18	by the appropriate standing committee(s) and the Navajo Nation Council except as	
19	otherwise provided herein. 2 N.N.C. § 164 (A).	
20	B. The Navajo Nation established the Naabik'íyáti' Committee as a Navajo Nation	
21	Council standing committee and as such empowered Naabik'íyáti' Committee to	
22	assist and coordinate all requests for information, appearances and testimony relating	
23	to proposed county, state and federal legislation impacting the Navajo Nation. See 2	
24	N.N.C. §§ 164 (A)(9), 701 (A)(4), 701(A)(6).	
25	C. The Navajo Nation has a government-to-government relationship with the United	
26	States of America, Treaty of 1868, Aug. 12, 1868, 15 Stat. 667.	
27	D. U.S. Route 191 (US 191) is a spur of U.S. Route 91 that has two branches. The	
28	southern branch runs for 1,465 miles (2,358 km) from Douglas, Arizona on the	
29	Mexican border to the southern part of Yellowstone National Park. The northern	
30	branch runs for 440 miles (710 km) from the northern part of Yellowstone National

Park to Loring, Montana, at the Canada–US border. Unnumbered roads within Yellowstone National Park connect the two branches. The highway passes through the states of Arizona, Utah, Wyoming, and Montana. Wikipededia, The Free Encyclopedia, https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/U.S.\_Route\_191.

E. Chief Manuelito, Hastiin Chi'il Haajin, lived from 1818 until 1893. Chief Manuelito was a chief both before and after the Long Walk to Fort Sumner and was one of the Chiefs who negotiated for the Navajo People to return to their homeland. Chief Manuelito was regarded as a brilliant strategist. Robert W. Young, A Political History of the Navajo Tribe, 41 (1978).


F. On July 4, 1898 on the travel home Chief Manuelito stated, "When we saw the top of the mountain (Mt. Taylor) from Albuquerque we wondered if it was our mountain and felt like falling to the ground, we loved it so . . .." Bill P. Acrey, Navajo History The Land and the People, 77 (1988).

- G. For nearly a decade after the return from Fort Sumner, from 1870 until 1884, Chief Manuelito served as the head chief of the Navajo Tribe and was the foremost leader in the Eastern area of the Navajo Nation. Robert W. Young, A Political History of the Navajo Tribe, 41 (1978).
- H. Chief Manuelito's leadership and advocacy concerning the importance of education helped pave the way for many Navajo's to continue on with their post-secondary education. He said, "My grandchild, school is the ladder. Tell our people this." Bill P. Acrey, Navajo History The Land and the People, 124 (1988).
- I. In 1980 the Navajo Nation established the Chief Manuelito Scholarship to provide scholarships to high achieving Navajo high school graduates with their post-secondary education. *See www.onnsfa.org*.
- J. In the best interest of the Navajo Nation to request the State of Arizona designate the Arizona portion of U.S. Route 191 as the "Chief Manuelito Highway."

# OLJATO CHAPTER STRONGLY OPPOSES LEGISLATION NO: 0018-21; DESIGNATE THE ARIZONA PROTION OF U.S. ROUTE 191 AS THE "CHIEF MANUELITO HIGHWAY".

### WHEREAS;

Pursuant to Navajo Nation Code, Section 4001 (D) and 4028 (a), (b), the Oljato Chapter is established and certified as a local government entity of the Navajo Nation vested with the authority to review all matters affecting the Chapter and submit appropriate recommendations to the Navajo Nation Government or other local agencies by resolution; and

Pursuant to 26 N.N.C., Chapter 1: Navajo Nation Chapter, Section 1., (B) (1) & (2), The 2. Navajo Nation Councils delegated to Chapter governmental authority with respect to local matters consistent with Navajo law, including custom and tradition and allows chapter to make decisions to govern with responsibility and accountability to community membership; and

The Oljato Chapter advocates in the best interest of its community members; we are currently 3. the 3rd generation of "Chief Manuelito" and our children are the 4th generation. Some of us know where he had lived, hiding his family from being captured. Today, we honor and respect his legacy. We would like for our father, great grandfather, great-great grandfather to rest in peace. Hastiin Ch'il Haajiní (Chief Manuelito), his mother is a sister of our 8 grandmothers who were taken by their husband to various locations. There are several names recognizing his name, "Manuelito" that has been taken without a thorough consent from the Bitahnii Clan. Hastiin Ch'il Haajiní died 128 years ago. Please allow him to rest; and

The Oljato Chapter members of the Bitahnii clan, do not agree to utilize the name "Manuelito"; 4. a highway where people have traveled, such fatalities has occurred due to intoxication, animals on the road at night, this is disrespecting our grandfathers: Hastiin Ch'il Haajini.

### NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT;

1. That Oljato Chapter opposes the naming of Highway 191 "Manuelito".
