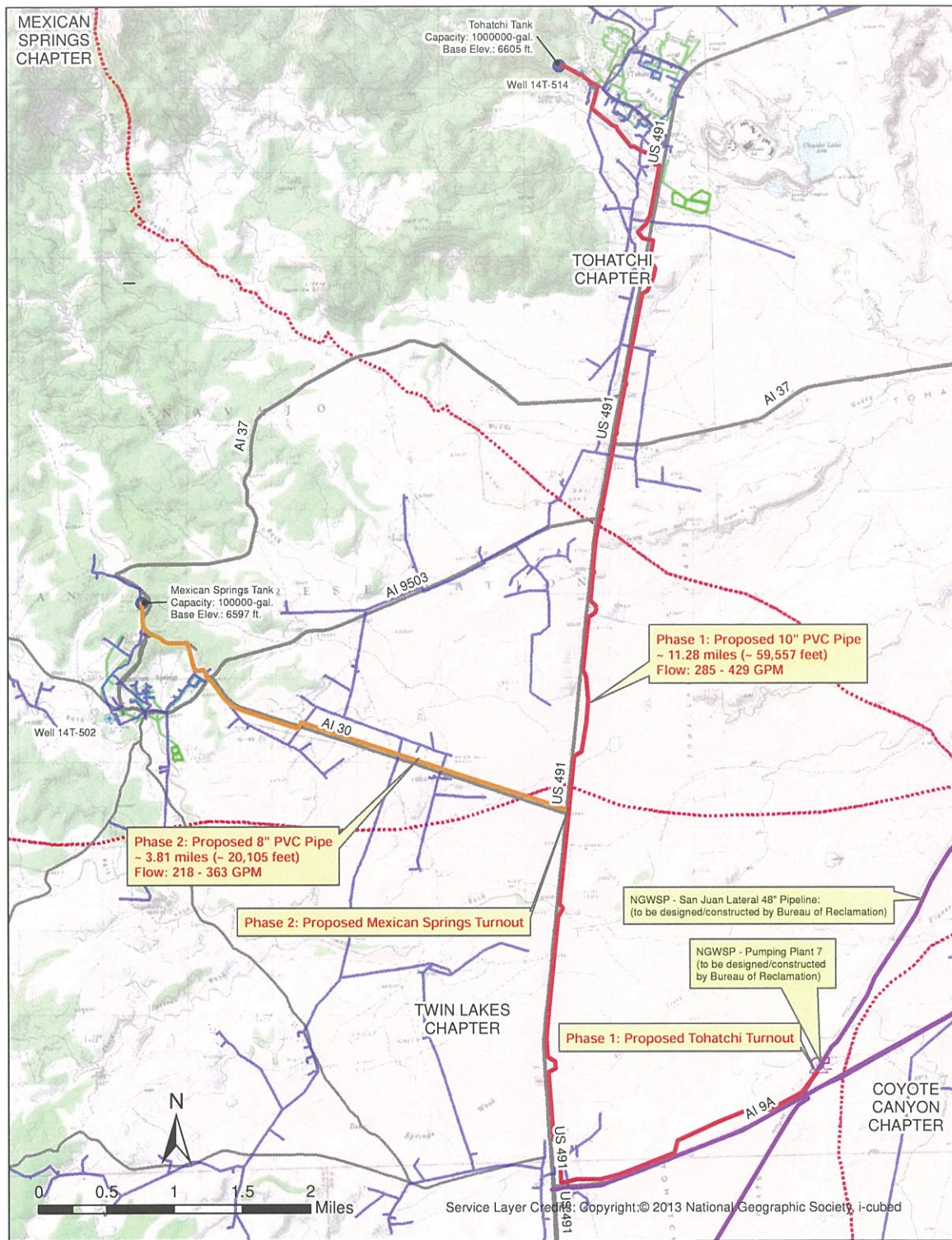

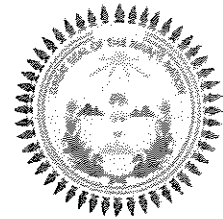

Navajo-Gallup Water Supply Project Rock Springs & Tsayatoh Connection

Project Descriptions:

The Connection Plan Projects include design and construction of:

- **Rock Springs/Tsayatoh Connection – (\$2,590,000.00)**

The Rock Springs and Tsayatoh Connection (see Figure 13) includes a scope, budget, and schedule to design and construct a dedicated 1.22-mile, 8-inch diameter PVC pipeline from the Navajo-Gallup Supply transmission pipeline to the Rock Springs #1 and #2 Tanks, construct new 261,000-gallon and 206,000-gallon water storage tanks, a gas chlorination facility, a hydropneumatic surge tank, and a Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) remote telemetry unit (see Figure 14). This connection would allow a flow rate of approximately 584 - 1,418 gallons per minute of project water from the San Juan River. The flow rate would depend on whether the Navajo-Gallup pipeline pumping plant is active or not. Project water will be conveyed to the Tsayatoh Chapter through the existing distribution pipelines.

A dedicated Rock Springs and Tsayatoh Connection will provide Project water to approximately 1,620 and 920 residents of Rock Springs and Tsayatoh Chapters, respectively. The Rock Springs and Tsayatoh Chapters rely on groundwater wells that are currently producing approximately 14% less water than when originally constructed. The water production decline in the wells is due to aquifer depletion or well fatigue. It has been reported that the wells have issues with odors, which is suspected to be Hydrogen Sulfide. The preferred solution to this issue is to connect the existing Rock Springs water distribution system to the San Juan Lateral.

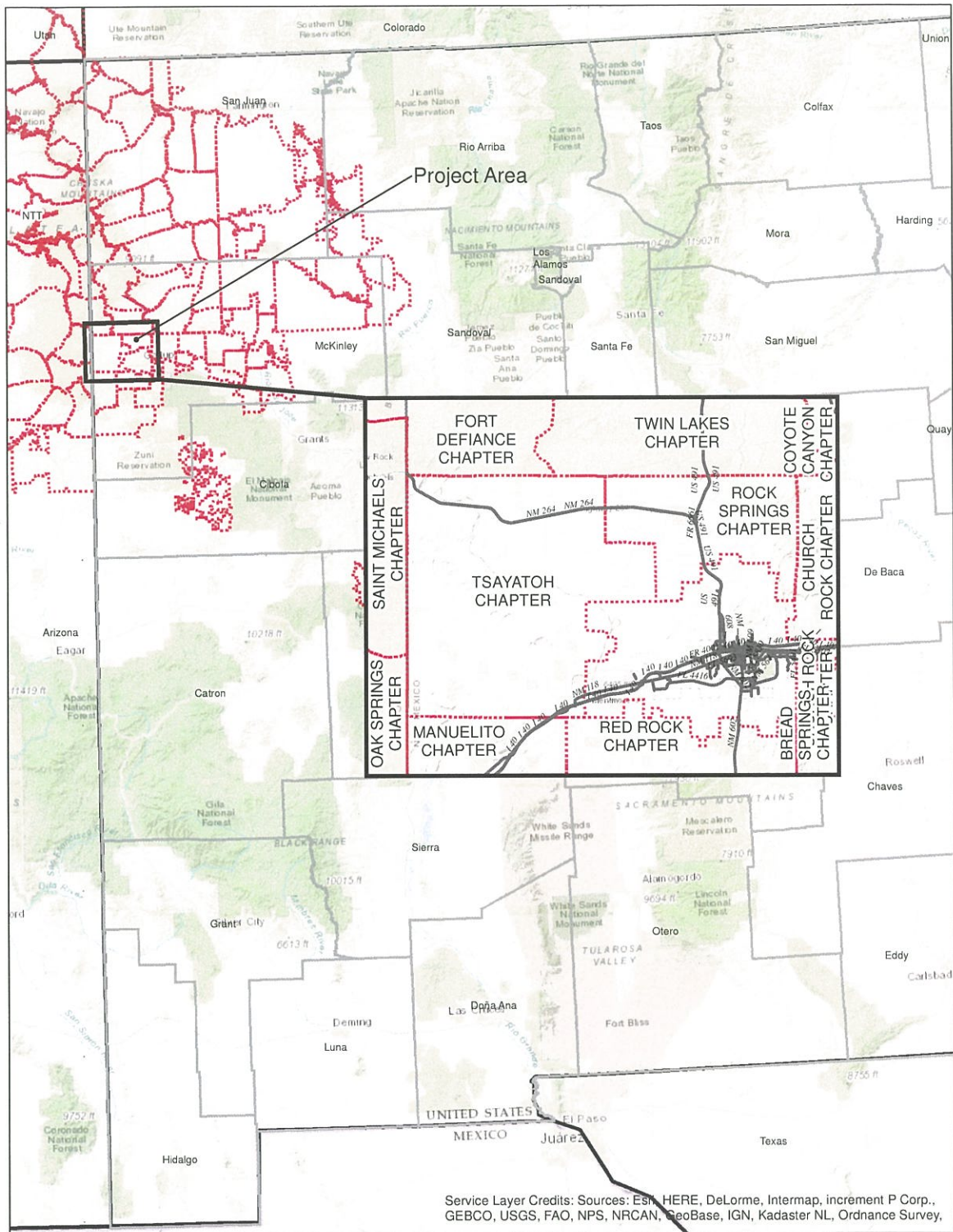
Since 2020, the Rock Springs and Tsayatoh Chapters have prioritized this project as No. 3 on their New Mexico ICIP as the Regional Navajo Code Talker Lateral Water Project (Appendix A). 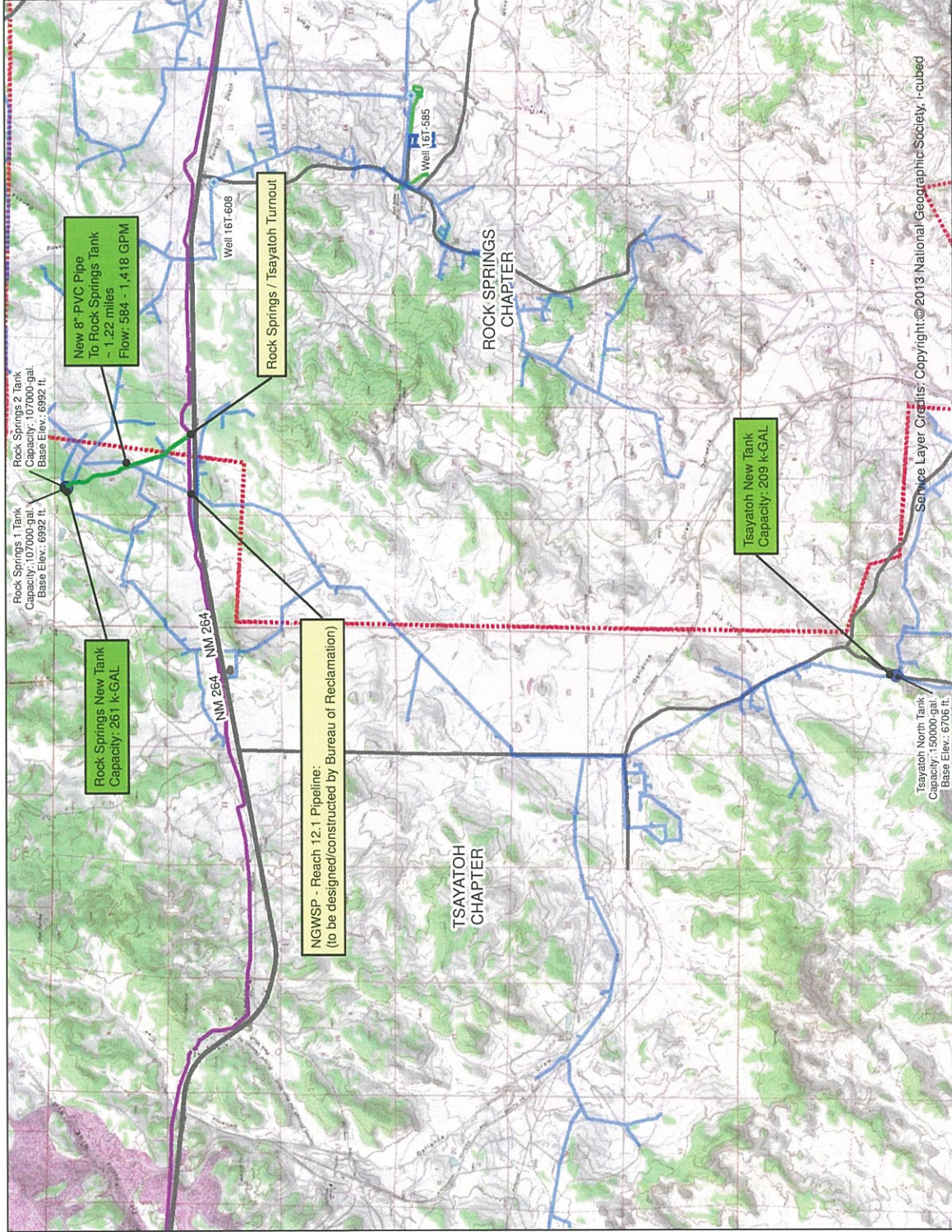



Standing Rock Connection

Project Descriptions:

The Connection Plan Projects include design and construction of:

- **Standing Rock Connection – (\$3,470,000.00)**

The Standing Rock Connection (see Figure 11) includes a scope, budget, and schedule to design and construct a dedicated 4.12-mile, 6-inch diameter PVC pipeline from the Navajo-Gallup Supply transmission pipeline to the Standing Rock South and North Tank sites, a gas chlorination facility, a 150 gallon per minute pump station, and a Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) remote telemetry unit (see Figure 12). The system is designed to run by gravity to the Standing Rock North Tank at a design flowrate of 225 gallons per minute. The system will require a pump station to convey 150 gallons per minute of water to the Standing Rock South Tank.

A dedicated Standing Rock Connection will provide Project water to approximately 833 residents of Standing Rock Chapter. Currently, Standing Rock Chapter relies on a sole groundwater well within the Chapter boundaries that produces enough water to meet the Chapter's demands. The Standing Rock Chapter water system is not inter-tied to neighboring water systems which means that there is no backup water source. In the event that the Standing Rock well goes down, the Chapter will be without water. The preferred solution to this issue is to connect the existing Standing Rock water distribution system to the Beacon Bisti N9 lateral of the Navajo-Gallup Supply project.

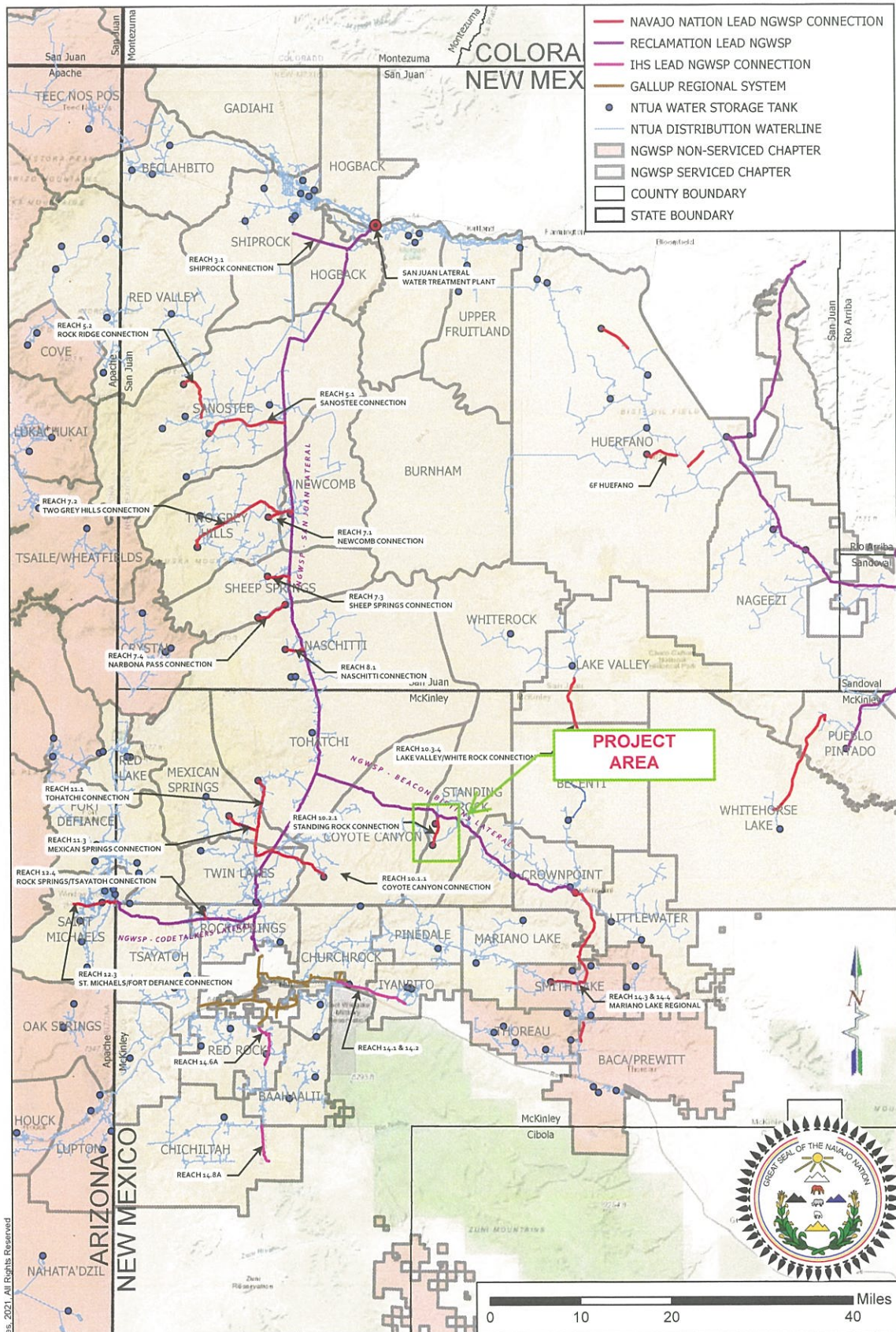

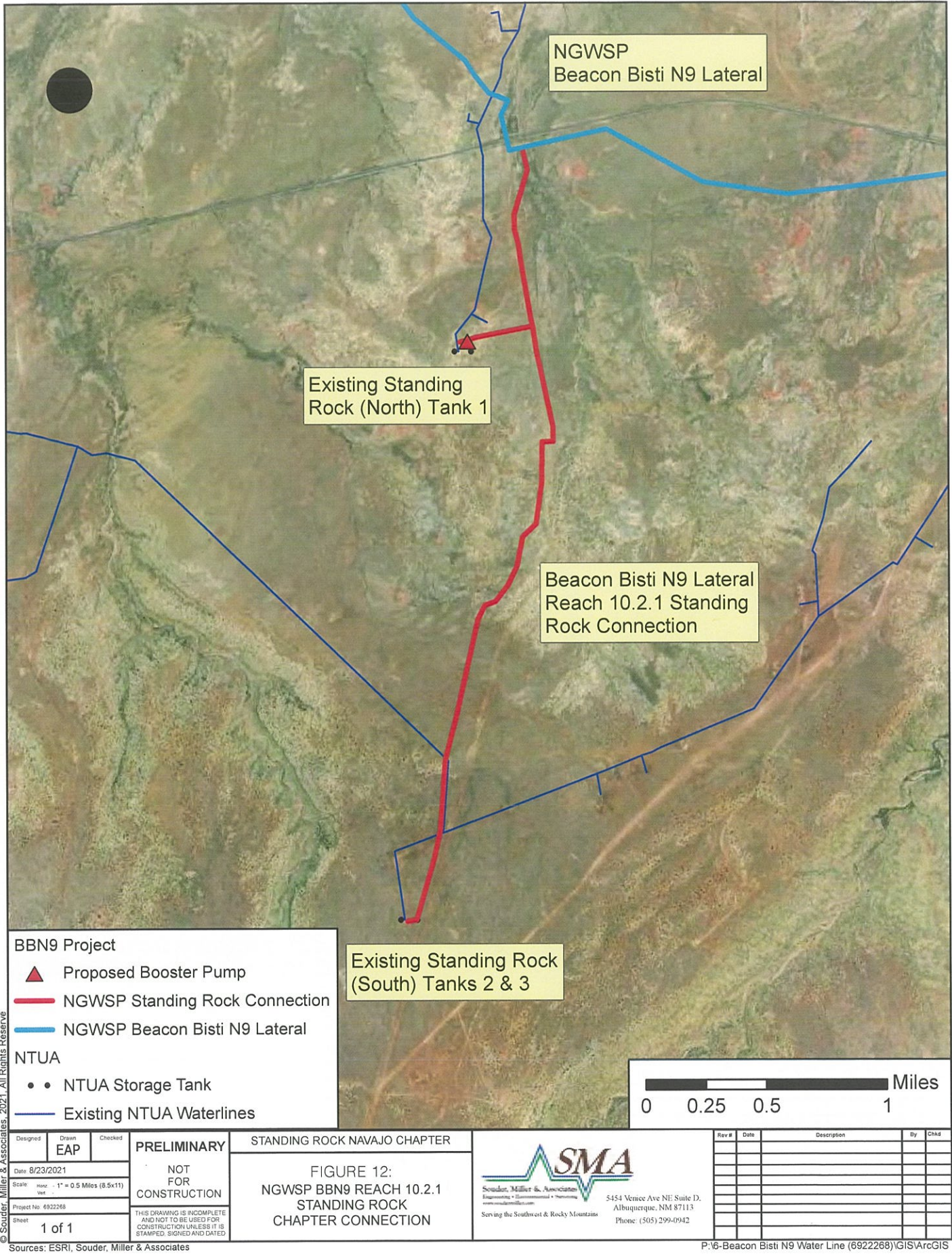

Laws 2021, Chapter 139, Section 42, TWO HUNDRED SEVENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (275,000) The agency for the department of environment project originally authorized in Subsection 52 of Section 26 of Chapter 81 of Laws 2020 to acquire easements and rights of way and to plan, design and construct water system improvements for the regional Beacon Bisti N9 lateral water project for the Tse'ii'ahi' chapter of the Navajo Nation in McKinley county is changed to the Indian affairs department.

The Grantee's total reimbursements under this Agreement shall not exceed TWO HUNDRED SEVENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (275,000) which is hereinafter referred to as "Appropriation Amount."

B. In the event the Appropriation Amount in this Agreement is greater than the amount stated in the laws cited in Article I.A. above, the Grantee acknowledges and agrees that the amount stated in those laws is the maximum amount available to it under this Agreement.

In the event of a conflict between the Reversion Date and/or the purpose of the Project and/or the Reversion Date as set forth in this Agreement, and the corresponding appropriation language in the laws cited herein Article I. A., the language of the laws cited herein shall control.

This project is referred to throughout the remainder of this Agreement as the "Project"; the information contained in Article I. A. is referred to collectively throughout the remainder of this Agreement as the "Project Description" The Project Description includes Attachment A to this Agreement, which is incorporated by this reference as if fully set forth herein. In the event of an irreconcilable conflict between the terms of Attachment A and the other terms of this Agreement, the other terms of this Agreement shall prevail over the terms in Attachment A; provided, however, that Attachment A may limit allowable expenditures to a subset of the expenditures that would otherwise be permissible under the appropriation language.

Attachment B sets forth additional or more stringent requirements and conditions, which are incorporated by this reference as if set forth fully herein. If Attachment B imposes more stringent requirements than any requirement set forth in this Agreement, the more stringent requirements of Attachment B shall prevail, in the event of irreconcilable conflict.

Funding Justification

Project/Entity: To'Hajiilee - Albuquerque Water Supply Line
Project Type: Surveying, Rights-of-Way and Water Rights
Date: August 26, 2021
Requested Amount: \$1,875,000

Need for Project:

The To'Hajiilee Chapter is suffering an acute water crisis. Five of the chapter's six wells have failed or been abandoned due to poor water quality, inadequate production, or both. At this time, nearly 1,800 chapter members rely on a single well that produces corrosive, poor quality water. During the past 5 years, this well has failed four (4) times due to the pump burning out, leaving the entire chapter – including residents, the school, and the health clinic – without water for up to two weeks. The school and clinic both had to close during these times. Moreover, the well casing itself is corroding due the corrosive water, which could lead to total collapse. When the well collapses, the chapter will be without any water source at all for several months, unless an alternative water source can be developed beforehand.

Project Description:

The proposed To'Hajiilee Water Supply Project will provide this urgently needed water source by connecting the chapter to the Albuquerque Bernalillo County Water Utility Authority (ABCWUA) via a new 7.2 mile 10-inch HDPE gravity pipeline. The ABCWUA will treat and convey water leased by the Navajo Nation from the Jicarilla Apache Nation (JAN) and pipe it to the Chapter. At this time, all private easements for the project have been negotiated, and the water lease has been negotiated between the Navajo Nation and JAN (execution pending requested funds).

Scope of Work, Line-Item Budget & Implementation Schedule:

The requested funds will be used for field alignment staking, legal and topographic surveying, securing capacity in upstream infrastructure, right-of-way acquisition, and water rights lease. A detailed listing of these tasks, with line-item budget costs and delivery dates, is provided below.

This project has already been awarded over \$10.7 million for construction by the State of New Mexico. However, these State construction funds cannot be accessed until the tasks listed below are completed. Therefore, the requested funding will allow the Navajo Nation to leverage over \$10.7 million in State funds.

**MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN
BERNALILLO COUNTY, ALBUQUERQUE BERNALILLO COUNTY
WATER UTILITY AUTHORITY AND THE NAVAJO NATION**

PREAMBLE

This Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") is entered into with an effective date of October 6, 2020 as agreed to among the Parties by and between the County of Bernalillo ("Bernalillo County" or the "County"), a New Mexico political subdivision whose address is One Civic Plaza NW, 10th Floor, Albuquerque, New Mexico 87102; Albuquerque Bernalillo County Water Utility Authority ("Water Authority"), a New Mexico political subdivision whose address is P.O. Box 568, One Civic Plaza NW, 5th Floor, Room 5012, Albuquerque, New Mexico 87102; and the Navajo Nation ("Nation"), on behalf of its To'Hajiilee Chapter, and through its Department of Water Resources whose address is P.O. Box 678, Fort Defiance, AZ 86504. The County, Water Authority and Nation may be referred to jointly herein as the "Parties" or each individually as a "Party."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the To'Hajiilee Chapter has had recurring potable water supply problems over a number of years that have prevented residents of To'Hajiilee from having a safe healthy and sustainable water supply from any source; and

WHEREAS, the water produced by the To'Hajiilee well does not meet potable standards; and

WHEREAS, in the last five years To'Hajiilee's well has failed three times. Each well failure results in the entire community being without water service for five to ten days; and

WHEREAS, during the times of outage To'Hajiilee's residents are forced to travel significant distances to obtain potable water; and

WHEREAS, recently the Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Management and the Albuquerque Bernalillo County Water Utility Authority have sent tanker trucks to the community for residents to line up and fill water containers for personal use; and

WHEREAS, because of the existing COVID-19 pandemic having large numbers of people congregating at a central tap to obtain drinking water could lead to increased risk of COVID-19 transmission; and

WHEREAS, because of the existing COVID-19 pandemic having large numbers of people travel to other parts of the state for purposes of obtaining water could lead to increased risk of COVID-19 transmission; and

WHEREAS, To'Hajiilee's residents are thus forced to either haul water from untreated water sources such as livestock ponds, purchase bottled water in Albuquerque, or visit neighbors to share water; and

WHEREAS, the use of non-potable water for domestic water needs can expose users to waterborne diseases and keeps residents from observing COVID safe social distancing practices; and

WHEREAS, the community's health care facility is also at risk for shutting down given the lack of a clean potable water supply; and

WHEREAS, a safe and readily available water supply is important for public health, whether it is used for sanitation, drinking, domestic use, or food production; and

WHEREAS, there is an urgent need to resolve the To'Hajiilee water crisis, which has been more acute during the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, the Water Authority is willing and able to treat water that is provided by the Nation and convey said water through a dedicated transmission line to the distribution system within the To'Hajiilee Chapter once easements and right-of-ways are obtained from private owners and construction is completed (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, both water and financial resources for the Project are immediately available requiring the Parties to work together; and

WHEREAS, the County has approved proceeding with the Project and obtaining easements and rights of way by a unanimous vote of the Commissioners on April 14, 2020; and

WHEREAS, the County and the Water Authority will work with the Nation and its To'Hajiilee Chapter and Department of Water Resources to develop MOU's/MOA's (Memorandum of Agreements) or other agreements with the Nation and other Parties to this MOU to finalize all requirements for Project completion; and

WHEREAS, consistent with that Cooperative Agreement dated August 28, 2006 by and between the Navajo Nation, the Water Authority and To'Hajiilee Chapter, the Water Authority is prepared and willing to facilitate and manage the construction of the necessary infrastructure as described in this MOU but under no circumstance will the Water Authority incur any net new expenses for such construction or provide water rights for the Project; and

WHEREAS, the Project will ultimately be owned and operated by the Water Authority up to the connection with the To'Hajiilee Chapter water distribution system; and

WHEREAS, the County is prepared, upon completion of construction of the necessary infrastructure and the approval of all easements and right of ways consistent with this MOU, to grant title and easements to the Water Authority to operate and maintain the infrastructure up to the point of the To'Hajiilee Chapter distribution.

NOW THEREFORE, the County, the Water Authority and the Nation agree to the following terms and conditions:

TERMS AND CONDITIONS


The aforementioned Preamble and Recitals are incorporated herein and are given the same weight as each of the additional terms and conditions listed below.

1. The County shall be responsible for obtaining all easements from the connection point of the Water Authority's existing infrastructure to the boundary of To'Hajiilee Chapter.
2. The Nation shall supply surveys and valuations for the following easements from the connection point of the Water Authority to the boundary of To'Hajiilee Chapter:
 - a. Lands of Caroline Armijo Butler, as described in attached Exhibit A;
 - b. Lands of Sunset Ranch Partners, as described in attached Exhibit B; and
 - c. Lands of Western Albuquerque Land Holdings, as described in attached Exhibit C.
3. As may be necessary to acquire the above identified easements, the County shall be responsible for pursuing and completing an eminent domain action, including the posting of any necessary funds, subject to reimbursement for such postings by the Nation.
4. The Water Authority will be responsible for construction of the necessary infrastructure up to the connection with the water distribution system at To'Hajiilee Chapter using the Water Authority's on-call vendors available at the time of this MOU, provided that all costs of such construction and design thereof shall be at no net expense to the Water Authority and its ratepayers.
5. The Parties agree that the Water Authority shall not provide or subsidize the funding necessary for the Project; however, the Water Authority agrees to assist in pursuing outside funding sources where available, such as the New Mexico Water Trust Board or other similar programs.
6. The Water Authority will enter into the appropriate agreement with the Nation for construction, operation and maintenance of the dedicated water line and transmission of Navajo Nation water supplied for the benefit of To'Hajiilee Chapter, which water supply will be expressly limited to meet current To'Hajiilee demands of 135,000 gallons per day and a maximum amount of 350,000 gallons per day in the next 40-year period, to be implemented on an agreed-upon schedule.
7. The Water Authority's commitment to deliver any water to To'Hajiilee Chapter under this MOU is expressly conditioned upon all such water being provided by the Navajo Nation for said delivery in a method acceptable to the Water Authority.
8. The Water Authority will be the ultimate owner of any easements obtained over private properties to accommodate the dedicated water line to convey water to To'Hajiilee Chapter.


9. The Nation will be responsible for the distribution of water within To'Hajiilee Chapter.
10. The Nation, through its Department of Water Resources, will advance sums for construction, transmission and right-of-way acquisition costs using Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act) funds, Navajo Nation budgeted appropriations, grants, or other sources of funds.
11. The Nation ensure compliance with Navajo Nation laws and other requirements.
12. All Parties will coordinate with New Mexico's Congressional delegation for federal support.
13. This MOU cannot be amended or modified except by a written instrument executed by all Parties.
14. In the event that one or more of the provisions contained in this MOU or any application thereof shall be found to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect, the validity legality and enforceability of the remaining provisions contained herein and any other application thereof shall not in any way be affected or impaired thereby.
15. By entering into this MOU, the Parties do not intend to create any right, title or interest in or for the benefit of any person or entity other than the Parties to this MOU. No person or entity shall claim any right, title or interest under this MOU or seek to enforce this MOU as a third-party beneficiary of this MOU.

WHEREFORE, the Parties hereby execute and enter into this MOU on the dates entered below, with the effective date being October 6, 2020 as agreed to by the Parties.

RESOLUTION OF THE TO'HAJIILEE NAVAJO CHAPTER TO APPROVE AND AUTHORIZE APPLYING FOR 2021 TIF CONSTRUCTION FUNDING FOR THE TO'HAJIILEE WATER SUPPLY LINE PROJECT.

WHEREAS:

1. To'Hajiilee Navajo Chapter, also known as Canoncito Band of Navajos (CBN), is a certified government, pursuant to 26 N.N.C., Section 3 (A) of the Navajo Nation Government, as listed as 11 N.N.C., Part 1, section 10, and delegated government authority with respect to local matters consistent with Navajo Law, including customs, traditions, and fiscal matter; and
2. The To'Hajiilee Navajo Chapter is empowered, pursuant to 26 N.N.C., Section 1 (B) is vested with authority to review all matters affecting the community and to make favorable decision when necessary and make recommendation(s) to Navajo Nation and other in the best interest of the community membership for appropriate actions, and
3. The Canoncito Band of Navajos (CBN) was granted by the United States Government certain lands in New Mexico to be held trust for the Canoncito Band Navajos by the Congressional Act of August 13, 1949 and with this recognition the CBN Tribal government has provided community services to the Canoncito Band of Navajos; and
4. To'Hajiilee Chapter tribal government is currently operating and maintaining the domestic water system that serves the community, which currently does not have a reliable water supply; and
5. The To'Hajiilee Navajo Chapter is coordinating with the Navajo Nation Water Management Branch and the consultant, Souder, Miller & Associates to complete the design of a new water supply line project to serve the community system, named and
6. The To'Hajiilee Chapter has listed the To'Hajiilee water supply project as the Number One (1) Priority of the To'Hajiilee Community on its Infrastructure Capital Improvements Plan.


NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. The To'Hajiilee Navajo Chapter authorizes applying to the State of New Mexico's Tribal Infrastructure Fund (TIF) to provide Financial Assistance for construction of the proposed To'Hajiilee water supply project.
2. The To'Hajiilee Navajo Chapter authorizes requests be made to the Federal Government including the BIA, IHS, HUD, and USDA; the Navajo Nation's Division of Water Resources; Albuquerque-Bernalillo County Water Utility Authority; Bernalillo County and other Local Agencies to provide Technical & Financial Assistance when requested to expedite the construction of the To'Hajiilee water supply project.

Honorable TIF Board Members:

The Indian Health Service (IHS) Office of Environmental Health and Engineering (OEHE) is aware of the imminent public health threat facing the To'Hajiilee Chapter and the approximately 2,000 Navajo residents due to the community's inadequate water supply.

To'Hajiilee currently relies on a single well (Well #5) that is prone to failure, as explained below, which can leave the entire community without water for up to 10 days at a time while pump repairs are made. The water outages also force the community's health clinic to close. These water outages, when they occur, can pose a serious threat to public health, especially during the COVID-19 crisis. Water is necessary for residents to wash their hands and practice basic hygiene to prevent the spread of the virus.

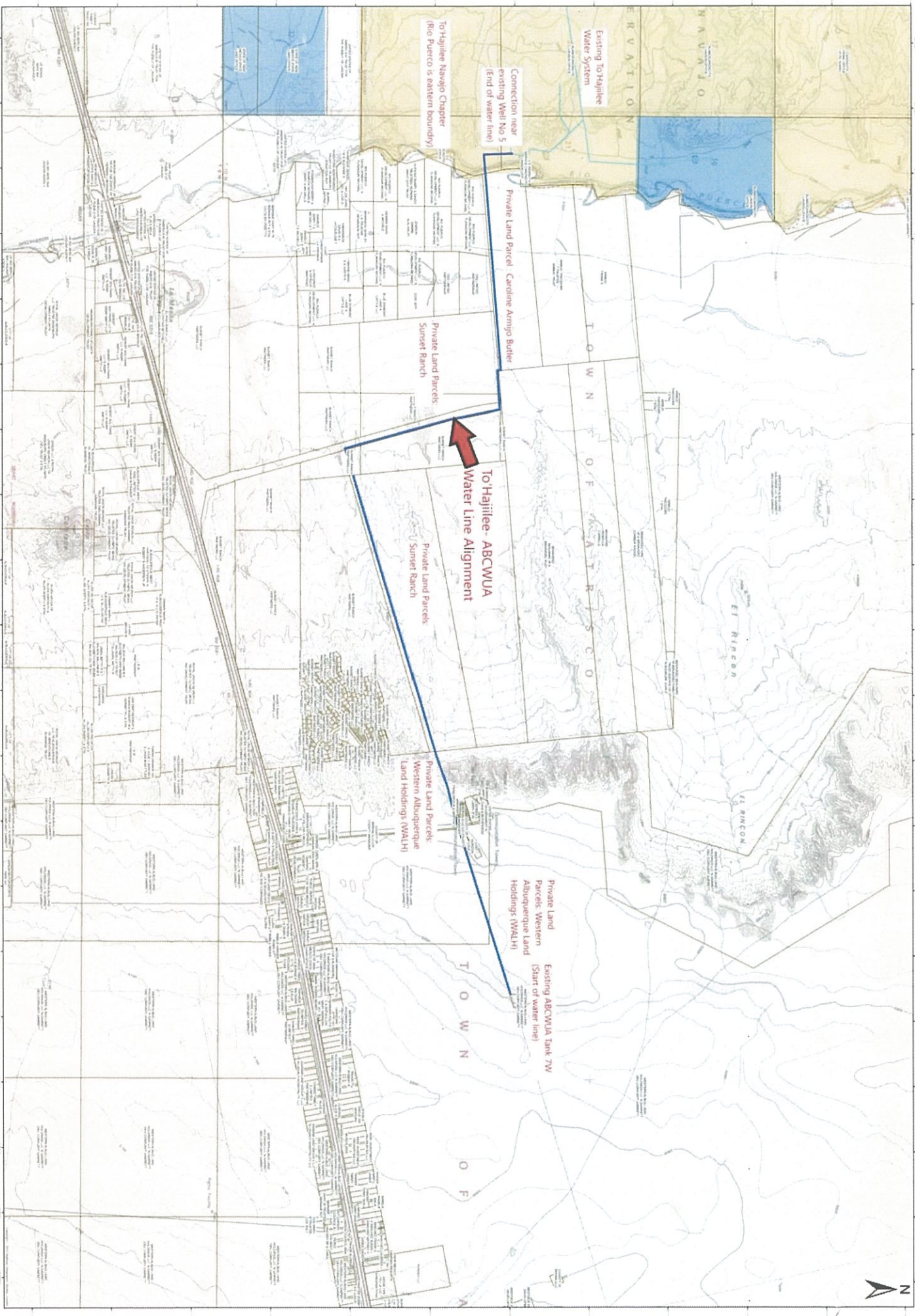
Well #5 does not provide enough water to serve the entire community. As a result, the Chapter has a waiting list of families to receive running water service to their existing homes. There are other well drilling projects currently under exploration; however, water quantity and quality is yet unknown, and these families will continue to experiencing the hardships and health risks described above on a daily basis. Well #5 is also at high risk of imminent collapse due to severe corrosion of the well casing, caused by the corrosive nature of the groundwater in the area. The Chapter's other three production wells, Wells # 1, 2 & 3, have already failed due to partial or total collapse and are now permanently off-line. The other two existing wells, Wells# 4 & 6, were never put on-line due to poor water quality and /or production. Well #5 is currently exhibiting signs of casing and drop pipe corrosion, such as pieces of rusted casing coming out of the well, which could be an indicator of imminent collapse. If Well #5 fails irreparably before a replacement water source is brought on-line, the community could be left without water or health care facilities for several months until an emergency water source can be provided.

The IHS supports any efforts to improve the public health of the people of To'Hajiilee by providing a more robust, reliable water supply for the community.
