Dear Honorable Members of the 25th Navajo Nation Council:

By signing this resolution into law, I am in support of approving \$50,000 from the Unreserved, Undesignated Fund Balance ("UUFB") to the Lexington Hotel Homeless Shelter ("Lexington"). These funds will allow Lexington to continue to serve one of our most vulnerable groups of people in the Gallup, N.M., and its surrounding areas. With the winter months now upon us, it is important that we help protect our Navajo relatives who find themselves without food, shelter and other basic necessities.

In supporting this good deed, I am cognizant of the fact that the Council must waive certain provision under Section 11 of the FY2024 Budget Instructions Manual to allow for direct payment from the Navajo Nation to the City of Gallup to benefit Lexington.

That being recognized, I encourage Lexington to seek alternative permanent funding sources in the future. I am happy to provide support letters in the future to assist Lexington as it addresses its fiscal challenges.

### RESOLUTION OF THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL 25th NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL - FIRST YEAR, 2023

#### AN ACTION

RELATING TO AN EMERGENCY FOR THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; APPROVING \$50,000 FROM THE UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE ("UUFB") FOR THE LEXINGTON HOTEL HOMELESS SHELTER TO CONTINUE ITS OPERATIONS; WAIVING CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF THE FY2024 BUDGET INSTRUCTIONS MANUAL TO ALLOW FOR DIRECT PAYMENT

#### BE IT ENACTED:

#### SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY

- A. The Navajo Nation Council is the governing body of the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. § 102(A). As such, the Council may consider emergency legislation. 2 N.N.C. §164(A)(16). "[M] atters constituting an emergency shall be limited to the cessation of law enforcement services, and disaster relief services, . . or other direct services required as an entitlement under Navajo Nation or Federal law, or which directly threaten the sovereignty of the Navajo Nation. Such an emergency matter must arise due to the pressing public need for such resolution(s) and must be a matter requiring final action by the Council." 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(16).
- B. As the governing body of the Navajo Nation, the Council may approve supplemental appropriations during the fiscal year. "Supplemental appropriations of General Funds within the current fiscal year are permitted, if and when additional sources of revenues above and beyond the initial or current revenue projections are projected and which are also in excess of the reserve amount set forth at § 820(J)." 12 N.N.C. § 820(L).
- C. A "supplemental appropriation" is defined as: "[a]n appropriation of funds from the UUFB during the fiscal year, outside of the annual Comprehensive Budget Process." See Section 2(37) of the FY2024 Budget Instructions Manual.
- D. Further Title 12 restrictions on supplemental appropriations, including all amounts from the UUFB, include:
  - 1. Payment of recurring government operating expenses shall be from recurring revenues, and payment of nonrecurring government expenses shall be from nonrecurring revenues such as UUFB funds. 12 N.N.C. § 820(E); 12 N.N.C. § 820(F).

- 2. Specifically, the UUFB shall not be used for recurring government expenditures or operations. 12 N.N.C. § 820(J); 12 N.N.C. § 820(L).
- 3. Nonrecurring revenues such as UUFB funds may be used only after the Controller determines if such revenues are subsidizing an imbalance between the Navajo Nation's recurring revenues and expenditures, and government expenditures shall only be authorized if a long-term (3-year to 5-year) forecast shows that the operating deficit will not continue; otherwise, nonrecurring revenues will be added to the UUFB. 12 N.N.C. § 820(F).
- 4. The above provisions in Title 12 may be amended or waived by a two-thirds vote of the full membership of the Navajo Nation Council. 12 N.N.C. § 820(F); 12 N.N.C. § 880.
- 5. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(F) all UUFB funding requests must be reviewed by the Controller, to ensure compliance with 12 N.N.C. § 820(L).
- 6. Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. § 820(M) all UUFB funding requests must be submitted to the Office of Management and Budget ("OMB") for a budget impact analysis.
- E. This resolution is being offered as an emergency action because the Lexington Hotel in Gallup, NM, a long-time provider of temporary shelter for the homeless, is facing imminent closure. Its closure will mean that many of our Diné relatives will have no temporary place to stay, to keep warm, and to get food and other basic necessities. The Hotel will close on December 31, 2023 if sufficient operating funds are not provided, and the City of Gallup has requested \$50,000 from the Navajo Nation to keep the Hotel open and operating. A letter from the City of Gallup to Navajo Nation President Nygren, dated September 14, 2023, is attached hereto as EXHIBIT A.

#### SECTION TWO. APPROVING THE COMPREHENSIVE BUDGET FOR FY2024

- A. The Lexington Hotel provides critical support services for many Navajos and other transients in the Gallup area. **EXHIBIT B**. Over 85% of the residents identified as Native American. **EXHIBIT C**. The Hotel's monthly operating budget is nearly \$152,000. **EXHIBIT C**. Without the Hotel, many persons face a danger to their lives and health, because they will be without shelter, food, and basic needs, and some may face death from exposure during the cold winter season.
- B. Navajo Nation Budget Forms for the requested supplemental appropriation from the UUFB have been provided. **EXHIBIT D**.

- C. The Office of the Controller has provided a memorandum as required by 12 N.N.C. § 820(L). This memorandum indicates that the proposed expenditures are non-recurring. **EXHIBIT E**.
- D. The Office of Management and Budget has provided a memorandum as required by 12 N.N.C. § 820(M). **EXHIBIT F.**
- E. The District 6 Joint Council has indicated its support for this \$50,000 appropriation for the Hotel. **EXHIBIT G**.
- F. The Navajo Nation finds that approving the requested \$50,000 to keep the Lexington Hotel open and operating is in the best interest of the Navajo Nation and our Diné relatives.

SECTION THREE. APPROVING \$50,000 FROM THE UNRESERVED, UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE ("UUFB") FOR THE LEXINGTON HOTEL HOMELESS SHELTER TO CONTINUE ITS OPERATIONS; WAIVING CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF THE FY2024 BUDGET INSTRUCTIONS MANUAL TO ALLOW FOR DIRECT PAYMENT

- A. The Navajo Nation hereby approves \$50,000 from the UUFB to the City of Gallup to keep the Lexington Hotel open and operating for the foreseeable future.
- B. This supplemental appropriation shall be from those funds that exceed the minimum fund reserve balance in the UUFB required by 12 N.N.C. § 820(J), as determined by the Controller.
- C. Immediately upon the effective date of this Action, the approved UUFB funds shall be provided by direct payment to the City of Gallup, via a check issued by the Office of the Controller.
- D. The Navajo Nation hereby waives the provisions under Section 11 of the FY2024 Budget Instructions Manual, to allow for direct payment of the approved \$50,000 to the City of Gallup.

#### SECTION FOUR. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Action shall become effective as provided in 2 N.N.C. § 221(B) and 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(17).

#### SECTION FIVE. SAVING CLAUSE

If any provision of this Action is determined invalid by the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, or by a Navajo Nation District Court without appeal to the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, those remaining provisions of this Action not determined invalid shall be the law of the Navajo Nation.

#### CERTIFICATION

RE: Lexington Hotel – Short-Term Operating Support

Dear Mr. President,

This letter is to request short term funding support needed to keep the Lexington Hotel open and Heading Home in operation as the provider.

Today, the City of Gallup met with Gallup Housing Authority, Hozho Center for Personal Enhancement, and many other concerned individuals and committed partners aimed at providing a short-, mid-, and long-term ownership, operation, and financing strategy to continue this vital homeless, transitional, and low-income housing option with wrap-around services in the City of Gallup for the regional need.

Attached is the current budget from Heading Home and ideas provided by the Hozho Center for Personal Enhancement for cost cutting measures to make this a bare bones operation. Based on these measures, we estimate the need is roughly \$50,000 a month for operation. We are soliciting support to raise 3-months' worth of funding or \$150,000 that could be used immediately to avoid the closure at the end of the month. The City is putting up the first \$50,000 and we are hoping that McKinley County and Navajo Nation can match that amount.

We are working on a State grant application due on September 22, 2023 that would be available in early October that could provide operational funding to take us from December – June 2024. This would give the City hopefully enough time to cement some longer-term options and funding strategies tied to State and Federal programs.

Again, the City of Gallup is available anytime to discuss this further and, in more detail, as we are committed to continuing this critical piece in the housing continuum. You can reach my office at (505) 863-1221 or email me at <a href="mailto:ideyoung@gallupnm.gov">ideyoung@gallupnm.gov</a>.

We are a group of physicians from the local hospitals in Gallup and would like to share our support for the Lexington

We believe that Housing First works, that providing housing and basic necessities to someone experiencing homelessness helps them start to pursue goals that benefit not only the individual, but our community as a whole – they are able to take care of their health, address their substance use, get an ID, apply for jobs, budget properly, and provide positive contributions to society.

We have seen firsthand the incredible impact that the Lexington Hotel has had on our patients. Patients who do not have safe places to live either stay in the hospital longer than is otherwise needed, or get discharged to unsafe and unideal circumstances, often leading to frequent emergency department and inpatient admissions. When we have been able to transition patients to the Lexington Hotel, we have seen dramatic results. Their diabetes is controlled for the first time in years, whereas previously they were unable to take their medications without having access to refrigeration to safely store their insulin. They are able to engage in primary care appointments and have their heart disease and high blood pressure addressed. They can follow up with crucial cancer screening. It is not an exaggeration to say that the presence of the Lexington Hotel in our community has saved lives. The Lexington Hotel has also worked closely with acute alcohol rehab programs to transition patients to safe housing options as they are in early recovery. They have an intensive case management program that is also able to facilitate next steps for patients in finding more permanent housing, jobs, IDs. For many individuals, their time at the Lexington Hotel has been their only sustained interaction with these supportive services which have allowed them to transition into more stable life situations again. This supportive housing option has been woven into the fabric if our community, and for it to leave so suddenly will have profoundly negative health impacts.

Supporting the Lexington Hotel is not only the right thing to do for our most vulnerable, it also decreases the impact of public health emergencies like COVID and saves precious community resources. We hope the State, County and City will support the continuation of what has become an essential service for the health and well-being of our community.

#### THE LEXINGTON HOTEL GALLUP, NEW MEXICO

The Lexington Hotel was first built in 1930 and served as a comfortable and classy hotel to travelers. In 2004 when it became a nonprofit called Care 66 the population of people experiencing homelessness had a place to call home as it was used to provide permanent supportive housing. In 2018, CARE 66—which used the Lexington Hotel for both rapid rehousing and permanent supportive housing—ceased operations. This further reduced affordable housing availability in Gallup.

Beginning in 2021, Heading Home began operating the renovated Lexington Hotel serving families and individuals experiencing homelessness. The Lexington, operating 24/7, is a 26-unit building that provides private rooms, shared common spaces, and a shared kitchen.

#### **RESULTS**

Since beginning operations in the February 2021, the Lexington has provided shelter and services to over 400 individuals and transitioned 12% to permanent housing. Over 85% of residents assisted identified as American Indian, followed by the next largest demographic of White at 4%; others identified as mix race.

#### **SUMMARY**

Heading Home will cease operations on September 30, 2023 unless sustainable funding can be secured. The best option is for another organization to take over the operations beginning October 1, 2023.

Many of the sheltered at Lexington are clan relatives or community members who are encountering homelessness and who have decided on their own to recover from their addiction while pursuing a job and/or attend counseling sessions, or may be families consisting of children, who need shelter security.

As the District 6 Joint Council, composed of six (6) Chapter communities nearby and outside the Gallup city limit, with a residency population of over 20,000+, we realize that the adverse impacts of homelessness and housing instability can affect the health, childhood education, personal safety, and financial stability, of those needing shelter.

The District 6 Joint Council encourages as many government and non-government entities to assist with funding at this time to continue the operation at Lexington Hotel to shelter the homeless. We encourage the Navajo Nation Council, with the support of the Navajo Nation President, to support and approve funding toward the sheltering of our clan relatives and others to continue at the Lexington Hotel.
